On August $18,19 L 2$ reporting agent contacted Examiner, Inmigration nd waturalization Service, Los Angeles, at wich time he advised that STEStR was petitioning for eitisenstip on fuguet 20 , 1942 ; however, that it mould likely be a period of six monthe before he actually cane we for admission as a citizen of the united States. 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On Septenber 17, 1942 the vriter interviewed Source ${ }^{\circ} 1970$ time agent was informed trint
services for the German army; that same had been done either to the German COnsul, GEORGE GYSSIING, or to F. A: GEBHAIDE, attomey for the Consul. This source also recalled that on one occasion some years ayo GWHADN rad acted as attorney for SJEBER.

Continuing, this saurce stated that neither SIEBCR nor DIETRICH: had ever made any statements in the presence of this informant indicating, that they vere Nazis or even pro-Geman. However, infomant stated that both SIESER and DIETRICH continually were "digeing" by making sarcastic remarks against the English. DIETRICH would say trat no Englishman could go on bond tours throughout the country because Americans hate them. SIEBER was of a like mind. In fact, of later inf ormant said SIEBER insisted in waving the American flag. STEBER was if described as the Prussian type of Gernan as is also DTETRTCF. As such they think that their people are right. However, informant made it clear that it mas not believed that either SIEDER or DIETRICH were engaged in any activg proriotion of the welfare of Germany. DIETRICH was described as being tof stupid to be a spy and SIEBER as beine afraid. Both SIETEF and DIETMICH A were believed by informant deep down to like the European ways of doing things. At the same time agent vas advised that DETRICH, after making her three-bond tours, has been greatly impressed br the adulation shown her and has taken a particular liking for this country which she did not have heretofore. Dhaing the time that SIEBER Was in Los Angeles he lived at DIETRICH'S home and informsnt stated JBAT GABIH, the French movie actor who is DIEIRIGH'S present consort, also was there most of the time. GrBII is subject of Los 1 Angeles file 100-6792 entitled "JEAN GABIN, with alias, Internal Security-F, This is in a closed status in the Los Angeles orfice.

With further reference to SIEBER Source fdvised that he is keepint company rith one a kussien who lives at the sane hotel 676 that SIESER inhatits, namely Fre Croydon Botel, New York City. us individuals in lew York rho could give authorative information about SEESER, Source $B D$ cuggested source felt that ne could be rolled on However, it is suggested thet of Source identity and suggestion not be revealed tol nection mith official inyestigations

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Jurkng the making of one picture DYSRTCH became enamored of MAYBE and their affair progressed to the extent that she persuaded manty to leave the Lorrisor agenay and be represented by hers, namely, FELDAN and BLUL, LORRISCN brought sust againet TAME,

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"The SIEBEES have lived at various places in Calif"ornta. One home was at the corner of Roxbury and Sunset Boulevard; in Beverly Hills; that was takien prior to 1934 and they lived there for sone si $x$ years. Then they took the hidion DivIES house at the Beach at Santa bonica and lived there approxieately a year. Then they moved to the COLLEEN! l.OOFE house in Belmar, where they lived for approximately a year and a half, and when hr. SIEBER had to go back to Europe for business reasons, Liss DIETEICH and their daughter moved to a smaller house. The only place they have lived on a permanent basis in America, since their first entry, has been in California, and the daughter has been here, except when the mother and father were on trips to Europa, almost continuously since 1931 .
"hiss DIETRICH first came to america and to Califormia in April of 1930 and stayed from April to Decenber; then $s$ he went back to Jerlin on a , vacation. In 1931 she came back to Califomia, in April, with her daughter, VARTA, and lived here until 1933. She then went to France with her daughter for a visit, in July 1933, returning to California in September, 1933, where the family resided until July, 1936. Liss DIFTRICH states that Lr. SIEBER first came to California the first part of 1932 , to the best of her knowledge and belief. He went back to Europe and returned to America in 1933 on a quota number. At no time between 1934 and 1939 was he out of the countryi long enourh to have kept him from becoming a citizen farept that he lost his catizenship time credit because in Noverber, 1937. when the family was preparing to return from a visit to France, England, and Switzerland, and had sailings" booked, AARIA, the daughter, became ill and the shipping companies would not permit her to have passage on any boat. 2r. and l.rs. SIEBZR canceled their sailing date twice, waiting and hoping that the daughter voulo be able to travel, but this was not the case and as Paramount was demanding her immediate return to meet a picture engagenent, and as there was no one to leave the child with in France, the only thing to do was for the father to remain with her. The SIEBERS considered having krs. SIEBER'S mother come from Berlin, but since she could not leave Germany i ithout giving up ail rights to her property that was deemed inadvisable, and Irs. SIEBER did not want her daughter to go to Germany as neither she nor lr. SIEBER had gone back to their native land since they had taken out quota numbers in America, so there was no choice but to have ir. SIESEf stay in France to take care of theix daughter. Both Lr. and Mrs. SIEBER received extensions on their re-entry permits, under their quota numbers.
"After finishing her Faramount picture, liss DISTRICN returned to France in 1938 for a vacation, and found her daughter ill again. -After a short stay in the South of France, where her daughter was under constant observation to try to ascertain the cause of her constant illnesses, they went to Paris, and the finest doctors there
and they started trese treatments, which caused LAFIA to show decided improvement immedately. The doctors inplored the mother and fathar not to take the child away from the treatnents given under their supervision. Once more extensions were given on the rementry permits for EARIA and Ir. SIEBER, and ISSS DIETRICH came back to America in November of 1938, with the doctors' pronise that if Ir. STEBER and bANIA would stay until January of 1930 , that the child could then be brought with safety to America, which he did merely and entirely because of the child's illness. is a matter of fact, when Lx. SIEBER'S absence from the countryw as explained to the proper authorities in Washinpton, although it is customary for a daughter not to be made a citizen until her father is made a citizen, this case mas so thoroughly understood by the "ashington authorities that the daughter was permitted to become a citizen; and remember, the only home that daughter has had in America has been in Culifornia.

"As stated above, kr. SIEBER first came to California in 1932 and then went back to continue his work for Paramount. in France, as he spoke very poor English and was much more valuable to the organization in Europe than he was in this country. In 1933 or 1934 when he came over under the quota, he came directly to California and again did not stay very long because he felt so out of place on account of his English, and because he had not risen high enough in his position with Paramount in France to obtain a good position here with the language handicap, and he went back to France merely with the purpose of making himself more valuable to the Paramount : organization, hoping to become important enough to make a place for himself in California. The latter part of 1934 he again returned to delifonia to his wife and family, and stayed. for a whole year, which extended into the yeartof 1935, during which time he made a picture with Dis DIETHICH, as assistant director, but this did not turn out so well because he was sensitive and felt that the supposed success he was having was because by that time kiss DIETRICH was a great star and he did not want to have his success attributed to 'pull', so gain he went back to Paris to work for Paramount, returning to California in December, 1935 to be with his family in their home, and also to straighten out the great trouble kiss DIETRICH had when it was found

Paramount he had always been in vary close touch with her business affairs, Paramount he had always been in very close touch with her business affairs,

He did not receive any salary during the var he was here End made a picture as assistant director because he did not wish to arouse antagonism and also he did not think it was fair to take money army from an American on the set, so he worked without compensation.

Mir. SIEGE left again for Europe in January, 1936 with $\overline{\text { iss }}$ DIETHC: because she had contracted to make the picture 'KIIGHT ITHOUT AR OUR' and he remained there then to get the company started for her ow productions, because she ranted to give him a chance to make his own pictures and get crit for his own undeniable ability. Later, as you recall, ir. Vow STerolSEHE had a nervous breakdown and since he was the center of the company from the directorial standpoint, they planned for Lir. SIEBER to $r$ turn to his home in California; this was in the fall of 1937. Then he was held up on account of the illness of the daughter, as given above.
"ami li and lr. SIEyBR did not get back to the United States until Fum, 1937 and by that tine $l$ iss Demacia was ready to go back to Europe, so she ret them in few York on their arrival in Jun of 1939, but by that tine she mas 'finished' in pictures in Hollywood, so thor said, and finding she could not get a commitment for a picture here, they vent back to france to monotint for 2 picture there, as she thought that if she made a smash hit in Fraceste would then be in demand amain in bollywood. Please understand that on this information she left for furniture, bank account, everything they had, in California, province conclusively that Cullifomia was still their horse. Dy the tire they arrived in France the var clouds fere becoming very orinous and hrs. SIEBER returned to the United States the first part of August rid s. SIESER returned on August 27, bringing LARTA with him, and they all cane out to the Coast.
there is, according $\hat{f}$, no income Europe, durine the times he was working for Parmount there and she advises that he got very little money for his work - possibly less than $\$ 50.00$ a week, American money - on Wich he had to pay french taxes and also from which he had to pay his livinc expenses, and the reason that there was no income ............ was probably that since his home is in Califomia and he, therefore, would be perritted to charge his living expenses in France as a business expense, after making that and other deductions, there would be no tax to pay. He was in France on a visitor's visa a nd had to live in hotels because, under French law, te could not om or lease even a simple apartment without being a resident of: Prance and he always gave there his howe as California. Also, since he: was in France on a visitor's visa, and the red tape there is even more strict. than it is here, had it not been that Paramount was a very powerful foreitn corporation he would not have been permitted to vork. Even his car, mich was given to him as a birthlay present, was in France on a 'trip ticket', whech means juct for temporary purposes, and it was later broueht back to California.

Wr. SIESER tried to obtain a position with Universal in California, but as his main capabilities are in connection with his expert knowledge of foreim lancueges and foreign distribution, and as Universal has no foreign department in California, they insisted that he po to New York City, where he has been employee by Dinversal since."


Hgent was adivisec in the course of his association ith DIMRICH and in several conversations with sizBer, that he had never heard cither of ther make any stiotements wich rould indicate that they were pro-Geman ard against this country.

Miss DEETRICH stated that ane had just recently returned from a bond selling tour of the United States and that on several occasions her husband, RUDOLFH SIMBER, had attempted to accompany her but had been barred from admittance to various locations because of the fact that he was an allen enemy. This condition has caused Miss Dithrach a great deal of worry she says, 30 immediately upon her return to boa Angeles, she telephonically contacted Inspector Indiction and Naturullation Service, Federal Building, Los Angeles, Galiforma. uss DLuMRTOH'S statement to Special Agent $\square$ mas that Inspector $\square$ told her "the case has been suspended by the F, B. $I_{*}$ " and that that agency was awaiting report from our New York office before proceeding with the case.

Hiss DIMTRLCH was informed by Special Agent $\qquad$ that such could not be the case, Inasmuch as the Federal bureau of Investigation did not grant or with old citizenship and that this function was the sole responsibility of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, Mise DIETRICH expressed disappolntaent, stating that she did not know where to turn for help or advice; that her husband's status was causing both him and her a great deal of concern and that she was of the frame of mind to call on President Rogsicvelf in an effort to obtain the true facts regarding the delay surrounding IUDOLFH SIEBER'S citizenship petition.

At the time of this conversation, Inspector .... stated that he had written a letter to the New York office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation requesting information rerarding the subject. (The report" of Special Agent dated Citober 9, 1942, at Los Angeles, it Califormia, set out leads for the New York Field Division and the local office of Immigration and Naturalization Service was advised of this fact in a letter dated January $14,2943$. )

Inspector $\longrightarrow$ volunteered the information to Special Agent as follows: Mour report is almost finished, we are waiting for your report, that is all that is holoing it up".

In response to her request, Special Agent telephonically contacted MAFLENE DIETRICH on March 25, 1943, at which time she was told again that granting of citizenship or withholding of same came under the jurisdiction of the Imrigration and Naturalization Service. Miss DIETRICH expressed disappointment and stated "I thought it was being suspended awaiting a report from ytir office", to wich she was told that any delay which had occurred was at the discretion of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and that any detailed information regarding this matter should be obtained from that governmental agency. Miss DIETRICH replied that she was of the opinion that there was nothing to do but wait.

This matter is being called to the attenfion of the Bureau, inasmuch as the possibility exists that 6 iss DIETRICH will coke this matter directiy to the President of the United States, FRANKLIN D ROOSEVELT. She mentioned that at the time of her departure for Europe several years ago, Treasury agents had impounded her baggage and jewels for federal taxes, at which time she personally called Secretary of the Treasury MORGENTHAU and had the matter adjusted to her entire satisfaction in an expeditious manner.

In view of the above, it is requested that the New York office give expeditious attention to the leads set out in the report mentioned in the body of this letter:
