MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.
With regard to the status of the $\mathrm{C}_{\mathrm{Gn}}$ : please be advised that ell of tine defendants named in the indictmatit returned by the Federal Grand Jury at Kansas City, Missouri on October 26,1934 have been released under bon is of $55,000.00 \mathrm{With}$ the exceplion of Herbert allen Farmer who has not yet made bond. The bond of Galates was fixed at $315,000.00$. Adam Richetti was named in an indictgent including three courts, charging him with the release of, cone siring to release, and aiding and abetting in the release of a Federal prisoner. The same Grand Jury returned an indictment charging perjury against Eugene C./ Hepper, former Director of Police, Kansas City, Missouri, Thomas J./niggins, Chief of Detectives, end George Fay en, Lieutenant in charge of the automobile squad.

The bolt of one of the guns used in the massacre case has been identified os the bolt on the gun recovered in the lagoon, Lincoln Perk, Chicago, Illinois on July $24,19 z^{2}$. . Although the gun proper has not yet been recovered, all Field Offices are being instructed to discontinue investigation with the view to causing the apprehension of those individuals suspected of perpetrating the murder of Join y (Lamia at Kansas City, Missouri on July 10, 1934, it having been determined $b_{y}$ the Technical Laboratory of the Division that one of the bolts of the gun used in that murder is the gene bolt which has been identified in connection with the Kansas City Massacre case.

May I submit fis menorandum in rupplement of what $I$ stated yostar day during our confersation about the recent oapture of wpyetty Bey in : OMoyd.

The men whon I mentioned were Deputy Sheriff GeorgekEaves and Policeman GeorgefPatterson, both of Iisbon, Onio, whose contribution to the capture if Moyd was to bead him off when he attempted to onter Lisbon in hie Ilight from Nelloville after his oncounter fith Chief Fultz. Frey effectively prevented his escepe through Hisbon and on to Ioungetown here it might have been more difficult to locato him. They also drove him beck tgward East Liverpool and into the roods near Spences and "captured" the two men wo Tere with Foyd, whom they nsumed were also linked win the crime. Hayes left the two mon in charge of Patterson and rushed back to Li sbon and organised a posee of citizens, of whom Merle Jy Lewis was the leader, and wo immediately rushed to the woods and prevented any return or escape to the north, driving Floyd in m easterly direction ond resulting in his ultimatp captore of winich 700 know soll.

The posse was armed $\boldsymbol{T}$ th deer rifles, old Mansers and other gimilar weapons and although they did not know at the time whom they were after, they ahowed a fine epirit of mpport of law and order end bravery in the face of danger. Incidentally, Hayen and Patteraom ongaged in a gun duel with Foyd in which Bam, the driver of Foyd'g car, was wounded and one bullet went directly through the wind ahleld and out the back window of Hayes' car, paseing within a few inchos of both Hayes and Patterson. - Hayes han a good record of prefious bravery nuter fire, having been mounded in the performance of his duties something orer a year ego.

May I ade fust my word of profound admiration for the manner in which you have performed the great task assiened to your department in ridding the country of 1 ta most dangerous enemies. Ho man in America is more respected for brilliant performance of duty than are jou.

Re: Facts concerning tho delay in the carrying out of the court's sentence relative to the * execution of ADAM SIICHETII for his participaction in the KaNsas CITI MASSACRE.

This memorandum is submitted for the purpose of eating forth the facts relative to the delay in the execution of the Missouri State Court sentence of Adam Richetti for bis participation in the Kansas City Massacre.

It is recalled that one of the most atrocious crimes committed in modern times was the murder of four peace officers and their prisoner at Kansas City, Missouri, on the morning of June 17, 1933, men an attempt was made by three gunmen to deliver Frank Nash, an escaped Federal prisoner, who was being returned to the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, from which institution he had previously escaped.

Investigation conducted by Special Agents of the Bureau disclosed that the three gunmen were Verne Miller, Charles Arthur "Pretty Boy"Fioyd, and $\Delta d a m$ Richetti. Coincident with the apprehension of Frank Nash at Hot Springs, Arkansas, by Bureau Agents, accompanied by Otto treed, Chief of Police, McAlester, Oklahoma, on the morning of June 16, 1933, Ford and Richetti kidnaped Jack XKllingsworth at Bolivar, Missouri, and carried him into Kansas City, \& Missouri, where he was released around 8:00 $0^{\prime}$ clock P. M., the evening preceding the attempted delivery of lash. Associates of Nash communicated With Verne Miller at Kansas City, Missouri, who enlisted the services of Floyd and Richotti to deliver Hash upon his arrival at the Union Station in Kansas City, Missouri, on the morning of June 17, 1933, which resulted in the death of Raymond J. Coffey, Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Otto Reed, Chief of Police, McAlester, Oklahoma, Frank E SHermanson, and William JdGrooms, as well as Nash.

Verne Miller was killed by unknown persons, and his body was found on the outskirts of Detroit, Michigan, on the morning of November 29, 1933. Floyd was killed by Bureau Agentr, in cooperation With local police officers, near Clarkson, Ohio, on the afternoon of October 22, 1934. Richetti was taken into custody by local officers at East Liverpool, Ohlo, on October 20, 1934.

On March 1, 1935, four indictments were returned by the Jackson Countw, Missour1, Grand Jury, charging Adam Richetti (in each) with murder in the first degree. The trial of idax Richetfi on the indictment charging him with the murder of Prank E. Hermanson commenced at Kansas City, Missouri, on June 10, 1935, and on June 17, 1935, the Jury returned a verdict of guilty, Fith the recomendation that the death penalty be inposed. On the same date, June 17, 1935, Adam Richetti was sentenced to be hanged."

In connection with the delay of the execution of this sentence, it is to be noted that on Auguct 20, 2935, Mr. E. H. Cook, Deputy Cleric of the Criminal Division of the Circuit Comrt of Jackson County, Kansas City, Missouri, adfised that on August 19, 1935, Richetti's motion for a nev trial was overruled by Judge Ray G. Cowan and October 4, 1935, set as the date on which Richetti should be hanged. Immediately after the motion for the new trial was overruled, Richetti's counsel filed notice for appeal, the law of Missouri allowing one year in which the appeal may be perfected. On August 20, 1935, Mr. Russelll Boyle, Assistant Prosecuting Attorney, Kansas City, Missouri, advised that as a general rule it required approdmately two years to dispose of any appeal to the Supreme Court and that no further action conld be had in this matter until the appeal mas disposed of: $v$

At frequant intervals, the prosecuting officials have been contacted by the Kansas City office, with a view to ascertaining the status of this pending appeal, and on May 3, 1938, the Supreme Court of the State of Hissouri affiraed the mrder conviction of Adam Richetti.  RE: CHARLES ARTHUR FLOYD AIIAS "PREITTY BOY" FIOYDThe following are the details concerning tie actial shooting and killing of Floyd by the Special Agents of the Division of Investigation, United States Department of Justice:

At 1:00 p.m., October 22, 1934, information received by the Special Agents of tilis Division on patrol in the vicinity of East Liverpool, Ohio, developed the fact that a man, later idantified from a photograph as "Pretty Boy" Floyd, had been furnished lunch at the farm of RoberdyRobison, of East Liverpool, Ohio, Parral Route No. 1. $17 l$ roads ware inmediately blocked, and the roads, woods and vicinity were placed under intensive patrol. In this work, the Division of Investigation had the assistance of Chies of Police Hugh If McDernott, of
East Liverpool, Ohio.

At $4 i 00$ p.r., four Agents of the Division of Investigation, with'several police officers of East Liverpool, Ohio, encountered Floyd at the farm of Mrs.' Ellenlfonkle, where he had requested the brother of Mrs. Conkle, S. S. Dyke, to drive him to Youngstonn, Ohio. When first seen by the Agents, he was in a car behind a corn crib located on the north side of the house, and was ready to leave, after having forced the members of the Conkle household to furnish him food. In the car mere Dyke and two momen of the Conkle family. The car backed out from behind the corn crib, and upon seeing the Special Agents, Floyd made Dyke drive the car back to the former position behtnd the corn crib, at which time Floyd left the car and dashed past an outbuilding across an open field, over a ridge, toward the neighboring woods. The officers inmediately followed, and he was commanded to halt. He failed to do so, and the officers then fired. The shooting occurred at 4:10 p.m., and Floyd died at 4:25 p.m. Floyd admitted his identity just before he died. Two .45 automatic pistols, fully loaded, with extra clip, were found in his possession and one was in his hand when he fall. the other was in his belt. The body of Floyd was immediately placed in an automobile by the Special Agents and taken to East Liverpool, Ohio, where it was placed in an undertaking establishment. A coroner's inquast was held last night.

In the pursuit for Fhoyd in the vicinity of East Liverpool, Ohio, as already indicated, the Agents of this Department were rendered excellent cooparation and assistance by Chief of Police Hugh J. McDermott, of East Liverpool, Ohio, and by Sheriff RaydLong.

Records in the Los Aneeles Pglice Department show that Permit Mo. 676 wes issued to J. K Polimer and Ly Feirereisen on July 17, 1931, for the retail sale of firearms. An address das eiven on this permit for wr. Polimer as 410 North Crescent Heights. Invesigation at this address revealed that J. M. Polimer died sometime in 1933, and that his wife had remarried and was residing at 921 South Gramercy Drive.

Mrs. Polimer, who is now krs. Desser, was interviewed and adfisod that she was the $\begin{aligned} & \text { ife of the polimer in question, and that he died in 193s; }\end{aligned}$ that in 1917, he conducted a retail firearms atore in LOs Angeles, but that she did not know where his records might be. She stated that she had separated from him a foll years before his death, and that she could give no information regarding the tracing of this pistol.

Mr. Peireraisen mas contacted at 2966 Fourth Avenue, Los Angeles, and he advised that he had been in business tith J. M. Polimer aince the eariy part of 1931.  letter dated 0 october 16,1934 concerning the discovery of exploded shotgun shells found at the scene of tire Kansas City massacre, please be advised that this office is in receipt of information to the effect that Bob short, former deputy sheriff and present special agent for the bleakwell Oil and Gas Company, Seminole, Oklahoma, arrested relatives of Birdwell, Floyd's former partner, and found in their possession a baved-off shotgun remodeled to resemble a machine gin.

Mr. Short, in accordance with the request of the Oklahoma City office, produced this gun for examination. He stated that he obtwined it from Raymondjuones, presently incarcerated at Fenoka, Okleboim on state charges. Raymond Jones is a near relative or georgevirdmell. Information imparted to Short by Jones mas that the gun in question vas used by Floyd ai Birdwell in their activities up to the time that they obtained possession of a Thompson mb-machine gun.

An examination of this faun reveals that it is a twelve gage Browning automatic shotgun, serial No. 102633, barrel No. 932. The barrel has been saved off, and a hand resembling a foregrip of some types of Thompson ab-machine guns has bean added thereto. Photograph of two views of this gin are attached hereto, and there is being forwarded to the Division under separate cover specimen shells fired from this gun

Pletures of the DLLINGiAR and KARPIS-BAFKFRR gangs vare shom to MR. SMMAGTON, along with pioture of GONTZ (TON ASH), and egent was informed that he had not meen any of the persons areept BOMER IIISON, NO. 837 . IB. SMONTION informed egent that it mould have been inpossible for coryiz to have hed a eabin on or near Granberry Lake and he not to have known it.

Agant interviened clarince christiansian and O. N. OIFN, who ifte In a hat on Cramberry Lake, tho stated that their pleee was the only one on Cranberry Lake, and stated that a few months ago they hed built a roet to the lake. Both of these men stated that there hed been no eabin on Oranberry Lake, and edrised agent upon axamining the photographs of GUFIZ and members of the DIIKINGRR and BARKER-KARPIS gangs that they hed not een any of thone people around Cramberry Leke.

Azont interviered BRAT BURGMT at Gagne Chioken Renoh, near Gramberry Late, tho Tierred the picturee of the DIIJMNG: and KARPIS-BAPGER cengs but mo ldentifieations vere made.

Agent interviowed MR. $A R I F I N R$ EAMNFORD, wo stated that he hed 1ived metr Craberry Laks for joars and ras wire that there were no eabing on Cranbarfy Leke, and upon being shom a picture of GOEIZ (VON ASE), atated that ho had not aeen that person near Cranberfy Lake, and voild have seen him if he hed omed eabin on that lace MA, HANMAPORD Tas shown the plotures of the DILLINGFR and KARPLS-BARKER gangs, long Fith other pietares, and atated that he hed not seen any of them near Cranberry Iakes.

Agent proceeded to Granberry Lake Ho. 2, whoh is looted thirty
 stated that she lived on that lake for aeveral years and kow all of the persons orning obing on that lake, and upon axaining the above mentioned photographe. etated that mone of the pereons hom her hed lifed on or near Gramberry Lete.
 Lake as there ware only three cabins and ahe cas personally acquainted fith the oeoupante of them all, and aleo stated that all of these people had lived thare for seterel jeare.

Agent also intartieved P. H. Whinin, tho is amployed by the grocery atore at Grand View, Wisconsin, wo stated that he delivered groceries to all of the cabins on or near Cranberry Lake and atated that he had held this position for the past five years. VR. WavJJN wes shom a pioture of Coirrz, and also the piotares of members of the DILtaMGER and KARPIS-BARYER gangs, and stated that he vas poaitive that none of these prople hed lived on Grambary Lake during the past itve fears.

Agent intacti ered MR. C. L. FRIFDADPR at his oamp near Cable, Wiaconsin, and was afvised that he held dances near Cranberry Lake, and that most of the summar residente oame to these dances. He was also shom photo: graphs of the above mentioned individuals, and stated that he hed not seen any of these people noar Granberry Lake during the past trr ee years. mis man lives on Rural Route NO, 2 , Cable, Eisconsin.

The following investigation was conducted on Nor ember 10,1934 by Special Agent F. B. Matney, to ascertain mho hed possession of the bullet that was found by the body of $A N D E R S O N$ near Webster, Fisconsin, who was dleged to heve been kill ad by KarPis and BARKBR.
agant intormi ered iR. C. H. SMNDRES, Bheriff at Crantaburg, Wisconsin, who stated that the alug that was dug from the ground near the body of AmDRSON was not in his possession but that he belioved his eopoty, 4. O. Braberg, hed this slug.

Agent interviowed 4. O. ERABERG at Webster, Wiseonsin, wo stated that he hed kopt this slog in hia possession aince it ras found, but stated that he did not mow where it was at this time. MR. BRABRRG searched for this alug but was unable to locate it. Agent was edivised that an diditional cearch mould be made and if this slug was located he would formard it to the St. Peul Diviaion orfice inmediataly. Agont vas edvised that min upired ahell Fas also found bear the soene of this orime, and atated that it was found at the apot where ANDERSON was dragged from the car. this 45 unfired shell weas secured and Fill be returned by agent to the St. Peul Orfice.

The 45 unfired sholl was secured and is being sent to the Diviaion in order that it may be axemined in the teohnical laboratory. From on examination of the ahell it does not appear that any effort had been fade to fire seme, or ahow any algns of having been ortracted from a firearm
howerer, under alose examination some information of value mey be seoured.
Sperial Mgent 4. J. Zimmarman conducted the following investigation at the office of the Superintendent of the Bureau of Criminal Aprehenaion, State Offioe Building, St,Pail, Mnnesota, on July 12, 1934:

In regard to a 45 callber bullet which was found near the body of GZORTE ANDEASN at Tebster, Wibconsin, MR. PASSOLT informed agent that this bullet had never been in his office but ras left in the oustody of sheriff Burnett, Yebster, \#isconsin, and rithout doubt could be raum there at this time.

## UNOTSCAPR LRADS:

The St.Paul Division Orfice
Fill conduct further investigation in an effort to locate the lodge of COITZ, ho is reported to heve owned same under the name of VON AsH. It is moted in the report of special igent B . C. Coulter, St.Paul, Minnesota, dated August 3l, 1934 that this lodge is located on Gronberry Lake, oight nileo from Coudaray, Fiaconsin, and that the caretaker's name was CHARLIE and his iffers name was Lecth or LOTUS. This information was furniahed by MRS. CADYS MERGINS, who did not knov the direetica this lodge is loented from conderay.

Mr. Brantley called me at 10:00 P.M. last night to advise tho Special Agents of the Oklahoma City Office had late yesterday afternoon at Sallisaw, Oklahoma, picked up Beulah and Rosemeird, the paramours of ${ }^{\circ}$ Floyd and Richetti. Mr. Brantley ateted that he felt these women, if continuously and vigorously questioned for an extended period of time, would be able to furnish us with a greet deal of information concerning the activities of Floyd and Richetti during the pest year. Mr. Brantley stated the there were no facilities in Oklahoma City which would permit the detention of these women there, and that he felt theta writ of habeas corpus would be filed upon him if he attempted to hold them in Oklahoma City. Mr. Brantley thought that he should transport these nomen to Chicago and detain them there. I stated to Mr. Brantley that I did not believe the information which we might obtain from the Baird women would justify the expense of transporting them to Chicago, since if we did know the activities and hideouts of Floyd and Richetti during the past year, they would be of no value to us now, except for a possible prosecution of some individual for harboring. After discussing this situation with you, I contacted Mr. Cowley at Chicago and asked him for his views in the matter. He stated that he could see no purpose in bringing the Bird women to Chicago, since the information obtained from them would be of little practical use to the Division now. I requested Kr. Cowley to call Brantley and tell him that after talking to the Division it had been decided that Brantley should question these women to the best of his knowledge in Oklahoma City and if threatened with a writ of habees corpus or other proceeding, to dismiss the women from custody.

CONSPIRACY TO DELIVER FEDERAL PRISONER
On November 16, 1934, the whiter, together with Special $1914 \%$ Agents Andersen and Trainer, of this office, conferred with United States Attorney Maurice H . Lillian and his assistants relative to the indictments in the above case.
ur. Mulligan added that Judge ot fe iffy criminal cases beginning December 26, 1934, and continuing for approximateif two weeks. It is Ki. Gilligan's intention that the conspiracy indictment in this case be the first to be tried, which Would mean that the case would actually go to trial on December eth. Following this trial the case against Georgexpayen charging perjury will be heard before Judge Otis. Mr. Mulligan farther advised that Judge Reeves will hold court commencing about Jenuery 8, 1935, at which time the perjury cases against Iugene C-Reppert and Thomas JX Higgins will be tried.

With reference to the indictments rotumed against Reppert and Higgins, Mr. Killigan called attention to the fact that it will be necessary to develop as strong a ease as possible. He foels that these persons will endeavor to present evidence indicating that the Police Department was active in its efforts to solve the massacre, and that the Government should be ready to present all possible evidence rebutting the contentions of the defendants. He, accordingly, is desirous of having on opportunity to confer with the representatives of the Division who rare in charge of our investigation during the period immediately after the massacre in order to determine from them the extent of their recollection concerning any conferences or negotiations had with officials of the Kansas City Police Department. Mr. Mulligan belevee that it would be more expedient and hal prut if a conference could be arranged at Kansas city at mich time the Division's
representatives could all be present, rather than to have these persons submit statemonts in this regard. It is noted that during the period in question Assistant Director Nathan was in Kansas City, as vell as Special Lgenta in Charge fetterli, Jones and Harrey. It is 㞰 recollection that probably all of these persons had some contact with officials of the Police Department.

Mr. Mdilgen is desirous that this conference be had as soon as posaible, suggesting that efforts be made to arrage it .. during the coming week. I informed him that this would nodoubtediy not be reasible, but that I would present the matter to you and that euch action as is posibie would be taken by you. If the Divition believes that such conference is desirable I will eppreciate your early edvice in order that the necesaary arrangements may be effected without andue delay.

It is noted that the Divi aion has been furnianed wth copies of all of the indictments in question. With reference to the indictment againet Rayen, the United States Attorney has mquested that interviows be had ritb all persons alleged to heve been present at the time of the conference in Wichita, Kansas out of mich the indictment against Rayen grew. Certain interriewn in this connection have been had and will be reported $\begin{gathered}\text { (ithis a fer }\end{gathered}$ days. The remaining investigation in this connection will be conducted as soon as possible.
