Roy Sherrill held up and robbed mail train at Paola, Kansas, June, 1918, was arrested September, 1918 for the robbery, and sentenced to 25 years U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas. Racaped subsequently and operated with the Al Spencer gang in the Osage Hills of Oklahoma; was captured McAlester, Oklahoma in 1925; returned to prison. Associates: Information concerning Harvey Bailey secured. Clement Braley, alias F. C. Barnes unknown. Complete history of Sherrill on file at office of Postal Inspectors and Detective Bureau, Kansas City, Missouri.

This investigation was conducted upon instructions of Mr. Vincent Hughes of the Bureau who had received information by telephone from the St. Louis office that an informant named Ingraham had advised that Roy Sherrill who was traveling with Harvey Bailey and Clement Braley alias Barnes and two other men whose names were unknown had advised Ingraham that he had killed Frank Nash and Special Agent Caffrey at Kansas City, Missouri, Ingraham had also advised that the Postal Inspector named Kansas City, Missouri, Ingraham had also advised that the Postal Inspector named Jesse Donaldson, new attached to the Washington office, knew Sherrill and could furnish information concerning him.

This Agent contacted Mr. Jesse Donaldson, Deputy Second Assistant Postmaster General, Room 506 Post Office Building. A photograph of Roy Sherrill that had been secured from the Division of Identification was exhibited to Mr. Donaldson and he immediately recognized Sherrill as being the individual who, with four other men, held up and robbed a mail train.at Paola, Kansas in June of 1918. Mr. Donaldson stated that he personally worked on this case, and to his knowledge, Sherrill was arrested near Denver, Colorado in September, 1918, after having driven an automobile through two posses; that at the time of his capture he was badly wounded.

Mr. Donaldson stated that all of the other individuals implicated in this mail robbery were dead, with the exception of a St. Louis, gamgater named) King, altes Knight who also received 25 years for mail robbery. Mr. Donaldson advised that Sherrill escaped from the U.S. Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas shortly after his incarceration. there; that after his escape he joined the Al Spencer gang which was then operating in the Osage Hills of Oklahoma; that oberrill was subsequently captured some time around 1925 near McAlester, Oklahoma and returned to prison. Mr. Donaldson advised that at the time Sherrill was arrested near Denver, Colorado, in ... 1918, Eva Lewis was in the car with one George/Eudaley, that Eudaley and Sherrill were very friendly; that Eudaley had served time in the Jefferson City Penitentiary for bank robbery. Mr. Donaldson advised that Roy Sherrill was also known as Gabe Sherrill, that he was the son of a Baptist minister who lived at Terre Haute, Indiana, and that his father may be living there at the present time; that Roy Sherrill has a younger brother named Ray Sherrill who has been connected with Roy Sherrill in numerous store robberies in the past. Mr. Donaldson advised that Sherrill is a vicious outlaw who is an expert shot with any kind of firearms and that in his opinion Sherrill would not besitate to shoot on the slightest provocation.

Mr. Donaldson advised further that Harvey Bailey was a well-known gangster who had robbed a bank at Fort Scott; that Bailey was serving time in the Peritentiary at Lansing, Kansas at the time Sherrill and his companions held up the mail train at Paola, Kansas. Er. Donaldson states that to his knowledge Bailey and Sherrill were rather intimate acquaintances. Clement Braley alias F. C. Barnes was not known by Mr. Donaldson.

Mr. Donaldson advised that he has lost track of the individuals mentioned above since 1925, however, that all information in the possession of the Post Office

Mr. Donaldson advised further that Thomas Higgins, Chief of the Detectives, Kansas City, Missouri, Police Department, has complete knowledge of the activities of Roy Sherrill and Bailey and would no doubt be able to give valuable information concerning their acquaintances and their present whereabouts.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

With reference to the attached report of Agent Rauber, dated June 27, 1933, concerning Roy Sherrill, alleged to be one of the group who killed Agent Caffrey and police officers at Kansas City, inquiry of Division Six developed that their records on Roy D Sherrill failed to show that he had been released from the Penitentiary at Leavenworth but that apparently his sentence was reduced from 25 to 10 years and that his time would be near expiration.

Inquiry of the Prison Bureau elicited the information that after Roy D. Sherrill had been returned to the penitentiary subsequent to his escape his sentence was reduced from 25 to 10 years; that he was released on conditional pardon on February 7, 1930 and all conditions were discharged January 1, 1931; that, therefore, he has been out of the Penitentiary since 1930.

Attention is directed to the Chicago Office letter dated June 22, 1935, which dealt with certain investigations made in regard to the telephonic communication of the Kansas City Office, to the effect that Central 5990, Chicago, Illinois, and Melrose Park 645, Melrose Park, Illinois, had been called on the telephone from the Southern Club in Hot Springs, Arkansas.

The list of calls which were appended to the letter, and which were made from the number Melrose Fark 645, were all the calls recorded up to June 15, 1933. Today, for the first time, calls made on and later than June 15, 1935, were available. Among the calls noted was one which was made on June 16 to Jackson 9702, Kansas City, Missouri, which appears to be the number of the Horseshoe Tavern, and the call was listed as having been made to one Fritz Mellory. The other numbers called on June 16, which were numerous, and on June 17, 18, 19, are being checked by the Chicago Office, in order to obtain the name and address of the subscribers and such investigation will be conducted, as is deemed Decessary.

It is suggested that appropriate attention be given to the possible identity of this Fritz Hallory at the Horseshoe Tuvern in Kansas City, Missouri.







Confirming long distance telephone conversation had this afternoon with Special Agent Cowley at the Bureau, the following data is submitted: -

Special Agent M. W. Meekins at Toledo, Ohio inquired as to this matter of the Superintendent of the Toledo, Ohio Police Identification Section and was advised that CHARLES ARTHUR FLOYD alias FRANK MITCHELL alias PRETTY BOY SMITH alias PRETTY BOY FLOYD was sentenced at Toledo, Lucas County, Ohio in Common Pleas Court 11/24/50 for the crime of Bank Robbery committed at Sylvania. O. The sentence indicated was twelve to fifteen years confinement in the Ohio State Prison. Floyd escaped December 10, 1930 at Kenton, Ohio while being transported to prison. He was 23 years of age in 1930 and the Toledo Police Department submitted his fingerprints to the Bureau at Washington. His Toledo Police Department number is 21458.

In addition to the above, Floyd was taken into custody on this charge at Akron, Ohio with two other persons, John King and Bert Walker. King was returned to Toledo and received a sentence in the Ohio State Prison and Walker was electrocuted for murder of an Akron, Ohio policeman.

In connection with the telephone conversation had with Mr. Cowley of the Bureau on June 29, 1933 concerning the matter of CHARLES ARTHUR FLOYD with aliases, please be advised that Special Agent H. D. Harris ascertained from Marden Thomas, Ohio State Penitentiary that they have no official record of the above individual, although Warden Thomas has some general knowledge of his activities and reputation. He advised that in view of the fact that subject did not reach the institution after having been sentenced to it, there is no file on him and no official notation of his having been sentenced.

From Mr. S. M. Current, Superintendent, Bertillon Bureau, Ohio Penitentiary, there was secured photograph and fingerprints of subject, enclosed herewith. These had been secured by Mr. Current from the Toledo, Ohio police department. Mr. Current also has a file on subject, indicating his correct name to be Charles Arthur Floyd, with the following aliases: Frank Mitchell; "Pretty Boy" Smith; Charles Arthur Boyd. His fingerprint classification is 1 U 00 19.

Under date of January 22, 1932 a letter was received from Wm. J. Burns International Detective Agency, 165 Broadway, New York City, per C. W. Chapman, asking if a reward had been offered for subject by the Ohio Penitentiary, the information being desired for use in an article to be published in the American Bankers Association Journal, Protective Section for February 1932. .This letter indicates that subject had been implicated in numerous bank robberies in Oklahoma. It cites his conviction of November 24, 1930 following the robbery of a bank at Sylvania, Ohio his sentence to 12 years in the Ohio Penitentiary and his escape on December 10, 1930 while enroute to the penitentiary.





SYNOPSIS OF FACTS

Arthur Swanson, Pampa, Texas, who is superintendent of fabrication of the Cabot Shops, Inc., Pampa, A. W. Mabione, a recent resident of Pampa, Texas, and owner of Green Buick Sedan bearing 1935 License 445708, motor 2512356, has been employed for seven years as an oil driller with Crea & Hoover Drilling Company. The latter firm ceased operations at Pampa, Texas in April, 1933, leaving Babione without employment. Babione and family departed from Pampa in his ear on June 8, 1938, stating he was going to visit and reside with his mother-in-law, a Mrs. Farmer at Webb City, Missouri. Swanson and Babione appear to bear good reputations at Pampa, Texas.

TAILS:

Before sonducting this investigation at Pampa, Texas, Agent sonferred with R. H. Bouth, Amarillo, Texas, in charge of the State Highway Patrolmen, easigned to the Panhandle, and L. T. Keffer, License & Weight Inspector of the State Highway Patrol, both of whom are highly regarded and reliable, and have been scoperating to the fullest extent with the Dallas Office. They stated that Bolker and Pampa, Texas are considered two of the worst hide-outs in Texas for that the sheriff's office, police department and constables at both places, particularly Pampa, cannot be relied upon, and advised against contacting any of the peace mofficers while at Pampa, Texas.

In this connection, Bgt. Routh and L. T. Keffer volunteered to accompany Agent to Pampa, Texas and assist in every way possible, and stated that Postmaster Cecil, Sherman White, County Attorney (the latter who has called them in

from time to time on confidential investigations), and Carson Loftus of the business men's association at Pampa, would be reliable sources of information.

of Arthur Swanson, 417 North West Street, Pampa, Texas. The 1933 Pampa City Directory lists him as Arthur Swanson (wife Anne), Supt. Cabot Shops, Inc., home address 417 North West Street. Agent ascertained from Postmaster David E. Ceeil that Swanson is well known to him; that he came to Pam a, Texas, from Baltimore, Maryland, and has been for the past six years employed with the Cabot Carbon Company; that the Cabot Shops, Inc., is a subsidiary. Mr. Secil stated that the Cabot Carbon Company is an important industry and has four or five plants in the vicinity of Pampa, Texas, their main office being at Pampa; that Swanson who is superintendent of fabrication, has been with the company since his arrival at Pampa; that he bears an excellent reputation and he never heard anything derogatory to his character.

Agent interviewed Carson Loftus, Manager of the Better Business Bureau and Retail Credit Men's Association, Pampa, Texas. He stated that he was well sequainted with Arthur Swanson, who is about 36 years of age and lives with his wife (no children) at 417 Morth West Street, Pampa, Texas, he having lived here for the past six years. He exhibited Swanson's file which indicates that when it was last checked on April 2, 1930, Arthur Swanson was Superintendent of Fabrication of the Cabot Carbon Bompany and earning a salary of \$300.00 a month, excellent record of paying bills, high character and reputation. According to Mr. Loftus, Arthur Swanson is still with the Cabot Carbon Company as Superintendent of Fabrication and highly regarded by that company.

At the Southwestern Telephone Company, in the absence of Mr. E. Hoeks, Manager, Agent interviewed his secretary Miss L. Carter and ascertained that telephone number 623 W has been in the name of Arthur Swanson for more than three years and the records do not indicate any long distance calls during the month of June, 1933. According to Miss Carter no record is kept of incoming long distance calls when placed station to station except when made collect; that long distance station to station paid calls are handled like local calls, the Passa operator ringing the number in the regular way.

In order to verify that Arthur Swanson was still with the Cabot Shope. Inc., Agent called the main office at Pampa, Texas, by telephone and was told that Mr. Swanson was at the time at one of the plants supervising some work. No name or message was left for him.

Sherman White, County Attorney, Gray County, Pampa, Texas, When interviewed by A ent, stated that he knew Arthur Swanson who was known at Pampa as Art; that the latter enjoys a good reputation at Pampa, Texas.

The City Directory of Pampa, Texas for the year 1933 reveals the name of Allen W. Babione (wife Mary) occupation driller, residence 917 East Browning Avenus. The telephone books lists the name of A. W. Babione, 917 E. Browning, telephone No. 1267J.

At the office of the tax collector, Pampa, Texas, the records indicate the following information:

1930 Buick Sedan, engine No. 2512556
registered by A. W. Babione, 917 E. Browning, Pampa,
weight 4500 pounds, tax paid \$21.60.

Texas 1932 license plates 512460, were registered January 1, 1932, by J. M. Sanders, box 74, Pampa, Texas, for the above car. Sanders transferred title in the car on April 26, 1932 to the Rose Buick Company, Pampa, Texas, and on May 26, 1932, car was transferred by the Tom Rose Buick Company to A. W. Babione, 917 E. Browning, Pampa, Texas.

At the Tom Rose Buick Company, Pampa, Texas, Agent interviewed Peter Sitton, who verified the sale of the above described Buick to A. W. Babione. He stated that the transaction was financed through the General Motors Acceptance Corporation, and the records failed to indicate any default in payments, it being his impression that the car has been fully paid for by A. W. Babione. Mr. Sitton stated that Babione moved from Pampa in the early part of June, 1935; that he (Sitton) was a neighbor of Babione, while the latter lived at Pampa, Texas, and never heard his reputation questioned.

Mr. David E. Cecil, postmaster, stated that he was slightly acquainted with A. W. Babione and wife; that as far as he knew their reputations at Pampa was good. Babione left forwarding address at the post office 6-8-33 to 511 E. Daughtery Street, Webb City, Missouri.

Mr. Carson W. Loftus, Manager, of the Better Business Bureau and Retail Credit Men's Association, Pampa, Texas, stated that he was acquainted with A. W. Babione; that his character and reputation while at Pampa was considered good; that Babione moved from Pampa in the beginning of June, leaving a grocery bill of \$350.00 unpaid. At the Southwestern Telephone Company, Pampa, Texas, Miss L. Carter, Secretary of E. Hooks, Manager, advised Agent that telephone 1257J has been in the name of A. W. Babione, 917 E. Browning, Pampa, since October 22, 1932; that the records do not indicate any long distance calls during June, 1933; that the

Sherman White, County Attorney, Pampa, stated that he slightly knew A. W. Babione; that his wife was better acquainted with them inaxwach as Mrs. A. W. Babione appeared to be an active worker for the Methodist Church at Pampa, Texas, of which church Babione and his wife were members. Mr. White telephoned to his wife in the presence of Agent, and she advised that she never heard sayone speak unkindly of Mr. Babione and his wife; that Babione was out of employment since April, 1933, with no prospects at Pampa, and he and his family moved to Webb City, Missouri, where they were going to live with Mrs. Babione's mother.

bill has been paid in full and telephone disconnected June 6, 1935.

Agent ascertained from Mr. Carson Loftus, whose name already appears in this report, that G. B. Crea, 920 East Francis Street, Pampe, and a partner of the firm of Crea & Hoover Drilling Company, that he and his wife left Pampa a few days ago to visit his mother Mrs. Martha Crea at Woodsfield, Ohio, and that they would be gone for a month. Also that L. Hoover, the other partner of the firm was at Houston, Texas.

By telephone Agent communicated with Mrs. Hoover, 1118 E. Francis Street, who stated that she was well acquainted with A. W. Babione and family. Agent interviewed her at her home. She stated that she often heard her husband Mr. Hoover and his partner Mr. Crea state that Babione was a good sober and industrious worker; that Babione first was employed by the firm of Crea & Hoover Drilling Company at Holdenville, Oklahoma in 1926 and 1927; that for the past five years Babione has been in their employ at Pampa. She stated that his salary was \$9.00 per day, and he was one of the men who had steady employment entil April 1933, when the firm was forced to cease operations pending better conditions in the eil fields of Texas. She further advised agent that Babiene since April 1935 has been out of employment and hard pressed financially; that he told her and her imshend that he would go back to his wife's mother, a Mrs. Farmer, that had a little place at Webb City, Missouri, and remain there entil conditions got better, unless he received some kind of employment in the meantime. According to Mrs. Hower, about three weeks ago Babione came to her husband and borrowed :-\$100.00, stating that he decided to move to Webb City, Missouri; that her imsband gave him the money, and Babione, his wife Mary, boy 14 years old named Herbert and e girl 10 years old named Frances, departed from Pampa in Babione's Buick Sedan,

Pampa, Texas, relative to the alleged telephone call placed at Joplin, Missouri, at 8:27 P.M., June 17, 1935, from telephone No. 1169, which is the Cottage Ind. to telephone 625W, the latter in the name of Arthur Swanson, Pampa, Texas. If the Kansas City Office deems it advisable to interview Mr. Swanson, this matter will be given appropriate attention by the Dellas Office.

According to Sgt. Routh, Amerillo, he discreetly ascertained that there is no indication that Arthur Swanson or A. W. Babione were ever arrested at Pempa, Texas or in trouble of any kind at that place.



MEMOPANDUM of Telephone Calls re FRANK NASH

Mr. Nathan advised that Mr. Vetterli had received a call from the City Menager, Mr. McElroy, requesting that he come to see him; that the City Manager stated it was more his case than ours, inasmuch as two of his men vere killed, and only one of ours; that the City Manager requested that the telephone numbers in the possession of the Bureau be given him, and that if this were done he believed they could break the case. Mr. Nathan advised that nothing was being done in this regard today. He further advised that the important numbers in their possession were the telephone number back from Fort Smith to Hot Springs on June 16th; a call from Hot Springs to Joplin, Missouri on June 16th; a call from Joplin, Missouri to a number in Kansas City (the house the Agents have been covering) on June 16; a telephone call from the Union Station in Kansas City to Joplin, Missouri, just after midnight, on June 17th.

I stated to Mr. Nathan I was of the opinion we should definitely ascertain what the Police meant to do with these numbers when they get them, and have an understanding that they will make no move without first a consultation with the Bureau agents. Mr. Nathan stated he thought we should first -have permission from the telephone company to give these numbers to the Police. I also advised that it should be determined to whom the City Manager intends to give these telephone numbers, and that it should be explained to him that in receiving these numbers he assumes the responsibility for any leaks which might occur.

Mr. Nathan advised that it had been established that the V.C. Coore in the House is really Verne C $m{\mathcal{O}}$ liller, a well-known crook; that they had some $\hat{}$ information with regard to this man and that they were telephoning St. Paul for some information in their possession; that he thought it would be a good idea that when he forwards this information an I.O. be prepared in the Bureau on this individual.








I requested Mr. Vetterli to forward to the Bureau a letter out lining just exactly how much report writing, stenographic and typing was the resident agent at Omaha, Netraska has to do. I explained that Mre Carthur & Mullen had conferred with me yesterday and made the same request mode by the Mullens at Kansas City-namely, that Mrs. Caffrey be assigned at Omeha, and do the work there; that I advised that I did not know exactly how much work there is to be done at Omaha, but doubted whether there was enough to keep her busy; that Mrs. Mullen seemed very well informed upon the matter, and advised that the resident agent had to travel at government expense to the Kansas City office to dictate his reports and that there was enough work at Omaha to keep Mrs. Caffrey occupied. Mr. Vetterli advised that absolutely Mr. Flood, the resident agent at Omaha, types his own reports and does all of his own paper work, and comes to Kansas City but once every three weeks to get new work; that he, Mr. Flood, is a typist himself; that Mr. Flood has about twelve to fifteen reports to prepare each week, ranging from a page and a half to two pages each. I requested Mr. Vetterli to send me today a letter setting forth how often it is necessary for Mr. Flood to come in to Kensas City and for what purposes he comes, and also, how many pages of typewritten reports he sends in weekly. I informed Mr. Vetterli that I desired to forward this information to the Attorney General, with my recommendation, if there is insufficient work at Omaha to keep Mrs. Caffrey occupied, that she be placed in the United States Attorney's office there.

I instructed that as soon as Mr. Harvey can be relieved of his duties at Kansas City, without intefering with the case, he proceed to Philadelphia.

Mr. Vetterli stated that he sent to the Bureau yesterday information upon which to issue an I.O. for armer, and that today they would forward the information on Vernon C. Miller for the same purpose. He stated that it had been ascertained that Braley is in the penitentiary at the present time, but as yet it had not been ascertained where Sherrill is at the present; however, it had been ascertained that Sherrill had been in Leavenworth, escaped once, and was transferred to Atlanta in 1926, his maximum sentence to expire in 1930. Mr. Vetterli stated they were checking further on this matter. Mr. Vetterli further recalled that the informant in Henderson, Kentucky had stated he was in Leavenworth when Sherrill was brought in all shot up, but the records show that Sherrill was received at the penitentiary before the informant was ever there. He advised they had found a house where a number of the men are supposed to have been hanging out; that they have a fingerprint expert out there today taking some latent fingerprints, and that they would send these prints in to the Burcau as soon as possible.



Mr. Nathan called from Kansas City and advised he had just been talking to Miss Mullen, United States Commissioner, in Omaha, who advised that She, Arthur Mullen, and the family had been in a conference last night and decided that the best thing which could be done would be to arrange for Mrs. Caffrey to start work immediately, and that they thought the Kansas City office was the proper place, and that Mrs. Caffrey was coming to Kansas City today. It was decided that if Mrs. Caffrey desired to start work right away she could be placed on a voucher, and that the permanent papers for her appointment would be sent through immediately, as Typist, salary \$1440.

Mr. Nathan advised that Agents Brantley and Anderson errived last night, and that Mr. Colvin had left Oklahoma City yesterday afternoon for Little Rock and was to see the informant there some time today, and that he, Mr. Nathan, had been attempting to contact Mr. Colvin to request that when he leaves Little Rock he come through Kansas City on the way back to Oklahoma City. Mr. Nathan says he thinks the trouble with the informant is that in making the arrest of Frank Nash the Agents disregarded his wishes, entirely, in that he advised them not to go near the gambling house where the arrest was made.

It was stated that the eye witness at Kansas City is quite a prominent manufacturer, and that the question of protection has been put up to him but he has declined, stating that he will not go away, and that any one staying near him for the purpose of protecting him would only tend to call attention to him, but that he does want absolute secrecy and permission to carry a gun. The informant has been advised that his request for secrecy will be respected but that permission cannot be given for him to carry a gun without his name being given to the police, which is not desired; however, that Mr. Vetterli is this morning going to see the City Manager and get from the City Manager a permit in blank authorizing an unknown individual to carry a gun. I advised Mr. Nathan that in the statement of this eye witness sent in to the Bureau it is stated that he recognized one of these men as Bernard Philips, although this name had not previously been given to us as one upon which an I.O. is desired. Mr. Nathan stated he would look into this matter, and advise. Mr. Nathan stated they are working upon the theory that there were four men in the crowd-Bailey, Brady, Davis and Clark. I informed Mr. Wathan that yesterday they had requested that I.O.'s be issued on those four individuals, and also Underhill. He advised he would also look into the Underhill angle and advise.

I informed Mr. Nathan that yesterday the name of "Pretty Boy" Floyd was also given to me for the issuance of an I.O. Mr. Nathan stated he would also look into this and advise me in this regard. I advised we would hold up these I.O.'s until I received further information from Mr. Nathan. I requested that it be ascertained positively who has identified each of these individuals.

Subsequently, Mr. Nathan again telephoned from Kansas City and advised that with regard to the I.O.'s, only two of those individuals have been identified with any degree of positivity—Bailey, identified by the informant, and Brady, identified by Vetterli. He advised that the Lackey identification of Davis is rather vague, as Lackey will make no positive identification but says he looks generally like the man he saw, and also says that the Brady picture looks generally like another. He further advised that Clark hasn't been identified by any one, but that his name was included because the four of them were the most desperate criminals who escaped from Lansing in the prison break and have always worked together. He stated that Underhill was included because he was in the car with the other four, and one other, when they kidnaped the Warden, but that the informant had identified Underhill and Philips from pictures later shown to him. Mr. Nathan stated that the woman in the station is the only one who has mentioned seeing "Pretty Boy" Floyd.

Mr. Nathan suggested that if we had to say that these individuals were wanted in connection with the death of Special Agent Caffrey, we should not issue the I.O.'s. It was decided that the issuance of the same would be held up for the present.

I contacted Miss Mary A. Mullen, United States Commissioner at Omaha, and advised her that Mrs. Caffrey could enter upon duty at the Kansas City office of this Bureau at her convenience, and would receive a salary of \$1/40 per annum. I advised Miss Mullen that if Mrs. Caffrey desired appointment in any other office of the Bureau I thought this could be arranged; she advised that they would discuss this matter and inform me of their vishes.

On receipt of your telegram of June 22nd I got in contact with Governor Alf M. Landon and he informed me that Judge A. S. Foulks, Parole Officer in the Executive office, had some information which he obtained through investigation of the recent prison break at Lansing, Kansas, and that I should take the matter up with Judge Foulks.

Judge Foulks came to the office this morning and went over the information he had with Mr. B. R. Allen, Agent of the Bureau of Investigation, and with this office. It is impossible to give a detailed report of the information obtained because the information was not in detail but was very general in character, but in the opinion of the representative of the Bureau of Investigation, and in my opinion, contains information that might furnish valuable leads and assist the Bureau and the Department in running down the men responsible for the Kansas City massacre.

with Milton Gould, former sheriff of Crawford county, Kansas, and that Mr. Gould has been working with some under-cover men on the prison break. The Judge has also been in contact with the Sheriff of Marion County, Kansas, who from the information this office has is an efficient and reliable officer. The information furnished Judge Foulks consisted of a copy of a telegram sent to Mrs. Nellie Dunn Kimes. (The Kimes brothers are well known desperadoes). This telegram is in code but has been decoded and was in effect that the prison break would take place on May 30th and that the escaping prisoners would go to Picher, Oklahoma. There was also information as to where Underhill, Dailey and Brady had been seen at different times, and some information to the effect that the evening before the Kansas City affair Brady and Conn, both of whom had escaped in the Lansing break, were seen to board a Frisco freight

train at Cherokee, Kansas, going west. This would make it possible in our judgment for these two men to have arrived in Pittsburg, Kansas, in time to be in Kansas City, Missouri at the hour of the crime. There was also some information as to the hangouts of a criminal known as "Pretty Boy" Floyd, and also Underhill, Bailey, and members of the gang of Frank Nash.

The value of this information consists largely in the leads it furnishes the Department. The Agent of the Bureau of Investigation informs me that this information to a considerable extent tallies with information that they had, or is not inconsistent with some of the facts known by the Bureau of Investigation in reference to the movements of the men suspected at or about the time of the crime. It is the intention of the Bureau of Investigation at Kansas City to run down these leads, and particularly to contact the Sheriff of Marion, Kansas, and Mr. Gould, and to follow out all of these leads.

While the Bureau of Investigation is very reticent about the work they are doing on this case, I am confident that a solution of the crime is not very far off.

I think I have given you as much detail as possible and the salient points of the information furnished. We will keep you advised of any additional information which comes to this office.

MEMORANDUM of Telephone Call re FRANK NASH

Mr. Quinn telephoned from Memphis to advise that the story related by the Menderson informant was not checking out; that there is no Lase Xiathan there in Memphis; that they had secured some information regarding two armored cars-one serviced at the Cadillac agency on June 8th, and the other was seen passing through the city by a Cadillac man about a week ago.
In China stated that they have the discuss and motor numbers of the car first mentioned above, which was from New York. He further advised that the man who had seen the sixteen-cylinder car pass through the city about a weet ago stated it bore either California or New York license plates, and was occupied by five men.

Mr. Quinn suggested that some one go to Hemderson and again contact this informant to ascertain the truth of the story which he told the Bureau agents. I instructed Mr. Quinn to telephone Mr. Ladd at St. Louis and advise him of the result of the investigation, and also, that Braley is in the penitentiary at the present time and that ASherrill was received at the penitentiary a year before Ingrehen, the informant, was ever in the penitentiary.

Mr. Quinn stated that he had ascertained that about a week ago the traveling representative of the Cadillac Company in Memphis was in Little Rock, and was told by the Cadillac representative there about a armored car which had been in there—the automobile beside being bulletproof had a windshield which could be run down and a steel sheet run up. which had holes in it, and there were machine guns in the car. I instructed Mr. Quinn to telephone Mr. Vetterli at Kansas City and give him this information.

I suggested to Mr. Quinn that in conferring with Mr. Ladd it be decided that either he or Mr. Ladd, or both, contact Ingraham, and it is not deemed desirable to have the same Agent interview this informent who secured the information from him in the first place.





Through this medium the location of two other friends of Harvey Bailey and Verne C. Miller, frequently mentioned in the Nash file, was obtained as telephone Nevada 5114, which is located at 4201 West Van Buren Street, Chicago. The parties located use the name of Catherine and Helen. Arrangements are being made to tap the above telephone today, with a view of obtaining information from the friends of Nash as to the location of Harvey Bailey, if possible.

Special Agent W. C. Ryan was assisted by Lew D.; Nichols in tapping the above wire and obtaining the desired information. Mr. Nichols is an applicant for position of Special Agent, as noted in Chicago File 67-957. He has cooperated loyally and, in my opinion, has rendered valuable services in locating various telephones for tapping purposes if necessary. Mr. Nichols has previously been engaged in such work with the Secret Six and the Intelligence Unit of the Internal Revenue Bureau in Chicago. He is now employed at night, working for the Unemployment Relief Association at a meager salary of \$20.00 per week, having been released from his last position due to bad economic conditions. In my opinion, this office could make use of his services for the next thirty days on the Frank Nash case, accordingly permission is requested to employ him for a period of thirty days, if possible. I am confident that he would be willing to work for this Bureau at \$5.00 per day. Mr. Nichols has not approached me in this respect and the request for permission to employ him is made of my own volition.

BRACH, for two years investigator under EURON FITTS, State District Attorney for Los Angeles County, and under the direct supervision of BLANEY MATHEWS of Mr. Fitts' Office, Los Angeles, Calif., appeared at the Los Angeles Bureau Office on July 1, 1933, and related information concerning the possibility of his locating CHARLES ARTHUR FLOYD, alias "Pretty Boy" Floyd.

Mr. Beach stated that he has a half brother by the name of JOHN JONES, a youth 20 years of age, a laborar whose present residence is 224 No. Hope Street, Los Angeles, Calif., who formerly resided with his full brother, WILBUR JONES, a taxicab driver, at 115 No. Denver St. Tulsa, Okla.; that Wilbur Jones is married to an Indian girl and that Wilbur Jones has information concerning subject FLOYD.

Mr. Beach further stated that Wilbur Jones worked for SHERMAN GOENS who is connected with an independent taxicab company at Tulsa, Okla.; that the wife of GOENS, CATHERINE GOENS, is a cousin of subject FLOYD and part Indian, and is friendly with and a chum of Floyd's wife and relatives of Floyd at Tulsa, Okla., and at Sallisaw, Okla.; that Wilbur Jones stated that in October, 1932, he hauled FLOYD in a taxicab from the depot to a rooming house on East 2nd Street, Tulsa, Okla., at which time Floyd had a Thompson machine gun and a package.

PAUL L. BEACH desires to go to Tulsa, Okla., and to Sallisaw and Stillwell, Okla., and with his relationship connections in that vicinity, relatives of Wilbur Jones, endeavor to locate FLOYD, as he feels certain that Floyd has a hideout between Chickasha and Stillwell, Okla.; that he, Beach, recently secured information that subject Floyd was at Lees Summit, Mo., at the time of the Kansas City, Mo., shooting, and that Floyd eften comes into Tulsa, Okla., and contacts relatives there

PAUL L. BEACH desires to be departized in some capacity and furnished transportation to Tulsa, Okla., and given expense money for his investigations there for a two weeks' period. Gere at Denver, Colo., enroute to Los Angeles and had expected to hear from the Bureau in regard to prospective work on this case or authorization of The Attorney General.

Mr. Beach desires that this information be treated confidentially and that no contact be made with his half brothers, JOHN and WILBUR JONES as he has not advised them that he desires to cause the apprehension of subject FLOYD. It is the intent and purpose of Mr. Beach to secure the Oklahoma State and other rewards offered for the apprehension of subject Floyd. Mr. Beach is remaining in Los Angeles until he hears from this matter and can be reached by telephone Michigan 1686, Apt. 8, or through the office of Blaney Mathews of the State District Attorney's Office, telephone Mutual 2141, Extension 3390.

O Investigation by Bureau Offices indicates that one HARVEY BALLEY, Kansas State Penitentiary No. 3045, was a participent in the massacre of the officers in this case. BALLEY was captured July 7, 1922, with Escaped Federal Prisoners Keeting and Holden, on the Golf Links at Kansas City, Kansas. He was subsequently identified as a bank robber who participated in the Fort Scott, Kansas, Bank Robbert during the early part of 1932, for which offense he was convicted by jury and sentenced to serve ten to fifty years in the Kansas City Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas. He escaped from this penitentiary on May 30, 1933 and is at large.

A cover on the mail addressed to Bailey's Farms, which are located at Kilmot, Wisconsin and Richmond, Illinois, disclosed that on June 28, 1933 a letter was mailed to Mrs. Henry Schuster, 761 Genita Avenue, Long Bench, California. This letter bore the return address of E. R. Bailey, supposed to be a half brother of Harvey Bailey.

A description of Harvey Bailey, alias William Bailey, alias John J. Brennan, alias John J. Brown, alias Bloom, alias p Snyder, is as follows:

Reference is made to a long distance telephone call received from Mr. Hathan, Assistant Director, at Kansas City, Missouri, on June 29, 1933, in which Mr. Hathan advised that through a confidential source the Bureau Agents at Kansas City had ascertained that a long distance telephone call was placed at Chicago, at 5:00 P.M., on June 29, 1935, to telephone number Hyland 0852, in Kansas City, Missourie

The Assistant Director further explained in his telephonic emmunication, that this long distance call was transferred to shother exchange, located near first and Wyandotte Streets, Kanses City; that the party calling at Chicago give his same as MACM, and instruct in the mass MACM is an alias for HARVEYOBAILEY, Mr. Hathen requested that the identity of the person placing the above call be ascertained.

The writer immediately contacted in Success of the Illinois Bell Telephone Company at his home in Chicago, Illinois, who advised it would be impossible to obtain the desired information until the morning of June 30, 1935. Mr. Webber, Superintendent of the Telephone Company, was then contacted at his home and promised to minder all the assistance possible in this matter. Mr. J. R. Harmon, in charge of the Investigative Division of the Telephone Company, called the Chicago Bureau Office a short time after Mr. Webber was communicated with, and advised that he would remise all the assistance possible in establishing the location from which the above referred to long distance call was made.

At about 0:30 P.M., June 29, 1933, Mr. Harmon edvised the Chicago Bureau Office that from Midnight, June 28, 1933, until 0:00 P.M. June 29, 1933, early two Hyland Exchanges at Kaneas City, Missauri with Child from Chicago, Illinois. He advised that one call was placed from Briangete 6166 about 12:08 A.M., June 28, the party called being at Hyland 7004.

Inquiry disclosed that Briangute 6166 is a switchboard located at the Coronada Apartments, 1061 Resement Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. In view of the fact that Special Agent Earl Van Bagoner of the Chicago Office formerly resided at the latter address, he was instructed by the writer to report to this office with a view of obtaining a confidential contact, if necessary, at the Coronado Apartments.

One other call was made from Chicago, Telephone Number State 3758, to Hyland 4571, Kansas City, Missouri, the party calling asking for Mr. Browns. This call was transferred to Victor 2070 in Eansas City. Three-tigation disclosed that State 3758 is listed to Priebs & Sons, Poultry, Inc., 110 North Franklin Street, Chicago, Illinois. The aforesentianed call was placed at 12:10 P.M., June 29, 1935.

Mr. Harmon of the Illinois Ball Telephone Company subsequently advised there were approximately seventy long distance calls made from Chicago to Kansas City between the hours of 5:00 and 5:00 P.M., June 89, 1953. He further civised they would trace all these calls and furnish & list today, if possible.

The records of the Illinois Bell Telephone Company failed to indicate a record of a call having been made from Chicago, Illinois to Telephone Number Hyland OSSS, in Kansas City, Misseuri on June 20, 1855. Mr. Harmon requested that this office varify the information previously obtained from Assistant Director Methan. Conversation was subsequently had with Special Agent R. C. Suran of the Kansas City Office, who verified the call in question. This information was invedictely communicated to Mr. Harmon, who caused a further check to be made. He called the Chicago Survey Office about 11:80 P.M., advising that the call in question was made from Superior 4660, Chicago, at 5:45 P.M., June 28, 1955 and same was completed about 5:48 P.M., at which time Mr. Bloom called Frank Malley, the call being transferred at Kansas City to Victor 4400.

Inquiry disclosed that Superior 4660 is the telephone number of the St. Clair Hotel, located at 168 K. Chic Street, Chicago, Illinob. Agent Kenting, accompanied by the writer, immediately proceeded to the St. Clair Hotel, surveyed the situation, and then proceeded to the Mary-land Hotel with a view of making appropriate centests to according the general character of the management and personnel of the St. Clair Hotel. Deck Clark Osborne of the Maryland Hotel, who has previously ecoperated with this effice in the Kesting and Holden Case, advised that the Manager of the St. Clair Hotel is one Malcolm James, who bears a good reputation in the hotel business. Agents were mable to locate Mr. James, however, as he could not be disturbed after Midnight.

Further inquiry disclosed that T. L. Taylor is the Hight Manager of the eferomentioned hotel. Mr. Osborne edvised that Taylor was O. K. for interview.

The writer and Agent Keating, accordingly, interviewed Mr. Saylor, advising him as to the nature of the mission, whereupon Mr. Enylor promised his continued cooperation. He produced his secords, showing that Mr. and Mrs. O. Hg Bloom registered at the St. Clair Rotel on March 7, 1933 and word assighed to Room 518. The Electre gave their address as Chicago, Illinois. He further edvised that Mrs. Moon is a bookkeeper and secretary at the Ches Perce Night Club, located at 611 Pairbanks Court, Chicago. Due to the fact that has Ricon, from time to time, has furnished patronage for the St. Clair Rotel, that hotel rented Mrs. Moon a room at a special rate of \$10,00 per week. Mrs. Moon is described by Mr. Taylor, as being about 52 or 53 years of age, 5 feet 8 inches tall, weighing about 130 pounds, fair complexion, blonds bair, long nose, drawn face, elightly sunken, uses commetics abundantly, Little is known of her husband, O. H. Bloom, except that he is a traveling man, supposedly. Mr. Taylor advised he has seen Mrs. Meen at the hotel frequently, but did not recall ever seeing Mr. Bloom prior to last Seturday, June St, 1935. Mr. Taylor described O. H. Bleck as about \$8 to \$5 years of age, 170 to 180 pounds, wears a dark brown suit, is well dressed, wears a straw hat almost constantly. Mr. Taylor believes Bloom's hair is prematurely grey around the temples.

Mr. Taylor further sivised that Bloom was contacted last Saturday, in the lebby of the St. Clair Hetal, by a heavyset man, of about thirty years of age. The photographs of the immates still at large, who recently escaped from the Ransas State Penitent iary, and of all other persons involved in the Kenting-Holden-Rash med, were exhibited to Mr. Taylor. He was unable to identify any of them definitely. He stated that the profile photograph of HARVEY BAILEY resembled the general appearance of O. H. Bloom; however, he was unable to positively identify him, inasmuch as he has been very busy and has not motical Mr. Hloom very carefully.

The current records of the St. Clair Hotel show that a long distance telephone call was placed from Room 518 at 5:57 P.M., Chicago Time, on June 89, 1935, at which time Mr. Ricom called F. B. Malley, Hyland 0825, in Keness City, Missouri. The call was transferred in Enses City to a Victor Exchange. The clark who headled the call with hotel was Operator No. 8, who is Miss Margaret Vimplemen. This appearance was cit duty at the time of Agent's call. The records further familiested that possibly emother long distance call was placed from

Room 518 on June 28, 1935, in the man of \$1.50. The identity of this call could not be established until the auditor's records were evallable today.

The hotel records further indicated there were also five local calls made from Boom 518 on June 28, 1935. Hr. Taylor cavical that Manager James would be available at the hotel about 8:50 A.M., teday and would assist in every way possible in this connection.

Through the courteey of Mr. Taylor, the reporting Agent and Agent Keating proceeded to the seventh floor of the St. Clair Hetel, which has a similar floor plan to the fifth floor, on which the Blooms are located. It was noted that Bloom and his wife occupy a corner room, near an exit and a fire escape. There was not a single vacant room on the fifth floor of the hotel on the night of this call; however, Mr. Taylor promised to reserve a room on the fifth floor in the event one was available today.

Conservation from the sutside of the hotel on the west side, disclosed that a light was on in Room 518. Mr. Taylor, Agent Keeting and the writer proceeded up the street, at which time the writer observed a mea about thirty-two years of age, wearing a brown suit and a sailor hat, in the room about \$100 A.M., June 80, 1953. On the cutside, a mea observed waiting in a Studebaker automobile. The man in Room 318 appeared younger and scenethat smaller than Harvey Bailey is postayed by his photograph and physical description.

The information regarding the call in question was transmitted to the Kansas City Baroon Office about 2:00 A.N., June 30, 1953, at which time Agent Suren advised that a call from Hyland Octa in Examens City was made at 7:44 P.N., to Reon 518 St. Clair Hotal, by Frank Malley.

Mr. Taylor further styled he had no recollection that Mr. Moor limped. Bailey is reported to limp alightly at this time, due to gunshet wound inflicted in his leg when he made his assays from the Kansas State Ponitentiary on May 30, 1935.

Agents J. R. McDonald, J. L. McCala, V. C. Boun remained in the Bureau Office during the above investigation, in readings to headle any emergency metter which might be referred to them.

On even date, Malcolm James, Manager of the St. Clair Hotel Des interviewed by Special Agent Keeting and after perusing the photegraph of Bill Balley, edvised, and stated positively, that the man in

Hoom 518 is not BAILEY. He further stated that Bloom is of Jovish extraction and that Mrs. Bloom is a mative of Florida and halds a responsible position in which she handles all of the accounts and cash at the Ches Parce Night Club. Mr. James further stated that Bloom and his wife moved into the hotel on March 7, 1935; that they were newly-cods, having been married on or about Pobrusry 15, 1935. Mr. James stated that he knows Bloom very well as a guest of the hotel and has seen him at frequent intervals at the hotel, between March 7, 1935 and this date. He advised that Bloom travels considerably, but recently he was supposed to be in Saint Louis, Missouri for approximately a month, and that Mrs. Bloom forwarded him \$100.00 there, by telegraph. Bloom returned to the hotel on Saturday evening, June 24, 1935.

received two barrels and a box which she stated contained househald goods which Bloom had received from his parents somewhere in Michigan. Mr. James stated that the barrels and the box above mentioned were in storage at the hotel at the present time and suggested that an importion be made of same. Accompanied by Mr. James and Mr. Taylor, Agent Keating inspected these barrels and box, in the store reon of the hotel. They were spen and it was found they contained glassware and other household stensils. A tag on the box, which contained phonograph records, showed that these household goods were formerly in storage of the Cadillac Storage Company, 11745 Twelfth Street, Detroit, Michigan, telephone Longfellow 9400, and were shipped from this storage company to the St. Clair Rotel about one month age.

A check of the hotel's meerds, in the enditor's office, disclosed that on June 88, 1935, four local telephone calls were made from Boom 518, as fellows:

The Resmood number scald not be ascertained as all telephone numbers in Chicago sonsist of four digits. Delaware 1805 is the Chas Parce Restaurant, 347 E. Ontario Street, Chicago, Illinois; Superior 1816 is the Kenwood Woulens, Inc., 850 No. Michigan Ave., Chicago, Illinois; Superior 6879 was recently changed to Superior 1817 and is allocated to the Kenwood Mills, Inc., 880 No. Michigan Avenue, Chicago, Illinois.

From the aforementioned telephone calls, it would appear that possibly Bloom is a woolen goods salesman. The \$1.30 item which was charged to Room 518 on June 28, 1933 was for a Western Union telegram. Endeavor is being made at this time to ascertain the contents of this telegram and the party to whom it was cent.

Agent Keating, assisted by other Agents, is covering all known hounts of the Keating-Holden-Mash mob at this time in an endeavor to run the Chicago phase of this investigation to a logical conclusion.

Please be advised that Harry Evans, underworld character, who resides at 4870 Winthrop Avenue, Chicago, personally called at this office last night stating that he is proceeding to Kansas City at 6:10 P.M. today at the request of Roy Lapitz, a representative of the Burns Detective Agency; that Lapitz is stationed in Chicago; however, he recently proceeded to Kansas City and wired Evans \$40.00 for the purpose of joining him and supposedly to obtain information regarding the murder of Special Agent Caffrey and three police officers.

The brief interview with Evans disclosed that he has recently been in Kansas City where he alleges he ascertained that Special Agent Caffrey and the police officers were killed by Charles "Pretty Boy" Orloyd and Adam (Richetti; that immediately after the murders were committed Floyd and his companion were concealed by Johnny Clazzia, a well known Itulian of Kansas City; that about eight hours after the persons were slain Lazzia assisted Floyd and his companion in leaving Kansas City.

Apparently Evans called at this office for the purpose of obtaining protection while at Kansas City, inasmuch as he is fearful that Chief of Detectives Higgins and other local police may arrest him while associating with other underworld characters. Evans was reluctant to furnish me the charges on which he is wanted. He was advised that any information he may obtain regarding the murders should be furnished the Kansas City Bureau office, and was further informed that this Bureau would not endeavor to protect him from arrest by law enforcement officials. However, in the event he furnishes information of value, he was advised the Kansas City police will be advised of same in the event inquiries are made regarding him, Evans. Apparently Evans

does not desire to cooperate with Lapitz in Kansas City, but prefers to assist this Bureau if possible. Evens was advised regarding the location of the Fansas City Bureau office.

HE: UNK TOWN SUBJECTS - OBSTRUCTION OF JUSTICE (Endeavor to deliver Federal Prisoner Frank Hash).

After arriving at Wemons, Illinois on Wednesday morning, agent interviewed Miss Wilsonk Assistant Postmaster, who furnished the following information:

Mrs. Frances Harrison, a niece of Mrs. Agatha Orsen, has from time to time visited her aunt at Wenona. The picture of Frances Luce was identified by Miss Wilson as a likeness of Frances Harrison referred to above. The description of Frances Harrison as furnished by Miss Wilson is identical with that of Frances Luce.

Frances Harrison who is supposed to be a resident of Oak Park, Ill. has a daughter about & years of age.

Becords of the Wenona Post Office show that on March 9, 1933, a registered letter addressed to the Western & Southwestern Life Insurance Co. South Marion St. Cak Park, Ill. was mailed. It bore return address Frances Harrison, Wenona, Ill.

Yesterday a pasteboard tube apparently containing a calendar mailed by the same company addressed to Francis Luce, Menona, Ill. care of J.J. Green, passed through the Menona Post Office.

April 10,1935, a large package containing toys and valued at \$20.00 addressed to Danella Luce, Aurora, Minn., bearing return address Frances Harrison, Wenone, Ill. was brought to the Post Office by Jacob Orsen, cousin of Frances Harrison who sent the package registered sail.

Some time ago Frances Harrison had her bunions removed at the hospital at Streator, Ill. She is described as having unusually large feet.

Mrs. Agatha Orsen, munt of Frances Harrison, is a widow with two children Jacob and another she who has a farm near Wenoma.

Jacob Orsen is married, the father of 5 children, and resides with his mother. He is a licensed embalmer, her worked for a local undertaker, but of late has been a bartender in a soft drink parlor. Until recently he supported his femily with difficulty but in the last three or four months has become prosperous. On June 15,1933, he purchased the soft drink parlor in Wenona where he has worked as a bartender. At the time of the purchase it was explained that Frank Harrison "a big shot from Chicago" was backing Jacob in the venture. Jacob recently displayed a

Frances Harrison on previous visits has driven her own car - could not learn the make of ear, but it was believed to be a coupe. Apparently she did not not bring her ear with her on this trip to Wenona.

Miss Rushn, Cashier and operator at the local effice of the Illinois Commercial Telephone Co., informed agent that she lived two doors south of the home of Mrs. Agatha Orsen; that while she does not visit Mrs. Orsen's home she is acquainted with Frences Harrison, the nices of Mrs. Orsen; that Mrs. Harrison has frequently visited Mrs. Orsen; that Mrs. Harrison was supposed to be a resident of Oak Perk, Ill; that she and her six year old daughter are now visiting at the home of Mrs. Orsen; that she saw Mrs. Harrison for the first time on this trip on last. Friday (June 23rd); that on Tuesday (June 27), she saw Frances Harrison and Jacob Orsen in the latter's curand has not seen Mrs. Harrison since that time although she has seen Mrs. Harrison's child playing in front of the house every day including today; that Mrs. Harrison on other visits has seldom been seen except on the porch of her sunt; that the Orsen family does not visit smong the neighbors to any extent although remaining on friendly terms.

Miss Ruchn was shown the picture of Frances Inco an stated same was a likeness of Frances Harrison. She had no information as to the mode of transportation used by Mrs. Harrison or when she arrived in Wenons.

Miss Wilson, Assistant Postmaster, informed agent yesterday that the night before a resident of Wemons had remarked to her (Jake Orsen went to Chicago yesterday: This was the day (Tuesday) that Miss Knehr saw Jacob Orsen and Frances Harrison in Jacob's automobile. It is possible that Mrs. Harrison mude the trip to Chicago with him.

Miss Wilson, Assistant Postmater, advised agent that at 10.00 e*Clock this morning (June 30) she talked with Mrs. Otto Johnson who resides next door on the north side of Mrs. Orsen; that Mrs. Johnson had informed her that Mrs. Orsen's niese and her little daughter were visitors at Mrs. Orsen's home, and were there this morning; that she had been at Mrs. Orsen's home, and were there this morning; that she had been told by members of the Green family that Francis Harrison's husband is "on the read-and rakes big money", and from her observation Mrs. Harrison appeared to have plenty of money.

The telephone in the Orsen recidence is Wenoma 57, and at the soft drink parlor is kenoma 218. Both telephones have been installed within the last 15 days.

At the local office Miss Enchn, to eachier, explained that at the end of the day all long distance outgoing call tickets are sent to the accounting effices of the Illinois Consercial Telephone Co. at Alton, Illinois, and after being recorded are returned to Wenoma, at the end of the month. This is not a Bell Telephone Co. Miss Anche promised to furnish agent with the numbers called on long distance from the residence of Mrs. Orsen and the soft drink parlor of Jacob Orsen, but today she informed agent that she had been instructed not to do so by the District Hanager at Kankakee, Ill. Who passed through on an inspection trip. The main office of the coupany is at Springfield, Ill. Suggest that the St. Louis office arrangs to get a record of outgoing calls from telephones WELDIA ST and WELDIA 218.

Meither Miss Wilson or Miss Knehn or any of the presons with whom they had talked had ever seen the so-called Frank Harrison.

In connection with this matter and referring to long distance call from Agent in Charge Vetterli this morning relative to the Sheriff at Mana, Arkanans, having two men in custody with machine guns who, eccording to the press, were from Kanana City, I communicated with Sheriff Jones at Mana by telephone. He stated he had only arrested one man, whose name was Cornelius Lefever, who had a machine gun and who had been taken to Ashdown, Arkanass; that this man recently held up the bank at Malvern, Ark. The Sheriff said he knew mothing about this man ever having been in Kanana City; that he is a product of Malvern, Arkanass, a man about 45 years old, and has a brother who is a doctor at Malvern. Since the facts do not seem to warrant any further inquiry, I will not pursue that angle unless you suggest so.

Gere, Salt Lake City, Utah, dated June 26, 1933, and to the information furnished by Arthur Johnson, alias Red Price, who evidently knows what he is talking about. You will note his mention of the 0. P. Inn in Chicago, which is the location of telephone Molrose 645, the telephone number in Chicago which was called from Hot Springs on the day of Mash's arrest and which we are already investigating. I think the information furnished by Johnson alias Price should be thoroughly checked.

On yesterday I talked to, I believe, Agent Trainor over the telephone at Kansas City regarding Vincent C. Moore, whose 'phone number is one of those called at Kansas City. I called Agent Trainor's attention at that time to report of Agent S. W. Hardy dated December 4, 1931 from St. Paul, Minn., under caption "Francis L. Kesting, Fugitive, I. O. #1129", in which is disclosed certain information about Mack Leavitt alias Maurice Leavitt, former owner of the Dunnagre Ap rement Hotel, Chicago, and his connection with the gang. It will be recalled that Vincent C. Moore, whom you are now tracing, gave Mack Leavitt as a reference. I have formed the opinion that Vincent C. Moore is none other than Verne C.P. Miller and mentioned this fact to Agent Trainor over the 'phone. I think it would be well for you to refer to the report of Agent Hardy, above mentioned.

A letter has been received from the Sheriff's office at Chickesha, Oklahoma, stating that on June 21, 1933, they were called to investigate a ear and its occupants about one mile south of Chickesha, where the car was seen being driven very rapidly. They found the ear parked and the alleged owner gave his name as Mr. Lindsay of Kansas City, No. He showed his Driver's License from Kansas City in that name. He was supposed to be visiting some relatives at Chickesha and was driving a Cadillac Sedan with Missouri License 1813,398. The opinion of the Sheriff's office was that this man is a recketeer from Kansas City, and they thought we might desire to look up the record of this car.

Agent Smith tells me that Agent Anderson recently developed some information at Hot Springs to the effect that some of these gangaters are hiding out mear Eureka Springs, Ark. I think this is very probable, as informat A at Hot Springs told me that the gong had a hideout near Eureka Springs and might be there at the present time. My information soming from a source which is entirely antagonistic to the source from which Agent Anderson obtained his information would tend to substantiate the reports. If anyone is sent into the vicinity of Euroka Springs, extreme core should be taken in regard to Ralter Manblim, who is the divorced husband of Esther Farmer, wife of Rubert Fermer of Joplin. Hamblim controls the gambling and other rackets at Eureka Springs and has heretofore been associated with the Nash gang. There is one men at Eureka Springs who can be approached eafely and who has heretofore helped us in this matter - that is Mr. A. J. Russell, Jr., an attorney who was previously a Deputy United States Mershal with headquarters at Fort Smith, Ark. He is now a junior attorney in the office of Congressman Claude A. Fuller at Eureka Springs. I understand that Fuller is very close to Hamblin. therefore any contact made with Russell should be very very discreet in order not to jeopardize his position. Hamblin runs a number of turist cabins, I. understand, in the vicinity of Euroka Springs besides his gambling racket.

Springs, please be advised that the situation is such that he will not let me wire or telephone him and although he has given me his post office box number I fear to communicate with him through that sou so on any matters pertaining to this case. Practically the only safe way is to contact him personally or through Agent Smith. He does not desire to deal with or be known to other Bureau Agents. While I was in Hot Springs he caked me pointedly whether or not we would be interested in having "Pretty Boy" Floyd and I told him at that time we had nothing on him. He stated flatfootedly that he could put his finger on "Pretty Boy" any time we wanted him and I believe he can, but as I stated in my previous letter, covering my recent trip to Hot Springs, he does not seem to be "very hot" about Harvey Bailey, Bredy, Underhill, and company, and expressed the belief that the massacre was pulled by Chicago man. Whether or not his belief is genuine or merely an attempt to divert our attention away from Bailey and company, I camot say.

I telephoned Agent Jones the other day to contact a Santa Fe brakemen named F. J. Golobay, who was an eye witness to the shooting and whose run is apparently between Tules and Kansas City. Please let me know if he has been contacted and if not I will have him interviewed at Tules. However, I believe the interview should be conducted by the Kansas City office, who are better posted as to the situation there and can question him more intelligently. He may not have anything but of course every eye witness should be interviewed sooner or later.

nolysis of this matter and in this connection I refer to my letter of yesterday, furnishing all the telephone calls which we have located and anking the Kansas City office to point out any of those calls which in their spinion should be traced further. Doubtless you are in possession of many details with which I am not esquainted and there might be significance to certain telephone calls which to me would not appear significant and which the Kansas City office might wish checked further.

I am short two Agents at the present time of my normal personnel, Leckey and Agent Chipman, who is in the hospital, and if I am to do very much detail work on this case I will have to have another man or two to essign to that exclusively, as the current work upon other matters has to be carried

with respect to contacting informent at Hot Springs, I believe more information could be secured from him by agent Smith than by anyone clue. I realize the importance of keeping constantly in touch with him. I will exait your suggestions.

Incidentally, while talking to informant at Hot Springs, he told me that Agent Caffrey had been close enough to Hash several times to put his hand on him. I thought you might trace this back to Caffrey's reports and find out scatching about where Caffrey might have talked to someone who was Bash and didn't know it. I am confident the informant knows what he is talking about because Caffrey's name had not been mentioned up to the time he suddenly stated "I know that Caffrey has been close enough to Hash several times to put his hand on him".

Deer Sir:-

With further reference to the report rendered by Special Agent in Charge D. M. Indd dated June 29, 1973 at St. Louis, Missouri reflecting certain information furnished by one H. C./Ingraham, who was interviewed at Henderson, Ky., on June 26, 1933 relative to this case, please be advised that a thorough investigation was mode at Mashville, Tennessee in an endeavor to locate one "Migger" Molan, but without success. Further efforts were made in an endeavor to ascertain whether Ray Therrill under the name of Roy Koberts or any of the other individuals mentioned in connection with this case had been or were receiving mail at the General Delivery window. Ho information of this kind could be secured.

It was ascertained that one Nick Molan (colored) had died about a year ago, but from information received from police and other law enforcement officers in that vicinity, this individual was not connected with the criminal element.

At Mumphis, Tennessee efforts were made to locate one lafe or lace Mathan, reputed, according to Ingraham to be a book-maker and gambler in that city. With the assistance of Chief Inspector William T. Griffin, one Sam Mathan was located, who operates a head book and who was interviewed and denied any knowledge of the individuals alleged to be connected with this case. Inspector Griffin stated that Sam Mathan recently inherited quite a sum of money and was not considered by the Police Department as having any connections with the criminal underworld.

The results of the above were telephonically communicated to the pirector, who stated that Ingraham should be again located and thoroughly interviewed. He was located by the writer at the Havlin Hotel, on June 30 and interviewed at this office on even date. I am attaching hereto, two copies of a statement distated by Ingraham, which sets forth in detail all information which he possesses concerning the shooting at Kames City on June 17. It will be noted that his statement varies considerably from the information set forth in the report of Special Agent in Charge Indd. He now admits that he was received at the Penitensiary from Santa Fe, New Mexico under the mane of Edgarylay, alias Paul/Gregg, alias Fredgmith, received May 3, 1919 and discharged Hovember 15, 1920. It will be noted in the statement distated by Ingraham that he still insists that Roy Sherrill was brought to the Penitensiary after he was incarcerated there, however the records on Sherrill show, as furnished by Special Agent in Charge Vetterli that he was received at that institution on Hovember 15, 1908.

Another discrepancy, which I consider of importance is the fact that he now changes his statement to the effect that he met Harvey Bailey of Kamess City, Hissouri and Kamess City, Fansas about ten years ago; that he was mistaken when he informed Special Agent Haynor that he met Bailey at the Federal Penitentiary at Leavenworth.

From a group of photographs which were displayed to Imercham he picked therefrom the photographs of Harvey Bailey and Roy Cherrill, but failed to identify the photograph of Robert C. Brady with alieses as the person referred to in his statement and called Braley alias Harnes. Then advised that Info or Ime: Bathan could not be located at Pomphis, Tennessee he stated that he was possibly mistaken with regard to the mans furnished to him by Sherrill, but that he was certain that the person that Sherrill had in mind was a brother-in-law of one imax Heis, who at one time was in the wholesale boot and shoe business at Hemphis, Tenn. Efforts to werify this information are now being made by Special Agent R. E. Petersen of the Birmingham Office.

With regard to this Bailey, alias Barnes there is apparently so doubt in Ingraham's mind that he was one of the five eccupants of the ear which was alleged to have been in Henderson, Ky., on the afternoon of June 81, although information received from Special Agent in Charge Vetterli telephonically, now places this individual in the McAlester Pemitentiary.

With regard to page 4, paragraph 5 of Mr. Ingraham's statement, the person referred to therein is Frank Bash, that is according to Cherrill's statement they were somewhat afraid of Bash furnishing information concerning the break at the Leavenworth Penitentiary at which time Warden White was kidneped.

page 3, paragraph 6 of his statement is a bit confusing, but according to Ingraham, Sherrill, Bailey and the others were at Bot Springs, Arkansas on the date Mash was apprehended, for the purpose of placing him on the "spot" and according to Ingraham, Sherrill advised that he was apprehended before this purpose could be accomplished; that when information was received to the effect that Mash was apprehended, they immediately started for Kansas City. He was unable to furnish any other information as to how Bailey and the others knew that Mash would be immediately taken to that point.

The Kansas City Office might desire to check the information furnished by Ingraham concerning BILL CRESCORE, who is alleged to have resided at Jay. Oklahoms.

with regard to the ultimate paragraph on page 7, the writer located Maude Montgomery now connected with the World's Shows of America which show is playing at Middletown, Ohio. She stated that in 1925 at Boston, Mass. she married one Archie Nach who was an acrobat; that his home was just outside of Boston and that she secured a divorce from him during the year 1927 in Texas; that she last heard from him in 1929 in Portland, Mains; that according to her information Archie Mash was the only shild and who was unable to furnish any information concerning Frank Mash or his relatives.

For the information of the Enmas City Office a copy of Ingraham's statement is being furnished the Chicago Office at the request of the Director, in order that Incille Roberts, reputed to be the girl friend of Sherrill and now working in the "Days of "49", Century of Progress, Chicago might be discreetly interviewed for any information she might be able to furnish concerning Sherrill or his relatives.

A detailed report concerning the investigation at Emahville, Mamphie and Cincinnati will be reported by the writer within the maxt few days.

I first met Roy Shevill in the Federal Prison, Leavenworth, Emses in 1919, where he was brought in on crutches to serve a sentence. He was placed under my care in the prison hospital. After his wounds were healed he was given an assignment as chauffeur for the prison physician. I left the Federal Penitentiary in the month of Movember, 1919. I never saw Shevill prior to the time he was brought into the Federal Penitentiary.

The next time I saw Sherill was at the Chicago Stadium in Chicago, Illinois in October, 1932. He came to the Chicago Stadium to see a girl named Lucille Roberts, who is now working at the "Days of '49" at the Century of Progress at Chicago.

I have known Harvey Bailey for about ten years, having met him from time to time in Emmas City, Missouri and Hansas City, prior to June 84, 1933, about four or five years ago at Emmass City.

I also knew Braley alias S. L. Barnes. I knew him in Oklahown when I was with the 101 Ranch at Ponca City. I last sew this person in 1928 at Ponca City, at which time he was Manager of a taxi office in that city.

Sherrill wrote me in October, 1932, asking me to get him a job at the place where I was employed. He was at a small town in Indians, near Terre Haute, where his uncle lives. I enswered the letter received from Sherrill and told him that there was no opening at that time, and that I was going East. I want to New York and Boston, Mass. Lucille Roberts, undoubtedly, knows the address of Sherrill's relatives residing near Terre Haute, Ind.

From that time I never saw any of the individuals mentioned above until on June 24, 1933, at Henderson, Kentucky, while stopping at the Kingdon Hotel.

I was walking along Green Street at about 2:30 in the afternoon, when the car drove by with five men in it. The ear was practically a new 16-cylinder Cadillac, four-door. I am sure there was a spare tire on each side in the front. The ear was black. There was a lot of chronium on it, and it had wire wheels. It had a plain Cadillac radiator esp. The car was passing by me in the same direction, can the same side of the street, when Sherrill recognized me. They were going south on U. S. Highway \$41, in the direction of Mashwille, Tennessee. I was alone when Sherrill recognized me. Sherrill was sitting in the front seat with Bailey, who was driving. I recognized one of the three occupants in the back of the ear as Braley alias Barnes.

Sherrill hollered at me and jumped out and wanted to know what I was doing there. I recognised Sherrill.

Everybody got out of the car except Bailey, the stayed at the wheel. I did not see either the number or solor of the license plates. The first thing Sherrill said to me was that they were in a "jem". He said, "What are you doing here?", and I asked him, "What are you doing here?". He said, "We are in a jem. We had to bump off a bunch of people in Emsas City." I asked him if he was mixed up in that Hash affair, and he said, "Nothing else but". At that time Sherrill was alone, the other persons remaining in the car. Bailey spoke up and told Sherrill he was talking too much, and Sherrill said, "I know this fellow, and know he is allright". He made some remark that he would not have any leg if it had not been for me.

Then they all piled out of the car except Bailey. Bailey never left the seat. I noticed that Bailey's right leg stayed in one position all the time. From a medical standpoint it may have been impaired or helpless. I noticed that he drove with his hand instead of with the foot accelerator.

I looked into the car as they were getting out and it was full of guns and amminition. They were all on the floor in the back. There were a couple of machine guns and a few sawed off shot guns lying on the floor of the car. They were sovered when the occupants of the car got out. All the men had guns on them. There was also in the front of this car, a sawed off shot gun, between Bailey and Sherrill which was not covered, but which gun was placed in the back of the car when they all got out of the car except Bailey.

Bailey did not have any hat on. He had sport shoes and flannel trousers, white shirt and no tie.

Sherrill had a straw hat on. He had no coat on, but had a light pull-on, V-shaped neck, sweater. They were all clean.

Braley alias Barnes had light trousers with suspenders and no coat. He had a Bangkok hat on. Their coats were all off when I first saw them.

I was wrong when I stated all the occupants had their coats off. I now recall that Bailey had a coat on, and had a double holster under it. He pulled back his coat and displayed to me this double holster. There were several .45's in the car; also boxes of cartridges.

Beiley stated they were going down to a filling station to get some Diamond gas. He told the other fellows to stay with me while he went to get the gas. He had already asked somebody the location of the Diamond Gas Station, which was only a block and a half from where we were, and he went to the gas station, leaving the remaining four people with me.

This place where we were standing was in the residential section about one and one-half blocks from the main thoroughfare. I had been talking to the occupants of the ear about four or five minutes before Bailey left to get the gasoline.

Just as soon as Bailey left, Sherrill called me aside, probably twelve feet away from the other three fellows, and told me he was in a terrible mess. He said that they had intended to kill Mash only, for double-crossing BillsCreekmore, whom I knew. He said that Mash had double-crossed Creekmore as well as everybody else, and had beat it to Hot Springs, where Bailey and Sherrill and the rest of the boys had gone to get him. They were in Hot Springs when Mash was apprehended and they beat the train into Empass City.

Creekmore's place is near Juy, Oklahoma, across the State line from Joplin, Missouri. He used to keep up erooks between jobs and acted as a fence for them. He went to Leaven-worth in 1919 for a crime which I do not know.

Sherrill said they killed a bunch of officers and that it was impossible to get Mash without getting them. He said the five of them were in on it. There were two cars used in the killing at Emeas City, but he did not tell me the makes of the cars. He said the cars used in Emeas City had been picked up in Emeas City. Sherrill stated that the car now in their possession was not one of the care used during the killing.

I asked him if it was necessary to mow all these fellows down, and he said that it was done now and that they were all in the same spot, and that it is capital punishment in Missouri, and that it would not help their cause any, whether they killed one or one hundred. He said it would be safer to travel in one car, because it would be stronger, and that they were going to stick together until the finish.

I noticed that the Cadillac was a very beautiful ear. It was a regular stock job. The glass on the car was all flows. The ear looked comparatively clean.

They told me that they were spending their nights in tourists camps, and not registering in any hotels. They had a trunk on the back of the ear. There were no grips in the ear.

Sherrill said some of their associates were afraid that he would do some talking about an escape out of Leavenworth two or three years ago. He mentioned someone from Oklahoma who was in it, but mentioned no mame. All this conversation took phace with Sherrill, while the other three remained about ten or twalve feet away.

He asked he how I was fixed for money, and seid that they had plenty of money. I told him I was allright and did not meed it. He told me how to get in touch with him. I advised him that I was about through there, at which time I was working on a Route Guide, for Highway \$41, listing tourists camps, hotels, service stations, etc.

Itold him I might go on down toward Mashville, Tenn.

He said, "I will tell you how to get in touch with me", and he teld

me where they were going, and said they were headed for Harlan, My.

He told me there were two different ways that I could get in touch with him in Mashville - one was to drop him a line addressed to Roy Roberts, General Dalivery, Mashville, Tenn., and the other was to see a man named Molan - I think he called him mig-or Nigger Molan - who is a well known fence at Mashville. He is a book-maker at Mashville.

He also said that they would be back and forth ever to Memphis, and that I could get in touch with him in the same manner at Memphis, either through the Post Office, or a book-maker named Lafe/Methan. One of the strangers had relatives around Harlan, My., and they were going there to make their headquarters in the hills.

Braley alies Bernes finally came over and maked me the same question as Sherrill did, about money, and I told him the same thing I told Sherrill, that I did not need it. Braley said that if I came to Mushville, he would like to see me. I told him that Sherrill had told me how to get in touch with him.

Oklahoma, wanting to know if I had been down in Oklahoma lately. That had nothing to do with the case. Phuhuska is his home town. I do not know hig or higger Molan. I do know many reputable people in Mashville.

I do not know Lafe Mathan, mentioned by Sherrill, at Mamphis, but I have heard of him. I know his brother-in-law, who is a very high-class Jew, whose name is Max Weis. He used to be in the wholesale boot and shoe business there. I have never met Mathan.

The last time I was in Momphis, was January, 1955, at which time I was in charge of the circus at the Auditorium. It was a show which I put on in connection with the new Bry's Department Store. I stayed at the DeVoe Hotel. I have no relatives residing in Memphis.

About this time Bailey had some back. He was headed in the opposite direction and was gone about fifteen or twenty minutes to change the oil in the car and get filled up with gas. By this time we had all gotten together. Sherrill and Bailey introduced the other two men to me, but Icannot recall, at this time, their mames. You could tell that one was a hill-billy. These two men, whose names I cannot recall, had no coats on. They had sailor hats on. One had a blue shirt and cheap, striped, light-colored trousers.

Bailey told me, "We are in a pretty hot spot, but I would rather be in a spot, than back at that place. Anything is better than that."

He said he hoped to see me down in Mashville. I told him I thought maybe I would be down there in a few days. He said I sould be a lot of service to them, and that they would be willing to pay me for anything I could do for them, to keep them under cover. I entered into no proposition with them. Bailey, at no time during the entire time, got out of the car.

Beiley wanted to know how long it would be before I would be down to Meshville. I told him probably in a week or ten days. Beiley asked me if Roy had told me how to get in touch with them at Mashville. I told him I would probably be there in a week or ten days. I told him Sherrill had told me. Beiley then maid they would make me a good proposition, meaning that I could protect them, and that I could get around where they could not. I told them I would think it over, and talk to them when I came down.

After Bailey returned from the gas station, he remained about ten minutes. In all, I believe I spent about forty minutes with them. Bailey told us be had the arank case drained, and had it filled up with gasolime.

They left me, I would judge, about five or ten minutes after three o'clock. They were going a little beyond Mcahville, Tenn., to a tourist camp located on Highway #41, on the other side of Mashville. They were going from Mashville, Tenn., to Marlen, Manuaky, to establish a headquarters, and then back and forth between Mashville and Memphis, Tenn.

One of the hill-billies said, "I have a light car in Meshville, Tenn. We are not going to take this thing up into the mountains". The lighter car, according to my understanding, was in Mashville.

When they got beck into the ser, Sherrill got in the front seat, and the other three fellows got into the rear seat. The saved-off shot gun was still in the beck seat.

Sherrill said he had been hanging out in Oklahoma, I would judge, eround Pawhuska, Ponca City, Tulsa, and Muskogee with Bernes. I think both the other boys had been with him in Oklahoma. I never attempted to get a look at the license plates or the color appearing on same. I turned around when they left and walked fown the street, without turning my head.

Immediately after that, I debated the thing until Monday morning. Then I went to Evansville, Ind., and tried to call Mr. W. H. Moah, Chief Post Office Inspector at St. Louis, shortly after mine o'clock, on the 26th. I put the call in collect from either the McCurdy or Vendome Hotel. I was unable to get Mr. Moah. I talked to the acting Inspector In Charge. I told him that I was envious to get in touch with Mr. Moah, inconnection with this Mash case. He told me Mr. Noah was out of the city, but that I could tell him anything I had to say. I said I would rether get in touch with somebody who was directly in charge.

He then told me to call Mr. Ladd at Central 1650 at St. Louis. I did not do this, but at 5:30 that afternoon, I sent a day letter to Mr. Hoover at Washington, as a result of which I was interviewed by Mr. Maynor at Henderson, Ky., the same night, about ten o'clock.

There is a women with a carnival at Middletown, Ohio, who will be there until tonight, whose name is Maude Mash, either married to Frank Mash or his brother. Her name now is Maude Montgomery. She is known in the show business as Maude Mash. She may or may not know something. I last saw Maude Mash about eighteen months ago in Chicago.

From a group of photographs he picked out photographs of Bailey and Sherrill. From the photographs he stated that Braley alies Barnes was not included therein.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

BU EAU OF JUSTICE ATTEAN FILE

In connection with your request noted on memorandum dated June 29, 1933, referring to the commutation of sentence of Roy Sherrill from 25 to 10 years, kinily be advised that Mr. Barry, of the Pardon Attorney's office, permitted the writer to examine the file of that office on Roy Sherrill, from which it appears that Sherrill was convicted after a plea of guilty on a charge of holding up a Kansas City & Denison train at Koch Siding, near Paola, Kansas, July 10, 1918. There were five randits participating in the hold-up, consisting of Dale Jones, Frank Lewis, Roscoe Lancaster, Thomas Knight, and Roy D. Sherrill. Jones and Lancaster were killed resisting arrest, Lewis died in jail awaiting trial, and Knight and Sherrill pleaded guilty to the charge and were each sentenced to serve a term of 25 years, the minimum.

Sherrill filed application for commutation of sentence from 25 to 10 years, which was granted April 21, 1920. He escaped June 22, 1921 and was returned to the penitentiary June 2, 1923.

The commutation of sentence was recommended by Post
Office Inspectors J. M. Donaldson and J. W. Adamson, the United
States Attorney who handled the case, Fred Robertson, and the United
States District Judge who sentenced Sherrill, John C. Pollock.
The recommendations were made because Sherrill made a complete
statement, admitting the facts of the hold-up and implicating the
co-defendants. The United States Attorney and the Post Office
Inspectors stated that but for Sherrill's admissions, Knight could
not have been convicted, and that because of Knight's knowledge that
Sherrill had made a complete statement, he also entered a plea of
guilty. It was stated also that Sherrill did all he could to assist
in the location of the other bandits, who were shot and killed.

Sherrill's father, Reverend J. L. Sherrill, a minister to the Baptist Church, did considerable corresponding with Congressman Everett Sanders of Indiana and also with Senator Watson, during the time that Sherrill's application was pending. After Sherrill's escape and return to the penitentiary his father wrote numerous letters to Congressman Sanders in an effort to have his son's good

For your information, the Kameas City Office is the office of origin in this case.





When we called they said - would have to wait -- they said -- He only had 4.00 in money, a diamond ring, a wrist watch & glasses. Can you get this information from Mr. Smith - who was with him - when he was killed. I would also like to know if the Department of Justice does not notify the family when one of their prisoners are killed, especially like my brother was - shot in the back of the head. Our family had to telephone twice to Kansas City before we could locate his body.

I would like to know about his belongings as they will have to pay his funeral expenses - the undertaker there can give you the correct information about the coroners office, as he went with me when they said I could have his belongs. We had to borrow money to bring him home and will have to sell his belongings to defray the expenses.

Your attention is invited to the report of Special Agent R. J. Caffrey, formerly of the Kansas City Bureau Office, dated July 29, 1932 in the case entitled "Yrancis L. Kenting, with aliases; Thomas Holden, with aliases; Frank Hash, with aliases, Pugitive, I. O. #1166, Escaped Federal Prisoners", Kansas City File Ho. 76-174.

A perusal of pages 15, 16, and 17 of the aforementioned report indicates that one William Engler, who served time in the Leavenworth Penitentiary for Mail Robbery, No. 24846, and who is out on bond in Des Moines, Iown for bank robbery, and his wife, Bertha Engler, were connected with the Keating-Holden mob.

In the said report, it is further noted that William Engler was arrested in Des Moines, Iswa en December 12, 1931, en a charge of bank robbery. At the time of his arrest at Des Moines, he was accompanied by one Edward Vilhite, Des Poines PD No. 8977, Wincelfurban, Des Moines PD \$897., and John Lager, Des Moines PD No. 8978. These four individuals are alleged to have been captured by the Des Moines Police Department in a bank at Des Moines Iowa on December 12, 1931 and were subsequently released on bond, pending disposition of State charges against them.

In the jakewactor kidnaping case which occurred at Chicago, Illinois a few days ago, Urban and Wilhite are mentioned as possibly part of the kidnaping gang.



Replying to your letter of July 1, 1933, requesting investive gation emeerning V. C. Moore, you are advised that we had previously endeavored to locate Mrs. E. Morton, 1817 Harland, Oklahoma City. Okla., and found there is no such address in Oklahoma City. I informed Agent Gus Jones of the results of our investigation by telephone. I also furnished you a copy of the unpercendum submitted by Special Agent G. H. Franklin deted June 27, 1933, covering our investigation of V. C. Moore at Oklahoma City.

In reply to your letter of June 28, 1933, requesting that inquiry be made at the railroad ticket effice of the Missouri Pacific Railroad, Ft. Smith, Ark., to determine whether or not enyone secured information through that source on June 16th as to purchasing of tickets and destination of the officers who transported Frank Hash to Kensas City, please be edvised that W. R. Harper, Ticket Agent for the Missouri Pacific Railroad at Ft. Smith, was on duty on June 16th from 4:00 P.M. to midnight and sold the tickets. He reports that no one made any inquiry concerning the matter; that he only sold three other tickets on that train - one to Vinita, Oklahoma, one to Independents, Oklahoma, and one to Kenses City, with lower berth, which were purchased by script indicating probable use by commercial travelers. There were a number of people in the office at the time of the departure of the train, including newspaper reporters, and dispatches I think went out of Fort Smith over the A.P. at 8:45 P.M., stating that Hash was being taken to Leavenworth on that particular train. These A.P. dispatches were plaked up in transit at Hot Springs, Pine Bluff, Helena, El Dorado, and Texarkana. Also at 10:45 P.M. that night the A.P. sent a dispatch to Oklahoma City to be relayed to Kensas City, stating that Nash was being taken there by Missouri Pecific train and would arrive there at 7:15 A.M.

The most interesting thing we discovered was through Mr. C. A. Perrysen, General Agent for the Missouri Pacific Railroad at Ft. Smith,

Ark., who advised that at about \$155 P.M. on the 16th as the Kammas City train was crossing the river bridge coming into Fort Smith and as he was attempting to cross the road between the passenger depot and the freight depot, a large coups - either a Cadillac or Lincoln - color either dark blue or black, same driving around the back of the freight depot at a rapid pace and stopped in back of the passenger depot. In connection with efforts of the Bureau of Investigation to apprehend one Frank Bash, a Federal Pugitive from justice, Chief of Police Otto Reed of McAlester, Oklahoma, proceeded to Hot Springs, Arkansas, with two Special Agents of this Bureau where the fugitive, Bash, was apprehended. Chief Reed was requested to accompany the Agents in view of the fact that he knew Hash and could readily identify him. Chief Reed accompanied the Special Agents of the Bureau with the Federal prisoner to Kansas City, Missouri, from which point it was planned to proceed to the Federal Penitentiary at Leavencorth, Kansas. At the Union Station in Kanses City, the officials were fired upon by individuals concealed behind automobiles who used machine guns and Chief of Police Reed was killed as were other law-enforcement officials, including a Special Agent of the Bureau of Investigation.

In view of the foregoing, information is requested as to whether there is any way in which this Bureau could meet the funeral expenses of the late Chief Reed. This officer lost his life in assisting employees of the Federal Government in the handling of a Federal case and it would appear that the Government should be able to at least care for the funeral expenses. I would appreciate it if you will secure an early decision on this matter.



From a reading of press reports, it appears that the car occupied by the attackers drove up close by and parked near the car of Agent Caffrey, and the thought comes to me that the attackers were probably able to locate and identify the car of Agent Caffrey because of the Department of Justice identification above referred to, which was in the car. AT CINCINGATI, OHIO

Agent Bliss Morton, forwarded from Indianapolis, Ind., to the Cincinnati Office of the Bureau, a copy of a letter which had been written by Fred Wampler, Captain of Police, CCC & St.L. Ry., Mattoon, Ill., addressed to E. F. Cline, Captain of CCC & St.L. Ry. Police, Indi napolis, Indiana in which it was stated that Deputy Sheriff Grissom, Indianapolis, Indiana in which it was stated that Deputy Sheriff Grissom, Toledo, Ill., had informed Captain Employ that Grissom had been told that four men had stopped at an automobile camp called "The Cake" between Casey and Greenup, Ill., about 5:30 P.M., on the date of the shooting at Kansas City and had remained until dark and then went east. The information further was to the effect that these men were in a big dark colored sedan, and that they were the man, or part of them, who had done the killing at Kansas City.

AT CARRY, ILL.

By pre-arrangement, agent met Nelson Grissom, Deputy
Sheriff of Toledo, Ill., at the automobile camp known as "Oak Grove Lodge"
some three miles west of Casey Ill., on National Highway #40. Deputy
Sheriff Grissom informed agent that he had obtained his information in
this case from the proprietors of the Oak Grove Lodge, who had been at
that place many years and were reliable.

perhaps 20 years old, mail address Casey, Ill., were interviewed. They have an eating place at that address, with a number of cottages. Mr. Baker keeps a record of guests, by name, number in party, number of eagin eastgred address and license number of car and make of car. The Bakers state that on June 17, 1933 between 5:30 and 4:00 P.Me. a Ford V-8 Tudor Sedan, black in eder, with red wire wheels was driven into the camp by two man. They wanted a cabin, and were assigned Cabin \$2. Mr. Baker's record shows that the car bore 1933 Indiana license plates \$559-391. Mr. Baker states he asked the driver for his name and the driver wanted to know if it was necessary to give it; whereupon Mr. Baker told him it was customary. Thereupon, the driver said he was Ira Seybold, address, Loransport, Ind. Mr. Beker wrote that information in the register, but neither of the man signed the register. This man was between 35 and 40 years of age, about 5' 10" tall, register. This man was between 35 and 40 years of age, about 5' 10" tall,

weighing about 160 lbs., slender build, marrow face; with scar in eyebrow but Baker does not know whether in left or right eyebrow and when he came in he had oil or eintment, which looked greasy and which seemed to be up under his hat, but had streaked onto his face somewhat.

The man with him did not give a name, but seemed to be about the same age as the one called Seybold, about 5' 10 or 11" tall, weighing about 180 lbs., coerse features, heavy face, dark eyes.

After these men arrived and rented cabin #2 they drove their car to the cabin and weahed up. Baker saw one of them carry into the eabin a black box, approximately 3" x 8" x 22". He could not state of what material the box was made, nor what it contained, but since thinking over the matter he has wondered if it might not have contained a machine gun. The men rested or slept about two hours or until nearly dusk. Then they drove their car cut to the side of State Road #40, almost in front of the main building of the place and came in and ate supper. Although other people were dining, they did not take off their hate all the time they were at the bable, and seemed to watch other people and the road rather furtively.

In June 18, the Bakers saw an item in a newspaper of the killing at Kansas City. They are not sure what paper they saw, but believe it was the Chicago Tribune; but it might have been the St. Louis Gbbe-Democration in this paper they saw on the upper part of the page, the pictures of the officers who were killed. Near these pictures, they saw a picture of the prisoner who was killed with the officers. On the same page, they saw a picture of a man, whose name they cannot recall, but who was mentioned in the paper as the leader of the gang. Mr. and Mrs. Baker and son, Gale Baker, all state that when they saw this picture they remembered that the man giving the name of Seybold, the day before, bore a great resemblance to him.

After the two men in question had eaten, they got into their car and drove east and the Bekers know nothing further about them. They state that no one else at Oak Grove Lodge saw the man.

Agent produced to them Identifications orders \$1189, 1190
1191, 1192, 1193 and 1194. They at once stated that Seybold resembled none
of these. However, they believe that the man with Seybold bore so:
resemblance to \$1190, Robert Q. Brady, alias Bob Brady, alias Pat Brady,
alias J. H. Taylor alias Bob Ross.

Deputy Sheriff Crissor could throw no light on this matter and knew of no one else who could assist.
