



#### MEMORANDUM OF TELEPHONE CALLS

I advised Mr. Nathan by telephone of the charges made against the Division by Police Director Reppert of Kansas City, of criminal negligence in the handling of the Frank Nash recapture. Mr. Nathan stated, contrary to the statement made by Mr. Reppert, that the Kansas City Police Department was notified that the prisoner to be brought in was Frank Nash. I also advised that Reppert had stated that the Government gave practically no assistance in solving the McElroy kidnaping case, and that the State could have been as successful without the aid of the Federal Government.

I stated to Mr. Nathan I had talked with Mr. Vetterli with regard to this matter and Vetterli had advised that he advised the Police Department that Frank Nash, a very dangerous criminal, was to be brought in, and that he desired the services of not less than two men, and that he, Vetterli, is forwarding to the Division a statement to this effect by Air Mail.


With regard to the McElroy case, Mr. Nathan stated he could be quoted as saying he heard Mr. McElroy voice the highest praise for the valuable assistance rendered by Vetterli in that case.

With regard to the charge made by Reppert that Chief Higgins solved the Kansas City massacre case, Mr. Nathan stated that if this were true the Division would really desire to know what his information is. He further stated that it looks as though if they really solved the case, they would have by this time taken some prosecutive action, as Bailey has not even been indicted for murder.

I advised we had received information that the wives of Holden and Keating were this week-end to come to Kansas City to visit their husbands, and would go then to St. Louis where they would meet "V" (probably Verne Miller) and the other boys. I stated that it is reported that telephone calls are going out from them from a drug store which is the headquarters of an Italian mob in Kansas City, which is the mob which backs Lavier.

I advised Mr. Nathan that the way the situation is at present, it seems as though the Agents will be released from guard duty at Oklahoma City, providing he, Mr. Nathan, will wouch for the deputies appointed by the Marshal to replace these Agents.

Mr. Nathan advised that as he entered the jail today Bates was being brought downstairs, at the request of the Marshal, to have a private conference with Katherine Kelly; that it seems that Katherine Kelly said to United States Attorney Hyde that if she could talk to Bates she would get out of Bates where his share of the money is and tell Hyde; that he, Mr. Mathan, immédiately told Hyde he was opposed to this procedure but of course could issue no instructions; that it was decided he could call Hyde and tell him how he felt about the matter; that he did this, and Hyde decided to hold up this action until an opportunity presented itself when they could all discuss the matter.

Mr. Nathan stated that the attorneys were in again today to see the prisoners, and he told the Marshal he thought the Attorneys should only see the prisoners once a day between certain hours, and that each time they should have specific permission from Hyde. Mr. Nathan stated the Marshal is new at this job, only having been there a month or so.

With regard to State prosecution, Hyde told Colvin they wanted to do just what we desired, and Mr. Nathan states he told Colvin we were to have no say in the matter.

I advised Mr. Nathan of the controversy developing over the disposition of the reward money in connection with the capture of George Kelly.

I requested Mr. Vetterli to send a full and detailed report on the Frank Nash recapture. Mr. Vetterli stated he advised the Police officials he would need some assistance as they were bringing in a Federal prisoner; that they advised they would provide some men from the cruisers; that he advised the prisoner was Frank Nash, a dangerous gangster, and they stated they would give him men from the "hot shot car" in this event. Mr. Vetterli stated that the guards (Agents and police) accompanying Frank Nash spread over an area of about 15 or 20 feet. Mr. Vetterli stated it has developed that even had they used the basement to leave the automobile in, the gang had that covered, as well.

Mr. Vetterli advised with regard to the Kansas City massacre that Higgins had only furnished the name of one man, Wise alias Wiseman, a gangster from Baltimore, but would furnish no particulars merely stating he understood he was mixed up in the affair, but that our investigation failed to show any connection. Mr. Vetterli further stated that either Higgins or Reppert gave to the Division the name of Verne Miller, but that we already were checking his possible connection with the matter before either of them gave us his name.

With regard to the McElroy case, Mr. Vetterli stated it was he who discovered the telegram and it was also he who arranged to get those people back from Texas by plane.

I stated that Mr. Vetterli should decline to make any statement to the press with regard to the charges made by Reppert.

In connection with the investigation being conducted by this office with regard to the case entitled VERNON C. MILLER with aliases, Fugitive, I.O. #1195, et al, Obstruction of Justice (Endeavor to Deliver Federal Prisoner Frank Nash), inquiries have been made from time to time at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel, New York City, with respect to long distance telephone calls and other data pertaining to one Benjamin Siegel and one J. Bonds. Siegel is an associate of Louis Buchalter, Charles "Lucky" fluciano, Morris "Dimples" (Wolinsky, et al, all of whom are well known New York racketeers and gangaters.

During an inquiry at the hotel on September 27, 1933, it was learned through Mesers. McDermott and Mallison of the credit office, that one Mrs. George Jy Hatfield of San Francisco, California, along with Mrs. Bailey Balkin and daughter, and Mrs. P. Viribi and children of Mice, France, registered at the hotel on September 25, 1933, where they expect to remain through September 29, 1933. The hotel records indicate that the above persons are the guests of Benjamin Siegel, and the hotel management was informed by Mr. Siegel that Mrs. George J. Hatfield is the wife of the district attorney at San Francisco, California. It was learned that in addition to the room and meal charges, that Siegel has been paying for items in the amount of approximately \$100 per day, which have been forwarded to the hotel on a C.O.D. basis by the women in question.

It is my understanding that George J. Hatfield until recently was the United States Attorney at San Francisco, Celifornia. The data contained in this letter is forwarded for your information inasmuch as the circumstances incident to Mrs. Hatfield's stay at the Weldorf Astoria-Hotel are regarded as being, at least, peculiar processing and the stay of the San Francisco.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Agent D. O. Smith called from Chicago. He stated that they had overheard a conversation from Kansas City to the wife of Francis Keating at Chicago, the party at Kansas City giving the name only of "C". which indicated that money was being mailed for the wives of Keating and Holden to go to Kansas City; that the women left Chicago this morning in a dark blue Ford two-door sedan, motor 317707 V-8 model, license 1933 Illinois 1-246123, and Chicago vehicle license A-405137 on the windshield. The conversation overheard was to the effect that the women were to go to Kansas City where they would meet "C" and then they would have an opportunity to visit "the boys" there over Sunday after which they would proceed to St. Louis \*where Vi and all the other boys are\*. Agent Smith stated that he had given full information to the Kansas City office and that Agent in Charge Conroy is planning to pick up the machine as it arrives at Kansas City and to watch for its destination at that point and keep in touch with their activities until they leave Kansas City for St. Louis. when, of course, they should be followed into St. Louis to see who the contacts are there. I will call Conroy Monday morning to ascertain the situation at that time and if necessary make arrangements with St. Louis.

#### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

I called Special Agent in Charge Conroy at Kansas City on the telephone this morning. He advised that they had met the Ford sedan coming into Kansas City from Chicago, bearing the wives of Kesting and folden, and that these women had put up at the Aladdin Hotel, Saturday at 11 P.M. They were met by two young Italians and later were taken to the Cotton Inn, a roadhouse, where they remained until 3:30 A.M. and returned to the hotel at 4:40 A.M. Yesterday they had dinner at the Muchlebach Hotel at 4 o'clock with the same Italians. They later proceeded to a drug store downtown, the place where the original telephone call to Chicago came from. They remained at this place until after midnight, and returned to the hotel. There is an Agent at the hotel covering this matter at the present time.

I told Agent Conroy to keep in the closest touch with this situation, to advise St. Louis, and for him to arrange to go to St. Louis when they departed for that point. He stated that he would take an airplane, so that he would reach St. Louis before they did and could be in touch with Ladd. He further stated that they had the telephone coming from the drug store covered, and will get all messages.

The women have not been to the penitentiary yet to see their husbands and Conroy expects that they will remain at Kansas City for several days.



#### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

With reference to the attached memorandum of Agent Mages covering the leads which have developed the possible location of Galatas and others, wanted in connection with the Kansas City shooting, at Tybee Beach, Savannah, Georgia, I desire to advise that when Agent Magee called me on the telephone I promptly contacted Agent Alt and again talked to him to ascertain something more concerning the location of the parties in question and the extent of the identification made by Agent Kingman. Agent Alt stated that Kingman felt rather certain that Galatas was there and possibly one other, namely, Verne Miller; that while it might have been possible for him to cause the arrest of the men he suspected to be Galatas yesterday, he hesitated to do that because he learned that there was quite a group of these men staying in Savannah and playing golf each day at Tybee Beach. He stated that he could trust no police officer of the Savannah Police force, but that agent Kingman did have with him one county officer in whom they had implicit confidence.

After this conversation and after I talked with you. I called the Charlotte Office and talked to Special Agent in Charge Brantley, suggesting that he arrange to proceed immediately to Savannah, there to meet Agent Kingman and other agents from the Jacksonville Office. I advised him also that he was at liberty to take with him one or more agents from his own office. He stated that he would take Agent Reed, but did not feel that any other agents would be necessary. He advised that he would stop at the Savannah Hotel, and I informed him that I would so advise Agent Alt. 11. Subsequently I talked to Agent Alt again, when he informed that the Savannah Hotel is the mecca for this very gang and it would be the galacter. dangerous for him or any other agent of the acksonville Office who is known to go near that hotel. Alt suggested that Brantley and Reed meet them at the residence of Agent Kingman at Savannah. I instructed Alt to proceed immediately to Savannah, taking with him 18 as many agents as he desired from his own office, calling them from other parts of the states. He stated that he would take with him ... Agent Shivers and would immediately instruct Agent Main, who was then at Miami, to proceed so that he could arrive early today at Savannah. He felt that this would be sufficient. Agent Brantley also felt that

this was a sufficient force. There will be six agents.

Brantley took with him a full equipment of arms, including a machine gum, as did Alt. They were to meet at Kingman's residence this morning. I told both Alt and Brantley to keep in touch with the Director, and if they desired any additional help or advice to call on long distance telephone from Savannah.

I have not heard from them this morning and they have not called; however, unless I do hear from them before the day is out I will call Kingman's residence.

Mr. Alt called from Jacksonville at 8:20 this evening with regard to the above case. He stated that he had received s call from Agent Kingman at about six o'clock this evening from Savannah, Georgia to the effect that he, Kingman, in company with an officer of the Savannah police force had observed a man closing resembling Galatas on the Wilmington Island golf course, that he also observed this man's wife at close range and he believed it to be Galatas' wife, that the above couple are going under the name of Bradley or Brantley, and are living with the Haars at Tybee Beach about 20 miles from Savannah, that they were travelling in a Lincoln auto with Arkansas license plates 119-017, with Hot Springs City tags2299, that he, Kingman, has heard rumors that have led him to believe that possibly others of the group were there, also that he was in a position with the officer to pick up the above couple but he didn't think it best for the reason that they might be able to round the others of the gang. Kingman also stated that he had information that this man Galatas was in Savannah three or four weeks ago, and that he has played golf three or four times at the Wilmington Island golf course, that others have played with him from time to time and that he has heard rumors that there are a mumber of high-powered gangsters in the hotels around Savannah at the present time.

Mr. Alt stated that he wouldn't have put much faith in this information if it hadn't been for the fact that the above car with the same license tags was mentioned in the report of W. F. Trainor, dated at Kansas City, July 28th, (page 26, 2nd paragraph), wherein it was stated that a couple giving the name of Brown had been arrested by the Provincial police at Quebec, Canada, driving the above car with the same license tags, and that inquiry at the State Capitol at Little Rock, Ark., revealed that the above tags were issued to a party named Madeline Vulotta, 310 Central Avenue, Hot Springs, Ark., for a 1929 Lincoln Sedan. Mr. Alt believed that additional men should be sent over to Savannah but that he did not have any available at Jacksonville.

The Savannah, Georgia and Tybee Beach investigations were based on Chicago Division letter to Jacksonville dated Sept. 16th, 1933

With reference to this letter it developed during the Frank Nash, Fugitive, Escaped Federal Prisoner, investigation that William Fawiser, later identified as William Meisman, was using an automobile with a license address issued for the address of 2511 Price Street, Savannah, Georgia, which is the address of Fred H. Haar.

The reference letter indicates that Keating and Holden when apprehended July 7, 1932, admitted that they had lived in Savannah, Georgia, at the DeSoto Hotel. Keating and Holden, and subject Verne C. Miller, were closely associated with Morris (Reisner and Leon Gleckman of St. Paul, Minnesota. Weisman, Keating and Holden, were also close associates of the Haar brothers at Savannah, Georgia. Willie Haar was associated with Doc Brown, alias Alabam, alias the Dixie Kid, now deceased, a nationally known com man who made his headquarters with his associates at the Whitney Hotel, Savannah, Georgia.

The reference letter advises that the Haars frequented Tybes Beach, Georgia, a resort close to Savannah, and played golf on adjacent golf courses.

Other reports in the Kansas City file have shown connection between William F. Weisman and subject Verne C. Miller at Kansas City, Missouri, prior to the massacre.

Report of T. H. Tracy, New York City, August 5, 1933, serial 418, Division file #62-28915, indicates that Agent Tracy was advised in telephone conversation with Inspector Leon Lambert of the Provinical Police, Quebec, Canada, that he was not holding a man and woman in possession of a Lincoln sedan with 1933 Arkansas plates #119-017, which were issued to Madeline Vulotta, address 310 Central Street, Hot Springs, Arkansas, for 1929 Lincoln sedan, motor #56176. Inspector Lambert did advise that there was a gang of international confidence men working around Quebec recently and that a man by the name of Brown and his wife registered at the Chateau St. Louis Apartments sometime around the first of July, 1933, and left the morning of July 21 in the Lincoln sedan previously described which is the Lincoln sedan identified by Agent L. E. Kingman at Tybee Beach, Georgia. Inspector

Lambert states that Brown contacted all the confidence men while he was in Quebec. He was not able to identify Brown as Galatas and it is apparent that he did not have a photograph or Identification Order on subject Galatas.

Report of T. H. Tracy, August 5, 1933, further indicates that two informents identified Galatas and Millier as being in a party of four at the Fawn Inn, Lake Placid, New York, July 22, 1933. This report relates that Betty Buckwalt, alias Buckholtz, and Viviany Mathis, slias, Allen, alias Miller, peramour of subject Miller, were identified as being at Ausable Chasm, 40 miles from Lake Placid, New York, in July, 1933

This report further indicates that William Weisman was stopping at the Mansion House at North Thite Lake, New York, under the name of Sam KRappaport at the time Sergeant Mangin of the New York State Police apprehended Waxey fordon at North White Lake on May 21, 1933.

The report indicates that Mrs. Vivian Allen and Mrs. Betty Wilson were registered at the Mt. Royal Hotel at Montreal, Canada, on July 15, 1933. An informant identified Vivian Allen as Vivian Mathis, alias Miller. A Lincoln sedan was stored in the Royal Garage by a party named Allen from the Mt. Royal Hotel. It bore 1933 New York license plates #307860.

The reference report indicates that on April 23, 1933, J. L. Ross, V. Dicore, and B. Siegel, registered at the New Bismarck Hotel, Atlantic City, New Jersey. V. Moore was identified as being subject Verne C. Miller. J. L. Ross was identified as being Samuel Schrager.

Subject, William Weisman, in 1930, was associated with Nellië Connors and it is reported that the were living together in St. Paul, Minnesota, in July, 1932, as Mr. and Mrs Stera. It will be recalled that subject Galatas was associated with Mrs. Louise Connor, at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

The Buckholtz family have two Lincoln sedans and the reference report describes the license and motor numbers neither of which are licensed to the Buckholtz family.

The associates of Verne C. Miller, Galatas, Weismen, Keating, Holden, Sammy Schrager, Ross, and the Buckholtz family appear closely connected at St. Paul, Kenses City, New York, Hot Springs, Arkansas, and Savannah, Georgia, in the Kansas City Obstruction of Justice and Nash files.

The Jacksonville, Florida, Division office was not furnished a copy of report of T. H. Tracy, New York City, August 5, 1933.

The Division is forwarding copy of this report, air mail, special, to R. A. Alt at Savannah, Georgia, care of Kingman.

Incidentally, Lazia is surrounded by a group of murderous gangsters and controls the police department, which is headed, nominally, by Sugere C. Repert, Police Director.

This office is receiving reports at frequent intervals from the telephone company. Material portions of the telephone conversations will be referred to incidentally in this report, but considerable investigation will be necessary to properly identify the parties and to discover elements of materiality in the conversations. After the necessary atudy is made of these telephone conversations, a later report will be rendered in that connection. The telephone reports as received are proving valuable as a means of anticipating proper movements in the surveillance of Lillian Holden and Marjorie Keating.

Sheriff Thomas Bash was taken into conference by Special Egent in the Charge Conroy on September 30th regarding this matter, after Italia consideration of the local situation. Deputy Bheriff Depew failed to observe where the par of Lillian Holden was parked by the hotel attendants, but Special Agent Bray of this office later discovered it parked in a parking lot next south of the hotel.

This Agent ewaited in the lobby of the Aladin Hotel for further developments after 11:00 p.m., having telephoned the Kanaga City office of the facts which had developed.

The car occupied by Sheriff Bash, who had accompanied Special Agent in Cherge Conroy, was equipped with a radio, and a previously arranged code message was sent thru the police radio and thereby the Special Agent in Charge collected his men at the office about 11:30 p.m., September 50th. The men were held in readiness for further developments.

At 11:30 p.m., two Italians were observed by this agent enter the lobby of the lladdin Hotel and proceed up the elevator 12:45 a.m., the same two Italians appeared in the lobby of hotel with Lillian Holden and Marjorie Keating. the momen having changed their attire to party gowns. Agent observed them enter a Buick 1932 Model brougham, Missouri License Tags No. 39-273. The car is of black color and appears to be the same car that Agent had previously known to have been recovered from Thomas Holden when he was arrested herein July 1938. Agent requested Deputy Sheriff Depew to telephone the Kansas City office inmediately and advise that the women and their escorts were les ing, in order that the Special Agent in Charge might make preparations for a raid if they were shadowed to a place that mis Justify name. While Mr. Depew was using the telephone, the parties in the Buick car departed, and Agent of necessity tollowed them before Depew could return to the car driven by this

The Buick car was followed to the Cotton Club, which is located about ten miles southwest of Kansas City, Rissouri, and which is operated by Frankie Nigro and his brother, "Doc" Rigro, known henchmen of John L. Lazis.

Upon Agent's arrival at the Cotton Club, the Buick car heretofore mentioned was observed in the parking lot. Agent not

They reported that he had a resemblance of Nicksbragna, also a Subject of the Kansas City File #52-157. However, the identification of Bragna's photograph, after being viewed, was not as positive in the minds of the Agents as that of Licaboli. The Agents were unable to see much of the Italian escorting Marjorie Keating, as he had his back to them. Only one person was seen to come to their table; that was man who appeared to be a German-Jew, about 40 years of age, tall and slightly heavy, dark complexion and very dark hair.

Agents Bray and Suran scrutinized all parties in the club, especially while they were dancing, and saw no one who would resemble Verne C. Miller, or other suspects, or fugitives, in this case.

At 3:30 a.m. October 1, Agents Bray and Suran saw Lillian Holden and Marjorie Keating with their escorts leave the club. The women had drunk considerable liquor, but did not appear intoxicated, and the group seemed interested only in themselves, no one else having toined them. The six parties left the club together.

Special Agent G. F. Hurley checked into the Aladdin Hotel under instructions, late on the night of September 50th and made certain observations, which will be noted in the log heretofore quoted. He activities there, which is as follows:

He checked in at 1:05 a.m., October let, having taken a taxi from the Union Station, and he had his baggage with him. He received word after arriving at the hotel through communication with the office from an outside telephone that the women in operation had gone to a night club and therefore, he was around the lobby mittle 8:00 a.m. and did not see them when they returned. On October 1st at 8:00 a.m., igent Harley again covered the lobby the women did not appear until about 1:00 p.m., when they went to a restaurant, after which they returned to the hotel, ibout one hour later, Marjoris met a man in front of the hotel, who was driving the same Buick Brougham, mentioned heretofore. She rode away with him and re-appeared in about fifteen minutes. As she was about to enter the hotel on her return, a bell boy took her

aside and talked with her. She appeared sumewhat concerned after the ponversation with the bell boy and instead of chtering the hotel, she went to a small lunch room next door near the parking let where Lillian Holden's car was kept, and asked for a telephone. If agent Hurley was in the lunch room, when she entered it. No telephone being available, she used the private phone of the operator of the parking lot, adjacent to the hotel. She then entered the hotel. Agents Bray and Trainor appeared on the scene about that time and it was arranged to check the various garages and parking lots so locate the Ford Coach of Lillian Holden. The car was located in the lot adjacent to the Motel. About 6 p.m., the women left the hotel and again went to a restaurant. (Shadowed to that place, the Muchlesbach Boffes Shop by agent Trainor) The room number of the women in question could not be secured by any safe means available that

agent Treinor found that at 9:10 p.m. Detober 1st, Lillian Holden and Marjorie Resting entered the Lowe's Midland Theater, with only one of the Italian men who had accompanied them the night previous They remained in the show for a full period of two hours. and npon their return, this ligent, accompanied by agent O. C. Devey, acticed them enter the Brick Brougham in front of the hotel, which had been parked there during their absence. Agents Desey and Trainor then followed the Buick Broughen when the two women and the one Italian man drove away about 11:20 p.m. As hoted in the log, the paraless proceeded to 188 Missouri Avenue. They remained there for about five minutes and then hurriedly departed. It was impossible to discern whether or not they were joined at that place by anyone else It was impossible to maintain a close surveillance at the point in question, due to the fact that the streets in that locality are deserted during the evening hours and any stranger's appearance there would be noticed immediately by the members of the Italian under world. It was believed advisable, therefore, to abandon the survei lance for the night Immediate contact was, however, made about 12 Midnight of Uctober 16t with Bert Haycock, Special Agent of the Telephone Company, and he reported that there had been no telephone calls local or long distance made from the phone at 128 Missouri Avenue around 11:30 o'clock. There were some calls made in, but none was made as outgoing. It was be lieved that when the women and the Italian entered the Drug Store at

that hour that they might be going there to make a telephone call.

At 8 p.m. October 8, Special agents B. R. Allen and W. I. Plereon M. Who were on duty near the Aladdin Hotel found that the women in question checked out of the hotel and proceeded in company with the Italians heretofore mentioned in the Blick Brougham ear to the Pick-Wick Hotel.

At 4:45 p.m. Agent securedall conversations over Grand 9030 received up to that moment on October 2nd. It was learned from the substance of one of those conversations that the women were probably in Room 644 at the Pickwick Hotel. Special Agent Dewey was immediately sent to interview the Clerk at the Pickwick Hotel, which is a very reliable establishment. He learned that \*Mrs. I. Martin and Miss M. Martin, 6400 Kenwood, Chicago, Illinois, had registered at about 2 p.m. in 800m 644. Agent Dewey also learned at that time that a Mr. Raymond

was accupying Room 646, which is just book to 664. Raymond phecked in to the hotel on September 24, 1935. Again herey learned through the elerk on duty that there is apparently some connection between the party in Room 645 and the one in Room 625. The individual in Room 625 is one Mr Willia, supposed to be a bond salesman. Ellis, and Raymond are said to be very close friends and to pal together in the lobby a great deal. It was intimated by the Clerk that are rangements had been made by Raymond and Ellis to have the women placed in Room 644, and therefore it is believed that they were interested in them, and is assumed that they are all a part of the same work.

The outside walks of these two rooms form a 900 angle and the window of 844 is approximately four feet from the window of Room 843. Specia Agente Burley and this Agent arranged throw the assistance of Bell Boy Hanks a hook-up of the Vactuphone, which was concealed in the room of Lillian Holden and Marjorie Reating, The mechanical operations of the Yactuphone were originally tested by these Agents and found to be perfect. He heard no conversation of any importance, but did learn that one of the woman only stayed in the point, having returned early in the morning accompanied by one of the Italians, who apparently had been occupying the same bed with her; It is presumed that the other woman may have stayed in one of the adjoining rooms with another man,

It was noticed by Agent Dewey that the men mentioned heretofore as Raymond is apparently a look-out man for the group, and his actions indicate that he was trying to spot anyone who might be observing the movements of the women when they ware around the lobby of the Pickwick Hotal. The man known as Baymond is described by Agent.

Agent Allen ascertained that on 9-29-35, Valenti called long-distance telephone, calling St. Louis, Mo. Phone Mo. Jefferson 7258. He also learned that Mildred Humas aver the local telephone was calling Room 448 at the Pickwick Hotel recently and that she did not succeed in making her connection there. Apparently there may be some significance to the long distance call made by Valenti to St. Louis, Missouri, and, accordingly Special.

Agent in Charge Conroy communicated with the St. Louis office and September 30, 1935, furnishing the information as to the long distance sall. Telephonically, the St. Louis office advised that Jefferson 7258 is that of the Hotel Newstead, located at 4398 Olive Street, St. Louis, Missouri. As to what further information has been secured at St. Louis in this connection, this office is, not aware.

Special igent illen has been keeping in close contact with the Clerk, Mr. Corum, at the Schuyler Hotel, and learned on the morning of October 3rd that one Joe Ciro called on Rocco Lawrence on the night of October 2. Agent illen, incidentally, was in the lobby at the time that Ciro entered, but, of course, ascertained his identity and hame later. Agent illen observed that Ciro had with him a young Italian, probably 21 years of ege, and that agent was able to discern the possession by the young Italian of two large pistels in shoulder holesters on either side. This is mentioned for any value which it may later prove. It at this time appears that there is a great possibility of local underworld familications having a bearing on the later stant case.

The Kansas City office is maintaining the atmost care in covering the movements of the Keating and Holden women. But in view of the fact that the telephone tap and Vactuphone have been arranged it has been decided by Special Agent in Charge Control to maintain only sasual personally surveillance, since there is danger of discovery in the maintainance of a more intensive shadow of these women. In the event they proceed to St. Louis, Missouri, From here upon their departure the Special Agent in Charge will follow in that place and the St. Louis should be prepared for such an emergency.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

In talking with Special Agent in Charge Conroy at Oklahoma Gity on the telephone on the 2nd. instant, the advised that there had appeared in the afternoon edition of the Kansas City Journal Post an article with headlines reading "Plaza Killing Blamed on U. S. Reppert Asserts Massacre Due to Negligence". Also "Talked Before Uptown Business and Improvement Association Luncheon".

The substance of the article was that Mr. C. E. Reppert, Commissioner of Police, had stated in his luncheon talk that the massacre at the Union Station on June 17 was due to the criminal negligence of the Federal Officers in charge; that an Agent of the Division of Investigation called the Police Headquarters in the morning requesting the assistance of police to meet a prisoner coming into the station; that the Agent did not identify this prisoner to the police nor did he indicate his desperate character; that if the police had been informed that it was Frank, Nash they were to meet they would have been properly equipped and in all probability the massacre would not have occurred. Mr. Reppert further criticised the manner in which the officers took the prisoner across the plaza. He 😸 stated that they were bunched together when they should have been deployed, some of them at least some distance from him; that they should have had machine guns rather than pistols. Reppert further referred briefly to Estate the EcElroy kidnaping case and stated that he had been amused at the account of that case, which gave credit to the Federal Agents; that as a matter of fact the case was solved by Thomas JNHiggins, Chief of Detectives, who would have solved it regardless of the Agents' activities. The article also stated that the Government had not solved the Kansas City massacre case, in spite of reports to the contrary; that the man who had solved the case was the man sitting next to him, namely Thomas J. Higgins, who had put his fingers on the two men who were responsible for the shooting. The relainder of the article related to a laudation of the Police Department 2 at Mansas City. He stated that crime had been reduced 40% since he, Reppart, had taken charge and that this was due to the efficient services of Thomas J. Higgins, Chief of Detectives.

I called Agent in Charge Vetterli at San Francisco Common telephone and inquired relative to his recollection of the request made of the Police Department for the services of patrolmen on the Chorning of June 125° Decreases.

Mr. Vetterli stated that he personally had called the Police Department not on the morning of June 17, but on the evening of June 16; that he had talked to the Desk Sergeant and that he told him he wanted their assistance as they were to meet Frank Nash, naming the prisoner, who was coming through on his way to Leavenworth Penitentiary; that Nash was a desperate character and it would be necessary to be extremely careful; that the Desk Sergeant remarked that then it would be necessary to have the hot squad attend to the matter and he would give it his attention. Vetterli states that the following morning two patrolmen were assigned to accompany the party going to the station.

With reference to the criticisms relative to the bunching of the law enforcement officials, Agent in Charge Vetterli stated that it was agreed between them all that they were to accompany the prisoner in fan shape; that had he known then what he knows now he possibly would have scattered some of the officers, but everyone was agreed at that time.

This morning Agent in Charge Conroy at Kansas City, in talking on other matters, stated that the account of Reppert's remarks had appeared only in one paper yesterday afternoon, that is, the Kansas City Journal Post; that the Kansas City Star had not made any mention of it and that the Kansas City Times this morning had not mentioned it.

Hasgele further stated that Vogel, although he appeared to be a reliable individual, apparently had no occupation and played golf to a great extent. Through Mr. magele agent made arrangements to have declared vogel communicate with him, and arrangements were made whereby agent would meet Mr. Vogel in the lobby of the fort wayne Hotel on Gotober 2.

This dentiet is a personal friend of agent's and investigation by inter viewing him and by running out other telephone calls purportedly made. by V. C. Inquiry of the house officers at the Mount Royal Hotel disclosed that Levine was not there at the present time and that it would never do to interview him as he is a very peculiar individual and refuses to talk to practically everyone; that he is well connected with the big liquor men and it is not to be expected he would have anything material to say.

It is recalled that when the Buchslter left the Majestic Apartments they stored their furniture at that place. With reference to this company, it has been learned by the New York City office that it is owned by Milton Spitzer of 1710 Andrews Avenue and that he has a brother Mathan Spitzer, a physician, who resides at the same address and is supposed to be she doctor who treats the mobile an old recketeer. In this connection, the New York City papers under date of September 29th carried an article to the effect that a raid at St. Paul, Minnesota, on a senitarium owned by one Goodrich,

led to the excest of an Al Spitzer, together with Goodrich and others. In telephoning to this storage company Netty telked to a man known as Bader. A New York City informant has siving that Bader is a first of agent for Louis Buchalter and furnishes the references for Buchalter whenever necessary.

On September 14th Betty called Tivoli 3-5948 where she telked to her father. This telephone is listed in the mame of Louis Fein, 1268 Stratford Avenue, Bronz, and installed therein just a few days prior to September 14th.

on September 15th Betty called a Mr. Bondian at Cortland 7-9087, which is listed to Fisher & Deimel, 165 Broadway, apparently attorneys at law. Bondish spoke to Betty about her son Harold and from the conversation it was deduced that Harold is the son of a former husband of Betty, awar veteran. On the same date Betty called the Beacon Hotel, Trafalger 7-2500 and spoke to a Mrs. Moss, who is presumably her mother in law.

On September 20th Betty over the telephone wired a New Year's greeting to Mrs. Rose Buchalter, 1280 Klizebeth Street, Denver, Coloredo. A letter was addressed to the Salt Lake City office requesting a sheek be made of the identity of this individual insemuch as it was felt she might be the wife of a second brother of Louis Buchalter, whose whereabouts is unknown to this office.

On September 22nd Betty selled Baymond 9-5158 and talked to one Betty and mentioned the fact that her husband had gone to the "Springs." The "Springs" is a term used by the underworld and indicates the party is out of town. On September 22nd Betty called Chalses 2-9066, which is the Allied Artists, Inc. 70 Grove Street, Manhattan, a night club.

On September 25th Betty celled Endicott 2-2085 and asked for "Sunny" was not in and Betty did not learn any message. This telephone is listed in the name of Sam Levy, 144 Yest 86th Street, and is a non-published number; In this connection, it is recalled that Mrs. Frank Nash advised that when she was in New York City and met the Buchalters, she met a Sammy and his girl named Pigeon, presumably Sammy Schrager and his girl, and enother man named Sammy and his wife named "Sunny." This number called may be that of the Sammy and "Sunny" referred to and further investigation will be conducted along this line.

the night of September 29th for Montreal and als contemplates staying there three or four days before returning to the HotelPierre.

previously, is still residing at Boscoe, New York, so fer as ear be ascertained. A list of long distance telephone calls made from his telephone up to September 13th was secured. The list shows nothing of importance to this investigation. A call was made to Montreal, Ganada, as previously described, and on July 28th two calls were made to the Hotel Pierre, New York City, but investigation failed ing conducted at Roscoe, New York, to determine if Sammy Schrager is theresboute.

At 5:30 A.M. Yom Kippur Day, September 30th, the Schrager spartment was raided by six of the City detectives working on the case and four Division agents. Mr. Aeron and Mrs. Sedie, father and mother, were found therein, as was also Louis Schrager, younger brother of Semmy. The father first denied knowing Semmy but Louis said that Sammy was his brother but he had not seen him for two months and when Sammy somes into town he stays at a hotel, but which hotel he does not know. About two months ego Sammy drove up in a say and came in for a minute or so and than left and he has not seen him since. He said that they have not heard from Semmy and have no idea as to where he is and as for himself, he said he has not worked for a year. The entire spartment was thoroughly gone through but no information was secured as to the whereabouts of Sammy. was bought in Hot Springs, Ark. was identified as being the property A cap which of Semmy. There was also observed some neck-ties purchased in Paris and some expensive suits which were wrapped up as a protection against dust, undoubtedly suits of Sammy. The cover on the mail of the Schrager family is being continued.

by the superintendent of the High Bridge Sub Station that a few days previously one Mrs. S. Schrager of 1110 Anderson Avenue, Bronx, had purchased money orders for gas and electric bills. Investigation in this connection disclosed that the S. Schrager is not Sammy, the party investigated being 45 years of age and having two grown children.

the Riviers, a road house-night club lossted at Fort Lee, E.S., inwestmuch as it has been removed that fours Buchalter has some sort of an interest the rain and it is well known as a hing-out far racketers, Agents McKee and O'leary interviewed that of the County Detectives Met Allen, Hackensack, W.J. and he advised that the Riviers is owned by Ben Marden, the manager, Jack Arian, Assistant Manager, and one Sherman, that practically all persons who frequent this place are from New York City and that all employees therein are unreliable and no one at Fort Lee, including the mayor, Chief of Police, and others can be trusted in this respect, inasmuch as they are under obligations to the proprietors. Allen said that they formerly had a floor show in the place but have had none since the first of this year, probably the result of a raid which was made on the place in November, 1932, which however was untruthful inasmuch as a no bill was returned.

On September 9th Agent O'Leary of this office proceeded to Roenoke, Va. as the Police Department at that point had in custody one believed to be Vivian Mathis. The woman turned out to be Eugenia Mayo, who is much younger and larger than Vivian Mathis.

From the New York Telephone Company there was secured a list of toll calls made over the Zweibel telephone from August 1st to September 1st. The list failed to reveal any information of value. It showed that Deal 5705 was called a number of times, which aumber has been previously reported on, and Oyster Bay 1497 was also 🛬 celled a number of times. It is recelled that this last number was called from Atlantic City, H.J. a number of times in July. Investigation at Oyster Bay disclosed that this telephone was listed in the name of Sidney Richards, Centre Island, Long Island, in exhaustics Investigation was conducted in this connection, incomuch as Tivian Eathis was identified at the post office and at the local drug store as being one of the occupants of the hopes. A. E. Firth, elerk at the Beyville, Long Teland post office, advised that Sidney Richards rented Post Office Box 161 on June 20, 1933 and on June 21st he sent a 210 money order to James J. Duffy, Dannemore Prison, Dannemore, M.Y. and that Richards some times calls for the mail and on several occasions young attractive blonds woman came to the post office and maked for the mail. He identified Vivian Mathia as the blonde woman he referred to. He said that the last time he saw her was three or four weeks ago as during the past month one Siegel, the proprietor of a grosery store at Glen Cove, Long Island, five miles from Bayville, deliveries groceries to the Richards and picks up the mail on the way down, and that Siegel has a brother memed Hoe, who is a well known rum runner and who completely disappeared about six months ago. At this point a special delivery package came in mailed from Atlantic City, September 11th, addressed to Richards and Agent Turron and Firth proceeded to the

Richards' house to see what could be seen. It was learned that Center Island is two miles hast of Bayville and is situated at what is known as Plum Point. It is a two story house with red tile roof and faces the Oyster Bay harbor, while the rear of the house is heavily shrubbed. It was found impossible to approach the house without being seen and when an attempt was made to deliver the special delivery package a colored maid came out and took the same. He cars were observed around the premises. It was learned that the house is the property of Louis H. Stevenson, 175 - 89th Street, Jackson Heights, Long Island and that during the summer of 1952 it was rented to one Paul Rothman, a racketeer. A cover was placed on the mail of Richards on September 11th but only one tracing was received and that indicated they intended moving shortly.

Miss E. Brown, clerk in the Chittenden Drug Store Beyville, Long Island, and proprietor S. King Chittenden, were interviewed. The latter said that Richards during the past summer has been patronizing his store and spending money lavishly and in his opinion Richards and his group are racketeers or dope wenders. He could not identify any photographs of the parties to this investigation. However, Miss Brown said that she was suspicious of Richards and his friends end took down the license numbers of three cars which were used by we the group who frequented the Richards place this past summer. Sergeant Ostaseski of the Massau County Police also had the plate numbers of the three cars; one was 8 R-5427, which plates were issued on a 1928 Whippet sedan to Frank Kohepp, Pine Street, Fermingdele, Long Island; 8 R-5428 were issued to William Betz, 213 Bedford Avenue, Bellmore, Long Island for a 1932 Chevrolèt coach: 5 R 52-92 were issued to Ben Israel, 217 Lafayette Boulevard, Long Beach, Long Island for a 1935 Buick Coups. Presumably Israel is identical with Richards inasmuch as Richards was the one who drove the Buick ear. However, investigation et Long Beach disclosed that no one by the name of Israel had ever lived at the above address, was unknown to the postal carrier, to the Public Utilities compenies, and, in short, the investigation as some ducted by Agent Seykora disclosed that Richards made a fictitions and registration. Sergeant Osteseski, referred to, soid that his office is located at such a point that any car or person proceeding in the direction of the Richards residence must pass his place and sould be observed and that all throughout the summer of 1933 be has been suspicious of the activities taking place at the Richards home and has had the group under surveillance a great deal. He could not identify any photograph but said that Vivien Mathis resembles somewhat the person going under the name of Mrs. Richards. The Sergeant, together with Agent McKee, proceeded to the Richards' home but the colored maid informed that no one was at home and that she is expecting Mr. and Mrs. Richards that night. On the evening of September 16th

Sergoant Detecoks advised this office the plates 215186 was moving the effects of the Richards family. said that Mrs. Michards, who was identified by Miss Brown as Vivien Mathie, was around the premises at that time and suggested that wa agent who had seen Vivian proceed to that point immediately. Agents Turrou and O'Leary proceeded to Center leland, Long Island, but harm that the moving van had left at 11:50 PM. The Bergeant said he had last seen Mrs. Richards about 10:30 PM driving her Buick Coupe but with new license plates 9-L-2829. The agents and the Sergeant proseeded to the Richards' residence and assertained there was no ene in the house and the gerege was empty. They then went to the old Heidelberg roadhouse operated by one "Bubs" Siegel; and noticed the Richards Buick car there. The three went in to the roadhouse and Agent O'Leary, who has seen Vivien Mathie, said that although are. Bichards bears a atriking resemblance to Fivien, yet she is not identical by any means and that Vivian is two Inches teller than Mrs. Richards. It was also learned from the further investigation performed that Bre-Richards, believed to be Vivian Mathia, was et Center Island eil throughout the summer of 1935. Therefore, she cannot be Vivian.

It was learned that the new license plates 9-1-2229 were issued to Murray Schwartz, Essau Hotel; for & 1935 Buick Coupe and were lasted to cover the plates & R-5488, which the affiant said A list of telephone calls made out of the Richards residence during the summer of 1935 and elso a list of all toll as list mede from the two pay stations in Chittenden's drug store, as the group used these two telephones a great deal, were secured but no connection with this investigation could be found. To was observed that they and It was observed that they called the automatic time announcer a great number of times throughout the summer which indicates they were placing time bets out there. They also called Mary B. Duffy of 2998 Wellmen Avenue, Bronz, Dresumebly the wife or mother of the Duffy now confined in Dannemore Prison. also called Dr. A. G. Desanctia, 12 Bast 11th Street, Menhattan, Stuyvesent 9-5345. In this connection it is observed that Marguerits Coletta, the registrent of the armored Cadillac ser referred to in previous reports, is supposed to have married a DeSantis person. also called Regent 4-2400, which is the Flower Rospital, Manhatten, They also ealled Belmar, N.J. 760. This possibly indicates a connection with the Longie mob in New Jersey. They also called the Rits Carlton Hotel, Atlentic City, a number of times in the early part of August and on August 20th a Mr. Cohen from Dr 9938 Los Angeles, California, called collect, asked for Sidney Richards and talked to him at a cost of \$11.00. Inasmuch as this last call was placed but a few days before a double murder committed in los Angeles, the office at that point was edvised of this call in connection with another investigation.

Beach 100 was called and this was listed for the Motel Massaul, Long Beach, Long Island, but this number is now discontinued. They also called Great Mack 1676, which was the summer home of Mr. and Mrg. Benjamin Siegal. The complete list will be found on page 42 of the continuing memorandum maintained by this office. The toll calls made from the two pay stations in the local drug store were gone through without result.

Hew York City detectives that one of the hang outs of the Buchelter most is the B. & R. Clothing Company, Inc., 160 Fifth Avenue. Agent Turrou examined the records at Dun & Bradetreet and learned that this corporation manufacturers a line of men's medium priced clothing and that sales are made to the general retail trade, that the corporation has w good volume of business on its available capital. Gus Rudow is president and treasurer, So years of age, and Augusto Budow is secretary. Louis Berger was farmerly president but withdraw in 1927 and Samuel Budow, former secretary, withdraw in May, 1931. The company was incorporated at New York on May to 1923. Agent Turrou ascertained that the corporation occupies the entire ninth floor of the building and surveillance of the premises was maintained for some time without seeing Buchalter or any of his mob frequent the place.

On September 11th Betty Buchalter tried to get from information the telephone number of one Jacobs at 201 West 85th Streets Incomuch so the telephone is unlisted the information was not furnished  $ho_2$ her. In a subsequent conversation she did mention Endicott 2-5585, which s listed in the name of Fennie Jecobs, 201 West 85th Street. called that when fugitive Miller and Sammy Schrager registered at the New Biamerck Hotel, Chicago, on April 25rd of this year, they gave a their address 201 West 85th Street, New York City. Therefore inquity was made slong this line and it was learned that the building is owned and managed by Abner Distillator, a reputable real estate operator, 660 Medison Avenue. Through him it was learned that Hortense R. Jacobs ; leased apartment 16B, which is a four room affair, on May 1, 1932 and gave Joseph Greenberg, 550 Seventh Avenue, and the Bank of Menhattan 93rd Street and Amsterdam Avenue, as references, Distillator know nothing about the Jacobs family but did may that his superintendent, Gronvold, and Brick Bayer, the doorman, have been with him for a number of years and were decidedly reliable. Through the superintendent it was learned that Hortense R. Jacobs is the danghter of Tennie Jacobs; the she is 25 years of age, is employed and goes steady with a man who drives a large automobile; that Mrs. Jacobs also has a son about 20 years and that a young man about 25, by the name of Stanley Gross, has lived with The superintendent and doorman both said the Jacobs' for a long time. that the Jacobs family had practically no visitors and none of them owns an automobile and that the family is in moderate circumstances. Photographs 62-4949

of Hiller, Schrager and others could not be identified. In going through the list of former tenents, the name Rine Siegal was noticed. The superintendent said that Rine Siegal and her husband named Ben formerly lived in the apartment house but were dispossessed in the Fall of 1932 for non payment of rent and that Siegal was a racketeer and had plenty of money but would not pay his rent. He was shown the photograph of "Bugs" Siegal and said he believed it to be identical with the Siegal tenent referred to.

It is recalled that when the Buchalters' rooms in the Hotel Pierre were secrohed, there was found a slip of paper on which was written the name Annette Downs, 400 East 52nd Street the Southgate Apartments - a decidedly fashionable residence. Pierce, superintendent, advised that Annette Downs or Annette Brake moved into the Southgate in March, 1935 from the St. Morits Hoteland she occupies apartment SE, a two room affair; that she entertains a great deal, frequents the best places in town and is understood to be a divorces or plans to sue for a divorce and that she has a colored maid and that she keeps company with a great number of man, presumably recketeers. The telephone numbers she called were examined but nothing of importance noted. In addition to the regular telephone, which has a switchboard connection, she has a private telephone, Plaza 5-3268. Miss Elsie Green, switchboard operator at the Southgate, was shown the photograph of Vivien Mathis and she advised that in her opinion the photograph was a likeness of a woman who has called on Annette' Downs on several occasions, the last of which was about three weeks ago, and that the woman in question gave the name of Dorothy Killeen. Not much feith is being placed in this identification. However, in view of the same and in view of the fact that she is known to be any esactiate of Betty Buchelter, whether she will be openly interviewed is being considered by this office at the present time. It might be said that her spertment has been gone through without finding any information helpful to this investigation.

The eight city detectives assigned to this ease are still actively employed and weekly conferences are held with them where information is being exchanged. No evidence of a tangible mature has been secured as yet indicating that fugitive Miller and Vivien Mathia are in the East. Police Department informants advise that the only information they can secure is to the effect that Miller and the mos are not in the East but are in hiding in some other part of the country.

In the report of Agent Leating, deted September 25 1933, there is a lead for the New York office to locate the Horseshop. In this connection the New York office advises that the Horsesho is a speakeesy and is identical with the Half Moon Restaurant, Both places are situated if the same building on West Both Street. Dutch Schultz is the purported ever of the speakersy and restaurant. The For and Lou Fox are the front men of that place. This speakeesy is well known in New York City, incomuch as it is the hang out for Louis Buchelter and his mob and other mobs. It is impossible to place a tep on the telephones leading into this place as the owners took the nocessary preventive measures. All of the eight city detectives working on this case are more or less concentrating on the Horseshöe speakeasy. The place has been raided a few times but not lately. for the past two weeks one of the city detectives has been making an effort to obtain the book containing the list of members or those who may be admitted. He is trying to secure this book for the bornfit of this office in this investigation. It is known to this office through telephone conversations that Louis Buchalter and his mob. frequent the place and particularly in the early hours of the morning, staying there some times until three and four A.M. . No open investigation can be conducted in this connection, of course. The city detectives have their informents and in this manner information is being secured. The Chicago office will also recall that it found in Miller's apartment in Chicago some few months ago a card of the Half Moon Restaurant. Le stated above, the Half Moon and the Horseshoe are identical except that the Half Moon is an open restaurant and the Horseshoe is a closed speake easy to which hope can gain edmittence except those on the list. **的现在分词 医阿拉斯氏征** 

The Chicago office will also observe that the Eddie Berman referred to by its informant as being in Montreal is undoubtedly Eddie (Kid) Baker, the manager and glgole of Texas Guinan now in Chicago Is is suggested that the Chicago office confer with its informant again to determine whether this is true.

In the report of Agent Keating dated at Chicage, September 23rd, is set forth a lead for the Salt Lake City office to locate the brother of William Weigman, referred to frequently in this investigation. For the benefit of all offices, it should be stated that when Weigman killed Prohibition Agent Finnellio at Mizabeth, M.J. in 1930, the county authorities employed Pinkertons to conduct an investigation. Their investigation showed as follows with reference to the personal history of Weigman:



Weisman who is supposed to have been an agent for the Prudential Insurance Company, St. Louis and lived at 8751-Goodfellow-St., St. Louis but now lives at 760 Mott Avenue, Bronx, New York City, epertment 4J. He has a brother Benjamin F. Weisman, who is a widower, who lived with William Weisman's wife at Neverk and may still be living there elthough it is said he recently moved to some other address. It is said, however, that he is legitimat He has a sister Gertrude or Goldie, who married a Harry Scallett, who lived at 1566 Estes Avenue, Chicago. He has another brother named Charles, 1841 Hamilton Avenue, St. Louis, Mo. and another brother hamed George, reported to be in Detroit, Michigan, The brother George was formerly a clerk at the Alamet Hotel, St. Louis, and was sentenced to serve a term of from ten years to life in Illinois, but served about six years. He has an uncle, Joseph Weisman, 4520 Washington Avenue, St. Louis, who operates a hotel and is believed to be a dealer in narco William Welsman is or was a trustee of the Rebonian Lodge 1048 F.A.O.M. Mecca Temple, 130 West 56th Street, Manhattan.

the Benton College of Law; 3636 Delmar, being the next building, is a residence
occupied by Laura E. Rogers, 3636a Delmar, the second floor of the Laura E.
Rogers residence, being vacant. The next building is numbered 3654 Delmar, which
is an old residence, same having been destroyed by fire several years ago. On

repair shop and the name or identity of the persons operating the same is unknown

Police Officer James Whitson walks the best in which the 3600 block on Delmar is located and upon interview advised he was well acquainted in this neighborhood but did not at that time know of any somen operating a rooming house or residing in that vicinity known as "Ins", however, officer Whitson promised agent he would contact his informants and in the event he was able to obtain any information would supply agent with the same.

The north side of Delmar Blvd. (odd numbers) is covered by the 9th District Police Station located at 2600 Dayton, St. Louis. The only apparent rooming house or house of 111 repute located on the north side of the 3600 block on Delmar is the Gran-Dell Rotel.

The officers covering the best within which is located the north side of the 3600 block on Delmar (Is the 9th Dist. Police Station) Sergt. O'Gorman and Patrolman J. H. Nicholae advised upon interview that no one by the name of "Ina" is known to them in that vicinity as an operator of a rooming house or house of prostitution or as residing in that neighborhood; that further 3625 Delmar is operated by different persons for only a short period of time, it being a well-known house of ill fame; further, 3637 Delmar is the Century Parking Terminals, a large garage and 3651 Delmar is the residence and office of Dr. Herman 4. Hauser. The above noted officers also advised Agent they would contact their informants in this vicinity and should they obtain any valuable information concerning "Ins" they would immediately advise the St. Louis office.

At this point Agent desires to state that 3628 Delmar Blvd.

Upon interviewing L. W. Cookson, Supt. of Meils, College Station, 3534 Lindell Blvd. he advised that both sides of the 3600 block on Delmar were covered out of his affice and that carrier A. Bi Delaney was familiar with the various residents in that section. Open examination of the Post Office records, particularly the removal records, they did not reflect that envone by the name of Ina had left a removal address or that she was otherwise known at the College Station Post Office.

Upon interviewing Cerrier A. B. Delaney he advised that no such person as "Ine" was known to him as residing on either side of the 3600 block on Delmar, also verifying the fact that there were no such addresses as 3634 or 3644.

Wrobel.

Oliver Henke, mail carrier covering the district in which 5921a Lotus, Wellston, Mo. is located, was unable to supply agent with any additional information concerning the occupants of this address, adding he had failed to observe the mail closely and had not received a removal order in connection with that address.



- It appears to him that the bullet entered the chamber of the gus at an angle so that the markings epaid be lengthler on one side of the bullet. He would like to know if this is a characteristic of all the fatel bullets.

The Sergeant said that he did not know of any other bellisticien in the district covered by this office who is so expert and reliable as to be trusted with one of the exhibits you furnished us. He did say that at the Massechusetts State Bureau of Identification, Boston,



In the apprehension of "Pretty Boy" Floyd, this is to give a tip as to his or some other wanted parties. There are three of them - two men and a woman. The first came about six weeks ago, located and bought 40 acres of land. It had a 12' x 12' log cabin on it, located in the exit of a miniature cannion. He brought a large male German police dog, same in a medium sized 2-seater used car. I judged him to be 5'10", weight 170 or 175, quick spoken, seemed to want his orders obeyed.

I own land adjoining his and went over the 9th inst. to look after rents. Was at his cabin, asked a few casual questions. He told me very bluntly that he did not thank me or anyone else to meddle in his affairs. I was so impressed with the idea that I had seen and talked with "Pretty Boy" Floyd that on my return to town I had saw his photo in the newspaper at the time of the commission of the crime in K.C. I went to our bank and found a photo of Pretty Boy. We both (noticed) a strong resemblance. The two men and women came ten days ago in a more delapidated (car). He is 6', weight about 160 or 154f; both have dark eyes of the sparkling variety; complexion between blond and brunett. The woman is a blond, 5'6", weight 120 or 125, seems to be under surveilliance. There might be a kidnaping. More details later, or if necessary, or if you care to take a "look see" I will gladly give you all the aid I can.

There is listed in the Brooklyn, N. Y. Telephone Directory one Edward F. Glynn, Attorney, 66 Court Street Inquiry through the above office revealed that Edward F. Glynn is the brother of John J. Glynn, of the law firm of Curtin and Glynn, Scolworth Building, New York City; that he has not been at the Brooklyn address for about a year, and that his present location is unknown.

Interviewed advised that Edward F. Glynn is his brother. He related the story of his family having had many difficulties with Edward F. Glynn, stating that he was a heavy drinker and in this connection had been confined to psychiatric wards of hospitals on several occasions. He related that his brother became acquainted with George Graham kice about three years ago, and since

In connection with George Greham Rice, it has been secortained that this man, whose true name is Jecob Simon Herzig, is the subject of three files in the New York office of the Division, all relating to misuse of the mails. In a matter entitled IDAMO COPPER CORPORATION, Rice, during December, 1928, in the United States District Court, Southern District of New York, was gentenced to serve a two year term in the United States Penitentiary at Atlanta, Georgia. A file in the matter entitled COLUMBIA EMERALD DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION was closed during April, 1929, in view of the above sentence. A matter relating to THE FORTUNA CONSOLIDATED MINING COMPANY was mol prossed during July, 1931.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Agent in Charge Conroy called from Kansas City and stated that the Keating and Holden women had visited the penitentiary yesterday and that guards were present throughout the interviews with their husbands; that after their return to their rooms they stated that if anybody expected them to say anything while the guards were present they were crazy. Subsequently Ers. Holden called Chicago, Hemlock 3978. her home, but was unable to make a connection. From their conversation it appears that they are leaving Kansas City tomorrow. They talk about arriving at Chicago on Saturday. While they have not mentioned St. Louis. it is assumed that if they leave Fridey morning they will proceed to St. Louis and thence to Chicago, as it would not require more than a day to proceed direct to Chicago. Agent in Charge Conroy has made arrangements to check the metter at Kansas City, and in fact has stated that he contemplated, if he had sufficient time, that he would follow them in his car with his wife, baby and baggage, and having a North Carolina license he probably would not be suspected. I told him that if he could do this

He stated further that the trial of C. Gargotta, the individual who was arrested by Sheriff Bash at the time Bash killed two other gangsters, begins on Monday; that immediately after the shooting Bash had called Special Agents Brantley and Turrou, who had handled the guns taken at that time; that Sheriff Bash has advised that it may be necessary to call these Agents to testify at the trial to show the continuity of possession of the firearms, and he would like to have the way clear for their immediate response in the event it is necessary to subpoena them.

I will confer with Mr. Parrish to see if there is any Departmental objection, and will call Brantley and the New York Office to suggest that Turrou be held in readiness to proceed in the event he is called early next week.

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to a telephone call from Mr. Vincent Hughes of the Division today, and a later call from the Director, regarding a talk made by Eugene Reppert, Director of Police, Kansas City, Missouri, in which he criticized the Agents in the Nash case, and stated that they could have gotten along well enough in the McElroy kidnaping case without the Federal Agents.

The first point to be covered was with respect to the notification of the Police by the writer. When I received information by long distance telephone from Oklahoma City, on the evening of June 16, 1933, at my residence, with respect to the apprehension of Nash, and the statement to the effect he would arrive at Kansas City 7:15 the next morning, under guard of Special Agents Smith, Lackey, and Chief of Police Ott Reid, I immediately telephoned Chief of Detectives Higgins at the Police Department, Kansas City, Missouri, and ascertained he had gone home, and accordingly, in the presence of Mrs. Vetterli, I endeavored to reach Chief of Detectives Higgins at his home address, which was furnished me by the Police Department, and for a period of thirty or forty-five minutes no one answered his telephone, so I again called the Detective Bureau of the Police Department, and requested their assistance in this matter, and they stated they would have a cruiser sent around to assist.

I then advised the individual at the Detective Bureau that the party they were bringing through was Frank Nash, a notorious figure, an escaped Federal convict, and a bad man, and they replied that in view of this fact, they would send the two men on what they termed the "hot shot", or riot car. The men on this car are supposed to be the best, and are sent out in case of serious trouble, equipped with machine guns, etc., so that in reality, while Mr. Reppert might not have known that Frank Nash was coming through, the Detective Division did, and as a result, the "hot shot" car was sent around, and not an ordinary cruiser. I received the call from Oklahoma City at my residence. Mrs. Vetterli was the only individual present who heard my conversation, although I do not know what she recalls in connection with this matter.

With respect to the second point, the deploy of men, I can only state that hindsight is better than foresight. I understood that the apprehension of Frank Nash was a secret, that he had been whisked away, and no one knew they were coming into Kansas City the morning of the 17th, and my understanding, according to telephonic information, was that the entire matter was secret. However, in spite of this fact, the precautions were taken, although we did not deploy the men. We were not bunched together, however. We were spread out covering a distance of about twenty feet through the station and out to the car. Further, we looked over the situation underneath the station, and we were very careful in proceeding to the car, but there did not appear to be anything irregular.

It is true that we could have taken Frank Nash off underneath the station, placed him in a car after crossing several railroad tracks, and from there taken him to Leavenworth, but as I recall, there was a telephone conversation developed later, in which it was stated "they had the matter covered three ways". I believe we would have encountered the same difficulties if we had taken Nash off under the station, and believe if we had taken him to Leavenworth as we planned to do, we probably all would have been killed on the way up there.

With respect to the third point, namely, that the Police Department did not need the assistance of the Federal Agents in the McElroy kidnaping case, all I have to say is that they accepted everything we developed, and if the writer had not found the wire at Leavenworth in the used car dealer's shop, no doubt the man who has now been sentenced to death would have been into Mexico long since. In fact, the Police Department was looking everywhere else in the country, with the exception of the southwestern portion, at which point Walter McGee had headed. They may not have needed the assistance of the Federal Agents, but it is a peculiar thing that Mr. Reppert had telephoned me personally at my home, on several occasions on this kidnaping case, and requested that I go along with him on certain engles, which I did. If they had not needed our assistance, why should the Director of Police personally call me at my home, and request my assistance?

I am frank to give credit to the Police Department for securing the first information on the identity of the kidnapers. But I am also frank to state if it had not been for the Division, the Police Department probably never would have had Subject Walter McGee, who has now been sentenced to dis. Further, Agent Schoales at Roanoke, Virginia, assisted in this case, and he will be a necessary witness at the trial of George McGee, and the writer will be a necessary witness in the trial of Clarence Click.

Judge McElroy, City Manager of Kansas City, has frequently expressed his appreciation for what was done, and so has his daughter, Mary, who was the victim. Why the thanks if the Division did not render any services?

I admit that I went to Leavenworth to interview the used car dealer, to see if he had any information on this case, at the suggestion of Mr. Reppert. I went along with one of his officers, but this officer was seated cut in front in his car at the time I ransacked the deak of the used car dealer at Leavenworth, and ran across the wire from Subject Walter McGee from Amarillo, Texas. Mr. Reppert did not have any idea that we would find any such information there, in fact, thought we might possibly secure something of Subject's history in this kidnaping case from this used car dealer, Abe Starr. If I hadn't acted according to my own hunch, and searched his desk, and found this wire, the police officer sitting out in front in his car would never have known of it, and Walter McGee would now be elsewhere.


In fact, to show you how far the Police were wrong, they had sent one or two men to Portland, Oregon, with a Post Office Inspector, where they thought they might be able to locate Walter McGee, and were approximately two thousand miles or more off the track. They had also dispetched men by plane to Minneapolis, and I made arrangements for Mr. Hammi to assist them, and further, in reality, the Police were looking in almost every section of the country for Walter McGee, but the particular section where he was at that time.

While the Police chartered a private plane to go to Texas, I went down, and having been deputized as a United States Marshal, returned them. This saved the State considerable time and money; saved extradition proceedings, and facilitated the matter a great deal. Further, Mr. Reppert personally called me one day, and stated he wanted an Agent immediately to fly with certain of his officers to Stockton, Kansas, where they thought they would be able to find McGee, and accordingly I went down to see Mr. Reppert with Special Agent Suran, and Suran made the trip by plane to Stockton, Kansas, with Kansas City Police officers.

Mr. Reppert has personally told me that we did a good piece of work, as well as Chief of Detective Higgins.

Judge McElroy, in my presence, personally thanked Mr. Nathan for the assistance of the Division.

Mr. Mastin, the prosecuting attorney at Kansas City, has from time to time expressed his appreciation for the assistance of the Division, as well as his assistants, and stated the case would not have been made without the assistance of the Division. Mr. Mastin, I believe, personally sent a long wire to the Attorney General, thanking him for the assistance of the Division, and particularly mentioning the writer and Mr. Keenan.



Director -- 4.

I do know that I worked night and day on this case with the Police Department, and, in fact, almost completely divorced myself from my home, to do the best I possibly could, and I am personally satisfied with the results to date. I do know that at the time I secured the information on Walter McGee, and returned him from Amarillo, everyone was profuse in their expressions of appreciation, including Mr. Reppert, who has apparently now suffered a change of heart. One newspaper of Kansas City took a photograph of Mr. Reppert congratulating me on finding this wire, and while this photograph was not published in the newspaper, the photograph was taken at the office of Mr. Higgins. It may be the photograph did not turn out to be a good one, but it was taken.

Anyone of the Kensas City office can wouch for my work on the McElroy case, and when I make this statement, I assure you I do not desire any credit whatsoever. I simply tried to do my duty, nothing more. I want no credit or praise, except as it might revert to the Division proper, and to the Department of Justice, and to those in authority.

When Judge McElroy returned from a visit back east, he told me he had seen the Director, and expressed his appreciation to him for the assistance of the Division.

Reverting back for the moment to my telephone call to Police headquarters the night of June 16th, for assistance at Union Station, I will frankly admit that I am not positive at this moment to whom I conversed at Police headquarters, in the Detective Bureau, on the assignment of men, but I am as positive as I am that I am dictating this letter, that what I stated above with respect to calling the Police Department, and getting the "hot shot" car in preference to a cruiser, is the absolute truth.

Reverting again to the Naah case, in which Mr. Reppert states Chief of Detectives Higgins himself advised the Division of the identity of the two men, whose names apparently were not mentioned by Mr. Reppert, please be advised that I cannot discuss this, because I do not know to whom he refers. I know that after we made our investigation on Miller, Chief Higgins and Mr. Reppert both told me that Miller and Weiss, alias Weissman were mixed up in the shooting. To date we have not been able to identify any witnesses who saw Weiss, or Weissman, but the Kansas City office is giving this matter appropriate attention in the course of their investigation.

I do know that in my presence, and in the presence of Gus Jones, and I believe one other witness, in the office of Chief of Detectives Higgins at Kansas City, Missouri, Mr. Reppert stated that the shooting at Kansas City "is your case, not ours", and manifested no particular interest, this in spite of the fact that two of his own men had been killed.

The Division at Kansas City had already developed any number of telephone calls to the residence of Verne Miller at Kansas City, Misscuri, and we also had the information on Verne Miller before the Police Department ever told me Verne Miller was mixed up in this case. In fact, I believe they were very much irritated because we had developed that fact, first, and as a result they fired Detective Sergeant Doc Thurman, apparently for assisting us in this case. The Police Department has not yet disclosed the source of their information on Miller or Weissman, and to date, to my mind, have not turned over to the Division one single bit of information that was of any value. They did turn over recently some miscellaneous letters, but none of them were of any value.

The Associated press called me today, and advised me of the statements of Mr. Reppert at Kansas City, and requested that I reply to them, and, of course, I advised them I had no statement to make, and referred them to the Director of the Division of Investigation at Washington, D.C.

Mr. Burney told Mr. Hoover that he would call the Los Angeles Office and take the matter up with them.

Lir. Eurney celled Mr. Hoover and stated that he had Dresser on the telephone and that Dresser was willing to reveal this information now if it was necessary if he was ordered to do so.

LEMORATIONN OF TELEPHONE CALL BETWEEN MR. HOOVER AND AGENT BLAKE.







had been learned that Lillian Holden and Marge Keating had left Chicago, Illinois at 8:00 A.M. on September 80, 1955 an route to Khasas City, Missouri, Further, that Lillian Holden and Marge Keating had departed from Chicago, Illinois via U.S. Highway \$66, driving a dark blue 1955 model V-8 Ford Todox Sedan, bearing 1955 Illinois license \$1-846-125, and City of Chicago vehicle tag \$A-405,157, mounted on the lower right hand side of the windshield. Descial Agent Smith further advised that the front license plate was fastened to the right front bumper and that the rear license plate was under the tail light and in addition that the above described Ford automobile was being followed by a large Lincoln automobile the same appearing to be an ambulance, which was driven by a chauffeur; that two people were in the rear of this automobile with pillows, and that the same carried 1955 Missouri license \$806.

The above described Ford automobile upon its departure from Chicago, Illinois, according to Special Agent D. O. Smith, was driven by Lillian Holden, who was dressed in a rust colored wool suit with a hat to match which appeared to be on the style of a beret. The collar of of Lillian Holden's dress had green and white stripes about one-half inch in width upon it. Marge Kesting was dressed in a dark purple dress with a small black hat,

Special Agent D. O. Smith also related that Marge Keating and Lillian Holden were proceeding to Kansas City, Missouri, and that they had learned that these individuals intended to stay there for a day or so and them come to St. Louis, Missouri to contact Vernon Miller and his wife, Vivian; that it was believed possible that Vernon Miller and his wife Vivian were in St. Louis, Missouri at that time.

Special Agent D. O. Smith also requested that the location of the telephone at St. Louis, Missouri, Jefferson 7258, be obtained and the information furnished the Kanses City Division Office. It was learned that this telephone was issued to the Hotel Newstead or Hotel Ednell, both located at 4598 Olive Street, St. Louis, Missouri. This information was communicated by telephone to Special Agent in Charge E. E. Conroy at the Kanses City Division Office;

In view of the above information, Special igent in Charge D. M. Ladd immediately communicated by telephone with Special agent H. G. Maynor at Springfield, Illinois, and instructed Agent Maynor to make arrangements to pick up the Ford automobile of Lillian Holden and Marge Keating prior to its entering Springfield, Illinois, and thereafter follow the same to Jacksonville Illinois, making sure that Lillian Holden and Marge Keating proceeded toward the vicinity of Kansas City, Missouri, and not toward St. Louis, Missouri, Pursuant to the instructions of Special Agent in Charge D. M. Ladd, Special Agent H. G. At the Abraham Lincoln Hotel night clerk and manager Joe Furman Bus interviewed, at which time Agents Haher and Yearsley registered at said hotel and were assigned to room 914. Mr. George Furman agreed to transfer any incoming or outgoing telephone calls received or made by the occupants of room 1015 to Agents' room. Further, Leila Falmer, the night telephone operator, edulated that the would pay particular attention to any telephone calls made to or from room 1015, and in the event it was possible, she would write down the conversation had.

Brennan of the St. Louis Division Office, were stationed on U.S. Highway \$40 west of St. Charles, Wissouri to await the arrival of Marge Keating and Lillian Holden and theresfer follow them into St. Louis, Missouri in order to ascertain the place of residence where they might reside, and also where they might store their autemobils.



The Division is in receipt of your communication of October 9th ordering a suggestion that a substantial reward be offered for information leading to the location and apprehension of Vernon C. Miller and Richard Tellman Gelates. The Division appreciates your suggestion, and, while it contains much merit, is inclined to the belief that the complications which might follow make it unwise to offer such a reward.

The Division has indicated to several of its offices, from time to time, that it would be willing to pay a reasonable sum for information leading to the apprehension of notorious fugitives from justice, such as Galates and Miller, but, of course, will make such a payment only after the fugitive has been taken into custody and custody has been effected through reason of the information given. The Division is of the opinion that this is the best plan of handling these cases, as ordinarily it is opposed to the offering of revaris for the apprehension of fugitives from Federal justice.

Pursuent to your instructions the test bullets received with your letter dated September 28, 1933, are being returned herewith.



# EMOPANDUM OF TELEPHONE GALLS.

Mr. Sathan advised that it is possible, but not probable, that pleas of gailty will be entered during the course of the Kelly trial, and it is his opinion it might be well to have the Marshal instructed where to move the Kellys in the event this happens. I stated I thought Kelly should be taken to Leavenworth, and that Kathryn Kelly should not be taken to the same prison where her mather is incarcerated. I stated that I would endeavor to have orders issued today to the Marshal as to where to transport the Kellys in the event they enter pleas of gailty.

Mr. Mathen stated that although he was opposed to such action, they considered it mecessary to bring the Armolds in, but that he is going to insist that they be taken back tonight to the place they were brought from.

Mr. Wathan stated he has been advised that the armoured prison car can be switched right into the Leavenworth gards, so he feels that this will suffice in the removal of the Kellys, and that he thinks at least 4 Agents should go along. He stated they need 12 hours notice to obtain use of the prison car.

Er. Blake telephoned to state that Brady's conditions was very much improved today, and he would suggest that both Brady and Clark be moved to the Santa Fe, New Mexico penitentiary. I instructed Mr. Blake to go with them, and that they should be moved as soon as the doctor's permission is greated.

I have just been advised by my San Antonio office that the Sheriff at Tucumcari, New Mexico, had wounded and captured a man who has been identified as Robert G. Brady, subject of our Identification Order #1190, wanted in connection with the Kansas City massacre and as an escape from the State Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas. The Sheriff stated that he at first thought this man was Wilbur Underhill, another one of the same gang and wanted in the same connection. At the time Brady was wounded another man was taken into custody, who has since been identified by the Sheriff as James Clark, also of the same gang and wanted in the same connection. Special Agent Street, of the Division office at El Paso, is proceeding immediately to Tucuncari for the purpose of interviewing both Brady, who was seriously wounded, and Clark, and also to assist in the possible location and apprehension of Wilbur Underhill, whom the Sheriff states was reported together with Brady and Clark at Kountainair, New Mexico, several days ago. He was looking for these individuals at the time he encountered Brady and Clark. then Brady and Clark were arrested they had with them a sawed-off shotgun, a high powered rifle and a .45 automatic pistol. They also had approximately \$3500 in \$20.00 bills. The numbers of these bills will be compared with the bills in the Urschel case. 
