# Congress Is Told Floyd Killed 10 Men During Life 

'Pretty Boy' Notched Watch Instead of Gun, Is Claim.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.-(AP)-The late "Pretty Boy" Floyd, congress whs informed Monday, had enew way of recording his "kills."
J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the fustice department's division of invertigation, testilied in hearings made public Monday that Floyd, instead of cutting notches on his gun. had an= other form of "self-flattery."
"He put notches on his witch." Hoover said. "You will note that in thls picture there are 10 notches on the tnside works of the wotch. 10 notches on the crystal. and 10 notches on the lucky plece that he carried. Fe had kiled 10 men."
If Floyd kept an sccurste eccount of his murders then he cilled two less men than popularly supposed. less men than populare latd at his dcor:

The slaying of Ery Kelly, pollee offleer, near Bixby, Olks.

The deaths of Eill and Wally Ash, Kansas City underworld figures.

The Kansas City union flation massacre of tive men, committed by Floyd and Verne Multer

The claying of a patrolman at Bowling Green, Ohto.

The slaying of a police offleer at Akron, Ohlo.

The murders of two Kansas City officers who falled to watch him after ho pretended drunkenness
The late Floyd's trick of cutting a noteh on hls watch to commemorwite each of his murder is news to W. I. Eads, chief criminal deptity theriff, bera.

Statement of Mrs. Ellen Conkle, Mede October 23rd, 1934, 12:30 P. M. at her home near Clemson, Ohio.

Presents Mrs. Ellen Conkle Hr. and Hrs. Stewart Dyke E. H. Sturgis, Coroner, Myra McCormick, Stenographer.

Q You reside st?
A Eest Liverpool, R. D. One.
Q On the Clarkson and Sprucevele Roed?
4 Yes.
At this time the usual oath wes administered by the Coroner.
Q Just atert and tell in your own words, Hrs. Concle, bout when he first care here and then you first gav him.

A It Fis just about ten minutes to three when he came here to the house. He asiced me if I would give him something to est, said he was hungry and lost, thet he and his brother hed been out hunting and he had got lost from his brother. I asised him whet he was hunting and he said bquirrels or just anything he could rind. I told him he surely vouldn't be hunting squirrels after night, end he said to me, to be honest he had been drinking and hed got too much to drink and he got in srong. I got hi:n $e$ lunch end he zsteci me if 1 Fould get hia some \#eat, he seid he wes hungry for meat. He said it was a lunch fit for a king. He gave me dollar and I said I didn't want to teke enything, end he soid it wes well porth it to him. He was here for elmost an hour.

Q Lid you suspicion his storyi
A Yes, I knew he vesn't telling me the truth because $I$ knew he hedn't been drinking, I bould tell thet by looiing at him. I didn't know they rere looking for him but I wes efraid of him, I will adait that.
Q That occurred then ifter that?
A He manted me to tike him to Youngstomn. I told him I couldn't teice him to Youngstomn. He asked me if I would let my folks take him. I wes afreid of hiri. I said if he would weit here until four oiclock I would see the he got down to Houte Seven. Ly brother was husking corn. I didn't want him in the neighborhood over night. Fhen he got through with his lunch he didn't tell hin he did or cidn't, I just smiled. He seid "I feel just thet wey". Then he seid MI mill go down in the cer end weitn. He got in my brotheris



I would say around four of clock in the afternoon of 0ctober 22nd, myself and Chester Smith and Hermann Roth and E. Wontgomery of the East Liverpool Police Department were driving on the Sprucedale Road, and coming along there and iontgomery noticed a man back of the corn crib on the Conkle farm, and I said to h 1 m , get out of the car everybody and I said get out of the car quick, which they did. In the meantime the Feds come up and we hollered, "there he is, back of the corn crib", so we hollered for him to come out and he started around to come, then he ran back and we could notice from the bottom df the crib thet he got into a car and then got out of the car, and after getting out of the car he came out with a Forty-five in his hand, and we hollered for him to put up his hands, which he did not, and started to run, so we gave orders to fire, and he fell in the center of the clover field, and we got to him, he said to me "Who the hell tipped you off", and he said "Where's Eddy", he said "You've got me twice. In the meantime I told the Federal officers to go to a phone, for which they had to go to Clarkson, and get an ambulance. In the meantime, they came back and I told the police officers that was guarding him to carry him from the field to the road for the purpose of putting him in the ambulance, and he died on the way out to the road, and the Federal car came up and we put him in the back of the Federal car, and I ordered him into the Sturgis Jndertaking establishment. He was shot about four-ten and lived about fifteen minutes after.

I said MI am just back from Canons Mill and heven't been reading the papers except funnies or looking thr ough the paper for a job." I said aiy name is Macmillen". So he said - I don't know why he puiled his coat up, but he showed me his gun. I said "Isn't thet kind of large". He let it pass, although I don't belleve his gun was locded in the car. we drove on through and passed one machine, I think the t's the only archine we pessed until we hit Baums. We turned off to go to Beums; then I pilled lay choke on the hill and told him I wes out of ges.

Why did you do that?

CEIEF FULTZ: Then you might ask the prisoner if be waives a jury trial and wants to be tried to you.

CHIEF FULTZ: You waive a jury trial and want to be tried by wayor Laugherty for carrying concealed weapons.
CEIEF FULTZ: This is just a waiver of your rights to a jury.

MAYOR LAOGRERTY: It reads, "Before Mayor W. H. Daugrerty, the Ueyor of the City of Wellsville. The State of Onio egsingt Adan Richetti. Charge of carrying concealed reapons. On expmination of the complaint made on behalf of the State againgt me on the charge of carrying concealed weapons, I hereby waive e jury and consent to be tried to the Mayor. Lated this 23 rd day of October, 1934.*

MR. LAFFERTI: Mr. Richetti, do you desire to have a preliminary hearing here before the Mayor on the shooting with intent to kill cese, or do you desire to waive that preliminary hearing here end consent now to be turned over to the Grand Jury? In this kind of case the hayor doesnot have final jurisdiction. In any event, if he should find that there is reasonable ground to think tho $t$ the offense was committed by you, his power then is to bind you over to the Grand Jury, even 1i you would have a hearing. You cen denand that hearing end the officers here will give you a heering, or you can waive thet hearing and be bound over to the Grand Jury. Whichever you want to do.

It goes to the Grand Jury either wey, doesn't it?
Thet defends on the outcome of the hearing.

CHIEF FULTZ: If you don't weive a heering now, the Heyor will have to set a certain hour for you to be here and will bring the officers to prove thet you were

The body is that of a muscular well developed white male of an age estimated to be between 25 and 30. There is a recently closed wound in the right axilla, from the embalmer's trocar. The body measures $5^{\prime \prime} 8^{\prime \prime}$ in length. There are recent wounds closed by stitches on the dorsal and palmar surfaces of the right forearm at about its middle. There is a wound in the right loin in the posterior axillary line $4^{n}$ above the level of the iliac crest. There is another wound in the right anterior axillary line $4^{n}$ above the anterior superior iliac spine. In the left anterior axillary line there is another mound $2^{\prime \prime}$ below the costal margin. Another wound in the left mid axillary line at the level of the Eth rib. The six wounds herein before described appear fresh and have been closed by stitches. There are multiple scratches over the hands and legs, and several minor contusions about the legs. One small buckshot can be felt immediately underneath the skin near the mid line of the back at the level of the lath rib. There is an abrasion of the skin $\mathrm{l}^{\prime \prime}$ in length in the upper medial aspect of the right thigh. No evidence of head injury is seen. There is a tattoo mark on the palmar surface of the left forearm composed of the face of a nurse within a rose. The ends of the fingers have been made smooth apparently by some abrasive substance. Due to the fact that the wounds had been sutured at the time of examination it is impossible to distinguish wounds of entrance: and exit. The body was opened from the supra-sternal notch to the symphysis pubis. The peritoneal cavity is filled with blood part of which is clotted. The Eth rib on the left side in the mid axillary line at a point immediately beneath the site of the external round previously described is shattered, and the path of this bullet is obliquely to the right and donnard and forward in the direction of the wound situated in the right anterior axillary line $4^{\prime \prime}$ above the anterior superior iliac spine. The gath of this bullet passes through the lower left diaphragm without injuring the lung and perforated the stomach at the cardiac end in trio places and perforated the small intestines $4^{4 n}$ below the duodeno-jejunal flexure and perforated. the root of the mesentery where there is a large retro-peritenesl hemorrhage and again perforated the ascending colon before leaving the body. The left pleural space is filled with blood stained fluid. The bullet path beginning in the right loin in the posterior axillary line penetrated between the lath end 11 th rib and extends forward and to the left to the wound previously described $2^{\prime \prime}$ below the costal margin on the left. There is a perforation of the transverse colon $2^{n \prime}$ to the left of the hepatic flexure. There is extensive retro periteneal hemorrhage from the right side and in the right ilio-psoas muscle. The liver and spleen show no injury. There is an extensive jagged wound on the anterior surface of the right kidney extending transversely a distance of $2^{\prime \prime}$ and about $\frac{7^{n}}{2^{\prime}}$ in depth. There are several perforations of the small intestines. The left kidney is apparently normal. The heart is normal in size, shape, end consistency; and the root of the aorta is smooth and contains a fer small atheromatous placques. The myocardial is normal in color and the endocardium is smooth throughout. The valves are normal, end the coronary arteries show no sclerosis. There is an extensive penetrating mound of the pancreas.

Michael (Jimmy Needles) La Capra, police character, surrendered last night to the police from an apartment on the second floor at 519 West Eleventh street, after the police had exchanged numerous shots with him and finally forced him to come out by using tear gas bombs.

At police headquarters La Capra spoke in a rambling disconnected manner as he had been reported doIng in other places in the city earlier In the night. Two women taken from the apartment building with La Capra were released by T, J. Higgins, chief of detectives, as having nothing to do with the wild foray by La Capra.

The Kences City office，as the Division is aware，has now in its pos－ session a Thompson sub－machine gun from which the serial number has been filed，completely：obliterating sane beyond restoration，which machine gun was recovered upon he arrest of adan Richetti near Tiellsville，Ohio，during October，1934，when Floyd made h 1 s temporary escape．It is noted that the Division Technical Laboratory at i＇eshington found that the serial number of the rieajon could not be restored by scientific methods，and it appears that the secret number hes not been obtained．In this connection，United states Attorney Maurice M．隹illigan of Kansas City has expressed a desire that the serial number be secured if at all possible，in order that the weapon may be traced to its former owner．It is thought probable thin the process necessery for the discovery of the secret number on the machine gun itself might in some ray interfere with the markings of projectiles fired from the gur，end，therefore，that process would not be advisable at this time．

It is noted that the machine gun, which was in the possession of Floyd and Richetti then recovered, bore no stock. It is quite probable the the stock of the gun now in possession of Fiesley Kenned may hove belonged to this gun.

Several months cfo, Special hent F. F. Trainer of this office was advised by Merle A. Gill, Bellistician at Kansas City, the under the butt plate on each stock of the Thompson sub-machine fin there is a serial number stewed on the wood which corresponds with the serial number of the weapon with which the stock was assembled at the time it $\kappa$ es shipped from the Colt factory. Information to this effect is contained in a letter from this office to the Division dated November $4^{2}, 1 \geqslant 33,0$ ae 2, paragraph 2, having reference therein to a machine faun stock mich bore serial number 1430 , and which was investiceted and an attempt made to trace. This office does not know definitely that the serial number on the gun stock is a corresponding number to the serial number of the actual reap on with which assembled, but this information could be apparently secured from the auto Ordnance Company, Hertford, Conn., which company manufactures this gun. In an effort to determine the probability of correspondence of such numbers, the butt plate was taken from one of the stocks of the machine guns on the property list in the Kansas City office, and
 the number there res found to be 5625 , but there is $n$ Thompson submectine gun in this office bearing sac! corresponding number, although it is possible that a machine gun of that serial number could have been purchased by the Division with the group of such weapons, which were distributed to the various offices.

I hesitate to request the Oklahoma City office to make a check of the gun stock in possession of :wesley Kennedy until first summit ing this information to the Division for its consideration. If, after considering the meter and determining whether the number under the butt plate of the gun stock does correspond of th the serial number on the gan with which it was shipped from the factory, the Division deems it advisable to inspect the stock in possession of Mr. Kennedy, it is requested that empropriete instructions be given to the oklahome City office, and that the Kancas City office be advised. In this connection, it may be noted that Agent Ferland learned that Wesley Kennedy treasures the gun stock which he has as a souvenir. Graves. He expects to call to his attgnty thy
fact thet the testimony of these Agents is all in the transcript which has been furaished to Mr. Graves. However, he expects to advise in. Graves that it is his understanding thet these fgents W111 be evallable for testimony before the state grand jury on February 25 , or on the date that the case will be considered by the erand jury. He esked me as to whether be could safely make this statement, and I informed him that it was my understandine that the Bureau would desire to have the beents present if needed for the contempleted state rosecution. Nr. Lilllean will inform wr. Graves that the deants whose testimony would be material in this case are Special Egent in Charge Vetterli end Special Agents F. S. Suith, F. J. Laciey, and J. E. Brennan. He will further advise : Fr . Graves that lirs. Mr. Willisan does not belleve that the presence of the finEerprint expert from Taskinaton, Lr. Nurphy, would be necessary for the state grand jury. However, he desires that the Bureau forward to this office for use in this matter the orieinal negatives of the latent print of Richetti found at the hoile of Verne l:iller, tofether with positive prints of that latent flagerpint. These could then be introduced in evidence by Special deent Brennan.

Mr. Willigen has received a telegram fram the Department advising him that it is not considered desirabie for him to employ the services of berle Gill as a ballistician, for the purpose of attempting to léentify the gun recovereê from Floyd as heving beon used in the massacre. Re is still very anrious to have this evidence avallable for use, both in the state prosecution for murder and in any further federel prosecution. He advised me thet he would be willing to pay Gill from 51 s own pocket, in the event such action would not be egainst the rishes of the Department. He is extremely interested in hevine such, testimony for the reason thet he feels that it would clearly show the public in Kansas City that Floya and ?lichetti were urdoubtedly connected with the massacre, end would refute allegations which have bean aade by the Kansas city JournalPost to the effect that the Governiert's alleged solution of the massacre was not an actual solution.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR．

In response to your memorandum dated January 7，1935，rel at ier．firm the Kansas City massacre case，in which you requested to be iffophea caky corning certain investigative phases which were not，in your est promptly and properly handled，please be advised that
（1）the files do not reflect the reason for the delay in send－ ing the latent Richetti fingerprint to Washington head－ quarters from Kansas City，Missouri．The files show that immediately after the massacre occurred Assistant Director Harold Nathan，who was then in Kansas $C_{1}$ ty，Missouri， telephonically requested photographic copies of finger－ prints of all suspects mentioned in connection with this case be forwarded to the Kansas City office，in order that latent prints obtained could be compared．These finger－ prints included those of Richetti and it appears that Special Agent J．E．Brennan，e fingerprint expert，con－ ducted the comparisons in the Kansas City office．At that time the Technical Laboratory was not functioning and latent prints were not then being submitted to the Washington headquarters．
（2）In connection with the statement furnished by James H．Isacapra， please be advised that all angles，possible of verification， were covered．＂Speedy＂Wilhtte，now serving a sentence in the Iowa State Penitentiary，Fort Madison，Iowa，was inter－ viered relative to the facts within his knowledge and intimated that the information furnished by Lacapra was authentic．In－ dividuals described by Lacapra as employees of the Traffic Way Garage were also interviewed and corroborated the state－ mont made by Lacapra．The angle relative to the Buick car， which was reported to have carried Floyd and Richetti out of Kansas City and found abandoned near Detroit，Michigan，al－ though previously investigated as reflected by the eight reports submitted in the case entitled DNKNOFN SUBJECTS， BUICK SEDAN，Motor No． 277459 ，was rechecked immediately following the statement furnished by Lacapra．The material and relevant portions of Lacapra＇s statement pere given at－ tention and all those persons named were interviewed and later summoned to appear before the Grand Jury at Kansas

City, Missouri, which returned the indictment against Richard Tallman Galatas, et al, on October 24, 1934. Relative to the gangater hide-out, mentioned by Lacapra, which was not raided until nearly thirty days after he had furnished the statement, please be advised that the files do not reflect the exact date on wich the particular hide-out, mentioned by Lacapra, was raided. The hide-out, namely, the storehouse of Charles Gargotta at 4 th and Oak Streets, is first mentioned in the report of Specisl Agent F. F. Trainor, dated at Kansas City, Missouri September 5,1934 and the next subsequent report of Special Agent Trainor, dated October 11, 1934, covering period of investigation from September 5 to October 8, 1934, shows that this particular hide-out had been raided during the period of investigation covered by the report. Relative to the hideout at the home of Dominic Benaggio, this was first reported in the letter of the Kansas City office, dated September 23, 1934 (Serial 2719). This particular hide-out was raided twelve days later, as reflected in my memorandum to you dated October 5, 1934 (Serial 2689) and the report of Speciel Agent Trainor, dated October 11, 1934 (Serial 2746).
(3) The statement of Vifian Mathis was predicated upon and corroborated facts previously developed by investigation and that portion of her statement which had not been previously investigated was immedietely checked, namely, the trip made to the home of Fritz Mulloy in a taxicab and the transportetion of Vivian Mathis from Kansas City to Des Moines, Towa by Martin Schwartiberg, Kansas City jeweler, immediately subsequent to the massacre.
(4) The body of "Pretty Boy" Floyd was not examined by medical experts with a vies to determining whether he had been wounded in the left shoulder, as reported by Vivian Mathis, for the reason that it was overlooked at the time.

I am in receipt of Division letter of the 28th instant， regarding the above captioned matter，in which you request that I fur－ gish information to the Division and the Kans as City Office immediately regarding the activities of tho Burns Detective Agency in this case and， particularly，any information which will，in any way，discredit the testimony of the operatives．

Please be advised that shortly after the Kansas City Massacre，I recall in a conversation with li．Eugene Cxpeppert，wo was then Director of Police at Kansas City that he advised me the he was going to employ one or two men frill the Burns Detective Agency to work on this case and，if I remember cofrectiy，I told him I thought it was a good idea，because I was anxious to have the case solved．I believed these men worked in Kansas City，Chicago and parts of Minnesota and while on two or three occasions，Mir．Repent made reports to me while I was in his office in connection with this case，the reports were oral and there had been no information developed by the Burns men that was of any value to the investigation at all and，accordingly，no particular attention was paid to these reports．Frankly，I did not know the names or identity of the two individuals who had been employed by the Kansas City Police Department from the Burns Detective Agency，and，frankly， I am in possession of absolutely no information which will，in any way， discredit the testimony of these operatives．The reports of the operatives were apparently made to Reppert or Higgins and not to the Division Office in any sense of the word．In fact，we had no contact with the operatives at all．This was strictly a matter between the Kansas City，Missouri Police Department and the Burns Detective Agency，however，I recall in conversation I believe with Special Agent Trainer of the Kansas City Office，who was familiar with this entire case that he indicated that he bed some informal－ cion developed by these operatives，which had come to light long since my transfer from Kansas City，which did indicate that they knew that Pretty Boy Floyd was involved in the massacre．If such was the case，I presume this information was passed on to the Kansas City Police Department and they，therefore，also had knowledge of this fact．I am confident that this matter received the investigative attention of one or two field offices and that there is a report on fie，particularly dealing with the latter phase of this case，in the Kansas City and Chicago Offices and，possibly，
in other Offices. If such is a fact, this is the only information wich I can recall which would in any way tend to discredit the teatimon of the operatives and, possibly, refute the contention of Mr. Reppert and others that they were assisted in this case. Accordingly, to my knowledge, they at no time advised the Kanaas City Office of information to the effect thet they knew Floyd was mixed up in this case, if wy recolleotion in this matter is correct.

I am aware of the Division's attitude with respect to the Burns Detective Agency, namely, that contscts with this atency be restricted as far es it is possible to do a and, frankly, atate thatin connection with the Kansas Gity case, no contact whetsouver was had by any representative of the Kansas City Division Office with any member of the Burns Agency during the time I was there.

Dear Sir：
With reference to Bureau letter dated February 9， 1935 in regard to the above entitled case，please be advised that under date of February 15， 1935 Special Agent J．K．Collins interviewed Dr．Roy C． Costello at East Liverpool，Ohio relative to the examination of the body of Floyd．

Upon occasion of this interview Dr．Costello advised agent that there Wis absolutely no indication of a gunshot round in the left shoulder of subject Floyd at the time he examined him．Dr．Costello stated that when subject＇s body was taken to the funeral parlors he had looked at the body，making a aperficial examination at this time．Because of the large number of people collected there he had not，at this time，made any post mortem but instead had left the premises，advising those in charge to notify him when they were ready for the post mortem to be made．When so notified and upon returning，Dr．Costello stated that Dr．Miscall was in the midst of his examination as to the outward appearance of subject＇s body，dictating his findings to an assistant who was present．

With regard to the fact that a review of the findings made by himesif and Dr．Niskall failed to indicate whether a gunshot wound ap－ peared in subject＇s left shoulder，Dr．Costello advised that these findings represented only the positive facts brought out by the examination．He stated further that he had since talked with Dr．Niskali concerning this matter and it was also that Doctor＇s opinion that there were no scars at all appearing on subject＇s left shoulder indicating a possible gunshot wound．

Dr．Miscall，at the present time，is at the Tulane University ${ }^{\text {at }}$ ， Medical School in New Orleans，Louisiana taking a post－graduate course end will be at that University until the latter part of March，1935．A copy of this letter and bureau latter dated February 9， 1935 are being forwarded to the New Orleans office and it is suggested that Dr．Edward \％．Miskein be interviewed．

In reference to the conference at St. Louie, IIO., between U.S. Attorney Gilligan of Kansas City, and Special Agent s in Charge Reed Vetterli, Gus T. Jones, the writer, end Special agent Trainer, when it was suggested that those in attendence prepare a memorandum of their recollection of conversetions had with members of the Kansas City, Mo, police Department, the following information is submitted covering my recollections of such conversations:

On the morning of June 18, 1933 Special Agents in Charge Reed Tetter li, Gus T. Jones, and the writer, proceeded to the Kansas City, lo. Police Departrent for the purpose of conferring with Eugenetreppert, Comisaioner of Police, in connection with the investigation to develop the identity of those responsible for the Union Station leassecre.

Reppert was located in the office of Chief of Detectives T.J. Higgins, and both Eiegins and Reppert were present during this conference. After the usual Greeting, Reppert stated minis is some mess you have gotten us into," or words to that effect. He also mentioned the fact that two of their men were killed while only one Bureau Agent was killed, and made the remark This is a Government case and not a police matter." There was al so some discussion by him in which he amplified upon this statement, the general tenor being that the Government had brought then into this, and while they were willing to render what assistance they could, he was very definite in indicating the this was not police ratter. Before the conference ended, Reppert indicated by his remarks the he wished us luck in the investigation, but the whole tenor of his conversation was indicative of the fact that he had made un his rind that this was not a ce se for the Kansas City Police to pursue in a vigorous manner, it being the impression of the writer that he intended to assume a more or less wand of ft policy and let the Federal authorities carry on the burden of the investigation.

After leaving the conference, the three of us expressed great astonishrient at Reppert's attitude and Special Agent in Charge Tones and the writer comented to SAC Yetterli at the time that we could not understand Reppert's attitude, particularly in view of the fact that two police officers had been killed and that the offense necessarily wald be a State charge of murder.

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Between four and five days after this conference, I talked with acting Lieutenent B. FixThurman (former Chief of Detectives) of the Fensas City Folice Departient, with Fhor I had been acQuainted for e nuiber of years, and who has always rendered excellent cooperation to the Bureau. On this occasion, Thurman irformed me that he would like to render what assistance he could but that he was not authorized by his Chief, meaning Reppert, to work on this case. He stoted, however, he wishod to essist the Governaent and would be willing to cooperete. He made it strictly understood, horever, that he did not wish any information that he wes working on the cese to get back to Reppert or H1ggins.

Thurrian thereafter accomenied the writer on this cese for a period of two or three dayb, and also assisted Special Agent in Charge Brantley, and Special Agent Brennan. I was accompanied by Thurran and threo detectives assigned to his Squed, known as "The Hot Shot Squad," at the time the resicence of Vemon Miller was loceted at 6612 Edgevele Road. The three detectives, I believe, were \#etkins, Beatty, and Ghent, who worked under direct orders of Thwrean.

Thuman end the writer rade arrangenta with a neighbor directiy acrose the street fron the iililer resicence to enable the Rureau to keep a survelllance over the l:iller home at 6612 Edgevale Road. As I recall, at the tire, according to inforration firnished by Thurman, there mas considerable ill feeling between the Chiet of Police, Fansas City, on the one side, and Cormissioner Reppert and Fiegins on the other, end Thurran mentioned somethirg to me about beine authorized to work on the case by the Chief, and further that whatever political animosity had arisen between the tro fections that if the Chief came out on top, Thurwan wuld be assured backing in the Police Departrent. I also recall that hementioned to me that he could trust the three ren in his squad, whose names are listed herein. This, I inferred, reant that he felt they wold not disclose the fact to his euperiors that he was working with the Bureau.

Thumen continued to work on this case for several daya until he wes called into Figgins office and wes told - Reppert hf issued instructions that he be discherzed.
