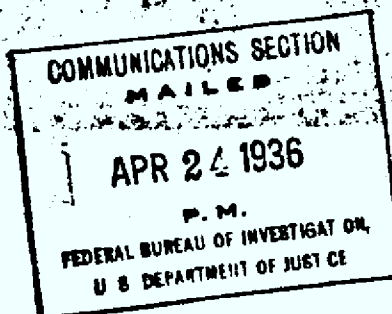
Dear Mr. Hanson:

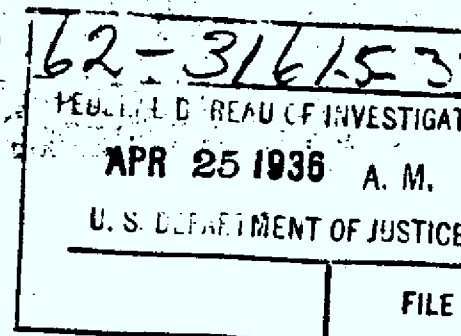

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON

Mr. Earl Collier dropped by the office this morning and just prior to his call Mr. Gruenwald telephoned and wanted to know if it would be possible to get a special photograph of the Director sitting at his desk to be used in connection with the advertisement being published in connection with Collier's script. I advised him that I would gladly convey this request to the Director upon his return to the city, and later on Mr. Collier called by the office and stated you had already furnished him with one picture but that he had seen a photograph of the Director in a different pose which he liked far better and was wondering whether he could secure one of these. Necessary arrangements were made through Miss Shaeffer to furnish him with the photograph.

Mr. Collier then wanted to know when the Director was returning to the city, stating that the newspaper men here in Washington were not really getting any kind of a break on the Karpis case inasmuch as press conferences were being held all over the country by the Director and he stated Walter Winchell had a special column in this morning's paper of an excellent story concerning various things Karpis stated to the Director and what the Director stated to Karpis. He then stated that the newspaper men that covered the Bureau in the past were not getting any breaks on the case and that from his way of looking at it there would be very little to give out upon the Director's return. He, also, stated he thought upon the Director's return to the city he should hold a press conference. I asked Mr. Collier if he had ever been forgotten by the Director and he stated he had not, and I assured him he knew Mr. Hoover well enough to know that all press representatives regardless of where they were located would be treated fairly and squarely.

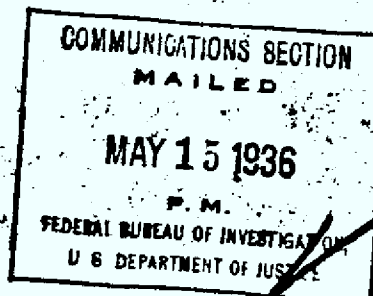

### Hoover's Herring

After a first burst of activity, in which they were publicised as America's saviours from gangdom, little has been heard of the progress of the much-boasted, much-filmed "G-men" (Federal police agents) organised and headed by Washington's Edgar Hoover.

After they had been equipped with weapons equal to those used by the gangsters, big things were expected of them. They earned much praise as the alleged slayers of John Dillinger, former Public Enemy Number One, but it was not long before whispers began to be heard that credit was due, not to Hoover's "G-men" but rather to the efforts of an ordinary Chicago "cop."

Since that date, the whole of the United States has been wondering why, apart from a few comparatively unimportant and easy captures, the Federal "dicks" have been unable, for instance, to trail present Public Enemy Number One, Alvin Karpis, crack sub-machine gun operator, bank robber and reputed slayer of a number of people.

For two or three years now, gangster Karpis has been at large, but apart from occasional newspaper reports, which always turn out to be false, to the effect that the slayer has been located in a farmhouse, is surrounded and about to give in, he appears to have gone his quiet way unchecked.

Last week, in Washington, G-man Hoover had a new excuse to offer for

the failure of his tough young men. In the days before they were equipped with sub-machine guns, automatics, tear gas bombs and fast automobiles, he was able to point out that they hadn't a chance against the enemies of society. Now they have these and other armaments and still do not meet with much success,

he has had to think up another. It came last week thus:

"It has been learned that 'certain equipment' in firearms affording a greater velocity and greater penetration power than the current type is being manufactured for the use of gangsters.

"It is such a menace that millions of dollars' worth of equipment purchased by the law-enforcement agencies in this country, including our department—such as bullet-proof vests and shields used in approaching houses during raids—will be absolutely useless against the high-powered equipment and ammunition about to be put on the market.

"We have found that in the eastern quarter a number of underworld characters have special armoured cars. We recently seized one in Boston. It is completely armoured, and was made so that the rear window could be opened and machine guns pushed through to fire at pursuing cars. These cars are not only steel in construction, but they also have armoured glass that will resist even machine gun bullets."

Continued Public Protector Number One: "The Federal agents ('G-men') are experimenting with new equipment, including a powerful type of armoured car to be used in the war against the most desperate and heavily-armed criminal gangs."

Not so easily impressed by G-man Hoover's fireworks, a number of people recalled that as long ago as 1930, Alphonse Capone, then Underworld King, now languishing in the island prison of Alcatraz (CAVALCADE, February 22, see Crime) for income-tax evasion, had just such a car as Hoover described, and that Federal agents had, during the six succeeding years, had plenty of time to secure similar weapons.

Sharp critics went even further to say that Hoover's present move was merely another red herring to throw off the scent a number of keen-nosed officials who see in the Department of Justice only a new and brilliant way of wasting public money.

Meanwhile, in the Underworld, Anna Sagen, "the woman in red," former "moll" of the late John Dillinger, created a sensation (1) by returning to America from Czechoslovakia, her native country, whither she fled after betraying the Public Enemy to Chicago policemen (CAVALCADE, February 8, see Foreign Affairs, Czechoslovakia), (2) by revealing for the first time how she "informed" on the King of Crime. She did this in order to avoid deportation back to Czechoslovakia.

"I first met Dillinger 10 days before his death," she told New York police. "He was introduced to me as Jimmy Lawrence. I discovered who he was one day when he was reading a newspaper and showed Polly Hamilton, a friend of mine, a picture, saying, 'They've put me somewhere else to-day.' I looked at the picture. It was Dillinger.

"I got scared and went to Police Sergeant Martin Zarcovitch. I also mentioned my deportation trouble. 'We will take care of that,' he said. I told him Dillinger would probably take me to a movie on Sunday night. I would wear a hat if we were going any distance, and would be bare-headed if we were going to the Biograph Cinema, where Dillinger's favourite film star, Myrna Loy, was appearing.

"We went to the Biograph Cinema, and when we came out I was shoved aside and shooting started. I had no idea they were going to shoot Dillinger like that. I thought they were going to arrest him."

Anna Sagen has now appealed to Secretary of Labour Florence Perkins to reconsider the decision to deport her once more.

## 150,000 AMERICAN MURDERERS GO FREE

ARMY OF CRIMINALS  
ROAMING COUNTRY

"G-MEN" CHIEF AND  
DOOMED CITIZENS

FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT

WASHINGTON, Friday.

About 150,000 murderers are roaming the United States, according to Mr. Edgar Hoover, head of the special force of G-Men organised by the Government to fight the gangster menace.

"Walking the streets of the towns of America," he declared in an address here to-night, "are 300,000 citizens unaware that they are doomed to die at the hands of murderers."

He asserted that one out of 25 persons in the United States was inclined to criminality. If the criminal world were to marshal its forces, he continued, they would "tramp ceaselessly past, hour upon hour, in daylight and darkness, and back to daylight and darkness again, 10 or 20 abreast."

"An army of criminals could be collected before which America would fall in a few hours."

Urging all citizens to declare war on crime, Mr. Hoover declared that the enforcement of law was prevented by those politicians who had criminal associates. Citizens paid a personal tax of £24 a year for the privilege of living in a country which each year saw

12,000 murders;  
47,000 criminal assaults;  
280,000 burglaries;  
750,000 larcenies; and  
300,000 motor-car thefts.

In every large city there were numerous lawyers who made their living by defending men they knew to be guilty.



# Passport Trap for Capone's Tutor

*London Express*  
Arrested Before Flight to Britain

*From Our Own Correspondent*

NEW YORK, Thursday.

The famous "G men" of the Department of Justice now have a stranglehold on the principal gangsters of the United States.

**C**HARLES LUCKY LUCIANO, racketeer millionaire, is in New York prison awaiting trial. Attorney-General Cummings has put a price of £1,000 on the head of Alvin Karpis, wanted for the kidnapping of the millionaire Edward Bremer, and a third gangster, John Torrio, known as "Tutor Extraordinary" to Al Capone, is in the same gaol that holds Luciano.

Torrio, who was ready to flee the country with a fortune of £2,000,000 in United States Government securities, and who was captured yesterday, owed his downfall to the close co-ordination now existing between the Government departments.

He had applied for a passport in Washington and booked a passage in the liner Empress of Australia, leaving Quebec next Sunday for Southampton.

## Wife Sees Arrest

The passport authorities warned the Department of Inland Revenue, and Torrio, who the "G men" allege has smuggled foreign liquors into the United States with a fleet of speedboats, was lured to the post office at White Plains, where he lives, by a faked registered letter supposed to contain the passport.

When he arrived with his wife, two "G men" stepped up to the gangster, whispered in his ear, and carried him off by motor-car to New York.

The police believe Torrio is the head of a syndicate composed largely of "prominent business men."

## Police Chief's Greeting

They also state that he has been visiting Capone's wife each month and giving her large sums of money.

Torrio, who came to the New York police headquarters yesterday, looked a very different man from the gangster of 20 years ago. Quietly dressed he appeared a well-to-do business man, and he expressed anger when Lieutenant Finn, who spent two years in tracking Hauptmann, looked up from his desk, and said pleasantly: "Hello, Johnny, it's a long time since I've seen you."

A letter addressed to "The man who is doing more than any other man to stamp out organized crime in the United States" without any city or other address has just been received from St. Louis, Missouri, by John Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

\*\*\*\*\*

The colored boys in Washington who are prone to play hunches in the numbers game are reported to have made a killing recently when they combined the numbers in connection with the days of the month on which the G Man apprehended a number of notorious kidnapers. Alvin Karpis was apprehended on May 1st; William Mahan and Harry Campbell were apprehended on May 7th, and Thomas H. Robinson, Jr., was caught on May 11th. 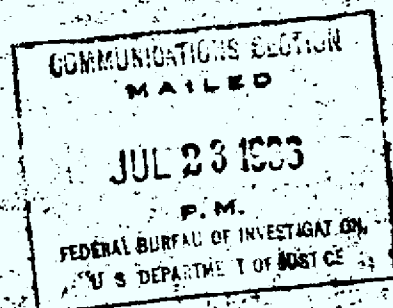

As I indicated in my letter, there had just opened in Los Angeles a picture called "Parole". On the night of June 20th, I attended the R.K.O. Theatre in Los Angeles for the purpose of seeing this picture, particularly to observe if any reference was made in it to you. I found that no such reference was made, but did find that at the entrance to the theatre there was a placard about 3x4 feet which was an exact copy of the advertisement that appeared in the local paper, which I sent to you with my letter of reference.

As I indicated in my night letter of June 20th to you, on the opposite side of this placard there was one of the same size containing an excerpt of one of Walter Winchell's columns about the mal-administration of the Parole System.

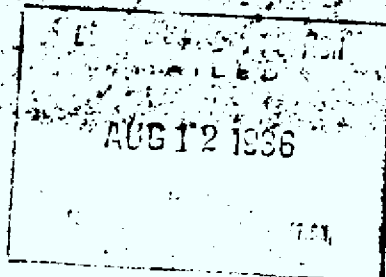
Dear Walter:

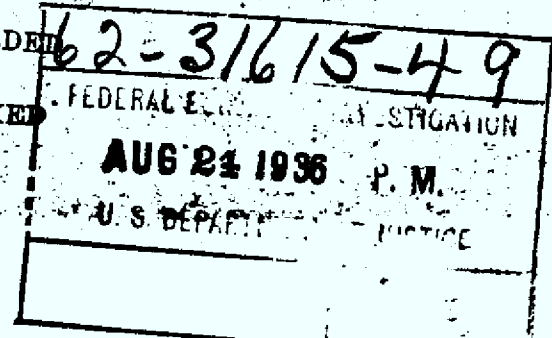

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON

Walter Winchell, in his broadcast on the Jergens' program last night, January 3, 1937, made, approximately, the following remarks concerning the Bureau:

Tacoma, Washington--The police and G-Men announce nothing new in connection with the Mattson kidnaping case. It is feared that the child may have been killed despite the assurance in the first ransom note that the child was safe as it will be recalled that the same assurance was made in one of the Lindbergh ransom notes. The child was kidnaped one week ago today.

Bulletin--The G-Men have personally taken over the Mattson kidnaping case in view of the fact that one week has elapsed since the kidnaping and the presumption is now that it is a Federal violation.

Lindbergh--It is surprising that so many newspaper editors were fooled on the report concerning the turning-up of goldbacks, claimed to be part of the ransom money in the Lindbergh case. This report should have been found to be erroneous on the face, in view of the fact that there were no goldbacks used in any of the ransom money but there were gold seals. One of the witnesses for Hauptmann at his trial was trapped on the same question when he stated that he had seen a number of goldbacks in the possession of a suspect.

Questions and Answers--The News Week Magazine is reported to have based the report that J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the G-Men, was resigning from what I said in one of my previous broadcasts. I did not say that J. Edgar Hoover was resigning but that it was feared that he ~~was~~ fired and the Chief Postal Inspector assigned to take his place. Mr. Hoover has held his position for nineteen years and I think you will agree with me that the American people will have much to worry about if such an act takes place.

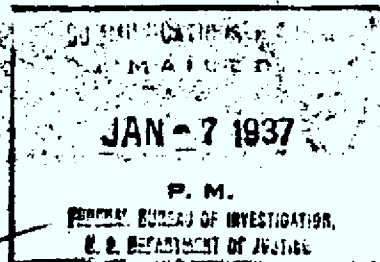

As I told you on the phone, I am indeed grateful to you for the comments which you made in your column, "Portrait of a Father Talking to Himself." The column appeared in full in today's issue of the Washington Herald and at the same time there appeared on the editorial page the inclosed editorial entitled "G-Men and Critics." I have been told that this editorial will no doubt be carried throughout the country in the Hearst papers. You certainly made a succinct and pertinent observation upon the factors existing at present in the Mattson case and those which may develop. Of course, all of the persons in the FBI are giving everything in them to bring about an early solution of this case but we recognize the fact that it may be one which will require a long, long pull, but the perpetrator of the crime will inevitably be apprehended.

The factor, however, which makes me burn more than anything else is the sincere belief that this crime - and I have no doubt several others of similar character which may follow - can be traced directly to certain activities and forces which have been at work for some time in trying to belittle, ridicule and sneer at the "G-Men." There are certain writers of slime columns suffering from mental halitosis and certain editorial writers who have an aggravated case of mental diarrhea that regurgitate their own filth and must tear down something which was gradually growing to be a restraining influence on the criminal of the underworld. The criminal morons can only be held in check by fear and a respect for a certain and vigorous apprehension and punishment. I know that instances have arisen when certain criminals whom we have apprehended have had in their possession clippings of the articles and columns written by some of the above-alluded-to coyotes. Now, of course, there is a marked absence of the same, but they have not denied or changed their views. They are merely remaining dormant until the temper of public opinion will permit them to take up again their slimy pens and resume their sneering tactics.

Incidentally, Mr. Winchell indicated that the "source" has secured his information from [redacted] I indicated to Mr. Winchell that I had contacted [redacted] and Mr. Winchell stated that the source had indicated that he knew that; but that [redacted] had said that he had not told me the truth. This is possible; however, I think such "source" is simply feeding Mr. Winchell with gossip that is current everywhere in Los Angeles and possesses no real definite information of any kind.

Portrait of a Father Talking to Himself

I felt that the little boy was dead two broadcasts ago, poor thing. And I so indicated in the very first flash. Didn't the snatcher of the Lindbergh child say in his first note that the boy "is in safe care"? This fiend, "Tim," in his only note, typed that the boy "is safe." Of course he was safe when the note was written! Too bad the ransom wasn't paid. Then it would be easier to trap him. No matter how much the parents plead with the law about "not marking the money," etc., it is always jotted down—the serial numbers, I mean. The bank that prepares the ransom can dig up all the old currency the kidnaper demands. But every great sum in snatch cases or extortion cases—must be recorded. The G-men could charge bankers with compounding the crime if they didn't. Lindbergh thought he was playing safe when he left the matter of bundling the \$70,000 ransom to his friends who control the Morgan bank. He exacted their promise that the currency numbers wouldn't be copied. But if they had kept their word with him—Hauptmann never would have been caught.

People all over the world who can read newspapers or who listen to the radio feel almost as badly as Mr. and Mrs. Mattson do. Perhaps Mrs. Mattson was prepared for the worst, and when the terrible news came, maybe her heart bled and bled a lot more—but surely the moment she knew her child had been taken—it was like being told he had died. Of course all of us feel so bitter against the person who committed the fiendish crime—but don't we always?

That's the way we all felt for the Lindberghs for a few weeks after the crime. The Lindberghs were the "underdogs"—the sympathy of the world was for them. And then what happened? Three years later, when Hauptmann was collared, he became the underdog! Very few remembered to feel sorry for the Lindberghs. Mark my words. If the Mattson snatcher isn't captured for a long time—the public and even some feature

writers on the papers—will start saying how sorry they feel for the man when he is caught. "Aw," they will argue with you, "he has a wife and a baby—what proof have they?" And newsreel audiences will hiss the Mattsons!

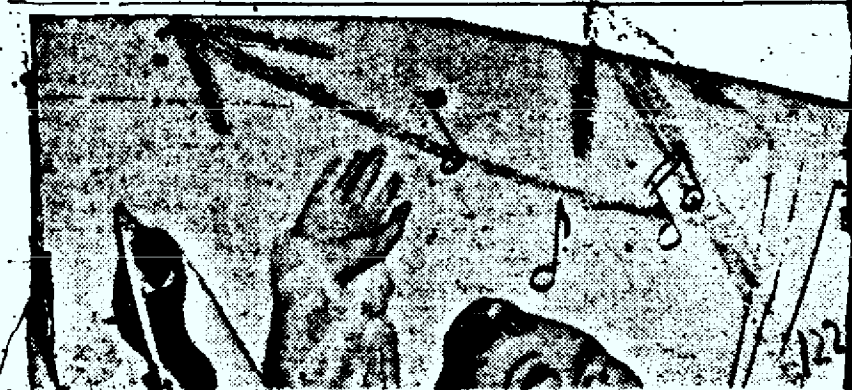
That's what happened to the Lindberghs. Did any of us ever imagine Lindbergh and Anne would be hissed in newsreel theaters? And if G-man Hoover decides to use 150 of his agents to trap the fiend—and if he uses tear gas bombs and machine guns—there will be some fools who will come out in their editorials and columns and accuse the G-men of "showing

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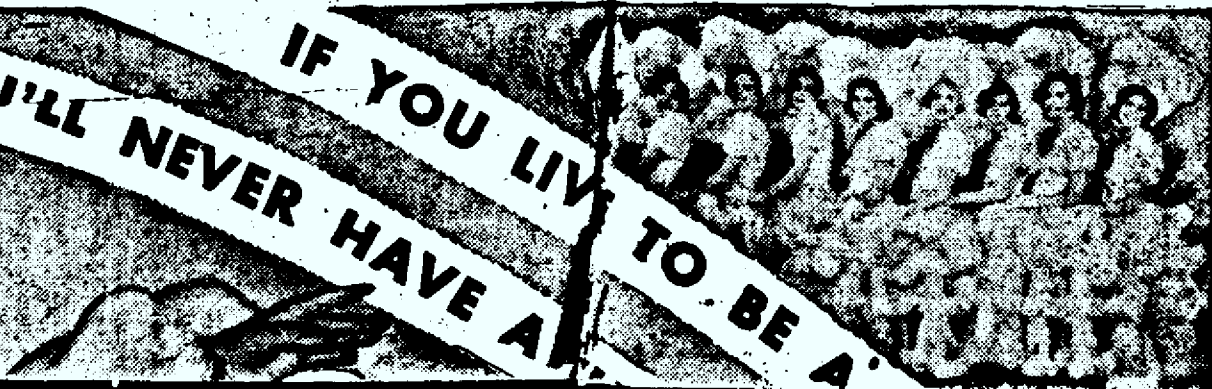

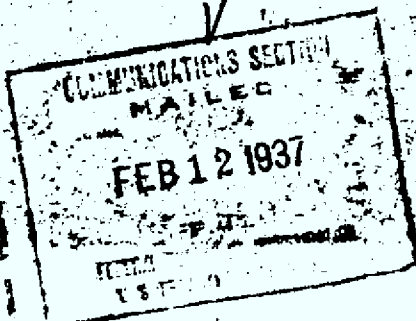

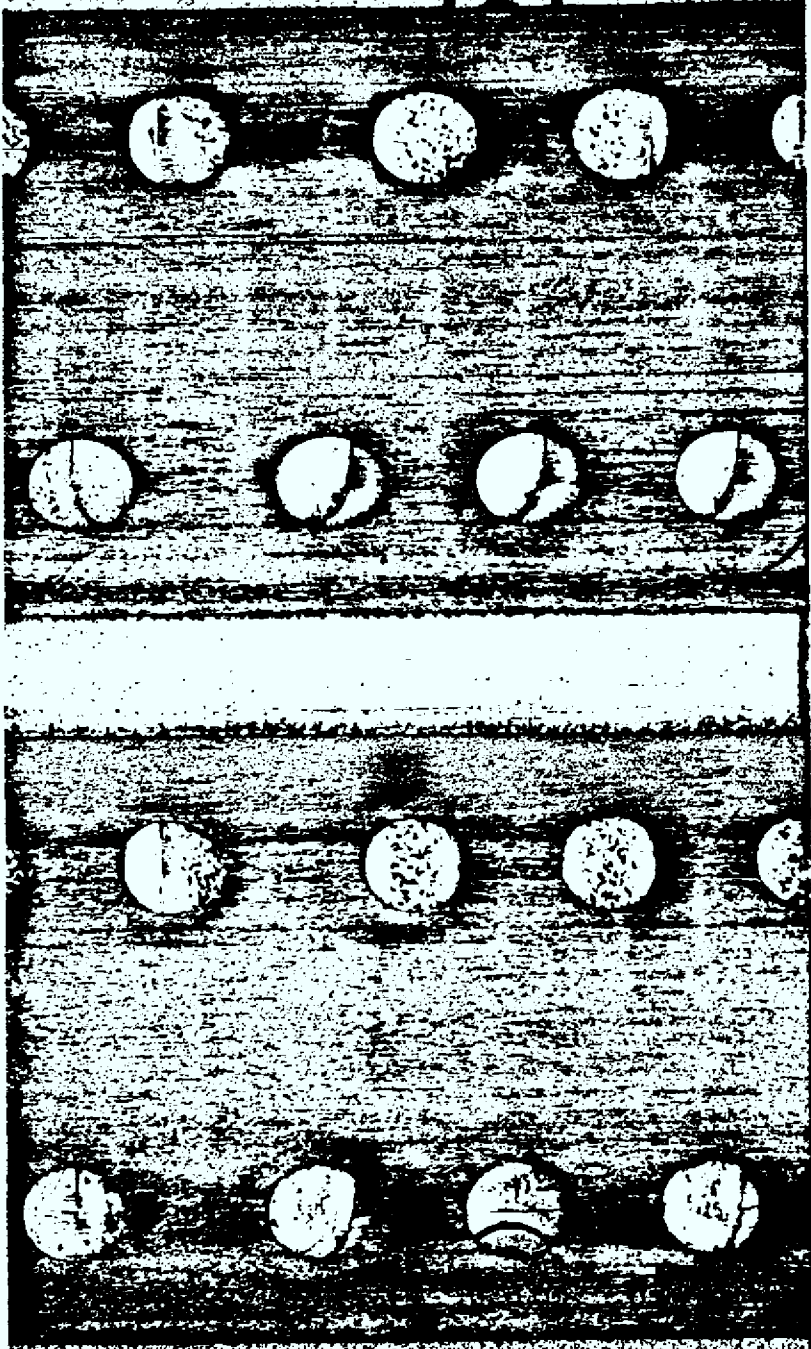
