information concerning LCN John Roselli and got matters. a version on Frank Sinatra's activities in Las Vegas which resulted in Sinatra's discharge as an entertainer at the Sands Hotel. stated that Sinatra, upon learning that his wife, Mia, had lost \$20,000 gambling at the Sands Hotel, became furious and purchased \$50,000 worth of chips in an attempt to win back his wife's losses. Within a 45 minute interval he had lost the \$50,000. Upon learning of Sinatra's losses, Howard Hughes (not identified) ordered Sinatra's credit stopped. Sinatra, intoxicated, tore his room to shambles. He then obtained a golf cart and drove it all around the front of Sands Hotel. Carl Cohen (not identified) attempted to calm Sinatra; however, Sinatra threw some chips in Cohen's face at which time Cohen punched Sinatra in the mouth causing the loss of teeth. Informant advised that it was indicated that this activity was planned in order to have Sinatra's contract at the Sands broken so that he could later be placed in Caesar's Palace, since this establishment had Family* interests. Informant did not believe this was planned, however, to the extent that Sinatra would loose two teeth.

This reference indicated that Roselli was active in LCN matters.







Sinatra, who was born December 12, 1915 (or 1916), in Hoboken, New Jersey, was associated early in his singing career with the late notorious Willie Moretti, a long-time La Cosa Nostra leader in northern New Jersey who became the victim of a gangland type slaying in 1951. Also quite early in his career, Sinaira was quite friendly with Paul Emelio D'Amato, a La Cosa Nostra member who, for many years, was the proprietor of The 500 Club, a night spot in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Sinatra's association with D'Amato, who has served a penitentiary sentence as a panderer, continued over the years with Sinatra appearing at The 500 Club during many summer seasons. It has been reported that during some of those appearances, Sinatra rented one or two entire sleeping floors in the Claridge Hotel in Atlantic City for party purposes, the party actually being a cover for clandestine meetings of La Cosa Nostra leaders.

D'Amato and Sinatra were associated in the operation of the Cal Neva Lodge at Lake Tahoe, Nevada, during 1963. Salvatore "Sam" Giancana, long-time "boas" of the Chicago "Jamily"

of La Cosa Nostra, was frequently Sinatra's guest at the Cal Neva Lodge during that period. These connections on the part of Sinatra provided a basis for the revocation of his gambling license in the State of Nevada and the disposal of his interest in the Cal Neva Lodge as well as the Sands Hotel in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Sinatra was present in 1947 in Havana, Cube, with top leaders of La Cosa Nostra who had gone there to meet with Salvatore Lucania. more commonly known as Lucky Luciano, former "boss of bosses" of La Cosa Nostra in the United States. Luciano had entered Cuba surreptitiously from his native country, Italy, to which he had been deported upon his parole from a New York State penitentiary where he had been serving a sentence on conviction for compulsory prostitution

Sinatra has long been very friendly with the Fischettis. particularly Joseph and Rocco. The Fischettis were connected with the Chicago "family" of La Cosa Nostra once headed by their cousin, the late Al Capone. Their deceased brother, Charles Fischetti, was once "boss" of the Chicago La Cosa Nostra.

In addition to the foregoing, 67D Colombo was asked by Patriarca to meet with Sinatra because of a close friendship between the two. In prior years, Sinatra, together with his friend and fellow entertainer. Dean Martin, became a director of the Berkshire Downs Race Track in western Massachusetts. 670

It is thought that this known and alleged connection of Sinatra's with La Cosa Nostra leadership might be of interest to vou.

Sinatra was reportedly born December 18, 1915 (or 1916), in Moboken, New Jersey. He began his singing career in approximately 1935 and early in his career was associated with the late Villie Moretti, a long-time member of La Cosa Nostra and a leader of the organized criminal element in morthern New Jersey who was executed in gangland fashion in 1951. In his early days as a singer, Sinatra was also reported to have been Very friendly with Paul Englio D'Amato, who was also identified as a member of La Cosa Nostra and who owned a night club in Atlantic City, New Jersey, At which Sinatra regularly performed. D'Amato and Sinatra were also associated in the operation of the Cal Neva Lodge at Lake Tahoe, Mevada, in the early 1980's.

Over the years, Sinatra has also been identified as an associate of Salvatore "Sam" Siancana, the former head of La Coma Wostra in Chicago. Siancana was identified as a guest of Sinatra's at the Cal Neva Lodge on several occasions in the early 1960's.

In October, 1963, Sinatra announced that he would not fight an attempt by the Nevada Gaming Commission to revoke his gambling license at the Cal Meya-Lodge. The Commission had reportedly sought to revoke Sinatra's license on the ground that he entertained "underworld figure" Sam Giancana at the Cal Neva Lodge in the past. Sinatra was also forced to sell his interest in the Sands Motel in Las Vegas, Mevada.

In June, 1969, Sinatra was subpoensed to appear before the New Jersey State Commission of Investigation which was probing organized crime and corruption in New Jersey. Sinatra refused to honor this subpoens and as a result, a warrant citing him for civil contempt was issued. Sinatra was purged

Chester Gray, advised that Gray was in Las Vegas at Caesar's Palace during the prior weekend and allegedly had some type of business contact with actor Frank Sinatra. Gray and three other individuals were arrested on May 29, 1969, at which time a large quantity of stolen securities was recovered by FBI Agents of our New York Office. On November 1, 1971, Gray was sentenced in U.S. District Court, New York City, to serve a term of three years in prison. (87-38830-208)

A confidential source who was in a position to know advised in March, 1970, that Sam Giancana, nationally known organized crime figure, had a falling out with Frank Sinatra and was reportedly watching Sinatra's activities for possible retaliation. 

Sinatra is one of a number of individuals who are currently subjects in an Interstate Transportation in Aid of Racketeering--Extortion investigation initiated by the FBI in February, 1971. That investigation was based on information received from a confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past that an attempt was made to extort \$100,000 from one Ronald Alpert by the use of physical force and by threatening Alpert's life. According to this source, Alpert was seeking buyers for Computer Field Expressway stock and allegedly came up with an investor who bought \$100,000 worth of this stock, reportedly put up by three individuals, who were described as active in organized crime circles, and Frank Sinatra. Subsequently, the value of this stock dropped and the \$100,000 investment was lost. (166-5477)

A copy of an FBI Identification Record, Number 3 794 610, was sent the White House by communication dated August 21, 1967. The files of the Identification Division reveal no additional arrest record.

This is in response to the Acting Director's inquiry. Following is a current brief concerning the above captioned individual.

Sinatra, who was born December 12, 1915 (or 1916), in Hoboken, New Jersey, was associated early in his singing career with the late notorious Willie Moretti, a long-time La Cosa Nostr leader in northern New Jersey who became the victim of a gangland type slaying in 1951. Also quite early in his career, Sinatra wa quite friendly with Paul Emelio D'Amato, a La Cosa Nostra member who, for many years, was the proprietor of The 500 Club, a night spot in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Sinatra's association with D'Amato, who has served a penitentiary sentence as a panderer, continued over the years with Sinatra appearing at The 500 Club during many summer seasons. It has been reported that during some of those appearances, Sinat rented one or two entire sleeping floors in the Claridge Hotel in Atlantic City for party purposes, the party actually being a cover for clandestine meetings of La Cosa Nostra leaders.

D'Amato and Sinatra were associated in the operation of the Cal Neva Lodge at Lake Tahoe, Nevada, during 1963. Salvatore "Sam" Giancana, long-time boss of the Chicago "family" of La Cosa Nostra, was frequently Sinatra's guest at the Cal Neva Lodge during that period. These connections on the part of Sinat provided a basis for the revocation of his gambling license in the State of Nevada and the disposal of his interest in the Cal Neva Lodge as well as the Sands Hotel to be Vegative and the Cal Neva

Sinatra was present in 1947 in Havana, Cuba, with top leaders of La Cosa Nostra who had gone there to meet with Salvatore Lucania, more commonly known as Lucky Luciano, former

"boss of bosses" of La Cosa Nostra in the United States. Luciano had entered Cuba surreptitiously from his native country, Italy, to which he had been deported upon his parole from a New York State penitentiary where he had been serving a sentence on conviction for compulsory prostitution.

Sinatra has long been very friendly with the Fischettis particularly Joseph and Rocco. The Fischettis were connected Wil the Chicago "family" of La Cosa Nostra once headed by their coust the late Al Capone. Their deceased brother, Charles Fischetti, once "boss" of the Chicago La Cosa Nostra.

In addition to the foregoing, that Joseph Colombo, a New York La Cosa Nostra leader, met with Sinatra Raymond Patriarca. New England La Cosa Nostra leader,

that Colombo was asked by Patriarca to meet with Sinatra because of a close friendship between the two. In prior years, Sinatra, together with his friend and fellow entertainer, Dean Martin, became a director of the Berkshire Downs Race Track in western Massachusetts.

In June, 1969, Sinatra was subpoenaed to appear before the New Jersey State Commission of Investigation which was probing organized crime and corruption in New Jersey. Sinatra refused to honor this subpoena, and as a result a warrant citing him for civil contempt was issued. Sinatra was purged of this contempt after testifying before the Commission on February 17, 1970, and the contempt citation was dismissed at that time. The nature of Sinatra's testimony before the Commission has not been made known.

In June, 1969, a confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past advised that a group of individuals, including several members of the organized crime element in the Kansas City, Missouri, area, took a junket trip to Las Vegas, Nevada, sponsored by Caesar's Palace Hotel. According

to this source, Joe "Turk" Harris personally contacted Frank Sinatra, who was appearing at Caesar's Palace, and had Mr. Sinatra and his daughter, Nancy, meet with these individuals.

ЫD Chester Zochowski, who is also known as Chester Gray, advised that Gray was in Las Vegas at Caesar's Palace during the prior weekend and allegedly had some type of business Contact with actor Frank Sinatra. Gray and three other individuals were arrested on May 29, 1969, at which time a large quantity of stolen securities was recovered by FBI Agents of our New York Office. On November 1, 1971, Gray was sentenced in U.S. District Court, New York City, to serve a term of three years in prison.

A confidential source who was in a position to know advised in March, 1970, that Sam Giancana, nationally known organized crime figure, had a falling out with Frank Sinatra and was reportedly watching Sinatra's activities for possible retaliation. According to this source, Giancana felt that Mr. Sinatra's main ambition at that time was to be the number one man in the Italian hierarchy in the United States.

a confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past advised that Joseph Anthony Colombo, head of the Italian-American Civil Rights League (IACRL) and a leader of the organized crime element in the New York City area, had discussed the planned Italian-American rally to be held on June 29, 1970, at Columbus Circle, New York. According to this source, Frank Sinatra was to be one of three individuals from the show business world who would be at this rally.

In December, 1970, a confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past advised that Frank Singtra was the godfather to one of David Robert Iacovetti's children. Iacovetti was described as a member of the organized crime element in the Miami, Florida, area.



A source who has furnished reliable information in the past advised on January 3, 1973, that Frank Sinatra is a close -67D friend of Angelo DeCarlo of long standing.

Sources who have furnished reliable information in the past have described DeCarlo as a respected member of organized crime in the United States who holds a position of "caporegima" in the Genovese family of La Cosa Nostra.

On December 21, 1972, DeCarlo was released from the United States penitentiary, Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, after a des commutation of his sentence by Presidential order.

A source who has furnished reliable information in the past advised that DeCarlo's release came as no real surprise to certain associates of DeCarlo as they had b7D been informed by someone very close to DeCarlo that he was expecte to be released before Christmas.

670 This source further stated that these same associates are attributing DeCarlo's release to the intervention of singer Frank Sinatra, whose close personal relationship with Vice President Spiro Agnew allegedly served as the necessary "contact." The source stated that Sinatra's efforts had allegedly been in the works for "at least a couple of months."

Information concerning Sinatra's friendship with DeCarlo and DeCarlo's release from Federal custody was furnished to the Department by Newark's letterhead memorandum dated January 11, 1973.

On May 18, 1973, Mr. Jonathon L. Goldstein, United States Attorneys office, Newark, New Jersey, advised

that he was contacted on May 17, 1973, by claimed to have information indicating that initial contact to secure the release of Angelo DeCarlo from Federal custody was made in April, 1972, by DeCarlo to a singer with a rock group performing at the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary. This singer (Frankie Valli of the Four Seasons Quartet) was allegedly requested to contact Frank Sinatra and have him intercede with Vice President Agnew for DeCarlo's release. This request was ostensibly related to Mrs. Sinatra who in turn supposedly forwarded to Frank Sinatra. continued that Frank Sinatra allegedly turned over \$100,000 cash to Maurice Stans as an unrecorded contribution. Subsequently, due to the fact that Vice President Agnew had been "stripped of his authority by White House aides," one Peter Maletesta (possibly identical to Peter John Malatesta, who was employed as a staff assistant to the Vice President as recently as January, 1971, Bufile 161-7758) allegedly contacted former Presidential Counsel John Dean and got him to make the necessary arrangements to forward the request to the Justice Department. Sinatra then allegedly "made a \$50,000 contribution to the President's campaign fund sometime during December, 1972. Decarlo's release followed. "

A summary of Sinatra's background and association with organized crime figures, prior to that information developed concerning his friendship with DeCarlo has been made available to The White House by letters dated August 21, 1967, April 25, 1969, and February 18, 1972.

While Bufiles do not disclose this information, it is recalled from recent newspaper articles that Sinatra was originally scheduled to entertain at President Nixon's most recent Inaugural Ball and he failed for some reason to make an appearance About the same time he reportedly had a strong verbal exchange wit society columnist Maxine Cheshire in which he reputedly used obscene language in "chewing her out." Most recently Sinatra did appear at The White House and entertained the President of Italy who was visiting this country :

Dear Mr. Taylor:

Receipt of your letter dated June 20, 1975, and addressed to the Deputy Attorney General is acknowledged.

Your request for a report concerning Francis Albert "Frank" Sinatra is not being processed pending notification from you of whether you have the permission of Mr. Sinatra to make such a request. Documentation of the authorization should take the form of a signed and notarized statement from Mr. Sinatra clearly empowering you to request and receive materials pertaining to him from our files.

The Freedom of Information Act exempts disclosures which would constitute an unwarranted invasion of privacy. The exemption is specified by Title .5, United States Code, Section 552 (b) (6) and (b) (7) (C).

Although the materials you have requested might include some small portions obtained from public sources, such as newspaper clippings, which would not be exempt from disclosure, I feel certain you are not seeking such materials and would be dissatisfied with such a disclosure.

Accordingly, I believe it would be pointless and a misconstruction of your apparent purpose in making this request to process it without further comment from you on the question of whether you have Mr. Sinatra's authorization.

Though deplorable on conventional grounds, the demise of mother was a necessary prior condition of the great success of their story on the stage. Mother had a habit of suing and, were she alive, doubtless would have slapped a writ on this production alleging defamation. And she probably would have tried to cast herself in the role of mother, which, by the will of Divine providence, fell to Ethel Mersagn.

It is not boyish infatuation which moves me to easy that the sisters are signify and, to the amagement of many, polite. They are now deeply involved in homemade literature and their book sales may accelerate with the show.

It has been dawning and dawning upon moralists and historians that many prominent and seemly people come from the most unpromising sources, and vice versa.

The Churchill kids and the Roosevelts, with one exception, passed on their way down two scrawny brats of the carnivals and vaudeville on their way up. To be sure, the Hovick sisters, children of a reporter in Scattle, may have sprung from remoter forebears of noble quality if obscure status. Sir Winston, himself, actually came from a sorry family whose principal virtue down to his own career was not honor nor even decency but mere success.

The Roosevelts had bad "blood," including spec-

tacular drunkards and fence-jumpers.

The annals of royalty and aristocracy are not always sweeter than those of the lowly mother who thrust Gypsy Rose Lee into strange renown achieved without sacrifice of virtue by dropping her shoulder straps and then her gown to stand briefly in the lunar glow of the spotlight.

Philip of England found Frank Sinatra in a crowded room in Hollywood with Leo Durocher, Allen Smiley, Buggsy Siegel and other such knighthood and the consort was so impressed that to cultivate his catch he invited Frank and Ava to a command performance for the Queen in London.

Hardly Deserved Such Honor

Noel Coward shook his head. Yes, yes; these were hardly the sort who deserved such honor by ancient standards. But Scotland Yard and the FBI cooperate and the Foreign Office undoubtedly knew the truth. So objections must have been raised—and waived—and who was he, though a Briton and a patriot, to cry "come, come!"

And, anyway, there had been Edward, Prince of Wales, a remarkably lively man, and, on the continent, a whole roster of royal roosters whose activities were still honored tradition in certain premises in Paris and Vienna not devoted to statesmanship or culture in the best sense of the term.

I am in complete accord with the statement made earlier this week by J. Nicola of the Catholic Legion of Decency who said, "The Legion evaluates films the basis of art, not the artist."

As the producer of the film I and I alone will be responsible for it. I accept the responsibility. I ask only that judgment be deferred until the picture is seen.

I would also like to comment on the attacks from certain quarters on Senat John Kennedy by connecting him with my decision on employing a screenwriter.

This type of partisan politics is hitting below the belt.

I make movies. I do not ask the advice of Senator Kennedy on whom I shou hire. Senator Kennedy does not ask me how he should vote in the Senate.

I am prepared to stand on my principles and to await the verdict of the American people when they see "The Execution of Private Slovik."

I repeat: In my role as a picture-maker, I have—in my opinion—hired the beman to do the job.

How Hood Got Sinatra In a Jam

Giancana Flew To Nevada After FBI Watch Ended

BY JACK WILLNER

The day after U.S. District Judge Richard B. Austin ordered the FBI to limit its surveillance of hoodlum Sam Giancana, the mobster hopped a plane for a Nevada rendezvous with singer Frank Sinatra.

These developments came out of an investigation by the Nevada Gaming Control Board, which has charged Sinatra with "catering to persons of notorious, unsavory reputation."

A five-point complaint was filed by board chairman Edward Olsen with the State Gaming Commission, which will make the decision on whether to revoke the gambling license of Sinatra's Lake Tahoe resort, the Cal-Neva Lodge.

The FBI dropped its watch entirely and investigators for Sheriff Richard B. Ogilvie took, up the job.

The nex day, according to Nevada authorities, Giancana eluded the sheriff's men and turned up at Sinatra's lodge, where he met his sometime companion, singer Phyllis Maguire. He stayed until July 28.

Sinatra admitted to a Nevada investigator that he has known Giancana and Miss Maguire "socially" for a long time, but denied having business dealings with the hoodlum.

DURING his stay Giancana stepped into a quarrel between Miss Maguire and her manager.

A handful of resort employes joined the battle, which developed into a brawl before Sinatra stopped it, witnesses told the Nevada investigators.

A spokesman for Sinatra told The Daily News, however, that the singer was not present during the fight.

Loss of his gambling license would also force Sinatra to sell his interest in the Sands Hotel in Las Vegas.

The Cal-Neva closed last Saturday in what a lodge spokesman described as a regular seasonal closing.

Sinatra was unavailable for comment. He was in New York preparing for an appearance Friday at a United Nations staff party.

Wednesday night he had been scheduled to appear at the Americana Hotel where his sdn. Frank Jr., was singing, but changed his plans without explanation.

The complaint said Sinatra

had "maintained and continued social association with Giancana for a number of years."

Olsen added that the singer "openly stated he intends to continue his friendship in defiance of the Nevada gaming code."

THE BOARD was acting under a Nevada law which created a so-called "Black Book" of 11 persons, including Giancana, who are not welcome in the state's gambling halls: The law is aimed at keeping Nevada's legalized gambling industry free from bigtime racketeers.

Knowing permitting one of the 11 on the premises is the housing of Giancana, 41grounds for license revocation, though all three would lose although it is not a criminal offense.

Sinatra was also accused of threatening Olsen with obscene language in trying to get the board to drop an investigation into his relationship with Giancana. Olsen said the threat came in a telephone call Aug. 31.

The complaint accused a member of Sinatra's staff, Paul (Skinny) d'Amato, with trying to bribe two gaming agents who were checking the winnings at the Cal-Neva, No further details were given-

The board said that Sinatra's partners at the Cal-Neva, Henry Sanicola and Sanford Waterman, were blameless in their licenses if the commission dinds against Sinatra.

PATRIARCA, WHO IS SERVING A SENTENCE FOR CONSPIRACY TO COMMIT MURDER, SAID HE KNEW SINATRA ONLY "ON TELEVISION AND IN THE MOVING PICTURES."

AND AGREED TO INVEST IN THE TRACK.

PATRIARCA SAID HE CLAIMED THE FIFTH AMENDMENT BECAUSE OF A PENDING TRIAL IN RHODE ISLAND. OF THE QUESTIONS HE DID ANSWER, PATRIARCA SAID HE WAS ONLY A MIDDLE CLASS VENDING MACHINE OPERATOR AND DID NOT HAVE \$214,000 TO INVEST IN ANYTHING.

HE ALSO SAID THAT JOSEPH "THE BARON" BARBOZA, WHO IN TESTIMONY MAY 24 LINKED PATRIARCA AND SINATRA WITH MAFIA DEALINGS AT THE TRACK, WAS "A NUTCAKE."
