

I informed Mr. Vetterli that you would be so advised as soon as possible.



Re: Vernon C^O Miller, with aliases (deceased), Fugitive I. O. 1201; Charles Arthur "Pretty Boy VFloyd, with aliases, Fugitive I. O. 1194, et al. Conspiracy to Deliver Federal Prisoner.

Vivian Mathis was released from the penitentiary at Milan, Michigan at about 8:30 P. M. on September 18, 1934, and was immediately taken into custody by Special Agents D. P. Sullivan, D. E. Hall, and R. C. Suran. Special Agent Hall had, prior to the release of Vivian Mathis, made appropriate arrangements with Warden Ryan not to release her until such a time as Division Agents desired, and Mr. Ryan cooperated fully in this respect. Vivian Mathia was given an conditional release and allowed the usual amount of seventy-two days good time, it being necessary for her to submit the appropriate parole reports, the first one being due on September 29, 1934.

Immediately upon taking Vivian Mathis into custody. the agents proceeded to an apartment at 12134 Lincoln Avenue, Detroit. Michigan, which apartment had been previously rented by the agents. Interrogation of Vivian Mathis was conducted by Special Agents Sullivan and Suran, during which time Vivian Mathia stated that on the night of June 16, 1935, she was at her home on Edgevale Road, Kansas City, Missouri; that Verne Miller left that evening and did not return until the following morning. She refused to give the approximate time of Miller's departure and return. She stated that no other individuals were present at her home on the night of June 16; that when Verne Miller returned the following morning, the first time she saw him, he was alone. She refused to state whether other individuals came to the residence on Edgevale Road, Kansas City

on the morning of June 17, 1933, stating that she could not answer that question. Vivian Mathia claims that she does not know the identities of the participants in the massacre and steadfastly refuses to discuss the activities of Verne Miller and herself on June 16 and June 17, other than stated above.

Vivien Mathis admits knowing and associating with Fred Barker, Doc Barker, Kate Barker, Alvin Karps, Volney Devis, Fred Goetz, C. J. Fitzgerald, and the individual known as Eus, but she refuses to discuss their activities.

Concerning C. J. Fitzgerald, Vivian Mathis stated that she did not know him by that name, but knew him as C. J. Murphy, who was identical with the C. J. Murphy who associated with Verne Miller in Kansas City, Missouri. She stated that Fitzgerald is suffering from rheumatism and usually spends the winters in Kansas City taking baths for that ailment. She further stated that Fitzgerald indulges freely in intoxicating liquors and when under the influence of said liquors is boisterous and rowdy.

Vivian Mathis stated that the Gus who isknown to her is not an old individual, but she refused to give a description of him and denied that she knew his last name, but admitted that he was friendly with Verne Miller. She stated that she also knew Gus Winkler, but that Gus Winkler is not identical with the abovementioned Gus. She refused to further discuss the personl history of these two individuals, but stated positively that neither of them were in her home on June 16 or 17, 1933, and to her knowledge, neither were in Kansas City, Missouri. She further stated that to her knowledge, none of the Karpis and Barker gang were in Kansas City, Missouri on the days in question.

To date Vivian Mathis has refused to admit that she accompanied Verne Miller to Chicago, Illinois subsequent to the massacre and has further refused to admit that she and Verne were at the home of Fritz Mulloy subsequent to the massacre, but she admits being well acquainted with Mulloy.

Vivien Mathis further admits being acquainted with Mr. and Mrs. Herby Farmer, but denies being acquainted with Dick Galatas and likewise refused to discuss the true identity of J. W. Ward, which individual played golf with Miller on June 16, 1933, at Kansas City, Missouri.

Concerning "Big" Momer, she stated that she knew none of Verne Miller's associates by that name. She denied that she was acquainted with Adam Richetti and "Pretty Boy" Floyd, and refused to discuss the possibility of either of them being in her home on the morning of June 17.

She stated that she and Verne Miller drank a considerable amount of beer and that she placed beer in the ice box almost daily. However, she stated she could not recall when the last case of beer was brought to the Edgevale residence and refuses to discuss the source of this supply.

Special Agents Earl M. Black and D. P. Sullivan are continuing the interrogation of Vivian Mathis.

I am making this statement volunterily. Ho threats, or promises here been made to me to influence me is what I am eaving in this statement.

I om 43 years of ago and the mife of Richard Tallman Galatas. married 17 years ago in Riverside, California. To have no children. At the time of our marriage I was a widow, having been divorced for about three years from B. Sturmey. I have one sen, Pat Sturmey, who was an issue of that marriage Mr. Calatas and I moved to Not Springs, Arkenses, from Detroit, Richigan, in 1925 or 1986. He operated in Not Springs as a book maker for horse races and baseball games with his headquarters at the Maite Front and at another place on Central Avenue gver Ben Rerrie' eiger Store. He also operated for several 🛞 months a garage known as the Olive Street Garage. During our stay in Bot Springs I became acquainted with Lou Somer and her husband, Eddie Comer. Eddie operated a road house. He died in July 1952. In the spring of 1955 I became acquainted with two individuals whom I now know were Mr. and Mrs. Frank Mash. I never knew then providus to the Kensas City massages under any names extent "Doc" and Frances. They had a little girl but I did not know that until just a day or two previous to the massacre. I did not know what "Doe" was doing nor where they lived but he hung around the White Front where Dick made his headquarters and I met Frances there several times and, on some occasions, she and I and lou Conner met there. These meetings were easuel and not by pre-arrangement.

On June 14, 1955, in the early afternoon, I had been down town in Mot Springs and upon returning home, or shortly thereafter, my husband, Richard & Calatas, and Frances, with her little girl, same to my home. They told me that "Doe" had been kidnapped. Previous to this time and during the two or three years previous, I had not and known Herb Farmer and his wife, of Joplin, Kissouri. I had seen the Farmers on sumerous occasions in company with Doc and Frances. Frances was very much upset on this occasion that I refer to, on June 16th, and I understood from her and my husband that it was her intention to go immediately to the Farmers' home at Joplin. I prepared lunch for her and the child. I had been in and out of my home several times. Between two and three o'clock, as near as I can recell, on June 18th, I was in my Cedillac Sedan and it stalled just at the end of Bathhouse Row. Several friends pushed me off a etreet car track. and about this time "Dutch" Akers and Joe Wakelin, Police Department officials, came by and drove me in their ear to my home. Frances Hank and my husband may here been at home at this time. I am not sure of this. I believe that Akers told me that he would go back and eye if he could get my Cadillac started and bring it to the house. The Cadillac appeared at our home within a few minutes and while I feel that Dutch Akers may have driven it, I am not sure. My husband told me that he had been down to the Police Station but he did not may who he had seen there. I don't know if Dutch Akers and Wakelin and my husband had any conversation at the house when the ear was brought back or not, or at any other time, and I don't know about any long distance calls that might have been placed to

Henton or Little Rock. I did not know that Frances Wash expected to go to Joplin by airplane until just before my husband and I, with Mrs. Hash and her child, left my house to go to the airport. At the time we left the house my husband hid not intend to go with her but after we got to the hirport he united with her over to the plane and I remained in the ear, which was my Godillac. My husband same back to the ear and said that Mrs. Mush was so nervous and hysterical and the child was hysterical and she was afreid because she had never been up in a plane before, and therefore he had decided to go with her. They told me that when I returned to my house to telephone to the Farmers at Joplin and tell Mr. Farmer to meet them at the airport. On my way home I stepped at Lou Gomber's house on Central Avenus and placed a long distance call from her telephone to the Farmers. I don't recall if I talked with Mr. Farmer or Mrs. Farmer but I teld them to neet the airport as Richard and Frances and Frances' bely were then on the way to Joplin. I might have told them that "Doe" had been in some trouble.

There were no other developments that I knew about until about 9:50 that night when my husband telephoned to me from Jeplin. He told me that they had arrived all right but that he would not be able to return that night because there had been a great deal of dalay as they had landed at the wrong airport. I don't know anything about any telephone call placed from Lou Commer's house in Hot Springs at 10:09 p.m. to the telephone of Herbert Warmer at Jepling

Up to this time I did not know that "Dec", or Frank Hash, was arrested or that he had been wanted for snything. However, I did hear my husband say to Mrs. Hash; "sell Frances if he was wanted, what was he wanted for?", and she said that she did not know.

I stayed at my own home that night. I did not see Lou Conner the night of June 16th and I stayed at my home and did not see her until the next morning, which was a short time before my husband returned to Hot Springs. He returned to Hot Springs in the same airplane and arrived about 10:30 a.m.

In the meantime, I had beerd either over the radio or down town about the shooting and killing of the efficers at Kansas City and I began to get mighty frightened as I associated this killing with the picking up of "Dos", or Frank Mash, at Hot Springs. My husband had not beard about the killing at Kansas City until he got home to our house and I told him. When I told him he kept saying, "oh, ms". He was terribly upset and so was I. We were emvised that the killing at Kansas City and the Frank Mash involved was the party who had been picked up at Hot Springs. Radio accounts were mantioning the feet that Frank Mash had been arrested the previous day in Not Springs by federal agents.

My mother was visiting me from New York and she left that day for New York. Mr. Calates mother was also visiting us from Long Beach, California, and she also left that day for her home. Early the ment morning my husband and I left Hot Springs in the Cadillac. We drove to St. Louis and I stored the Cadillac at a garage and I don't recall where it was that I left it but I told them that I wanted to leave it there for a short time. We went by train from St. Louis to Sacramento, California, changing trains at Los Angeles, but did not stop ever.

We purchased a Plymouth Coupe at Secremento and there began to use the mane of Mr. and Mrs. William Lee. We later changed this name to L. M. Lee. The Plymouth was registered in Secremento. Since that time we have speak some time in Santa Monies, California, and from there made a trip to New Orleans and then back to California and came back to New Orleans about the middle of last April, and for the past few weeks have been living at \$18 Marding Place.

Since our departure from Not Springs we have communicated with no former friends, relatives or associates. We did not even go to see my husband's nother in California and I have not corresponded with my don, who has been living in Montgonery, Alabama, and who was attending school at Tuscalooss, Alabama.

I was sware from reading movements that federal warrants had been issued for my husband and that the foderal government was look of for him.

Gomer, Not Springs, Arkmans, to the telephone of Herbert Allen Farmer, Joplin, Minsouri, during the efternoon of June 16, 1953, I recall that in my previous statement I said that this telephone call was made by Mrs. Frances Mash. This is incorrect, as I was confused at the time. I recall that I instructed my wife, Mrs. Milabeth Galates, to make a long distance telephone call to the home of Herbert Allen Farmer, Joplin, Missouri, and inform Farmer or his wife to the effect that I was coming over to their home with Mrs. Frances Bash and her child by airplane that afternoon, June 16, 1934. This call was referred to in my previous statement as long distance call No. S.

In my previous statement, in conrection with the telephone call designated No. 5, I now recall that I talked to first the maid and then to my wife, Mrs. Galates. During this telephone souversation I informed Hrs. Salates that I would not be home until the next day.

After having made the call to my wife from the Midway Drug Company in Joplin, I returned to the Farmer residence. Upon my return I was informed by Mrs. Frances Mash that Mrs. Galatas had called long distance to the Farmer residence and informed that the men who had Eash in custody were taking him to Kansas City rather than bringing him to Joplin, Missouri, and it was mentioned that these men were going by train from Fort Smith to Kansas City. The question arose as to what time they would arrive in Kansas City, and I said that I thought the train would arrive in Kansas City about breakfast time. This call is referred to as call Mo. 6 in my previous statement.

Some time efter the massacre in Kansas City I saw a photograph in the measure of a man by the name of Verne Miller, mentioned as having participated in the massacre. I identified the photograph of this man as an individual I had met in Hot Springs, Arkansas, on two occasions when I was operating a garage in Hot Springs and was a sub-agent for the Madison Smith Cadillas Company of Little Rock, irimasus. My best recollection is that this was about three years ago. I was introduced to this man by Eddie Conner, deceased husband of Louise Conner. I had known Eddie for several years. He was a gambler and it was my understanding that this man identified as Verne Miller had been playing golf with him. Eddie brought him to me as a prospective purchaser of a Cadillac. I talked to him about a Cadillac but he did not purchase one from me. I later learned that he purchased a Cadillac ear from the Esdison Smith Cadillac Company at Little Rock, Arkansas, through Wesley Smith of that concern. (2-287/5-2566

PER DESTROYED

In the Farmer home on the evening of June 18th there was a conversation between the Farmers, Frances and myself relative to a long distance telephone sail that has offered for some party in Kansas City. During this conversation Mrs. Heah/some person by the name of "Verne," at which time she mentioned the warm friendship existing between this person and her imstand. I recall that she said that this party in Kansas City had planty of money and she believed that he was the type of friend the would do almost enything for her husband, but no specific mention of that he would or could do for Hash. This call is identified as call No. 7 in my previous statement.

I did not at the time know the true identity of Frenk Bask, and, of course, did not know that he was an escaped Federal prisoner.

I again wish to say that I do not know the identity of the suspects in the massacre at Kansas City.

From what I have learned of the occurrence in Lancas City since June 17th I believe that Verne Miller was a participant. I have not, since June 17th, seen Herbert Farmer, his wife, Mrs. Frances Hash, or Verne Miller. I did see Mrs. Lou Commer upon my return to Not Springs, Arkanses, on June 17, 1934.

I placed an undersover informat in this house for a night and it developed that be was well acquainted with the operator and under suitable protect he made inquiry as to D.O.O'Connor. It was ascertained that O'Connor had been etopping there most every might for about ten days up to September 20, when he disappeared. He had no baggage of consequence, was shabby in appearance and practically broke. He paid the usual fee of 15 cents per might and nothing was known as to his antecedents, except that the attendant in the basement est room stated he thought the man was from New Newloo.

He was described as: Age - 35; Height - 5' 11"; Weight - 145 lbs. Light complexion; cheep elethes; shoes practically worm out. While there he purchased a pair of rubber half soles which he gland on to the bottom of his shoes. This men disappeared on the morning of September 19 or 20, date not exact, and has not been seen since.

Dear Sir:

The interrogation of subject Galatas was conducted throughout the night of September 25, 1934, by Messrs. Andersen and Brantley. This questioning took place in the New Orleans office. Subject Galatas was brought to the office after dark and was kept there until shortly before daylight. The interrogation was continuous and vigorous.

A statement obtained from Galatas has already been forwarded to the Division. On the night of September 25th he admitted several things with respect to the occurrences on June 16th, which was the day before the massacre, and which he had not admitted before. He admitted that the information relative to the change of plans of the officers in taking Nash to Kansas City rather than bringing him to Joplin was furnished to him and Mrs. Nash in Farmer's residence at Joplin by Mrs. Gelatas by telephone on the night of June 16th.

He admitted having seen Verne Miller in Hot Springs on two or more occasions prior to the massacre, but stated that at the time he did inot know, his true identity and believes that he met him under the name of Moore or Mason. He was asked who effected this introduction and he stated that it was Eddie Conner, the late husband of Lou Conner, subject in this case. It will be observed from the file that Miller purchased a Cadillac automobile in Little Rock on one occasion. Gelates says that he was a subagent for the Cadillac concern out of Little Rock, and that he tried to sell Miller, whom he knew as Moore or Mason, this car but that the sale eventually was made by a representative by the name of Smith, connected with the Cadillac Agency in Little Rock. 162-28915-2568

He admitted there was a discussion between the Farmers, Frances Nash, and himself, on the evening of June 16th with respect to calling CCT 1 1934

Verne Miller; that during this discussion Mrs. Nash discussed the friendship existing between Verne and her husband, subject Nash; that Nash's widow is alleged to have said that Miller had plenty of money and she believed he would do almost anything for her husband. He, of course, denied that there was any mention made as to just what Miller could or would do for Nash. Galatas also admitted that he talked to Verne Miller on the telephone that night, as did Mrs. Hash.

He denied that he knows the identity of the participents in the massacre, except to say that he does believe that Verne Miller was there. He denied that he knew the true identity of Hash. Galatas's statement, of course, is untrue.

During the questioning of Galatas on the night of September 25, 1934, on several occasions, he stated that the agents could prepare any statement they desired him to make and that he would sign same, but, of course, he was informed that only truthful statements from him are desired.

The questioning of this subject and of his wife will be continued, and the Division will be advised of results.

This is in confirmation of my telephonic conversation with Mr. Tanm today.

prior to the year 1954 the registration of automobiles in the State of Illinois was recorded by name of the owner and by the number of the automobile license; that in 1934 Certificates of Title were issued to the owners for the first sime and that now all automobiles are listed by motor and serial number, as well as alphabetically according to the name of the owner.

A search of the records disclosed that one H. Wilson on November 19, 1929, who gave his address as 7150 Cyril Avenue, Chicago, Ill., filed an application for the registration of a Packard Sedan, the same being notarized at Chicago on December 14, 1929 by C. E. Nicceum, a Notary Public of Chicago. This automobile was described as being a black, 1929 model, with engine #253,049. A photostatic copy of application for registration was obtained and is being transmitted to the Chicago Division office with this report. It shows the signature of H. Wilson, which is identical with the signature appearing on applications filed by this individual for registration of automobiles during subsequent years.

In 1930 the same H. Wilson also filed an application with the Secretary of State for the registration of a Cadillac, 5 passenger Sedan, bearing motor #803,227. This application was notarized by Herman E. Oswald, a Notary Public, 2015 E. 71st St., Chicago, Ill. This application was made for a transfer of the license issued to him for the above mentioned Packard Sedan to the Cadillac Sedan. It was stated in the application that the Cadillac Sedan was purchased from the Cadillac Motor Car Company, 2301 S. Michigan ave., Chicago, Ill. A photostatic copy of this application was also obtained and is being furnished the Chicago office with this report.

In 1931 H. Wilson, giving his address as 7130 Cyril Parkway, Chicago, Ill., registered a Cadillac Sedan, motor #803,227 in the State of Illinois. His application for registration at that time was notarized by Herman E. Oswald, 2015 R. 71st St., Chicago, Ill., May 19, 1931. A photostatic copy of this application is also being transmitted to the Chicago Division office.

In 1932 H. Wilson giving his address as 7130 Cyril Parkway; Chicago, Ill., again registered this same Cadillac in the State of Illinois. His application for license and registration was notarized December 5, 1932 by Herman E. Oswald, 2015 E. 71st St., Chicago, Ill.

In 1933 H. Wilson, giving his address as 8015 S. Wood St., Chicago, Ill., registered a Cadillac, 5 passenger Sedan in the State of Illinois under motor #1,202,348. He was issued 1933 Illinois license #199506 for the said automobile. This car was described as a Cadillac, 5 passenger Sedan, model 355B, and 1932 model. It was stated in the

application that said car was purchased January 10, 1933. Wilson stated in this application that he had never registered said car in the State of Illinois and that it had not been registered in any other State prior to that time. This application was notarized before E. J. Missing, 2015. E. 71st St., Chicago, Ill., Vanuary 10, 1953. A photostatic copy of this application is being transmitted to the Chicago Division Office.

In 1934 H. Wilson, giving his address as 8015 E. Wood St., Chicago, Ill., registered a Cadillac Sedan, 1932 model, factory \$1,202,548, engine \$1,202,548, model 355B. He was issued Illinois, 1934, license \$722069 for said car. In this application Wilson stated that he bought this car new on January 10, 1933 from the Cadillac Motor Car Co., 2301 S. Michigan Ave., Chicago, Ill., and stated that the said car was registered in the State of Illinois during the previous year. The application requested that license and title be mailed to him in care of the Felz Motor Sales, 1132 Diversey, Chicago, Ill. A photostatic copy of this application is also being transmitted to the Chicago Office with this report.

It appears from the above that Wilson, after registering Packard Sedan, motor #253,048 in the State of Illinois in 1930, traded this car to the Cadillac Motor Car Co., 2301 S. Michigan Ave. for a Cadillac, 5 passenger Sedan, motor #893,227, which he registered in the State of Illinois in 1930, 1931 and 1932. It further appears that he traded this automobile in to the Cadillac Motor Car Co., 2301 S. Michigan Ave., Chicago, Ill., for Cadillac Sedan, motor #1,202,348 on January 10, 1933 and according to the records in the Secretary of State's office at Springfield, Ill. this car is still in his possession, being registered in the State in 1933 and 1934.

It will be observed that in the application filed by Wilson for the registration of Cadillac Sedan, motor #803,227 in 1932, it is stated that the said car had also been registered in the State of California, but the date of registration was not given.

The above automobiles are the only cars which have been registered in the State of Illinois since 1930 in the name of H. Wilson or Homer Wilson that appear to have been owned or registered by the Homer Wilson of this investigation. It is noted that the letter of reference stated that in 1931 Homer Wilson was residing at 7135 Cyril Ave., Chicago, The first address given by H. Wilson in his registration of the Packard Sedan was 7150 Cyril Ave., Chicago, the address being changed in 1931 when he registered the Cadillac Sedan, motor #803,227, to 7130 Cyril Parkway, Chicago, Ill.

It is believed from the information shown in these applications that H. Wilson is identical with the Homer Wilson, whose apprehension the

Division is seeking. Accordingly, the Chicago Division Office is being requested to conduct appropriate investigation to determine that fact.

The second letter of reference stated that during the year 1930 there was in the possession of William Weisman a Cadillac Sedan, serial #4660, motor #801,478, and it was requested that investigation be conducted at the Secretary of State's office in Springfield, Ill. to determine if this automobile has been registered in Illinois at any time subsequent thereto.

As previously stated automobiles have not been registered in the State of Illinois by motor and serial numbers prior to 1934. A check of the records showed that this car was not registered in Illinois during 1934 and an examination of the alphabetical registrations disclosed at no person by the name of William Weisman since 1930. There is no record of automobile registrations in Illinois prior to 1930.

On July 5, 1934 the Division transmitted a copy of a letter to the St. Louis Division Office which had been directed to the Attorney-General June 26, 1934 by Earl Kinney, Deputy Sheriff, Oconee, Ill., which states in substance that a man had drifted into that eity who answered the description of Charles "Pretty Boy" Floyd.

The writer interviewed Deputy Sheriff Earl Kinney, Ocones, Ill, and presented to him a photograph of subject Floyd and he stated Floyd is not identical with the man he had in mind when he communicated with the Attorney-General; that he has previously received from the Division a photograph of Floyd and has determined that the man he suspected was not Floyd.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

CHICAGO OFFICE at Chicago, Ill, is requested to conduct appropriate investigation to determine whether or not the H. Wilson who registered the automobiles listed herein and who is now supposed to be residing at 8015 S. Wood St., Chicago, is identical with the Homer Wilson whom the Division is seeking. Information conserning this man can undoubtedly be obtained from the Felz Motor Sales, 1132 Diversey, Chicago, however, Wilson probably has some contact with this soncern and an open investigation would not seem advisable.


Conspiracy to Deliver a Federal Prisoner - Obstruction of Justice.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter dated September 84, 1934 addressed to Mr. Brantley, in which you suggest that Agent Lewrance arrange to proceed to Muskogee, Cklahoma with Roy Gooch of Springdale, Arkanese for the purpose of conferring with Special Agent Smith. For your information, Agent Smith was in Fort Smith, Arkanese at the time your letter was received and he was instructed to make suitable arrangements with Agent Lawrance at that point.

Agent Smith was in Fort Smith with Agents Hansen, Hell and Franklin of this office and Special Agent in Charge Conroy, Agents Lawrance and Earshell of the Little Rock office, as a result of information furnished by the informant who turned in "Red" Unsell to the effect that "Pretty Boy" Floyd would undoubtedly be at the home of Ly Edwards in Van Buren, Arkansas. The informant had arrangements to take Ruby Floyd from Morris, Oklahoma to Van Buren, Arkansas last night and a car was obtained for him for that purpose. Information has since been received that no developments of consequence occurred as a result of this effort. However, we shall attempt to utilize the further services of this informant inasmuch as information furnished previously by him has been of value and resulted in the successful apprehension of "Red" Unsell.



DETAILS: AT NEW ORLEANS, LOUISIANA.

The facts in this report are the result of joint investigation by Special Agents in Charge R. G. Harvey and Dwight Brantley, and Special Agents H. E. Andersen, L. E. Kindell, L. E. Kingman, W. A. Temple, A. Bosen, J. V. Blake, and D. W. Magos.

Subject Richard Tallman Galatas, and his wife, Elizabeth Galatas, were taken into Federal sustody at New Orleans, Louisiana, at 1 p. m., on September 22, 1934, by Special Agents B. W. Magoo, J. T. Blake, and A. Rosen.

Carlot Antique of Agric Confidential informant No. 1, on the morning of September 23, 1954, somforred with United States Attorney Rene A. Viceca, New Orleans, Louisians, who requested a conference with reporting egent, which was arranged, and at which time confidential informent No. 1 stated that he had viewed a photograph of subject seletes in the September 15, 1934 issue of the Liberty Magazine offering a \$1000.00 reward for information leading to the arrest of subject Galatas. Confidential informant Ho. 1 stated that an individual known to him under the name of Edwin W. Lee, or William Lee, The was the Southeastern Distributor for the Liquid Colophane, effice Room 505 Stern Building. New Orleans. Louisiana, was in his opinion subject Richard Tallman Galatas, Confidential informant No. 1 stated that the purpose of disclosing this information was to secure the \$1000.00 reward offered by the Liberty Magazine, and any other existing rewards offered. The reporting agent advised confidential informent No. 1 that, to his knowledge, no definite reward had been offered by the United States Department of Justice or the Division of Investigation for information leading to the apprehension of subject Galatas or his wife, but agent stated to him that if the information furnished proved to be true the matter would be submitted to the Department for an opinion relative a reward.

Confidential informent No. 2 was taken to the New Orleans Division Office by agent, was permitted to view the existing photographs of subject Bichard Tallman Galatas, and his wife, Elizabeth Galatas, and informant No. 1 was positive in his identification of subject Galatas after viewing Columbus, Ohio Police arrest \$0091, photograph of subject Galatas, and was positive in his identification of Mrs. Bichard Tallman Galatas after viewing her photograph, Mismi, Florida Police \$1059, under the name of Mrs. Glem Morris.

Agent immediately endeavored to reach Mr. Temm at the Division in Washington, D. C., by telephone, but was referred to Mr. R. E. Newby, at which time request was made of the Division whether subject Galatas should be placed under surveillance, as was requested by Division letter of July 26, 1955, or whether he should be apprehended. Special Agent Newby advised that if this individual was subject Galatas he should be apprehended immediately.

confidential informant No. 1 advised that it had been the sustan of Galaks, alias Lee, to remain in his office on Saturday afternoon until R p. M., and that his wife was always with him; that subject Galatas always were his hat but never were eyeglasses in the office; that he always refused to furnish his address or furnished false addresses when requested to advise the location of his residence; that he claimed to own an apartment house in Los Angeles, California, and slaimed to be from Southern California.

Agent instructed confidential informant No. 1 to advise no one of this information or the identity of subject Galatas, but to remain eilent on the matter in the event it was a true identification. This he promised to do.

Special Agents D. W. Mages and J. V. Make proceeded to 505 Starn Building, 548 Baronne Street, New Orleans, Louisians, leaving Special Agent A. Rosen as a lookput in an automobile in front of the building.

In the front office of the aforementioned company there were three sales-

Lecnard Burger, salesman, \$901 Wapoleon Avenue, telephone Uptown 5925-W, New Orleans, Louisiana, who always lived in New Orleans, Louisiana, having formerly operated a wall paper business. Burger recently met subject Galatas under the name of Lee and secured employment from subject Galatas as a salesman on a commission basis.

Chester H. G. Alexander, salesman, address Ruber Hotel, 423 St. Charles Street, New Orleans, Louisians, who was recently, within a six weeks' period, employed by subject Galatas as a salesman. Mr. Alexander has resided for thirty-five years in Birmingham, Alabama.

George W. Burt, salesman, Huber Hotel, 425 St. Charles Street, New Orleans, Louisiana, was employed by subject Galatas about two weeks ago. He is a sless friend of Mr. Chester H. G. Alexander, and has resided most of his life in Birmingham, Alabema. Burt claims he is a first sousin of Crawford Ellis, a prominent official of the United Fruit Company, at New Orleans, Louisians.

Chester B. Simpson, 4408 Tonti Street, Uptown 4414-W, New Orleans,
Louisians, occupied a joint office with subject Galatas, selling an oil pure refiner,
which is manufactured by the Oil Pure Refinery, Clendale, California. Mr. Simpson
was in his office adjoining that of subject Galatas when Special Agents Magee and
Blake entered Room 505 Stern Building, and the three salesmen, whose identity was
not known at that time, immediately left the office. Mrs. Galatas was in an
adjoining room and first approached Agents Blake and Magee. She was immediately
identified. Mrs. Galatas ushered Agents Blake and Magee into the room where subject was located, he being obviously sugaged in applying Colophane paint to some
sample boards.

Bubject Gelatas barely glanced at Agents, turned his back, and continued painting. For a short time Agents Blake and Mages sonversed with subject Galatas No gum was noticed on his person. Galatas wore his hat but no coat. Agents Blake and Mages established the identity of subject Bichard Tallman Galatas, and when guns were placed on him he showed no emotion and continued to paint his samples. He stated that he knew it was soming but that he would never in the world have surrandered.

Subject Galatas, his wife, Elizabeth Galatas, and Mr. Chester B. Simpson, the only remaining individual in the office, were brought to the New Orleans Division Office for questioning.

Mr. Town, of the Division, was immediately notified by telephonic communication of the arrest of subject Michard Tallman Galetas, and his wife, Klizabeth Galetas, and instructions were received that no publicity be given relative the arrest, and that they be confined in a suitable place and questioned relative the Kansas City massacre.

The Director was advised by personal and confidential letter of the New Orleans Division Office dated September 23, 1934, of the developments and interregation of subject Calatas and his wife transpiring up to that date.

After placing proper guard ever subject Galatas and his wife, agent immediately backtracked and interviewed the three above mentioned salesmen and Mr. Chester B. Simpson and took steps to avoid any publicity, this requiring immediate attention prior to the time that agent questioned subject Galatas and his wife.

Agent and Agent Rosen proceeded to the office of subject Richard Tallman Galatas and immediately took possession of all personal sorrespondence and records that might be of evidentiary value. This material, however, was all of a business nature.

Agent Hosen, on instructions, secured the Plymouth Coupe of subject Galatas from in front of the Stern Building and placed same in the Crescent City Garage at New Orleans, Louisians, after removing all personal papers and the license plates. This car will be held pending advice from the Division for disposition.

Agents Kindell and Mages proceeded to the residence address of subject Galatas and wife at 912 Harding Place, Apartment F, and secured a few letters, which were correspondence entirely of a business nature. Mothing has been found by investigation to identify subject Galatas as being in communication with any friends, relatives, or former associates, and nothing was found to identify him as subject Galatas, all correspondence being under the name of Edwin W. Lee or William Lee.

The Division was furnished a summary, by coded telegrem dated September 22, 1934, relating to facts of the apprehension of subject Richard Tallman Galates and Mrs. Galates, and furnishing their former residence addresses.

Subject Galatas stated to Special Agents D. W. Mages and All V. Blake, when first questioned during the night of September 22, 1934, and/morning of September 25, 1934, that immediately after the Kansas City, Missouri massacre, which came to his attention while he and his wife were at Hot Springs, Arkansas, they decided to leave immediately and traveled in their Cadillac car to Little Book, Arkansas, thence to St. Louis, Missouri; that they decided to drop all contact and association with relatives and friends for the purpose of avoiding possible

arrest; that he, Galatas, took a bank roll of sufficient size to carry him through; that after staying a few days in St. Louis, Missouri, where they stored the Cadilla car, he and his wife took a train to Los Angeles, California, over the Missouri Pacific and Southern Pacific Mailway, staying a few hours in Los Angeles, and taking hus over the Ridge route to Sacremento, California.

Subject Galatas places the date of his departure from Hot Springs, Arkansas, as about June 18, 1835.

Subject Galates states that his mother and his wife's nother, who were residing with him in Hot Springs, Arkeness, left about the same time for their respective homes.

Subject Galatas and his wife, under the names of Mr. and Mrs. William Lee, (Edwin W. Lee) resided at 1022 5th Street, Sacramento, California, for a period of one and one-half months, and subject Galatas stated that it was at this point that he assumed the aliases of Edwin W. Lee and William Lee. Under the alias of William Lee he purchased a new Plymouth Coupe, Motor PD 59178, Serial 5004574, bearing 1938 California License #4 B 5659, and subsequently 1934 California License #5 D 5074.

This car, when located in New Orleans, Louisiana, bore 1934 Louisiana License #128-807.

Bubject had in his possession receipts for the payment of this ear from Boyd and Riggs, Ltd., Woodland, California, but subject Salatas states that he purchased this ear in Sacremento, California.

Subject Galatas secured Galifornia automobile operator's license C-21168, under the name of William Lee, address 1022 5th Street, Sacramento, California, on July 18, 1935, on which license subject Galatas is described as age, 45; height, 5' 10 1/2"; weight 182 lbs.; eyes, green; hair, gray.

Subject Galatas states that after a month or a month and a half's residence in Sacramento, California, he and his wife proceeded to Santa Monita, California, where they resided at the Rio Rita Apartments, at which place they lived in two separate spartments on separate occasions.

Subject Galatas states that he and his wife later moved to the Fern Cliff Apartments in Los Angeles, Galifornia, residing there for about one month. He stated that they lived a majority of the time while in Southern California at the Rio Rita Apartments. He stated that when traveling he and his wife always lived in tourist camps and that they either used the name of Edwin F. Lee by William Lee.

Subject Galatas had in his possession at New Orleans, Louisiana, a warehouse receipt of the Redmon Fire-Proof Warehouse Company, 8428 Santa Monica Elvd., Santa Monica, California, for one hand case and two suit cases, and he stated that these personal affects were stored by him when he left California under the alias of W. E. Cox.

Subject Richard Tallman Galatas executed a letter power of atterney for the inspection of this baggage, under the name of W. E. Cox, and same was forwarded to the Los Angeles Division Office by letter dated September 27, 1934, from the New Orleans Division Office, wherein request was made for inspection of the beggage.

Subject Galatas stated that he and his wife traveled in the Plymopth Coupe from Los Angeles, California, to New Orleans, Louisians, arriving in New Orleans, Louisians, about the middle of September 1933, and that he resided at 1541 Metairie Road, Metairie Ridge, Jefferson Parish, in the Metairie Apartments, until about the middle of December 1933, when they traveled back to California in the Plymouth Coupe.

Agent found in subject Galates's possession electric light bills which indicated the address as 614 Metairie Road, instead of 1641 Metairie Road. These bills were from a period of time from September 18, 1935, to December 7, 1935. These bills indicate that subject Galates and wife were living under the name of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Lee at the Metairie Apartments at 614 Metairie Road, Jefferson Parish, Louisiana, a suburb of New Orleans, Louisiana.

Investigation will be made at this address at an early date.

Subject, in April 1934, at Los Angeles, California, met a Mr. H. W. Grapes, who is the head of the Liquid Colophane Corporation, main address - 3636 Beverly Boulevard, Boom 604, Los Angeles, California. Subject Galatas states that he secured a contract from Mr. Grapes, whom he claims did not know his correct identity, as Distributor and Field Representative of the Colophane Products for the States of Louisiana, Mississippi, and all Southeastern States.

Mr. H. W. Grapes at present is reported to be in Kansas City, Missouri, residing at the Valentine Hotel. He is reported to be a resident of Denison, Texas, where the wife of H. W. Grapes now resides.

Bubject Galatas and his wife stated that on their second trip to New Orleans, Louisiana, which was about the middle of April 1934, they resided first at the Carroll Hotel, 8688 St. Charles Avenue, New Orleans, Louisiana, subsequently moving to the Pontchartrain Apartments, address - 2051 St. Charles Avenue, New Orleans, Louisiana, an exclusive apartment house in New Orleans, Louisiana, for a period of about two months; that recently, being hard pressed for money, he has been residing in a small apartment at 912 Harding Place, Apartment 7, New Orleans, Louisiana, which is his present address.

Bubject Gelates gave Agent Mages a written letter of authority directed to Net Gold, Manager of the apartment house at 918 Harding Place, for the removal of subject Gelates's and Mrs. Gelates's personal effects and baggage, and same was removed by Agents Mages and Temple on September 26, 1934, at the request of R. G. Harvey, Special Agent in Charge of the Philadelphia Division Office, who was in New Orleans, Louisians, to the New Orleans Division Office, where these personal effects are stored. Personal effects of subject Richard Tallman Gelates and his wife will be listed at New Orleans, Louisians, in a memorandum in instant file, and will be held pending advice from the Kansas City Division Office or the Division.

Subject Galatas resembles photograph of the Division Identification Order bearing photograph without glasses, and looks very little like the photograph on Identification Order \$1804.

Subject Galatas stated to Agents Blake and Magee that he witnessed the Marriage License Certificate of Doc Miller (Frank Mash) and Mrs. Hash, at Hot Springs, Arkanses,

The foregoing facts were given for the purpose of making available leads to be investigated should it be the desire of the Division or the office of origin to request some. The aforementioned facts were secured by igents Blake and Magoe by investigation and by interrogation of subject Galatas and his wife, and contain material and pertinent matters developed on the investigation to date of September 23, 1934.

Special Agent H. E. Andersen, at New Orleans, Louisians, on the night of September 25, and early morning of September 24, 1954, interrogated subject Richard, and secured the following information and statements:

"Galates related that a short time prior to the apprehension of Frank Hash at Hot Springs, Arkansas, two men from Chicago, whose names he did not recollect, called on him to obtain his 0. K. in the distribution of illicit beer bearing the labels of the Blue Ribbon Brewing Company. Galatas informed these men that he was not interested in their proposition, advising them that he did not deal in beer himself, and that he did not feel in a position to back them with the City Administration at Hot Springs. The men left, but a night or two later appeared at the Thite Front Cigar Store and invited Galatas to go to the Eastman Hotel and have some cold beer with them. Galatas got in the car and noticed the third man who was driving. The car proceeded to the side entrence of the Hotel when one of the men he had met got out and opened the door to the ear and told him to get out. Galatas noticed that all three individuals were armed. He was directed to proceed to the basement of the Eastman Hotal, the driver remaining in the ear and Galams's two companions going with Galatas. They entered an elevator and the floor was called. The car, unbeknown to the two individuals, stopped at the first floor of the Hotel, and as some people started to enter the elevator Galatas made a hurried exit.

Gelates made his way to the White Front Cigar Store and told some of his eronies what had happened. He then concealed himself and a few minutes later observed the ear he had ridden in and the three men drive up to the White Front and inquire for him. He had arranged so that he did not have to meet them.

Within a day or two one of the men, aforementioned, in sompany with Frank Nash, alias Doc Miller, accosted him, and during the conversation he pulled out a mortgage which he had on his property, and in answer to their queries as to the money he had been making stated that he was almost broke but was merely putting on a big front. Mash and the other man appeared greatly surprised and they conferred at some length about the racket business in Hot Springs. Hash, whom Galatas maintained he knew at that time only as Doc Miller, offered to loan him a few thousand

dollars to carry on, and Galetas intimated that he might have use for the money at a later date.

In explanation of the foregoing, Galatas stated that while in the booking business at Hot Springs it was his habit to keep most of his money at his residence. He stated that this was generally known and that in his opinion the men who invited him to the hotel room intended to hold him for ransom and have someone, in his opinion Herber Farmer, to act as a go-between and collect the money from his wife. He said it would have been very easy for these men to have obtained at least Ten Thousand Dollars from his wife had she thought he was in danger. He was pressed for reasons as to why he suspected Herbert Farmer and Nash, and stated that their actions subsequent to the night in question clearly indicated to him that they had knowledge of what had transpired.

Galetas advised that it was his intention to get in contact with some Government official through Tom Kearney, a bookmaker at St. Louis, and inform him that Nash and Verne Miller, whom he also stated he had met at Hot Springs, could be located at that point through proper investigation. He claimed, however, that before he had an opportunity to take this action Frank Nash was taken into sustedy by the Government officers.

Galatas has not satisfactorily explained the telephone calls which form the basis for the conspiracy through which an attempt was made to liberate Nash at Kansas City, Missouri. It is believed that this information will be secured within a very short time.

In reports of this case it appears that Verne Miller placed a telephone call from a pay 'phone in the Union Station at Kansas City, Missouri, at 12:05 a.m., June 17, 1933. This call was to the residence of Herbert Farmer, who resides hear Joplin, Missouri, Statements made by both Mrs. Nash and Esther Farmer reveal that Galatas talked to Verne Miller, and that a general conversation was carried on between them regarding a change in the route which the officers were taking in bringing Nash to Kansas City. Their statements indicate that Galatas advised Miller that Nash, with his captors, would arrive in Kansas City from Fort Smith, Arkensas, by train at approximately 7:20 a.m. that morning. Their statements also indicate that Galatas inquired over the telephone whether his presence would be required in Kansas City and that he remarked, in substance - "Tell, as long as you don't need me I will return to Hot Springs in the morning."


Galatas was questioned with reference to this telephone call and stated that he could not afford to make any statement relative there to, as if he admitted such a conversation he would undoubtedly get the "hot seat." He was questioned along that line over a period of time and when the writer inquired - "Did you ask" Verne how he was going to deliver Nasht" - Galatas replied - "No I did not." He then remarked that he had been tricked into making an admission which might hang him, and said that should agent testify in a murder trial he had no doubt that his statement would be very hamful to him.

Galatas stated that he would gladly plead guilty to the Federal charge against him in the event the sentence was not more than two years, as he understood would be the case, but maintained that he would rather die than sign a statement or readily make an admission against those involved in the "massacre case."

He said that he felt that his life was in danger from mobsters who no doubt felt he had double crossed them with reference to the apprehension of Nash; that even though he were found not guilty by the dovernment in Kansas City he would not live long as the mob would probably be waiting for him to gut him on the spot.

From the statements of Galates as set forth above, it moreover to the writer that Galates was probably desirous of getting rid of Frank Mash, and that pursuant thereto he may have passed the word on to Informant A, whose identity is known to the Division. It should be noted that Informant A was without doubt aware of the fact that Frank Mash was frequenting Hot Springs at intervals, and that he could have worked with the Government for Mash's apprehension, had he desired, months before. It is interesting to note that within a very short time after Galates became desirous of ridding Hot Springs of Mash that the latter was "fingered" to Government agents by Informant A. The Division, of course, knows the relationship which existed between Galates and Informant A.

The information recorded above is being furnished in order that it may be of record at this time.




Special Agents L. A. Kindell, H. E. Andersen, and D. W. Mages secured the following signed statement from subject Richard Tallman Galatas the night of September 24, 1934, and early morning of September 25, 1934, which statement is dated September 25, 1934. The three mentioned agents signed as witnesses to this statement. The original and one sopy, which were signed by subject Richard Tallman Galatas and the witnesses, are being retained in the New Orleans Division Office file pending advice from the Division or the Kansas City Division Office. The original stanographic notes are being retained in the New Orleans Diffice file.

MEN CRIZARS, September 85,

"I am making this statement of my oun free will to D. W. Magee, L. A. Kindell, and H. E. Andersen, knowing them to be Special igents of the Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, after being advised that whatever I may can and may be used against me in court.

My name is Richard Tellman Galatas. I am forty-five years of age. For several years prior to June 15, 1935, I was a resident of Hot Springs, Arkensas.

garages - About two or three months prior to June 1935 I met Frank Hesh, whom I knew as Boo Miller, through Herbert Farmer, of Joplin, Missouri, the meeting taking place in Not Springs, Arkansas, I was located at the White Front Pool Hell in the capacity of making baseball books. In the latter part of May or early part of June two men came into the White Front and introduced themselves to me and propositioned me to handle some Blue Ribbon beer. They told me that it was beer that they had been handling in Chicago during Prohibition and it was an excellent grade of beer and would deliver in Hot Springs. Arkansas, for less than the genuine Blue Ribbon, so I said - 'Well, if it is not the genuine Blue Ribbon I don't want to buy it. I am not bootlegging and don't want to handle any beer of any kind. However, I have some here that I buy for the purpose of giving it to customers. That evening after dark I was stending in front of the Thite Front running a book when this fellow said - How about going over to get a drink? I want you to try this beer anyway and maybe you can connect me with scheene who can handle it. I said - I don't know of a soul who would be interested in that kind of a proposition. But anyway I got in the car with them and went down the street. I got in the back seat and one fellow got in the back seat with me, and there was one man in the front seat - the driver. We pulled up to the side entrance of the Restmen Hotel; [now the Kingsway]. I noticel This boy, the that the car parked double instead of parking along the curbing. driver, got out and ran around the car and opened the door for us to get out and when we got out I became suspicious and I walked on through the entrance to the Coffee Shop into the back, and there was no way for me to break away from the man because I was cornered. I thought one of them was armed. I didn't see any pistols but I saw a bulge in his pocket and thought it was a pistol. I walked through the corridor and got into the elevator in company with the two men. Then the elevator stopped on the main floor I got off right quick. I went (Continued)



"down through the lobby, hailed a car, and went to the White Front. Almost coincident with my arrival at the White Front the two men drove up in front of the White Front. They were driving a Cadillac Sedan with Illinois license. The biggest boy got out of the ear and came over and said - "What's the matter? Why didn't you come up to get some beer? This is good beer." So I said I new a friend of mine I had been looking for a few days, and I had to see him and I would have some up later. So he said - "We'll go back down and get some now," and I said - 'I can't go now but will go some other time;"

While I was talking to them Mash unlked up. He started talking to me and it was then that I told this boy, one of those who had taken me to the hotel, that I could not handle it anyway because 'I haven't any money to take care of it.' I showed him a Five Thousand Dollar mortgage. Mash was there at this time, having walked up. I explained to the boy that I could not handle any proposition owing to the fact that I did not have any money and there was no use for me to go any further into the proposition. I was afraid of a snatch and that Is why I showed them the mortgage to convince them that I was broke. I thought in this way that I would ward off any snatch. At the same time I did not want the men to suspect what I really thought.

I met Mash again in the White Front. He broached the subject that he was surprised to learn that I was broke, and I explained to him that that was the reason that I did not open the book. He said - Well - I'm going to Chicago and I will be back in a few days. I am going to get some money and will a couple of thousands take eare of the book? I said - I would not take the money from you unless you would accept it as an interest in the place or make a loan with the understanding that if I lose the money I will owe you Two Thousand Bollars, and if I win amything I will give you ten per cent on your money, and he said that was satisfactory. I think that was the last I saw of Mash until this other time, when he was arrested. I was suspicious than but it was so far fetched that it was unreasonable for me to be sure in my own mind. There was no way for me to figure the connection. I wondered at that time why Hash should offer me Two Thousand Bollars to open a book, and I became suspicious of him, and wondered if they might be somested with some snatch racket.

On June 16, 1935, at about 12 noon, I was in the back of the White Front: I came out front and the boys were talking about a kidnaping. That was the first thing I heard - that someone was kidnaped. I said who and somebody spoke up and said three men came in here and put guns on Boc Miller, put him in a car and drove off with him. We stayed there talking for a little while and nobody could decide what to do. I later reported the incident to Chief of Police Joe Wakelih, and Chief of Detectives Butch Akers. They called the surrounding towns and asked that the car be stopped. I went to the Oaklawn Tourist Court and got Mrs. Mash and took her to my house, after informing her of what had happened. She had something to eat in the dining room and I went into the back yard. I remember that about this time I went to the police station and overheard two telephone calls some in from Benton, Arkansas, the first advising that the police there had stopped the car containing Mash and found he was in custody of officers. The party called back a second time, almost right after, and said he was not sure that they were officers, although one of them had (Continued)

STATEMENT OF RICHARD TALIMAN GALATAS: (Continued)

"exhibited a gold badge. The car that took Hashery was a Buick Seden with California license.

At this time I was residing at 107 Harrell, Hot Springs, Arkanas, My telephone \$3842 was listed in the name of Hrs. George W. Bates. This name was adopted so as to get the same results as an unlisted telephone, not wanting to be called at all hours of the night.

I am informed by Mr. Kindell that on June 16, 1935, at 2:84 p. m. a long distance call, to be designated as No. 1, was placed from my telephone to the police department at Little Book, Arkansas. I called the Police Department to find out if they had heard anything of the car and they reported that the sar had been stopped at Little Rock, Arkansas, and that there were three officers taking a prisoner to Joplin, Missourie

Mrs. Mash was in the dining room and I told her this man was arrested and in the sustedy of officers, so I had been told by the Police Department, and what is the wan wanted for, and she said 'I don't know. I asked her what he could have been wanted for, and she said 'Probably on a bootleg charge.' I asked her 'At Joplin?' and she said - yes - at Joplin, Missouri for bootlegging. I asked her specifically at the time and she denied emphatically that he was wanted or that she knew of any place that he was wanted except on the bootlegging charge.

To the best of my knowledge I believe that I told the police officers at Little Rock that I was Chief of Detectives at Hot Springs. I am pretty sertain of this.

Mrs. Mash said - 'If they are taking him up to Joplin, how long will it take me to get up there?' I told her guite a while as there are tough roads. She could not drive her own car. I told her if she could not drive the car I could not take her but I would hire a chauffeur and she did not like that and asked me if there was an airplane service out of Hot Springs. I said - 'No, the airplane service is out of Little Bock but none in that direction,' but that there was an airplane field in Hot Springs and the man would take trips anywhere. So she mid - 'Well - let's go out there and see how much it will cost and what arrangements we can make.'

On the way out I stopped at the home of Lou Conner. I stopped at Mrs. Conner's on the way to the field as Mrs. Mash wanted to use the 'phone. Mrs. Conner was not at home but her front door was open and the maid was theree. I sent in and waited while Mrs. Mash placed the call. When she completed her call she told me that she had called Chicago and could not get the party she wanted, but had left a message. I don't remember who was asked for, nor what place she called. This call shall be designated as Mo. S.

Then we went to the field and made arrangements for the plane. ::

We went back to the farm and we did not get the information that Hash was not in town. We went back to the farm. nated as No. V, was placed from the 'phone of Herb Farmer to the residence of Vernon C. Miller in Kaneas City at 10:17 p. m., June 16, 1933. On this occasion I did not talk to Vernon Miller, as I believe that Herbert Farmer and I were then in Joplin proper. Some time after sall, designated as No. 8, which will be mentioned below, was reserved, Mrs. Heah told me that she had called Kansas City early in the evening but had been unable to locate the party, and that she left word for him to call her. I went to bed at about eleven o'cleak, as did the rest of them. Shortly after midnight Mrs. Hash was calling for somebody to some out to the telephone. She was crying and I took the receiver and conversed with a man I knew as 'Verne.' I told him who I was and that I had brought Mrs. Hash over there and he thanked me. I told him that Hash had been arrested at the White Front by three officers and taken away. I asked him if there was anything else I could do and he said 'No.' I told him I would go on back to Hot Springs early in the morning.

Mrs. Hash told me that she told Verne Miller that Hash and the officers were en route Kansas City, and were due to arrive that morning by train. Mrs. Farmer came out of her room and I went back to bed. I was up first in the morning. Those present in the house at the time this telephone call was received were Mrs. Frank Hash, Herbert Farmer, Mrs. Herbert Farmer, and myself. I left the next morning. Nothing worthwhile occurred in that interval. I was up first and waited for Mrs. Mash to get up, and I told her I was going to take the plane on back to Hot Springs, and asked if there was anything else I could do, and she said - 'Mo - not now.' I told Eather Farmer goodbye and Herb was cut getting the car. He drove me to the airport and I went back to Hot Springs.

I stayed at home most of the morning and I went downtown where I heard of the massacre at Kansas City. I then went over to get Lou and took her over to my house. I told her what had happened in Kansas City and that I had taken this party, Mrs. Mash, over there and let her use the 'phone and apologized for the 'heat'. I had brought the here.

I talked with Dutch Akers on my return. We talked about the Kansas City massacre and he knew that I went to Joplin. I told him that I was in Joplin.

The reason I showed such an active interest in this case was:

First. I wanted to avoid the newspaper notifiety that would come to me personally owing to the fact that this man, Nash, had been a steady customer in the White Front.

Second. That I was afraid the woman, Mrs. Mash, might believe that I might be the cause of Mash's arrest. (Continued)

STATEMENT OF RICHARD TALLMAN GALATAS: (Continued)

On either June 17, or 18, 1935, my mother and my wife's mother, who had been living at my home with my wife and myself, drove to Little Bock, Arkansas, where my mother and mother-in-law boarded a train for the home of my brother-in-law, Lee Cady, near Glann Falls, New York.

The purpose of their trip was that I expected to have notoriety in this case end I wanted my mother and my wife's mother to leave. I had not intended to leave at this time.

The next morning I decided to leave with my wife because I knew there was going to be a lot of excitement and notoriety, and because I feared arrest. I went to St. Louis, had my wife store my Cadillac sar.

I adopted the name of William Lee at Sacramento, Celifornia, and have used every means known by me to sonceel my identity and prevent apprehension by the Covernment. I have corresponded with no one and neither has my wife. I have communicated with no friends or relatives, for the purpose of avoiding apprehension.

With reference to the actual participants in the murders at the Union Station at Remsas City, Missouri, on June 17, 1935, I want to state that I surmise that Verne Miller not only laid the plans leading up to the murders at the Union Station, but that he was an actual participant.

I have read the foregoing statement consisting of six pages, and as same is the truth I have signed each page of this statement.

Subject Richard Tallman Galates and his wife voluntarily suggested that they would be willing to proceed to Kansas City, Missouri, and Special Agents H. B. Andersen, D. W. Mages, and L. A. Kindell secured from subject Richard Tallman Galates a waiver agreeing to voluntarily accompany officers of the Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, to the Western Mistrict of Missouri.

The same agents secured a univer from Mrs. Richard Tellman Geletan agreeing to voluntarily assempeny officers of the Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, to the Vestern District of Missouri, to answer there any proceedings begun in, or processes issuing from, or that may be filed against her in the District Court of the United States of the Western District of Missouri.

These waivers were signed on September 24, 1934.

Special Agent in Charge Bright Brantley, and Special Agent H. E. Anderson, conducted interrogation of subject Richard Tallman Calatas throughout the might of September 25, 1954, at the New Orleans Division Office, and a signed statement was secured from subject Richard Tallman Calatas dated September 26, 1954, relative this investigation, as follows:

September 26, 1934.

"This is a supplementary statement to the one given by me on September 25, 1934, to Messrs. L. A. Kindell, D. W. Magoe, and H. E. Andersen, of the Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, and is made after having been advised that whatever I say can and may be used against me. The statement is made to H. R. Andersen and Dwight Brantley, of the Division of Investigation:

I have been questioned relative to a long distance telephone call made from the home of Mrs. E. B. Conner, Hot Springs, Arkansas, to the telephone of Herbert Allen Farmer, Joplin, Missouri, during the afternoon of June 16, 1933. I recall that in my previous statement I said that this telephone call was made by Mrs. Frances Mash. This is incorrect, as I was confused at the time. I recall that I instructed my wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Galatas, to make a long distance telephone call to the home of Herbert Allen Farmer, Joplin, Missouri, and inform Farmer or his wife to the affect that I was coming over to their home with Mrs. Frances Mash and her child by airplane that afternoon, June 16, 1934. This call was referred to in my previous statement as long distance call Mo. 3.

In my previous statement, in sonnection with the telephone call designated Ho. 5, I now recell that I talked to first the maid and then to my wife, Mrs. Galatas. During this telephone conversation I informed Mrs. Galatas that I would not be home until the next fay.

After having made the call to my wife from the Midway Drug Company in Joplin, I returned to the Farmer residence. Upon my return I was informed by Mrs. Frances Hash that Mrs. Galatas had called long distance to the Farmer residence and informed that the men who had Hash in custody were taking him to Kaneas City rather than bringing him to Joplin, Missouri, and it was mentioned that these men were going by train from Fort Smith to Kaneas City. "arose as to what time they would arrive in Kansas City, and I said that I thought the train would arrive in Kansas City about breakfast time. This call is referred to as tall No. 5 in my previous statement.

Some time after the massacre in Yansas City I saw a photograph in the newspapers of a man by the name of Terne Miller, mentioned as having participated in the massacre. I identified the photograph of this man es an individual I had met in Hot Springs, Arkansas, on two occasions when I was operating a garage in Hot Springs and was a sub-agent for the Madison Smith Cadillas Company of Little Book, Arkaneas. My best recollection is that this was about three years ago. I was introduced to this man by Eddie Conner, deceased husband of Louise Conner. I had known Eddie for several years. He was a gambler and it was my understanding that this man identified as Verne Miller had been playing golf with him. Eddie brought him to me as a prospect ve purchaser of a Gadillas. I talked to him about a Gadillas but he did not purchase one from me. I later learned that he purchased a Cadillas war from the Madisqui Smith Cadillas Company at Little Book, Arkaneas, through Wealey Smith of that eoncem. 🔆

In the Farmer home on the evening of June 16th there was a conversation between the Farmers, Frances and myself relative to a long distance telephone call that was placed for some party in Kansas City. During this conversation Mrs. Mash mentioned some person by the name of "Verne," at which time she mentioned the warm friendship existing between this person and her husband. I recall that she said that this party in Kansas City had plenty of money and she believed that he was the type of friend the would do almost mything for her husband, but no specific mention of what he would or could do for Mash. This call is identified as call Mo. I in my previous Statement.

I did not at the time know the true identity of Frank Hash, and, of course, did not know that he was an escaped Federal prisoner.

I again wish to say that I do not know the identity of the suspects in the massacre at Kansas City.

From what I have learned of the occurrence in Kansas City since June 17th, I believe that Verne Miller was a participant. I have not, since June 17th, seen Herbert Farmer, his wife, Mrs. Frances Mash, or Verne Miller. I did see Mrs. Lou Conner upon my return to Not Springs, Arkansas, on June 17, 1934.

Andersen, in the presence of Special Agent in Charge Dwight Brentley, of the Oklahoma City Office at the New Orleans Division Office, an September 27, 1936, took the fingerpriate of subject Richard Tallman Galatas. One copy was forwarded under personal and confidential cover to the Director, and one copy will be retained in the New Orleans Division Office file.

Instant as there was no process outstanding against Mrs. Richard Tallman Galates, her prints were not taken by the New Orleans Division Office.

On September 26, 1934, Special Agents L. A. Kindell and L. E. Kingman secured the following signed statement from Mrs. Elizabeth Galatas, wife of subject Bichard Tallman Galatas: The original and one signed copy, properly witnessed by Agents Kindell and Kingman, are being retained in the New Orleans Division Office file pending Edvice from the Division or the Kansas City Division Office:

"New Orleans, La. September 26, 1934.

My name is Mrs. Elizabeth Galatas. This statement is being made to Leslie A. Kindell and L. E. Kingman, Special Agents of the Division of Investigation, United States Department of Justice.

I am making this statement voluntarily. No threats, or promises have been made to me to influence me in what I am saying in this statement,

I am 45 years of age and the wife of Richard Tallman Galatas. married 17 years ago in Riverside, California. We have no children. At the time of our marriage I was a widow, having been divorced for about three years from B. Sturney. I have one son, Pat Sturney, who was an issue of that marriage. Mr. Galatas end I moved to Hot Springs, Arkensas, from Detroit, Michigan, in 1925 or 1925. He operated in Hot Springs as a book maker for horse races and baseball games with his headquarters at the White Front and at another place on Central Avenue over Ben Harris' eigar store. He also operated for several months a garage known as the Olive Street Garage. During our stay in Hot Springs I became acquainted with Low Conner and her husband, Eddie Comer. Eddie operated a road house. He died in July 1932. In the spring of 1933 I become acquainted with two individuals whom I now know were Mr. and Mrs. Frank Wash. I never knew them previous to the Kansas City massacre under any names except 'Doc' and Frances, They had a little girl but I did not know that until just. a day or two previous to the massacre. I did not know that "Doc" was doing nor where they lived but he hung around the White Front where Dick made his heads. quarters and I met Frances there several times and, on some oscasions, she and I and Lou Conner met there. These meetings were casual and not by pre-armagement.

On June 16, 1935, in the early afternoon, I had been down town in Hot Springs and upon returning home, or shortly thereafter, my husband, Richard Galatas, and Frances, with her little girl, came to my home. They told me that 'Doc' had been kidnapped. Previous to this time and during the two or three 16 and 16

years previous, I had met and known Herb Farmer and his wife, of Joplin, Missouri. I had seen the Farmers on numerous occasions in company with Doc and Frances. Frances was very much upset on this occasion that I refer to, on June 16th, and I understood from her and my husband that it was her intention to go immediately to the farmers' home at Joplin. I prepared lunch for her and the child. I had been in and out of my home several times. Between two and three stalock, as ager as I can recall, on June 16th, I was in my Pedillac Sedan and it stalled fust, at the end of Bathhouse Row. Several friends pushed me off a street car track, and about this time "Dutch" Akers and Joe Wakelin, Police Department officials; came by and drove me in their car to my home. Frances Resh and my husband may have been at home at this time. I am not sure of this. I believe that Akers told me that he would go back and see if he could get my Cadillac started and . bring it to the house. The Calillac appeared at our home within a few minutes and while I feel that Dutch Akers may have driven it. I am not sure. My husband told me that he had been down to the Police Station but he did not say who he had seen there. I don't know if Dutch Akers and Wakelin and my husband had any conversation at the house when the car was brought back or not, or at any other time. and I don't know about my long distance calls that might have been placed to re-Benton or Little Book. I did not know that Frances Hash expected to go to Joplin by airplene until just before my husband and I, with Mrs. Wash and her child, left my house to go to the sirport. At the time we left the house my husband did not intend to go with her but after we got to the airport he walked with her over to the plane and I remained in the car, which was my Cadillac. My husband came back to the car and said that Mrs. Nash was so nervous and hysterical and the child was hysterical and she was afraid because she had never been up in a plane before, and therefore he had decided to go with her. They told me that when I returned to my house to telephone to the Farmers at Johlin and tell Mr. Farmer. to meet them at the dirport. On my way home I stopped at Lou Conner's house on Central Avenue and placed a long distance call from her telephone to the Farmers. I don't recall if I talked with Mr. Fermer or Mrs. Farmer but I told them to meet the airplane at the airport as Richard and Frances and Frances baby were then on the way to Joplin. I might have told them that "Doc" had been in some trauble.

There were no other developments that I knew about until about 9:50 that night when my husband telephoned to me from Joplin. He told me that they had arrived all right but that he would not be able to return that night because there had been a great deal of delay se they had landed at the wrong air mort. I don't know anything about any telephone call placed from Lou Conner's house in Not Springs at 10:09 p.m. to the telephone of Herbert Farmer at Joplin.

Up to this time I did not know that "Doc", or Frank Bash, was arrested or that he had been wanted for anything. However, I did hear my husband say to Mrs. Hash: "Well, Frances if he was wanted, what was he wanted for", and she said that she did not know.

I stayed at my own home that night. I did not see Iou Conner the night of June 16th and I stayed at my home and did not see her until the next morning, which was a short time before my husband returned to Hot Springs. He returned to Hot Springs in the same airplane and errived about 10:30 a.m.

In the mean time, I had heard either over the radio or down town about the shooting and killing of the officers at Kansas City and I began to get mighty frightened as I associated this killing with the picking up of "Doc", or Frank Nash, at Hot Springs. My husband had not heard about the killing at Kansas City until he got home to our house and I told him. Then I told him he kept saying, "oh, no". He was terribly upset and so was Is We were convinced that the killing at Kansas City and the Frank Nash involved was the party who had been picked up at Hot Springs. Radio accounts were mantioning the fact that Frank Nash had been arrested the previous day in Hot Springs by federal agents.

My mother was visiting me from New York and she left that day for New York. Mr. Galatas' mother was also visiting us from Long Beach, California, and she also left that day for her home. Early the next morning my husband and I left Hot Springs in the Cadillac. We drove to St. Louis and I stored the Cadillac at a garage and I don't recall where it was that I left it but I told them that I wanted to leave it there for a short time. We went by train from St. Louis to Sacramento, California, changing trains at Los Angeles, but did not stop over.

We purchased a Plymouth Coupe at Sacraments and there began to use the mame of Mr. and Mrs. William Lee. We later changed this name to E. W. Lee. The Plymouth was registered in Sacraments. Since that time we have epent some time in Santa Monica, California, and from there made a trip to New Orleans and then back to California and came back to New Orleans about the middle of last April, and for the past few weeks have been living at 912 Harding Place.

Since our departure from Hot Springs we have communicated with he former friends, relatives or associates. We did not even go to see my husband's mother in California and I have not corresponded with my son, who has been living in Montgomery, Alabama, and who was attending school at Tuscaloosa, Alabama,

I was aware from reading newspapers that federal warrants had been issued for my husband and that the federal government was looking for him.

The above statement, consisting of three pages, was dictated by Agents Kindell and Kingman from information furnished by me. I have read the statement and it is true in its entirety.

L. A. Kindell, Special Agent, Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice. Special Agents in Charge Dwight Brantley and R. G. Harvey, and Special Agent D. W. Mages contacted informant No. 1 and the malesman of the liquid Colephane Company, for the purpose of forestalling any publicity on the instant case, on September 27, 1934, as informant No. 1 had gone on a protracted drunk. This matter was straightened out estisfactorily and it is not believed that any publicity will arise at New Orleans, Louisians, on the instant case before official notification to the newspapers.

It was considered advisable by Special Agents in Charge R. G. Harvey and Dwight Brantley, as well as by Special Agents R. E. Anderson, L. A. Kindell, and D. W. Mages, that subject Galates and his wife be removed from New Orleans, Louisians.

Telephonic instructions were received from the Division by Special Agents in Charge R. G. Harvey and Dwight Brantley to remove subject Richard Tallmer Gelates and his wife from New Orleans, Louisians.

At 2:28 p. m. on September 27, 1934, subject Richard Tellman Galatas and his wife, accompanied by Special Agent in Charge Dwight Brantley and Special Agent: Winstead and Ryan, left New Orleans, Louisians, by chartered plane on route the Western District of Missouri.

Special agent in Charge Dwight Brentley had possession of the original signed waivers of subject Richard Tallman Galates and his wife, as well as copies of all memorandoms and statements relative the instant case and referred to in this report.

Investigation is being continued at New Orleans, Louisians, at the aforementioned residences of subject Galatas, and relative subject Galatas's office telephone calls of the Liquid Colophane Company. Particularly the long distance calls are being checked for possible leads on the instant case. Supplementary report will be submitted relative this investigation and Special Agent W. A. Temple has submitted a memorandum of investigation on the local telephone calls.

Subject Richard Tallman Galatas stated to Special Agent in Charge Dwight Brantley and Special Agent R. E. Anderson that he would enter a plea of guilty to an indictment charging him with conspiracy, Title 18, Section 753, Paragraphs h and At times, however, he stated that he would only enter a plea of guilty if the indicates the contained one sount only.

Subject Richard Tellman Galates stated to Special Agent R. E. Anderson that he had given enough information now on himself to give himself the "rope or the seat," referring to a possible marder indictment in the State of Missouri.

Subject Galatas, when questioned by Special Agents L. E. Kingman and H. E. Andersen, stated that he had read the law relative an accessory before the fact of murder and that he was worried about his participation in the Kanses City massacre.

Subject was given a vigorous and rigorous interrogation while in New Orleans, Louisians, by Special Agentain Charge Dwight Brantley, and Special Agents H. E. Andersen and D. W. Mages on separate occasions in an effort to secure a statement from him concerning his knowledge of the participants in the Kansas City, Missouri massacre. Subject Galatas deales knowing the identity of the participants, with the exception of subject Vermon C. Miller, with alianes, deceased. He stated that it should appear likely to myone that subject Terms Miller would not relate to him, Salatas, that he intended to do or who would join him, Miller, in the massacre. Subject Salatas, when given vigorous interrogation would completely surrender and would state that he would sign any statement or any set of facts produced, but would volunteer no information on which to base this statement.

Subject Galatas, when apprehended, appeared to be in a state of physical and mental exhaustion, and all facts and statements secured from him were obtained under laborious conditions because of his mental condition. He apparently has worried considerably since his flight from Hot Springs, Arkansas, which has brought about the state of mental exhaustion.

Ers. Elizabeth Galatas, alias Ers. Eichard Tallman Galatas, alias Ers. Edwin V. Lee, alias Ers. E. V. Lee, alias Ers. Villiam Lee, alias Ers. V. C. Lee, alias Ers. V. E. Cox, and other aliases, will not be carried as a subject in the instant case in this report, same being left to the discretion of the office of origin, should process be instituted against her.

All leads in this case are left to the discretion of the Division and the Kaneas City Division Office, which is the office of origin, with the exception of the facts to be developed at New Orleans, Louisians,

Agent Magee, in conversation with subject's wife during one of the seese sions of interrogation of her in subject Galatas's presence, aroused the ire of subject Galatas, and subject Galatas made the remark to Agent Magee - "I will take care of you." Agent Magee was talking to Mrs. Galatas at the time and to make sure of this remark asked subject Galatas to repeat the remark. He declined to do so and later denied to S.A.C. Brantley and Agents Anderson and Magee that he had made such a remark. However, Agent Magee definitely heard subject Galatas make the aforementioned threate

Agents Kindell and Mages, on first investigation at Apartment F, 912 Harding Place, New Orleans, Louisiana, residence of subject Galatas and his wife, found most all of their personal effects packed in their baggage ready for instant flight. Informant No. 1 stated previously that subject Galatas usually parried his bags around with him in the back of his ear. Ho guns were found in personal possession of subject Galatas or in his personal effects.

Confidential informants Nos. 8 and 5 have a part in investigation of the instant case. Their names and parts played by them will be furnished the Division by personal and confidential letter.

Agents Kindell, Andersen, and Magoe, when taking statement of subject Galatas dated September 25, 1934, and quoted beginning page ten of this report, questioned him concerning the idensity of the men show he intimated were attempting to either take him for a ride or extert money from him, and he denied knowledge of their identity. He stated, however, that one of these men had two or three fingers off of one hand. He refused, however, to permit this to be placed in the signed statement.

The numbers of the telephone salls in the statements of subject Galatas identified as the same numbers of the telephone salls as listed in the summary report of Special Agent W. F. Trainer, the date of which is not known to the New Orleans Division Office, but copy of which was in possession of Special Agent H. E. Andersen at New Orleans, Louisians.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

MRS. OBORGE SEIRERT elias IREME DORSEY, according to the records of Mayo Bros. at Rochester, Minn., has been a patient of that clinic on five different occasions since 1926. Interview with various doctors of this clinic reveal that she seemed to have been accompanied by her husband in May, 1932, and some of them recalled seeing her gith a person whose description fits that of LEMPREVANS. Photographs of well known criminals were exhibited to proprietors of hotels at which MRS. GEORGE SEIHERT had lived during her stay in Bochester, none of whom could be identified as being connected with MRS. SEIHERT. However, C. O. HITCHINSON of the Cook Hotel identified the photograph of ARTHUR R. BARKER as a person who had registered at his hotel sometime since July, 1934.

MR. G. H. JOHNSON, Business Manager of this institution, was reluctant to disclose any information contained in this file except that which pertained to her physical condition; and eventually explained that he deemed it necessary to turn the entire file over to one of the doctors who had attended her, due to the fact that this file contains a number of letters and notations which might convey the wrong impression to the reader unless someone familiar with this case was available to explain; therefore, the file was turned over to a DR. C. L. KIRKLAND of this institution who explained that he had been assigned to MRS. GEORGE SKIEERT'S case and that she was merely at the clinic under observation at such time in the spring of 1934 and was not confined to the hospital at all while she was there from the specific dates of March 27, 1934, to April 11, 1934.

. . DR. KIRKLAND stated further that he felt that he had been essigned to this case because he was a new and young doctor at this clinic, with a good deal of time, and that very probably the older doctors had "sized har up" on her previous visits to the slinic and did not ears to handle the case; that she was very nervous at the time he made his first call upon MRS. SEIHERT, at which time she made the remark that he was just a kid but supposed that he would do all right and then proceeded to tell him that she was the wife of GEORGE GOETZ, the "Big shot from Chicago"; that he was a headliner in that town and any time she wanted to know where he was, or what he was doing, all she had to do was to pick up the newspapers and find out for he was always where things were the hotest; and she made the remark that how did she know but what he was not mixed up in the Bremer kidnaping case. DR. KIRKLAND stated further that she then seemed to realize what she was saying and attempted to smooth the statement over by remarking that she was not telling him that her husband was mixed up in the Bremer kidnaping case but that he might have been and she did not want anyone guoting her & as saying that he was because she did not care to be "bumped off" by some of the gang who was actually "hooked up" with them,

was mentally impaired and for that reason he had not paid as much attention to her statement as he possibly should have nor did any of the other doctors with whom she managed to make friends pay a great deal of attention to the remarks that she had made while under observation; that MRS. SEIBERT was rather attractive and fast in her manner while a patient at this clinic, which resulted in her becoming quite intimate with several of the doctors of this clinic, especially

something of value concerning her past life for he and MRS. HEIBERT were quite intimate and no doubt carried on a correspondence

DR. KIRKLAND advised further that it was commonly known around the clinic that Dr. Arnold Kagel, who formerly studied medicine at the Mayo Clinic and then became health officer in Chicago, quite frequently had dates with MRS. SEIBERT while she was a patient at this hospital on various dates after 1926; further that at the time MRS. SEIBERT'S husband was killed by gangsters in Chicago; DR. KAGEL was responsible for her returning to Mayo's in the spring of 1934 and that possibly this doctor possesses a good deal of information relative to the underworld characters of Chicago. He very probably knew many of MRS. SEIBERT'S connections in that city.

DR. KIRKLAND stated further that the records in his possession pertaining to MRS. SEIBERT'S case indicate that DR. C. P. DIEON of this clinic had performed an operation on MRS. SEIBERT in May, 1952, and that whe had been confined to St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester for twelve days and that during that time two special nurses were assigned to the case, a MISS PEARL LOCKREM as day nurse and MISS ELEMNOR A. FISHER as night nurse; further, that if there had been any telephone calls to or from MRS. SEIBERT while in Rochester at any time while being treated by the clinic, there is a possibility that there would be on record such phone calls at the St. Mary's Hospital; and during the month of May, 1952, is the only time that she was confined to the hospital at all and that on other visits she had probably stayed at some of the local hotels in this city isasmuch as the records indicate that she at one time had been registered at the Brown Hotel sometime in 1926 and that no record was made as to her local address upon her various other visits to this clinic after 1926.

Continuing, DR. KIRKLAND mentioned that he had never seen any of MRS. SKIHERT'S friends while she was a patient at the clinic except one man whom she introduced to him on one of the downtown streets and vaguely recalls that such person had been called LKE. DR. KIRKLAND described this man as being approximately 30 to 35 years of age, 6 feet tall, slender, and had a small mustache and that his hair, as well as he remembers, was sandy. The writer then exhibited to DR. KIRKLAND the photograph of VERNON MILLER, VIVIAN MATTHEWS, FRED BARKER, ARTHUR BARKER, ALVIN KARPIS, FITZMERALD, GALATAS, "PRETTY BOY" FLOYD, HARRY CAMPBELL, VOINEY DAVIS, and BERNARD PHILLIPS, but he was unable to identify any of these people as anyone he had ever seen around the clinic and states that very probably a number of them had been there, no doubt, and that very often he had noticed patients who were continually watched by a man at their door for days at a time and

It was very often a case which would not require that much attention at any time; further, that "BUGS" MORAN and his body guard had been there at one time and none of the dectors knew his identity until after someone from the clinic had accidentally met him at a lodge near Rochester and the proprietor of this place told this person who MORAN was.

The file pertaining to the history of MRS. SEIBERT contains several postcards to DR. KIRKLAND, DAN MARKHAM, DR. GUARDY, and DR. WALTMAN, all of which postcards bear the postmark of San Francisco, California. The jacket to this file bears the notation to the effect that patient requests that no receipts or statements be forwarded to her.

to the world was the first of the first of the second In an effort to locate J. ADAMS who formerly lived at the Cook Hotel, agent interviewed the proprietor, C. D. HUTCHINSON, who stated that MR. J. ADANS and his wife had recently moved to an apartment, exact location of which he did not know and that MR. ADAMS is now operating a restaurant on Second Avenue S. E., in this city; that his father is JOHN ADAMS, owner of the Town Taxi, who at one time was connected with the Hertz Drive-It-Yourself in Chicago. During the course of the conversation the writer asked MR. HUTCHINSON whether he recalls a MRS. GEORGE SEIBERT having stayed at his hotel during the spring of 1934 and he replied that he did and that she had occupied Room 19 in this hotel, which is the adjoining room to that which J. ADAMS and his wife had occupied. MR. HUTCHINSON stated further that MRS. SEIRERT had become acquainted with MRS. ADAMS while living at this hotel and they were very often visiting one another in their rooms, but outside of that he knows nothing about their relationship and further that he had never seen MRS. SKIBERT with anyone except one man who bore the identical description as that of LER BEVANS.

MR. HUTCHINSON referred to his records which reflected that she had registered under the name of MRS. K. SUBERT on 3-29-34 and checked out on 4-11-34 at which time she proceeded to Chicago, Illinois, by plane; and returned to this hotel on 4-14-34 and registered under the name of MRS.

GEORGE SEIBERT and remained until 4-22-34, at which time she shecked out from this hotel.

The same photographs which were exhibited to DR. KIRKLAND! were exhibited to MR. HUTCHINSON, who immediately picked out the picture of ARTHUR R. BARKER as being the picture of someone who he is positive had stayed at the Cook Hotel sometime since July, 1934. MR. HUTCHINSON thoroughly reviewed his records from the first of July, 1934, to the present in an effort to connect some of the names appearing therein with the person of ARTHUR R. BARKER, but he was unable to do so with any accuracy

and stated that he is willing to turn over all his daily registration sheets to the Division at any time in the event same are desired for the purpose of checking against the handwriting of ARTHUR R. BARKER.

MR. DAN MARKHAM, Business Executive, Mayo Bros. Clinic in Bochester, Minnesota, stated that he recalls MRS. SKIBERT and that she had been in this clinic on a number of occasions for the past eight or nine years and that he had never seen her with anyone except one man in 1934 and that this person's identity had been shecked by him and was found to be a patient at the clinic and had no somection with her prior to the few days before she left Rochester.

MR. MARKHAM stated further that he recalls that upon one occasion in a conversation with MRS. SKIEKRT, she had mentioned to him that someone in Chicago was attempting to take her property away from her, the exact nature of which she did not explain, and that she left the clinic to attend to this matter and in a few days she returned and mentioned that she had seen some politician in Chicago and had the transaction straightened out; further, that she had mentioned to him (MR. MARKHAM) that immediately after her husband's death, she had visited his mother and sister, both of whom informed her that they desired to sever all connections with her; likewise; that she had visited some of the members of the gang her husband had belonged to and they too told her they did not intend to have anything to do with her since her husband had been killed; nor would any of the attorneys who were connected with her husband's gang represent her in the matter referred to above concerning the property being taken away from her. MR. MARKHAM stated further that MRS. SEIBERT had made the statement at this time that she was not afraid of any of the members of her husband's gang but was in constant fear that the Federal men would pick her up.

MR. MARKHAM produced a cross reference file to this case and it indicated that a MISS KISIK HELLER at 859 Fourteenth B. S., Mismi, Florida, had given the name of MRS. SKIBERT on July 10, 1933, as a reference. He too mentioned the fact that this cross reference card reflects that Dr. DeCarle is at the present time communicating with the clinic in regard to the various findings in this case and that there is a possibility that Dr. DeCarle is now attending MRS. SKIHERT, wherever she may be lecated in California.

MR. LLOYD KOENIG, Manager of the Brown Hotel in this city, referred to his records in his office which indicated that MRS. GEORGE SEIBERT had registered July 10, 1933, with a MRS. ELSIE HELLER in room 101 and that they checked out on July 20, 1933; MR. KOENIG stated that he recalls MRS. SKIBERT'S posing as a nurse for MRS. HELLER while she was being

treated at the Mayo Bros. Clinic; further, that in the spring of 1934, MRS. SEIRERT had visited the hotel and had mentioned to him at that time that MRS. HELLER had died at her home in Florida since the visit to the elinic in 1933, as is noted above; further, that a DR. HEATRICE R. GREEN had attended MRS. SEIRERT sometime during the spring of 1934.

DR. HEATRICE R. GREEN was interviewed at the Brown Hotel and stated that she is an esteopathic physician and that she had attended MRS. SKIBKRT in the spring of 1934, during which time MRS. SKIBKRT had introduced to her a young man by the name of LKE BEVANS and that after such introduction, MRS. SKIBKRT had stated that she and BEVANS had adjoining rooms at the Cook Hotel and that they frequently visited with MR. and MRS. J. ADAMS, and that they invited her to call on them at the Cook Hotel. DR. GREEN stated further that she has never seen her with anyone except HEVANS while MRS. SKIBERT was under her care, and suggested that a MR. IRWIN MEBERR, the former manager of the Brown Hotel, would possibly furnish information relative to people with whom MRS. SKIBERT associated while in Rochester because of the fact that MRS. SKIBERT had always stayed at the Brown Hotel while in Rochester prior to the spring of 1934, at which time she stayed at the Cook Hotel.

MR. IRWIN WEBBER, manager of the Compbell Hotel, stated that he knew MRS. SEIBERT prior to her marriage because of the fact that a person by the name of GEORGE INGLE, from Wilmington, Illinois, very frequently visited the Mayo Bros. Clinic and had always stayed at the Brown Hotel and that upon one occasion, he had recommended this hotel to MRS. SEIRERT'S family and that upon this recommendation, MRS. DORSEY, her two sons, and IREVE, had driven up to Rochester from Wilmington. Illinois, sometime in 1927 and registered at the Brown Hotel; and through this connection, he became acqueinted with MRS. SMIBERT; further, that in 1932, he had met her husband, who was introduced to him as MR. GEORGE SKIHERT and that they had stayed several days at the Brown Hotel and during this time, MR. SEIBERT had never mentioned to him as to what his business connection was nor was he very friendly and for that reason, he had not become well enough acquainted with MR. SKIBERT to be able to know very much about his character or activities of any kind; further, that in the spring of 1934, MRS. SEIHERT again visited Rochester and had called ... on him at the Compbell Hotel and asked him to visit her in her room at the Cook Hotel; further, that he had visited her, at which place he met a life. young man who was introduced to him as LKE and that during the course of the conversation she had never mentioned anything to him as to why she

was here or the events that had taken place in her life since he had last seen her in 1932 and talked only about her intention of going into the hotel business in Wilmington, Illinois, and asked his edvice earning the management of the same; further, that this was the only time he had seen or talked to MRS, SEIBERT in 1934 and, in fact, he had not seen her since,

The various pictures as previously mentioned in this report were likewise exhibited to MR. WERBER, who was unable to identify any of them as anyone he had ever seen in connection with MRS. SEIERRT.

MISS PEARL LOCKRAM edvised that she was, during May, 1934, the day nurse for MRS. SEIBERT, and that in this connection, she had become acquainted with a man who was introduced to her as MR. SEIBERT, the hisband of the patient; further, that he was purported to be a swimming instructor and that he had stayed at the hospital visiting his wife, MRS. SEIBERT, approximately a week. MISS LOCKRAM described this person as being approximately SD years old, blonds hair combed straight back, blue eyes, about five feet ten inches tall, had wide shoulders, and was very well built, and weighed about 170 pounds and that he made a very nice appearance; likewise, that some lady from the Twin Cities had come to visit MRS. SEIBERT while confined in St. Mary's Hospital but could not recall this person's name, nor could she describe her at all.

MISS LOCKRAM stated further that in the spring of 1934, MRS.

SKIBERT had visited her in her home for a very few minutes and at which
time she did not mention anything concerning her own interests but merely
confined their conversation in renewing their past acquaintance; further,
that the night nurse, MISS KLEANOR A. FISHER, has recently undergone an
operation at St. Mary's Hospital and is now with her people in their home
at Winona, Minnesota.

Likewise, an attempt was made to obtain the address of PRICHLA LEWIS, Box 166, Rochester, Minnesota, but in view of the fact that the custodian of the proper records pertaining to the address and ownership of this particular box was absent, the address could not be determined.



Crets was arrested by the St. Louis Police Department on June 15, 1934 as being implicated with Herman Tipton, Carl Fiorito and James Michael, in the holdup and robbery of Mike and Fannie Accardi at St. Louis, Missouri on February 24, 1934. At that time they obtained \$150 and threatened to kidnep Mr. Accardi if he did not have \$350 for them when they returned at some later time. Crets was positively identified by Mr. and Mrs. Accardi as one of the five men who came to their home and held them up. One, Norman Govier and James Vincent Griffin were shot and killed on February 26, 1934, when they were about to enter the residence of Mike Accardi to collect the amount of money demanded.

During telephonic conversation today, I confidentially informed Mr. Cowley at Chicago that Galatas was taken into custody at New Orleans yesterday; that this information is being kept quiet for the time being; and that Galatas is being held incommunicado while being questioned. Upon Mr. Cowley's inquiry, I stated that Agent H. E. Andersen had been erdered to New Orleans from Kansas City to conduct the interrogation. I school Mr. Cowley if he could suggest anybody else who should be present. Be stated he thought Mr. Andersen could handle the matter if he can keep the matter quiet, and if not, to assign somebody else.

I remarked that according to information we have, it appears that Calatas is "yellow," and that if it felt it would be to his interest to give us information he would do so. Mr. Cowley again stated that he felt Mr. Andersen could handle this matter better than anybody in the Chicago Office; that Agent Buran has been handling the matter at Chicago, and he, Mr. Cowley, believes that Agent Andersen is better qualified than Agent Suran. I inquired as to Agent Andersen's ability to obtain information from such a prisoner. Mr. Cowley said that he personally does not know Mr. Andersen, but that both Mr. Quinn and Mr. Conroy feel that he has hardly any superior qualifications along this line.

Mr. Cowley stated he feels that in such a case the first thing we should do is to convince the prisoner that he will not be able to get out on a writ.

I telephoned agent in Charge Brantley at Oklahoma City this afternoon and inquired if his health would permit him to proceed immediately to New Orleans. He assured me that he would be ready to leave at any time I designated.

I instructed him to proceed to New Orleans at once by plane; that Galatas is in custody; that Agent in Charge Whitley is in Washington; that the Agents in Charge at Birmingham and Mashville likewise are not at their offices; that Agent Andersen is now in New Orleans, but I feel that he has not been able to obtain sufficient information from Galates. I stated that in my estimation this is the solution of the Kansas City massacre case and it is therefore important that careful attention be given to the questioning of Galates. I informed him that it has not become known that this man is in our custody. I also stated that I had ordered Mr. Harvey to leave New York this evening by plane for New Orleans, but he will be able to take care of only the outside contacts, such as when the story breaks in the newspapers. I told Mr. Brantley that I wanted him to handle the questioning of the prisoner because I want some one whom I can trust and who is familiar with the case. I stated that I feel this is the most important case we have, next to the Lindbergh case, and I would like to wait possibly a week or ten days to break it, if we can get the other participants. I stated that I believe Galatas is "yellow", ounning, and thoroughly unscrupulous, and since he was taken into custody quietly I want to take advantage of this opportunity to obtain everything possible from him. I told ar. Brantley to direct this matter at New Orleans, so that as few people as possible, even in our service, will know about it.

Mr. Brantley inquired if I desire Calatas removed from New Orleans. stated that I did not want this done unless his friends should learn that we have him in custody. I also stated that you had directed the New Orleans Natioffice to have Calatas sign a waiver of removal for use in the event it becomes Tolafecassary to remove him hurriedly.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

I called Mr. Brantley with reference to the telegrem (on Galatas about the two additional agents and asked why he needed these agents. He advised that two or three of the local agents have some court assignments and they will need some teams as he is going to keep the individuals there separate and apart. I stated he has three agents from Brimingham, also Anderson and himself, which is five; that Harvey will make six. Mr. Brantley stated they have to keep them together now in the same room and it would probably be a good idea to split them up. I stated that he has Rosen and Perronnin. Mr. Brantley stated that Perronnin is on sick leave. I stated that Blake is there and Mr. Brantley stated that he has a court assignment and the United States Attorney is worrying him about a grand jury assignment. I told Mr. Brantley that I would see what I could do but I was not very optimistic.

Mr. Brantley advised that today at noon one of the informants got in touch with Dave Magee; that the informant was drunk and was rather obstreperous and wanted to know when he was going to get his reward and also wented to borrow money. Mr. Brantley stated that the likelihood is that this fellow will get drunk again and continue to be drunk and might spill something. I told Mr. Brantley to get him up against the wall and telk to him. Mr. Brantley stated that Magee did this; that he told him the best thing he could do would be to shut up or he would be in jail; that if we could do anything for him, we would do it in due time; that he talked pretty straight to him. Mr. Brantley stated that he can not control all of his movements. I told Mr. Brantley that if it was necessary he should put the fear of God into this fellow.

Mr. Brantley stated that Galatas has not told them anything so far; that they did not already know; that he denies knowing of anyone's participation in the massacre other than Verne Miller. Mr. Brantley stated that they are working on Galates and he thinks they will get some information. I advised Mr. Brantley that two Special Agents would be sent to him today.

MEMORANDEM FOR MR. TARM.

Mr. Brantley telephoned from New Orleans with regard to the GALATAS matter, and stated he arrived at New Orleans this morning, but Mr. Harvey had not arrived as yet. I stated that the airplane in which he was traveling was grounded and he will probably not arrive before six o'clock this evening.

Mr. Brantley stated that the Agents talked to Galatas all last night and secured a statement from him; that what they have is very good, but he is inclined to think that Galatas is "holding out" on us, and that they are going to make an affort to get more from him. I told Mr. Brantley I wanted particularly to get from Galatas the background of any protection he received. Mr. Brantley stated it is obvious that Mrs. Hash has lied to us all the way through, and it is his opinion she should be taken into custody, and that Mr. Cowley had indicated to him it is possible she is at Wemona, Illinois. I suggested that Mr. Cowley take this woman into custody and not let any one get to her, and Mr. Brantley stated he thought she should be taken to Kanses City as there is more information in the file at that office than anywhere else. I stated I thought it might be best to keep her at Chicago due to the reason that we have facilities there for keeping any one from knowing we are holding her. Mr. Brantley stated he thought this would be siright.

Mr. Brantley stated that Esther Farmer is also not telling the truth. (She is the wife of Herbert(Farmer). He advised that two or three weeks ago Farmer shot a deputy sheriff at Joplin, but he did not kill the officer, and that he left and his wife went with him. Mr. Brantley was of the opinion that they should both be taken into custody. I instructed Mr. Beatley to give the necessary orders on this.

Mr. Brantley further advised that Galates admits talking with Miller on the phone on the night in question, but does not know who was with Verne. Mr. Brantley remarked that he had not personally as yet talked with Verne Miller. I stated I had my doubts about this last statement attributed to Galates. Mr. Brantley stated that there had been no publicity on the matter, and both Galates and his wife have signed Waivers to go enywhere we desire to take them. I stated if anything begins to break we may move them out of New Orleans.

Ir. Brantley inquired whether I had any definite time in mind I wanted them to depart for Lanses City, and I stated I wanted them held there until such time as we can round up the rest of them. Brantley stated that Galatas has indicated to Agents Hages and Harold Anderson that he wants to plead guilty right away. I stated we want to try him for murder. I instructed Mr. Brantley that continued efforts should be made to make him talk.

Hr. Brantley stated he would ask Mr. Cowley at Chicago, and Kansas City, to take into custody Mrs. Mash, and the Farmers, respectively. He stated he would keep this office advised of any developments.

Thile talking with Mr. Cowley, I asked what he thought about picking up Ted Angus and whether we could prosecute him for herboring. Mr. Cowley stated he did not think we could do this right now. I stated if we picked him up and held him, we might get some information from him. Mr. Cowley stated that they have an agent working right near his place in the guise of a P.W.A. worker, - Dickstein. I asked whether he was any good and Mr. Cowley stated that he is a comparatively new man but he believes he is very good.

Er. Coxley advised that he moticed a letter from Oklahoma City dated September 26th concerning Barker and Karpie which fitted in with the information given to them by their informant. I stated that I recalled this letter from Brantley and Mr. Cowley stated that these men were in Kansas on September 21st and when their informant saw them a week prior to that, they said they were going to Kansas City. I asked Mr. Cowley what he thought shout picking up Willie Transfer and Mr. Cowley stated they have a couple of men working on Harrison right now but have not been able to spot him as yet. I stated he is supposed to be around the Casino Club all the time and Mr. Cowley stated that he is just there some of the time; that they have a pretty good lead on him and he is apparently on the lem for another reason and apparently because of trouble with Hammond. Mr. Cowley stated that when this trouble bless over they will have him.

I asked Mr. Cowley about Betty Tracey and he advised that they have had her in the office a number of times and questioned her; that she denies ever having had any contact. I told Mr. Cowley that if we could get Vivian Mathis, Mrs. Frank Mash and the Galatases together and let them see each other and tell them they better talk while they have a chance, we might get something as they will not know what the others have said. I asked Mr. Cowley whether he had any pictures of Varne Miller after he was killed and stated this might be a mental stimulant. Mr. Cowley stated that he will see what they can get.

On September 27, 1934, inquiry was received through representatives of the press at Oklahoma City for verification of a report to the effect that "Pretty Boy" Floyd had been apprehended at or mear Oklae" homa City. The source of the report was attributed to the Western Dalom telegraph office at McAlester, Oklahoma. Inquiry of Deputy Sheriff Maine by telephone at McAlester, Oklahoma revealed that such a report had been received there, but was duconfirmed. Mr. Rainey had received his information through Police Judge Haley of McAlester, who reported that he had received the report by radio or wire.

Inquiry of Judge W. E. Haley, McLlester, Cklahoma, by telephone revealed that the rumor is attributed to the fact that two messenger boys, one employed by the Postal Telegraph and the other by the Western Union, passed each other on the street at McLlester on the morning of September 87th. The Postal messenger remarked that a message had just come over the Postal whree from Dallae, stating that "Pretty Boy" Floyd had been caught in Oklahoma City. This story had been picked up by the newspapers at McLlester and broadcast, and Judge Haley stated that to his knowledge, there was no basis to the rumor. Mr. C. A. Abernathy, Postal Telegraph Company, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, advised that inquiries had been received there from KcAlester for confirmation of this rumor and that no such wire had been transmitted by Postal Telegraph. The rumor of course, was arroneous.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Mr. Harvey called from New York and advised there was nothing he could get from New York to New Orleans last night; that he did not take a train as they would not have done any good; that he can get a plane which will bring him in New Orleans in the morning and a train would not get there until Wednesday. I asked Mr. Harvey whether, if he left New York on Sunday night, he would not get to New Orleans until Wednesday. Mr. Harvey stated he could not get a train last night; that the only train would be this morning and he figured it would be better to take a plane. Mr. Harvey stated he is taking the 9:40 plane and will be in New Orleans 10:30 the next morning, Tuesday morning and the best by train would be Wednesday morning. Mr. Harvey stated the only possibility would be a plane to St. Louis which would leave at 3:30 this afternoon and miss the connections out tonight.

I advised Mr. Harvey that when he gets down there, we do not want any publicity on this case until we are ready to break it; that when it breaks, we want favorable publicity of an intelligent type, giving the Division full credit for what it has done in this matter; that we want him, Harvey, to dominate the situation down there; that we are not satisfied with the progress being made by Anderson with regard to Galatas; that we want the agents to be kept/Tine; that we want every precaution to be taken against Galatas committing suicide: that we want a waiver of removal in the event they spring a writ of habeas corpus, in which event we want to get him out of the district into Texas; that this calls for a great deal of work; that we want this interrogation conducted most vigorously because Galates is the key to the whole situation; that Anderson asked him some questions last night and he said he had to think about it; that this is not the answer as what we want to do is to get everything out of him that he has and get it as soon as possible; that he is being held at Magee's apertment and we want him, Harvey, to go to work on this fellow as we understand that he is yellow and, of course, there is a way to deal with people like that. I told Mr. Harvey that when this breaks, we want the Division to get full and favorable publicity about the whole case; that some write-ups on the case should be ready to be given out. I told Mr. Hervey that we would send him some photographs today under personal and confidential cover on Galatas so he will have them. Mr. Harvey stated he will wire his departure.





MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Mr. Nathan.... Mr. Tolson....

I telephoned the Birmingham Office and talked to Agent D. O. Swith. I advised him very confidentially that Agents Magee and Blake this afternoon took Galatas and his wife into custody, and are holding them in the New Orleans Office. I stated that we do not want this matter given any publicity for possibly a month; that we intend to hold them and interrogate them thoroughly and consistently in our own way; that I had instructed Agent Magee to rent an apartment in which to incarcerate these people, keeping them under guard while they are being questioned. I instructed Mr. Smith to select three sensible, steady Agents from his office, with as much experience as possible, who are qualified to perform such guard duty, and have them proceed at once to New Orleans, advising the Division by wire the time of their departure.

Mr. Smith stated that he had received a telephone call this morning from Agent in Charge Conroy at Little Bock relative to this matter, requesting that a telegram be checked which was sent from Birmingham September 20 or 21. I directed him to ignore this matter, and suggested that if Mr. Conroy calls him about it, he should advise him very confidentially that we have Galatas in custody but that there is to be absolutely no publicity given to the matter; however, that it would not be necessary to advise Mr. Conroy unless he calls him relative to the lead at Birmingham.

I told Mr. Smith to send the three Agents to New Orleans tonight, and to instruct them to be very cautious in keeping the individuals under continual guard; that the proper steps should be taken to have the windows properly barricaded, the locks should be removed from the doors of the apartment, including the bathroom door; they should not be allowed to keep anything sharp in their possession or within reach; and that every possible precaution should be taken to prevent suicide. Mr. Smith said he would have the Agents leave on the first train. I informed him that Agent Andersen is going to New Orleans from Kansas City.
