



Mr. Kennedy has been awarded honorary Doctor of Laws degrees by the following institutions of learning:

Colby College, Waterville, Maine, on June 17, 1946; Notre Dame University, South Bend, Indiana, on June 1, 1941; Oglethorpe University, Oglethorpe University, Georgia, on May 30, 1937; and Catholic University of America, Washington, D. C., on November 13, 1939.

Employment and Activities

Mr. Kennedy was employed from September 12, 1912, to November 14, 1913, as a bank examiner by the State of Massachusetts.

From 1917 to 1919 Mr. Kennedy was employed as assistant to the general manager of the Quincy Yard, Shipbuilding Division, Bethlehem Steel Company, Quincy, Massachusetts.

Mr. Kennedy was employed by 'Hayden Stone and and Company, Boston, Massachusetts, from July 1, 1919, to December 30, 1922. He was hired as a customers's broker and on July 1, 1920, was made manager of the Stock Exchange Department of the company, which position he held until his resignation.

In 1927 Mr. Kennedy, along with others, purchased the controlling interest of Film Booking Offices of America. In 1928 he reportedly sold his interest to the Radio Corporation of America.

On May 5, 1928, Mr. Kennedy was elected chairman of the Board of Directors of the Keith, Albee, Orpheum Theatres Corporation for a period of one year.

Mr. Kennedy was also on the Board of Directors of the Pathe Exchange, Incorporated, during the late 1930's.

On July 3, 1934, Mr. Kennedy was appointed as a commissioner of the Securities and Exchange Commission, New York City. This employment was terminated on September 23, 1935, by reason of resignation. At the time of his resignation. Mr. Kennedy was serving as chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Mr. Konnedy became a member of the United States Maritime Commission, Washington, D. C., on April 16, 1937. On February 17, 1938, he resigned and at the time of his resignation, he was serving as chairman of this Commission.

On February 13, 1938, Mr. Kennedy was appointed the American Ambassador to England. On November 30, 1940, he resigned from this position.

From 1940 to the present time Mr. Kennedy has been engaged in the management of his various business enterprises. He maintains an office at 230 Park Avenue,





SAC James Gale advised at 11:55 p.m. that Mr. Kennedy's room had been thoroughly checked out by sound trained SA's but no hidden microphones or other technical equipment was located.

Mr. Kennedy indicated that he was quite pleased at the way his request was handled by the Agents. He said that he intended to call Mr. Hoover on the morning of 12/4/61 to express his appreciation to him personally.

He was engaged in corporation finance from 1930 to 1984; appointed to the Securities and Exchange Commission on July 2, 1934; and elected Chairman of the SEC in 1934 and reelected in 1935. He resigned that position in 1935. He was appointed Chairman of the United States Maritime Commission in 1937 and was United States Ambassador to Great

Britain from 1937 to 1940 and resigned from that post in Movember 1940.

Mr. Kennedy is a Democrat, a Catholic, and has an estate on North Cocan Boulevard, Palm Springs, Florida, and a summer home in Hyannisport, Massachusetts. He also spends considerable time in New York City.

Special Agent Manual of the Boston Field Division, resident Agent at Hyannis, Mass., has had many productive investigative and social contacts with former Ambassador Mennedy at Hyannisport.

Kennedy, Agent was informed by the former Ambansador that he, Kennedy, is still actively engaged in the liquor business in New York City and owns several moving picture houses there. He stated that he maintains very close connections, financial and otherwise, with the moving picture industry in California and presently fears that the Communists and their fellow travelers have succeeded in obtaining for themselves many key positions in the moving picture industry. Mr. Kennedy also stated that he has some very good connections in South America in the moving picture business and he added that most of the foreign managers of the moving picture industry are indebted to him in one way or another; also, that he could eacily scoure assistance from any of these individuals in the event this assistance would benefit the Bureau in any way.

Mr. Kennedy is a devout Catholic and is very well versed on Communism and what it might possibly mean to the United States. He has said that he has many Jewish friends in the moving picture industry who would furnish him, upon request, with any information in their possession pertaining to Communist infiltration in the moving picture industry. He feels also that he is in a position to secure any information the Bureau may desire from his contacts in the industry with reference to any individuals who have Communistic sympathies.

The Bureau is also reminded that, because of his diplomatic background, Mr. Kennedy also has innumerable contacts in the international diplomatic set and he is willing to use his entree into those circles for any advantage the Bureau might desire in this field.

From his contacts with former Ambassador Kennedy, Special Agent Carpenter is able to state that Mr. Kennedy thinks very highly of the Bureau. He has also had several contacts with Special Agent in Charge Richard Danner of the Mismi Field Division Office and has entertained both the Director and Mr. Clyde Tolson of the Bureau at his estate in Palm Beach.



He is still actively engaged in the liquor business in New York City and owns several moving picture houses there. However, since the submission of the last report, contact has been had with both Mr. KENNEDY and and they have reiterated their willingness to be of assistance to the Bureau when the need for their services arises.

Prior to the submission of the next report in this matter, every effort will be made to develop additional contacts who are prominent locally in their various fields of endeavor with a view towards making good use of their services in connection with the Special Service Contacts program.






