Subject was arrested, together with her husband, Harry Fox, at El Paso, Texas, on August 22nd, 1921 for the theft of a Ford car, the property of John Barluform of Pueblo, Colo., which she had stolen and driven to Amarillo, Texas, where she was joined by her husband.

On August 25th, 1921, in accordance with the instructions of Assistant U. S. Attorney Elfers of El Paso, a complaint was filed before the U. S. Commissioner charging subject; J. E. Deverse and Harry Fox with violation of Section 3 of the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act, and they were held for appearance before the U. S. Grand Jury at Santa Fe, N. M. An indictment was returned against Edith Fox and Harry Fox by the Grand Jury at Santa Fe on March 6th, 1922, and on March 13th Edith Fox entered a plea of "guilty" and was sentenced to serve 60 days in jail and to pay the costs of the prosecution. Harry Fox was acquitted.

Edith Fox, together with Claude Parker, W. C. Parker, and Mrs. L. G. Whitten were apprehended by the Sheriff at Ferry, Oklahoma, on November 12, 1921, in possession of a Studebaker car, the property of Herman Schmolder of Peoria, Illinois, which was stolen on November 9, 1921. 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



My dear General Ridgley:

During our recent conferences in Washington, I mentioned to you about the possibility of my being reimbursed for some of the necessary expenses that I am put to incident to the Osage Murder Cases. The following are a few examples:

who was formerly connected with a beng of bank robbers in Cage County, but who is now helping in the investigation, has been deing me considerable good in locating witnesses and getting information generally for me. He and his family are very poor and they have an old Ford car, which he uses in driving from place to place on this work, and I have paid him some money out of my own pocket for gasoline and oil for his Ford. Nothing for his personal work. He is very faithful and willing and comes and goes for me at any time we ask him.

Another example is where respective withears: drive in for sonsiderable distances to see me and I take them to lamb or distance on the case may be-

Another instance, I hired a ford coupe for three weeks and have used it altogether on business connected with these cases and have not driven it for more than five miles for my own pleasure. As an example in using it, late Saturday ovening one of the agents and I had a call to go from Guthrie to Parhaska immediately, a distance of one hundred and twenty five miles, and if we had waited for the train, we could not have reconed there until about six Sunlay evening, but I took the car and drove over there Saturday evening, and was able to attend to the matter the first thing Sunday marning and returned to Gathrie Sunday night. Otherwise if we had made the trip by rail, we could not have gotten here before this, Honday afternoon, and we would have been unable to interfer vice the people we went to see. I was out the necessary gasoline and oil for the trip in addition to the rent of the car.

These are only some of the items that I have been out, but it will give you an idea of what they are. I, of course, can get a receipt of for the hire of the motmobile but sannot get areceipt from such people as they would immediately become suspicition, if saxed to sign any paper, and as for taking witnesses to lumb or such expenses as that, it is prectically impossible to do. Up to date, I have spent at least \$150.00 to \$200.00 of my own money solely for our interest is these marder cases.

When I see that such expenditures, that I have enumerated, are adventagious to us and have gotten good results, I have unhesitatingly paid them sycalf, but as the pork progresses and I see that such things are easing up all the time, I do not feel like paying this money out of my own pocket, if I am rightfully entitled to be reimbursed. If I could afford it, I would gladly do so and say notifing to the Department about it. I discussed this matter with the Surseu of investigation and was advised that they have a system of using "Blue Slips" for obtaining confidential information, but the Surseu is somewhat separate from us, and I was unable to understand just how to go shout it without receipts or instructions from you.

if there is any way by which I can be reimbursed for my expenditures up to date and know that the same will be taken care of in the future, I wish that you would advise me-

I can make an itemised statement of most of the expenditures and accepany same with my affidevit and the affidevit of one or more of the Special Agents, that the same has been truly spent, and that the same has been spent insident to these Government cases, but as I say in some instances, it will be impossible to furnish receipts.

I think that you will readily see, that after having made these expenditures without knowing whether I could get the money back, that I will mat spend any money foolisaly and for other than the good to be accomplished in these cases and in every instance the Special Agents working with me or Agent in Charge white will verify what I say, provided a verification is needed.

In the argument of the motion to stay the execution in the Edith Fox case, the Court took the view, and I think rightly, that it had authority to recall the Maristo at any time carring term time. The only proposition that I could use in argument was, that before the defendant sould ask for a re-hearing in the Court of Appeals, she or no must personally surrender to the authorities to abide the judgment in the first instance, and as notice for her motion for stay of execution had been served upon the United States Attorney or Mr. Ingraham, but at the hearing on the motion, the same was opposed by the Government, the Court thought that this would relieve her of that obligation.

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STATESMET OBTAINED FROM B. B. CRANE:

"Several days before Anna Brown was found murdered: I was at Earnest Burkhart's home. at Grayhorse. I recall that Dewey Selph. Clarence Bailey, Kelsey Morrison, Earnest Burkhart and several others were there. We were all drinking and we played indian Stud Poker. I was very drunk while we were playing poker: I don't remember the time of the night: Earnest Burkhart, Kelsey Morrison and Dewey Selph went into another room, and talked. Theh Deway Selph came back, and called me to one side and told me that Earnest Burkhart wanted Anna Brown bumped off and asked me what I thought of it and said our time would be made worth while. I told Dewey that kind of money wouldn't be any good to us. Dewey did not say any more and we went back to the poker game. Later on the game broke up, and Dewey Selph said to me come on, and he and I, Kelsey Morrison, marnest Burkhart and Clarence Bailey. went out and got in Marnest Burkharts Buick car and marnest Burkhart drove us to Pawhuska and stopped west of town near a bridge. When the car stopped Kelsey Morrison got out of the car, and walked away. I was drinking and paid no attention to what was said before Kelsey left the car. Kelsey was gone some time and came back in a car and in this car I remember seeing Anna Brown and another women that i paid no attention to and cant say who she was. I dont remember what was said but Melsey stopped his car and then drove on off and Harnest Burkhart followed. Earnest drove on to his home at Grayhorse. we got there some time about morning. We all got out and I layed down and want to sleep. Later Dewey Selph woke me up and Dewey. Clarence, Bailey, Earnest Burkhart and myself drove to Fairfax in Barnest Burkhart's Buick car and ate breakfast. + dont remember seeing Kelsey Morrison or anna Brown at Barnest Burkhart's house when I woke up, and we left for Fairfax some time later. I recall we all went to Grayhorse and saw some races. I remember seeing Bryan Burkhart at the races, and also Kelsey Morrison but dont remember seeing Anna Brown. After the race some time in the evening I remember that newsy, myself, Kelsey Morrison, Earnest Burkhart and Clarence Bailey, went to Earnest Burkhart's home and ate supper. This was

This was late in the evening. I tried to eat but got sick and vomited. Some time after supper, Marnest Burkhart, Clarence Bailey, Dewey Selph and I, In Earnest Burkhart's car, left Earnest's house, Kelsey Korrison was not with us when we left; when we got to Grayhorse which is a short distance from Earnest Burkhart's house, I saw Kelsey Morrison, Anna Brown and another man and woman that I dont remember sitting in a car in front of some store. Earnest Burkhart stopped his car near Kelsey's car and I paid no attention to what was said. but we then drove on and Kelsey with Anna Brown and the other two followed us. We drove down to P Fairfax. .. s stopped at Fairfax and Kelsey Morrison, anna Brown and the others drove up and stopped. Marnest Burkhart and Dewey Selph got out of our car and walked over towards Kelsie's car. Clarence Bailey and I remained in our car and I went to sleep. The next thing I remember I woke up and our car was in front of the hotel at Malston and Melsie Morrison's car with Anna Brown and the other two were at Ralston. We all got out of our car and went into the hotel. Clarence and I set down in the Lobby of the hotel and all the others left us and went some where in the hotel, ardept the man and woman whom I dont remember that was riding in Kelsie's car and they stayed in Kelsie's car. In a little while Clarence and I wanted a drink and was afraid to arink in the lobby so we went out and got in Larnest Burkhart's car and drank some whiskey which we hal, and I went to sleep. time later I dont know what time but around day light, marnest and Dewey came and got in the car an drove to Fairfax. I did not see Helsie and Anna Brown again. At Fairfax Jewey Selph took me to a hotel and put me to bed. This was in a rooming house close to the Depot. "hen I wake up I eat and later say Dewey, who was sitting in front of the place where I slept. I told bewey that I believed a would go to Denoya and see Albert Sturnson. I left Fair:ax in a bus going to Denoya. The next day I came back to Fairfax and met Deway and the next day I went to Ponca City. In about four or five days later I saw in the paper where they had found Anna Brown murdered. I have made the above statement of my own free will and accord. because I felt that the Government should know all the facts that I have told. B. B. Crane. Witnesses. F. S. Smith, J. A. street."

CONCERNING THE MURDER OF W. E. (Bill) SMITH ET AL.

Memorandum statement obtained from Mrs Margaret Mitchell (nee Himes)

by Special Agent, Eurphy.

STATEMENT OF MRS MITCHELL:

"That she came to Fairfax, Okla., during the Spring of 1921, and secured employment as a nurse in the Fairfax Hospital, where she worked until the sail of that year; that at that time her name was Margaret Himes, she having met and married a Jr. J. H. Mitchell at rairfax; that she was assigned to the case of ... H. "Bill" Smith on night duty; that during the time she was his nurse he never made any statements to her regarding who might be responsible for the dynamiting of his home, but that during his sleep he muttered several times various names which she was unable to understand, also he stated-"they got mita and now it looms like they have got me. " That he was afraid he might mention names while he was asleep, and upon wakening would at once ask her if he had mentioned any names during his sleep, and on being told he had not, would seem releaved. Mrs Mitchell also stated that she was not present when Bill smith made a dying statement, as she was asked to leave the room by Dr. Shoun, and the only ones present were Dr. Shoun and some attorneys, whom she did not know. Mrs Mitchell further stated that some time after Bill smith's death, she was asked by sr. Shoun to go to the home of Bryan Burkhart as nurse for Bryan, who was ill; that she refused to go, stating she would not nurse any Indians or stay in their homes, but finally agreed to take the case for one

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day only, until they could obtain another murse; that during the day she was there, Bill Hale, the Uncle of Bryan, visited him and she was asked to leave the room so they could talk, she going out on the porch and sit in the swing; that in a short time Bill Hale came out where she was and tried to engage her in conversation, finally asking her if Bill bmith had made a dying statement, to which she stated she replied to him - That if he did I would not be telling it. Mrs Mitchell is of the opinion that Bill Hale would like to get to her to secure any information which he thinks she may know."

Address Margaret Mitchell, Hamlin, Oklahoma, witness under surveillance Deputy Sheriff Hebler, who will keep agent advised of any change in her address.

POSSIBLE DEVELOPMENTS:

Through a confidential informant, one Henry Cornet was interviewed in County Jail at Anadarko, Oklahoma, where he is confined by the State of Oklahoma under charge of bank robbery, and stated as follows:

That he is in possession of meterial information relative Osage marders; that should he divulge such information at this time and his enemies in Osage Jounty through any means detect it, that they would use their exerted efforts to convict him in the cases in which he now stands charged and while he is confident of acquital when cases are tried pept. 17th. Jornet promised informant that after his trial that he would divulte all information in his possession and would aid and assist the Jovernment in the Osage matters.

The confidential informant has great faith in Cornet doing this. Cornet outlined to informant briefly some of the material facts in his possession, as follows:

"That sometime prior to the murder of Henry Hoan, Osage Indian, that Bill Hale, master mind suspect in Osage murders, and one Henry Grammer, now deceased, but then the king of liquor

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menufacturing and distribution, and a fence and protector for, and manipulator of the law violators of Osage District, were overheard plotting the murder of Henry Roan by a friend of Cornet. That their plot was to have Roan killed on Cornet's rangh to leave the impression that Cornet committed the murder: that repeatedly after their plans were laid that friends of Hale Grammer organisation circulated numerous reports that Roan and Cornet were bitter enemies, and that Hoan was going to kill Cornet and that general line of propaganda to impress the public of the animosity existing between Hoan and Cornet. That he, Cornet, knew three Indians who have material information relative to Usage murders and who he will cause to tell the whole truth; that he knows two men now in the Penitentiary at McAlester. who actually participated in the Usage marders. who he can cause to divulge the full truth."

It is a developed fact that just prior to the Roan murder in Jan. 1925 and at the time of Anna Brown's murder in 1921, that Jornet, Grammer and other suspects in Usage Murders, were an organized gang of high powered criminals and knew the heart beat of each other, which justifies anticipated results from Cornet, as he unquestionably has information of interest.

AGRIT'S HOTES:

For the information of the Bureau, copies of all reports of Special agents with reference to Osage marders up to Jan. 1925, were furnished United States attorney, Maurer, for the mestern district of Oklahoma. Recently Mr. Maurer advised Agents that all copies of the Osage cases mysteriously disappeared from his office and advances the theory that they were stolen. Since January at which time these agents were specially assigned to these investigations no copies of reports have been furnished the United States Attorney of this District, and will not be unless otherwise instructed. Under instructions

of Special agent in Charge, T. B. White, the original and two copies of all reports are furnished him, and by him sent Director of Bureau, and three copies retained in files of these Special Agents.

! PAIDAX AND VICINITY:

While Agent Davis was at the White Star Cafe at Fairfax conducted by one Mr. Franks, one Mr. Smith of Fairfax, whose son-in-law, a Mr. Denoya, owns a dray line at Fairfax, stated in conversation with agent Davis and Mr. Franks, that he Smith came to the Cases country in an early day and took contracts to dig water wells for the Osage Indians. Er. Smith stated that he knew all of the Osage Indians that had been murdered mentioning Anna Brown and Henry Roan, who had been murdered near Fairfax. Mr. Smith stated that he also knew the Bill Smith family whose house was blown up in Fairfax. killing wife of Bill smith who was a sister of Anna Brown and who was also related to the Osage Indian. Henry Roan. Mr. Smith stated that Bill smith, his wife and a servant girl was killed when the home was blown up. Mr. Smith further stated that it was thought that a rich ranchman was the master mind of all the three murders (but Kr. smith did not give name of rich ranchman) Mr. smith stated that these murders were being investigated by the Federal Government and detectives now and turning to agent Davis asked Davis if he was a detective and when being told by Davis that he was not a detective, Smith stated, * I guess I have said too much already for my son-in-law has told me not to talk for the bunch may bump me off if I did. ' Mr. smith stated he was 84 years of age and come from Canada at an early day. At the Wide Awake Filling Station located about 6 miles east of rairfax and on the Fairfax and Pawhuska Road, this station is conducted by a man and his sister and the mail box shows the name of Bert. white in conversation with the lady who waited on us she informed us that the ranch across the road from their filling station belonged to Bill Hale and she asked agents if we were thinking of locating in that vicinity, on being informed that we were looking around for a loostion stated that Bill Hale was not a very good neighbor as he controlled every thing around there, that he, Bill Hale, owed them an account of 50.00 that they had purchased an old house from Bill Hale that stood in his pasture across the road from their filling station , that they offered him 10.00 for this old house and that Hale said that he would let it rot down before he would take \$10.00 for it, but finally agreed to take \$25.00 for the house. that they agreed on the price and they moved the house overothe filling station, that later they sent Hale a bill for the balance due them, that Hale then sent them a bill for \$250.00 claiming that they owned him that

amount for things that they had bought from him at different times. This lady stated that she and her brother did not owe Hale five cents but that Hale did owe them, stating that is just the kind of man Hale is, that it was reported and generally known that Hale had had an Osage Indian woman murdered and that this woman's bodywas found not far from their filling station and that also there was an Osage Indian man killed and his bedy found in a pasture near Fairfax, that there was a house blown up in the town of rairfax killing a man, his wife and a servant girl. This lady further said that Hale owned and controlled about 50,000 acres of land near their filling station, that sometime ago he, Hale, had the grass on this land insured for a dollar an acre or \$30,000.00. She further stated that he. Hale, had his cow boys to go around and set fire to this grass at night and that every acre insured was burned off and that he. Hale, had collected the \$30,000.00 Insurance. This is about all this lady mentioned in regard to Hale, as at this time a car drove up and we had to move out to let the other car in. The above conversations quoted are merely to show what is generally known in the vicinity of rairfax and were voluntarily on the part of the people quoted. No accept if the lady and her brother who own and operate the Wide Awake Filling station on the road between Fairfax and Pawhuska were interviewed by an agent of this Department, who is not under cover, might be able to throw some light on this case, and if not on the murder cases, information may be obtained as to Hale having his pasture set fire for the insurance as this is a prarie country and only a barb-wire fence and a road between the residence of the owners of the filling station, they undoubtedly saw the fire and may have seen men setting fire to the grass as

AT RALSTON AND VICISITY:

Agent Parker and wren visited and stayed all night at the Jones Hotel at Palston a short distance from Fairfax, Agent Davis remaining at Fairfax. The proprietor of the Jones hotel is a man named John Holder, he stated to the above named agents that he had lived in the country for about thirty two years, that he had been running the hotel for about two years, that the hotel was owned and ran previously be his step father who died about two years ago. In a general conversation with Mr. Holder in regards to investments eto he stated that the country in the vicinity of Fairfax and malston was owned and controlled by a group of men and the leading character of the bunch was named Bill Hale. John Holder further stated that all of the hi-jackers, boot-leggers etc had married Indian

they could see for a number of miles.

women and had obtained by marrying said Indian women the royalty and income of their oil and lands. Holder appeared to agents by his actions to know or to have been next to the Rale gang activities, and at a proper time we are of the opinion that Holder should be interviewed by an agent that is not under cover, in reference to Osage murders frauds etc. as reports made by other agents shows that the Jones Hotel was visited by Anna Brown and Bryan Burkhart on the night that anna Brown was murdered. On the same block due west of the Jones Hotel at Ralston is the restaurant where Anna Brown and her party stopped and got sandwiches on the night of the murder. This restaurant is owned and operated by a man named Bob MoSpadden who was also running this place at the time this party bought the sandwiches. Reports read by these agents does not show that Bob McSpadden was ever interviewed and agent Frank Smith stated to these agents that lk Spadden has never been interviewed-working in this restaurant is McSpedden's wife and daughter, the daughter being acting waitress and the wife doing the cooking.

AT SHIDLER AND VICINITY:

While at Shidler. Agents Wren and Parker stopped at the Broadway rooming house, which is operated by John Gregg. wife and daughter. Agents had a lengthy conversation with John Gregg far into the night. In the course of conversation Gregg told agents that the prohibition officers had recently been in ahidler and vicinity conducting raids, searching men and women at dances for liquor. Gregg said that the officers in Shidler were a sorry lot. that some ofthem would arrest a man if they smelled whiskey on his breath and that another officer would either put a small falsk in his pocket or swear that he had taken the flask off of man arrested. White talking to Gregg about conditions of the country he informed us that sometime ago some men had learned that a \$200,000.00 pay roll was in one of the banks at Pawhuska, that these men got into the bank drilled a hole in the safe and put in a charge of nitro-glycerine and touched same off and after the explosion they discovered that they had put in too much and had blown the safethrough the wall and had jammed the door so it couldn't be opened and that they had to beat it. Greeg further stated it didn't take much nitro to blow a safe that these men were green at the business. Greeg stated that he had seen many oil wells shot with nitro. Gregg stated that nitro was a very powerful explosion and that sometime ago some one blew up a house in Fairfax with nitro-glycerine killing several members of the family and completely wrecking the house-Gregg did not mention whose house it was, who blew it up or no names mentioned for at this point of conversation Gregg was interrupted by a man who came into hotel to

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
