It is understood and agreed that the sum tendered herewith is a voluntary, gratuitous contribution to said fund, which I understand is to be administered in the following manner:

The Director of the Bureau will appoint a committee which shall consider all matters pertaining to the acquisition, safe keeping, and expending of said fund, which committee will recommend appropriate action to the Director of the Bureau in pertinent matters. The Chief Clerk of said Bureau shall receive all contributions and account for same to the Director.

Upon the death of any Special Agent, the appointed committee will consider the case and submit a recommendation to the Director as to its conclusions. Appropriate instructions will then be issued to the Chief Clerk, directing him to pay to the designated beneficiary the sum of \$5,000.

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John Lizer Moover was born Jenuary 1, 1895, in the District of Colm Mic. We are seducated in the Public Bahaals of the District of Delm Mic, preducting from Central High Mahaal in 1913. He holds the to rees of LL.M., and LL.M., from Bearge Mashington University and also the Lenorary degree of Doctor of Laws from George Washington University, Pennsylvenia Military College, New York University, mestrinster Ballage, Oklahoma Baptist University, Georgetown University at Praka University. He holds an honorary degree of Doctor of Civil Laws from the University of the South. He has been admitted to produce for the District of Columbia, the United States Court of Claims, and the United States Supreme Court. He is a trustee of the Jean's askington University and a member of the Board of Directors of the Jentral Dispensary and Emergency Mospital, Washington, D. C.

Fr. Hoover entered the Department of Justice in 1917 and in 1713 was appointed Special Assistant to the Attorney General. From 1/41 until 1974, he served as Assistant Director of the Bureau of Investigation, and in May, 1924, he was named Director.

Ir. Hoover holds the Commission of Lieutenant-Colonel in the library latelligance Division of the Officers. Reserve Corps, Initial States arry. He is a member of the Columbia Country Club, Nevy These. Deryland; the Metropolitan Club, Washington, D. C.; the Masonia Traterrity; the Mappa Alpha Preternity; an honorary member of the Omicron Delta Mappa Fraternity and of the Zeta Sigma Pi, a Matienal Memorry which Science Fraternity; a life member of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the International Association for Mentification, and the Chief Constables Association of Car Ca, and is an hyporary member of many state-wide police, sheriffs, and other law enforcement associations.

On June 14, 1939, Mr. Moover was awarded the Alwani Achievement Award by the George Washington University Alumni Association.

The ITI Resignal Police Academy Associates conferred their first is northly Award on Ar. Hoover on September 27, 1939, in recognition of Lie pioneering in the field of Police Training.

In April 22, 12.0, the Public Velfere Medal of the national nectons of Sciences was awarded to ir. Hoover, ".....for estimated in the application of science to the public welfare."
The Saturans of loveign wars conferred their Gold Citizenship Medal upon Ir. Fooder on October 25, 1940, for "Outstanding contributions to the cause of incricanism and the American way of Life."


