Information has been received at the Bureau to the effect that Henry Miller, who was described as a phony writer, recently spoke at Cortwouth College before a group of members of the Navy V-12 Program. It was alleged that Miller told the group that the Hamis were must the same sort of people as the Americans and that they were fighting for the same thing. According to our source of information, Miller has a following among pseudo intellectuals in this country, believes the Maxis are very decent people, and likes collaborationists.

on Miller, we have not been able to identify him with any information in the Bureau's files. However, it is desired that preliminary inquiries be instituted at Dartmouth for the purpose of identifying Miller and determining the exact nature of his remarks made at a recent speech at that school. Your inquiries in this matter should generally follow the line of a sedition investigation and the Bureau should be appropriately advised of the results of your inquiries in an investigative report. It is not the Bureau's desire that an extensive investigation be conducted in this matter unless your preliminary inquiries indicate the desirability of such a course of action.

AT HANOVER, NEW HAMPSHIRE

Stated that
the Subject is a writer of considerable note and has had several books
published in this country and abroad. He stated that many of the Subject's
books were not permitted to be published in this country because of the
fact that the writer seemed to have absolutely no morals governing the
choice of the words that he used.

The Subject had been at Dartmouth some time between November 12 and November 17, 1944. The Subject appeared for fifty minutes before each of these two classes in a question-answer group discussion. Both of these classes consisted of members of the Navy V-12 program as well as civilian students.

entire discussion to "bait" the Subject

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enclosing an article which appeared in a Jewish publication and which was later reprinted in the DAILY WORKER. was unable to locate the above mentioned article nor was he able to recall the Jewish publication in which it had originally appeared.

stated that the Subject at no time made any statements concerning the fact that the Nazis were very decent people and that he liked collaborationists. In fact, there was nothing which could be considered subversive or un-American mentioned by the Subject

He state apparently felt that the Subject in some of his previous writings had indicated an anti-Semitic attitude, and for this reason, had deliberately gone out of his way to attempt to get the Subject to make statements which would indicate this anti-Semitism.

It is to be noted that the discussions had between Subject the discussions had between Subject were concerned primarily with creative writing and were definitely non-political. Most of the questions asked by the students were concerned with the source material of the books and articles written by the Subject.

The Subject was described as the subject was being an ultra-modern type of writer who went to such an extreme in the use of certain words that many of his books were not allowed to be published in this country. He stated, however, that the Subject has a substantial following among military groups in this country and is considered by many critics to be one of the foremost American writers at this time.

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stated that he has known the Subject for many years out has only actually met him on two different occasions. He stated that the Subject is strictly the artist type and could very easily be called "screwball" by people who didn't understand or appreciate his writing. The Subject apparently has no substantial source of income, his chief income being obtained through gifts from several of his followers who have considerable wealth.

stated that if further information concerning the Subject's background was desired, would be a logical source for this information. He further stated that most of the writings of the Subject are non-political and that none of them at all reflect that the Subject is in any way subversive or un-American. He stated that the Subject is considered somewhat of a pacifist as is the case with practically all of the true artists. At the present time, the Subject makes his home at Big Sur, California.

two classes before which the Subject appeared and the writer was able to obtain the names of students who had listened to the Subject talk.

AT DARTHOUTH COLLEGE, NEW HAMPSHIRE

the Subject had given a talk before a Comparative Literature class of which he was a member and that at no time during this talk or the resulting discussion was any mention made of the Nazis or other problems involving current international politics. He stated that the discussion was principally a question-answer affair, in which the students questioned the Subject principally concerning the source of the subject matter and material which the Subject had employed in many of his books and writings. Another Subject which was discussed was a comparison of the ethics and morals of the United States with those of many of the countries in which the Subject had travelled.

He stated that had announced at the beginning of the discussion period that the questions were to be absolutely non-political and were to concern themselves with creative writing and also concerning the writings of the Subject. Most of the questions which were put to the Subject were concerning source material for his books and also concerning the ethics and morals of countries in which the Subject had travelled, in comparison with those in this country.

who at one point attempted to dominate the entire discussion and that it was necessary for to advise that the Subject was the guest speaker and requested to refrain from asking so many questions. According to apparently became angered at some statement which the Subject had made, which he thought had been directed toward him personally and from then on until he was repulsed by had attempted to "heckle" the Subject.

said that there was absolutely nothing said by the Subject which could be construed as being un-American or subversive and that no mention was made of the Nazis being decent people at that time such as the Americans.

furnished in substance much of the same information previously furnished by He also stated that there was no mention during the Subject's discussion with the class of current international political problems and that there was nothing said by the Subject which could be construed as being un-American or subversive.

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In view of the fact that the allegation furnished to the Bureau concerning the Subject appears to be without basis, no further investigation is being conducted and this case is being closed on the authority of the Special Agent in Charge.

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
