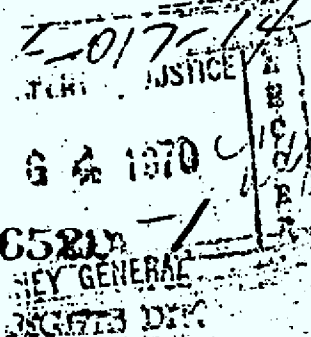
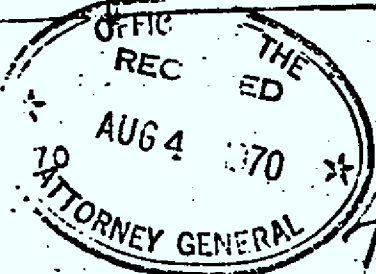

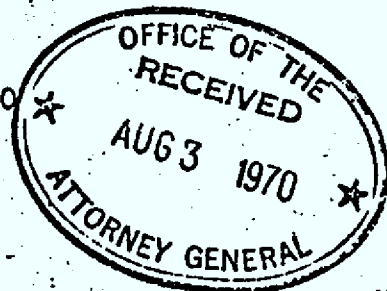

A characterization of the Black Panther Party will be found in the Appendix, attached hereto.

On the afternoon of July 29, 1970, THOMAS VAUGHAN, Chief of the Hartford, Connecticut, Police Department, issued a statement to the press and to the public via radio and television that his men would be armed with shotguns that evening, and that they had orders to use them if necessary to protect themselves and the lives and property of residents of the North End of Hartford. He requested residents of that area to stay off the streets. Reports of developing trouble were received during the press conference. A former Hartford police officer [REDACTED] was acquitted of manslaughter in Superior Court in Hartford that afternoon. He had been charged with killing a Puerto Rican youth April 1, 1970, during a high-speed chase. The acquittal was unpopular with the Puerto Rican community, and they vowed vengeance.

Disorders Damages Worst Yet

Damages incurred in five days of disturbances in Hartford are expected to exceed \$1.5 million, police reported today.

The estimate was made as police and fire officials began inspecting the disorder torn areas of the city and compiling a list of damages.

The damage report is expected to be completed by the end of this week.

If the \$1.5 million figure holds true, this year's disturbances will go down in record as the most serious in Hartford history.

Last September's disturbances have held the dubious record. Ninety-seven businesses were burned and looted and damages then totaled \$1.3 million.

Three hundred and twelve persons were arrested in connection with this year's disturbances. Of those, 16 were juveniles, police said.

Most of the juveniles—persons under 16 years of age—were arrested on charges of looting, breaking and entering and throwing stones and bottles at police, according to Lt. James M. Jordan, head of the Juvenile Division of the Hartford Police Department.

"On the other hand," Jordan said, "we have not had one juvenile arrested for curfew violation."

The most serious juvenile arrest of the past five days took place early Sunday morning, he said, when a 14-year-old Black Panther Party member was arrested on charges of conspiracy to commit murder, possession of

APPENDIX**BLACK PANTHER PARTY, aka
Black Panther Party for Self-Defense**

According to its official newspaper the Black Panther Party (BPP) was started during December, 1966 in Oakland, California, to organize black people so they can take control of the life, politics and the destiny of the black community. It was organized by BOBBY GEORGE SEALE, BPP Chairman, and HUEY P. NEWTON, BPP Minister of Defense. NEWTON is presently serving a sentence of two to fifteen years on a conviction of manslaughter in connection with the killing of an Oakland police officer.

The official newspaper, "The Black Panther," which further describes itself as the "Black Community News Service," stated that the BPP advocates the use of guns and guerrilla tactics in its revolutionary program to end oppression of the black people. Residents of the black community are urged to arm themselves against the police who are consistently referred to in the publication as "pigs" who should be killed.

"The Black Panther" issue of September 7, 1968, contains an editorial by BPP Minister of Education, GEORGE MASON MURRAY which ends with the following:

"Black Men. Black people, colored persons of America, revolt everywhere! Arm yourselves. The only culture worth keeping is revolutionary culture. Change, Freedom everywhere. Dynamite! Black Power. Use the gun. Kill the pigs everywhere!"

Included in the introduction to an article appearing in the October 5, 1968, edition of "the Black Panther" is the statement, "...We will not dissent from American Government. We will overthrow it."

Issues of the "Black Panther" regularly contain quotations from the writings of Chairman MAO Tse-tung of the People's Republic of China and feature MOA's statement that "political power grows out of the barrel of a gun."

The national headquarters of the BPP is located at 3106 Shattuck Ave., Berkeley, California. Branches have been established at various locations throughout the United States.

Gonzalez Death Report Stirs Criticism of Police

By W. EDWARD WENDOVER

The Greater Hartford chapter of the Connecticut Civil Liberties Union and a Hartford minister have criticized Hartford police for their activities during city disturbances last summer. The police "were particularly criticized for their involvement in the death of Efrain Gonzalez, which was investigated by the state coroner."

In a report released Wednesday, State Coroner Irving L. Aronson absolved Hartford police of criminal responsibility in the fatal shooting of Gonzalez on July 31, but said the shot that struck Gonzalez in the chest was fired by a policeman. Aronson also recommended that lawmen discontinue the use of shotguns as mob control weapons.

"This (coroner's) report indicated the lack of organization and administration in the Hartford police department," the Hartford CCLU chapter said in a statement released Friday.

"It was the general opinion of the community leaders that police department officials have very poor control of officers in the street during times of crisis," the statement said.

The CCLU statement also criticized police for making no public announcement of any investigation into the Gonzalez death.

"We are against indiscriminate use of shotguns by police," the CCLU statement said. "Violence begets violence—there will be an equal reaction from the people on the streets."

"We note the escalation of violence each summer," the CCLU said. "What is the City Council going to do to try and preclude this type of thing next summer?"

The CCLU statement also said some people believe the police department control of annual

tion and firearms by policemen

on the streets is lax. "This indicates negligence and poor administration," the CCLU statement said.

Minister Criticizes

The Rev. Charles Pickett, an Episcopal minister to the Spanish-speaking community, also criticized the coroner's findings. "The (coroner's) report is not only strange it's downright shocking," Pickett said.

"One can hope and pray that responsible citizens will not accept this report as final but that they will demand an impartial, thorough and proper investigation of the whole matter," Pickett said.

"I urge all those who value law and order with justice to protest (this report) in a legal, peaceful, and non-violent manner," Pickett said.

"No one can be safe on our streets until this is clarified," he said. "It's not merely a matter of black people and Puerto Ricans in the North End."

"Had the victim been a prominent citizen, one suspects the report would have been quite different," Pickett said. "Mr. Gonzalez's crime was that he was a Puerto Rican on the wrong street in the wrong city at the wrong time," he said.

According to a report pre- pared by the clinic, the pro- gram's 1970-71 budget is about \$35,000 and only \$10,000 of that comes from the state. The state also provides office space at the UConn Law School in West- Hartford and use of telephones which associate professor Jo- seph Harbaugh, director of the clinic, estimates at an addition- al \$1,250 a year. The remaining \$25,000 comes from a Ford Foundation grant.

As for the governor's apprais- al of the program as nothing more than an agency to attack governmental institutions, the clinic personnel feel this shows Gov. Meskill really hasn't stud- ied their program.

300 Cases Handled
The report prepared by the clinic showed that 300 cases had been handled since the begin- ning of the school year in Sep- tember.

Of that number, five cases in- volved challenges of federal, state or municipal ordinances.

In April, clinic representatives served as co-counsel for the state statute and the Anti-Air- craft Conspiracy, an an- tiwar group trying to get a per- mit to use Bushnell Park for a rally. City officials tried to block the rally but a U.S. Dis- trict Court ruled in favor of the demonstrators and stated that the city officials were violating the first Amendment's rights by trying to stop them.

Later in the year, a man was arrested for waving a Viet Cong flag at a demonstration when Vice President Agnew came to Hartford. The man was charged

with drawing money. Fitzgerald's letter to the gov- ernor also cited the cost of the state at \$100,000, the same fig- ure the governor used in his budget message, which Sacks- end Harbaugh say is way off. Fitzgerald said that by the state funding the program, "we are sowing the seeds of our own destruction."

Fitzgerald and representa- tives of the clinic have opposed each other several times. While Harbaugh will point to the small number of constitu- tional cases actually handled, no one at the clinic uses that re- cord to defend their actions in those five "unpopular" cases. "The government should have interest in seeing the Constitu- tion upheld," said legal intern Atty. Steve St. Clair.

"It's become unpatriotic to defend the Constitution," stu- dent Ellen Lubell said with a look of bewilderment and dis- gust.

The small number of civil rights actions are complement- ed by a large number of cases on behalf of prisoners. More than half the clinic's cases involve counseling those challenging convictions, motions protesting the type of imprisonment and other cases dealing with con- victs.

All cases handled by the clinic, both civil and criminal in- volve those who can't afford a lawyer. It's a service those at the clinic feel is sorely needed because of the work load facing public defenders and neighbor- hood legal services.

Only 4 per cent of those repre- sented by the clinic have had to go to jail and in 65 per cent of their cases charges have been nolledd, according to the clinic report.

As for the educational benefit, the students feel they are get- ting experience they could never get in a classroom; experi- ence that will be vital after graduation.

But the program has a great- er value to the students, accord- ing to Miss Lubell, in that it sensitizes them to the problems of the poor.

Atty. Marjorie Gelb, a legal intern, agreed. "A lot of stu- dents have told me they weren't interested in this type of work before but now they think it's important."

Harbaugh denied that any stu- dent was drawing money.

Shotgun Use By Police Is Supported

Both the Hartford city manager and the police chief back the continued use of shotguns by police in "grave" situations, despite criticism from the Hartford County coroner.

"I will continue to authorize the use of shotguns but only under grave circumstances," said City Manager Elisha Freedman, reacting to a suggestion from Coroner Irving L. Aronson that use of shotguns to quell riots be discontinued.

Aronson, earlier this week, absolved the Hartford police of any criminal responsibility in the shotgun killing of Efrain Gonzales, 23, a north end man shot to death by police fire July 31 during Hartford disturbances.

He said the pellets that killed Gonzales were fired from a police shotgun while Gonzales walked peacefully along Seyms Street with his brother.

Aronson, in recommending that shotguns not be used, cited the wounding of an 11-year-old girl who was shot in the arm after pellets came through her window in the north end during the same disturbances. He said a shotgun has a spraying effect, scattering 200 bullets in a single blast.

Police Chief Thomas J. Vaughan, concurring with Freedman, said he would use shotguns again "if the situation called for it."

"When the lives of your officers are in danger, and they must protect their own lives from snipers, then they will have shotguns."

Both the city manager and chief expressed concern for the safety of innocent persons but neither saw any other

means of controlling a riotous situation.

Freedman said he would authorize only the use of birdshot for the shotguns, a milder ammunition than some other pellets.

At normal times, the manager said the shotguns "are under lock and key" at police headquarters.

He said several other metropolitan cities have taken to the use of shotguns "at any time" but that he did not foresee a similar occurrence in Hartford.

"Who would have thought we'd come to this?" Freedman asked to no one in

particular, circling his cluttered desk at City Hall.

Hartford policemen normally are armed with .38 caliber revolvers.

A Hartford police union, which represents some 400 policemen, referred to Gonzales' death as "a tragic thing."

But, said Det. William L. Kearns, "the police are trying to protect themselves and the city."

Shotguns, Kearns said "have a psychological affect" on rioters.

"I think that just the sight of a shotgun being raised will stop bottle throwing and sniper fire during disturbances," Kearns said.

The detective admitted the shotgun's spraying effect but he, too, saw no other way to protect the city in a riot.

Meanwhile, the Gonzales' estate has instituted legal action against the city as has a North End woman who claimed she was slightly wounded from shotgun fire while sitting in her living room.

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
