On Saturday, June 1, Mrs. J.Aletreet, wife of a special agent attached to this office, reported having seen a tan colored, small sedan automobile which ran through a traffic light in Kl Paso and by such action aroused her suspicious, causing her to follow the car for several blocks during which time she claims she got a good look at the driver and she is absolutely satisfied the same was Alvin Karpis, although he had red hair. She claims that the lines around his mouth and the hair line, etc., were to identical and that he had that "hunted look". Mrs. Street furnished as with what she claims is the actual license number on the ear which was 1935 Arizona No. NS 57. She also stated that the man had considerable baggage lashed on ∸ the car, and was apparently trying to get through town in a hurry. We broadeast the license number over the local police radio but no one saw or checked the car afterwards.

I wired the motor vehicle division of the State Highway Department at Phoenix, Arix., and on June 4 received a reply stating that Arizona 1955 license No. MS 37 was issued to Mrs. Homor Harris, Cadedon, Tuna County, Aris., for a Chevrolet Cabriolet, Motor \$3765994.

I do not know just how seriously to take Mrs. Street's information. although I have the utmost confidence in her sincerity, I do not have so much confidence in the correctness of her deductions, nor an I entirely confident that she furnished the right license number, as at first she was a little in doubt about it. However, in view of the recent rumors to the effect that the remainder of the Karpis gang are probably now in the West or Southwest, I deem it advisable to request you to make an investigation concerning the automobile hereinabove described, to locate and identify Mrs. Homer Harris, the alleged owner. It may be that her license plates have been stolen, especially if they were on a sedan and the records show her car to be a cabriolet.

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

Mr. Newby has invited my attention to a statement contained in the report submitted by J. H. Hanson at Jacksonville,
Florida on April 23, 1935, relating to an interview with Mr.

T. K. Knight, the fether-in- law of Joek Adams. You will recall that Joe Adams is under indictment for harboring Karpis, et al in Florida, and that his father-in-law T. R. Knight is a political figure of considerable prominence in lorida. T. R. Knight advised Agents McKee and Henson as follows: "He mentioned that he had been to Washington, D.C., a few days prior to his conversation with the

Agents and that he had discussed the facts in this case with the Honorable Joseph B. Keenan, Assistant Attorney General, and that Mr. Keenan had explained to him that on occasions when a case was presented to the Federal Grand Jury and an indictment had been secured, if subsequent investigation revealed that the case was not one that should be prosecuted, that on some occasions indictments had been dismissed for this reason.

"Mr. Knight stated that it was for this reason that he was speaking to the Agents, hoping that they would hurry and complete the investigation and make a recommendation to the United States Attorney that no prosecution be had against Mr. Adams.

"Wr. Knight was informed that such recommendation was not within the province or duties of a Special Agent and that under no circumstances would such a recommendation be made; that the duties of the Special Agents were solely to gather facts and that it was within the province of the United States Attorney to institute pro-

Moran, Harry Campbell, William Feaver, William J. Harrison and Myrtle Eston. The set of glossy finished photographs, enclosed herewith, should also be furnished to Mr. France.

The Agent who conducts the interview should also furnish Mr. Frazier with information concerning persistent runors received by the Bureau to the effect that Fillian Teaver has purchased as farm somewhere in Arkanes, and that Alvin Earpis and Harry Caupbell are reported to be in hiding on this farm. Mr. Frazier should, of course, be requested to treat this information as confidentials

as to the manner in which any information obtained by him should be seemmicated to you, and further that he will be paid for any information resulting in the location and apprehension of the individuals referred to herein.

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Inquiry in Lonoke, Arkansas, revealed Walter Noe lives at Beebe, Arkansas, and his daughter, Virgie Noe, is presently living on Route 4, Lonoke, Arkansas, with Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Moore.

Virgie Noe, Route 4, Lonoke, Arkansas, advised that on February 2, 1935, she and Elizabeth Schropshir, a girl who resides at Beebe, Arkansas, had decided to hitchhike to Phoenix, Arizona, to visit Elizabeth Schropshir's brother, who works at that place. Virgie Noe stated they left Beebe on February 2, 1935, and hitch-hiked their way to Phoenix, Arizona, arriving at that place on February 5, 1935. Miss Noe advised she and Elizabeth obtained a job with a Mrs. Jones, who resides on Route 1, Phoenix, Arizona, and whose mail box is #262, and worked for her and stayed with her all the time they were in Arizona. Miss Noe stated she left Arizona about one month ago and returned to Lonoke, Arkansas, and that Elizabeth Schropshir went on to California, and her present whereabouts is unknown to Miss Nos. Miss Nos advised she has never heard of Phoenix Donald and knows no one by that name or by the name of William Weaver. photograph of Phoenix Donald was exhibited to Miss Nos, and she advised she had never seen anyone who resembled the photograph of Donald. Miss Noe was questioned regarding any correspondence she might have carried on with anyone in Conway, Arkansas, during her stay in Arizona. Miss Noe advised she wrote several letters to Arvle Brown, a rural mail carrier who lives in Conway, Arkansas, and who is the son of Tom Brown, a former firemen of Conway, Arkensas. Miss Noe advised she was never in any trouble of any kind, had never been arrested, and had not served any time in the Arizona Industrial School for Women, located at Phoenix, Arizona. The following description of Virgie Noe is being set forth:

Reference is had to telephone conversation of June 11, 1935 from Mr. Tamm of the Bureau to the St. Paul Office advising that wire had been received from Harry H. Peterson, Attorney General of the State of Minnesota, to the effect that Leonard Mankins, a prisoner in the Stillwater, Minnesota, prison on the charge of robbery of the Northwestern Bank of Minneapolis, Minnesota, is applying for a pardon from the Minnesota Prison on the basis that a confession made by JESS DOYLE exonerates him of the crime for which he has been convicted and is now serving sentence; that the wire of Attorney General Peterson further stated that he had requested United States Attorney George Sullivan, St. Paul, Minnesota, to furnish him JESS DOYLE'S confession; that Mr. Sullivan had advised him that he would only furnish DOYLE'S confession on authorization of this Bureau.

Mr. Tamm instructed that Mr. Sullivan be advised that it is not within the jurisdiction of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to tell the United States Attorney what he should do in this matter, or whether he should furnish DOYLE'S confession to the Attorney General of Minnesota, this being a matter for him to determine.

This matter was discussed with Mr. Sullivan and he was advised along the lines requested by Mr. Tamm. He said his reason for not giving Attorney General Peterson the confession in the first place was because he did not .... want to do anything which might jeopardize any pending impostigation being made by this Bureau. On June 11, 1935 a Federal Judge in the District of Minnesota signed an order vacating the removal order previously made by which JESS DOYLE would be removed to Oklahoma on the charge of the robbery of the Okemah, National Bank of Okemah, Oklahoma. DOYLE signed a waiver immediately thereafter which he gave to State Sheriff F. G. Benton of Lincoln, Nebraska, and Sheriff Emil Ackerman of Fairbury, Nebraska, for his return to Fairbury, Nebraska, to face charges of bank robbery in State Court at that point.

KAT: CSH June 7, 1935 MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR RE: BREMER KIDNAPING CASE. the informant who pointed out Volney Davis Gandy to us, claims that Mr. Cowley had assured her she would be paid liberal compensation in the event she furnished information resulting in the apprehension of Davis. She claims she does not know how much she was to receive but I recall on several occasions talking with Mr. Cowley and telling him that we would pay any confidential informant who furnished information to us resulting in the apprehension of the fugitive subjects in the Bremer case from \$500 to \$1,000, depending upon the identity of the subjects and, of course, the lowest amount of money which appealed to the individual informants. Mr. Purvis states that is inquiring concerning the compensation which she is to receive for having "fingered" Davis. COPY FILED IN 66-1542 I believe we should pay this woman a maximum of \$500, settling, of course, for less if we can induce her to accept a smaller sum. Subject to your approval, I will inform Mr. Purvis that he is authorized to pay a sum not to exceed \$500, and request that he endeavor to settle for less. Respectfully, A. Tamm. Reference is made to your letter dated June 4, 1955, requesting that the Presidents of the American Airlines and the United Air Lines Transport Corporation be interviewed relative to the maintenance of secrecy concerning the movements of Special Agents of this Bureau when they travel by air and also secrecy with regard to the transportation of criminals.

I have talked with Mr. C. R. Smith of the American Airlines, Inc., and he has expressed his desire to cooperate in every possible way. He informed me that he would issue a confidential memorandum to all employees instructing them that under no circumstances should any information be given out to anyone concerning such travel by his airlines. He is now preparing this memorandum and states that he will forward a copy to me, after which I will forward the same to the Bureau.

I also talked with Mr. W. A. Patterson of the United Airlines and he likewise expressed extreme interest in this matter and indicated a desire to cooperate with the Bureau, and stated that he would issue instructions immediately end also furnish me with copy of his instructions to his employees.

He also stated that he would select a list of "key men" in his organization all over the country who might be contacted for confidential transportation when such light necession of part of employees of the Bureau. He will furnish these names to me and I will furnish them to the Bureau.

About 2:00 P. M. on June 4, 1935, Mr. D. L. Brannon of the Associated Press, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, communicated by telephone with me and advised that he had received information over the wire that Alvin Karpis had been captured at Madison, Wisconsin.

I informed him that I could neither confirm nor deny the report. I immediately communicated by telephone with Mr. Tamm of the Bureau and advised him of the information I had received from Mr. Brannon. I communicated with Mr. Tamm prior to making any inquiry at Madison concerning the rumor inasmuch as it was believed possible that Bureau agents may have conducted investigation in Madison, Wisconsin, regarding Alvin Karpis, and it was believed that if this were true, any inquiry by the Milwaukee Bureau office might arouse suspicion and prevent secrecy on the part of the Bureau. Mr. Tamm advised that Bureau agents had not been engaged in any investigation in Madison,

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Wisconsin, concerning Alvin Karpis and that no information had been received at the Bureau to the effect that Alvin Karpis had been captured.

Telephopic communication was immediately had with United States Marshal Comeford at Madison, Wisconsin. He advised that he had received numerous telephone calls prior thereto on June 4, 1935 from newspapers concerning the reported capture of Alvin Karpis at Madison, Wisconsin. Mr. Comeford stated that he was of the opinion that the rumor had its origin as a result of the grounding of the plane in Madison, Wisconsin, which transported Volney Davis from Chicago to St. Paul, Minnesota. Mr. Comeford stated that he was quite certain that there was no foundation for the rumor that Alvin Karpis had been captured in Madison, Wisconsin.

Mr. Brannon of the Associated Press later telephoned me and advised that he had received information from a confidential official source that Alvin Karpis was not in custody.

I immediately sent a wire to the Bureau advising of that information.

Special Agent Melvin conducted an investigation in Madison, Wisconsin and it was determined that there was no foundation for the rumor that Alvin Karpis had been captured at that place.


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
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

She stated she was unable to recall what these people looked like, but does remember that she had not seen them before and has not seen them since; that, apparently, they were friends of Willie Harrison. She recalls that she asked Dorothy King what her husband did for a living and was informed that he "sold soap".

further, that she insists that "Babs Moran and Mrs. William Harrison
are the only friends of Willie Harrison who have been informed of her
present location by her. She further stated that Dorothy King had not
corresponded with her previously and she was unable to account for this

sudden letter written by a chance acquaintance with whom she became acquainted two and one-half years ago. She further stated that Willie Harrison usually referred to St. Louis, Missouri as the "Cinder City" and is of the opinion that she will again receive a letter from Dorothy King and that it, like the instant one, will be dictated or written at Willie Harrison's direction. It should be noted in this connection that there is no doubt in mind that Willie Harrison persuaded some girl friend to write the above quoted letter.

Special Agent in Charge at the St. Louis Bureau Office immediately upon the receipt of any letter or information and make arrangements for a subsequent interview and she stated that in the future, she would follow that procedure. The abovequoted letter, together with the post card received therein, is being attached to copies of this report designated for the Chicago Bureau Office.

# At Galesburg, Illinoise

Mr. Sam Solomon, Manager, Sols-Liberty Carnival, advised that his show opened in Madison, Wisconsin an May 27, 1935 and moved to Galesburg, Illinois on June 2, 1935 and would move to Streator, Illinois on June 10, 1935 and to DeKalb, Illinois on June 17, 1935. He and his essistants were questioned at length concerning a girl named Patsy, but his statements and the investigation conducted at that time failed to reveal information concerning this individual. Subsequently, the St. Paul Bureau Office furnished the following telegraphic information which is now included for the assistance of the Milwaukee Bureau Office:

PEREKID DAVIS RELATES HE PICKED UP PROSTITUTE
NAMED PATSY AGE TWENTY FIVE TO THIRTY WEIGHT
ONE TWENTY FIVE HAIR HLACK AT MADISON WISCONSIN
SHORTLY BEFORE HIS ARREST IN CHICAGO STAYED
WITH HER TWO NICHTS STOP CLAIMS SHE IS NOT
COINECTED WITH BUT FOLLOWS SOLS LIBERTY CARNIVAL
AND WAS TO MEET HIM AT GALESBURG BUT PREVENTED
BY ARREST INFORMATION AT REQUEST OFC HICAGO
OFFICE

Mr. Solomon was re-contacted and he arranged for interviews with the majority of the individuals connected with the Carnival concessions. Don Martin, an employee, advised that he was selling tickets at the Fortune Teller's stand in Madison, Wis., and had become acquainted with two prostitutes, one named "Patsy" and the other "Chubby", who lived at 3042 West Wilson St., Madison, Wis. He stated that these girls were known by the Sheriff's Office as prostitutes and that they usually hung around a tavern located near the carnival grounds. He further stated that the one known as "Chubby" was dressed in black and recently served a two year prison

The one named "Patsy" was dressed in red and was wear ing a leather jacket; ... He stated that he did not observe any male companions accompanying these girls, but did recall that on one occasion, a man drove by the tavern in a new Ford V-8 Coupe and picked these girls up. A photograph of Volney Davis was exhibited to Martin, but he was positive that it did not resemble the individual driving the abovementioned Ford Coupe. He further advised that in his opinion the man he saw was at least six feet tall and 🖹 weighed approximately 175 pounds. He recalls that one of the girls said: "We must go. There at Walley". Photographs of other members of this mob who are still at large were exhibited to him, but he 😅 was positive that he had no seen any of these individuals in Madison, Wisconsin, however, he did state that the abovementioned girls were apparently well financed and spent money rather freely. Don Martin produced a photograph of these two girls, which they had given him and the same is attached to the copies of this report designated for the Milwaukee Office

## At Peoria, Illinois

The Automobile Protective & Information Bureau, Chicae go, Illinois, advised the Peoria Police Department by letter, dated June 4, 1935, that a 1935 Ford V-8 Coupe, Motor #18-1618818, which had been stolen from Dixon-Freedman Company at Peoria, Illinois on Merch 26, 1935, had been recovered by Bureau agents in possession of Volney Davis and that the motor number had been changed to now read 18-2643348.

Mr. Ross Dixon, 124 S. Washington Street, advised that he had parked the Ford Coupe in question directly in front of his business located at the abovementioned address at approximately 1:15 P.M. on March 26, 1935 and that he left thekeys in the ignition; that he returned approximately thirty minutes thereafter and discovered that his car had disappeared. He was unable to furnish information as to any suspects and was likewise unable to recall that he had seen anyone who resembled the photograph of Volney Davis which had previously been exhibited to him.

In this connection it should be noted that 124 S. Washington Street is situated approximately one block from the Rock Island Railroad station and further that a Rock Island passenger train from Chicago, Illinois arrives at 1:25 P. M. It would, therefore, appear that there is a possibility that Volney Davis arrived in Peoria, Ille on this train:

THE MILWAUKEE OFFICE at Madison, Wisconsin will locate and interview Patsy and Chubby, for the purpose of ascertaining if either of these alleged prostitutes are acquainted with Volney Davis. The identity of "Walley", who supposedly picked these two girls up in a 1935 Ford V-8 Coupe, should likewise be determined. These two girls should be interrogated at length as to their association and conversation with Davis, inamuch as the Bureau desires a thorough investigation into every place where Volney Davis has lived since his escape from agents at Yorkville, Illinois on February 6, 1934.

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This information was wired to the Chicago Office on May 23, 1935.

A further telegram dated May 25, 1935, was received from the Chicago Office requesting advice as to Florida license D 12712; and from the Motor Vehicle Commissioner's Office at Tallahassee, Florida, advice was received that this license was issued to William T. Seymour, 229 N.K. First St., Mismi, Florida, for Graham sedan, Engine No. 1016340.

Inquiry at Mismi, Florida, regarding Mr. Seymour was made by Special Agent B. F. Fitzsimons. He ascertained that Seymour was unknown at Mismi, Florida, or at the address in question, and that the address 229 N.E. First Street last winter housed the City Club, a gambling and night club operated by unidentified Chicago hoodlums during the past winter season, and that said place closed about April lat. No information as to the identity or present whereabouts of Seymour could be determined through the usual sources.

On June 10, 1935, a further telegram was received from the Chicago Office requesting advice as to Florida license D 7286. The Commissioner of Motor Vehicles at Tallahassee, Florida, advised that this license was issued to Mary Ellen Crosier, 336 S.W. 13th Avenue, Miami, Florida, for Auburn cabriolet, Motor No. GC 1819.

Special Agent B. F. Fitzsimons made inquiry regarding Mary Ellen Crosier at Mismi, Florida, and learned that she resided at the Briton Apartments, 336 S.W. 13th Avenue, Mismi, from January 1st through February last, with her husband W. C. Crosier, a Field Representative for Colliers Magazine Company; thereafter Crosier left for Tampa, Florida, and Mrs. Crosier remained in Mismi until about April 1st, when she left for an unknown destination. No criminal record or forwarding addresses were discovered; and from those interviewed, the reputation of these people seemed to be without question. This information was wired to the Chicago Office on June 11, 1935.

Subject Henry "Duke" Randall, in this case, in compliance with the order of Federal Judge Halsted L. Ritter issued on May 24, 1935, was released on bond in the amount of \$2,000.00, which bond was made in a cash payment by Joe Mams. A record in the files of the Clerk of the Federal Court at Miami indicates that this sum is in reality the property of Mrs. L. G. Knight, El Comodoro Hotel, Miami, Florida.

Agent Fitzsimons, at Mismi, Florida, learned that all of the cases in this matter pending in court at that place were on May 28, 1935, postponed to the October term; and he was further advised by Mr. Walter L.

Barlow, Special Assistant to the Attorney General, that he, Barlow, was submitting a detailed memorandum on the Miami situation, which would embrace the results of court action, including a decision by Judge Ritter wherein he upheld the constitutionality of the Federal Firearms Act, and that such memorandum would also set out the recommendations and opinion of Mr. Barlow with respect to further prosecution. A copy of this memorandum has now been received from the Cincinnati Office and is incorporated in the Jacksonville file.

On May 13, 1935, the Jacksonville Office submitted to the Bureau for study in the laboratory a registration card showing the name of W. J. Harrison, National Hotel, Havama, Cuba, dated September 9, 1934, with request that an opinion be rendered as to whether or not the signature on this registration card was identical with that of subject William J. Harrison in this case.

A laboratory report dated May 21, 1935, from the Bureau has been received, which concludes in part: "It is the opinion of the examiner that Harrison wrote the signature appearing on the hotel registration card".

The Jacksonville Office has received from the Bureau in its letter dated May 28, 1935, copies of letters from the Department of State dated May 10 and 17, 1935, together with copies of dispatches referred to in said letters reflecting the results of inquiries conducted by the merican Embassy and Consular Officers in Cuba relative to the presence of subject Karpis in that country. Inasmuch as these dispatches and enclosures seem to contain no information in addition to that already obtained by agents of this Office, they are not being set out in detail in this report.

Special Agent B. F. Fitzsimons, at Migmi, Florida, recently submitted a memorandum containing data for incorporation in this file which may or may not be of value at a future date. The memorandum is as fol-

"The following information submitted by one R. V. Tays, 120 Northwest Eleventh Avenue, Miami, Florida, telephone 2-1075, is transmitted for possible future reference, one copy of which may properly be included in Jacksonville File #7-24; ALVIN KAPPIS, with aliases-FUGITIVE, et al., EDWARD GEORGE BREEER - KIDNAFING:

\* Mr. Tays stated that one FRANCIE NEWTON, a former associate of Al Capone, now residing at Garden Coe on Key Largo, Florida,

with one Birdie P. Wilson, a woman of ill-repute, has a boat anchored in the Key which Newton operates for charter occasion ally. However, Tays is of the opinion that Newton is engaging in illicit activities, the nature of which he cannot determine. He stated that Newton has frequent visitors who arrive in automobiles with foreign license plates; that his visitors do not remain long, and from appearances they are of the underworld type. Tays further stated that Newton operates a night club near Homesterd, Florida, where he possibly dispenses liquor illegally. The referred Tays to Mr. Avery of the Alcoholic Tax Unit, Mismi, in that connection.

I advised Mr. Tays that the Bureau is very much interested in violations of Federal laws within its investigative jurisdiction and enumerated such of them as I believed Newton might engage in, particularly the harboring of fugitives. Tays, who stated that " he intends to open a barbecue stand in the vicinity of Newton's place on Key Largo, agreed to look the situation over and to advise me of any suspicion of a violation in which we may be interested."

Special Agent S. K. McKee, while at Miami, Florida, and upon Bureau instructions, had a photostatic copy made of all the various papers and documents contained in the zipper case surrendered by subject Cassius Mc- ... Donald following his arrest at West Palm Beach, Florida, in February, 1935. Two copies of this long list are presently incorporated in the Jacksonville file for future reference.

A report has been received from the Bureau Laboratory dated June 3, 1935, relative to its study and analysis of certain specimens of handwriting submitted May 28, 1935. The specimens were two pages of sample handwriting of Joe Adams and eight small slips of yellow paper with blue lines containing sample of handwriting of Henry Randall. The purpose of the study of this writing was to determine, if possible, whether or not Randall or Adams may have affixed the signature "Leroy Morrison" on the certificates of Charles M. Bronson. The experts could not definitely conclude that such was the case, the opinion in part being:

"They could have written certain of the signatures, but evidence to prove this is lacking, and in some instances the writing habits appear to be contrary.

With respect to checking telegrams at Miami, Florida, by Special Agent 5. K. McKee, some question arose as to the meaning of a signature on one of the telegrams as to whether or not the word "Frederico" was a name or a code word. This appeared as a signature on a telegram address-

ed to Joe Adams, El Comodoro Hotel, Mismi, and originating at Havana, Cuba, on December 31, 1934. Special Agent B. F. Fitzsimons has been able to learn from W. T. Williams, Office Manager of the Postal Telegraph Co., that he, Williams, had made inquiry regarding the matter and definitely learned that the word "Frederico" is not a code word but the name of the sender, whose only address was given care Plaza Hotel.

Recently, while Mr. Walter L. Barlow, Special Assistant to the Attorney General, was in Mismi, Florida, in connection with this case, he received advice that one G. J. Wimbish, an agent of the Alcoholic Tax Unit, Bureau of Internal Revenue, who is located at West Palm Beach, had some information regarding Harry Campbell, a fugitive in this case. Based on this advice from Mr. Barlow, Agent B. F. Fitzsimons interviewed Wimbish as to what he knew, and Wimbish stated that in the latter part of May, 1935, he was in the Turf Bar at West Palm Beach when one Sidney Catts, Jr., a West Palm Beach attorney who was in the Bar drinking, called to Wimbish and stated that Wimbish was a "G Man", and that Catts desired to advise him that Harry Campbell, a member of the Barker-Karpis gang, had been to see Catts a day or so previously and attempted to borrow \$50.00 from him. Catts remarked that he did not give Campbell the money since he wanted to get rid of him and have nothing to do with him.

Special Agents Fitzsimons and McKee proceeded to West Palm Beach for the purpose of interviewing Catts. However, upon arrival there it was found that Catts was at that time in Tallahassee, Florida, where he was engaged in lobbying activities during the session of the State Legislature.

Not having an agent available to dispatch to Tallahassee, Special Agent R. B. Donaldson succeeded in getting Catts on the telephone and interviewed him regarding the statement. Catts informed that he had made such a statement in a conversation with Wimbish at West Palm Beach, but that the Harry Campbell referred to had nothing to do with the Barker-Karpis gang, but was actually a remote cousin of his who was raised in Montgomery, Alabama, by a grandmother of Campbell's, a Mrs. Campbell; that in reality, the full and correct name of this person was Harry Campbell Spencer, but the name "Spencer" had been dropped on account of and at the instance of the grandmother who raised him. Catts further stated that Campbell had been living at Birmingham, Alabama, and vicinity; that he was moreor less of a shiftless fellow and hard to keep track of; that he had no connection whatever with this case; and, further, that he, Catts, did not know subject Campbell in this case, nor any other of the subjects.

It may be stated that from the best information obtainable, Mr. Catts is a son of a former Governor of the State of Florida.

PENDING

Mr. Pierstone called from Pittsburgh to advise that some little time age a Mr. John Cook came in the office from Toungstown, Ohio and complained of being swindled out of \$22,000 by four or five individuals at Canton, Ohio. Yesterday aftermoon's paper carried a story that one Bishop was being "taken over" for \$31,000 and that the matter was being handled by Detective Lieutenant Frank Barrett. Barrett told Mr. Fierstone that several individuals had been locked up at Canton, this and and Mr. Cook claims none of these individuals are the ones who swindled him. Barrett said that this gang included about twenty men who are working in the racket with headquarters at Buffale. It is believed that Case McDonald is mixed up with this meb but Mr. Cook could not identify his photograph.

I suggested to Mr. Plaratone that he commiscate with the Gleveland office and have them question the man being held ? at/Canton, Chio; that while the Bureau should not make any direct inquiries, it should be ascertained if they know enything about Cass acDonald and if any lead on the obtaining of money by fraud er deceit is obtained, there might be a violation of the Mational Stolen Property Act.

For your information in connection with the above entitled case, and with particular reference to subject Alvin Karpia, whose photograph has been furnished to you, information has recently been received from a confidential informant to the effect that when he last saw Alvin Karpia, he had large scars on his face, extending down to below his ears, the scars being the result of an attempted facial operation on him by subject Moran. These scars are reported to be visible. This informant further stated that the ears of Karpia oraginally were without lobes, and that a portion of the flesh was cut on the lower part of the ears, forming lobes. The informant also advised that Alvin Karpia is left handed, and that he does everything lefthanded, with the exception of writing, concerning which the informant is not certain.

The informant also advised that an attempt had been made by subject Moran to lift one of the eyebrows of Kurpis, and in doing so, he cut the flesh on the hairline of Kurpis' head, as a result of which a scar is visible under the hairline. The informant advised that while there was some change in Kurpis' facial appearance immediately after the operation mentioned above, no visible change is noticeable at this time, with the exception of the above-mentioned scars.

Concerning subject William Harrison, the informant edvisor the investigation has readish-brown hair with considerable gray in it, whereas you will note the description on the Identification Order for Harrison indicates 13 1935 P. In that his hair is light brown. Harrison, according to the informant, also has a very ruddy complexion and he is always smiling and joy although Turther, Eve of Justice that he wears octagon shaped glasses and is a heavy user of intexicating liquors.

As you are also aware, efforts are bring made to locate Charles J. Fitzgerald, who is generally known as "Chuck" or "Old Fitz." The informant advised that he understands that Fitzgerald died in California as a result of an operation upon his leg. This has not been verified. The informant advises that Fitzgerald appears to be over seventy years of age, is bald and wears a brace on his left leg continuously, and also wears a built-up shoe to the extent of about four inches on his left foot.

On the same date Harold Alderton and Elmer Farmer each received a twenty-year sentence and on the same date John J. OMcLaughlin, Sr. and James Wilson each received five-year sentences. The imposition of the sentence on Byron Bolton was deferred until after the trial of Harry Sawyer, which is expected to take place during the next fall Term of Court. On May 28, 1935 the harboring cases at Miami, Florida were continued to the October Term of Court. Special Assistant to the Attorney General Walter Barlow has submitted a memorandum of recommendations in connection with this case, recommending that Joe H. ) Adams and Henry Duke Randall be prosecuted on the harboring charges. as well as for violation of the National Firearms Act. Mr. Barlow recommends that the indigtment charging Nathaniel Heller with harboring Alvin Karpis be dist ssed for lack of sufficient evidence. He recommends that Cassius IcDonald be included in an indictment to be returned at St. Paul charging him as an accessory after the fact in connection with the kiunaping of Bremer. There are no present leads on the whereabouts of Alvin Karpis or Harry Campbell. 



She had described the man to Mr. Eanes as being about forty years old, weighing 165 pounds, and being gray headed and very ruddy-faced. She said that his name was GRIFFIN or GRIFFITH.

NUTT, the manager. This hotel is located at 728 Broadway. She consulted her record, which revealed that an R. E. GRIFFITH, of Chicago, Illinois, was registered in Room 319. She said that he had been there three days and was alone and had never been out of his room; that he drank considerably and ordered all his meals sent to him; that he told the porter that he was sick. She stated that she had never seen him.

Agent talked with the night clerk who was on duty when Griffith registered. He advised that Griffith appeared to be drunk when he came to the hotel; that he had said that he was too tired to register and had the clerk to register for him; this clerk said that he had never been out of the room since he had come to the hotel. Agent exhibited about twenty-five of the outstanding Identification Orders of the Bureau to this clerk, but he was unable to identify any of them as being Griffith.

Agent contacted the negro porter who had been waiting on Griffith. He said that the man had been drinking quite heavily thepast few days; he denied that he had ever given him a \$20.00 bill to be changed, stating that a \$1.00 bill was the highest that had been given him to get food and drink. Agent exhibited the Bureau Identification Orders to this porter and he finally picked out the Identification Order of DR. JOSEPH P. WORAN, Number 1232, as being identical with Griffith. He was positive of this identification.

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At police headquarters Agent secured the services of IE-TECTIVES M. J. MORIARITY, A. W. BARMORE, H. T. JONES, and W. V. SMITH and went to Room 319, Welsworth Hotel, 728 Broadway. Mr. R. E. Griffith was questioned in his room. Mr. Griffith was very much intoxicated. His entire room was searched but he had no gun or any other article which appeared suspicious. He had several identification cards showing his name to be R. E. Griffith, 131 Rienback Street, Hammond, Indiana. His occupation was shown to be in the employ of the Pullman Company. He advised that he was fifty-four years of age and that he had been in Birmingham, Alabama, on business for his company for the past two weeks; that upon leaving there he had gotten some liquor and gotten very drunk on the drive up from Birmingham and he thought he had better stop over in Louisville and get straightened out before going on to his home. Mr. Griffith weighed about 200 pounds; was gray headed, and his features in no way resembled those of Moran. He stated that he had never been arrested and expected to return to Hammond, Indiana, in the next day or two as soon as he was able to drive. It being very apparent that Griffith was not Moran he was not taken to Police Headquarters and fingerprinted.

Reference is made to Bureau letter; dated June 11, 1935, addition dressed to Mr. Gibson Arnoldi, New York Post Office, Station M. New York, N. Y., with which letter you forwarded to the New York office a communication which had been transmitted to you by Mr. Arnoldi, indicating that he was in a position to secure information as to the whereabouts of subject Karpis.

This is to advise that on June 12, 1935, Mr. Arnoldi called at the New York office, where he was interviewed by Special Agent J. H. Hanson, at which time he stated that he and his wife have taken a great deal of interest in a girl named Thelma Naids, who comes from a good family in New York, but who married a man named Morris Naids who is a person of criminal tendencies and who Arnoldi believes has served a sentence in a correctional institution; that as a result of this marriage, this girl's family have had nothing to do with her, for which reason Mr. and Mrs. Arnoldi have befriended her on various occasions.

Arnoldi continued by saying that in October, 1934, this woman, with her husband, was living in New York City and that at that time she visited the Arnoldis, when she informed Mr. Arnoldi confidentially that her husband was befriending a man in their apartment who the Naids woman described as being very common and of whom she was frightened. Arnoldi added that in October, this girl's husband burglarized his home, stealing therefrom a considerable sum of money; further, that after this, the Naids girl and her husband disappeared, and their present whereabouts are unknown. He mentioned that he had received telegrams from the girl in Atlanta, Ga., Jacksonville, Fla. and Richmond, Va., in which telegrams she asked for money. Arnoldi stated that he had not telegraphed her any money, but that he had telegraphed her that if she would go to the Travelers Aid and would request transportation to New York

City, he would guarantee the Travelers Aid repayment of the money advanced. He mentioned that she apparently had not taken advantage of this offer, with the result that he does not know where she is located at the present time.

Mr. Arnoldi also stated that the husband of this girl is fairly well known in Atlantic City, N.J.; furthermore, that an individual named Paxon, whomhe described as a City Magistrate in Atlantic City and who also operates several large filling stations there, controls the underworld of that city; further, that it is his opinion that Karpis and Campbell, when they escaped from the local authorities in that city in January, 1935, were aided by someone in that city. Arnoldi believes that the person who gave Karpis and Campbell this assistance was Paxon, and furthermore, that it is his opinion that the man who Maids was sheltering in New York City in October, 1934, was Alvin Karpis. Arnoldi theorizes that Naids is an acquaintance of Karpis' and that Naids in turn had made Karpis acquainted with Paxon in Atlantic City.

As was mentioned above, Arnoldi stated that he does not know the present whereabouts of either Naids or the latter's wife, but that it is his opinion that if he could locate the Naids girl, he would be able to find out where Karpis is staying at the present time. Arnoldi said that under no conditions would he give any other information than that mentioned above to the representatives of this Bureau in order that they could check the value of this information. He stated that he would do it himself, and that the only condition on which he would do it would be if the Bureau would advance him \$10,000, in order that he could commence appropriate inquiries to locate the Naids woman.

Arnoldi was advised by Special Agent Hanson that his offer of cooperation was very much appreciated, but that Arnoldi should furnish this Bureau with all of the information in his possession concerning the Naids woman, and the Bureau would cause an appropriate investigation to be conducted; furthermore, that if this Bureau was successfuly in apprehending Karpis as a result of the information furnished by Arnoldi, arrangements undoubtedly could be made to compensate him for it, but that he could not expect compensation in the amount of \$10,000.

It might also be mentioned for the information of the Bureau, that Arnoldi indicated that he had previously offered the above information to Detectives C. H. Cronin and William Gilmartin of the New York Police Department, who, he advised, were not amenable to his offer. He indicated that he was very much displeased with the attitude and "ignorance" as he termed it, displayed by these officers.

It is my recommendation that no further consideration be given to the information furnished by Mr. Arnoldi as is outlined above. His

reasons for believing that he can secure information as to Karpis\* whereabouts are based on theory only. Furthermore, this Bureau knows that Karpis was in Cuba in October, 1934, up until December, and there has been no information developed to the effect that anyone named Naids is an acquaintance of his nor has it been determined that Karpis ever was in Atlanta, Jacksonville or Richmond, Va. during this past winter.

It might also be mentioned that there is in the New York office an old file on Mr. Gibson Arnoldi, indicating that he might have been involved in German activities during the World War. This old file contains a pamphlet entitled "A Scholarly Review of What America Must Do to Develop Its International Business" by Gibson Arnoldi, B.C.L. At the time Arnoldi called at the New York office, he displayed to Special Agent Hanson numerous letters that had been sent to him by such men as Mr. Richard Whitney, President of the New York Stock Exchange, Arnoldi claiming that he was displaying these letters in order that Agent Hanson would fully realize Mr. Arnoldi's position. It was noted that these letters pertained to the pamphlet mentioned above as having been written by Mr. Arnoldi, and the general tenor of the letters was that Arnoldi was soliciting subscriptions for a trade promotion committee which he possibly represented.



The communication from the Chief Post Office Inspector at Washington referring to this matter is dated April 5, 1935.

Mr. Weicht further stated that he has never received a letter from the Director of the Bureau of Investigation at Washington referring to this or any other matter, but that his investigation was predicated upon the letter from his superior, the Chief Post Office Inspector, above referred to. Apparently there was a misunderstanding on the part of Special Agent R. D. Reference is made to Bureau letter to the Pittsburgh Office dated June 4, 1935, a copy of which was received by this Africa office June 6, 1935, relative to the offer made by Arthur Py Burdette, of Erie, Pennsylvania, to visit his sister, Wynona Burdette, for the purpose of obtaining from her information which may essist the Bureau in locating Harry Compbell and other members of the Barker-Karpis gang.

Superintendent John J. Ryan of the United States Detention Farm, Filan, Fichigan, on June 11, 1935, edvised Special Agent A. A. Euzzey of this office that any arrangements the Bureau desires to make relative to the visit of Burdette with his sister, Kynona, at kilan would be satisfactory to him.

Kr. Ryan stated that Friday is the regular day for visits with women immates of the farm and that such visits are made between the hours of 9:00 A.K. and 4:00 P.M. However, Mr. Ryan states that he would gladly arrange a visit for Burdette on any day the Bureau desires but to arouse as little suspicion as possible on the part of kynone, he suggested that this visit be made on a Friday.

Mr. Ryon further advised that it is a rule of the farm that a guard be present during such visits but that at the time Burdette visits bynone, a guard will go in but will be called out in such a manner ( as to arouse no suspicion so that Burdette and Kynona may converse alone, Lir. Ryan deems it advisable to inform Burdette that a guard will go in at the beginning of the visit but that he will then be called out. -576-

Davis, recently apprehended in Chicago, has furnished sertain information relative description of Subject ALVIN KARPIS. He states that Karpis has large scars extending downward below his ears, which agars were the result of a facial operation made by Subject Doctor Joseph P. Moran. 😹 Volney Davis stated that the goars on the face of Karpis were more visible than those on the face of Doc Barker, and it is known that the scars on Doc Barker are still prominent. Davis stated that the ears of Alvin Karpis were originally without lobes, and a portion of the flesh was cut an the lower 🔅 part of the ear, forming lobes, and was of the spinion that scars would show underneath the lobes. Subject Davis further informed that Alvin Earpis is lefthanded and does everything lefthanded with the exception of writing, of which he is not sure. Volney Davis states that an attempt was made by Subject Doctor Moran to lift one of the eyebrows of Alvin Karpis and in so doing he but the flesh on the hairline of Karpis' head, and that as a result of this... out, there is a small out scar visible under the hair line, but he could not recall over which eye. Davis stated that the cuts on Karpis' face presented a changed appearance only when healing but since the threads were removed, as visible change in his facial appearance could be noticed, except the scars. Volney Devis informed that Alvin Karpis has a very distinct stoop in his

The Chicago Bureau Office advised that Volney Davis had the same operation performed on him and that scars on his ears are still visible.

Concerning Subject Willie Harrison, Volney Davis informed that Harrison has reddish brown hair with considerable gray in it. It will be noted that the description on the Identification Order No. 1239 on Harrison describes the hair as light brown. Volney Davis states that Willie Harrison has a very ruddy complexion and that the photograph appearing on the Identification Order for Harrison is a good likeness of him, with the exception that Harrison was seldom seen without a smile; that he is at all times very jovial; that Harrison wears octagon shaped glasses and is known to be a heavy user of intoxicating liquors. Identical information concerning Willie Harrison has also been furnished by Clara Gibson.

The Chicago Bureau Office secured information from Volney Davis that Subject Charles Fitzgerald, nickname Old Fitz and Chuck, might have died in a hospital in California as a result of an operation on his leg. Chicago Office letter of June 4, 1935, describes Subject Charles Fitzgerald, on information from Volney Davis, as age over 70 years, considerably bald, wears a brace on his left leg continuously and also wears a built-up shoe to the extent of about four inches on his left foot.

Confirming the telephone conversation between your Office and Special Agent R. C. Suran of this Office on June 10, 1935, I have to advise that Special Agent C. Jenkins obtained information from Dr. C. J. Carlin, 208 Scott Street, Joliet, Illinois, one of the physicians employed by the Illinois State Penitentiary; that he in that capacity examined Subject Joseph P. Moran on Movember 17, 1928, at which time an X-ray examination disclosed that Moran had a foreign substance in his lung tissue which was probably a piece of shrapnel, and should be still lodged in his body and essily located. Ir. Carlin stated that the I-ray misclosed that this foreign substance is about the size of a pea. He further advised that the I-ray film had been destroyed about a year subsequent to the time it was taken.

In addition Ir. Carlin further advised that the records of Ir. Horan in the penitentiary disclosed that during the Forld War he was injured due to the falling of an airplane in which he was riding. In this accident Ir. Horan's left arm and chest were injured, two ribs broken and two fingers of his right hand fractured. It would therefore appear that these injuries would be of little value in identifying the body now being held by the Coroner at Letroit, Kichigan.

Further information was received that six months after Moran's discharge from the Army he was sent to the Veterans! Hospital at Boston, Massachusetts, where his left breast was removed. -


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
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

he was going to Tampa, Florida. His wife remained at Miami until about April 1, 1935, when she left for an unannounced destination Mrs. Walker stated that she did not inquire of her tenants from whence they came, nor did they indicate the place of their permanent residence. Mrs. Walker stated that they appeared to be of good character; that they had no visitors; that Crosier worked most of the day and spent the evenings typing. His wife spent her time either on the beach or at the horse races, after her husband left for Tampa, Mrs. Grosier remained at Miami, attending the horse races daily and after the racing season was over Mrs. Crosier left, about April 1, 1935, but she did not indicate to Mrs. Walker where she was going. Mrs. Walker claims that both Grosier and his wife had an automobile, but she did not know the make of either car, nor did she know what license the cars carried.

Mr. C. E. Walker, husband of the above mentioned Mrs. Walker, substantiated the statements of his wife; claimed that Crosier apparently held a responsible position with the Collier Company; that he was industrious; did not dissipate in any manner, spending his time almost exclusively at his work. Mr. Walker likewise was unable to recall the make of automobiles or license plates possessed by the Crosiers, and he denied knowing where they came from or where their permanent home may be.

Neither Crosier nor his wife has a criminal record on file with the Miemi Sheriff's office or police department.

Through inquiry of the Postmaster, Miami, it was ascertained that neither Crosier nor his wife has an address of record and neither left a forwarding address. It was also ascertained that the Collier Magazine Company does not have an office in Miami.

During the early part of April the United States Attorney for the Eastern District of Oklahoma forwarded to this office certified papers, requesting the removal of Jess Doyle from this District to his district for trial there on a national bank robbery charge.

Doyle was a defendant in the so-called Bremer kidnaping case, tried here in St. Paul recently but the evidence against him in that case was insufficient to permit consideration thereof by the jury; and proceedings were instituted to remove him to the Eastern District of Oklahoma, in which a removal order duly issued and is now in the hands: of the United States Marshal for this district for execution.

Through the local Bureau of Investigation word has reached me that the United States Attorney for the Eastern District of Oklahoma now has determined that he has no case against Doyle in that jurisdiction and will not want Doyle removed thence to his district.

When Doyle was arrested by the special agents in February, 1935, he made a twelve-page statement, admitting a guilty connection with several other bank robberies. I have been advised that this 3 written confession, which is now in my possession as a part of the Bremer kidnaping case, cannot be used, without your consent, by anyone other than a federal prisecutor. However this may be, the fact is that the federal authorities have exhausted or are about to exhaust their means of holding Doyle in custody any longer. Doyle has a long criminal record, involving previous convictions for bank hold-ups, and it is my judgment that he should not be liberated by the Federal suthorities here in St. Paul, until such time as it has been definitely determined that the State authorities in the several states where he kas admitted complicity in bank robberies do not want to prosecute him.

## MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION.

Please note the attached letter from the United States Attorney from St. Paul, Minnesota, concerning Jess/Doyle, who was one of the defendants in the so-called Bremer Kidnapping Case, and whose removal to Eastern Oklahoma was requested. According to the United States Attorney, the fact is that the Federal authorities have exhausted or are about to exhaust their means of holding Doyle in custody any longer, and the United States Attorney for Eastern Oklahoma has determined that he has no case against him in his District.

Mr. Sullivan requests authority to turn over to the county attorneys mentioned a copy of Doyle's confession in the event either of them decide to prosecute under the state laws, and requests assurance be given that the two Special Agents to whom the statement was made be made available as witnesses on behalf of the state in such prosecution. I heartily concur in this view and believe that we should assist the state authorities to this extent in any prosecution undertaken by them.

Will you please, therefore, advise me immediately whether this arrangement can be made so that I can telegraph United States Attorney Sullivan.

Please return the attached papers with your reply.

"At this time Fred Barker, Doc Barker and Earl Christman were living at the Home Apartments in Oak Park, Illinois with Mother Barker and Earl's wife, Helen. Volney Davis and I were living with Edna and Doris in my apartment in Maywood, Illinois. Frank Nash was living with his wife, Frances, at Louie's Place in Fox River Grove, Illinois. I believe Eddie Green was residing in Chicago and Alvin Karpis in Oak Park, Illinois.

"The Boys had gone to Kansas City two or three days before the robbery took place and rented a furnished apartment near 45th and Main Street in Kansas City. I believe Doc Barker and Volney Davis made the arrangements for this apartment. When Fred and I arrived in Kansas City we lived in this apartment until the day of the robbery. We drove to the bank in two cars, Fred was driving a Chevrolet Sedan and I was driving a Buick. Doc Barker, Volney Davis, Alvin Karpis, Eddic Green, Earl Christman and Frank Nash entered the bank and I parked my car on the street nearby. I believe Fred was parked in back of me in another car. Shortly after the boys entered the bank Earl Christman came out to act as a look-out. A few minutes later the boys emerged from the bank and as they were getting into our waiting cars Earl was wounded. I drove my car with Alvin Karpis reading the get-away chart, to a point 15 miles away, where we switched automobiles. I believe Alvin Karpis then went with the other fellows and Doc and Volney returned to Kansas City with me. We proceeded direct to our apartment, abandoning the car a couple of squares from the building. That night Fred came to the apartment and told Doc and I to return to Chicago, stating he would take care of the car we had abandoned. Doc and I immediately took a train to St. Paul, 58 Minnesota, as Doc wanted to see Harry Sawyer. We remained in Harry's place only a few hours, after which a fellow named Tom, who works for Harry Sawyer, drove us to Louie's Place in Fox River Grove, Illinois. Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis and Frank Nash were already there when we arrived. It was at this time that Fred told me Earl had been 'hit'. Fred also gave me my split at this time. I do not know where the money was divided. Volney had not shown up as yet and it is entirely possible that he remained in Kansas City to take care of Earl. On the next afternoon Fred and Doc left Oak Park, Illinois and I believe they went to Kansas City. Two or three days later Volney Davis returned alone and told me that he had been in Kansas City on business. About three or four days later Fred and Doc returned, and at this time Fred informed me that Earl had died.

Doyle has a long criminal record and this office is not disposed to give him his liberty until we have made every effort to have the state authorities take him into custody and prosecute him for offenses which

have been committed by him against the state laws, concerning which the United States Department of Justice has information.

Accordingly it is urged respectfully that you promptly consider the matter set forth in this letter and in the event you decide that Doyle should be prosecuted in your county, that you make arrangements immediately whereunder you can obtain jurisdiction of Doyle's person prior to his release by the federal authorities in the district of Minnesota, notifying the United States Marshal and also notifying this office at your earliest convenience of your decision and action in the matter.

Shanahan, both of whom are special agents of the Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, which statement was reduced to writing and covers twelve typewritten pages, each page having been signed and sworn to by Doyle. On Pages 5, 6 and 7 of this written statement Doyle makes the following admissions with reference to the robbery of a bank at Fairbury, Nebraska:

"This robbery occurred on April 5, 1933, and the following men participated:

ALVIN KARPIS

"Fred Barker, Doc Barker, Alvin Karpis and I were living at either the Twin Oaks or Three Oaks Apartments in St. Paul at that time. We had a meeting place in a garage in Minneapolis shortly before the robbery, and I drove the above mentioned men to the bank in a Lincoln Sedan. I was wearing a chauffeur's cap at this time. All of the boys entered the bank and I drove the car a couple of hundred feet down the street. Shortly afterwards I observed Larry DuVal come out of the bank to act as a look-out. A few minutes later the others emerged from the bank and, simultaneously, a squad car pulled up in front of Larry. He fired at the police officers in this car with a machine gun and killed two of them. When I saw the boys come from the bank I drove the Lincoln car to where they were and they got in. Vern Miller got into the driver's seat, replacing my position, and drove away. As we were making our getaway the police fired at our car and punctured two of our tires. Vern drove at a rapid rate of speed to a park in St. Paul where we abandoned the Lincoln car on account of the punctured tires. Fred instructed Alvin Karpis and I to get away, stating that he would meet us at the spartment. Alvin and I took a cab and as we were leaving I heard several shots fired a short distance away. Alvin and I proceeded direct to our apartment and sometime afterwards Fred and Doc arrived, and at this time he gave us our split. I believe the money was previously divided in Larry's apartment. I subsequently heard, through conversations with Fred and Doc, that when the boys were changing cars in St. Paul some person in an automobile drove past them and tried to see their license number and one of the boys shot him in the head, I do not know who 'cased' this job nor do I recall the amount of my split. None of our boys were wounded. Larry Du-Val was arrested in his apartment the following night while drunk and was charged with participation in this robbery. I believe he plead guilty and received a life sentence."

"Harry Hull, who was living with Larry DuVal at that time, notified us the following morning of Larry's arrest, whereupon all of us, with the exception of Vern Miller, left St. Paul and drove to Reno, Nevada, at Fred's suggestion. Upon our arrival in Reno Fred connected with Early Christman, who, I believe, put them in touch with someone in Reno who took care of their 'hot stuff'. Volney Davis and Mother Barker were in Reno when we arrived."

## AT DALTON, GEORGIA.

Mr. Will Denton, Postmaster, advised that his office had no forwarding address of Gene L. Jordon. Denton also stated that the address of 28 King Street, Dalton, Georgia, was the address of Mrs. B. C. Bivings who operated a small boarding house at that place. Denton continued that Mrs. Bivings was a member of one of the oldest and most prominent families of Dalton and that her boarding house was considered one of the most refined and respectable houses in the city of Dalton. Denton further advised that he was quite certain Mrs. Bivings did not take strangers into her home because she only had such guests as had been staying with her for a number of years and were beyond question as to character and reputation.

Mr. Denton concluded by stating that no such person as
C. L. Franklin was receiving mail through that office and that he.
Denton, was quite certain no such person lived in Whitfield County.
The only family by the name of Franklin in Dalton, according to
Denton, was the family of T. L. Franklin, a retired business man of
excellent character and reputation, who was not a Notary Public and
because of his age and senility was inactive. Efforts to contact
T. L. Franklin were without success in view of the fact that he and
his family were not in town at the time of this investigation.

Mrs. B. C. Bivings, 28 King Street, advised that she does not take strangers into her home for rooms and that during the last five or six years no one has spent the night at her home that she did not know personally unless they came highly recommended by respectable citizens of Dalton. Mrs. Bivings also stated that once in a long while she will serve a meal to a stranger, but that no such meals have been served during the Spring of 1935.

Mrs. Bivings was shown photographs of Volney Davis and other members of the Karpis-Barker Gang and stated that she had never seen any of these persons to the best of her recollection.

To Lo Lambert, Manager of the Lambert Motor Company, Dalton, Georgia, advised that his company was the exclusive Ford dealers in that community. Lambert made a search of the records in his offica and advised that his company had not sold a 1935 Ford V-8 automobile with motor #18-1543348 and further that he had not sold a 1935 model Ford to any one who was not known by himself or members of his firm by the name of Franklin and that notarizations in his office were made by a Mr. Halle

General inquiry among the garages and automobile dealers in Dalton, Georgia disclosed that mone of them had sold a 1935 model. Ford V-8 automobile of any description to any stranger.

Mr. Marshall Westbrook, Clerk of the Superior Court, Whitfield County, Dalton, Georgia, stated that his office kept a record of all commissioned and licensed Notary Publics in Whitfield County. Westbrook continued that there was no person by the name of C. L. Franklin listed as a commissioned Notary Public in Whitfield County, Georgia, and that he knew of no such person as C. L. Franklin who lived in Whitfield County.

J. C. Brooker, Ordinary, Whitfield County, Dalton, Georgia, stated that his office kept the records of Justices of Peace in Whitfield County and that these men were also ex efficio Notary Publics. Brooker made a thorough search of the records in his office and advised this  $\mathbb{Z}_{q} \not \propto$ agent that no one by the name of Franklin was listed as one of these Justices of Peace, and that further he, Brooker, knew of no person by the name of C. L. Franklin in Whitfield County. During the course of this investigation this agent received information that a person by the name of C. L. Williams had formerly been involved in some questionable notarizations at Dalton, Georgia and that it was thought there was not such party living in that community. A thorough investigation of the records in the office of the Clerk of the Superior Court and the Ordinary of Whitfield County disclosed that no such party as C. L. Williams was a Notary in that County. Special Agent C. A. Whitten telephonically advised this agent from Atlanta, Georgia on June 10, 1935 that the records in the State Librarian's office, State Capitol Building, Atlanta, Georgia revealed no one by the name of C. L. Barrier Williams was a Notary Public for the State of Georgia at large.

Mr. Denton, referred to above, advised that he knew of no such person as C. L. Williams and further that no one by this name was receiving mail through his office.

KIDNAPING. HARBORING AND OBSTRUCTION OF JUSTICE. NATIONAL FIREARMS ACT.

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On June 13th. 1935. Special Agent A. Dickstein was contacted on the 'phone by while informant was visiting in Chicago. He advised that he had some information he desired to furnish this Office.

Agent Dickstein met Informant following information was furnished:

and the

ascertained that Mildred was living with a person by the name of Jerry Cass at the Harper Crest Apartments, 5345 Harper Avenue,

Chicago; that Mildred had received a letter from "Doc" Barker advising her to forward this letter to Pat Lonquest, who was to give this letter to an individual by the name of Louie, who in turn was to deliver the letter to the "boys who are on the lam."

When the letter referred to was given to Louie, whose last name the Informant had not been able to obtain, Mildred Kuhlman requested that she be permitted to join Louie for the purpose of seeing the boys. Louie refused to permit Mildred to join him and stated he was the only one who could make contact with the boys because they were "too hot". The Inform-

ant advised that he presumed "the boys" meant the fugitive members of the

Karpis gang.

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Informant further advised that "Doc" Barker's attorneys, DeCourcey and one Kenny, were to be in Chicago on June 14th to meet Mildred for the purpose of obtaining from her the location of the vault in which "Doc" Barker's money was hidden. The Informant was unable to obtain the location of the said wault through Mildred but was informed there was more than \$4000.00 stored away.

br On June 14th the Informant again contacted Special Agent A. Dickstein and another meeting was had Informant advised at this time that he had learned that the Louie previously referred to was one Louis Alteria and that Louis had delivered the letter previously referred to, to an individual by the name of Eddie, last name not known to the Informant. The Informant further stated that Mildred had received three letters on June 14th, 1935, from her home at Ottawa, Ohio. One letter was from Attorney DeCourcey; the second letter from Attorney Kenny, and the third contained two other letters enclosed therein, one of which had been written by "Doc" Barker's father, addressed to Mildred, and enclosed therein the original letter from "Doc" Barker himself.

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The contents of the letter from "Doc" Barker to Mildred were unknown to the Informant. However, Mildred stated

that "Doc" Barker advised her not to worry as he was not going to remain in prison all his life and that a break was going to be made as soon as his brother, "Bud", leaves the Penitentiary at Leavenworth; that "Doc's" brother, "Bud", would make the necessary contacts and a break would be made soon. Mildred further stated to Informant that "Doc" said he would get out of the Penitentiary if it meant his life.

Informant stated that he has known of his own knowledge that a code has been used by Rene, residing at Collingwood Avenue and North Cherry Street, Toledo, Ohio, that whenever a contact was made with the boys, referring to Karpis, Campbell, et al, or whenever a letter was received by Rene from the boys, which was to be given to Bert or Ted Angus, Rene would call up Bert or Ted Angus at the Casino Club from the drug store in the premises where she resides, and in code say, "Bert, please send me a bottle of whiskey as I have a bad cold." Informant states that this meant that Rene had a letter from the boys for his special attention.

In connection with the Louie and Eddie referred to by Informant, I have to advise that on the morning of June 14th, 1935, Attorney John DeCourcey called at this Office and talked with Special Agents Madala and Suran, stating that he was here in connection with the suit being brought by

the Schmidt Brewing Company against "Doc" Barker for the money now in the safety deposit box at the Woodlawn Trust & Savings Bank, Chicago, Illinois, and that he had called at this Office to ascertain the status of "Doc". Barker's car, now in possession of this Bureau.

During the course of the conversation he stated that "Doc" Barker was getting messages to an individual in Chicago who was supposed to have \$1000.00 of his money; that "Doc" Barker contacted this individual through Louie Alterie. DeCourcey finally volunteered the information that the individual who is supposed to be in possession of "Doc" Barker's property was Eddie Donovan, but he stated he had no information that Eddie Ponovan was contacting fugitive members of the gang.

It is not known by the Chicago Office what arrangements have been made by the Kansas City Office in securing outgoing communications written by "Doc" Barker at the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, but apparently communications are being forwarded to George Barker, "Doc" Barker's father, and in turn are being relayed to Mildred Kuhlman in Chicago, Illinois. It is believed the Kansas City Office should, if it has not already done so, make some arrangement to secure copies of all outgoing letters written by "Doc" Barker and his brother, Lloyd, who is also an inmate at the institution.

Browne had registered, Room 2529, Governor Clinton Hotel, N.Y.C. Adjoining room was taken by agents and surveillance maintained on Browne's telephone calls. Browne made two long distance calls to Chicago at 2 A. M., June ?, 1935; no response. He received two local calls and three long distance calls from Chicago on June 7, 1935, but Browne not in hotel. Browne departed hotel, June 7, 1955, re serving air passage TWA plane. This reservation transferred to United Air Lines for Chicago. Browne had reservation from Chicago to St. Louis on June 8. 1935. Browne's baggage searched, but nothing of suspicious nature discovered. Browne now definitely known to be president of International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees and Motion Picture Machine Operators Union of U.S. and Canada, with headquarters in Washington, D.C. Frederick E. Castle is an official of this Union, local #306, NYC, and was indicted and fined \$500. for coercion. ## **DETAILS**

Upon information contained in letter of reference to the effect that George E. Browne had left Washington, D. C. on June 6th, and had given his forwarding address as the Governor Clinton Hotel, New York City, the writer, together with Special Agent R. H. Emory, covered the arrival of Pennsylvania Railroad train #42, which arrived in New York City at 6:15 P. M. EST. Agents were not able to recognize George E. Browne in the rush of passengers from this trains

Agents immediately proceeded to the lobby of the Governor Clinton Hotel, where a contact had previously been made, and where it had been ascertained that George E. Browne did not have reservations. His name was given to the manager, who advised he would inform agents immediately of Browne's arrivale

About one hour efter the arrival of the train, the writer was informed in the lobby of the Governor Clinton that Browne had registered there, had been assigned to Room #2529, and that he was alone, registering as George E. Browne, 160 N. IaSalle Street, Chicago, Ille The writer had previously made arrangements that Browne be given this particular room if he were alone, and the room next door, #2551, had been blocked off for agents use. Arrangements were then made through the manager and chief operator to inform Room 2551 of any incoming and outgoing ealls made to or placed by Browne, and that agents would listen in on the same.

As far as Special Agent Emory and the writer in Room 2551 could ascertain, Browne remained continuously in his room on the evening of June 6th, and did not receive or place any telephone calls. At 2:10 A. M., June 7, 1935, he placed a long distance telephone call to Chicago, Central 2151, asking for Room 1838 and A. T. Brennan. He was informed by the operator that Brennan did not answer; whereupon Browne then asked for "Bergman in the room next door." There was no answer to this call. At 2:12 A. M. Browne placed a long distance call to Chicago, Euclid 5341. No answer was received from this call. The Chicago office was informed of these telephone calls by teletype.

At 10:25 A. M., June 7, 1935, agents heard the end of what was apparently a brief conversation between Browne and an unknown

party. This party stated, "All right, George, I will meet you down in the lobby."

At 10:43 A. M. on the same day an unknown person called Mr. Browne in Room 2529. There was no answer from this room. Browns was paged in the lobby without results. The calling party told the operator: "No message. I will pick him up somewhere else."

At 12:35 P. M., the same day, a long distance call was placed from Chicago, Central 6468, for Browne; that he was evidently out of his room. This call was handled by Operator 59.

At 2:30 P. M. Chicago Operator 59 again called Browne;

that there was no answer from his roome

At 4:15 P. M. the same day a call was placed for Browne by one Wilson, calling long distance from Chicago, Central 6466. No enswer was received to this calle :

On the morning of June 8th, the writer was informed by the manager of the Hotel Governor Clinton that some unknown person, not Browne, had paid Browne's bill that morning.

Inquiry was immediately made at all airline offices and it was ascertained that George E. Browne had reserved a seat in a TWA plane, trip #7, for Chicago, on the afternoon of June 7, 1935. This trip was cancelled on account of the weather and the United Air Lines office informed that one D. C. Browne transferred his reservation from TWA to the United Air Lines plane leaving New York 7:30 P. M., June 7, 1935, and due in Chicago at 2:02 As E. June 8, 1935. The records of the latter line indicated a reservation for D. C. Browne from Chicago to St. Louis via American Air Lines, leaving Chicago, 8 A. M., June 8, 1935, arriving at St. Louis, 9:57 A. M. It is not known, of course, whether Browne used the latter reservation.

Relative to Browne's registrations, together with those of Micholas J. Deani alias Dean, William Bioff and Harland Holmden, at the Warwick Hotel, 65 West 54 Street, New York City, the writer learned that it was customary for Browne and these men above named to come to the hotel, sometimes for one night, sometimes for three or four nights. It was ascertained that this number is a coin box telephone listed to Leon and Eddie's Restaurant, 33 West 52 Street, New York City. Inasmuch as this is a coin box telephone, and in view of the fact that Leon and Eddie's is a gathering place for a criminal type, it was not deemed advisable to conduct further investigation at this restaurant at the present time. Eddie Davis, one of the owners, is known to have a criminal record.



previous interview Mr. Woods had stated that he had occasionally heard automobiles arrive and leave the home of W. T. Bowling at late hours of the night and had thought it possible that Donald might have visited his brother-in-law and sister, Susia Bowling, on one of these occasions. Mr. Woods could not be contacted due to his absence at Salam at the time of the writer's visit, but Sheriff Langston informed that no further development in this regard had occurred. He had kept in close contact with Woods in the hope of obtaining some information relative to the identity of visitors at the Bowling home, but had so far been unsuccessful. It will be remembered that W. T. Bowling was formerly Sheriff of Fulton County, Arkansas, and during his incumbency in office and since that time it has not been unusual for him to have visitors late at night. However, the possibility that Weaver and Myrtle Eaton might seek to contact this place will be kept in mind in future investigation.

Cuthbert Pickren, proprietor of the Pickren Hotel, Salem, Arkansas, was also interviewed but had no further information to offer which might be of assistance in tracing the whereabouts of either Myrtle Eaton or Weaver. It is believed Mr. Pickren will cooperate to the fullest extent in this matter inasmuch as he is highly regarded at Salem and is in a position to obtain any information which might be available in that vicinity. As is mentioned in the reference report, his hotel is situated approximately one hundred yards from the Commercial Cafe, operated by W. T. Bowling, Donald's brother-in-law. In this respect it was believed that John Pickren, a gasoline station and garage operator, can also be fully relied upon. He is a brother of Cuthbert Pickren and although he could not be located on the occasion of the writer's visit for interview, the latter was informed by Sheriff Langston that close contact with him would be kept in the future.

Attempts were made to locate and interview Dr. G. L. Weathers of Salem and also Guy Harris, a next door neighbor of W. T. Bowling, who the writer was informed have in the past expressed their willingness to cooperate with the Bureau in the instant investigation, however, they were not available in Salem on this occasion and it is suggested that when an Agent is again in Salem, Arkansas, an attempt be made to talk to them. Again Sheriff Langston advised that he was in a position to keep in close contact with both of these people and to report immediately any occurrence which might be of value to the Little Rock Bureau office.

H. J. Humphreys, Postmaster, Salem, Arkansas, likewise stated that he was not in possession of any further information other than that which he had furnished on the occasion of the last visit of Special Agent Taylor of the Little Rock Bureau office, at which time the latter received a list of the names of all of the relatives of Donald residing in Salem and vicinity, same being set out in the reference report. It is apparent

from the number of relatives of Donald living at Salem that he might appear in that locality expecting refuge. However, from the small size of the town and the reliability of the informants there and the willingness of the Sheriff to cooperate, it is thought that any appearance put in at Salem, Arkansas, by either Bill Weaver or Myrtle Enton will be quickly transmitted to the Little Bock Bureau office.

At Mammoth Springs, Arkansas, Earl E. Sterling, Postmaster, and D. B. Heiliger, assistant in charge of the U. S. Bureau of Fisheries, Mammoth Springs, Arkansas, were interviewed but had no further information to offer regarding the possible presence in that locality of Weaver or the Eaton woman. It will be recalled from the reference report that Sterling knows Donald very well and has been carefully watching the mail addressed to Donald's sister, Mrs. Nellie Frazier, who resides near Mammoth Springs that in the locality served by the Post Office of Thayer, Missouri, Mammoth Springs being situated a very short distance south of the Missouri-Arkansas state line. Sterling has promised further cooperation in this matter and suggested that contact might be had with Mrs. Erwin, Postmaster, Thayer, Missouri, Inasmuch as he thought that the Frazier woman was in all probability receiving mail at both Post Offices.

In regard to investigation conducted at the U. S. Bureau of Fisheries, Mr. Heiliger was interviewed by the writer, in the presence of Sheriff Langston, and stated that he had not been able to again get in touch with one Claude MacLamore. It will be recalled from reference report that MacLamore is closely associated with Eugene Bowling and it was hoped that through him Heiliger might have been able to secure information regarding Weaver. Heiliger said that he had not been able to arrange another meeting with MacLamore but would continue his attempts to be of assistance in this way. Accordingly, it is suggested that Mr. Heiliger be contacted the next time an Agent is in Mammoth Springs.

importance was attached to this information by Mrs. Erwin, it is thought that the inquiry previously conducted by the above mentioned offices has exhausted this phase of the investigation. However, it is being pointed out at this time so that the Kansas City of fice may proceed with any A further inquiries deemed advisable. It is further recalled by the writer that prior report in the instant case from the Pittsburgh office has set out the above information asking that the attention of the Kansas City office be directed thereto, consequently no lead to the Kansas City office is being set out at this time. 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

Mr. Fierstone called from Pittsburgh in connection with the proposition made by Arthur Burdette, now at Erie, Pennsylvania, to the effect that he would, if arrangements could be made, interview his sister at the Prison and secure whatever information she has relative to the exact location of the hideout and the whereabouts of Campbell. Fierstone said he received a letter from Detroit yesterday, advising that satisfactory arrangements had been made at the Prison where Winona Burdette is incarcerated, and that Arthur Burdette can come out there on any Friday, during regular hours. Fierstone wanted to know how they should arrange for get Arthur Burdette out there, whether he should be given money enough to go alone, whether an Agent should go with him, or drive him out there.
