Mr. Green reminisced on the part he had played in the raid conducted in the Cookson hills for the purpose of apprehending Floyd. He stated that he was a close friend of Marsh Corgan, who is a former Prohibition Agent and now running for Sheriff at Muskogee, Oklahoma.

I explained to Mr. Green the policy of the Division with reference to paying informants for information which proved to be of value to this Division upon investigation and that in the event he could furnish information regarding the whereabouts of the principal members of the Barker-Karpis gang he would be amply rewarded.





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

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York, is the carrier who delivers mail on Brunswick Boulevard.

Mr. Albert Flynn, 41 Salem Avenue, Buffalo, New York, upon being interviewed, advised that he has delivered mail to 34 Brunswick Boulevard for a period of about six years; that the Zier family has resided at that address, as nearly as he can ascertain, for a period of approximately twelve years, and have always been very respectable people. Mr. Flynn stated that Mrs." C. E. Pope is well known to him, she being a middle-aged womanthe daughter of Mr. Zier-who approximately two years ago married? Mr. C. E. Pope; that Mr. C. E. Pope is employed by the New York Central Railroad and travels between Albany and Buffalo, New York; that Mrs. C. E. Pope remains in Buffalo while her husband is absent from the city. According to Mr. Flynn, they receive only ordinary advertising and business mail from Buffelo, and occasionally a letter from Albany or some western state. Mr. Flynn was unable to recall the name of this particular state.

Mr. Flynn was interrogated at length by the writer and Special Agent J. D. Cunningham and informed that neither the Zier or Pope family do much entertaining; that he has never observed any out of state cars parked in the vicinity of their home; that during his contacts with the neighbors in that vicinity, he has always heard them spoken of in the highest terms. Mr. Flynn has not personally observed any persons who might be classified as racketeers or hoodlums visiting or in the vicinity of 34 Brunswick Boulevard.

A picture of Harry Campbell and the various other suspects in the Bremer kidnaping was shown to Mr. Flynn, but he was unable to identify anyone as having been seen in the vicinity of 34 Brunswick Boulevard.

34 Brunswick Boulevard was observed by the writer and Special Agent J. D. Cunningham, and same was found to be a very respectable middle class residential section of the city.

Before proceeding further with instant investigation, the writer immediately communicated with Special Agent in Charge J. P. MacFarland, advising him of the statements of Mr. Flynn, and at his express direction Mrs. C. E. Pope was contacted.

Mrs. C. E. Pope was found to be a very respectable middle-aged woman, and upon interview stated that she was born in

Buffalo, New York and has resided in Buffalo during her entire lifetime. She was questioned as to her friends and relatives outside of Buffalo, and she stated that she has no friends or relatives outside of the State of New York, with the exception of Mrs. Pearl Flannigan, who resides in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Mrs. Pope stated that Mrs. Flannigan's maiden name was Campbell; that she had met Mrs. Flannigan in Buffalo approximately ten or twelve years ago at the Methodist Episcopal Church, Tupper and Asbury Streets, Buffalo, New York; that Mrs. Flannigan was a very quiet person, who at that time was employed by the Potter family, 700 Lafayette Avenue, Buffalo, New York.

Mrs. Pope was asked whether or not she had been in communication with Mrs. Flannigan recently, at which time she readily advised that she had received a letter from Mrs. Flannigan, advising that her sister's (Mrs. H. L. McNeil's) husband was suffering from an ailment and that it was impossible for them to procure in Texas the particular salve which she (Mrs. Flannigan) had on previous occasions forwarded to Mrs. McNeil. Mrs. Pope advised that the name of this particular salve was "Pneumatic" and that at the request of Mrs. Flannigan she forwarded two tubes of this salve on or about October 22, 1934 to Mrs. H. L. McNeil at Electra, Texas. She stated that Mrs. Flannigan paid for this salve.

Control of the second s Mrs. Pope was interrogated at length in an effort to ascertain any additional information relative to the Campbell 🕮 family, and she stated that she believed the Campbell family originally came from Pennsylvania; that two sisters, Laura and Pearl, reside with their parents at 818 South Rockford Street, Tulsa, ... Oklahoma; that another sister, Mrs. McNeil, resides in Electra, Texas; and that there is one brother in California. Mrs. Pope also stated that she believed Mrs. Flannigan had a brother, Harry Campbell, who was injured by an oil crane some years ago, and 15 was her understanding that he was in some difficulties. According to Mrs. Pope. Mrs. Flannigan left Buffalo approximately six or seven years ago and has not visited Buffalo since; that while 🎊 Mrs. Pope has communicated with her by letter, she has not seen her personally for that period of time, nor have any friends or relatives of Mrs. Flannigan been in Buffalo. Mrs. Pope has never seen any of Mrs. Flannigan's brothers.

Continuing, Mrs. Pope advised that she has never received any mail in Buffalo to be forwarded for Mrs. Flannigan

or any relative of Mrs. Flannigan, nor has she received any packages nor handled any transactions for Mrs. Flannigan or any member of her family. It is Mrs. Pope's understanding that Pearl Flannigan at the present time has a small account at the Marine Trust Company.

Mrs. Pope stated that she purchased the salve which she forwarded to Texas at the Bison Drug Store, which is a subpostal station, and that she mailed same from that address. However, inquiry at the Bison Drug Company failed to positively verify
the fact that a person had purchased any "Pneumatis" salve, although one of the clerks (whose name the writer was unable to procure) indicated that some salve had been purchased, and it was
quite possible that same was mailed from that address.

Examination of the registered and insured receipts of that postal station failed to disclose the mailing of a package to Mrs. H. L. Deceased, ET AL, CONSPIRACY TO DELIVER FEDERAL PRISONER FRANK WASH

The state of the s Fred Gootz, under the alias of J. George Zeigler, was killed on the morning of March 21, 1934, by four discharges of a shot gun fired at close range in front of the Minerva Restaurant, 4811-15 Cormak Boad, Cicero, Illimois, which restaurant is owned by one 7. He Mangume Zeigler was killed instantly by the shots and his face and head were horribly mutilated. To date no motive for the killing has been determined, but circumstances surrounding the shooting the dicate a typical gangland assassination. The identities of the bill ers likewise have not as yet been established.

Fred Goetz was a graduate of the Engineering School, of the University of Illinois, and played on the football team at that institution. After his graduation he worked as a life guard at the Clarendon Bathing Beach in Chicago, and on June 5, 1925, he was are rested by the Chicago Police Department on a charge of attempted rape of a seven year old girle. He was placed under a \$5,000 bond which his mother furnished, but subsequently he forfeited this bond and was never apprehended to answer this charge.

A review of the file entitled; JACK MUPAS, with aliance, I.O. 1179, WATIONAL MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT ACT, definitely links Goetz with Klutes and Ernest Rossi, both now deceased, the latter being killed in gangland fashion. Previously Goetz was reported to have associated with Fred "Killer" Burke, Ted Newberry and Gus Winkler and other well known gangmen, all of whom were associated with the Capone syndicate in Chicago, These are the men who are alleged to have participated in the St. Valentine's Massacre in Chicago in 1929, and it might be well to mention at this time that Byron Bolton, alles Monty Carter, one of the Subjects in this case, was likewise implicated in the above Massacre. Ted Newberry and Gus Winkler were killed' by gangsters within the past two years, and Fred Burke is now serving a life sentence in the Michigan State Penitentiary for murder, It is entirely probable that Fred Coetz, as well as Ted Newberry and Gus Winkler, were put on the spot as retaliation for the St. Valentine's

Massacre. However, this has never been positively established.

Arthur Johnson, alias "Red" Price, who is presently serving a life sentence in the Colorado State Penitentiary, previously furnished to the Division the information that Gostz, under the name of "Shotgun" Zeigler, was closely associated during 1931 and 1932 with Vernon C. Miller, Frank Rash and Harvey Bailey; that in view of this close relationship with the above mentioned men it was thought for

time that Goetz had participated in the Massacre at the Union Station in Kansas City, Missouri on June 17, 1935. However, subsequent investigation in that case definitely eliminated him as one of the participants.

The late Special Agent W. Carter Baum, who conducted the investigation after the death of Fred Goetz, learned that Goetz was receiving his mail in the name of J. George Zeigler at 40 Chicago Avenus, Oak Park, Illinois, a gas station. This gas station is operated by Tony Pirille, 1027 North Grove Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, and Pirille was formerly connected with the Capone syndicate in Chicago, No information of any value was obtained from this source with the exception that the attendant at the above gas station positively identified the photograph of Alvin Karpis as having been seen in the company of Goetz on at least two occasions.

Agent Baum also learned that Goetz had been living at 2141, Bunderson Avenue, Berwyn, Illinois, just prior to his death, and investigation by him, Agent Baum, at that address showed that Goetz wader the name of G. B. Johnson had been living in Apartment 508 for approximately a year and a half, and that he moved out on March 15 1934. Further information obtained from this source indicated that Goetz sometimes did not visit the apartment for a month at a time, and was seldom there more than two or three times a week; that on a number of occasions he came to the apartment with different women, and that there was also observed there a man whom Goetz stated was his exclusion. brother, and that this man was supposed to be a golf professional. He was described as about 5'll" tall, weight 175 lbs., slender build, dark hair and round face. Further information disclosed that on March 15, 1934, a small moving wan with two employees assisted in the moving of the effects of Goetz out of the apartment, but no information could be obtained as to the identity of this moving; want that the apartment had been thoroughly cleaned since Goetz had vacated it since It was a furnished apartment, and the various papers that were left behind in the apartment had been destroyed. Igent Baum did not find enything of value therein in connection with this case,

At the time of Goetz* death among numerous other cards and papers found on his person, the following appear to have some significance in this case. Your attention is invited to the report of the late Special agent W. Carter Baum, Chicago, Illinois, dated April 5, late Special agent W. Carter Baum, Chicago, Illinois, dated April 5, 1934, for the description of the other papers and cards found on Goetz at the time he was killed.

A card of the Associated News Service, 1933-1934, initialed by A.W.J., Managing Director, which showed that J. George Zeigler was entitled to membership as a member of the American Landscape Association.

A membership card In the Chicago Yacht Club, dated 12/51/51, to one J. George Zeigler, signed "Charles P. Barton, Secretary, and O. E. Smithe"

A card showing J. George Zeigler as an associate member in the Sheriffs and Police Officers Association. This card was signed by R. H. Van Meter, Business Manager, and was dated 1/11/55.

A card dated January, 1933, showing J. George Zeigler as a member of the Oakdale Riding Club, signed by James Custer, Secretary.

A membership card in the Cowentsia Golf and Country Club, Lake Forest, Illinois, to J. George Zeigler, signed by Charles Moore and James Bartley.

With reference to the membership cards of the Chicago Yacht Club, Oakdale Riding Club, and the Onwentsia Golf and Country Club listed above, it will be stated that

found among other things a large quantity of the above described membership eards. The Chicago Office, advised in this connection that Christman had the above membership cards printed and distributed them among the various members of the mob, same to be used for identification purposes. In view of this, it is entirely possible that the remaining members of the Barker-Karpis gang have some of the above described cards in their possession at the present time, and it might be well to keep this in mind when conducting future investigations.

After Goetz' death considerable effort was made to locate Mrs. Fred Goetz, as it was thought that she might supply valuable information concerning the activities of her husband. Special Agent R. C. Suran of this Office learned that Mrs. Goetz' correct name is Ireme Dorsey, and that her folks live at Wilmington, Illinois, and information at that point by Agent Suran resulted in the finding of a telegram addressed to Mrs. James Dorsey, Wilmington, Illinois, and signed "Ireme", bearing the return address "Larne Hotel, San Francisco, California."

The San Francisco Division Office subsequently located Irens Dorsey in the Stanford-Lane Hospital, San Francisco, where she was under treatment for a nervous breakdown. A surveillance of this girl was maintained for a short period, but nothing materialized therefrom, and accordingly that Office deemed it advisable to interview here it the time of these interviews Irene Borsey's mental condition was such that she could not give a coherent story; however, she readily idensified photographs of Vernon C. Miller, Fred Barker, "Doc" Barker, alvin Karpis end others, and admitted knowing and associating with them, but denied knowing anything concerning the KansasCity Massacre and the Bremer Kidnaping case.

Frequent efforts were made by igent Suran to interview Hiss Dorsey -

Ireme Dorsey was interviewed on various occasions by this Agent during the period from October 1, 1934 to October 19, 1934. Agent first introduced himself as being sent to her from Washington, D. C. for the purpose of determining how she was getting along, and whether there was anything the Government could do for her. Shee refused any aid, stating that in the light of her present condition nothing could be done for her at this time. She appeared to be in good spirits and generally manifested a desire to talk.

press ner for any desired information, as it was feared that in yiew of her temperamental nature such pressure on her would incur her animosity for Agent, and as a probable consequence she would not divulge anything.

for a time, and during the later interviews with her she expressed a willingness to cooperate with the Government by furnishing all information in her possession relative to the Bremer kidnaping case, giving the reason therefor that she wanted to wash her hands of the entire matter and be left alone. She also desired that her present whereabouts be kept strictly confidential as she is very much afraid of the Chicago underworld, as well as of the Barker-Karpis gang.

Irene Dorsey stated that she was born at Wilmington, Illinois, that she is single but has been living with Fred Goetz, alias George B. Zeigler, alias George B. Seibert, alias A. W. Johnson, alias George B.

Johnson, without having been married to him, for the past sight years and up until the time of his death on March 20, 1934. She stated that she and Goets lived at 308 Walnut Street, Elmhurst, Illinois, Suring the summer of 1935, and that prior to that time they were living in the Park, Illinois, She further advised that Klaie Heller, a dear street of hers, and who was the paramour of Jack Gusik, notories Chicago gangster, was living with them for a part of the time at the above address; that Klaie during this period was

pitalization. Irene stated that in view of her intimate friendship with Miss Heller she felt it her duty, more or less, to sid her in every way possible, and for this reason insisted that she live with them. Irene stated that when Elsie moved in with them at Elmhurst, Illinois, they became rather erowded, which made it necessary for them to vacate their apartment and move to a larger one. She stated that they rented an unfurnished flat at 1954 West Carfield Blvd, and furnished same with their personally owned furniture which had been in storage.

Irene further stated that she and Fred also had living with them at that time a young boy named "Bobby", who is the son of "Denver Bobby", now serving time in the penitentiary for participation in a mint robbery; that "Denver Bobby" was associated years back with Tom Filbin, Charles Fitzgerald, alias "Old Charlie", and Harvey Bailey, and it is her understanding that Bailey owns a half interest in a garage located in Hammond, Indiana, and that Bobby, the boy in question, owns the other half; that Goetz, Euring the last months of his life, had been making negotiations to sell this property, and that prior to Bailey's sentence in connection with the Urschel kidnaping case, for which he received a life term, Goetz endeavored to have Bailey transfer for his title of ownership to the above mentioned property to young Bobby, in order that the boy might have full ownership of same; that as far as she knows Bailey never made this transfer

Irene further stated that Rose Perry, the boy's mother, was taken for a "ride" by unknown persons approximately two and a half years ago, and that after her death "Denver Bobby", the father, asked Tom Filbin to care for the youngster until he became of age. Irene stated that Bobby was living for a few days at the Hollyhocks Inn in St. Paul, which is owned by Jack Pfeiffer, and during this time Fred Goetz and she were vacationing in St. Paul; and on one occasion, while in the Hollyhocks Inn, either Filbin or Pfeiffer, she did not know which, requested Goetz to take care of the boy for a while. Irene stated that she immediately became attached to the boy and persuaded her husband to take him home with them. He consented and on this occasion Arthur Johnson, alias "Red" Price, previously mentioned in this report, accompanied them to Chicago, Illinois. It should be stated that "Red" Price, according to Irene, was also an old associate of "Denver Bobby", as well

as Fitzgerald and Harvey Bailey; that as she understands it Price subsequently surrendered himself to the police authorities in Folorade as he was afraid of being put on the spot.

Irene further stated that they moved to 1934 West Carfield
Blvd, around the middle of August, 1953, and that Eleie Helier Sontinued
to live with them, as did the boys that Eleie sied in the Morey Rose
pital around the latter part of Beptember, 1953, as a result of an Masus
cessful operation. She stated that Tom Filbin and his paramour, Gladys
Merkins, often visited them at the above address, and on Gotober 51,
1935, which she remembers was Halloween night, Tom Filbin same to
Chicago from St. Paul alone, and subsequently returned to St. Paul take
ing Bobby with him; that this was the last time she saw the boy in
question.

frene stated that while she was living at the above address she hired a Krs. Beatrice Burns to work for her as a housekeeper; that Mrs. Burns remained in her employ up until the time they moved from this address, which was on January 31, 1934. She further stated that during this period Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis visited them occasione ally, as did a West Side Chicago politician by the name of Ed Konvalinka and whose wife's first name is Rose. In this connection it will be recalled that during the Dillinger investigations, conducted by this Office, it was developed that Hose Konvalinka is an alleged sontact for Lester M. Gillis, alias George "Baby Face" Welson. This fact Is mane tioned herein for the purpose of showing the criminal connections of Rose Konvalinka. Agent questioned Irene as to whether Konvalinka and his wife were acquainted with either Karpis or Barker, and Irene stated that Karpis and Konvalinka were, and further mentioned the fact that last summer, 1935, Karpis rented Konvalinka's summer home at Long Bedek Indiana, for approximately two months. She stated that it was her opinion that Alvin Karpis met Konvalinka through Fred Goetz. Attention is invited to the report of Special agent R. D. Brown, Chicago, Illinois, dated October 1, 1934, for complete detailed information and description of the above mentioned summer home.

Ireme further stated that Willie Harrison, who is very friende.

In with the Barker boys and Alvin Karpis, lived with them for shout three weeks at the Garfield Blvd, address during the latter part of 1935 and the early part of January, 1934; that Harrison at that time was wanted in Hammond, Indiana, on a rape charge, and that he remained as their home merely for the purpose of refuge; that Goetz during this period made frequent trips to Hammond, Indiana, in an effort to get the charge against Harrison dismissed; that she recalls that Harrison spent New Year's Eve with her and Goetz in Chicago, Illinois. She also advised that Harrison is an excellent golfer and at one time operated taverns in Calumet City, Illinois, Burnham, Illinois, and Hammond, Indiana.

Irene stated that on or about January 17, 1934, Goets like formed her that he was going out of town on business for a few days, but did not indicate where, or on what kind of business he was going. In this connection Irene explained that she never did question Goetz as to where he want or what he was doing, as she always felt that it was none of her business, and furthermore, that if Goetz wanted to tell her he would have done so without her asking him. Besides, he was a very close mouthed individual, and often remarked that gangsters wives should never know what jobs their husbands go one

Continuing, Irene stated that on the day Goetz presumably left town, Tom Filbin and Gladys Merkins arrived in Chicago and registered at the Croydon Hotel under the name of Gilbin or Filbert, or some other name very similar to Filbin; that as she recalls, although Goetz was supposed to be out of town he apparently got in touch with Filbin en the day of his arrival in Chicago, inasmich as Goetz balled, her that afternoon and told her to prepare supper for them, meaning from and Gladys. She stated that Filbin and Gladys visited her that evening, but Goetz bid not show up. In fact she did not see him again until on or about January 20, 1934, although he was communicating with her by telephone almost daily.

stayed a short while and departed without revealing to her his desetination. He also did not indicate what business he had been on, nor where he had been. Irens advised that either one or two days later willie Harrison, previously mentioned, came to the apartment along and stated that Goetz had sent him for his breeches, high top shoes, and stated that Goetz had sent him for his breeches, high top shoes, woolen shirt and heavy sweater; that Willie did not mention at this time where Goetz was staying, nor for what purpose he wanted these clothes; that she did not ask him, but at this time had her own suscitions in view of the publicity given to the Bremer kidnaping case at that time. Irene stated that after she gave the above described at that time. Irene stated that after she gave the above described clothes to Harrison, she observed him step into a Ford car which was parked in front of the building and drive away with the second man, who was at the wheel. She could not recognize this person from her point of observation.

Miss Dorsey advised that shortly after January 17, 1934, Monty Carter came to Chicago from Phoenix, Arizona; that upon his arrival at the apartment he advised her that Goetz had sent for him, and in this connection sent him money to come by plane; that he made the trip by plane; and that his purpose for coming to Chicago, accordening to Goetz, was to take care of her, Irene, and escort her wherever ing to Goetz, was to take care of her, Irene, and escort her wherever she desired to go; that Goetz was busy at that time and was not home very much.

Irene further stated that on or about January 25, 1954 Sosts Telephoned her at the apartment and told her to pack her effects for a two day tripe. He did not indicate at this time where they were going, but stated that she should edvise Mrs. Burns, the housekeeper, that he had received a position with the Government. as a landscape gardener and was working the territory between Sprin Meld, Illinois, and St. Louis, Missouri. Trens advised that she hestily packed her things and drove her Buick Coupe to the intersection of 50th Avenue and 22nd Street, Cicero, Illinois, and there met Goetz, who was with Monty Carter. Monty did not accompany them on this trip for some unknown reason, and she and Goetz drove to Lincoln, Illinois, and visited with Dr. Boyd C. Rembe, who was an old friend of her husband. She further stated with reference to Dr. Rembe that he and Goetz had been intimately acquainted for ale most four years; that Rembe has an office in Cicero and is generally recognized as a hoodlum doctor. Irone stated that she hever did get along with fir. Rembe as he was always drunk, and whenever he had e easion he would persuade Gostz to accompany him to go out with other girls on drunken spress. She indicated that Dr. Rembe had been a dope addist some years ago.

Irene advised that they remained at Dr. Rembe's home in Lincoln overnight, and that the following day they stopped at Springfield, Illinois, where they visited with Frankie Dias. In this connection Irene stated that Diaz was formerly connected with Goetz and Monty Carter in the bootlegging racket, at which time they were operating between Chicago, Illinois, Springfield, Illinois, and St. Louis, Missouri; that Goetz persuaded Dias to adcompany them to St. Louis on a pleasure trip, but Diaz refused to go, giving the reason that he was too busy at the time. At any rate, Goetz and Irene proceeded to St. Louis alone and remained in that town for two days, living in the best hotel in the city; that she never found out mjust why Goetz made this trip to St. Louis, but presumed that he had some business to transact there. Irene advised that upon their arrival in Chicago from St. Louis, Goetz instructed her to drive to the intersection of 55th Street and Cottage Grove Avenue, at which point she observed him catch a cab and proceed in a southerly direction. Trene advised at this point that on numerous previous occasions she areve Goetz to 55th Street and Cottage Grove Avenue for the purpose of getting a cad, but he at no time ever told her where he was going, or for what reason he secured a cab at that point. Irene stated that after this she proceed home, and when she arrived there Mrs. Burns informed her that a man, dressed in hunting togs and who gave his name as Mr. Cotton, had been at the apartment; that same afternoon, and very excitedly had asked for Zeigler (that is, Goetz); that Mrs. Burns informed him that Goetz was somewhere near Springfield, Illinois, and was not expected home for some time; that Mr. Cotton them asked for Irene, and when Mrs. Burns informed him that she likewise was at Springfield, he hurriedly departed.

Trene stated that when Mrs. Burns told her of the above she has

Trems stated that when Mrs. Burns told her of the above she has same very much worried as she had never heard the name "Cotton" before, and further sould place no sme answering to the description Mrs. Burns furnished of this man; that she immediately drove to mether Barker's place and told, her of the above incident. Irene stated that Mrs. Barker informed her, after hearing the name "Cotton" that he was one of the boys and probably wanted to see Goetz on business (this person undoubtedly was Volney Davis, as he is quite frequently referred to as "Cotton" by his friends;

Irene stated that Mrs. Barker was living at that time on the north east corner of 73rd Street and South Shore Drive, Chicago, having moved into shis place around the middle of September, 1933; that Mrs. Barker purchased her own furniture when she moved, and that Gladys Sawyer, the wife of Harry "Dutch" Sawyer, one of the Subjects in this sase, helped her buy this furniture. She stated that she and Goetz visited with Mrs. Barker on numerous occasions during the latter part of 1933, as at that time her soms preddie and "Doe" were away from Chicago; also that during the paried Bremer was held captive Goetz instructed her to see Mother Barker as often as possible, indicating that such visits would in a way relieve her of worries come cerning her boys:

In this connection with the above, Goetz informed her, Irene, at this time that he, as well as the two Barker boys, had participated in the Bremer kidnaping. He further informed her that after the Hamm Job, inferring that he likewise was in on that abduction, he told the boys, meaning Freddie and "Doc", that he was through with the kidnaping racket and absolutely would not participate in another as he did not approve of this way of making money. However, shortly prior to the Bremer kidnaping, Freddie and "Doc" Barker approached him and stated that they were low on money and in this connection adwised that they had a "cinch" who was good for two hundred "grand," Irene presumed they had reference to Bremer. She stated that after Goetz learned who they were going to kidnep he told the boys to keep away from Jack Pfeiffer's town, as he put it, as another kidnaping in St. Paul, Minnesota, would surely ruin him, Pfeiffer, and his business. At this point Trene mentioned that Goetz regarded Pfeiffer very highly and repeatedly warned him not to have any thing to do with hoodlums and people of that type, as they would only cause him a great deal of trouble and would ruin his better class of trade. She further stated that she presumed that Freddict and "Doc"s" greed for money was far greater than their loyalty for Jack Pfeiffer, and after further solisitations on their part of Goetz he finally consented to assist them in this kidnaping. Irene advised at this point that she positively knows that Goetz, Fred and "Doc" Barker and Alvin Karpis had likewise perticipated in the kidnaping of Hamm in

t. Paul last year; that during the time the Touhy gang was being tried for the above kidnaping in St. Paul, Gootz was in the Twin Cities making every possible effort to have them acquitted for this abduction; not because he was friendly with them; but in view he she fact that he did not wish to see them take a "rap" for a grime that they did not perform. From sould not elaborate on this information nor could she furnish any detailed information concerning the Hamman kidnaping. She further stated that it is her opinion that the plans for the kidnaping of Bremer were made in St. Paul, Minnesota, around Christmas of 1935, as Goets was in St. Paul for approximately one week around that time; that she did not see any of the boys in Chicago from that time until after Bremer was released. She further stated that she does not believe that Goetz thok part in the actual kidnaping of Bremer, as he often told her that he sould not be identified for this srime. She pelieves, however, that he wrote the renson notes in the case, and also arranged the negotiations for the payment of the rensom money. She further stated that the underscoring of sertain phrases in these ransom notes for the purpose of emphasis was very typical of his work, as she had previously noted that in all his writings and drawings he would underline certain words and phrases y to denote emphasis.

possessed a typewriter, whereupon she stated that he did not personally own one, but that on one occasion during last November, he brought home conething which looked like a portable typewriter, and at that time issued specific instructions that no one should touch it, and placed it in the closet, and it remained there for two weeks. Trans stated that she never saw Goetz use this particular typewriter, nor does she know where it came from, or who owned it. It was her recollection that Goetz also brought to the house at that time a standard typewriter, make unknown, and on various occasions saw him type thereon his own identification cards, and letters of references some of which were for Monty Carter and Alvin Karpis. Irene stated that she believes that this typewriter was owned by Fred Mangum of Cicero, Illinois. However, she was not positive.

It this point Irene stated that when Karpis made an application to rent an apartment at the Orlando Hotel in Chicago during the latter part of the winter, the Management asked him for references, and in view of this Karpis at first did not intend to take the apartment. However, after he informed Goetz of this, Goetz told Karpis that all high class apartment hotels in Chicago required references from their tenants, and in this connection suggested that he should advise them that he was connected with the Wine Distributing Company in California; and for further reference to give them the names of two persons in Chicago, which she does not recall, and that he would write the leters ostensibly from them.

Irene savised that on their return trip from St. Louis, Gost informed her that they would have to move immediately from 1934 West Garfield Blvd.; that a few days previous Tom Filbin telephoned their home from St. Paul, the nature of which call she does not remember; and that in view of Filbin's hoodlym sonnections and the further fact that things were generally hot in St. Paul, as Bremer had not yet been released, Goetz thought possibly the call might be traced to his home. Goetz instructed her to sell the furniture and inform Mrs. Burns that he had obtained a new position in Springfield; Illinois, and that she Irene, was moving to that town to live at th him. Goetz also stated at this time that he would arrange for another apartment. Irane advised that she sold her furniture to various second-hand dealers and on January 51, 1954, when she had the last of her effects moved ? from the apartment she met Goetz on the street corner near by and he drove to 7827 South Shore Drive, Chicago, at which place they resided up until the time of Goetz' death.

Trene stated that during the period from January 16, 1954 to January 51, 1934, while living at 1934 West Garfield Blvd. Goets telephoned her almost daily, and she seemingly is of the opinion that none of these calls were made long distance. She also stated that when she met doets after she moved from the above apartment, Monty Carter was with him, but she does not know where Goetz or Carter were living at that time. She further stated that about two or three days after she moved to 7827 South Shore Drive, Goetz instructed her to go to Wilmington, Illinois, and live there with her folks for a while, giving at this time no specific reason for this move. She went there by train, and about three or four days later Monty Carter drove to Wilmington alone and advised her that Goetz wanted her to return to Chicago at once. She stated that Carter was driving diwr Freddie or "Doc" Barker's car, and that she returned to Chicago with Carter in this automobile; that upon erriving in Chicago, which she estimates was around the time Bremer was released, Goetz made the remark that he was glad that that job was over. He also mentioned at this time, rather jokingly, that in his discussions with Victim Bremer in the hideout, soncerning the amount he could afford to pay for his free. dom, Bremer begged that he be released immediately, stating that he knew many other poeple in St. Paul and Minneapolis who undoubtedly could afford to pay more than he as ransom, and in this connection

ha, Brower, expressed willinghess to finger these persons if they gave him his freedom. Goetz also mentioned how, on one occasion while at the hideout, two men entered the house and identified the selves as game wordens, and asked for their hunting licenses that & these men remained for approximately one hour and then left. Irone sould not state whether the boys settafied the game wardens by Misplaying such licenses, and in this connection stated that she knows that Gostz had a Wisconsin hunting license on his person at that tim but did not know whether he also had one for the State of Illinois. Goots also made the remark at this time that they had intended to release Bremer quite a bit sooner than they actually did, but could not very well do so on account of the heavy and continued rain falls ing at that time. He also mentioned the fact that they had a hard and long ride back, stating that it was raining all the way and make one time they mearly skidded off the road due to the slippery payer ment. He also stated that at time it was difficult to get something

Agent spent considerable time with Irene going over various possibilities as to the location of the place in which Bremer was a held. Descriptive data of the hideout and sounds heard by Victim Bremer were read to Irene in an effort to have her compare same with some place which she might have in mind as being the place. However, agent also questioned her concerning whether she knows of any family with two small children, and who also possess dogs, and she readily mentioned the name of "Slugs" Stacey, who is the brother of "Doe" Stacey. Then asked why the singled out his name, she stated that "Slugs" Stacey has two children and the dog, and that this was her only reason for doing so. She later advised that it was always her impression that Bremer was kept in Melrose Park, Illinois, but could not provide any information to confirm this belief.

It is known to this Agent that "Slugs" Stacey lives in Melrose Park, Illinois;

With further reference to the location of the hideout Irene advised that it must be near Chicago as Goetz, as heretofore stated, telephoned her at the apartment almost daily, and she is positive that none of these calls were long distance calls. Further confirmation for this belief is that Goetz saw her quite frequently during the period in question, and that on these occasions he did not give the appearance of having just returned from an out of town trip.

It might be well to mention at this point that from information received this far the indications are that the hideout is located

in hunting territory in view of the game warden incident mentioned above, and the further fact that Willie Harrison came to get boots: hunting togs during the period of Bremer's eaptivity, and also the appearance of Volney Davis in hunting clothes when he came to Irene's apartment on one occasion during this time;

Irene advised that while they were at 7827 South Shere Drive Monty Carter resided with them a short while and them returned to his family in Phoenix, Arizona.

At this time Agent questioned Miss Dorsey whether to her knowledge Carter received a split of the Bremer ransom money, and she advised in this connection that she had knowledge of the fact that on one occasion, either before or after Bremer was kidnaped. Monty and Goets, had a discussion concerning Monty's share of the rensom, which discussion was held in her presence; that he she recal it Goets informed Monty that he told the boys that it was his wish that Monty receive a split of the money collected, whereupon the boys agreed to give him \$3,000,00. However, Monty would not take this amount and put up the argument that he either get an equal split or he would not take anything. Goetz sided with Carter In this connect tion. Irene could not advise what the final outcome was concerning Monty's split of the money in question, but provided the information that it is her guess that Goetz was influential in getting what Monty demanded. When asked what part she thought Carter played in the kidnaping of Bremer, she made a gesture indicating that she was not sure whether or not he had taken an active part in the abduction. and that if he received a split of the money sollected, it was bee cause of doets and because Goetz demanded it of the boys. She stated that her husband's object for doing so would be for the reason that Carter took care of her during the period of Bremer's captivity. This explanation appeared rather absurd and far-fetched, and it is highly probable that Irene was trying to protect Monty Carter from any implication in this case.

Irone further stated that after Bremer was released, she and Goetz exchanged frequent visits with Freddie and "Doe" Barker, who at that time were living with their mother at her apartment at 75d and South Shore, Drive, Chicago, Illinois; that to her knowledge the ransom money collected In this case was kept for a short while at the Barker apartment and to her recollection none of this money had as yet been spent or exchanged at that time as the boys were of the belief that the currency was marked. She stated that sometime about a month prior to Goets' death on March 20, 1934 he and Fred Barker drove to Wilmington, Illinois and left a portion of this money at her uncle's place, the name of her uncle being Simon Cinotto, At this point Irene was hazy in her recollection as to whether in fact Fred Barker accompanied Goets to Wilmington at that time. She stated in this connection that she gained that impression from what Goetz later told her, on which occasion she asked him what disposition would be made of the money at her uncle's place should enything happen to him or her. In reply Goetz stated that both Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis had knowledge that the money was there and that they would take care of it if necessary.

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Trene advised that about two weeks prior to the time Goetz was killed he brought to the apartment the other portion of the ransom money, having obtained it either from Fred Barker's apartment or Alvin Karpis' place; that Karpis at that time was living with Polores Delaney on Yates Avenue near 71st Street in Chicago. She stated that she distinctly recalls seeing this money in the closet of their apartment, and that it remained there for about three or four days; that at this time Goetz made the remark that he did not like the way this money was being moved about and suggested that the safest place for it would be at her uncle Ci's place, Wilmington, Illinois, along with the other portion of the money.

Irene advised that she helped Goetz pack this money in a large package and wrapped it in brown paper. She estimated the amount of this money to be around \$100,000.00. She stated that she never saw so much money in her life; that after this money was securely wrapped and bound, she accompanied Goetz to Wilmington, Illinois, where he left the money with her uncle. Irene stated at this time that she is positive that her uncle had no knowledge as to what these packages contained, nor was he acquainted with any of the boys except Goetz and Monty Carter; that had he known what these packages contained and in what racket Goetz was engaged, he never would have accepted them for safe keeping.

Irene further related that on one occasion while Fred and "Dog" Barker were at their apartment, they discussed with Goets the matter of taking a portion or the whole of the ransom money to Beno, Nevada for the purpose of getting it exchanged for good money; that Fred and "Doo" Barker wanted Goets to make this trip to Reno in order to make negotiations but he declined, stating that he thought it would be more advisable for either fred or "Doc" to make the trip, as they had numerous contacts in that town. Irene advised at this point that from the conversation which followed, she gained the impression that the Hamm ranson money was also exchanged in Reno, Nevada, through some of the bankers there, At any rate, returning to the original discussion, Fred and "Doc" Barker told Goetz that they were too "hot" in Reno and for that reason they inmisted that he go, stating that he was the only member of the mob who would be capable of handling this matter. However, Goetz was persistent In his refusal to go, at the same time being unable to furnish a logical explanation as to why he should not go, and after much argumentation it was finally agreed that "Doc" Barker should make the trip. She advised that "Doc" left by plane on the following night and this was the last time " she ever saw him. ..

Irone stated that she was in her apartment at 7827 South Shore Drive at the time Goetz was killed in Cicero, Illinois, and she claimed that she had no knowledge of his death until the following morning, when she read about it in the newspapers; that she immediately proceeded to the Barker apartment and there found Mother Barker alone. At this time she related to Mother" what had happened and asked for Freddie and "Doe", and was advised by Mrs. Barker that she had no idea where the boys were Irene stated that she then proceeded to Wilmington, Illinois and stayed with her parents over night; that on the following day she went to her uncle's home to make sure the money was still there, and while here her uncle advised her that he moved Goets' furniture and effects from his apartment at 2141 Gunderson Avenue, Berwyn, Illinois, to an unfurnished apartment on Stony Island Avenue near 71st Street; that he moved these things about five days prior to his death and that at that time Goets specifically instructed him net to mention this move to Irene, which he did not. She stated that upon receiving this information, she persuaded her uncle to accompany her to Chicago and point out to her the place in question; that they found the apartment and upon examination of same, she found therein a woman's bathrobe which did not belong to her and some soiled laundry of Goets. She could find no papers or any other possessions which might have belonged to Goets.

She stated that after Goetz' death, she contacted numerous of his friends, namely, Louis Campagnio, Phil Deandre, Ralph Capone and Ed. Konvalinka, but none of these persons could effer any suggestions as to why Goetz was murdered. "Little Louis" Campagnio indicated to her at this time that the syndicate had knowledge that Goetz had participated in the Hemm and Bremer kidnapings but they did not care and he is positive that the syndicate was not responsible for his death.

Trene stated that she went to Mrs. Berker's apartment frequently thereafter in hopes of contacting Freddie er "Doc" Barker, as she was concerned about the money at Wilmington, Illinois, but neither of them was at home and "Mother" could not advise her where she could get in touch with them.

Irene stated that she deserted her apartment at 7827 South Shore
Drive after Goetz was killed, leaving all of her possessions behind, and
went to live with Mr. and Mrs. Phil Deandre. It will be recalled that
Phil Deandre received a six months sentence for carrying a concealed weapon
in Judge Wilkerson's courtroom during Al Capone's trial for income tax evasion
in Chicago about three years ago. Deandre was formerly the private chauffour
for Al Capone.

Irone advised that on Thursday, March 25, 1934, while she was at "Mother's" apartment, Freddie came in at about 4:00 P. M.; that at this time she observed that he had his fingers bandaged. He complained of the severe pain in his fingers and walked about the room like a deranged person. At this time Irene asked Fred Barker to remove the money from her uncle's I place immediately as she did not want her uncle to become involved in any trouble. Fred advised her that he thought it would be safer there than any other place and promised her faithfully that her uncle would not be involved in any way. However, she insisted on having the money removed, and after further pleading he finally consented, and in this connection instructed his mother and her to proceed to Aprora, Illinois in his car and there pick up Volney Davis, furnishing Irene with Volney's address, which she recalled was 415 Fox Street. Freddie could not drive on account of his injured hands. and when Irene asked him what had happened, referring to his fingers, he stated that he and Karpis had their fingerprints removed through a surgical operation by some hoodlum doctor in Chicago. Irene further stated that she drove Mother Barker to Aurora in Freddie's car and stopped at 415 Fox Street. Mother, who apparently knew Volney Davis well, went to the house and inquired for him, whereupon a man who closely resembled John Dillinger, came to the door, and upon recognizing Mrs. Barker, he let them in and they called for Volney; that this occasion was the first time she had met Volney Davis,

although she had heard his name mentioned frequently by the boys. A photograph of William Weaver was exhibited to Irene, and she advised that same resembled the man she thought was Dillinger but she did not make a positive identification.

Irons further advised that Volney Davis accompanied her and Mrs. Barker to Wilmington, Illinois, arriving there after dark; the she went into her uncle's house and informed him that she came for the two packages previously brought there by Goetz, whereupon he a directed her and Volney Davis to his work shop located in the rear of the house. Mother Barker remained in the car. Irene stated that her uncle pointed out to Volney Davis the location of these packages, whereupon Volney obtained them and carried them to the car; that she also had Volney get some of Goets' personal effects, which likewise were kept in this shack. (Included in these things was a time bomb which Goetz had invented and constructed. Irone described it as a piece of mechanism on the order of a time bomb with various leather straps affixed to it; that the purpose of this contraption was to instill fear into a vistim by strapping this time bomb on his person and then giving him a certain amount of time to follow out bowmands, for instance, to open a wault or reveal some hiding place where money would be kept; that although this device does not appear to be practical it did have some psychological effect on the victim. She stated that the above article is now in the possession of the Barker boys and to her knowledge it has never been used on one of their jobs.

Irene stated that on the return trip to Chicago, she overheard Mother Barker and Volney Davis discuss the amount of money in the two packages which they had obtained at her uncle's place; that Mother Barker advised that to her knowledge about \$6,000.00 had already been taken from the total amount, which was either spent or given away, she could not remember which; that with the exception of this amount, the money was intact.

She further advised that they proceeded to Aurora, Illinois, and in view of the fact that Freddie had not mentioned that Volney should accompany her and "Mother" to Chicago, they left him off at the Fox Street address, after which they proceeded to Chicago alone with all the money. She stated that they arrived at the apartment at about 5:00 A. M. and she and "Mother" carried the packages to the room; that when they entered the apartment, she observed Fred Barker walking around the place as though he were insane. He repeatedly mentioned the severe pain in his fingers and continually called for a doctor. At this time Mrs. Barker suggested

that Irene get Goets' doctor, Dr. Renbe, and asked Freddie if he would be all right. Freddie replied, "To hell with George", referring to Goets Irene stated that this remark remained indelibly in her mind and she often wondered just why Fred Barker made that statement. At times she believed that had fred been in his right mind, he never would have made such a remark, as prior to Goetz' death he always looked up to him as a superior and generally admired and respected his ability. Furthermore, she never heard Fred Barker say a word against him at any time previously. On the other hand, Goetz might have incurred Fred's animosity when he "backed out" of going to Beno, Nevada, and this reason, coupled with the fact that Goetz was doing a great deal of talking towards the end of his life, appears to suggest to her a probable motive for Goets' assassination at the hands of the Barkers. In this connection Irene explained that during the last few weeks of Goetz' life, he showed symptoms at times of being mentally unbalanced; that on numerous occasions he would some home and rave to her as though he were insane; that at times when he was reading a newspaper he would, without any provocation, throw the newspaper on the floor and talk about a coming revolution in this country. She further stated that while he was in this mental state, he imparted certain confidential information to persons whom he would not have trusted ordinarily. Irene gave as an example of this that Goetz told her more of his criminal activities during the last two months of his life than he previously had during the eight years she had been living with him.

Irene furnished another theory for Goetz' death - that he might have "chased around" with the wrong woman, that is, one who did not meet with the approval of either the syndicate in Chicago or the Barker-Karpis outfit. In this connection she called agent's attention to a blonde woman, to whom the newspapers gave much publicity at the time of Goetz' death, as the girl who frequently was seen with him. She advised that she recalls reading an account in the Milwaukee newspapers concerning one Virginia Seiminski, who gave herself up at the Milwaukee Police Department for questioning concerning Goetz, and at this time Irene indicated that it is entirely probable that this blonde woman above referred to is Virginia Seiminski. It has been ascertained through the Milwaukee Police Department that this girl is the daughter of Mrs. William (Martha) Kozlawski, who resides at 1819 Lincoln Street, North Chicago, Illinois. A photograph of this girl has been obtained from the Milwaukee Police Department and same is being retained in the Chicago Division office files for future investigation.

Irene stated that after much persuasion on the part of Mrs. Barker, Freddie finally agreed to have Dr. Rende visit him, whereupon Irene telephoned Charles Grosscurth, a very good friend of hers, and asked whether

he would drive her to Cleare, Illinois, She explained that the reasen she called Charles Grosscurth at this time was because she did not want to go anaccompanied in view of the lateness of the hour and Mother Berker could not go as she had her hands full with Freddie and did hot want to leave him alone. Grosscurth agreed to accompany her, after which she picked him up in front of the Country Club Hotel 6850 South Shore brire. Chicago, Illinois, where he was residing, and he drove her to Cleare. Illinois, where she contacted Dr. Henbe at his home. She explained Freddie's condition to him and after some persuasion, he agreed to go with her; that Grosscurth drove them back and she directed him to let them off at the intersection of 72d Street and the first street east of South Shore Drive, which is Yates Avenue. She stated that as a precautionary measure she did not want Grosscurth to know where the patient, Fred Barker, was living, as Grosscurth was legitimate and did not know him or any of the other boys, with the exception of Goots and Monty Carter.

Renbe gave Fred an injection, which was supposed to relieve his pain; that she then drove the doctor back to Cisero in Fred's car and when she returned she was completely exhausted and in a very nervous condition. At this time Mrs. Barker invited her to live with them until she became well or at least until the "heat" blew over, as at that time the newspapers were giving much publicity concerning the efforts of the police to locate her for questioning in connection with her husband's death. Irene, however felt that she would be an added burden to Mrs. Barker as she had noted that the mother was having considerable difficulty with her son, Freddie, at that time, and in view of her physical condition, she thought it best to proceed to Rochester, Minnesota, immediately and recuperate for a while at the Mayo Brothers Clinic.

Irene advised that on the following day Freddie's condition become worse and as a consequence he became almost uncontrollable; that Mrs. Barker could do nothing with him alone and she pleaded with Irene to remain with her at least until Freddie became well. Irene, however, insisted that she had to look after her own health and she refused, whereupon the mother suggested that Irene drive to Aurora, Illinois and ask Volney Davis to live with them for a while. Irene stated she proceeded to Aurora, Illinois, alone in Freddie's Ford sedan and informed Volney Davis of the situation at the Berkers. He agreed to help out in any way and he suggested that she leave Fred's car in Aurora and drive with him to Chicago in his Chevrolet sedan. Irene advised that en route she and Volney discussed various subjects, particularly the death of Fred Goetz and he advised her at this time that he had heard information to the effect that Goetz was being trailed by the Government for the past five months, and that in all

probability this was the reason for his murder, indicating that his cohorts might have been afraid that Goets would lead the law to them according to Irene, Volney also told her that the Government man who was on Goets' trail during the above period was a man by the name of Canaling ham, and that he was connected with the United States Department of Justice

Irene further stated that on the second trip to Aurora, she met for the first time Volney's wife, whom she bdieves is a blende. She identified the photograph of Edna Murray alias Edna Grace elias "Rabbits" as this girl. Irene stated that when she and Volney arrived at the Barker apartment, she remained there for only a short time, and this was the last time she saw any of the above mentioned individuals.

she advised that she continued to live at the home of Pail Deandre for a few days afterwards and around this period she sent a telegram together with some money, to Monty Carter, who at that time was living at 5548 North East 17th Avenue, Phoenix, Arizona, and asked him to come to Chicago. She stated that Monty Carter came in by plane, and when he arrived in Chicago, he was practically broke, as was she; that she sent Monty to the Barkers to get some money for her and himself, inasmuch as she had previously asked Barker for money and he advised her at that time that he did not have very much available cash on hand and he would see to it that she received some money in a few days. Monty in was unable to obtain anything from Barker, and as a consequence who ber-3 rowed \$150.00 from Charles Grosscurth and then left for Rochester, Minnesota, on or about March 30, 1934. Monty remained in Chicago, as the Barkers promised him and Irene some money in a few days. Irene stated that she stopped at the Mayo Brothers Clinic in Rochester for about ten days and then returned to Chicago; that Monty at this time evidently was successful in getting some money, as when she contacted Grosscurth upon her return, he advised her that someone had left \$1,000.00 with him for her. She stated that she asked Grossourth at this time where Monty was but he did not know, stating that he only saw him on one occasion while she was in Rochester. Irene stated that she remained in Chicago for only three days at this time, when she returned to the Mayo Brothers Clinc; that at this time she stayed for about two weeks and again returned to Chicago; that upon arriving in Chicago she made numerous attempts to contact Monty Carter through Grossourth but he did not know where he was as Monty had not been in touch with him; that she proceeded to Wilmington, Illinois to visit her folks and while she was there they annoyed her so much she decided to leave this section of the country and go to California. She stated she left without letting

her folks know of her destination, and she proceeded to where she contacted Lee Bevans, who is a brother of Art Bevans, me of her former boy friends. She stated that she had previously met Les Bevans at Rochester, Minnesota, at which time he persuaded her to go to California with him, stating that he had a job there waiting for him; that Lee and she traveled to Springfield, Illinois by train and there purchased a second hand Ford cabrielet; that while she was in Springfiel she desired very much to get in touch with Carter before leaving for California, and upon this occasion she called Elmer Farmer of Bensonvil Illinois, by telephone. She explained that Elmer Farmer was very friendly with Monty Carter as well as the other boys, and she was of the epinion that if Monty was in Chicago, Elmer would know of his location. She advised that she called Farmer's place and asked for Monty; that Monty was there at the time and talked with her over the telephone; that Monty asked her whether everything was all right, whereupon she informed him A that she was on her way to San Francisco; California, to get some rest. Monty tried to persuade her to accompany him to Phoenix, Arizona, stating that he thought the climate there would be more beneficial to her. However, she had fully made up her mind to proceed to California and told him that she did not want to be of any bother to him and his family, Irene contends that this is the last time she heard from Monty, but she stated that while she was in the hospital at San Francisco, Lee Bevans brought her a letter, presumably from Yeva Carter, Monty's wife, in which she stated at the time that they were contemplating going to the North Moods in Wisconsin for a brief stay. Irone was unable to state where this letter was mailed or where Lee Bevans obtained it, explaining that at that time she was in such a bad condition physically, she did not bother to ask.

Irene further stated that she and Lee Bevans left Springfield,
Illinois, in the ear they purchased there and drove to San Francisco,
California, by way of Kansas City, Missouri and Denver, Colorado; that
upon arriving at San Francisco, they registered at the Larne Hotel as
man and wife; that shortly thereafter she showed symptoms of a nervous
breakdown, and at her request Bevans took her to Dr. Donald DeCarle,
who had previously treated her at the Mayo Brothers Climis in Rochester;
that upon examination Dr. DeCarle ordered her to the Stanford-Lane Hospital
in San Francisco and there placed her under the care of Dr. Henry Newman,
a staff physician at that institution.

With reference to Monty Carter, frequently mentioned above, Irene advised that his correct name is Byron Bolton, and that his home is at Virden, Illinois, where his parents and brothers are residing at the present time; that Carter served in the United States Navy during the World War, receiving an honorable discharge, and that subsequently he received disability compensation checks regularly from the United States Government; that Monty is married to Veva Freeman, whose home

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is at Theyer, Illinois, and that they have two children, a boy and a girl, whose names are Moses and Vonnie. Irene further stated that Monty and Goetz, together with Frankie Diaz, operated a liquor still in Springfield, Illinois during the years 1925 and 1926; that the following year they moved to Chicago and joined the Capane syndicate; that through this connection both Goetz and Carter became associated with seme of the most notorious criminals in Chicago at that time, namely, Al Capane, Ralph Capone, Jack and Harry Gusik, Gus Winkler, Ted Hewberry, Jack McGurn and Fred "Killer" Burke; that all at these men were apparently members of the syndicate, and in 1929 Ted Newberry, Gus Winkler, "Killer" Burke and Fred Goetz shot down in cold blood four members of the "Bugs" Moran mob, a rival gang, in a garage located on Borth Clark Street in Chicago. This killing is known in Chicago as the St. Valentine's Day massacre, as it occurred on February 14th.

massacre, as it occurred on February 14th.

Irene stated that the police learned, in their investigation of the above massacre, that Monty, who at that time was going under the name of Bolton, had rented the apartment in which the above killers were seen just prior to the massacre, and that in view of his implication in this case, Monty changed his name to O. B. Carter and his friends subsequently named him Monty. According to Irene, the Chicago police have been looking for Carter ever since the massacre but as yet they have not been successful in apprehending him. To her knowledge Monty was never arrested previously. She further stated that while Carter was evading the law, all of his compensation checks from the Government, which were being delivered to an address in Bloomington, Illinois, were returned by the Post Office unclaimed; that Monty had knowledge that the above address in Bloomington was being kept under surveillance by the Illinois State Police, and consequently he did not go near there. She further stated that Goetz more or less felt responsible for Carter's complicity in the above killings, which made him a fugitive from justice, and as a result cut off his previous income; that in this connection Goetz gave Monty on an average of \$200.00 to \$400.00 a month for his and his family's living expenses; that the syndicate likewise furnished Monty a certain amount of money for this purpose. Irene stated that Monty, in reciprocation, ran errands for Goetz and did everything ha demanded of him.

Miss Dorsey further stated that while they were living at 305 Walnut Street in Elmhurst, Illinois, Monty and his family were residing at 264 Ridgeland, which is also in Elmhurst; that they and the Carters moved from that town around the middle of August, 1933, and to her recollection the Carters moved to the Wilmington Hotel in Chicago;

that Mrs. Carter and the children also lived for a short period about this time at Yeva's niece's home, the address of which she does not know. She stated that she only knows this woman as "Sid", and that her husband's name is Joe. (These people are undoubtedly Joe and Bidina Williamson, who reside at 108 North Lamont Street, Chicago, Illineis.

Irene advised that Monty, his wife and the children left chicago during the middle of October, 1935, and moved to Phoenix, Arizona; that in this connection Monty is a victim of tuberculosis, and that his coster ordered him to live in that climate. She further provided the information that Monty is an excellent golfer and often posed as a golf professional and instructor; that last winter he won either the Arizona or Texas State golf championship. She also stated that Carter is a gambler by profession and although she does not know what he is doing at the present time, it is very likely that he is either in the slot machine raskef or is employed in some gambling house.

Irene further advised that shortly prior to Goetz' death, he was making negotiations for the erection of a gasoline service station on the corner of 16th Street and Austin Boulevard, Oak Park, Illinois, which property belongs to her but is in the name of her uncle, Simon Cinotte; that Ed. Konvalinka was endeavoring to get permission, through political influence, to erect this station on the desired corner, and that a J. Cotter, who is connected with the Anchor Gas and Oil Company, and a man named Ruppert draw the plans for this station. She stated that Ralph Capone lived directly across the street from this corner, and that he likewise aided in getting the necessary permission to put up the station; that on the night Goetz was murdered, he saw Ralph Capone and Ed. Konvalinka relative to the above matter, and as she recalls, Goetz telephoned her five minutes before he was killed and told her that he had completed the deal, referring to the gas station, and that he was going to Mangum's place to get a celebration drink. She stated that he appeared to be in exceptionally good spirits at that time, and now she has a faint recollection of Goetz telling her that "Doc" Barker and Willie Harrison were waiting for him outside in a car. She, however, was not positive concerning

with reference to Fred Mangum, owner of the Minerva Restaurant and Tavern, 4811-13 Cermak Road, Cicero, Illinois, in front of whose place Goetz was killed, Irene advised that Goetz had known him intimately for almost three years; that Mangum was formerly in the real estate business in Cicero, Illinois, and when he could not make a go with this line of business, he opened a tavern, in which he is now located.

Irone indicated that Mangum was not trusted by the syndicate of Chica and frequently was threatened with his life. She stated that she see Mangum after Gootz was killed and learned from him that while Goetz was in his place just prior to his death, two men entered the tavern who were strangers to him; that these men did not look right and took a position at the bar near Goets and he noticed that they frequently scrutinized him. On one occasion while these men were in the washroom, Mangum called Goetz' attention to them and warned him to be careful as: they looked exceptionally suspicious to him. According to Mangum, Soets merely laughed at him and stated that he was unduly suspicious of everyone With this remark he walked out of the place and a few minutes later Mangum heard three discharges which appeared to come from a shotgun. He immediately graphed his gun and ran out of the rear entrance and same around to the front. When he reached the sidewalk, he observed three men standing over Goets' body and he is positive that he recognized two ef :... these men as those whom he had warned Goets about. He stated that this recognition was later confirmed by the fact that these men left their drinks and their change on the bar, giving the appearance that they departed rather hurriedly. He was positive that these men had something to do with the killing. At this point it might be well to mention that a, Mangum denied to the police that Goetz had been in his tavern immediately prior to the time he was killed.

Irene further stated that on one occasion subsequent to Goets' death, she saw Monty Carter and discussed with him her busband's finances; that she was endeavoring to collect any outstanding cash which might be owing to him, and in this connection Monty told her that Goets had lost close to \$200,000.00 on the stock market during the past two years; that on one occasion last year and immediately after the Hamm kidnaping, Goets gave Monty \$14,000.00, which Irene presumed was Monty's split on the Hamm kidnaping, and that shortly thereafter, Goets borrowed this money from Carter to play the stock market; that according to Monty, Goets lost this entire amount on the exchange and the \$14,000.00 was never paid back to him... Irene advised that she also learned that Goets sid a large volume of stock business with Bill Siegel, who was formerly connected with Ettinger and Brand, Brokers in Chicage, Illibois.

Further information provided by Irene disclosed that on one occasion shortly after the Hamm kidnaping, she went to Monty's house in Elmhurst, Illinois, and there met Fred and "Doc" Barker. In this connection she advised that she had previously met these boys at one time at Jack Pfeiffer's place in St. Paul about five years ago, and therefore did not know them very well; that Monty told her this last time that she should drive Fred and "Doc" Barker wherever they desired to go; that they

directed her to Rocky Stacey's house, Melross Park, Illinois, and upon arriving there they went into the house and told her that they did not need her any more. She thought it peculiar at the time that Freddie and "Doc" should go to Rocky's house, as the Government had just questioned him about that time concerning the Kansas City massacre and he a consequence Rocky was considered very "hot". However, she arrived at the conclusion that it was none of her business and when she returned to Elmhurst, and informed Monty where she had taken Freddie and "Doc", Monty went up in the air".

She also stated that while they were living in Elmhurst, Illinois last summer Fred Barker drove up to their place one evening and was accompanied by "Chuck" Fitzgerald alias "Old Charley" and his wife, Belle; that they remained only a short while and this was the last time she paw either Charley or his wife.

Irene admitted knowing "Big Homer" and identified the photograph of Mrs. Homer Wilson and the child. She stated that Homer was formerly connected with a kennel club in Miami, Florida, and that he is a very good friend of Edward J. O'Hara, presently the President of the National Jockey Club at Cicero, Illinois; that the last time she saw "Big Homer" was in either February or March of this year, at which time he and his wife were living in an apartment located near theirs on the South side of Chicago; that Homer and his wife were staying with a couple known to her only as Frances and "Dutch". Agent exhibited a photograph of Clyde Nimerick to Irene, which she positively identified as of the man above referred to as Trances is no doubt Trances Hoisner.

Trene advised that when she saw "Big Homer" on this occasion he told her that the four of them, meaning he and his wife, "Dutch" and Frances, were going to travel through the South.

"Big Homer", that on one occasion during last summer she and Goetz stopped at the Green Lantern Tavern, located at 79th and Dobson Streets, and while at this place the bartender motioned to Goetz, indicating that someone, desired to see him in the back room; that Goetz went into the back part of the tavern and remained there for about three or four hours, and when he returned, Irene asked him whom he saw, and he told her at this time that "Big Homer" and his wife were there, and that Homer wanted to talk to him on business. Concerning the Green Lantern tavern, Irene advised that she does not know who owns this place but that same is considered a hangout and contact for the Barker-Karpis gang.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent R. C. Chicago, Illinois, dated September 1, 1934, Therein there is incorporate information to the effect that during the months of October and Hovenberg 1935 numerous calls emanating from Berwyn 1899, listed in the name of B. Johnson, an alias of Fred Goets, were made to Longbeach 5024, which number was ligted under the name of innabelle McGlynn, 941 irgyle Street, Chicago, Illingie. In view of the frequency of these calls, it was thought possible that Amabelle McGlynn might have been a close friend of Coets, and accord ingly she was interviewed by Special Agent Suran. She stated that her name is now Annabelle Parker but that her telephone, light and gas bills are still. listed in the name of Annabelle McGlynn. She denied knowing Fred Goets and feiled to recognize his photograph as that of anyone known to have She stated, however, that prior to the month of November, 1935, there was a young lady living with her by the name of Kathlean Sullivan, who was the girl friend or wife of one Buddy Whelen, who at that time was manager of a roadhouse, the name of which is unknown to her, and which is located across the road from the Mohawk Country Club, Bensonville, Illinois, She stated that Buddy Whelan did not own this roadhouse but managed it for other individuals and it was entirely possible that Buddy Whelen was acquainted with Fred Gosts.

Agent Suran learned, through an interview with Miss McGlynn's sister, that Kathleen Sullivan and Buddy Whelan ment to Miami, Florida, in the letter part of November, 1935 or the first part of December, and that Kathleen Sullivan's address at that city was Malida Apartments, Northeast 14th Street and Biscayne Boulevard.

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The above information is set out herein in the light of information provided by Irene Dorsey when agent asked her whom she thought had knowledge of the location of the hideout in this case. She readily mentioned the name, Buddy Whelan, in this connection and stated that Goets had furnished Whelan with a considerable amount of money during the fall of last year. She did not know the reason for such contributions. At any rate, she advised that Buddy Whelan and his girl friend went to Mismi, Florida during Movember, 1935, and that on one occasion, either subsequent to Bresser release or during his captivity, Whelan wrote Goets a letter which was postmarked Mismi and stated that he had knowledge to the effect that Goets had a hand in the Bremer kidnaping and at the same time remarked that he was low on money. According to Irene, this letter aggravated Goets yery much and he mentioned the fact that the whole thing appeared to him to be a blackmail scheme on the part of Whelan; that he "cussed" him out and 3 stated that he should be put on the spot. Irene advised that Whelan and the formerly operated a barbecue stand across the road from the Mohawk Country Club near Bensonville, Illinois.

In view of the foregoing, efforts will be made to locate Whelan for the purpose of interviewing him vigorously concerning any information he may have with reference to this case.

With further reference to Willie Harrisgn, Irene advised that she has known him for some time; that his only connection with the Barker-Karpis crowd, as far as she knows, is that of companionship, and the does not believe that Willie participated in any of the jobs performed by this gang and that he acted more or less in the capacity of a "finnix" for them. She advised that Willie Harrison was married in Hammond, Indispeto a girl by the name of Ruth on the same date that Ous Winkler married his wife, Georgia.

Holden, Bernard Phillips, Frank Nash and Gus Stone, and with reference to these persons she advised that during 1951 and 1952 she and Coets frequently met them at the O. P. Inn in Melrose Park, Illinois, which was owned and operated by "Dos" Stacey; that she distinctly recalls on one occasion during 1932 while she and Goetz were at the D. P. Inn, Tommy Holden, his wife, Lillian, Keating, his wife, Frances, Phillips, whom she knows as "Big Phil", and his girl friend, Winnie (Winnie Williams), Verne Miller, Vi Mathias and Que Stone came into the place in a very drunken condition; that they made a great deal of noise, and in a few instances Verne Miller pulled his gun from his holster and danced around the place like an Indian. She stated &. that Goets was very disgusted with them and later informed her that he repeatedly warned "Doc" Stacey to stay clear of these fellows or else they would eventually get him into a lot of trouble. She further mentioned the fact at this time that the above gang must be crazy to separately drive the around in public in large, expensive cars, bearing foreign license plates, and then park the cars in a group wherever they went; that she indicated that such actions would surely create suspicion and probably lead to their arrests. Irene also advised that Frances, who used to work as a cook at 🐔 the O. P. Inn and who subsequently lived with Frank Nash, used to be the 🖟 girl friend of Gus Stone. In this connection, according to Irene, Goets frequently warned Gus against Frances, indicating to him that she could not; be trusted and that if he were wise, he would not associate with her. She also advised that she had received information to the effect that the underworld, particularly the Barker-Karpis gang, were "gunning" for Frances Nash, as it was purported that she was seen on one occasion on the streets in Chicago with six Department of Justice agents shortly after the Kansas City passacre, which gave the appearance that she was cooperating with them.

With reference to the Kansas City massacre, Irene stated that Goetz had told her that Verne Miller was the person who manned the machine gum, and in this connection made the remark that Verne must be crasy to do such a thing and think that he would get away with it; further, that on

the night before the killing, Verne was supposed to have called BocStacey at Melrose Park, Illinois, and told him that he was going to meet
Frank Mash and the law at the Union Station in Kansas City the following
morning; that Verne also called St. Paul and New York, advising them of a
the same, but Irene could not state what persons Terne talked with in
St. Paul and New York in these telephone conversations.

irene elsimed that efter "Doc" Stacey was arrested for making a telephone call in connection with the Kansas City massacre, Costs make numerous efforts to collect money from the underworld in Chicago for the purpose of Stacey's defense. However, she could not state how much money he secured for this purpose.

Irems also stated that on one occasion during 1935 she asked Goetz what become of "Big Phil" who was Bernard Phillips, as she had not seen him for quite some time; that Goetz told her at this time that "Big Phil" was killed two years ago and volunteered no further information concerning him.

Miss Dorsey further advised that Jack Gusik, who is at present serving time at the Federal Penitentiary for income tax evasion, was a very good friend of Goetz; that when Gusik was incarcerated, Goetz corresponded with him regularly in a sort of code language. She stated that pursuant to Goetz instructions, she rented a Post Office Box in Oak Park, Illinois, and that Gusik addressed his latters to this box. Irene advised that when she rented the above Post Office Box, she gave the name of Anna Moran and furnished a fictitious address in Oak Park; that as she recalls, she gave Monty Carter as one of her references. In this connection it will be recalled that when Alvin Karpis applied for rental of an apartment at the Orlando Hotel last winter, he furnished the name, Anna Moran, as a reference with a Post Office Box address, and subsequent investigation at the Post Office failed to reveal the identity of this woman.

Irene concluded that when she will be released from the sanitarium she intends to immediately proceed to San Francisco. Celifornia, and look for employment there. In this connection it might be stated that she has frequently expressed to agent her affections for a Dr. Henry Watkins, a staff physician at the Stanford-Iane Hospital and has indicated at times that she will marry him upon her arrival in San Francisco.

Irene frequently displayed the utmost contempt for her mother during agent's interviews with her and blames her for her present predicament She advised that her pother tricked her into doming to Chicago and placing her in the sanitarium and that she will never forgive her for this. She also stated that her family is not financing her medical care at the sanitarium and she will probably have to pay this bill herself shen she is released.

So other information of any significance or value has been obtained from Miss Dorsey.

It will be stated here that it is reasonably safe to accept Miss Dorsey's information as being correct as at times during the period of interviews with her, various angles and addresses were blacked for borroboration, and in each instance same were found to be substantially borrest. During the later interviews with Irene she presented no indications of being mentally unbalanced, and it is agent's belief that she will be released from the sanitarium in a very short time. Or Gahagan, her physician, was not available for his opinion in this regard.

On October 10, 1934, this agent proceeded to Wilmington, Tillhols and confronted Simon Cinotto, the uncle of Irone Dorsey, with the information supplied by her concerning the two packages left at his place for safe keeping by Goetz. He at first denied any knowledge of such packages and claimed that the last time he say Goots was during the sum of 1933, at which time he and Irone paid him a visit. However, the later admitted that one day during the week prior to rebruary 80, 1951, Goets came to his room and had in his possession a large package which he estimated was about 36 inches long, 18 inches wide and 20 inches high; that this package, as he recalls, was wrapped in brown paper, and referring to it, Goetz told him that its contents were very valuable and asked whether he could store it some place within his house, where it would be safe, Cinotto advised that he had no available space in his basement but that he could very easily keep it in his work shop and garage, located in the rear of his home. Goets then asked whether this shop was locked at all times and Cinotto enswered "Yes", stating that he had many valuable tools in there and for this reason exercised extra precaution to see that same was kept locked at all times. Cinotto advised that Goetz personally carried the package to his work shop and placed it in the corner which Cinctto allocated to Goetz for this purpose. In this connection be explained that Goetz had previously brought to him some of his effects for safe keeping, namely deer heads and the like, all of which were kept intact in that particular corner. At this time agent specifically questioned

Cinetto as to whether or not Coetz was accompanied by another man, in view of what Irone had previously told agent in that she had a hazy recollection that Goetz was accompanied by Fred Barker on this trip, but Cinotto emphatically denied this.

Cinotto further related that approximately two weeks later.

Irene and Goetz came to his home, and on this occasion Goetz brought with him another package, which was approximately the same size as the first; that he, Goetz, placed this package in his, Cinotto's, work shop along with the other belongings of Goetz and covered them with a tarpaulin which Cinotto furnished him. At this time Goetz indicated that he was leaving these packages in his care for only a few days. At this time Cinotto emphatically denied that he had knowledge of what the above boxes contained and admitted knowing Monty Carter and Goetz but denied knowing any other members of the mob in this case.

called him by telephone and stated that he had a moving job for him.

Inasmuch as he was in that line of business, Cinotto agreed to move him, and in this connection he and his son drove to an address in Berwyn, Illinois, which Goetz furnished him and moved the effects and furniture therein to an unfurnished apartment located at 1528 East 69th Place, thicago, Illinois; that to his recollection he also picked up on this trip some furniture at a storage place hear the latter address. Cinotto stated that Goetz specifically requested him at that time not to mention anything to Irene concerning the latter apartment, to which he agreed. He disclaimed any knowledge of Goetz' connections and racket and stated that he only knew him through Irene and was also of the opinion that Goetz worked as a landscape gardener.

Cinotto further stated that about three or four days after Goetz was killed, Irene arrived at his house at about 9:00 o'clock in the evening, at which time she was accompanied by a man whom he had never given previously; that she appeared to be in a highly nervous and excited state and advised him at this time that she came for Goets belongings. He stated that he directed her and her male companion to his work shop and pointed out to them the location of the articles in question; that the man carried the two packages mentioned above to the car. At this time Cinotto abserved another woman sitting in the automobile but he was unable to recognize her on account of the darkness. Cinotto stated that Irene and her companions left hurriedly after receiving the two packages. The photograph of Volney Davis was exhibited to Simon Cinotto, but he was unable to identify same as being that of the man whom he saw with Irene, giving the reason that it was very dark and as a consequence he did not get a good look at him. He likewise failed to identify the photograph of Mother Barker as the woman sitting in the car.

igent thought it peculiar that Goets should trust Gis to the extent of placing in his care all of the ransom money in this wase, which Trene estimated to be approximately \$194,000.00, and at first it was the belief of this agent that Cinotto might have had so part in the kidnaping of Bremer. This suspicion was previously borne out during interviews with Irone Dorsey, as it was noted that when agent questioned her concerning a hideout, she purposely evaded the issue and launched off into some other matter. She also repeatedly stressed the point that her uncle was in no way involved in instant kidnaping and that he absolutely knew no one of the gang except Carter and Coets. In view of the foregoing and the fact that the sounds occurring in Wilmington, Illinois correspond in many respects with those heard by Bremer in his hideout, agent gained the impression that it was entirely possible that the hideout might have been at the uncle's place. Agent had occasion to observe Mr. (Cinotto's househeld and found that it in no way answers the description of the hideout as furnished by wittin Bremer. Also, Cinotto has no small children and there are no dogs located in close proximity to the house.

With reference to Irene's statement relative to the appearance of two deputy game wardens at the hideout, who asked the occupants for hunting licenses, which corroborates the information furnished by victim Bremer, agent proceeded to Joliet, Illinois en October 19, 1934, and interviewed, in the absence of Paul Upton, Geme Warden, Mr. Charles Gehagan, Chief Deputy Geme Warden. Mr. Gehagan advised that his territory includes Wilmington, Coal City and Braidwood, Illinois, and all territory from the Kankakee County line to Joliet, Illinois along the Kankakee River; that last winter the above territory was also patroled by John Cinotto of Coal City, Illinois. John Cinotto, incidentally, is a brother of Simon Cinotto, the uncle of Irene Dorsey. Both Gehagan and Cinotto were shown photographs of members of the Barker-Karpis gang, but neither was able to make any identifications therefrom.

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Agent carefully discussed with these men the incident related by victim Bremer and Irene Dorsey with respect to the game warden's visit at the hideout during Bremer's captivity, but they could not recall any such visit and in this connection Cahagan advised that he does not make inquiries at houses promiscuously with the demand that the occupants display their hunting licenses.

Agent asked both Mr. Gahagan and Mr. Cinotto whether the name "Pancho" was familiar to them, as it will be recalled that victim Bremer mentioned the fact that the only name he heard while at the hideout was "Pancho", and in this connection Gahagan stated that the name appears

very familiar to him and he is positive that he has heard it in and around Wilmington, Illinois. He, however, could not associate it with any particular place but premised agent that he will give this considerable thought and should he learn where "Panche" is located, he will immediately communicate with the Chicago Division office. Mr. Cinothe was unable to furnish any information concerning the name, "Panche".

At 1528 East 69th Place, Chicago, Illinois, at which address Cinotto moved Goets from 2141 Ounderson Avenue, Berwyn, Illipois, agent interviewed Mr. and Mrs. Fred Moeller, owners and agents of the building. Mr. Moeller advised, after viewing the photograph of Fred Goets, that he distinctly recalls him as George B. Johnson; that to his recollection Johnson came to the building on one occasion and asked to be shown various apartments therein; that Moeller showed him apartment 102 and after viewing same, Johnson expressed his desire to rent same; that he signed a thirteen-month lease at the rate of \$50.00 per month and gave as a reference a previous landlord, Boss N. Browne, 919 North Michigan Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. He gave his occupation as that of a landscape gardener which and his business telephone as Berwyn 1599. Mrs. Moeller at this time stated the that she had quite a talk with Johnson prior to his moving into the building on which occasion he told her that he was employed by the Government as a landscape architect, and that the majority of his work was out of town; that she would, in all probability, note his frequent absences from the apartment, and in this connection she should not be alarmed as he probably would be working away from Chicago. He also informed Mrs. Moeller that he served in the Air forps during the World War and was a licensed plant Mr. Moeller advised agent that about a week after Goetz was killed, be was reading the newspaper and observed Johnson's picture therein; that he immediately recognized it and called the police, informing them that the man in question was living in his building at the time of his death. He also requested that they keep his address out of the newspapers as he feared that such publicity would give the building a bad reputation. Mr. Moeller stated that two detectives of the Chicago Police Department responded to his call and in his presence they thoroughly searched Johnson's apartment; that according to Moeller, no papers having any apparent value. were found; that to his recollection a pair of high top shoes, very worn, and a pair of riding breeches were found in the closet; that he, upon authorization of the police, burned these clothes the following day. He was unable to furnish any other information which might be of value in this Caso.

It is respectfully requested that all offices exercise great care that Irene Dorsey's name be not mentioned as the source of the above information in conducting further investigations in this case.

Reference is made to your long distance telephone call of October 20, 1934, relative to Louis/Pleason, Edith/Williams, and Dorothy Snyder who were arrested by the police department at Claremore, Oklahoma; and also to a letter dated October 22nd from 0. 3. Hall, Special Agent at Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Kinnesota license B-478673 is listed to Edith Williams at 295 Stinson Street, St. Paul, Minnesota.

On October 22, 1934, Special Agent M. Pranks went to 295 Stinson and there interviewed Mrs. Joseph Scharf who stated that she owns this house and that Edith Williams never lived at this address but that she used to come and visit the people living upstairs.

Krs. Scharf stated that for the past six years, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Freye had lived there; that he works for the St. Paul Book & Stationery Company at St. Paul; that this family is now residing at 208 Front Street, St. Paul; that Mrs. Freye's first name is Molly and has a daughter by a first marriage who goes by the names of Lilliam Reissner or Roisner (spelling uncertain), Lilliam Kohm, and Gameo or Cameron or Cammon; that this daughter's husband is Al Kohm. Mrs. Scharf stated that just during the past year, this daughter Lilliam had stayed with Mr. and Mrs. Freye permanently and it was during this time that this Edith Williams would come and visit; that mail also used to some to this address for Edith Williamshiol/ E 'O?/ Free Agents

showed that Lillian was Mrs. Al Kohn. Mrs. Scharf further stated that Al Kohn used to come there now and then but never seemed to stay over. night: that the occupants of this house seem to be very suspicious to her at different times as on one occasion Mrs. Freye had told her that Al Kohn was in the hospital and at different times people would call Mrs. Scharf and ask for Al Kohn and she would advise them that he was in a hospital and Mrs. Freys told har on several occasions not to give out any information to anyone regarding what she heard or saw around the place; that Lillian used to wear a Eudson seal coat which was valued at about \$450 and that all of the occupants seemed to be very well dressed. She further stated that she thinks Edith Williams had a Chevrolet car when last around this place and that she must have bought it through the Utility Finance Company in St. Paul because letters would come to 295 Stineon addressed to Edith Williams from this firm. Mrs. Scharf stated that a men also used to come around there and the only name she knew him by was "Sugar"; also, a girl mamed Margie would come and visit Lilliam and she seemed to stay over night now and then. Mrs. Scharf's opinion was that "Sugar" and Margie were husband and wife; that Al Kohn used to some to this house about once a week and whenever he left he generally was carrying a black grip about two feet long and about ten inches wide and ten inches high, and Kohn remarked once that it contained clothing. Mrs. Scharf stated that it contained something heavier than elothing as it appeared to be heavy; that Mr. and Mrs. Freye were told to move out 🕾 and they did so on August 25, 1934. Mrs. Scharf stated they were a little behind in their rent and that is the reason she asked them to get out, but she stated that the real reason was that these people's activities were very suspicious but she did not give that reason to Mrs. Freye. This home at 295 Stinson is an upper and lower duplex and the Freye people lived upstairs.

Mrs. Scharf further stated that at different times men would come and knock at her door and ask for Edith Williams and she would advise them that she did not live there. Then these men would come in and use her telephone and call up Edith Williams at an exchange which she believes to have been Elkhurst; that Mrs. Freye once stated that Edith Williams was a housekeeper for a man who was travelling on the road; that on several occasions Edith used to have two little, valuable dogs with her which Mrs. Freye stated belonged to Edith's employer.

Agent inquired of Mrs. Scharf whether the occupants of this house ever made any long distance telephone calls from her telephone inasmuch as there was no telephone upstairs, and she remarked that they made only local calls; that during this past summer, the daughter Lillian

was supposed to have a softage at White Bear Lake for a while. Mrs. Scharf stated that she did not know what their "racket" or business was and that there did not seem to be any drinking going on as they never had any parties.

67c Reference is had to Division letter dated October 25, 1934 concerning certain information obtained from his connection with members of the Karpis-Barker gang.

Please be advised that on the afternoon of October 27 I received a telephone call from Inspector Cowley at Chicago requesting that Informant be sent to Oklahoma at once with instructions to develop what further information he could in regard to the matter. I advised Inspector Cowley that it would first be necessary to obtain a permit from the Goverto visit that State, inasmuch as he is under a nor of Oklahoma for banishment parole. Inspector Cowley directed me to communicate with the Oklahoma City office by telephone and have this matter arranged, if possible. I did so and yesterday received from the Oklahoma City office the necessary permit signed by the Governor of Oklahoma.

In discussing this matter with Mr. Cowley regarding compensation to be paid the informant, I was advised by Mr. Cowley that I would be authorized to offer informant \$1000, each, for information leading to the apprehension of Karpis, the Barker brothers and Volney Davis, and as much as \$300 for the apprehension of Dr. Moran. Mr. Cowley, I believe, suggested that I make my own arrangements with regard to financing of informant for the work he is to undertake. I therefore have arranged for Informant to leave here today en route to Oklahoma City and have agreed to advance him transportation and expense money and, further, that we would supply him with as much as \$20 per week while engaged on this activity, to be deducted in the event he is successful in causing the apprehension of any of the fugitives and receives the reward therefor. If he is unsuccessful the amounts advanced will be considered in the way of salary.

DATE: 11-1-65 27.

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For the purpose of the record, it is stated that Informant will enter on duty today, at noon, and will report to the Agent in Charge at Oklahoma City upon his arrival there. I will personally advance him \$25 or \$30 here upon departure, and in view of the fact that he will be working under the jurisdiction of the Oklahoma City office, I assume that office will take care of his weekly expenses thereafter during the period of his employment.
