Grines of violence are on the increase.

There is a death by violence in the United States every forty minutes - a rebbery every ten minutes - a burglary every two minutes a case of largeny every forty-four seconds!

Crime costs the citizens of the United States the staggering sum of \$475 per second; \$28,500 per minute; \$1,710,000 per hour; \$41,095,890 per day; \$15,000,000,000 per year, or ten dellars per month for each man, woman, and shild!

The greatest deterrent to crime is the knowledge by a prospective criminally inclined person that there will be sure detection, swift apprehension and certain and unfailing pumishment.

The Pederal Bureau of Investigation convicts 96 of every 100 persons it takes to trial.

The FBI was established in 1908, and investigates violations of ever minety different Federal statutes, covering a geographical area of 3,619,000 square miles.

It was not an effense under the laws of the United States to Mill a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation until 1934. Prior to 1934 Special Agents were not authorised to carry firears, or to make arrests.

A felony is committed in this country every twenty-four seconds.

The fingerprint collection of the Federal Bureau of Investigation was begun in 1924, and is the largest and most complete in the world.

Sir R. R. Henry, late Commissioner of Police of Scotland Mard, London, England, devised a system of classifying fingerprints which he introduced in England in 1901.

Sing Sing Prison introduced fingerprinting for griminal identification in 1903. Pingerprinting was first used at the United States Prison, Leavenworth, Kansas, in 1904.

There are more than 7,500,000 fingerprints on file at the FBI in Mashington, D. C. Over 11,000 law-enforcement organizations are submitting them from all sections of the United States. They are received at the rate of approximately 5000 daily. Eighty-one foreign countries, territories and American Pessessions are exchanging criminal identification data. Over 500 fugitives from justice are identified each month through the use of the FBI fingerprint file.

a fingerprint record of a criminal can be located by the FEI experts in the collection of seven and a helf million fingerprints within a period of two minutes!

There are 400,000 civil fingerprints on file in Washington, and 1,000 citisens daily add their prints to this collection. Amnesia victims are identified and returned to their relatives through the use of these files.

Several school children killed in the explosion of the New London, Texas, School, in 1937 whose identity could not otherwise be determined were identified by their fingerprints which they had taken at the Texas Contennial Exposition at Dallas the previous summer and placed on file.

A "Moniker" or mickness file of criminals is kept at the FEI. Such manes as "Gate Mouth," "Butterfly Billie," "Am I Elwe," "Get Back Sallie," "Butcher Enife Liz," "Dago Rose," and many others are found in these files. Criminals are frequently cought by the use of this "moniker" file.

We have an army of 200,000 persons in our metion who will take a human life before they die. Three hundred thousand persons going about their daily lives today believing themselves secure, will be their victims, and will be murdered at the rate of 36 every 24 hours.

In the last three years the Federal Bureau of Investigation has sent to penitentiaries over 12,000 enemies of society. The expense of conducting these investigations plus the expense of maintaining the FMI Technical Laboratory to assist the communities of the entire United States and also to conduct and carry on the central flugerprint repository, totaled twelve million dollars. Against this, in recoveries of stolen goods, in fines, and in monies saved the Government, eight dollars have been returned to the taxpayer for every one that has been expended. Over eighty million dollars appear on the profit side of the ledger resulting from the activities of the FMI during the past three years.

Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation at the time of their appointment must be between the ages of 25 and 35. They must be graduates of a recognised law school, expert accountants, or have had extensive law-enforcement experience. Only one out of each 1,000 applicants is appointed.

There are at this time 636 Special Agents in the FSI who are assigned to the forty-seven field divisions located at strategie points in the United States, in Alaska, Paerto Rico, and Revail.

A fourteen weeks intensive training course is given each Special Agent when he is appointed. He wast qualify as a marksuan in the use of all types of guns. Eighty-four per cent are experts. A Special Agent must be able to take and classify fingerprints. He also wast be able to search the prints of a suspect through the Bureau's files containing ever 7,500,000 fingerprints. He can determine if a spot a man's clothes is blood. Be oun tell which side the blow some from that broke a window. He can tall whether a shot came from a particular gun. He can tell the number of a gun which has been filed aver. So can sometimes read "invisible" writing. So can pick out the typewriter that wrote the reason note. He can identify the handwriting of an extertionist. He can tell what is in a box before it is spened. He can reproduce his hand or face in life-like appearance by the use of morniage. He can tell what type of bullet killed a man. He can tell what kind of tire left the track at the scene of a orine. rans apart and assemble them in the dark.

Seventy-six per cent of the Special Agents hold one or more university degrees. They speak fluently one or more of 21 fereign languages. They have had experience in over 100 different trades, industries, businesses, sciences, and professions. One hundred and ninety-three Special Agents have two cellege degrees or more.

A magnetic blackboard is used in the FEI training school to study raid problems. Metallic houses, trees, ears and non adhere to the blackboard when it is in a perpendicular position.

In a ten-day period in May, 1936, Alvin Karpis, Marry Campbell, William Dainard, and Thomas E. Robinson, Jr., motorious kidnapers, were all apprehended without the firing of a shot by Special Agents.

The average man who receives a life sentence for murder remains behind the bars only ten years; the average time served by a prisoner whohas been convicted of murder is less than four years.

With one exception, every Special Agent killed by gunfire has lost his life at the hands of a paroled convict! The other one was killed by an escaped convict.

Seventeen per cent of all our crime is committed by persons of less than voting age.

Statistics show that srime flourishes in any community where police departments are undersanned, where they are poorly equipped, where they have insufficient pay and insufficient incentive to do their duty. Crime likewise diminishes when public sentiment, freedom from corrupt politics and the support of proper appropriations give to a

law-enforcement body weapons which it must and should have if it is to properly combat the rawages of orine.

There were 1,333,526 major crimes countited in the United States: In 1936. In addition, ever fourteen million minor crimes are countited each year, not including traffic violations.

The crime army in the United States today marshals in its forces more than 4,300,000 criminals. Seven hundred thousand of these committed crimes prior to the time they were twenty-one years of age.

The facilities of the FSI Grime Laboratory are available to all law-enforcement agencies without cost, and technical experts will testify to their findings in state courts without expense to local authorities. In fifteen months time, there were smanined 2,049 ranson, extortion and threatening letters. Over 235,530 examples and specimens were compared with this number of letters. Experts are available to analyse any type of evidence which may be found at the scene of a crime.

Besides conducting technical investigations in current cases, the technicians of the FSI engage in research to develop new techniques for the solution of crime and to study methods and practices in use by police departments to effect constructive improvement.

The formula for effective lew-enforcement is simple. One needs only the ingredients of honesty and determination, of integrity, of education and intelligence plus freedom to proceed and hard work.

Criminality exists usually because some law-enforcement body has failed. And that law-enforcement body usually has failed because the persons behind it, the citizen himself, has failed. Therefore, only enoperation can bring success. The goal of that success is eradication of concerted and professional criminality.



Walter Winchell in his broadcast of November 21, 1937, stated that the Sheriff out in Clark, South Dakota who had released two suspects only later to find that they were Bucheliter and Shapiro, wanted fugitives, were in fact later found not to be these two individuals.

He further stated that the Attorney General Announced there would be no quibbling about the payment of the rewards of \$2000 to Mirra and \$4000 to Whiteford, the two men who gave the location of the escaped prisoners in the O'Connell kidnaping case. He also stated that Governor hoffman was waiting until all the claimants for the \$25,000 reward money were received before he designated the individuals who were entitled to this money. At the Fresent time there are twenty-nine claimants. Mr. Winchell was of the opinion that there were only three he would consider proper claiments, namely Lyons and Lyle, filling station attendants, and trong, the cashier at the Coin Exchange Bank, who identified the money.

District Attorney Fitts, Los Angeles, has announced that he is making war on all of the tracketeer visitors to Los Angeles from New York.

Mr. Winchell addressed a statement to the Governor of Ohio advising him that two of the three kidnapers of Doctor Seder were paroled last July the Ohio State Prison.

I received your letter of January 24, 1938, and merely to set you straight as to the facts concerning what you consider to be a Winchell scoop, you are advised that I confirmed to Winchell a tip which Winchell had already received concerning the Dean angle of the Ross kidnaping case. At no time did the Associated Press or any other press association contact me following the Winchell broadcast for a comment. The following morning, mamely, Monday morning, I personally called my Washington Office and was informed that inquiry had been made of the official in charge of public relations in the Attorney General's Office by some of the press associations as to whether the story which Winchell had related over the air was true, and I informed the official in charge of public relations that he could state that the Ross kidnaper had informed me that plans had been discussed to kidzap Dizzy Dean, but the plans had been dropped because of the fact that it was believed the Cardinals would not pay the ransom that might be demanded. So you will see that there was no preconceived plan upon my part to give Winchell a scoop, and certainly no statement was made by me subsequently to any mewspaper man for the reason that I was not questioned by any press association.

I am merely writing this letter to you, not to try to change your opinion of me in any way, because from the venomous tone of your letter it is obvious that your personal views toward me are prejudiced against me, but I did think that you should have before you the facts. For any one to reach the conclusion that you have reached, that I or any one else who had been up without sleep for over seven days and nights, suffering physical hardships at times almost beyond human endurance, would have rushed on to New York solely to contact a columnist for a news flash, reflects a perverted type of mind that is beyond my sonception,
