I reviewed for Mr. Keith certain developments in the Middle West which lead me to believe that this tip might not amount to much but cautioned Mr. Keith nevertheless not to treat the matter casually.

Mr. Keith telephoned me from New York and gave me the following information concerning the above matters:

Scaffa has for some ten years dealt with an informant named [redacted] who now lives in [redacted]. This informant has previously lived in New York, Brooklyn, Port Chester, and Norwalk.

Mr. Nathan Scaffa has used his previously on truck hi-jackings of silk and other merchandise out of Connecticut into New York and stated that the informant has turned up some valuable information, and is quite reliable. Scaffa has not dealt with the informant now for about a year but the informant had asked about Scaffa's conviction and sentence and called Scaffa to inform him that he had some information which Scaffa might be able to use to help himself. The informant then told Scaffa that some days ago on his way from Bridgeport while stopping along the highway at various roadhouses he ran into a close friend who told him that Karpis and three other men were living in a bungalow in Coscob, Connecticut; that Karpis has his hair dyed, color unknown, and wears dark tortoise rim glasses; that once or twice a week Karpis goes with his three companions to a "Black and Tan" joint on a road east of Southington, Connecticut. Scaffa had told the informant that he was interested in the information and the informant had agreed to attempt to get the street address in Coscob and get in touch with Scaffa before Saturday. Sunday, Sept. 8.

My dear Dolores,

This is Sunday evening, 8:30. I am all alone as usual, except Bobby.

I have thought of you so much all day tried to imagine what it must be like to be in a prison, perhaps its better I don't know.

Dolores, did you receive those old snap shots I sent them to the matron and asked her to give them to you. I didn't think that I could send them to you direct, when I wasn't writing.

I do hope that they are of some concilation to you, my dear. Those were truly "Happy days". Can you remember that trip to Salt Lake City? And the altitude was to high for me. I was taken so sick. And we wired for your Dad. I don't remember how old you were then, but I think you were around 3 yrs. You know dear, I had some more snap shots when I was on this trip, but it wasn't my kodak and they were so small I had one enlarged, I will give you, tho it isn't very plain. It was taken on Lake Superior, in Duluth. I know you will laugh, Dolores, for can you imagine your mother in breeches and boots. Well thats what I had on in the picture. I couldn't say that I had a very good time on the trip. I guess the water didn't agree with me. Listen Dolores I took a ride around the island where we were in a speed boat. And talk about rough water. The captain said it was the worse day he ever had in the twelve years he ran the boat. May be I will be able to tell you all about it soon. Now this is the big secret. I expect to leave here for Chicago about the 14th so perhaps I may see your baby next Sunday. You don't know how really anxious I am to see him.

I want to bring him something nice, but I may wait until I see what he needs. There is the cutest little coat and cap in one of the stores. I've handled it a good many times, and I would say to myself I would like to see that on Dolores' baby. I know Dolores that you think its strange that Margaret don't go to see your baby. Well you might as well know the truth, the Federal dept. wont let her, why, I don't know except, she's been a prisoner. You know Dolores how crazy Mugs is about kids and especially yours. And then it was born on her birthday. Now I don't want you to feel bad about it. I'll see what I can do as soon as I get there and I am certainly going to see what I can do about your clothes, and the baby things. Mr. Ladd has charge of the Chicago Dept. He was transferred from here last spring. He was at my house a good many times, he was very nice to me. Speaking of the federal agents, you asked me if they bothered me when you were picked up.

Yes, I will say, that I guess all the men here, was to see me, from the time that Mugs was caught, up untill some time after you were caught. But I will say this, that they treated me with every courtesy and respect. They were all gentlemen, that's more than I can say about the Police Dept. I will tell you all about it, some other time dear, so don't worry about any thing. I want you to try and get your mind off of every thing that happened.

It bothers me terrible about your hair falling out. I asked the matron in my note if I would be allowed to send you a hair brush and some danderine. And then you remember, how I used to message my scalp. You know how I mean Dolores loosen the scalp up, with your hands, go all over it.

Please do this, and if I can I will send you the danderine & brush.

Don't you have a physical examinations? Does your leg bother you much?

When I read your letter about eating sweet corn. You were so glad to get a change. I just cried my self sick. It hurts me so terrible. You know dear, I never cook any thing good that I don't think of you, and Frances.

There is nothing I can do about it Dolores, except to tell you that it won't always be like this. You know, God is good. And always say your prayers. I am going to say good night to my baby. Will write more when I know for certain about leaving for Chicago.

Sunday, Sept 15. My dear, a whole week since I started this letter. I have been waiting so I could tell you just when I am leaving here for Chicago, My teeth are holding me back and I won't be able to leave before next Wed. or Thursday now. It maked me sick but then I want then I want them before I go down. I am having a partial plate made and its a problem on account of that bone tumor, I had removed. Isn't it strange Dolores the pieces of furniture that you wanted are the pieces I kept also. I also kept that round table & the little coffee table. I just couldn't part with them. And you will be able to see them again and use them to.

I do hope you are feeling better, and unless something happens I will be able to write you a more interesting letter next time, because I will see the baby by that time. Babe says he is the sweetest thing she ever saw. Dolores I haven't been able to get the sacred heart badge that

you asked me for but I will send it soon. Have a letter for me at the
address in Chicago when I get there.

MY CAREER IN CRIME

August 9, 1935

I was in the 6A in grade school in the city of Tulsa, Oklahoma, I had attended school regular up until this time and had never played hooky are had any sort of trouble in any way. I was 14 years old at the time and it was the year of 1916 about the middle of the fall term an last half of the years school.

I was wrestling with another boy of about my age who was slightly heavier than I was. He suddenly broke loose from me and then made a lunge back at me and I stooped and caught him below the knees then raised up with him as quick as I could and he fell over my head and in falling his arm was twisted under him in such a way his arm was broken in three places. I helped pick him up and carried him to the principles office and the principle told me to go home and to send my father over to talk to him. So my father went over and the principle told my father that he thought the best thing to do was to take me out of school for a period of 30 days. So it was arranged. My people being very poor I begin to watch the papers for an ad to see if I couldn't find a job. My father didn't want me to sell news papers as he thought it would put me in the wrong kind of company. About which he was right. It turned out for me that way at least. Altho I will say here that the average news boys are an honest class taken as a whole. I found an add in the paper one evening that stated, Wanted twenty boys at a certain address the following Saturday morning. So I was one of the first there. It turned out to be an oil field advertising wedly called the Saturday Spectator. And it was its first issue. So I took a chance on explaining it to my father and I took an arm load of the pamphlets and went out to sell them which I did to the extint I earned \$1.50 that Saturday. So I taken the money home and begged my father so hard that he finally said seeing that it wasn't sold on the streets and that it was sold mostly in office buildings he said I could continue selling them. While I was out of school for the thirty days any way. So after the next Saturday I begged him to let me sell the news papers too as I could earn something every day that way and I promised him I would go back to school in a short while any way and forget it all together. But I never reckoned with the results I would find after being out of school for thirty days in the middle of a term. Why that principle ever told my father to take me out of school over that accident to this day I can't understand. The boy that was hurt (Carl Dick) by name wasn't even mad about it. And for that ungodly reason I was

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requested to stay out for I can't understand. But this is a fact and can all be proved if the persons concerned are alive at present which I should think they are. As I was saying I pleaded with my dad until he said being as tho I had already started to selling the Spectator that he would let me sell the news papers also. This I did until the finish of the thirty days was up and I seldom earned less than \$1.00 and Saturdays and Sundays I would earn more. My mother at the time was taking in washings and my Father who is practically an inviled from a bad rupture, did what ever odd jobs he could find that he was able to do. So our income was not very large and when the time came for me to go back to school I was far behind in my class and could not catch up very easly. So I begged my father to try to get permission from the school authorities to let me remain out of school and help them in making a living. This was after I had been back in school for some time and they had missed the money I had made for I always gave my money to my mother. It had taken quite a burden off of her when I was working. So it was arranged for me to quit school to help support my Father, mother & four sisters three younger than myself. The one oldest at this time was eighteen and she had been working for two years are more helping support the family and at eighteen she was married so that took her salary out of the family fund. So all in all they needed the money I earned very much. So that is how I quit school so early. I sold papers, worked in a machine shop the Norris Sucker rod company of Tulsa, then the Bauer Auto top shop and several other jobs and like most other street urchins I came to the notice of the Juvenile officers for taking some eggs from a farmers wagon. I was lectured and released. During this period of my life I even picked up junk and sold it for six months are so. Then I was employed for a while in the press room of the Tulsa World one of the cities largest morning news papers. Where I worked at night. An from midnight until early morning. Across the alley from this news paper office was located the Turks Bros. Shoe store which three other boys and my self entered one night and stole several pair of shoes. We also entered a hardware store and another shoe store I believe it was the Walkover shoe store and the Nickols Hardware store where we taken some flash lights pocket knives and other articles. A few months are weeks later I was out hunting and an officer came to my house to arrest me for these burglaries and my Father brought him out to where I was hunting and I accompanied him to the police station and I made a full confession of what I had done and was released and told if I was ever arrested again in Tulsa I would be sent to the reform school. So I got with two other boys, Harry Campbell, one that is connected in this case and another boy named Bill Green who killed himself after he escaped from Leavenworth Federal penitentiary rather than be captured. With these two who were much older than my self we came to Kansas City where we were

arrested and the Tulsa police were notified of our arrest. They sent a hold order on me and Campbell & Green were given 24 hours to get out of town and released. I was returned to Tulsa and charged with burglary. While awaiting trial two other boys and my self dug a hole through the wall into the elevator shaft and escaped. A few days later I was caught in the act of trying to steal a casing and tire off of an automobile. I was taken before the judge where I entered a plea of guilty to the tire theft and also the burglaries and was sentenced to a term of three years in the penitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma. I was 17 years of age at the time. I was taken to the penitentiary on Sept. 28 - 1919 where I served until July 15 - 1920 and was then transferred to the reformatory at Granit, Oklahoma to finish my term. While there I was a trusty at the gate and also drove the mail truck to town after the prison mail. I served my time with all the possible credits for good behavior and was released the 28th of June 1921. I went immediately to my Father & Mother at Okmulgee, Oklahoma where they were living at the time. So after being there for one month and failing to find work I went to Tulsa to live with one of my sisters and to try to find work. I found a job of work at the construction site of the St. Johns Hospital in Tulsa. I worked there for about three weeks. Then I was accused of having some misconduct with a girl at Central park. The National Guard Armory was just across the street from Central park and I was accused by one of these fellows. At least he told my sister the one I was staying with, that I had misbehaved my self with a young girl. I am mentioning this to show why I quit my job and left my sisters house. As there wasn't a semblance of truth in it. It was all over jealousy on the part of the National Guard boys. As they knew me and that I had just got out of the reformatory. If there had of been anything to it I would have been arrested for it. Am charged with it after I was arrested a few days later. But this accusation was the cause of my sister which had a young daughter at the time, caused her to tell me that she couldn't have me staying with her if I did things like that. And of course it hurt me for her to believe that I had been guilty of such a horrible offence. So I packed my clothes and went to town. Then it was that I having no one over me are to check on me about how late I was staying out. I begin to stay at first one rooming house and then another with three other boys. One of which was Doc Barker, the other two of which one is dead and the other I don't know what became of him. But the one that is dead will come into this article later on his name was Howard Margraves. We were arrested the first part of September (1921) in our room and charged with state vagrancy. That carried a penalty of 30 days in jail and \$100.00 fine. So I tried to argue that I had just quit a job and that I was looking for another one but owing to my record I was found guilty before a police judge and sentenced. But doc he got a lawyer and got out on a bond.

Also one of the others. But Margraves & my self were held as he had been into trouble before too. Now this crime that I was later convicted on had already happened. It happened the 26th of August 1921, and this was in September that I was in jail. I stayed in the jail for about thirty days and a bunch of dope fiends and Margraves & myself made an escape from the jail. The escape was made possible by the neglect of the jailor in leaving the door open. We went out of the cage and upon top of the cage and made a hole in the roof of the building and I think about 20 left. Margraves, James Sexton and myself left together. This happened in October 1921 about the first. We went to Muskogee, Oklahoma. Margraves left Sexton and I there and went home to Pittsburg, Kansas. Sexton and I stayed together for a month or more making a living by hiping and on the short con game. He was good at both. We went to Sapulpa and it was here that I meet Edna Price known now as Edna Murray. She was a waitress in a restaurant at the time. Up until this time there had never been a girl in my life. She was 4 years older than my self. She being 23 at the time. And we seemed to get along very well and I liked her. But she had been married and I had the old fashioned idea that I shouldn't marry some one that had been married it was taught to me at home. For that and that alone kept me from marrying her. I have often wondered if I had of only married her then that both of our lives would have been different for I did love her and things that came to pass will show it later on. I stayed there in Sapulpa all of that winter some times she would feed me and pay my room rent and some times I would be the one. But it was a partneur ship affair. In January in 1922 about the 8th or 9th James Sexton was killed with some other fellows in Okmulgee, Oklahoma. And in the mean time I had saw in the paper where Doc Barker was arrested in Tulsa for murder and my name was mentioned as being wanted for a material witness. I never give it much thought as he had never come back to see me after he got out of jail in Tulsa so I continued to live in Sapulpa fifteen miles from Tulsa. So on March the fourth 1922 I was arrested in Sapulpa and taken to Tulsa and charged with murder in the first degree. I was charged with the murder of a night watchman that had been killed on August 26 in 1921 at the place where I had been working in Tulsa the St. Johns hospital. Before I was arrested Doc Barker had been convicted of this charge and sentenced to life. Myself not being guilty of the charge, just figured it was because of my record and my association with Doc if he was guilty. I never for one moment thought I would be convicted for a crime I never did. I just didn't think it could be that any thing like that could happen. But I have learned better since for I know of several cases when men have been convicted for crimes they didn't commit.

Edna had one of the best criminal lawyers in the state to come and talk to me Ben Tompson of Sapulpa and we went over the case together and he told me they didn't have much of a case and that he would defend me. But later on the Kly Klux Klan entered the case. They were at their height at that time in Oklahoma and they are I always figured it was them caused Tompson to withdraw from the case. He refunded the money that had been paid him which wasn't very much and I was left with out an attorney. But in the meantime while I was held in the jail Mrs. Barker, Doc's mother came to see me and told me that they had appealed Doc's case to the criminal courts of appeal and that if I didn't tell them the same story that Doc did it would ruin his appeal and that if I did it would help him. Well I knew if I lied and told them I was with him that they had convicted him on his testimony so they would me and at that time I thought I should help the old women if I could and not hurt my self. And then too I had got another lawyer and he had told me not to worry that they couldn't convict me on the evidence they had against me. So they kept putting my case off from time to time. I think I was in jail during three terms of district court. And each time I was told not to worry that they were liable to throw my case out any time. So it went on until January in 1923 I had been in Jail almost a year and I had begin to think I was the most unfortunate person in the world. I couldn't get a trial and I was held without bond, couldn't have made a bond if they had of set one. So on the 16th day of January there was a bunch of boys in the jail that wanted out very badly. So we planned a jail break and on that morning we grabbed the jailor took his gun and eleven of us escaped. Margraves had been arrested in Pittsburg, Kansas and was in the jail at the time. So him and I went to Sapulpa and were headed out into the county to a place where I had lived before I was arrested and while on the way out there a wagon passed us and we got on the back end of it riding with our feet hanging out the back end. Then two Deputy Sheriff's from Tulsa drove up behind us in a car and they recognized us and they begin to shoot as they passed and Margraves was killed and several bullet holes were in my clothing. But I wasn't hit. So there were big head lines in the papers and I was branded as the leader. And when I got back to jail my trial was set for the 23 of January. So on that date I went to trial for a crime I didn't do any my life was at stake. The trial lasted two or three days and when the state had finished this case. My attorney who was appointed by the state told me to not take the stand an offer no defense what ever. He said that they hadn't made a case against me and that the only thing the jury could do was acquit me. So not knowing much about court cases I took his advise. The case went to the jury and they convicted me and sentenced me to life. But the

foreman of the jury told my mother afterward that this was the reason they convicted me. He said that they didn't think I was guilty of murder but that I ought to have some time for breaking out of jail. So he said they the jurors all agreed to convict me on the murder and that they all agreed to recommend me for clemency after I had served 5 years. Which they did. I will explain this part later on. I went to McAlester Penitentiary on Feb 3rd 1923 to serve life. After serving almost two years my appeal in the criminal courts was affirmed as was Doc Barkers. And on January the 8th 1925 I escaped from the penitentiary with 4 other prisoners. And thirteen days later I was caught in Kansas City at the apartment of Mrs. Edna Murray. She had married Jack Murray while I was in the penitentiary. So I was returned to the prison. After I was back there three or four years my people begin to try to get me out and went to visit all of the jurors that were living or could be found. Then is when my mother found out about the agreement the jurors had had in the jury room the day I was convicted. They all recommended me for Clemency. And told her about the agreement. They recommended my time to be cut to five years. I could have gotten out then if I had of had some money to have got a lawyer. Then about this time a burglar was killed and his brother captured in Pittsburg, Kansas. The brother told the sheriff there that his Brother had killed a man in Oklahoma and that two innocent men, Volney Davis & Doc Barker, were doing time for it. The fellow had confessed it to his Bro. His mother and to a Priest in Kansas City. So my mother got busy and got a sworn affidavit from all of them to that effect. With this kind of evidence she still could not get me out. One reason was because I had escaped. And the rest were because I didn't have any money to pay to some attorney to get it put through. Time went on until Sept. 10th 1932 when Doc's brother Fred, Jess Doyle, Alvin Karpis and Fred & Docs mother put up money and got Doc out. He was out about 30 days when He sent Jack Glyn of Leavenworth, Kansas, down to see me and he told me that Doc & Jess was going to put money up for me a parole and that they wanted me to meet them in Leavenworth at the National Hotel. When I got out. So on November 1st I got a leave of absence for a period of eight months. I wasn't required to even report until my 8 months was up. I was supposed to get a parole. So Preston Lister the attorney that Jack Glyn used down there at McAlester wouldn't take but \$150.00 dollars of the \$250.00 that he had put in escrow in the bank in McAlester. I left the other \$100.00 there and he said he would get me a parole for it. So later on before the eight months were up I saw Jack Glyn and gave him some more money and he got me another 12 months leave. Jack Glyn in all got about \$2,000.00 from Doc, Fred and Jess for getting me out. So I felt my self obligated to them. I met Jack Glyn at the National Hotel and he said he had a wire from Doc and that he

would meet me there. I got a room and that evening Doc came in by plane. He had plenty of money and gave me some. Then he told me what Fred and him wanted me to do. He said Fred had their mother with him in Saint Paul and had been with her for a long time and that they wanted me to go to Saint Paul and get mother and to take her to Chicago and that would be all I would have to do for six months was to take care of her. It was one of the longest and hardest six months I have ever spent. She had plenty of money and I was furnished with plenty but I didn't enjoy it. And I was quick to see why they were so anxious to be away from her. But I will pass over this. Mother meaning Mrs. Barker and I left St. Paul for Chicago the next day. But before I left St. Paul I met Vera Miller, Earl Chrisman, Earl Doyle, Jess Doyle, Lawrence Duval, Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis. Each of these knowing I had just been released from prison gave me some money. And Lawrence Duval ask about another boy that was in McAlester doing 25 years and I told him he could get out for \$200.00. So he gave me \$300.00 and told me to send it to him which I did from Chicago. I went with mother to Chicago and Bill Weaver a party known to me as Jew Otto from the east he also had a girl with him called Helen. We went to Joe Bergels auto agency in Cicero and he directed us to Doc Stacys home in Maywood then we went there and saw Doc Stacy. He made arrangements for us that night. Bill and myself sleep at Ross Stacy that night a brother of Docs. The next day mother, Helen and I rented an apartment in Chicago at Kedzie and Jackson Blvd. just around the corner on Kedzie. Otto went back to St. Paul with Bill and we stayed there a few days and Doc Barker & the Jew Otto came down from St. Paul. And said they had just made some good connections in Reno, Nevada, and that he would go out there with me. He said Fred & Karpis was already out there. So we taken all of the luggage and mother caught a train for Reno. Doc Otto & I was to drive through in two cars one belonged to Karpis and the other was Docs. We started some time before Xmas and was out there before Xmas. Mother was there when we got there. We all three came through in one car as the Jew Otto turned Docs car over close to Palmyra, Mo. So we left it to be repaired and finished the trip in Karpis car. The next day after arriving mother and I rented an apartment. Then shortly Doc, Jew Otto, Karpis & Fred left for St. Paul. On the way back Doc stopped in Kansas City and there he connected with his father & Harry Hull the boy I sent the money to from Chicago. He had got out in the mean time. So they went on to St. Paul together. It was the first time Fred had saw his father in several years. But Mr. Barker only stayed a short while in St. Paul. But before any of the rest came back to Reno the 3rd North Western National bank was robbed in Minneapolis and there was two policemen and a citizen killed. Harry Hull, Bill Weaver, Doc Barker, Fred Barker, Jess Doyle, Earl Chrisman drove to Reno in one car. Karpis went to Chicago, I think before he came out to

Reno. I heard later that Vern Miller and Lawrence Duval were with them in the robbery. I know they all had lots of money when they came out with the exception of Harry Hull. But they all gave him money and bought him clothes. But later on he taken a suitcase of Jess Doyles that contained about \$300.00 in one dollar bills and left. Doc & Jess Doyle followed him to Kansas City to kill him but he got wise to them and got away from them after they had located him. And while on this trip I had Doc to look up Edna Murray who had escaped from Jefferson City prison and was living in K.C. with her sister Doris. They found them alright and Jess fell in love with Doris, and Edna sent word to me to come and see her. So when Jess & Doc returned to Reno they brought me this news. They also told me that they meet Eddie Green & Earl Doyle and that they was going to rob a payroll in North K.C. and that they wanted to cut me in on it. But Doc said no that he wouldn't tell me. But later on he told me after they had robbed the payroll. Buck Coleman & Dago Howard helped them & Earl Doyle & Buck got shot. So it was then that Doc told me that they had wanted me to go on it with them. I was glad that I didn't of course.

Mother went to visit her sister Goldie in Calif. and had arranged for her to meet her in Chicago so they could attend the worlds fair together. Mother took a train to Chicago and Doc and I came by plane to K.C. Doc went to Palmyra Mo. to get his car and I went on to Chicago where I meet mother and we rented an apartment at 112 Home Ave. in Oak Park. They I came back to K.C. and meet Doc, Earl Chrisman, Vern Miller, Frank Nash, Jess Doyle, Karpis, Fred Barker and Eddie Green. They had planed to rob the Fairbury Neb. bank for a long time and at last they got set on it. So before they started, Jess and myself who were living with Edna & Doris sent them on to Chicago to rent an appartment for us to come to. Now here is another robbery I could have been in on but they had too many the way it was and Fred said it would be a tough caper and as I had never been in a day lite robbery or a bank robbery. That I had better not go. He said he would see that I got something out of it. So I stayed in the apartment just as Harry Hull had done in St. Paul when they had robbed the 3rd Northwestern bank. They figured on getting back at night, so they wanted some one there during the day and to have something to eat. Bank robbers have to eat too. And they had to go with out any thing all that night and the next day. I stayed there and they all left one day about 7 P.M. They meaning Fred & Doc Barker, Vern Miller, Frank Nash, Eddie Green, Jess Doyle & Earl Chrisman & Karpis. The next time I saw any of them was the next evening at about 8 or 9 o'clock P.M. When Fred Barker, Vern Miller & Earl Chrisman drove up in front of the apartment. I went out and Earl was in the back seat of Jess Doyles Chevrolet sedan. Earl had been shot so I stayed there in the car with him while

Vern Miller went to get a Doctor and to arrange a place to take him too. While we sit there the others came in walking and went on in to the apartment. Vern came back and we went to a house in the southern part of K.C. Dr. D. M. Nigro treated Earl for a week or more that I stayed there and nursed Earl. When he began to get better I was released by Doc & Fred. I understand Earl got worse after I left. They also moved him to Vern's house at 6612 Edgevale Road in Kansas City. He died here and they disposed of the body. I never did know where. Doc & Fred Barker, Karpis & Vern Miller did it. I was given several hundred dollars and was to get a car. I didn't own any at that time. So when I left for Chicago Vern Miller wired to Joe Bergel in Chicago where he had a credit and told Bergel to give me a new car. Bergel also gave me enough money to make up \$1,000.00 one thousand dollars. It was already for me when I got there. I sent Doc Stacey's wife over after it so Bergel wouldn't see me. She bought it in my right name E. V. Davis. I lived with Jess Doyle & Doris and visited mother Barker every day. Then Fred & Doc came on to Chicago and Fred didn't like the place we had rented for his mother as her sister was going to visit her and he wanted her to have a better place so we moved her to the Orolando Apartment hotel on the south side. She rented one half of a whole floor two complete apartments adjoining. While she lived there I lived at the Elenor Manor on the south side of Chicago. But Fred had brought Paula Harmon with him from K.C. and he couldn't take her around his mother so him and I went to round Lake Ill. and rented a cottage for the season this must of been in June in 1933. Paula, Edna, Freddie, Doc and myself went out there at first but they had some kind of a deal on with some big shots and they didn't stay out there much. Here is where I met Miss Helen Byrns who I fell in love with. She was there on a vacation from a nurses training school. I could have married her by deceiving her. But I liked her too well for that. While we were living here Mr. Hamm was kidnaped. But I did not know it until one evening when Montie Carter & Big Charley or (Chuck) and Karpis, Fred & Dock Barker came out there to cut the money up. They gave me \$750.00 and said it was some extra they had left. I never did know how that money was split but I heard Fred say that Tom Brown & Jack Pieffer of St. Paul got the big end of it. We lived on here until the end and close to the end of the season. About this time mother had read one of Goldie's letters from her husband and he said he thought it was dangerous for her to be there with Fred & Doc and that he thought she should come home. Goldie never knew that mother read her letter. So when she said she thought she ought to go home no one protested. And as soon as she left Doc and I moved mother to an apartment Hotel at 72nd and 73rd and Stony Island in Chicago. Edna and I moved in from the lake to

64th and the I. C. R.R. in a big yellow apartment there we had an apartment on the back side near the tracks. But it was close to mothers place. It was while we lived here that Bill Weaver come to Chicago and told them he had a mark in South St. Paul. He said the Chief of Police are the former Chief had give it to him. Bill had lived in South St. Paul under his protection. They had a meeting place in Calumet City at Willie Harris saloon. Here is where I meet Harry Campbell, Irish Omalley, Babs Moran and Willie Harris & Gus Stone for the first time. I had knew Campbell a long time before. I was taking the fair in during this time and also courting Miss Byrns ever chance I got. I would get her at 7 P.M. and have her back at 9 P.M. those were the rules at the nurses home. I visited mother every day and got her the things she wanted. One one morning I meet Fred there and he said looks like I am going to have to get a nurse and a doctor for the gang and keep them all the time. He said Big Fits are Charley had got hit on the last caper and he wanted me to go to Calumet City and stay with him. When I went out there Omalley & Gus Stone was there with him in Willie Harris house. I stayed there several days and some large doctor come and dressed Chuck every day But I never did know his name. It seemed as though Gus Stone got him. I thought Gus Stone was Gus Winkler But in that I guess I was wrong. Big Charley was taken from there to some hospital I never knew where. But it was pretty close about 150 miles I think. Shortly after this while I was still living near the I.C. RR. there was a mail robbery in the loop down town at night and in getting away there was a wreck. But before I go into that I want to say here I don't know which of these robbed that pay roll S. St. Paul Fred & Doc Barker, Karpis, Bill Weaver, Babs Moran, Harry Campbell, Big Charley was there for he got shot. Irish Omalley, Willie Harris, Gus Stone. But some of them did it. Well when this car was wrecked I saw a picture in the paper of some of the tags that were in it and I recognized the number as that of a tag I had stolen in Deluth, Minn. Tag No. B141145 - 1934. I got it off of a car in a garage. In fact I did a lot of this kind of petty stealing for them. I was always on the lookout for tags. For they always had tags for all the states they would have to cross in going any where. Then later on Doc came to my house and he had his hand bandaged up. So since I have been in custody this time Elmer Farmer told me that that night the mail robbery was attempted that when they had the wreck and killed a policeman that Montie Carter or Bolton had shot Doc through the little finger on his left hand. And that when they came to his house in Bensenville that night that Harry Sawyer, Fred & Doc Barker, Big George Zigler, Montie Carter or Bolton and Karpis was in it. But I thought Gus Stone was with them too. Just a guess

I don't know. I also thought Harry Campbell was in on it. But Bolton knows. After this Edna and I moved to St. Paul and lived at the Oseolla apartment at Lexington just off of Grand Ave. I was living there under my right name E. V. Davis. But before this we had all visited Reno, Nevada. Fred & Doc Barker, Harry Campbell, Karpis & myself with our women had been out there. So I will go on to the apartment in St. Paul. We Edna & I lived there one month and had paid another months rent when on the 18th or 19th of January 1934 Fred Barker & Blond George or Zigler came to my house and told me that I had better leave St. Paul. That the police would turn the town upside down looking for the kidnapers of Bremer. I didn't want to go but they said I had better. For it looked bad leaving a whole months rent and I had used my right name. But Fred had had some kind of a shooting scrape with an aviator and they had got his tag number. So he wanted to use my car as it was a coupe and that was what he wanted. So George Zigler took Edna and my luggage and went to Chicago where Edna was told to rent a flat for Paula Harmon, Freds girl and Winona Burdett, Harry Campbells girl. I was to go there too when I got strait with the landlord. I left the next day after trying to get some of my rent money back. I also paid the milk man and the paper boy. So when I went to Chicago on the bus I went to mother Barkers place on the south shore drive and I went to Willie Harris place in Calumet City. I don't remember which. But I believe it was Harris place as he was the one that had helped Edna locate the apartment at 6212 University on the south side in Chicago. That was where I found Edna, Paula & Winona and I stayed there with them for about 3 weeks or more I know I had a hell of a time with the three of them for they would get drunk every time I would go to George Zigers flat in Cicero to meet Fred Barker, Montie or Bolton and George. I also meet Willie Harris there on several trips. I brought Fred clean clothes and done everything I could for him. I also visited his mother and keep his guns and equipment for him. It was in George Zigers flat that Montie or Bolton & George would type the ransom notes. George always wore gloves while typing. During this time Paula Harmon & Edna had a fight and I got Fred and Willie to get her moved they moved into an apartment on 63rd and two blocks off of Stony Island going east on 63rd. They used the name of Bradberry I believe. So after Bremer was released Fred gave me three or 4 hundred dollars and I moved to Aurora, Ill. I also sold my car, that is Willie Harris sold it for me. I bought an old ford for \$195.00 in Chicago. I lived in Aurora a month or so when Fred give me some more money. I think it was three five hundred dollar bills. I traded my ford in for a second hand Buick. I was living under the name of J. E. Hansen. As I was afraid they would find that place

in St. Paul where I moved from and had used the name of Davis which is my name. My idea in moving to Aurora was this Edna knew a man there & his wife - Cory Bales was his name and his wife name was Violet. Edna had meet them when she was an escape from prison before. But they didn't know anything about her. He was a gambler and he had lived there a long time and knew lots of people. So I interduced myself as a gambler to him. I was going to get acquainted with as many people as I could and in that way make myself a town to be from. Know one knew me there so I was going to learn as many names and address as I could then where ever I went I could correspond with them and people would think that was my home town. But before I had got settled good I like all other fools who think they can beat the law had told Bill Weaver and Doc Barker where I lived. So Bill found him a house and him and Myrtle moved over. Then Doc and Harry Campbell came over to Bills and they begun to get rid of that money. They was using his place to make meets with Slim Gibson and Ollie Berg. But just before this one night I believe it was the next night after George Zigler was killed, mother Barker & Irene, Georges wife, came to my house at night and wanted me to go to Wilmington, Ill. and get some of Georges things and stuff that belonged to Fred and Doc Barker. I went with them and went to Irene's uncle Sy. Him and I dug a hole in his garage and then busted a concrete vault and took two packages out. We also got some other stuff out of the house. Mother & Irene took me to Aurora and they went on to Chicago. But the next morning Irene came back after me. She said Fred had gone crazy. She said he had been operated on and had went out of his head. When I got there Jimmie Wilson and some other fellow was there and they had him quite. He had had his finger prints all cut off. They took him back to Ollie Bergs house after that. Then it was that Doc and Harry Campbell brought the money over to Bills house in Aurora. I have been told since that the bundles we got that night contained \$140,000.00 of the Bremer ransom. I never knew at that time what it was. Then about this time Montie Carter or Bolton and Elmer Farmer came over after Doc and told him that Joe O'Brien and Bobby two Chicago gangsters wanted to see him. I drove him to the sea food inn on north Ave. in Elm Hurst, Ill. and there we meet them. They said they had Dillinger & Homer Van Meter & Hamilton and that Hamilton was shot. They had had them several days and had to get rid of them. So Doc turned to me and said cant you keep them a day or two in your place. Well I said yes the same as any one else would have underlike circumstances. So we made a meet with them for that night at the same place. I went home and took Edna over to Bills house. You see they had that money at Bills was the reason they didn't take them there. So that night we meet Eobby & Joe at the same place and Dillinger & Van Meter & Hamilton was in a car out side we made the transfer and I drove them to Aurora. The next day Hamilton died. And Joe & Bobby got Dillinger a new yellow

wheeled 1934 ford and to drums and some shells for a machine gun and took them to Elmer Farmers place in Bensenville, Ill. I went over there and got them I give Farmer \$125.00 they had sent for the car and stuff. So the next day they took out. But Van Meter give me several hundred dollars while he was there. He had about \$17,000.00 then. The next I heard of them they robbed a bank in Ohio close to Toledo and as luck would have it Fred & Doc Barker, Ray Karpis, Campbell & Bill Weaver and myself and our women were all in Toledo at that time and they had stole a tag out of Toledo to use on the robbery. But they didn't know we would be there and we didn't know they would be there. That is the last I heard of them until they were killed. Campbell, Doc & myself had Dr. Moran to work on our fingers while we were in Toledo. Then we moved up on the lake near Sandusky. Bert & Ted Angus made all of our arrangements for us in Toledo such as renting houses and buying cars and furnishing us a place to drink and loaf around. I got into an argument with the Barker boys over some money and they give me \$3,100.00 and bought me a car. Bert Angus bought it for me. I had the old Buick I had bought in Aurora so I took it to Cleveland and traded it in on a truck. I took the truck and Edna took the new ford and we started for Montana and freedom from all such gangs. That is what we thought. I was going to try to live a decent life. I was going into business. Which I did I went to Glasgow, Mont. and went into partners with Cary Bales who was already there when I got there. Him and I gambled there for a while looking around and we made good money. But I wanted to go into business of our own and he and I leased a piece of land near the big government job of the Fort Peck dam. We built a building and was going to have a night club where you could dance and dine also gambling. But just as I had it about built I made a trip to trade my car in for another one as Edna had turned this one over on the trip up there and had ruined it. So when I came back I foundout that the federal men had been up there looking for me. So I just left. It was an awful blow to me and Edna as we sure thought we were going to be able to get out of that awful strain of living in town and being afraid to open the door when some one knocks. But we had to leave. So I came back to Kansas City and lived there until I was caught in Feb. Then I got away that night in Yorkville, Ill. and decided to go it alone. I never went near any one that knew me after I left Matt Gleasons place in Aurora that night. The only other place I went was where I went when I was caught. I went by my folks home in Neosho, Mo. and they didn't want me to stay there which I wouldn't have any way. I was there about five minutes and drove right away. I am writing this with the word of a federal agent that it won't be published are given to the public in no way. And will be used for the good of the department and will be put into the proper hands

to benefit me. I am doing this hoping to atone for the wrong I have done. I know some of this article won't sound true to some people. But if they knew the Barkers as I do they could understand it. They considered themselves paying me for the wrong I done myself in not ruining Doc's appeal in that case in Tulsa, Okla. I followed their advice and got life when I could have used my own and have been acquitted. But I couldn't see it that way then. But that is the way they looked at it. I have plead guilty to conspiracy in this case and have been sentenced to life. I also have the life sentence in McAlester, Okla. So I know I will have to do a long time to get out, but I have made up my mind to make a man out of myself and never be into any thing dishonest. I think during my life I am due to have one chance to live a decent life and make a respectable living. If this can be used to advantage I will feel that I have done something good. But it can fall into the wrong hands and possibly cause my death. But I don't believe honest people will double cross me when I am trying to help them and I believe if they can see that I intend to do right that they will help me. And all they will have to do is to watch my record in prison to see that I will prove that I am on the square with them. But I have got all of the thieves view points on life that I want and if I find honest people as crooked as thieves are in their dealings then I don't want to live any how for there is only two kinds of people in the world dishonest & honest. I intend to be honest. I have tried the dishonest life and have found nothing but sorry, grief, fear & deceit. I would like to write a story some time on (crime can't pay) and another on the (Fear and Strain of a hunted man). I think it might do some young people a lot of good. The one thing that kept me with the Barkers was my feeling toward Edna. Her health wasn't very good and she sure hated to leave me. So I felt like I had been the cause of her getting started in a life of crime. So she kept telling me just as soon as I got hold of enough to start some kind of a business that we would leave them. But as things went on I got in so far I was afraid to try to quit. I will always regret I didn't arrange to have them all caught and put myself on the mercy of the court. That is what I should have done. I hope this is handled in the right way for if it is not I will be forced to protect myself from the hatred of the other prisoners. And I can't keep a good record if I am fighting with other prisoners. But surely this will be taken care of and not published. I would like to be kept in this prison if I am allowed to work. I hope I am separated from Doc Barker. He has always had a bad influence over me and I would like to be separated from him. I hope that the heads of the federal department have time to look this over and that it is

kept on record where it will be available in time to come when I try to get out. I also hope that if I ever get out it will be on a parole. I want it to be as strict as it can be made and I will live up to it.

So in closing I will say that the names and dates in here are as near as I can remember and that I have told the truth as near as I can remember. I will be glad to aid in any way I can on anything that comes up. I will not be associated with thieves while I am in here are if I am ever released. If I did not intend to go straight and live and honest and legitimate life I would never have done the things I have here. I would have just went ahead and got in with the hard class in here are where ever I am at and depended on their help to get away. But I don't want to be out as an escape. The life one has to live isn't worth any thing. You can't own any thing you can't know any one, you can't sleep well. You can't visit like a human with your own kinfolks. You can't marry a decent women. You can't have children are a bank account. In fact you have to live like a wild animal. And I would like to do these things. So to do them I will do my best to do what is right. I have been used by this gang of thieves and realize I have done wrong. I have talked to Mr. Farland and Mr. Norstrum and am convinced they will help me later on. Mr. Farland has been in the service of the Department of Justice for 29 years. So he must be honest and up right in his dealings. Otherwise he would have been dropped. So I am putting my life and future in his hands. I would like for my mother to have a complete copy of this also Judge Joyce. The Judge that sentenced me, and if it is giving to him to be with the understanding that it is not to be published.

I guess this about all. Oh! yes, another thing that happened to me was when Doc Stacy sent Vern Miller to my house after that massacre in Kansas City. I was living at 219 North 2nd Ave. in Maywood, Ill. when it happened. I had forgot it so put it here. So who ever reads this can see how I was used and that I got in so deep I was afraid to leave them without their consent. But I will do my best to make good and prove myself worthy of help. I will never be associated with that class of people again

A SUPPLEMENT.

I have already give this information to the departaent. So therefore didn't include it in the other article. First I told them where John Hamiltons body could be found. Second I told them who participated in a Chicago loop mail robbery, during which a policeman was killed. Third I told them where and how one Willie Harris was killed. Fourth I told them who robbed a mail truck in Coffeerville, Kansas, and who set the job up. Fifth I told them all I knew about where and what became of one Dr. Joseph Moran. Sixth I told them how to locate William Weaver and his wife. I also will furnish any other information that I can that will aid them. I hope that the promised protection will be given me and that some day in the future I can have a chance to live a free man under parole. I entered a plea of guilty in the Bremer case and saved the government the expense of a trial. But surly in time to come I will be given my freedom if I show the right attitude toward prison life and my effort to reform. I am not a criminal at heart. I have never killed any one. I have never even been in a position to shoot at any one. Although I have been shot at on several different occasions in trying to escape. So at my age and been through what I have and seeing my mistakes as I do, if I can't ever be free it would be much more meryfull to sentence me to death than to let me languish my life away in prison. We are all susceptible to mistakes. From the highest minister to the lowest felon. But I am ready to atone for mine and intend to live a life that will prove it. I may be making a mistake in making this statement. And only be killed for my effort to do good. In knowing these fellows as I do I know thats what will happen if I am confined with them and they ever find it out. For any one that can take his fellow man that he has dranked with, ate with, slept with, and lived with, out and shoot him. Would not hesitate to stick a knife into some one that told that he did these things. So that is the position I am putting myself in if you don keep your word with me and let me serve my time where they are not at. Of course if this is kept out of the papers and away from these people named I can go on as tho nothing has happened.

I would like for the warden of what ever institution I serve my time in to be informed of my attitude. I will not cause him any regret from any favors he might show me. Seventh. I told them where Mr. Hamm was held. Two of these things have already been proved true I will underscore them. In finishing this I want to say this: Without the help and information of the following people the Gang of Barker & Karpis would have been put out of existence long ago. The names & towns follow. Tom Brown, Crumly & Sawyer & Jack Pieffer of St. Paul, Minn. These Jim McKay, Bill Graham & Scar face Sullivan of Reno, Nevada. Willis

Heeney of Chicago, Bert & Ted Angus of Toledo, Ohio. Without their help there would have been no kidnaping by this gang. And without their help they are we would have all been caught in St. Paul. Are in Reno. I am sorry I wasn't so I could get evidence against these. But maybe this will help. Hoping I have not failed are just made another mistake in doing this I will stop.



With reference to your letter of September 4, 1935 to the Director covering the transmittal of various guns recovered from William Weaver, and particularly the 4th paragraph thereof, wherein you refer to certain ammunition recovered from the place of William Weaver, this ammunition should be kept intact until such time as it has been determined whether or not the United States Attorney at St. Paul might want this ammunition for introduction at the time of the trial of William Weaver at St. Paul.

With reference to the last paragraph of this letter as to the \$1002.32 recovered from William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton, as indicated in reports and my teletype to the Bureau it is believed that in the absence of any identification of this money as being ransom money, it remains the personal property of these two individuals and should be handled as such personal property taken from the person of a prisoner at the time of arrest, and forwarded to the St. Paul office for delivery to the United States Marshal there as the personal property of William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton.

You should obtain the approval of the Bureau for the forwarding of the money indicated and thereafter arrange accordingly to forward this money to the St. Paul office, which office will be governed in its actions by the wishes of the United States Attorney and the Bureau as to delivering this money to the United States Marshal as the property of the prisoners in question.

Please be advised that when William Weaver, with aliases, and Myrtle Eaton, with aliases, were apprehended near Port Orange, Florida, on September 1, 1935, the sum of \$555.00 was found in the pocketbook of Weaver and counted in his presence and verified by Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley and myself. There was also found in the pocketbook of Myrtle Eaton the sum of \$347.32, which was counted in her presence by Mr. Connelley, Special Agent M. J. Cassidy and myself.

There were also located \$100.00, composed of five-dollar bills, below and behind a dresser drawer in one of the bedrooms in the house in which Weaver and Myrtle Eaton had been residing. This sum was also counted and verified in the presence of Weaver and Myrtle Eaton by Mr. Connelley and Special Agent R. D. Brown.

It may be also stated that the numbers on the bills were listed and compared with those on all ransom lists in our files and it was found that none of this currency appeared on these lists.

During a thorough search of the premises by five Special Agents, in charge of Special Agent M. W. Meekins of the Nashville office, there were located in the dining room buffet five dollars in dimes and a small dime bank marked "Bobbie Osborne", Weaver's adopted son, containing some cash, amount unknown.

All of the above monies were turned over to me and are presently being retained in our office safe.



likely places for guests and others to gather and McCulley is in and out of these places constantly, and for this reason it is believed that McCulley would be the logical informant in and near the Empire Hotel.

Mr. John Connors, owner of the above hotel, on examining the picture was not positive as to whether he has seen Meade or not, but stated that he would easily remember him if he saw him due to his peculiar mouth and action of his eye. Mr. Connors stated he would immediately notify the St. Louis office in the event he sees Meade or anyone resembling him.

Mr. J. A. Thompson, Post Office Inspector, was contacted to ascertain whether he had information concerning Meade and specifically whether he has known of Meade being in or around Springfield, Ill. Mr. Thompson stated that he had no information of that nature but would check his files and submit what information he did have.

Under date of September 16, 1935, the St. Louis Office was in receipt of a letter from Mr. Thompson which sets forth the following information:

*A wanted circular was issued by our service, July 2, 1934, Case No. 34837-E, for William Elmer Mead, aliases John Henry Foster, J.W. Mead, E. E. Laird, and Edward E. Gaynor; age 30 in 1934; weight 160 pounds; height 5' 11"; eyes, blue; mouth distorted by wound; native of Iowa; wife, Katherine Mead, also known as Marie Mead and Kate Schmitt, has relatives located in Portland, Ore., and San Francisco, Calif. Residence, 1928 to 1934, at 1533 Fargo Ave., Chicago, Illinois.

*The circular also shows that Mead was indicted Dec. 15, 1928 U. S. Court, Jacksonville, Fla., charges: Fraudulent use of the mails as "Confidence or Bunco" man; arrested Canon City, Colo. Sept. 15, 1925; forfeited bond on Dec. 7, 1931, at Jacksonville, Fla.; arrested August 10, 1933, at Chicago, Ill. Case called April 2, 1934, at Jacksonville, Fla.; bond of \$10,000 forfeited. If located or arrested, hold as fugitive and telegraph government rate collect to nearest post office inspector and United States Marshal, Jacksonville, Florida, and notify the Post Office Inspector in Charge, at Atlanta, Ga., or at New York, N. Y.



DETAILS:

Mr. McIntyre of the Bureau exhibited an anonymous letter to Acting Special Agent in Charge F. M. Hickey of this office under date of September 12, 1935 dated at Painter, Virginia September 8, 1935 stating that a man was staying at Wilkins Beach, Northampton County, Virginia who resembled very much Alvin Karpis and furnished the description as 5'8" or 10", 155 pounds to 160 pounds, hair black, eyes black or dark brown, scar over left eye; that he carried a pistol in a holster under his left arm and was driving a 1934 model Lincoln Sedan bearing New Jersey license 176-933. The writer of the letter indicated that he maintained Post Office Box 302, Painter, Virginia.

In reply to a telegram to the Trenton Office, of this Bureau, information was received that there was no such license as New Jersey 176-933; that the registration license is confined to five numbers, all of which have a letter prefixed and that no driver's license was issued to date as high as 176-933.

Mr. Jones stated he was on duty late Sunday evening, September 8, 1935 preparing mail for the midnight train and he noticed a letter in the mail in handwriting unfamiliar to him addressed to "J. Edgar Hoover, Washington, D. C." and that on the upper left hand corner he noticed the return address Box 302. Neither Mr. Jones nor Mrs. Askins could furnish any information as to the possible identity of the writer of this letter. They stated that identification orders were always posted in the front lobby and they knew of no one in the community who would write such a letter.

Agent ascertained through discreet inquiries that no one at Painter, Virginia is the owner of a Lincoln automobile and from general inquiry no one has seen a Lincoln bearing New Jersey license in that vicinity.

Investigation conducted at Eastville and Cape Charles, Va., both small towns near Painter, Va., failed to elicit any information of value.

Investigation at Wilkins Beach, approximately two miles from Eastville and about 11 miles from Cape Charles, Va. disclosed that the only house on the beach is a large house having 30 rooms and at present is operated as a bathing house and local dance hall by John Silzy of Eastville, Virginia and is owned, according to the U. S. Marshal of Eastville, Va. by the brother-in-law of Virginia State Policeman Giles C. Upshur.

Agent, accompanied by Upshur of the Virginia State Police proceeded to the rooming house at Wilkins Beach and exhibited photographs of several well known gangsters to Mr. Silzy, Mrs. Silzy and a colored man who works at the place. None of them, however, could furnish any information of importance to this investigation. The Silzys stated that many people "dropped in for a swim" and that several weeks ago a party was there in a new Lincoln Sedan of tan color but none of them resembled the photographs exhibited.

**Although a Woman Is Arrested
With Him, She Not His
Red-Haired Companion
in Robberies.**

While searching for "Blackie" Doyle, bank robber, detectives yesterday afternoon stumbled upon the solution for the series of grocery robberies in which a red-haired woman has played a prominent role in Kansas City the last month.

The red-haired woman, identified as Gladys Smith, was not captured. Neither was the elusive Doyle. Instead Robert K. Cole and Tom Clarkin, city detectives, arrested a man who said he was William Newman and a woman companion. Newman confessed to six grocery holdups, implicating Gladys Smith and another man.

Earlier in the afternoon the officers, accompanied by two federal agents, went to the 3600 block on East Twelfth street, where they were informed Doyle was in hiding. A thorough search of an apartment building gave only one unusual detail—in an apartment rented to a Mr. and Mrs. William Barr, freshly laundered shirts bore the name "Cole."

SAYS NEWMAN FITS DESCRIPTION.

Clarkin remained in the neighborhood, awaiting the couple's return. He said he recognized Newman immediately as the man described by his victims as the leader of the grocery robbing band. When Clarkin was rejoined by Cole, the two found two revolvers and a 12-gauge double-barreled shotgun mounted on a pistol frame in a zipper bag in the apartment.

Newman withheld his identity for an hour and a half. He then admitted he had served a term in the California penitentiary for burglary, that he had lived in Kansas City the last year, and that he had committed six holdups.

Gladys Smith, he said in a signed

statement, had been his accomplice, along with her man companion, who usually drove the bandit car. She left early this week for Western Texas.

statement, had been his accomplice, along with her man companion, who usually drove the bandit car. She left early this week for Western Texas, Newman said. He asserted the woman arrested with him had taken no part in the robberies.

Shortly before his incarceration in San Quentin, he met Gladys Smith in Los Angeles, Newman said. He saw her upon his arrival in Kansas City and she joined him in banditry.

WOMAN IN FIVE HOLDUPS.

Newman admitted these robberies, asserting Gladys Smith was an accomplice in all except the last one:

- August 13—Jewel Tea Company, 3105 Euclid, \$784.84.
- August 17—Dee's Wash Shop, 3711 Summit, \$150.
- August 19—Piggy-Wiggy grocery, 3704 East Twenty-seventh; more than \$50.
- August 20—Pierson grocery, 3305 Summit, \$75.
- August 27—Weneck grocery, 2701 Holmes, \$50.
- September 5—Santa Fe market, 2845 Indiana, \$44.

Newman is 31 years old. He has been unemployed, he said, since he was released from prison. He said he was a user of narcotics, of which a quantity was found in his apartment. The woman arrested, neighbors told the officers, had been drinking heavily since she rented the apartment a week ago. She refused to give her name to police. Both she and Newman were booked for investigation.

Detectives said the information that Doyle was in Kansas City and probably could be found in the neighborhood where Newman was arrested came from Charles L. (Bad Eye) Arbogast, captured following the Blythesdale robbery. Beside Doyle, authorities are seeking John Langan for the robbery.



SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Continued investigation through Boston Police Dept. fails to disclose the party who contacted Subject Callahan. Francis L. Sweeney states he had no knowledge of teletypes received by the Boston Police and the subject matter of this investigation. Subpoena issued for production Western Union records covering \$200 money order.

REFERENCE:

Report of Special Agent H. B. Fletcher, Boston, Mass., dated September 3, 1935

DETAILS:

AT BOSTON, MASSACHUSETTS

Agent contacted Police Commissioner E. M. McSweeney, Boston Police Department, 154 Berkeley Street, for the purpose of continuing the discreet investigation, tracing the teletype messages set out in reference report. Agent explained to the Commissioner the purpose of his visit, explaining that the Bureau was interested in determining the identity of the party named as "Fred" in State Teletype #93 dated July 13, 1935. Mr. McSweeney stated that Agent could make use of all the resources of the Boston Police Department and could conduct such investigation as he deemed appropriate. Commissioner McSweeney introduced Agent to Superintendent Martin F. King of the Boston Police Department and stated that Mr. King would be available to Agent for the purpose of aiding him in his investigation. Agent then presented the matter under investigation showing Superintendent King

the copies of the teletypes as formerly secured by Agent through the cooperation of the Detective Bureau, Boston Police Department.

Superintendent King stated that, in view of the information furnished by Agent, he believed the proper place to begin the investigation was in the Detective Bureau and for that purpose, called Captain Stephen Flaherty in the absence of Deputy Superintendent James R. Claflin.

Captain Flaherty stated that, in view of the nature of the teletypes, he did not believe that the Detective Bureau had any knowledge of the same, but that he would be glad to help Agent so far as possible. Captain Flaherty advised that he had known Subject Callahan ever since boyhood and had gone to school with him and that, knowing Callahan as he did, he would say that it would be impossible to secure any information by contacting Callahan. Captain Flaherty stated that he had on previous occasions attempted to get information from Subject Callahan in matters in which he was interested but, despite his acquaintanceship with Subject Callahan, he has been unable to secure any such information. He added further that Subject Callahan was a well known criminal attorney in the city of Boston and that it was a known fact that Callahan often appeared for the purpose of aiding his clients as soon as they were arrested. Agent took this to be an expression of opinion by Captain Flaherty that Callahan had unknown sources of information as to the activities of the law enforcement officials.

Agent attempted on September 4th to contact Deputy Superintendent James R. Claflin, head of the Detective Bureau, Boston Police Department, and was advised that Mr. Claflin would not be available until near the end of the week or the first of the following week. In view of the nature of the investigation being conducted, Agent did not believe it advisable to proceed without contacting Deputy Superintendent Claflin. Consequently, no further investigation was conducted relative to the Boston Police Department until September 9, 1935 when Deputy Commissioner Claflin returned to his office.

Deputy Commissioner Claflin stated, after the matter had been presented to him that he did not believe that the Detective Bureau had any knowledge of the teletypes in question and that he does not recall ever having seen or heard of these teletypes and that the nature of the teletypes lead him to believe that the Bureau of Records and the Bureau of Operations would be the only places where Agent might secure the information he desired. For the purpose of aiding the Agent, he called Lt. James T. Sheehan, who is in charge of the Bureau of Records, and discussed the teletypes in question with Lt. Sheehan in the presence of Agent.

Lieutenant Sheehan stated that he was not entirely conversant with the matter but that he had been approached by this Agent during the tracing of the teletypes, as set out in the reference report, and that he believed at that time, Agent had secured all the information that was possible at the Bureau of Records.

Deputy Superintendent Claflin suggested that Agent return to the Bureau of Operations and determine who sent the reply to State Teletype #93 which reply was indicated to be Boston #95 dated July 13, 1935, as set out in the reference report.

At the Bureau of Operations, the full cooperation of the personnel was secured; a re-check of the teletypes was made, together with a re-check of the journal, and no information was obtained other than that already in possession of Agent. An effort was then made to find the original copy of the teletype as sent to the Bureau of Operations for transmittal to the Northampton Police. It was found that no original copy of the teletype was in the possession of the Bureau of Operations.

It was ascertained that teletype bearing Boston #95 was transmitted by Operator Ely, who was contacted by telephone by one of the officers present, and he advised that he recalled State Teletype #93 and Boston Teletype #95. He stated that upon receipt of State Teletype #93, he had personally taken it down to the Bureau of Records and consulted Berkebile, who was the only officer on duty in the Bureau of Records at that time. Berkebile was very busy fingerprinting and taking pictures of a number of police characters and requested Ely to try to get more information. In response to this oral request, Ely transmitted teletype bearing Boston #95.

In view of the fact that Berkebile was apparently the only official on duty at the Bureau of Records at the time State Teletype #93 was received, Agent contacted Lieutenant Sheehan, who advised that Berkebile was one of his most trusted officers and that information in his possession would not be transmitted to outside sources.

Francis L. Sweeney, 191 Poplar St., Roslindale, Mass. stated that he is a police officer, being one of four officers on the Narcotic Squad of the Detective Bureau, Boston Police Department, and that his hours on duty are from five P. M. until midnight. He stated that he knew Herbert F. Callahan as an attorney who had a great deal of criminal work and that he had come in contact with Callahan as a result of having cases in which Callahan represented parties in whose arrest Sweeney had been interested.

Agent exhibited copies of teletypes in question to Mr. Sweeney and he stated that he had never seen them before and only faintly recalled the newspaper items relative to the arrest of William E. Meade at Northampton. He advised that he was not acquainted with any underworld character using the name "Frank Sweeney" and could not tell Agent to whom Callahan had referred in his statement. Mr. Sweeney apparently had not noticed the similarity between his name and that of "Frank Sweeney", but finally volunteered that he realized that his name and description

was similar to that of the Frank Sweeney referred to by Attorney Callahan. He stated that he hoped Agent did not believe that he was the Frank Sweeney referred to by Attorney Callahan. Agent indicated that he attached some importance to the similarity of names and Mr. Sweeney assured Agent that he had not contacted Callahan in this matter and that his acquaintanceship with Callahan was not of such character as to permit even a passing "hello". He said that he doubted that Callahan even knew he existed and that when passed on the street by Callahan, the latter makes no sign of recognition. He assured Agent that he had not contacted Callahan relative to this matter and knew nothing about it. Mr. Sweeney appeared to be very sincere in his statements and somewhat worried over the similarity in names in view of the investigation being conducted by Agent.

At the General Offices, Western Union Telegraph Company, 218 Congress St., Boston, Agent was advised that it would be impossible for the company to furnish any information relative to the money order telegram sent from Boston to Northampton forwarding \$200 as bail for the party known as Charles E. Carter, and that the same could only be obtained upon the issuance of a subpoena. Mr. C. A. Crane, Superintendent, was designated to Agent as the proper party to subpoena to secure this information.

Agent consulted United States Attorney Francis J. W. Ford, and requested that a subpoena be issued requiring the production of the Western Union records, as set out above. Mr. Ford granted Agent's request and the subpoena is being issued returnable at 10 A. M. the 16th of September, 1935.

Agent also related the facts of this investigation to Mr. Ford, requesting an opinion as to possible prosecution. Attorney Ford stated that he did not believe the facts determined to date would authorize any prosecution on any charge of which he had knowledge. He suggested that a subpoena be issued for Herbert F. Callahan to appear before the Grand Jury in an effort to secure more information from him. Mr. Ford agreed with Agent that perhaps it would be better to delay issuance of a subpoena on Subject Callahan pending the completion of the contemplated investigation.

Lester Standley, 30 Federal St., Boston, Mass., was contacted by Agent for the purpose of determining the long distance phone calls made to and from Subject Callahan's known phone numbers on July 13 and 14, 1935. Mr. Standley is a Special Agent employee of the New England Telephone & Telegraph Company. He stated that he would procure this information for Agent as soon as possible.

Received your letter Saturday night, was glad to hear from you so you are putting up Tomatoes now, thats a lot of work but they come in handy later on. they put up lots of them in here as they have about three farms out side and plenty of men to work on them so they raise lots of thing and can them for the winter. that government agent was here three days talking to me about things I dont know anything about I wish they would let me alone in here. I told him I would not go back up to St. Paul so it look like they are trying to scare me in to going back but I am not going. he seems to know all about Bensenville and just whats going on out there all the time. we sure are having fine weather down here now about the same as you have up there. I am still waiting for some thing to do here and think I am taking on a little weight, but hope to take it off when I get out in the yard. I am feeling fine and eat good. I really feel better now than I did for some time I think the rest did me good. I can go to school down here or take up most any kind of business course I want to. but I have to waite untill I am working to do so. What do you think would be the best to take up. they have all kinds of different thing I can learn but havent been out in the yard to find out. What I would like to do after I get out there will let you know what they are and see what you think about it. Where I am now I can onley teke up some kind of mail order course or some kind of school lessons they give you each day and so far I havent tryed any of them yet. I suppose Gifford likes it much better now that he is working steady. I read all about the horses every day and keep trying to pick a winner but dont have much luck doing so. Two papers I get every day have all the races in them one is the Chicago American and the other the Kansas City Times. they are both good sporting papers and I have plenty of time to look them over good. I'm glad you are not going back up there on any more cases, as you dont know those people you couldn't testify, and you have to think of yourself and when you have served your time and come back you want to live your life without fear and so do I. I hope you'll soon get work and then you will be more settled.

If they have a school there may be you could take up some study while you are there. Am glad you are getting the papers as reading them keeps you informed as to what is going on. So you follow the races. Can you pick any winners?

Your food is very good there and it's fine you get milk twice a week. The price of food has risen a 100% in the last six months here. Your dollar is worth about 50¢ now. Chud was over the other day, he says he has the place all fixed up inside and out and it looks fine. They are building at the roundhouse so there are a lot of extra men working now and that keeps business in the restaurant.

We are having nice weather now. Guess yours is about the same as here. I'll say Good-Bye for this time.

AT TORRINGTON, CONN.

Agent interviewed Mr. Andrew Oneglia, partner in the firm of Oneglia & Gervasini, road builders and contractors of Torrington, Conn. Agent exhibited a photograph of William Meade and was advised that Oneglia has never seen Meade or had business dealings with him. His partner, Romeo Gervasini, home telephone 4892, office telephone 6551, was at present out of town for several days and was expected to return in the near future. Oneglia advised that it was unlikely that his partner had any contact with Meade, but in the event anyone corresponding to Meade's description had approached Gervasini, he would notify the New York Bureau Office by telephone.

to Amelia Pasquariello and Olga Cartocci, who are the office clerks of Oneglia & Gervasini, and neither recognized said photograph, although Miss Pasquariello remembered that there was a certain P.W.A. auditor who appeared to her somewhat similar to Meade. However, upon subsequent interrogation, Miss Pasquariello doubted if he were the same individual, as the man she had observed was very short and quite stocky. He appeared in Torrington on July 31, 1935, driving a tan Buick car with New York license plates.

Agent also exhibited the photograph of Meade to Eugene Broggi, who is the field man for the firm of Oneglia & Gervasini, and who stated that he had never seen such person.

Mr. Oneglia advised agent that he had P.W.A. contracts on the Harwinton, Norfolk and Canaan highways; that his weekly payroll exceeded \$4,000; that he had perhaps the largest share of P.W.A. work in the State; and the fact that his name was checked on the "NERBA" (New England Road Builders Association) publication might have indicated that he was spotted as a party likely to have considerable cash on hand; that the nature of his contracting and construction jobs is such that it would be rather difficult for anyone to run a confidence scheme on him; that he had never been approached by anyone under any circumstances which might have appeared suspicious; but that he will be on the lookout for anyone answering the description agent gave of William Meade, and will ascertain from his fellow contractors if anyone had attempted to pull a confidence scheme on them.

Mr. F. W. Disbrow, New Milford, Conn., who is Assistant Highway Engineer, was interviewed, and the photograph of William Meade exhibited to him. Mr. Disbrow stated that he has never seen subject Meade but that he will, in his various contacts, endeavor to ascertain any information which may be of value in this investigation.

Hugh E. Meade, Chief of the Torrington Police Department, was interviewed, and upon agent's exhibiting the photograph of subject Meade, stated that he felt reasonably certain he had seen Meade some place on the street in Torrington. He gave agent a description which was approximately accurate, without any further comment from agent. He stated, however, that his memory is vague and he cannot recall where or when he saw subject, but will endeavor to refresh his memory on the matter and will advise this office in the event he obtains any information of value.

Agent searched the telephone directories of Torrington, Conn., and observed that fifteen contracting and building firms are listed there, but did not deem it advisable to contact said firms

until further information was obtained indicating Meade's presence in Torrington, Conn.

Agent attempted to verify the presence of a P.W.A. auditor in Torrington, Conn., on July 31, 1935, but two attempts to contact Mr. Hoffman, Regional Director, P.W.A., were unsuccessful.

AT HARTFORD, CONN.

Mr. Joe Harrison, Field Investigator for the Aetna Life Insurance Company, 151 Farmington Avenue, Hartford, Conn., was interviewed in connection with another matter, and advised that about eight years ago, a druggist of Holyoke, Mass., had had a car stolen and the same had been traced to Canada and to William Meade; that Joe Beauchmine, 1200 Main Street, Springfield, Mass., who handled the case for the Aetna at that time, telephoned him a few days ago, requesting the file on said old case; that Beauchmine had been advised that C. E. Carter, who was taken into custody by the Northampton, Mass., Police, was in reality the same William Meade whom they had wanted in connection with the above mentioned druggist's stolen car; that he had advised Beauchmine that the file had been destroyed on said case. Mr. Harrison stated that Beauchmine apparently did not recall the facts of said case, and doubted if an interview with him concerning said car stolen eight years ago would be of any assistance. He advised, however, that the Aetna Life Insurance Company had a system of classification of handwriting; that all applications for licenses in the State of Connecticut are searched daily; that Connecticut has a reputation for being an easy state in which to obtain licenses; and that by jerking all applications which appear in the least suspicious, they are able to apprehend on an average of one a week of characters who are wanted by police officials. Mr. Harrison offered to classify William Meade's handwriting in their permanent file and to compare same with former applications which appear suspicious, and he will advise the New York Bureau Office of any information developed. At the time of this interview, agent was not in possession of a specimen of Meade's handwriting, same being on file in the New York Office. Arrangements were made with Mr. Harrison to interview him in the near future, at which time a specimen of Meade's handwriting will be furnished him for the purpose of classification in his file.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

NEW YORK OFFICE, at Hartford, Conn., will furnish Mr. Joe Harrison, Aetna Life Insurance Company, 151 Farmington Avenue, with specimen of the handwriting of William Meade, and will re-interview him with regard to any information developed by a more thorough search of the Aetna Life Insurance Company files.

The trial of Joe Adams, in connection with the Karpis case, is scheduled for sometime this fall in the Federal court in Miami. Thought you would like to know what the advance reports are in connection with same. The talk of the whole town is that the father-in-law of Adams, Mr. Knight, who is a brother-in-law of Congressman Wilcox of Florida, has gone to Washington several times and through this connection, has fixed things up so that Adams will be acquitted. The story is that the hotel man in Havana is also to be freed and the man Randall is to take the rap; the story is also that Adams has a strong pull with Judge Ritter, because Adams and Ritter's Son have been pals for years. They have had dozens of drinking and womens parties together, before Adams married Knight's Daughter last year.

The people in Miami who know anything at all about the case, are familiar with the facts that Adams has been a front man for the Chicago gansters for several years, and has been connected with the McFarland gang. In fact McFarland has always been the real boss of Adams's race tracks in Miami. The report is now that Adams so sure of being freed that he has again taken over the active management in Miami, which belongs to McFarland and Mr. Knight.

Everybody knows that Adams harbored the Karpis crowd last winter, in his hotel, in Bradford's house and in another house in Miami. They also know that Knight and Adams exchange a good many One Thousand bills (dollars) at the dog track at the First National Bank.

I have been a resident of Miami for 26 years and I admit that I have been working for Adams at his track for 4 years and have my job again this year, he promised it to me last week. A meeting was held last night of twelve old Miami Citizens and it was decided that Miami should get rid of these gansters and that is the reason I am writing you all of these things. This same crowd killed Skeets Downs last winter and used Chicago gangster methods here, with the help of Mr. Knight, who gave them local political protection and brought them all to Miami. Please excuse this badly written letter, it is the best I can do on a typewriter, and you can understand that I can't put my life in danger in letting you know who I am, but they might find out.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Bureau is in receipt of a report of Special Agent E. B. Fletcher dated at Boston, Massachusetts September 13, 1935.

The cooperation of the Boston Police Department has been secured by the Boston Bureau Office in an effort to determine the manner in which Attorney Callahan was apprised of the fact that William Elmer Heade was in the custody of the Northampton, Massachusetts Police Department. Efforts have been made to trace the incoming and outgoing teletypes which were exchanged by the Northampton and Boston Police Departments, but no information has been forthcoming as to a possible "leak" in the Boston Police Department.

Captain Flaherty of the Boston Police Department has advised that he has known Attorney Callahan since childhood; that they attended school together; and that knowing Callahan as he did he would say that it would be impossible to secure any information through Callahan. He further stated that Callahan, being a prominent criminal attorney in Boston, Massachusetts, often appears at the Boston Police Department for the purpose of aiding his clients immediately after they have been arrested. For this reason it appears that Callahan undoubtedly has personal contacts in the Police Department through whom he is advised of all important arrests.

You will recall that Attorney Callahan informed an Agent of the Boston Office that he, Callahan, got his information to the effect that Heade alias Carter was in the custody of the Northampton Police through one Frank Sweeney. There is an officer on the Boston Police Department known as Francis L. Sweeney. This party was interviewed and advised that he is one of four officers on the Narcotic Squad who

of the Boston Police Department, and that his hours of duty are from 5:00 P.M. until midnight. He informed that he knows Herbert F. Callahan, and that he had come in contact with Callahan as a result of having cases in which Callahan represented parties who had been arrested by Sweeney. Sweeney denied any knowledge of the incoming and outgoing teletype messages that were exchanged which related to the apprehension of Neade alias Carter. He informed that he only faintly recalled having read in the newspapers news items concerning the arrest of William E. Neade at Northampton.

Sweeney's description is somewhat similar to that of Frank Sweeney who was referred to by Attorney Callahan. Agent Fletcher reports that Officer Sweeney appeared very sincere in declaring that he had had no contact with Attorney Callahan with regard to this matter, and that Sweeney appeared somewhat worried over the similarity in names in view of the fact that an investigation is being conducted by this Bureau.

The investigation is going forward in Boston, and you will be advised of later developments.

LOCAL MAN IS HELD IN WEST

**"Chas. Adams," Nabbed in
Los Angeles, Identified As
Walker C. Kimler**

Under the name of Charles Thomas Adams, Walker C. Kimler formerly of Burlington, is under arrest in Los Angeles, California, in connection with a kidnaping and extortion charge, according to a telegram received last night by Harvey C. Jaeger, superintendent of the department of public safety, and Chief of Police Fred Machholz, from the sheriff at Los Angeles.

The local police, tipped that a suspicious California car was here a couple of weeks ago, wrote California authorities the license number and asked if the men in the car were wanted. Word came back to "arrest and hold," but the car had disappeared. Yesterday morning Chief Machholz and Police Captain Gitche received a letter that the men were in custody and thanking local police for their interest in the matter.

In the meantime, local police were given information which led them to believe that "Adams", in whose name the car was licensed on the west coast, was Walker C. Kimler, former local resident, and their attention was called to the fact that the California car was here the night that the L. S. U. was robbed and possibly, the night that Lind's bakery was entered.

Following word yesterday that "Adams" and a companion were in custody in Los Angeles, Jaeger instructed the police chief to wire Los Angeles authorities to ascertain if the man was the former local resident and word came back last night that he is Kimler. The other man in custody there is Martin G. Bryant.

Jaeger announced today that he had been advised that photographs are on the way, and he dispatched an air-mail letter this morning requesting that Kimler be questioned about the local robberies.

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




SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Joe Adams, Miami, Florida, admits negotiating with Gurante in October, 1934, for operation of restaurant and bar facilities at El Commodoro Hotel, but claims Gurante failed to assume the position as agreed and did not again contact Adams.

REFERENCE:

DETAILS:

AT MIAMI, FLORIDA:

Under the pretext that Andrew Gurante was under investigation by the Bureau, and without disclosing the true purpose of the inquiry, Joe Adams was interviewed at El Commodoro Hotel, Miami, Florida, and offered the following information concerning his negotiations with Gurante:

Sometime during the latter part of September, 1934, Adams claims that Gurante called on him at the El Commodoro Hotel, stating that he had been referred to Adams by one F. K. Rickensacker who had suggested that Adams intended opening a bar in the El Commodoro Hotel and could possibly use Gurante, then unemployed. Mr. Adams stated that he had never met Gurante previously, and that during the course of their conversation Gurante claimed that he had been a resident of Jacksonville for the past ten or eleven years and that he had acted as manager for the Carling Hotel grill for a number of years prior to coming to Miami. Evidently,

Adams concluded, Gurante was possessed of a thorough knowledge of hotel, restaurant and bar operations and he agreed to employ Gurante. Under the terms of the agreement Gurante was to manage the bar and restaurant at the El Commodore from the date of the opening throughout the season, until about May 1, 1935, at a weekly salary of \$15.00, and at the end of the season, if the bar and restaurant proved a financial success, Gurante was to receive a commission of twenty percent of the profits. Adams claims that Gurante advised him that he had written to several friends for reference and that they would possibly communicate with Adams concerning their acquaintance with Gurante and his ability. Under date of October 3, 1934, Adams received a letter, the original of which he exhibited to Agent, on stationery of the Carling Hotel, Jacksonville, Florida, over the signature of Dave Myerson, managing director of the Carling, in which Myerson stated that he had known Gurante for several years; had previously employed him at the Carling and believed Gurante capable of "handling a sporting type" of clientele such as frequents Miami during the season. Mr. Adams stated that the bar was to have opened on October 1, 1934, and on that date Gurante failed to appear. However, on October 2, 1934, Adams received a letter from Gurante, postmarked at Miami on stationery of the Halcyon Hotel, in which Gurante apparently enclosed newspaper clippings concerning himself. The following day when Gurante failed to appear, Adams called the Halcyon and was informed that Gurante was not in and later that day he claims he received a telegram from Gurante sent from Miami in which Gurante stated that his brother had died suddenly at Jacksonville and that he was going there immediately, but would return. Thereafter Adams heard nothing further from him and under date of October 12, 1934, Adams wrote to Gurante, returning the newspaper clippings Gurante had furnished and informing Gurante that he was disappointed in him for his failure to keep his bargain and for not advising Adams of his intentions. Adams claims to have received no reply to that letter and saw nothing of Gurante.

Mr. Adams stated that while Gurante made a nice appearance and evidently was experienced in the restaurant business, nevertheless he considered him shiftless; willing to accept a position such as would place him more or less before the public, but obviously without assuming any responsibility; talkative and very much impressed with himself. During the course of the conversation, Adams was asked if Gurante had agreed to operate a gambling concession for Adams in connection with the restaurant and bar, and Adams denied that any such negotiations were made. He also stated that he alone negotiated with Gurante, and that his father-in-law, Bob Knight, was not a party to the agreement. Some few days after the interview with Adams, Agent had occasion to talk with Bob Knight and he was questioned concerning Gurante, but denied ever having seen him or met him. He recalled that Adams had made a deal with a man to operate the bar and restaurant, but that the deal fell through when the man failed to appear.

Effort was made to locate F. K. Rickensacker, who formerly resided at 1721 Southwest Twelfth Street, Miami, Florida. However, he has moved from that address. He left no forwarding instructions and he has not registered a local or forwarding address with the Post Office at Miami. Mr. Adams stated that he knows Rickensacker, who occasionally drops in at the El Comodoro, and in event he is able to locate him, Adams will notify the local resident agent. Mr. Adams stated that Rickensacker formerly sold postal cards and novelties, but he does not know what business he is in now.

In the event Rickensacker is located at Miami he will be interviewed concerning his knowledge of Gurante's character and reputation.

Bloom, Troop C, Pennsylvania State Police, Shamokin, R.F.D., #2, searched his records and advised that he was unable to locate any criminal record on Patrick J. Lyons. Bloom further advised that he had never heard of the name Patrick J. Lyons at Shamokin. In the absence of the Chief Burgess, Officer William Mayer, Shamokin Police Department, searched his records and advised that he was unable to locate any criminal record for Patrick J. Lyons. Mayer further advised that he was unacquainted with anyone named Patrick J. Lyons at Shamokin and that to his knowledge the 1662 Tioga Street address is presently occupied by a Polish family named Kovich who bear a good reputation.

At the Shamokin Post Office, East Sunbury Street, Assistant Postmaster Raymond E. Long, 50 N. Sixth Street, Shamokin, advised that he was not personally acquainted with Patrick J. Lyons and after a search of the files, advised there is no record of a forwarding address at the Shamokin Post Office for Lyons.

On September 21, 1935, a thirty day mail cover was placed on all mail addressed to Patrick J. Lyons and Nellie M. Lyons, 1662 Tioga Street, Shamokin, Pa.

Joseph A. Kaseman, 13 N. Grant Street, Shamokin, who is a substitute mail carrier and has been delivering mail at 1662 Tioga Street, for the past two weeks, stated he was not personally acquainted with the occupants but stated positively that he had delivered no mail addressed to Patrick J. Lyons nor had he observed any stranger around the premises. From his limited recollection of the occupants, he advised that they are law abiding and suggested that contact be made with the regular mail carrier, one Tyson.

Timothy T. Tyson, 601 Kase Street, Shamokin, advised that he has been the regular mail carrier covering 1662 Tioga Street for the past two and one-half years; that he is not personally acquainted with Nellie M. Lyons; that the other occupants of the instant address are Mr. and Mrs. T. Novich (Novack), Stanley N. (a son of Mr. and Mrs. T. Novich), Nellie M. Lyons, and Arlene Lyons, daughter of Nellie Lyons. Tyson stated that he has not noted the presence of any stranger at this address and further advised that he considers the Novick family to be of good reputation and law-abiding. Tyson further stated that one Schaffner formerly delivered mail at this address.

Richard Schaffner, 917 Walnut Street, Shamokin, stated that he has delivered mail at this address for about eighteen years, with the exception of the last two and one-half years. He recalls having seen Patrick J. Lyons at 1662 Tioga Street some twelve or fifteen years ago but was unable to furnish any description of him. He stated he would be unable to identify him at the present time. Schaffner stated he has been well acquainted with the entire Novich family and considers them law-abiding; that he does not recall delivering any mail at this address, addressed to Patrick J. Lyons;

that all mail was addressed to Nellie M. Lyons. Schaffner is of the opinion that Patrick J. Lyons has not been at this address or in the vicinity for the past twelve years. He advised also that Lyons was probably not married to Nellie Lyons in Shamokin, Pa., stating that he customarily received invitations to all weddings in families living on his route but he had not received any invitation to the Lyons wedding. Schaffner further stated that to his knowledge Lyons had no criminal reputation; also that the immediate neighborhood is composed of Polish families who are suspicious of all strangers, suspecting them to be Agents of the Alcoholic Tax Unit, inasmuch as there is considerable alcoholic activity among them. He recommends, however, that one Irene Burke, 1636 Tioga Street, an employee of the Federal Relief Administration at Shamokin, as being a reliable individual.

It was ascertained by telephonic communication with the Burke residence that Irene Burke was absent from Shamokin and would not return home for several days. In her absence, her sister, Regina Burke, a school teacher in the Coal Township Grade School, Shamokin, Pa., was personally contacted. She advised that she is well acquainted with Nellie M. Lyons and other members of the Novich family; that Nellie Novich and Patrick J. Lyons were married about seventeen years ago; that they have one daughter, Arlene Lyons, who is presently fourteen years of age; that Patrick Lyons lived with the Novich family at 1662 Tioga Street for approximately two years; that about twelve years ago he separated from Nellie Novich owing to some drunken brawl; that during the period of his residence in Shamokin he was employed by the Sharp Ice Cream Company as a driver; that he was not intimately acquainted with any men in the community; that he bears a reasonably good reputation although a heavy drinker, which fact probably caused the separation mentioned above; that she heard it rumored that Lyons had been arrested in front of the Reading Railroad Station, Shamokin, about twelve years ago on some minor charge, probably drunkenness, and indecent exposure; that about five years ago, Patrick J. Lyons returned to the Tioga Street address in company with an unknown stranger in order to secure his discharge papers then in the possession of his wife, Nellie, which papers were necessary in connection with his application for his veteran's adjusted compensation; that his wife refused to turn these papers over to Novich; that during his entire stay, which was for about five days, he did not gain entrance to the Tioga Street address. She recollected also that Lyons departed from Shamokin riding a freight train and she is positive he has never since that date returned to Shamokin; that the estrangement between Patrick and his wife, Nellie, is genuine; that it is highly improbable Nellie

knows of the present whereabouts of Lyons for the reason she recalls Nellie was unable to locate Lyons about two years ago in order to forward to him a telegram advising of his father's death. According to Miss Burke, Nellie bears an excellent reputation in the community but she is presently, and has for the past eight years, been mentally incapacitated and seldom leaves the premises; that she has no male acquaintances; also, that there have been no strangers staying at 1662 Tioga Street, and that the Novich family is law-abiding. Miss Burke is positive there is considerable ill feeling between the Novich family and Patrick Lyons.

Some of the above facts were discreetly obtained by Regina Burke from her cousin Mary Omlar, 1640 Tioga Street, who is also well acquainted with the Novich family.

George F. Zimmerman, 400 E. Independent Street, constable of Coal Township, recollected that approximately five years ago, Patrick J. Lyons requested him, Zimmerman, to secure a certain discharge paper then in the possession of Nellie Lyons; that in accordance with this request, he went to the home of Nellie Lyons and after threatening to arrest her, she voluntarily turned over said discharge papers; that he recollects that with the assistance of J. H. Lawrence, vice-commander of the local Legion Post, Patrick Lyons made application for adjusted compensation. Zimmerman verified the information given above by Regina Burke with reference to payment of a portion of the proceeds of this check over to Nellie Lyons. He also verified the fact that Lyons both arrived at Shamokin and departed therefrom riding a freight train and had the appearance of being a hobo, as did his unknown companion. Other than the incident mentioned above, Zimmerman states the Novich family and Nellie Lyons enjoy a good reputation in the community. Zimmerman also recollected Lyons mentioned having been in some Veterans' Hospital prior to his return to Shamokin, which hospital is located in some Western State.

J. H. Lawrence, 803 E. Clay Street, vice-commander of the American Legion, Abraham Lincoln Memorial Post, Shamokin, and teller at the Guarantee Savings Bank and Trust Company, Shamokin, stated he is well acquainted with all past and present members of the local Legion Post; that he does not recollect Lyons was ever affiliated with the local Post but faintly recalls that about five years ago, an individual named Lyons requested assistance in filling out application blanks for bonus payments; that he also assisted Lyons to cash a Government check for his bonus at the above named bank. Lyons, however, was unacquainted with

the personal history of Lyons or the Kovich family.

William Bowman, Service Officer, Abraham Lincoln Memorial Post, Shamokin, searched the files in his office and advised that he could not locate any record of Patrick J. Lyons. He also informed that he was well acquainted with all past and present members of the local Post but was unable to recollect the case of Lyons. Bowman, at the request of Agents, also conducted a discreet inquiry among the various police members of the Post but was unable to develop any information concerning Lyons. He advised that C. C. Carle, an ex-officer of the Red Cross might have assisted Lyons in making application for bonus payments.

C. C. Carle, 432 W. Arch Street, presently employed as a Professor by the Shamokin Board of Education, stated he recollected the case of Lyons but was unable to furnish any information in addition to that set out above with reference to the bonus transaction. He stated that all local records of the Red Cross have been destroyed. Carle also stated that he has been employed by the Tharp Ice Cream Company for the past twelve years except for the last year; that he personally paid all employees of this ice cream company and, to the best of his knowledge, Lyons had not been an employee of this company.

Chester Tharp, 49 E. Independent Street, President of Tharp Ice Cream Company, searched his records but was unable to locate any employment record of Patrick J. Lyons. Tharp also called in several old employees, none of whom were able to recollect Lyons. Tharp advised, however, that the payroll records prior to the year 1923 have been destroyed.

On September 21, 1935, Agents arranged with Herbert Maurer, 76 N. Shamokin Street, a special delivery messenger employed by the United States Post Office Department, to deliver a special delivery registered letter, addressed to Patrick J. Lyons, 1662 Tioga Street, Shamokin, bearing a return address of F. G., 1416 Dearborn Street, Chicago, Illinois. In addition to this address, the letter bore the notation: "Deliver to Addressee Only".

In pursuance of this plan, Maurer attempted to make delivery of the letter on September 21, but was informed by Mrs. T. Kovich that the addressee did not reside at this address; that his present whereabouts were unknown to her; that Nellie M. Lyons, wife of the addressee, was temporarily absent but it was doubtful that if she were present she would have the address of Lyons. Mrs. Kovich, according to Maurer, displayed considerable interest in the letter, asking about the return address, which was given her. She still replied that she did not know the present address of Lyons. Maurer gave Mrs. Kovich the customary notice to call at the Post Office in the event the address of the addressee was obtained. No response has been made to

this notice. Maurer also attempted a second delivery on September 21, but obtained no additional information. Mrs. Novich again advised that she had no further information as to the present whereabouts of Lyons.

On September 23, 1935, Special Agent C. E. Pelletier, Philadelphia, represented himself to Mrs. T. Novich and her son, Stanley Novich, 1668 Tioga Street, as being from the Veterans' Bureau, for the purpose of obtaining more complete personal history of Veteran Lyons, suggesting that there would possibly be some cash payments to be made in the future. Mrs. Novich immediately advised that her daughter, Nellie, is the wife of Patrick J. Lyons but that it would be inadvisable to interview her on account of her mental state. Mrs. Novich advised that Lyons had separated from his wife, Nellie, about twelve years ago; that he has never contributed to the support of his wife or daughter, Arlene, 14, who is in her second year at high school; that Lyons has not been around Shamokin, Pa., for the past five years, having returned at that time in connection with certain bonus payments; that about two years ago, Nellie received a telegram advising of the death of Lyons' father but at this time she was unable to locate him. She stated also that on September 21, she received a special delivery letter and had to inform the Post Office messenger she did not know the present address of Patrick Lyons. (This is the special delivery letter mentioned above). Mrs. Novich advised also that Nellie and Patrick Lyons were married at Fort Hamilton, New York, and Lyons had been stationed as a soldier in the United States Army at Fort Hamilton, N.Y. On several occasions during this interview, Agent Pelletier noticed that Nellie Lyons was endeavoring to over-hear the conversation and that her antics appeared to be very queer. Mrs. Novich also complained that her daughter, Nellie, is unemployed and had refused to associate with anyone other than the immediate members of her family since her separation from Lyons. In response to further questions, Mrs. Novich stated that Dr. Peril was the last physician to treat Nellie for her mental condition.

Dr. Hyman H. Peril, 3 E. Sunbury Avenue, searched the files in his office and informed that he has no record of treating Nellie Lyons, under that name or under the name of Kovich and stated he had been employed in a medical capacity by the Poor Board of Shamokin and, in that capacity, examined numerous mental cases of which he kept no record. He faintly recollected that he treated Nellie Lyons but was unable to furnish any specific information or diagnosis of her present mental condition.

The following description of Patrick J. Lyons was furnished
by George F. Zimmerman, Constable.

By teletype dated September 23, 1935, the Philadelphia Office advised the Washington Field Office that Patrick J. Lyons was probably a World War veteran and had probably been stationed at Fort Hamilton, New York. This teletype was furnished the Washington Field Office with a resume of the facts upon which the instant investigation was predicated and requesting the War Department and the Veterans' Administration be immediately contacted to secure the last known address of Patrick J. Lyons.



A check was made of all the Lyonses in the same City Directory to determine if there was one with such a name residing on Oliver Avenue. The following was found: "Kath. Lyons (Widow Dennis) residence 1032 Oliver Avenue."

The following investigation was made by Special Agent Bliss Morton:

Agent contacted Captain of Detectives Herman Rademacher and Desk Sergeant Griffin with reference to Patrick J. Lyons. Neither had any record of him, nor could they remember such a person. Sergeant Griffin stated that he knew of Lyons families in west Indianapolis, but none of them had been in worse difficulties than drunkenness. He found the name of Dennis Lyons on McKim Avenue.

Agent then called at 1032 Oliver Avenue, and the young woman with whom Agent talked stated she was Mrs. Dowdell. Agent asked for Pat Lyons, and she said he had not been around for years. She stated that she is Pat's cousin, and that Pat's mother lives with her, but the latter is old and feeble, and not in good health. Agent did not interview Mrs. Lyons. She stated she did not know where Pat is at present. She understood he was in Indianapolis a short time last winter, but did not know where he stayed. She believed one of his brothers, probably Dennis, saw him on the street or he visited Dennis. She

states he is a World War veteran, draws a pension, and has been in Government hospitals. She believes he was once in the Veterans Hospital at Danville, Illinois, about two years ago, but is not sure of the fact that it was at Danville. She is quite certain he has been in a Government hospital at Sawtelle, California. She also believes he was on the police force at Indianapolis some twelve or fourteen years ago. She states that he is married to a girl named Nellie Novack of Shamokin, Pennsylvania. She does not know Nellie's address in Shamokin, but states there is a daughter, now about twelve years old, named Arlene. Pat has deserted his wife. She believes his brother, Dennis, is presently in jail for being drunk, at Indianapolis; that Dennis would be most likely of his relatives to know his whereabouts; that he has another brother, Thomas, living in the neighborhood of 209 S. McKim Street; another brother, Mike, address unknown; and a sister, Mrs. Helen Froelich, 3211 E. Michigan, who might give information.

Agent called at 3211 E. Michigan Street, and interviewed Mr. and Mrs. Froelich on the pretext Agent was interested in the veteran's pension. They have not been in close touch with him for many years, but Mrs. Froelich was of the impression he was at the hospital at Sawtelle, California. She stated if Agent would phone her about Tuesday, she might possibly be able to furnish Pat's address. Agent presumes she hopes to obtain it from Dennis, in jail. She has no phone at home, but can be reached through a neighbor's phone, Cherry 0954.

The following investigation was made by Special Agent in Charge H. H. Reinecke:

At the time reference teletype was received from the Portland Office, no Agent was anywhere near the vicinity of Newburgh, Indiana, which is a town of between 1200 and 1400 population. A check was made of the 1934 Medical Directory which showed the following: "Isaac C. Hollinger, Boonville, Indiana, deceased. Death reported June 22, 1934."

Agent immediately communicated by long distance telephone with Mr. Henry H. Powell, the Postmaster at Newburgh, Indiana. He stated that Dr. I. C. Hollinger had operated a sanitarium about two miles out of Newburgh many years ago, but that Dr. Hollinger six or eight years ago had closed up this sanitarium and moved to Boonville, Indiana. Mr. Powell further stated that the sanitarium when it was near Newburgh was an old stone residence which has since been made over into a fine residence and is now occupied by respected citizens.

Mr. Powell stated that so far as he knew the reputation of Dr. Hollinger while in the vicinity of Newburgh was excellent.

Agent inquired of Mr. Powell with reference to an old Army Fort about ten miles out of Evansville, and near the city of Newburgh. He said that the only place which might answer such a description was a hill near Cypress Beach, Indiana, which is about two miles from Newburgh, the latter city being about ten miles from Evansville, Indiana. The Postmaster stated that it is reported that there was an old frontier fort on this hill many years ago, but there are now no buildings or any indications that there was such a fort. Mr. Powell stated that he is an elderly man but the fort was never located there during his life time.

A long distance telephone call was immediately had with Postmaster Edward R. Siegel, Boonville, Indiana. He stated that Dr. I. C. Hollinger moved to Boonville about six or eight years ago from Newburgh, Indiana. He opened a sanitarium in his residence. He stated that Dr. Hollinger died at Boonville about two years ago and the family has moved away. The residence which was used as a sanitarium has now again been turned into a residence and is occupied by respectable citizens.

According to Postmaster Siegel, Dr. Hollinger bore a good reputation in Boonville.

A summary of the above information was forwarded by teletype shortly after midnight of September 20, 1935, to the Bureau and the Portland, Cincinnati, Chicago, and Philadelphia offices. It was suggested that the Portland Office endeavor to secure more recent details relative to Lyons from the Veterans Hospital at Sawtelle, California.

In view of the facts developed as a result of the above inquiry no further investigation is deemed necessary at this point at this time.

Two copies of this report are being forwarded to interested offices so that one copy may be placed in the Bremer kidnaping file and the other in the Weyerhaeuser kidnaping file. The Indianapolis Office is so filing copies of this report.

Information has also come into the possession of the Bureau that while Karpis and Campbell were being quartered at a place owned and operated by Edith Barry in Toledo, Ohio, their seals were brought to them by one Green, a taxi driver who is the husband of one Annie Smith, the latter being a check room girl at the Casino Club.

The Chicago Office has developed a confidential informant.

The register reflected that Mrs. J. W. Osborne registered at 10:00 P.M. on 1-10-35 from Toledo, Ohio and was assigned to Room 714, at a rate of \$2.00 per day. The records further reflect that on 1-11-35 Mrs. Osborne placed a long distance telephone call to Frank West, phone number Adams 2161, Columbus, Ohio, but was unable to get Frank West and talked to a Mrs. Cline. The amount of this call being \$1.70 plus 10% service charge, total \$1.87. It should be noted that Mr. Frank West is in charge of the Bureau of Motor Vehicles for the State of Ohio at Columbus, and is known to Agents of this Office. The records further reflect that Mrs. Osborne placed another long distance telephone call to the Clerk of the Lucas County Court at Toledo, Ohio, phone number Main 5257, amount of call \$1.55 plus 10% service charge, total \$1.70. The Hotel records show no other calls being placed by Mrs. Osborne while registered there.

The records further reflect that Mrs. Osborne checked out of the Dennison Hotel on 1-12-35 but does not show the time of her departure from the hotel.

Agent showed pictures of various individuals contained in this file to the Lyon brothers but they were unable to identify any of the individuals as having ever stopped at the Dennison Hotel. They were also shown the pictures of Myrtle Eaton and William Weaver but were unable to identify Myrtle Eaton as being the Mrs. Osborne who was registered there on 1-10-35.

AT TROTWOOD, OHIO.

Agent contacted Mr. R. M. Swank, Postmaster, Trotwood, Ohio. Postmaster Swank stated that he had been Postmaster at Trotwood, Ohio for the past 27 years; that he has known Mrs. Mamie M. Vaniman for the past 35 years; that she was married to Charles C. Vaniman and they had two grown children; that the Vanimans were highly respected citizens in that community and that Mr. Vaniman was the Ford Agent at Trotwood and had been, since 1914.

Agent contacted Mr. Charles C. Vaniman at the Ford Agency in Trotwood, Ohio. Mr. Vaniman stated that he bought two lots in October, 1925, numbers 12 and 13, in the Harbor Oaks Addition which is located between the Dixie and Indian Rivers near Daytona Beach, Florida; that at the time he bought these lots real estate was cheap in Florida and he bought them as an investment and placed them in his wife's name on the tax roll in Florida. Mr. Vaniman stated that he had had several inquiries from different individuals who wanted to buy these lots but as he had not been offered a fair profit he had never considered selling them. Mr. Vaniman further stated that on 7-12-35 he received a letter from J. W. Osborne, Post Office Box 321, Port Orange, Florida, which reads as follows:

Port Orange, Fla.
July 12 - 35

Mr. Chas. Vaniman
Trotwood, Ohio.

I'm writing you in regards to the two lots 12-13 which you own in Harbor
Oaks, Fla. If you are interested in selling write me.

Of course you know that the "boom" is over and Fla. Real Estate is not what
it use to be.

If your price is low enough I will buy, so quote me your lowest figure.

Mr. Vaniman stated that he had no use for this letter
and turned it over to this Agent. This letter is being forwarded to the
Chicago Office with copies of this report. Mr. Vaniman further advised that
he had received a letter about the first of the year from some individual
in Pennsylvania, making inquiry of these two lots but he couldn't remember
the name of the party and was unable to locate this letter.

Mr. Vaniman stated that this was the only communication
he had from J. W. Osborne and that he couldn't remember answering this
letter. He was unable to find a copy of same, and he did not know J. W.
Osborne. He was unable to identify the pictures of William Weaver or Myrtle
Eaton.

Mr. Keith telephoned me from New York City and reported that he had been checking the information submitted by Scaffa. His preliminary survey of the town of Coscob, Connecticut, where Karpis and three companions were reported to be living, revealed that it is a very small place between Greenwich and Stamford, Connecticut. Mr. Keith made a contact with the postmaster at Coscob whose family has lived there for several generations and Mr. Keith learned without open investigation that all the strangers and rented cottages in the town proper could be eliminated from suspicion. However, several rural routes presented possibilities, Mr. Keith stated, particularly along the Mianus river. Mr. Keith had again contacted Scaffa and the latter is attempting to get in touch with the informant again and feels certain he will reach him by Monday, September 23.

The tip regarding the "Black and Tan" joint which Karpis and his friends were supposed to frequent seemed without foundation as Mr. Keith stated that there were no such places nearby, the nearest approach to such a place being Layton's Halfway House which employs colored waiters, but at which place there is no co-mingling of white and colored guests. Mr. Keith expressed the opinion that the information furnished is either false or is something that might have occurred months ago. It is Mr. Keith's plan when he meets the informant to take the informant up to Coscob in a private car and have the informant point out the places referred to.

In connection with this case, Mr. Keith inquired whether the names, James Wisbrod and James Fisher figured in the case in any way. Two parties by these names had been located at 98 River Road in Coscob and while Mr. Keith knew that neither one was Karpis or Campbell, he thought they might possibly have some connection. I stated that I was not familiar with those names and Mr. Tamm, whom I called, also was not familiar with the names, but I informed Mr. Keith that the files would be checked.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Dr. Charles Fishburne, Darien, Georgia, stated that neither of the two individuals resembled the photographs of Karpis and Campbell. A. S. Poppell, Sheriff of McIntosh County, Darien, Georgia, stated that the younger man resembled Karpis but neither of the two resembled Campbell. Fred Stebbins, Darien, Georgia, refused to commit himself in respect to identification.

REFERENCE: Letter from Jacksonville Office, August 27, 1935.

DETAILS:

This investigation is predicated upon information received by the Jacksonville Office from the Chief of Police, Jacksonville, Florida, who advised that on August 12, 1935, he had received a Western Union telegram from Darien, Georgia, quoted as follows: "Gray LaSalle Coupe just left this place two men both brace revolvers". Signed: "Citizens"; that the telegram was followed by an anonymous letter dated August 20, 1935, from the author of the telegram which contained a description of the two men mentioned in the telegram and also a statement by the writer to the effect that he had seen the picture of one of the men in the newspapers. The writer further requested that he be supplied with a picture of Karpis in order that he might effect a possible identification.

AT DARIEN, GEORGIA.

Dr. Charles Fishburne advised that he was the author of the anonymous letter and telegram and further stated that on August 12, 1935, two men had driven up to the Stebbins Drug Company in a 1935 model LaSalle Coupe, gray in color, and with New Hampshire tags; that they had gotten out of the car, had entered the drug store where they asked for a drink of water and also purchased some cigars. Fishburns stated that he had paid particular attention to the heavier of the two men because of his robust build which contrasted so strangely with the pallor of his complexion, that he noticed that both these individuals were armed with two guns and had the appearance of being thugs. He also stated that he was quite sure that he had seen the heavier and older of the two men pictured in the newspapers and that he had the happy faculty of never forgetting a face once he had seen it. Agent exhibited to Dr. Fishburns photographs of Karpis and Campbell and he immediately declared that the photographs were not likenesses of either of the individuals in question.

The following descriptions of the two men were furnished by Dr. Fishburns:

Dr. Fishburns further stated that Fred Stebbins, Stebbins Drug Company and A. S. Poppell, Sheriff of McIntosh County, were in the drug store at the time of the two mens appearance.

Dr. Fishburne stated that Sheriff Poppell, although a fine man, is rather a poor Police officer in his opinion in that he did not make any attempt to notify the Police of the presence of these two men and that he, Dr. Fishburne, felt it his duty as a good citizen to take proper action. Agent advised Dr. Fishburne that in the event similar circumstances occurred he should notify Chief J. E. Register of the Brunswick Police Department who is known to be a capable and efficient Police official. Dr. Fishburne also stated that he had made no notation of the license number of the car and also that he had no idea where the car had come from save it had come from a Northerly direction. He further stated that it continued on its way toward Brunswick.

A. S. Poppell, Sheriff of McIntosh County, stated that he reputed the appearance of the two men who appeared at the drug store and verified Dr. Fishburne's statement in respect to the presence of weapons upon the persons. He further stated that the poorer of the two men had indicated that they had come from up North and had made one hundred twenty miles per hour on the road. Agent exhibited to Sheriff Poppell the photographs of Karpis and Campbell and he stated that in his opinion the younger of the two men resembled Karpis but that neither of the two individuals resembled Campbell. At this point it is deemed pertinent to state that in Agent's opinion Dr. Fishburne is a very intelligent individual and preference should be given to his statements rather than to those of Sheriff Poppell.

Fred Stebbins, Clerk in Stebbins Drug Company, stated that he had not observed the two men very closely and did not care to venture an opinion as to their possible identification as Karpis or as Campbell.

Sheriff R. Jack Allen and Captain William Miller, Casper Police Department, were both absent from Casper on the date Agent was in that vicinity.

Deputy Sheriff Robert Owens advised that he had no new information concerning Karpis and Campbell and that apparently the information secured by the writer from him which is set out in reference report of the writer was false.

George Stine, Special Agent of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad, was also out of town on the date the writer was in Casper and he will be interviewed at a later date concerning his conversation with Mat Goad.

AT MIDWEST, WYO.

Agent in company with Deputy Sheriff John Buckmaster interviewed A. W. Westbrook, Sinclair Producing and Refining Company, Station No. 15, and he stated that he was the party who circulated the rumor that Karpis and Campbell accompanied by "Red" Fonda were at Midwest in late May or early June, 1935. Westbrook is personally acquainted with Campbell, according to the information previously secured by the writer before in an interview with him.

Westbrook's description of Campbell was accurate, but he supplied the following of Karpis: age, 25-28; height, about 5'9"; weight about 170-180; build, heavy set; eyes dark; hair dark; complexion, swarthy; dressed in brown suit, large light grey Stetson hat, and cowboy boots.

Westbrook also stated that John Hamilton accompanied Fonda, Karpis and Campbell on that date and that the Bureau was mistaken in their identity of Hamilton when the press issued a statement that he had been found dead.

It seems apparent that Westbrook has fabricated this story and it appeared to the writer that Westbrook was somewhat of a "magazine detective".

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE DENVER OFFICE: At Casper, Wyoming, will interview Dan Tubbs, 128 West F Street and question him regarding his association with Karpis and Campbell when he, Tubbs, was living at Alcova, Wyoming and vicinity. The request for this interview was set out in reference report of Agent Hansen.

Will keep in touch with Sheriff R. Jack Allen and Captain William Miller for any material developments.

Will interview George Stine, Special Agent C. B. & Q. Railroad, to ascertain whether anything of value was secured in his interview with Mat Goad and whether an interview by an Agent of the Bureau with Goad would be advisable.



ADOLF BREMER ONCE GAVE BOND TO AID WEAVER

Kidnap Suspect Jailed in Sawyer's St. Paul Saloon

VICTIM'S FATHER OWNED PROPERTY

Prisoner to Be Arraigned on Charges in Two Weeks

Fresh study of kidnap evidence be-
gun, and pictures. Page 2.

William Weaver, the "tough" mem-
ber of the Barker-Karpis gang who
was returned to St. Paul last night,
was revealed today as once having
been released from jail on bond fur-
nished by the father of the man
Weaver is accused of kidnaping.

This disclosure came as United
States District Attorney George Sul-
livan announced that Weaver's ar-
raignment would be held within two
weeks. Date for arraignment was
delayed pending return of Federal
Judge M. M. Joyce from a vacation
trip.

Happened Two Years Ago.

The startling revelation that Adolf
Bremer, wealthy brewer and father
of Edward G. Bremer, once furnish-
ed bond for Weaver came from offi-
cial sources. The incident occurred
less than two years before young
Bremer was kidnaped by the Barker-
Karpis gang for \$200,000.

Weaver was arrested in St. Paul
with James Colton on Aug. 2, 1932.
Both were picked up in the notorious
Wabasha street saloon of Harry Saw-
yer, alleged "finger-man" of the

Bremer kidnaping who now is await-
ing trial.

On August 6, Weaver and Colton
were to appear in court. On the
night of Aug. 5, it was learned the
elder Bremer asked Walter Magee,
St. Paul contractor, to attempt to af-
fect release of the two men. Magee,
who later served as contact-man dur-
ing ransom negotiations, communi-
cated with Thomas Dahill, then chief
of police. Weaver and Colton were
released on \$500 each.

Both immediately jumped bond and
Weaver had been sought since then
until his capture by federal agents
in Florida a few days ago.

Bremer Owned Property

Bremer, it was disclosed, was own-
er of the Wabasha street property
where Sawyer's notorious saloon was
located. Before Sawyer took charge,
the place was operated by "Dapper
Dan" Hogan, who until his death
was a notorious fence for northwest
holdup loot.

It was not, however, until Weaver
had been released from custody here
that it was learned by local police
that he had shortly before been pa-
roled from the Oklahoma state peni-
tentiary by Gov. William H. "Alfal-
fa Bill" Murray. Weaver was sen-
tenced to the Oklahoma prison on a
murder charge.

Parole Revoked

His parole was immediately revok-
ed after the arrest here.

Weaver, accused as one of the ac-
tual Bremer kidnapers and frequent-
ly named during testimony at the
trial of seven Barker-Karpis gang
members here last April, also will
face charges here in connection with
a \$50,000 railway express holdup in
1932 and with the attempted slaying
of Ray McCord, pilot for the North-
west Airlines.

McCord was shot a few blocks
from the apartment of Myrtle Eaton,
who was captured with Weaver in
Florida. He was pursuing a car
which he believed contained men
who had been molesting an apart-
ment of a friend. When he pulled
alongside, a blast of gunfire swept
his car. He was wounded but recov-
ered. Subsequently it was learned
that the car contained several mem-
bers of the Barker-Karpis gang who
had just arrived at the Eaton apart-
ment.

Reference is made to the letter directed by this office to the Bureau dated September 17, 1935.

Since the dictation of that letter Stoltz, whom the Bureau will recall is employed by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company as a machinist in Altoona, Pennsylvania, has been investigated by the Superintendent of the Pennsylvania Railroad Police at Pittsburgh, at my personal request, and the results of this investigation indicate that, among other things, this individual is suffering  b7c

In addition, the report indicates that some time in April of 1935, Stoltz made application to the Altoona Police Department for a permit to carry a gun, giving as his reason his alleged activities in the Hauptmann case in New York and New Jersey. At that time his mental condition was investigated and the sheriff's office at Altoona was accordingly advised.

Stoltz has again written into the Pittsburgh Office, presuming to give further information relative to the subjects in the above case, as well as in the William Dainard case.

Volney Davis advised as to the participation of Tom Brown of St. Paul with instant kidnaping and other information of possible interest. Interview with Arthur Barker unproductive. Informants in this district contacted for information concerning remaining Subjects.



REFERENCE: Reports of Special Agent A. J. Norstrom, Kansas City, 8-9-35 and 8-24-35.

DETAILS: On 8-26-35 Volney Davis was interviewed at the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, by Special Agents A. E. Farland and A. J. Norstrom relative to his escape from Bureau Agents at Yorkville, Illinois, in February, 1935, and to any possible assistance that Matthew Gleason might have rendered him in this escape. Davis refused to impart any information concerning this matter other than to say that Gleason took no part in aiding his escape. Davis also volunteered the information that if Earl Christman's mother, who resides in Kansas City, Missouri, would

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have an opportunity to talk to Arthur Barker at the penitentiary, he was sure that Barker would divulge the location of Earl Christman's body and he suggested that Mrs. Christman might advise Barker that she wished to give Earl Christman's body a descent burial and he felt positive that Barker would advance the desired information.

Davis also volunteered the information that Byron Bolton, Doc Barker, George Zeigler, Fred Stone, Alvin Karpis and Harry Sawyer participated in the mail robbery which occurred at Chicago, Illinois, on 12-22-33, at which time Miles Cunningham, a Chicago Police officer, was killed. He advised that Arthur Barker had been slightly wounded by Byron Bolton in this engagement when Bolton accidentally hit him in the left ring finger, splintering a large diamond ring which Barker wore on his left hand, when Bolton was firing at the officers with a machine gun. Davis advised that Elmer Farmer could give a great deal of information concerning the participation in this robbery, in that the evening of the robbery Farmer had harbored all of the participants at his home in Bensenville and, accordingly, knew the exact details of the whole matter.

Davis said that another matter that might possibly be of interest to the Bureau was concerning an infernal machine which Farmer had in his possession. He advised that George Zeigler and Byron Bolton had originally conceived the idea of this infernal machine to free Al Capone from the penitentiary if he was sentenced to serve more years to the penitentiary than they thought he could possibly serve without too much discomfort. However, the machine was later perfected to be used in bank robberies on bank employees and on victims in kidnapings. The machine described by Davis consisted of two time clocks and a timing device filled with nitro glycerine which was strapped with a fool proof lock to the victim's leg and the clocks were set for sufficient length of time for the victim to produce whatever was demanded of him. Davis said the perfection of this machine had cost Bolton and Zeigler \$15,000.00 and that four of the machines are now in existence and all of them are in the possession of Elmer Farmer.

Davis was again interviewed on 9-9-35 by Agents Norstrom and Farland and on this date he advised that it was his information that the following persons were to receive \$20,000.00 of the Bremer ransom money, less expenses: Byron Bolton, Doc Barker, Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis, William Weaver, Harry Campbell, Harry Sawyer, Tom Brown, Fred Goetz and Charles Fitzgerald. Davis said that he received approximately \$5,000.00 and a new Ford car for his share of the ransom money. He said that his part in the abduction was merely taking care of the women in the party.

Davis also stated that Tom Brown, Chief of Detectives of the St. Paul Police Department, was to have received \$20,000.00 for the part that he played in the abduction, but in that he was responsible for the killing of Homer Van Meter the rest of the gang refused to pay him anything. Davis said that the part that Brown played in the abduction was in that he was well acquainted with all the activities at the Bremer home and in the St. Paul Police Department after the kidnaping, he was to furnish the information to the gang so that safe contacts could be made in delivering the ransom notes and obtaining the ransom money.

Davis also stated that Bryon Bolton received two equal shares in the kidnaping money and that after Fred Goetz was killed he received Irene Dorsey's share of the money.

Davis stated that he was in St. Paul on the 17th of January, the day of the kidnaping, and was not aware that the abduction had taken place, but was advised that evening by Fred Parker and Fred Goetz to leave town as it would not be safe for him to stay. He said that he did not leave the town until the night of the 18th or the morning of the 19th of January, at which time he took a bus to Chicago and met Edna Murray on University Avenue in Chicago.

Davis also stated that although Charles Fitzgerald received an equal split of the ransom money, he took no part in the actual abduction. Davis explained this in that Fred Barker and Fitzgerald had been very intimate friends and that Fitzgerald had been wounded during the South St. Paul robbery and was still a cripple from the same, Barker felt that in that he was still a part of the gang he should receive an equal part of the proceeds. However, Davis stated that although Fitzgerald was not in the actual abduction that at a later date he helped exchange the ransom money.

Concerning Davis' activities after he escaped from Federal Agents at Yorkville, Davis said that he purchased a 1935 Ford Coupe from one Tony Moreno. Davis said that he accomplished this through calling Jim Farmer at Bensenville, Illinois, and stating that he was Mike Moreno and wanted to get in touch with the person who furnished Elmer Farmer with his automobile. Jim Farmer agreed to this and stated that he would have Tony Moreno meet him on North Avenue in Elmhurst which was subsequently done. Davis said that he met Tony Moreno at the appointed place and Moreno agreed to have a car for him within three days. Moreno subsequently furnished this car for which Davis paid \$125.00. Davis stated that Tony Moreno was the same person from whom he purchased a yellow automobile which he delivered to Dillinger the night after the gang had buried John Hamilton near Aurora, Illinois.

Davis positively stated that he was sure that Mike Moreno

was not the same person as Tony Moreno, in that he personally knows Mike Moreno.

Davis was questioned as to his knowledge concerning the killing of Gus Winkler at Chicago and advised that he was not acquainted with any of the facts of the killing, but in his mind he believed that Verne Miller and Charles Fitzgerald killed him. Davis could give no facts to support his allegation other than his personal belief that in that Winkler owed Miller and Fitzgerald a large sum of money and they were having difficulty over payment of same, he felt that Miller and Fitzgerald had killed him because of their differences.

On 8-29-35 arrangements were made by Special Agents A. E. Farland and M. B. Rhodes to interview Arthur Barker at the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, for the purpose of questioning him as to the locality where Earl Christman was buried in Kansas City.

On the morning of 8-29-35 Agents Farland and Rhodes proceeded to the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, for the purpose of interviewing Doc Barker. Upon their arrival they immediately contacted Warden Fred G. Zerbst, who stated that he had complied with our suggestion as to the newspapers and that they were still being held in the guard house. Warden Zerbst also handed Agent Farland a note which he had received early that morning through the Deputy Warden from prisoner Volney Davis which in substance said that he wanted to see Agent Farland before Farland talked to anyone else in the prison. Warden Zerbst ordered Davis brought to the conference room in his office where Davis informed Agent Farland and Agent Rhodes that the inmates of the prison, including those in the isolation ward where he and Barker are presently confined, knew of the recovery of the body of John Hamilton; that they had heard the announcement over the radio at 5 P.M. on the previous day giving this information. Davis also stated that he had called across the corridor to his cell block and asked Doc Barker if he had heard the above announcement and that Barker replied that he had. Davis further informed Agents that he feared that Barker might suspect him, Davis, of having furnished the lead to Agents of the Bureau which resulted in the finding of Hamilton's body, and suggested that when Agents talked to Barker that they cause him to believe that the information which Davis had previously furnished relative to the location of Hamilton's body, was furnished by Edna Murray and Byron Bolton. Davis was greatly worried over the release of the Hamilton story in view of the fact that he had been interviewed several times immediately prior to the recovery of the body, and it was he that suggested that Doc Barker be interviewed.

Following the above interview with Volney Davis, Doc Barker was interviewed by Agents on the morning of 8-29-35, in the Deputy Warden's office in the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, and was questioned at length without results. He was particularly

questioned as to whether or not he could furnish information as to where the body of Earl Christman was buried. He stated that he did not know and would give no other reply. However, before the end of the interview Barker assumed a more cooperative attitude and it is believed he may later divulge some information. He stated during the interview that he believed he was to be sent to Alcatraz Prison and that he might be better off there than where he is at the present time and he said that he did not care where he was sent as it could be no worse than where he was presently confined. Just before leaving Barker was asked if he could furnish any information as to what had become of Willie Harrison whom Davis had previously furnished information to the effect that he had been "put on the spot" in an abandoned factory near Bensenville, Illinois, and killed by Bolton, Doc Barker and Elmer Farmer. Barker would make no reply. Barker informed Agents that he had heard of the recovery of the body of Hamilton over the radio on the previous evening, but would make no comment. In order to protect Davis, Agents intimated to Barker that the lead as to the location of Hamilton's body was furnished by Edna Murray and Byron Bolton.

Special Agents A. J. Norstrom and A. S. Reeder called on Mrs. Mary Christman, mother of Earl Christman, deceased, at 3537 Tracy Avenue, Kansas City, Missouri, for the purpose of enlisting her cooperation in discovering the burial place of her son as was related by Volney Davis during a recent interview at the U. S. Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas.

Mrs. Christman advised that she was first aware of the death of her son Saturday, 8-25-35, when a news article appeared in the Kansas City Star concerning an admission from Jess Doyle in St. Paul that Earl had died at the home of Verne Miller on Edgevale Road in Kansas City. This was a great shock to her, as well as to other members of the family, as they were unaware that Earl had ever engaged in any type of criminal activity other than gambling or something of that nature. The news account was the first information that the family had ever received that Earl had participated in the Fairbury, Nebraska, bank robbery. Mrs. Christman felt that he had died in that she had not heard from him for a period of three years and he had customarily sent her greetings on Christmas, Easter and Mother's day.

She was advised that Doc Barker at the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, could possibly give some information as to the burial place of her son and that an interview by her with Doc could possibly produce the desired results. Mrs. Christman at first was somewhat reluctant to consent to this proposition, stating that in that he was dead and buried she wished to avoid any additional embarrassment and publicity for the sake of her sons and daughters who apparently are law abiding and respected citizens. Mrs. Christman also

stated that in the event that her son's body was found there would be the additional expense of burial at Wichita, Kansas, which she felt that she was unable to bear. Later, after giving the matter some consideration she stated that she would like to know where her son was buried so that her mind would be set at ease. She arranged to discuss the matter with her family and advise at a later date.

Mrs. Christman is suffering with a broken hip at the present time and is and will be unable to walk for at least two months and, of course, she could not visit Barker at present. She thought that her youngest son might talk to Barker and endeavor to obtain some information of value concerning the disposition of Earl's body. Mrs. Christman expressed her appreciation for the interest shown in her case and advised that a decision would be reached at a later date.

With reference to the report of Special Agent S. L. Fortenberry, Detroit, Michigan, 6-27-35, Special Agents D. A. Bryce and D. I. McCain made inquiries of Mr. Travis, Postmaster, Joplin, Missouri, and Ed Portley, Chief of Detectives, Joplin, Missouri, for information concerning Dutch and Shorty, mentioned in reference report, without success. Detective Victor Fetty of the Joplin Police Department advised Agent Bryce that a Dutch Carpenhagen, a petty thief, lived about fifteen miles from Joplin and was known to the officers of Joplin, Missouri, but he knew of no Shorty in the vicinity. It is to be noted that during the time that inquiries were made by Agent Bryce he was making an intensive investigation through the territory mentioned in reference report looking towards the apprehension of numerous bank robbers in this district.

[redacted] an informant who has been previously interviewed by Agents Bryce and McCain, advised Agent Bryce on 8-17-35 that he had secured information that Harry Campbell was now in the vicinity of Joplin, Missouri. He further stated that he knew a young woman who was very close to Campbell who now resides at Tulsa, Oklahoma, and that he would contact this person to determine if Campbell had made any contacts in the vicinity in recent months. [redacted] advised Agent Bryce that he would immediately make arrangements to contact this woman at Coffeyville, Kansas. He was advised that a \$1,000.00 reward could and would be paid for information leading to Campbell's apprehension. [redacted] advised that it was his information that Karpis and Campbell had split up and that they were no longer together. [redacted] is regarded as a reliable informant by the Kansas City office in view of the information of the above character submitted in the past in connection with numerous bank robbers in the Kansas City district.

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On 8-23-35 [redacted] was again contacted by Agent Bryce and he advised that he was in close contact with an ex-convict in

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Joplin whose name he would not divulge and who was a friend of Campbell and, therefore, was well aware of the presence of Campbell when he was in that section of the country. [redacted] advised Agent Bryce that his source of information informed him that within thirty days he would have something definite to report and that he would immediately notify [redacted] who in turn would notify the Kansas City office and at that time [redacted] and the informant would make arrangements to put Campbell on the "spot". As previously reported, [redacted] stated that Karpis and Campbell were not together and that his informant confirms this information.

On 7-15-35 the Kansas City office was advised by A. S. Cooper, operative of the Burns Detective Agency, Tulsa, Oklahoma, that one Gus Hawk had been arrested at Independence, Kansas, on a local burglary charge; that he had been released on bond awaiting preliminary hearing to take place on 9-5-35. Mr. Cooper advised that Hawk had informed the local officers that he had information in his possession concerning the whereabouts of Harry Campbell and that Hawk's attorney, F. B. Hanlon, of Coffeyville, Kansas, might know where he was.

On 8-22-35 Special Agent W. John McNulty interviewed Attorney F. B. Hanlon, 130 1/2 West 8th Street, Coffeyville, Kansas, who advised that his client Gus Hart, alias George Hart, was at that time free on a \$5,000.00 bond for a burglary at Independence, Kansas, and his preliminary hearing would take place on 9-5-35. Hanlon advised that his client's name was Hart, not Hawk; that Hart had a wide acquaintance in the underworld and had informed that in the forepart of July, 1935, he had been with Harry Campbell in Joplin, Missouri. He further advised that Hart had informed him that Campbell and he were to commit a robbery at Joplin on 7-20-35 but that Hart's arrest at Independence prevented.

Chief of Police Truman S. Thompson, Independence, Kansas, furnished Agent McNulty with the following description of Gus Hart:

Eyes - brown
Complexion - medium

On 9-6-35 Special Agent B. P. Cruise interviewed Mr. Hanlon, who stated that Gus Hart, his client, was an ex-convict from the State Penitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma, and was well acquainted with hoodlums in Oklahoma, Southern Missouri and Southern Kansas. He stated Hart resided principally in Joplin, Missouri, and lived with a paramour there by the name of Lee Galbraith, a woman ex-convict from the State Penitentiary at San Quentin, California. He stated that Lee Galbraith had been sentenced to San Quentin under the name of Marie Kemy from a county in Southern California on a charge of burglary and larceny, and had been paroled about a year ago. Mr. Hanlon informed that in his opinion Lee Galbraith would not divulge any information. Mr. Hanlon informed that his client, Gus Hart, had made an appointment to see Hanlon in Hanlon's office at 5:30 P.M., 9-6-35, and would inform Agent Cruise of any connections with Harry Campbell.

Agent Cruise interviewed Gus Hart in Mr. Hanlon's office. Hart appeared to be about 45 years old, 6 feet tall, brown eyes, medium complexion, robust build. Hart stated that he had served a sentence in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary at McAlester in 1913 and that since then he had been well acquainted with hoodlums in Oklahoma, Southern Missouri and Southern Kansas. He stated that he personally knew the Barkers, Karpis, Davis, Campbell, Herb Farmer, Blackie Doyle, Vivian Chase, Jess Doyle and others. Hart advised that he knew for a certainty that Harry Campbell had not been associated with Alvin Karpis during the last six months, since he, Hart, had been in close contact with Campbell for the past six months, having known Campbell, however, for three or four years. He stated that Harry Campbell was driving a 1934 black Plymouth Coupe, license number unknown, advising that Harry Campbell was in the practice of changing license plates frequently. Harry Campbell, he stated, slept in his automobile much of the time.

Upon requesting Hart to describe Harry Campbell, Hart stated Campbell was about 5 feet 9 or 10 inches tall, weighed about 160 pounds and walks with a limp. Other descriptive data of Campbell coincides with the description given on I.O. 1236. Agent asked Hart if Campbell was as tall as he, Hart, and Hart replied that Campbell was not quite as tall as himself and he himself was 6 feet tall. From Agent's observation Hart appeared to be about 6 feet tall. Hart stated that he knew that Harry Campbell, with whom he had been associated, was the Harry Campbell wanted in the Bremer case for he had talked to Campbell about instant case; that Campbell denied participation in instant case. Hart advised that when asking about Campbell's past operations and associates Hart informed he did not make a practice of asking too many questions and did not get much information as to Campbell's past. Hart stated that he and Campbell had planned to rob the Empire Light Company Building, Joplin, Missouri, on 7-20-35, but that Hart's arrest shortly previous to that time in

connection with burglary at Independence, Kansas, had temporarily disrupted their plans. He added, however, that he expected at any time that Campbell would contact him in Joplin with the end in view of carrying through their plans to make the robbery. Hart, in the presence of Mr. Hanlon, stated that in the event Campbell contacted him he would arrange for a meeting with Campbell several hours later and, if possible, a day later and immediately inform Attorney Hanlon of the arrangements and Mr. Hanlon informed that he would immediately, upon receipt of information from Hart, telephone the Kansas City Bureau office.

Agent Cruise told Hart, in the presence of Hanlon, that the Bureau would pay \$1,000.00 for information leading to Campbell's arrest, providing that that information were given to the Bureau exclusively. Hart advised that that was satisfactory and stated that he had no hesitancy in causing Campbell's arrest for the reason that he had expected Campbell to spring him from the jail at Independence, Kansas, and that Campbell had not done so.

In view of the very inaccurate description of Campbell given by Hart and in view of his general boastful demeanor in knowing parties wanted by the Bureau, it is not thought that Hart is very reliable.

Agent Cruise showed Gus Hart the identification order of Harry Campbell and Hart advised that it was apparent that the picture was that of Campbell, but that it was not a good likeness of Campbell.

Hart informed Agent Cruise that he personally knew Subject Alvin Karpis and had seen Karpis in Joplin, Missouri, about a month ago. He stated, however, that he did not know who Karpis contacted in Joplin and could give no information by which Karpis could be apprehended should he return to Joplin. He stated that Karpis had a sister named Opal, last name unknown, living near Gunnison, Colorado, and that he had personally met Opal there. Hart informed that if he wanted to locate Karpis he would proceed to Gunnison, Colorado, drive twenty-five or thirty miles northwest of Gunnison, Colorado, where Opal lived with a man whose first name was Charlie, last name unknown. He added that Opal lived in a tent about one hundred fifty or two hundred feet from the highway and that this tent could be located near the highway about twenty-five to thirty miles northwest of Gunnison, Colorado, across the road from a dance hall which would appear on the right hand side of the road which lead from Gunnison; that the tent in which Opal lived was on the left of the highway leading from Gunnison, Colorado, immediately opposite a dance hall. He stated that a man named Bill Rich, a prominent fisherman and sportsman in the vicinity of where Opal lived was well known in that vicinity and could easily be located; that Bill Rich was

active as a post office for hoodlums all over the country. He stated that Opal and Charlie were friends of Bill Rich and Bill Rich's wife Jessie. Hart stated that if an Agent would contact Bill Rich in the guise of a fisherman or vacationer and spent a few weeks fishing with Bill Rich that Opal and Charlie would show up.

Hart described Opal as being about 33 to 35 years, build heavy set, weight 150 pounds, height 5 feet 4 or 5 inches, complexion dark, hair brown, peculiarities not good looking, acts like a man, good marksman, criminal record unknown to Hart.

When asked how he knew Opal was a sister of Karpis, Hart stated that he had been on a drinking party with Bill Rich and his wife Jessie and that Opal and Charlie were present at the party; that Bill Rich had told him that Opal was Alvin Karpis' sister. Hart believed that Alvin Karpis could be found in the vicinity of Gunnison, Colorado, with his sister Opal.

F. B. Hanlon advised that an informant of his, [redacted] whose address is [redacted] had furnished the information to Special Agent Hall, Oklahoma City office, a little over a year ago which led to the location of the Nut House in Chicago. He stated that [redacted]

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[redacted] was a reliable source of information. Mr. Hanlon arranged for an interview by Agent with [redacted] at 9 A.M., 9-7-35.

Agent on 9-7-35 interviewed [redacted] in Mr. Hanlon's office. [redacted] advised that she had [redacted]

Hill's place was closed about two months ago by Oklahoma State authorities. She stated that she believed [redacted] Earl Morris, together with Jess Doyle and Al Sherwood, and possibly others, had robbed a mail truck in Coffeyville, Kansas, about a year ago. She informed that [redacted] was well acquainted with hoodlums in the vicinity. [redacted] further stated that last spring a man giving his name as Jimmy Murphy White had been to visit Al Sherwood in Coffeyville and from the conversation which she overheard between Sherwood and [redacted] others in South Coffeyville, Jimmy Murphy White lived in an apartment at 21 and C Street, Washington, D.C., and that White was an underworld contact. She added that at the time Jimmy Murphy White left Coffeyville, Earl Morris also left Coffeyville and that she was unable to locate Earl Morris until his return to Coffeyville some weeks later. During this interval [redacted] had gone to Al Sherwood for the purpose of ascertaining where

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Earl Morris was and Al Sherwood had refused to tell her, stating that if she would write a letter to Earl Morris and give it to him he would see to it that the letter reached Earl Morris. [redacted] believed that Earl Morris had gone to Washington, D. C., with Jimmy Murphy White at that time.

[redacted] further stated that while Jess Doyle was living at Pittsburg, Kansas, she believed that Earl Morris and Al Sherwood were in close contact with him.

[redacted] further informed that about a year or more ago she had seen a party in South Coffeyville, Oklahoma, near McCabe's filling station, who was pointed out to her as Harry Campbell and that she would recognize this party should she see him again. Agent showed her a picture on the identification order of Harry Campbell and she stated that there was some resemblance. She stated that a few months ago some officers had appeared at South Coffeyville looking for Harry Campbell, Harry Campbell having been reported to be there and that after the departure of the officers she heard McCabe, who operates a filling station in South Coffeyville, make the remark that he, McCabe, knew positively that Harry Campbell had not been in South Coffeyville for the reason that if Harry Campbell should appear the first man he would contact would be McCabe.

[redacted] advised that she would keep on the look-out for Harry Campbell and information which might lead to his apprehension and the apprehension of other parties, and would immediately inform the Kansas City office.

Agent left with [redacted] the address and telephone number of the Kansas City Bureau office.

F. B. Hanlon informed Agent Cruise that Tommy Hill's Casa Del Camina had been closed by Oklahoma State authorities about two months ago and that Tommy Hill was presently operating the Tri State Steel Company in South Coffeyville dealing in oil field supplies, such as pipe, etc.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent in Charge J. A. Dowd, Omaha, 6-5-35, in this matter wherein it is noted that a confidential informant of the Omaha office informs that Ray Larson, Raymond Peil and Jim Frost of Topeka, Kansas, were close friends of Karpis in the past.

With the assistance of Detective Sturm of the Topeka, Kansas, Police Department, the writer contacted Jim Frost at 314 Golden

Avenue, Topeka. Frost is a man 32 years of age and has resided in Topeka all his life. He is married, has two children and although he has worked as a plasterer, he now is working on county relief projects. He states that he has known Karpis for a number of years and grew up with him in Topeka. They were partners in operating a hamburger shop on 11th and 4th Streets in Topeka during the years of 1924 and 1925, and were in business together when Karpis was sent to Hutchinson the first time in 1926. He stated that he and Karpis were always the best of friends and that if Karpis were to return to Topeka he was positive that he would be the first person contacted by him.

Frost stated that in the summer of 1926 he was sent to Hutchinson for stealing an outboard motor and there renewed his acquaintanceship with Karpis. He was at that place also when Karpis escaped.

Frost said that the last time that Karpis was in Topeka was about three years ago at which time he met him in a beer parlor on the north side of Topeka. Karpis was driving a new Buick Sedan and was accompanied by one Steno who had done time with him at Hutchinson. Since that time he has not seen Karpis although he heard from a friend, whose name he would not divulge, that he had seen Karpis at Pawhuska, Oklahoma, about a year ago. He further stated that he doubted if Karpis would ever return to Topeka as he was too well known. Concerning the rumors that Karpis had been there on several occasions within the past year, Frost expressed the opinion that they were absolutely without foundation. Frost offered, in the event that information was received by the Bureau that Karpis was in the vicinity of Topeka, to lend his assistance in uncovering any information that would be of value. He stated that he was well acquainted with all the members of the Karpis family, including Albert Grooms of Topeka.

Frost advised that he did not know Harry Campbell or any other Subjects in this case. He was evidently sincere in his statements, but when discussing the possibilities of making contact with Karpis, he said that it would be a waste of time because he was entirely unfamiliar with Karpis' present activities and associates.

Concerning Ray Larson and Raymond Peil, mentioned in the reference report, Frost said that it was his information that Larson is in the Missouri Penitentiary at Jefferson City and Peil is in the Kansas State Penitentiary at Lansing.

From the Identification Unit of the Topeka, Kansas, Police Department, the following information concerning Frost, Peil and Larson was obtained:

At the suggestion of William Link, Topeka Police Department, the writer also contacted Herb Irish, engineer at the Boys Industrial School, Topeka, with reference to any knowledge that he might have concerning Karpis. Irish advised that he had known Karpis when he was in Topeka prior to his incarceration at Hutchinson. He also stated that he was in Johnson's Pool Hall in Topeka in December, 1934, when a man entered wearing dark glasses whom he did not recognize and when the talk drifted to Karpis this man left. Someone in the place thought that this person might be Karpis and called the police, but this person was never apprehended. Although Irish said that he did not recognize the man, his general stature conformed somewhat to that of Karpis. Other than that he has heard or seen nothing of Karpis in recent years and could give no information of value, but did promise that in the event that his services were of any value at a subsequent time, in the event that Karpis did make an appearance in the vicinity of Topeka, he would immediately report it to the Kansas City office of the Bureau and lend his assistance in procuring whatever information of value that he could.

Within the past several weeks numerous efforts have been made to contact H. A. Morgan, Charleston Apartments, 615 West 15th Street, Kansas City, Missouri, who was mentioned in the report of Special Agent A. J. Norstrom, Kansas City, 8-9-35, as a possible informant concerning Harry Campbell. On 9-3-35 the writer and Special Agent W. John McNulty were advised by Mrs. E. C. Platt, manager of the Charleston Apartments that Morgan had left the apartments owing her a week's rent and that his departure was unknown to her. Mrs. Platt could furnish no information concerning his associates or possible whereabouts.

Officer Logan was again contacted at the Union Station and he advised that he has not seen Morgan of late in that Morgan is no longer a bartender at the Reno Club. Logan stated, however, that he was well acquainted with all of the contacts of Morgan and was quite certain that he would be able to locate him within a short time.

Logan was again contacted on 9-4-35 and advised that he had received information to the effect that Morgan had taken a trip to some point in Arkansas and intended to be gone about a week. Logan agreed to contact him on his return to Kansas City and make arrangements so that another interview could be had with Morgan for the purpose of ascertaining if additional information has been developed concerning Harry Campbell.

On 9-5-35 Hugh Larimer, formerly a Special Agent of this Bureau, appeared at the Kansas City Bureau office and advised that about a week ago he had been talking to one Tom Powell, formerly a Deputy Sheriff of Topeka, Kansas, and presently employed by the city, at the City Hall, 7th and Quincy Avenue, Topeka, Kansas. Powell told Mr. Larimer that about three weeks prior thereto he had been in the Post Office and had seen Alvin Karpis call for mail there. Mr. Larimer states that Powell knew Karpis as Karpis was from Topeka, Kansas.

On 9-11-35 Tom Powell was contacted by Special Agent A. S. Reeder at the Sanitary Department of the City Hall, Topeka, Kansas, who advised that three or four months prior to the time of the interview he had seen Alvin Karpis walking down the steps at the Main Post Office, Topeka, Kansas. At first he did not recognize him. He later recalled that this individual he had seen was Karpis and he was positive in his identification in that he had known Karpis when he was attending grade school in Topeka and also had had trouble with him while he, Powell, was a Deputy Sheriff at Topeka. Powell stated that when he first met Karpis on the afternoon in question his mind was on other things and he did not recognize him on first glance, but after recalling that it was Karpis he made several efforts to locate him in

town without success. He stated he did not report the matter to the local police as he wanted Karpis turned over to the Bureau as he was not anxious to work with the local Police Department. Mr. Powell was given the telephone number of the Kansas City office and he agreed to notify the office if any information should develop in the future concerning Karpis.

While at the Sheriff's office at Topeka, Kansas, Agent Reeder on the same date was also advised by Deputy Sheriff Jack Harrison that a confidential informant the week previous had told him that Karpis had recently been to visit the sister of a convict named MacKay, first name unknown, and that this sister lived in Cassiday, Matfield Green or Eureka, Kansas, a wild country that afforded excellent possibilities for hideouts. Karpis is alleged to have given MacKay's sister \$500.00 for protection while he was there and Harrison said he talked to his informant a short time prior to Agent Reeder's visit and had been informed that Karpis had just left the place. Harrison further advised Agent Reeder that he might gain some information from Mrs. Sybil Lafferty, 300 Klein Avenue, Topeka, Kansas, whose brother, Elmer "Swede" Anderson had been a close associate of Karpis when he was in Topeka.

Agent Reeder contacted Mrs. Lafferty, who advised she had neither seen nor heard of Karpis for twelve or thirteen years although she thought that perhaps her brother might know something concerning him. Agent Reeder did not interview "Swede" Anderson in that other Agents of the Kansas City office had previously interviewed him and at no time had he ever divulged any information of value.

Harrison further advised Agent Reeder that one Ray Peil, presently incarcerated in the Kansas State Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas, had made overtures to the law enforcement officials at Topeka offering to locate Karpis if they would quash an indictment against him, which the Prosecuting Attorney refused to do.

Sheriff Rogers informed Agent Reeder that it is believed that Peil might produce Karpis if he had an opportunity to do so and further that Special Agent A. E. Farland had talked to Peil previous to his being taken to Lansing, but that he would not talk at that time.

Under date of 7-16-35 Milton C. James, Deputy Sheriff, McPherson County, McPherson, Kansas, addressed a letter to the Bureau advising that he had received a tip relative to Alvin Karpis and requesting that his office be furnished with an identification order on Karpis. On 7-20-35 the Kansas City Bureau office replied to Mr. James' letter and enclosed two copies of identification orders of Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell.

On 8-27-35 Special Agent R. J. Brandt interviewed Undersheriff James, who advised that a woman living near McPherson, Kansas, had been a very close friend of Karpis and would be able to furnish information concerning his present whereabouts. Undersheriff James then advised that one Doris Stanley, who operated the Chicken Inn, one mile south of McPherson, Kansas, was the individual. Subsequent investigation disclosed that Doris Stanley is Doris O'Conner, who has been previously interviewed on numerous occasions by Agents of the Kansas City Bureau office for information concerning fugitives in this case. Undersheriff James advised Agent Brandt that Doris Stanley had advised him that Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell had been at the Chicken Inn approximately six weeks prior to the interview and she expected them to return and in the event they did so she would notify Undersheriff James immediately, but that she did not wish to notify the Federal Bureau of Investigation as she stated she had cooperated fully with the Kansas City office and was instrumental in the apprehension of Volney Davis at Chicago, Illinois, but that she had been double-crossed by the Bureau and would not cooperate with Mr. James if the Bureau were notified.

From the facts related by Mr. James it appeared evident to Agent Brandt that the information received from Mr. James was not of practical value, at that time, due to the fact that Doris O'Conner was believed to have been an unreliable source of information during interviews had with her by Agents of Kansas City and also in that she was not instrumental in the capture of Volney Davis at Chicago, Illinois. However, Agent Brandt and Undersheriff James proceeded to the Chicken Inn where Doris O'Conner was interviewed by Agent Brandt without disclosing his identity, but no information of value was obtained.

In the opinion of Undersheriff James, Doris O'Conner is playing his office for leniency in that numerous violations of the Kansas Prohibition Law have been reported concerning her and he agreed that if he received any information of value from her he would immediately transmit the same to the Kansas City Bureau office.

On 9-17-35 the Kansas City office received a letter addressed to Special Agent A. J. Norstrom from Edna Murray, register #28973, Missouri State Penitentiary, Jefferson City, Missouri, advising that she had been thinking things over and that she was ready to help the Bureau and herself and requested that an interview be had with her. This matter will be taken care of immediately.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

KANSAS CITY OFFICE at Jefferson City, Missouri, will interview Edna Murray in the Missouri State Penitentiary in an endeavor

to obtain all pertinent information concerning this case that she may be willing to divulge.

At Joplin, Missouri, will endeavor to contact [REDACTED] for any further information that he may have concerning Harry Campbell.

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At Kansas City, Missouri, will endeavor to contact Mrs. Christman relative to her decision to assist in the location of Earl Christman's body.
