MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

SAC Alt telephoned me from the Omaha Office and said that on April 20, 1936, he advised the Bureau by teletype that the Morningside State Bank at Morningside, Iowa, a suburb of Sioux City, was robbed by four men, this not being a case within the investigative jurisdiction of the Bureau. Mr. Alt said that Paul Gruber of the State Bureau of Identification in Des Moines, Iowa, is making the investigation of this case. Gruber has never furnished the Omaha Office with any information which was found to be reliable. Gruber has a problem in the robbery of this bank that he can't solve, and yesterday, he asked Mr. Alt for some photographs of Alvin Karpis, which were furnished. The robbers, at the time they robbed this bank, kidnaped two officers and two employees of the bank, who were all scared badly, and when Gruber got the photographs of Karpis, he displayed them to the officers, who readily identified them as being one of the persons robbing the bank. It is the opinion of Mr. Alt that they would identify almost any picture which was put in front of them as being one of the robbers. The robbers used a black Buick Sedan in this robbery, and were in town for almost an hour before the robbery, where they had some work done on their automobile. Mr. Alt said he knows the employees at the garage where this repair work was done have stated that none of the persons involved in this affair was Karpis.

Paul Gruber called up Mr. Alt and after informing him of the identification as made by the officers of the bank, asked Mr. Alt if he would have any objection to his giving a statement to the press that Alvin Karpis was in on this robbery. Mr. Alt said he told Gruber the Bureau is anxious to apprehend Karpis, and if he were in this section of the country, nothing would do us any more harm than the giving out of this information to the press, that, however, this was his investigation, and he could do as he pleased, but in so far as the Bureau is concerned, we wanted no part in the publicity.

I told Mr. Alt that as a matter of fact, at this particular time if Karpis is in that vicinity and the publicity would make him move, nothing would do us any more good, in view of the fact that we have extensive plants in other parts of the country to which he would be liable to flee. However, I told him we want to handle this matter intelligently and get from Gruber anything he has indicating Karpis was in on this job, and at the same time, we won't be precipitated into the investigation of his bank robbery case.

Dear Mr. Hoover,

Please find contained herein information that might interest you.

First: however, grant my saying that I am detailed from the Audit division of the G.A.O., Washington, D. C., to the G.A.O., Michael Bldg., Athens, Ga. for a period of approximately seven months in the interest of the Cotton Price Adjustment Program--having left D. C. March 4, 1936.

Believing the foregoing paragraph sufficient I offer now a result of a casual observation:

During week of April 12-18, I stopped in a small Cleaning and Pressing establishment (Athens) to have my trousers pressed while waiting. Having been directed to a 4'x4' dressing room, I noticed the name ALVIN KARPIS written upon a small table's covering, the same name could be observed upon the wall opposite with date 3/6/36 appearing below. I observed also, the name ALVIN T. BELL written upon the wall with a series of dates appearing immediately below the name. By this time, trousers were returned me and I went to office.

Yesterday, April 23, I made it my business to have trousers badly in need of press, therefore, I visited the 4' x 4' a second time. I severed from table paper covering, the section bearing name ALVIN KARPIS and this section please find enclosed. From the wall I copied the following dates which appeared below name ALVIN T. BELL (Watkinsville, Ga.) -- there were two separate columns thus:

Reference is made to the above-entitled case wherein the following piece of original evidence was forwarded by Mr. E. A. Tamm to the Bureau's Technical Laboratory for examination:

- A. One small piece of brown wrapping paper on which appears the name "Alvin Karpis" printed in pencil.

The irregularly torn piece of brown wrapping paper designated as specimen A above, bears no watermark and has a thickness of .0034". There is no available known handprinting specimen of Karpis' writing on file, consequently, no handprinting comparison can be made.

The material has been developed for latent fingerprints but none of value has been developed.

Supervisor K. McIntyre of the Bureau's Investigative Unit has been telephonically advised of the above results.

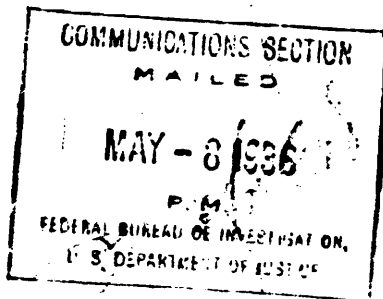

There is attached hereto a copy of a memorandum submitted in this case by Special Agent B. Dilillo at the Pittsburgh Office dated April 27, 1935, which is self-explanatory.

I am just in receipt of information from the United States Commissioner at Bluefield, West Virginia that a lady in that city positively identified Karpis as a person who had breakfast at the Loyal Cafe there at about 10:00 A. M., Friday morning, April 26, 1935.

If the persons referred to in the memorandum of Agent Dilillo are Karpis and members of his mob, it is likely that they were enroute to Jacksonville, Florida, if Karpis is the person who was seen in the restaurant at Bluefield, West Virginia, as that city is located about two hundred miles southwest of Clarksburg, West Virginia, on the main highway leading to Florida.

It is suggested that the Jacksonville Office conduct appropriate investigation at the Loyal Hotel for the purpose of ascertaining if Karpis is located there.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE SPECIAL AGENT IN CHARGE:

BREKID

Special Agent H. A. Bangert called by long distance telephone from Clarksburg, West Virginia, at 3:00 P. M. today and informed that he is personally acquainted with J. E. EBERHARDT, a War Veteran, who makes his livelihood in selling magazines. Agent Bangert informed that Eberhardt is also well known by police authorities at Clarksburg, who, allege that Eberhardt has in the past furnished the police with reliable information.

Agent Bangert stated that last Thursday, April 23, 1936, between 5:00 and 6:00 P. M., Eberhardt visited a beer garden known as "The Little Hope" in the vicinity of Clarksburg and observed at a table six men and two girls; that he sold to each of the parties in question the "Veteran's Service Magazine", for which he, Eberhardt, was paid the exorbitant amount of \$35.00.

Eberhardt stated to Agent Bangert that he recognized one of the said six men as ALVIN KARPIS. Eberhardt could only give a faint description of another man with Karpis whom he described as a short fellow with a small dark mustache. Eberhardt also informed Agent Bangert that the party of eight was travelling in a Lincoln automobile, either black or dark blue, registration plates unknown; that in leaving the beer joint, "The Little Hope", one of the girls dropped two pieces of paper, one of the said pieces of paper containing the notation - "Devon Hotel, Julia and Bay Street, Jacksonville, Florida, Friday night, Room 26". The other piece of paper was a newspaper clipping headed, "Karpis Gangster Seized in Texas". The news, propagated through the Associated Press, was dated at Dallas, Texas, April 12, 1936, and related to the arrest of BLACKIE BOYLE, identified as having been connected with the Luer Kidnaping Case.

The informant of Agent Bangert, in conveying the information, stated that he was naturally interested in receiving the reward if Karpis were apprehended through the said information. Eberhardt, according to Agent Bangert, could not convey the data herein given inasmuch as he could not locate Agent Bangert in Clarksburg prior to this date.

Dear Sir:

In conversation with confidential informant Clayton Hall, who is presently in Little Rock, Arkansas, awaiting the return of Grace Goldstein for contact with her concerning the location of Alvin Karpis, please be advised that this informant advised Special Agents W. John McMulty and John L. Madala of the following information on this date:

Informant advised that in January of this year while he was visiting Alvin Karpis at Hot Springs, Arkansas, Karpis lead him to believe that he might possibly in the near future kidnap the son of Mr. Richman, wealthy clothing manufacturer, and hold him for possibly \$500,000.00 ransom. In this connection, Karpis stated to our informant that he had previously read in a newspaper that Mr. Richman's son was given as a wedding present by his father the sum of either one-half million dollars or one million dollars in cash; that Karpis further informed him that either the son or the elder Mr. Richman, or both, reside in Cleveland, Ohio, and that the kidnaping of the former would take place in that city.

Karpis further informed Mr. Hall that he had thought of some plan whereby he could secure the ransom money in this contemplated kidnaping without any law enforcement body securing the serial numbers of the money paid as ransom. In this regard, Karpis mentioned that if he were to perpetrate this kidnaping, he would call on the elder Mr. Richman about the same time that the boy is being kidnaped; that he would then remain with Mr. Richman constantly until the money is paid over to him; that he would inform Mr. Richman that should he make any attempt to notify the authorities of the "snatch" or in any way uncover him, that his son would be killed. Karpis was of the opinion that he could very easily avoid detection by being in the elder Richman's company constantly and possibly

going under the pretense of being a relative or employee of his. Informant Hall advised that Karpis was firmly convinced in his own mind that he could get away with a kidnaping of this sort.

At about the same time, during course of conversation with Clayton Hall, Alvin Karpis made mention of pulling a certain payroll robbery. While no name of a city or town was mentioned in connection with this latter venture, the informant is of the opinion that this job was to take place in some city or town in the vicinity of Chicago, Illinois.

The informant recalls that Karpis stated that at this particular plant where the robbery was to take place on pay day, an armored car would drive up early in the morning and the employees at the place would be paid during the day from the armored car. It is the informant's recollection that in addition to the pay master there are two or three guards at or near the armored car, and that the cash payroll involved is in the amount of approximately \$500,000.00. While no detailed modus operandi was stated to the informant, mention was made that one of the gang would dress as a workman and get in the line with the employees receiving their pay. When this individual reached the pay car, tear gas would be thrown into the cab of the armored car and the balance of the cash taken. Only one member of the gang would line up with the workmen. A get-a-way car would be available and the rest of the gang would be in the vicinity at various points of vantage. Karpis advised the informant, when this matter was discussed, that it is his opinion that with proper planning this robbery would be easy for him and his associates to handle.

It might be stated that, with reference to the above two plans, Karpis did not at any time mention to informant Hall who his associates might be in these ventures. It should also be noted that Karpis did not inform Hall that he would definitely commit these crimes but merely indicated how easy it could be done.

In conclusion, informant Hall advised the agents that he is reasonably certain that Alvin Karpis and Freddie Hunter have at present only approximately \$2,500.00 to \$3,000.00 between them. He also stated that in view of the reward circulars which will be distributed this week, he is of the opinion that Karpis will possibly pull one more big job and then probably confine himself to a safe place until the "heat" on him, which these

circulars will undoubtedly give him, blows over.

Dear Sir:

In the course of investigation being conducted at Little Rock, Arkansas, information was received indicating that Alvin Karpis has recently expressed his intention of kidnaping in the near future the son of Mr. Richman, a wealthy clothing manufacturer, reported to be living in Cleveland. Karpis is reported to have read in a newspaper that Mr. Richman's son was given as a wedding present by his father the sum of either one-half million or one million dollars in cash and that, predicated upon this information, Karpis intends to kidnap the son of Mr. Richman and hold him for \$500,000 ransom. Karpis, if he carries through this kidnaping, intends to attempt personally approaching the elder Mr. Richman immediately after the son is kidnaped and remain with Mr. Richman constantly until the ransom money is paid over to him in order to avoid any notification to law enforcement officials.

It is desired that you ascertain immediately the identity of the Richman family referred to by Karpis in his discussion of this kidnaping and notify both the elder Mr. Richman and his son of Karpis' alleged intentions. The Richman family should be notified of the procedure to be followed by them in the event of any kidnaping and they should be instructed to take all possible precautions to prevent this occurrence. It should be pointed out to the Richmans, of course, that it will not be possible for this Bureau to render guard duty to them.

It is desired that you give this matter immediate attention, advising the Bureau when you have contacted the Richmans.

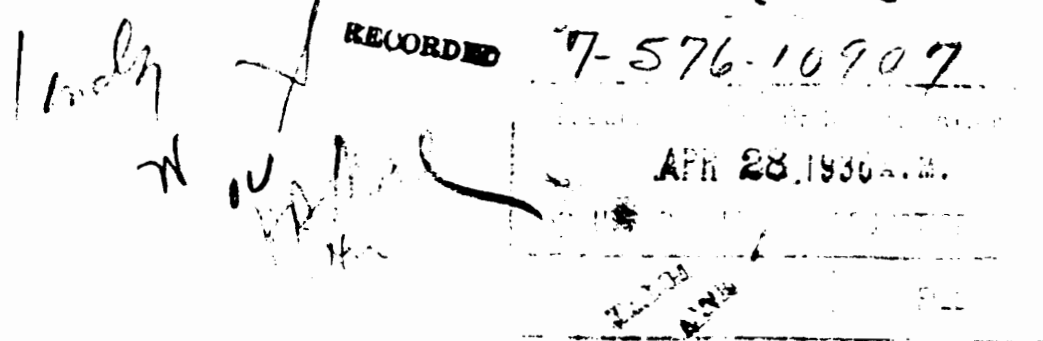

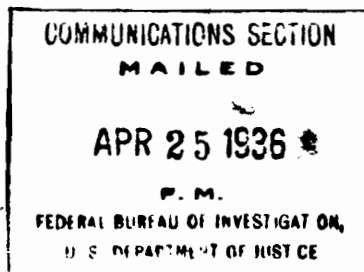

The Cincinnati Office is in receipt of a letter from the Jacksonville Office dated April 21, 1936, in the above entitled case, indicating that Fred Hunter, with a girl posing as his wife, was at Orlando, Florida in January of this year, where he was interested in cock fighting, and was associated with persons at Orlando interested in that activity.

This office has contacted a confidential informant, whose name is being furnished to the Bureau under separate cover, who is connected with the cock fighting game in Jefferson County, Ohio. This informant, upon being shown a number of photographs, immediately picked out the picture of Fred Hunter, named him and stated that he was from Leavittsburg and Warren, Ohio, and was well known in the cock fighting game. The informant stated that Hunter has not been in the vicinity of Jefferson County for over two years; that Hunter always calls on him when in that locality.

The informant advised that Hunter has for a considerable period of time, been interested in chicken fighting at a large pit located at Sand Springs, Oklahoma, and that he is intimately acquainted with one Banks King of Ardmore, Oklahoma, King being in this same business. The informant states that King absolutely should not be approached as he would not cooperate with law enforcement officials.

The informant will advise this office if he secures any information as to the present whereabouts of Hunter and has, in fact, suggested that he might go to Warren, Ohio, in an endeavor to learn of Hunter's present whereabouts, as he is well acquainted with all of Hunter's associates at that place. The advisability of having the informant visit Warren, Ohio, is being left to the consideration of Special Agent in Charge T. J. Connelley.

Dear Mr. Patterson:

Inasmuch as I understand that the rules and regulations of the United Air Lines specifically provide that employees of your company are to keep all business matters confidential, I wish to inform you of the following facts relating to the activities of one of your employees, who, through his indiscreet actions, which incidentally violated the rules of your company, permitted representatives of the press to learn of contemplated travel of Special Agents of this Bureau, which resulted in a news story which had a very detrimental effect upon an official investigation being conducted by this Bureau.

On the night of March 28, 1936, the Special Agent in Charge of the Cleveland, Ohio, Office of this Bureau contacted the Reservation Clerk of the United Air Lines in Cleveland, endeavoring to arrange for a chartered plane for a trip from Cleveland, Ohio, to Little Rock, Arkansas. Upon ascertaining that there was no equipment available in Cleveland for the trip, your employees endeavored to secure a plane from Chicago, but inasmuch as there would have been some delay in bringing the equipment from Chicago to Cleveland, arrangements were finally made with another concern to furnish a plane for the proposed trip.

The details concerning the negotiations were known to your Assistant Station Manager, Mr. Ralph Grospitch, in Cleveland, who has informed a representative of this Bureau that he understood the rules of the company, which as a matter of policy are that no information will be disclosed to outside persons concerning any details with reference to the business of the company, particularly with reference to the identity of persons travelling and chartering planes. admits that during the early morning of March 29, 1936, he discussed the details concerning the proposed trip by Special Agents of this Bureau with two pilots of the United Air Lines, namely, Emory Martin and E. D. Gray, in the coffee shop of the Cleveland Airport Terminal, and that before discussing this matter with them he had noticed a newspaper reporter sitting near-by in the coffee shop. Mr. Gropitch also informed the Special Agent that he had a few words with the newspaper reporter while in the coffee shop, but denied furnishing him with information concerning the chartering of the airplane for the trip from Cleveland to Little Rock, or any information as to the identity of the parties who were to travel on the chartered plane.

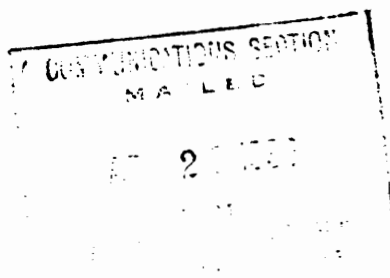
Notwithstanding this fact, on Monday, March 30, 1936, a story appeared in an early edition of the Cleveland newspaper represented by the reporter who was present during the discussion between Mr. Gropitch and the two pilots, which set forth in considerable detail information concerning this trip. The newspaper article stated that the Department of Justice was reported to have first contacted the United Air Lines concerning the trip and, upon finding no equipment available at Cleveland, representatives of your company had contacted officials at Chicago in an effort to secure the equipment, but due to the fact that the price of the trip was considerably more than that charged by the Sundorff Aeronautical Corporation, a plane of the latter company had eventually been used. The newspaper article even went so far as to show the exact amount asked by your company and the amount reported to have been charged by the latter concern. The press article indicated that the information which they published could have been secured only from some representative of the United Air Lines who was familiar with all of the details. From the inquiries which I have caused to be made in this matter, it appears that the newspaper secured the information regarding the chartered trip from Mr. Gropitch.

The furnishing of this information to the press and the resulting newspaper publicity seriously jeopardized the investigation then being conducted by this Bureau looking toward the apprehension of a notorious criminal, and I thought you would be interested in knowing of the facts relating to this matter.

DETAILS:

This report covers investigations by Special Agent in Charge Dwight Brantley, and Special Agents M. W. Acers, W. L. Buchanan, R. N. Butterworth, C. J. Endres, W. A. Giddens, Paul Hansen, L. E. Kingman, J. B. Little, V. I. Parry, L. B. Reed, J. H. Rice, and F. S. Smith.

With reference to a letter addressed to Mr. Connelley by the Little Rock Office, dated March 23, 1936, Mr. O. W. Duncan, Auditor at the Municipal Air Port, Tulsa, was interviewed. He stated that he comes in contact with practically all passengers arriving and departing from Tulsa by air plane, commercially, as well as pilots and passengers of private planes. The air port maintains a register, but there is nothing compulsory regarding it. Private planes which are not registered by their pilots are noted in this register according to the plane number. This register was checked from January 1, 1935 to March 26, 1936.

Re: Plane License NC12180

There was no record of this plane having been registered at Tulsa between the dates mentioned. In view of the fact that the letter of reference mentions this plane as proceeding to Tulsa in November, 1935 the sales slips covering the supply of gasoline, etc., to planes were checked. Ticket #29494 reflected that 16 gallons of gasoline were placed in a Stinson plane bearing number NC12180 on November 10, 1935. No other information was reflected on this sales ticket. It was made out by Gilbert Clover, service man.

Gilbert Clover could furnish no additional information concerning this ship. With the number of planes arriving and departing at Tulsa Mr. Clover stated that it would be by the merest accident that he could recall a pilot or passenger of a strange ship.

Both Mr. Duncan and Mr. Clover mentioned that a short time ago Post Office Inspectors Hill and Haines inquired about this ship and mentioned the fact that it had "Toledo" on the side of the ship.

They also mentioned the fact that this plane could not have come all the way from Hot Springs, Arkansas on 16 gallons of gasoline. 16 gallons would permit this plane to travel from 112 to 120 miles, and it appeared logical that it might have landed at Fort Smith, Arkansas en route where it took on another supply of gasoline before proceeding to Tulsa. The average plane carries a gasoline tank with a capacity of 30 gallons.

Re: Plane License NC5585

The register of the air port at Tulsa, for the period mentioned reflected the following departures and arrivals of this plane:

MARCH 11, 1935 Pilot John Stover, Owner H. G. Harper, Pilot license 21625, Ryan plane, Motor J69, arriving at Tulsa at 1:30 a.m. from Carthage, Missouri and departing 3:20 p.m. for Fort Smith, Arkansas, with a crew of 1 and carrying 2 passengers. This plane had no record of storage overnight which indicates a possible error in the arrival at 1:30 a.m. It was serviced with gasoline on a Spartan Service ticket #9497 made out by Neal (Spartan Air Craft Company).

JUNE 23, 1935 Pilot John Stover, Owner John Stover, arrived from Hot Springs, Arkansas and departed for Hot Springs, carrying a crew of 1 and 1 passenger. No arrival or departure time was recorded, and there was no sales slip showing supplies furnished this ship. It is impossible for this ship to fly from Hot Springs to Tulsa and return without refueling and it is possible that it landed at Fort Smith for gasoline.

AUGUST (?), 1935 Same plane piloted by Earl Ricks, Pilot license 11320, arrived from Oklahoma City with a crew of 1 and 3 passengers. The time of arrival and departure is not recorded. Sales slip was available, dated August 28, 1935, showing that this ship was supplied with 25 gallons of gasoline and there was no storage charge indicating that it departed on the same day. H. N. Gray, service man, serviced this plane and made out the sales ticket. He could recall no information concerning the plane, the pilot, or the passengers.

Mr. Gray had a note that this plane was owned by the Rapid Air Lines in a pocket notebook containing numbers of various ships arriving at the field.

W. T. Neal, Service Manager, for the Spartan Air Craft Company, which maintains an air craft school at the Tulsa Municipal Air Port, the hangar of which is but 100 yards or so from the air port terminal. He produced his copy of Spartan Service Ticket #9497 and stated that he supplied Stover's plane with gasoline on this occasion and that it was charged to H. G. Harper of Carthage, Missouri. Mr. Neal is familiar with Stover and this plane as frequenting the Tulsa air port, although he claims not to be personally acquainted with Stover. Neal checked his records from January 1, 1935 to March 26, 1936 and was unable to find any storage charge on this plane. Concerning his recollections of Stover's arrivals and departures from Tulsa and the passengers who accompanied him, he said that on the occasion of March 11, 1935 he believed that Harper accompanied Stover and paid for the gasoline obtained on that date. During air races at Tulsa the latter part of June, 1935, at which time there were many planes at the air port, Neal recalls that Stover had arrived at the field and in the absence of hangar room, had had his plane staked down outside and stayed at Tulsa for the night. He apparently arrived the evening before and left about 8:00 a.m. the next morning accompanied by two boys, one of them a blonde. Neal did not see Stover on this occasion until they departed. Neal's records reflect that he supplied Stover with 20 gallons of gasoline on June 26, 1935, charged to the Stover Flying Service. He believed this is a separate occasion from that just mentioned. Although he could find no record to substantiate his statement, Neal

believed that Stover arrived sometime in May, 1935 accompanied by one man, stayed in Tulsa for the night and departed the following morning. He described this man as dark complexion, 5' 10" or 6' tall, weight 180 pounds.

Harry Burnes, negro porter at the air port, is the only porter employed there and he has held this position for four years. He stated that he could not recall any particular instances of the arrival and departure of private planes.

M. J. Thompson, driver for the Clover Leaf Taxi Company, has been the air port taxi man for the past four years. He brings all passengers to the planes traveling on commercial tickets and takes all passengers from the air port into Tulsa. At times he is assisted by other Clover Leaf drivers and in the event anyone at the air port desires a taxi, a Clover Leaf Taxi is called. It is not impossible, however, for a party at the air port to call a taxi of their own volition over the pay phones there. Mr. Thompson could not recall anything concerning the arrival and departure of the above mentioned planes.

All of the parties mentioned above were shown a picture of Fred Hunter alias Fred King alias Harold King and could not identify it as anyone whom they had observed at the air port.

Inquiry at the offices of the Clover Leaf Taxi Company reflect that their daily way bills showing addresses of pickup and delivery of passengers are retained for only 30 days and this practice is followed by other cab companies in Tulsa.

It was ascertained from the air port employees interviewed that the Post Office Inspectors mentioned, also made inquiry concerning Reg Robbins of Fort Worth, Texas who also arrived on November 10, 1935 flying a "Travel Air Plane" license NC9815. Robbins is a frequent visitor at the Tulsa Air Port, and is known to the employees there. Post Office Inspectors did not indicate what their interests in Robbins might be.

With reference to Ruth Hamm, alias Connie Morris, alias Ruth Roberson, whose parents reside at Davidson, Oklahoma, and who, it was ascertained through the activities of Agents at Hot Springs, Arkansas following the raid near there on March 30, 1936, is presently reported to be with Karpis and his associates, inquiry was conducted at Davidson, Oklahoma by Special Agent W. A. Giddens. This investigation reflected that Mr. and Mrs. John Bell Hamm have lived at Davidson, Oklahoma for thirty years. Mr. Hamm is supposed to be a plumber, but he works at various trades, more especially on windmills. His reputation in the community is poor, based possibly on the fact that he is a heavy drinker. He has three sons at home, Leonard, age thirty, Howard, age twenty-eight, and Raymond, age sixteen, all of whom work with their father. He has three daughters, Mrs. Raymond Muse, living at Davidson, and reported to be the most reliable one of the family, a younger daughter, name unknown, who is supposed to bear a very poor reputation in Davidson, she is living with the father, and a third daughter named Ruth Hamm, who is obviously the person under investigation in this case. The following description of Ruth was obtained: Age, 23-25;

height, 5' 3"; weight 125-130; build, slightly heavy; hair, dark brown; eyes, believed dark; swarthy complexion; no known marks or scars; considered good-looking. Four years ago, Ruth Hamm married one Curly Roberson, a bootlegger at Frederick, Oklahoma. Approximately three years ago he and his brother were involved in a shooting at Altus, Oklahoma and both received long sentences in McAlester Penitentiary. Shortly thereafter, Ruth obtained a divorce from Curly Roberson. Approximately 1 1/2 years ago she left Davidson, purportedly to go to San Antonio, although it is not definitely established that she did go there. Ruth Hamm was last seen in Davidson about three months ago at which time she was driving a Plymouth Coupe. No description of the Plymouth Coupe or the license number thereon was obtainable. At that time she was supposed to be alone and it was rather definitely ascertained that she has not returned to Davidson since the above-mentioned trip. Ruth Hamm is generally believed to be presently residing in Hot Springs, Arkansas.

She did not have the reputation of being a prostitute at the time she resided in Davidson. The Hamm family receives their mail through General Delivery at the Post Office, Davidson, Oklahoma, where Mr. L. C. Dobbs is Postmaster. Mr. Dobbs is considered reliable, and has been a resident of Davidson for the past thirty years. He advised that several days ago Mrs. Hamm came to the Post Office for mail and at that time told him that she had received a long distance call from Ruth, who was then at Hot Springs, Arkansas. Mrs. Hamm did not tell Mr. Dobbs what the call was about. No one could be found in Davidson, Oklahoma through the discreet inquiries made, who has ever heard of Connie Morris. The telephone operator at Davidson, handling the above-mentioned call, is considered very unreliable, and she was not contacted.

Arrangements were made with John Eubanks, the present night watchman and law enforcement officer at Davidson, who is considered reliable and has been a resident of Davidson for the past 35 years, and L. C. Dobbs, Postmaster, who has also been a resident of Davidson for more than 30 years and is considered reliable, for these two parties to be on the lookout for the return of Ruth Hamm and to immediately notify the Oklahoma City Office by telegram relative to any car or any companions which she might have.

With reference to telegrams directed to the Hamm family at Davidson, Oklahoma, and telegrams sent by the Hamm family, arrangements were made with the Superintendent of the Western Union at Oklahoma City and the local telegraph agent, J. F. Nunn, at Davidson for a cover to be placed on the telegrams for a period of thirty days, beginning April 3, 1936.

With reference to long distance telephone calls for the Hamm family, arrangements were made with L. M. Baker, District Manager of the Southwest Telephone Company at Frederick, Oklahoma, whereby Mr. Baker will notify the Oklahoma City Office immediately by wire of the sources or destinations of any long distance calls made or received for the Hamm family.

These contacts have been continued by Agent Giddens. Mr. Dobbs, the Postmaster at Davidson, Oklahoma, states that the Hamm's receive very little mail. A thirty day mail cover was requested on April 12, 1936. While contacting the Postmaster on April 14, 1936, he advised Agent Giddens that he had a letter addressed to Mrs. Bertie Hamm, Davidson, Oklahoma, bearing the postmark of San Antonio, Texas on April 13, 1936, with the return address of Mrs. Kirkpatrick, 518 S. Presa St., San Antonio, Texas, apparently from Mrs. Hamm's daughter, Dortha. Agent Giddens was in the Post Office at the time Mrs. Hamm called for this letter and overheard the conversation had between Mrs. Hamm and the Postmaster. Mrs. Hamm remarked that the letter was from Dortha, that she had hoped that it would be from Ruth inasmuch as she had not heard from Ruth for so long. Mr. Dobbs remarked that she had daughters scattered all over the country, to which she replied that she had some in Davidson, one in Frederick, one in San Antonio and one in Hot Springs. Mrs. Hamm stated that she had written a letter to her daughter Ruth at 253 1/2 Central Avenue, Hot Springs, Arkansas, which had been mailed by her on March 26, 1936, and was returned with the notation that it had been opened by mistake by Ruth Roberts. She wished to be advised how she could send a letter to her daughter Ruth with the assurance that it would reach her and the Postmaster suggested that she send it by registered mail. She indicated that she would forward a registered letter to her daughter Ruth, and the San Antonio and Little Rock Offices were advised of the foregoing by teletype on April 14, 1936. Mrs. Hamm, in referring to her daughters, was apparently referring to her daughter Bertha Hamm and Mrs. Raymond Muse at Davidson, Mrs. Claud Marshall in Frederick, Oklahoma, Dortha Kirkpatrick in San Antonio, Texas, and Ruth in Hot Springs, Arkansas.

A cover was placed on the mail of Mrs. Claud Marshall, Box 19, Route 1, at Frederick, Oklahoma on April 11, 1936, a sister of Ruth Hamm. This cover had reflected no information of value, to date. Inquiry at Frederick, Oklahoma reflects that Claud Marshall is a respectable tenant farmer and at the present time resides on a farm two miles east and five and a fourth miles south of Frederick, Oklahoma. The rural mail carrier, who serves the Marshall home advised that he had not noticed any strangers or visitors at that place. Investigation failed to reveal any criminal record on Marshall and further reflected that he bears a good reputation.

Under date of April 18, 1936 a letter was addressed to the Oklahoma City Office by Mr. L. C. Dobbs, Postmaster at Davidson, Oklahoma, advising that a letter had just arrived addressed to Miss Bertha Hamm, return address being given of Paul Hayes, Star Route, Chapman Ranch, Texas, bearing the postmark of Corpus Christi, Texas, 1:30 p.m., April 16, 1936. This information was furnished the San Antonio Office by wire on April 19, 1936 and the following day, in view of information being received from Special Agent in Charge Brantley, then conducting investigations in the vicinity of Paris, Texas, to the effect that information had been received that Karpis and his associates had possibly gone to Southern Texas on a hunting trip, this information was furnished Special Agent in Charge Jones of the San Antonio Office by telephone on April 20, 1936.

Close contact is being maintained at Frederick and Davidson, Oklahoma by Agent Giddens, with the sources of information mentioned above.

On April 8, 1936, Special Agent L. E. Kingman was advised by Post Office Inspector Hill at Tulsa, Oklahoma that he had an informant who possessed data indicating that the hideout of the fugitives in this case might be in the vicinity of Claremore, Oklahoma, and that Post Office Inspectors and representatives of the Kansas State Highway Patrol who had been at Hot Springs, Arkansas, were proceeding to Tulsa. Telephonic communication with Special Agent in Charge Fletcher of the Little Rock Office reflected that Special Agents B. L. Damron and F. S. Smith were leaving for Tulsa with Post Office Inspector Haines and Joe Anderson of the Kansas State Highway Patrol, as a result of a telephone call received from Inspector Hill at Tulsa. It will be noted that the town of Owasso is approximately ten miles north of Tulsa and approximately twenty miles west of Claremore, Oklahoma. It appears that the name of this town might have been confused with the name "Warsaw", reported by informant Clayton Hall of the Cleveland Office, as a contact point of the subjects in this case. At the suggestion of Mr. Tamm of the Bureau Special Agent in Charge Dwight Brantley proceeded to Tulsa to engage in this meeting.

The results of this meeting at Tulsa reflected that Post Office Inspector George Hill, through an informant at Claremore, Oklahoma, had ascertained that on the morning of April 4, 1936, Sam Coker came into Claremore, Oklahoma by train and was picked up by a taxi driver, whom he had known for a long time, and taken to the Will Rogers Hotel. At this time Sam Coker was reported to be minus part of his clothing. This informant of Hill's further reported that Milton Lett later arrived by a Frisco train and was taken to the Will Rogers Hotel by the same taxi driver, who was later called to the Hotel by Coker and drove Coker and Lett to a house in the country approximately thirteen miles from Claremore. At this time Coker and Lett are reported to have carried two bags and were in the house for about a half hour, taking the taxi driver's car keys to prevent him leaving. They came out of the house still carrying the bags and talking as if no one was home. They drove down the road a short ways, where they met a man driving a sedan, who was hailed by Coker. This man was unknown to the taxi driver, but was believed to be the man whose house was visited. Coker and this man talked a few minutes and Coker and Lett gave him some money. Still farther down the road, they met a new Studebaker Sedan, which was hailed by Lett. The driver of this car was also unknown to the taxi driver. Neither Lett or Coker discussed Karpis or Campbell within the hearing of the taxi driver and no maroon Buick Sedan or other cars were observed around the vicinity corresponding to those used by the subjects of this case or their associates. The taxi driver purchased a coat for one of the men at Penneys Department Store in Claremore. Coker and Lett apparently checked out of the Will Rogers Hotel at the time the taxi driver was called and subsequently had supper at the taxi driver's home where they waited until train time. They would not permit the taxi driver to go out of their sight, even to the grocery store, having the groceries delivered to his house. They were reported to have purchased two

tickets to St. Louis with pullman reservations and intended leaving Claremore on the evening train but observed an officer at the station who was unknown to them and had the taxi driver take them to Collinsville, Oklahoma, where they purchased two tickets to an unknown destination. They paid the taxi driver \$180.00 for the day including the tickets to St. Louis.

Coker and Lett apparently had plenty of money and it appeared to be their ultimate aim to go to St. Louis. From the conversations overheard by the driver, Coker and Lett had not seen each other for some time and Lett asked for news, and Coker did not talk loud enough to be heard.

Inspector Hill did not wish to disclose the name of his informant and although the Oklahoma City Office can obtain the name of this informant through contacts at Claremore, same is not being done at this time in deference to Inspector Hill. The house to which these men were taken by the taxi driver has been found to belong to one Couch, who is reported to be designated as Coker's guardian.

Special Agent Paul Hansen subsequently talked to Post Office Inspector Hill who stated that he had checked up and found that only one ticket was purchased on the Frisco line from Claremore to St. Louis, Missouri on the night in question and refund was made only on one ticket. The taxi driver, who is Hill's informant, now admits that only one ticket was purchased and that was for the one that he called Lett. He still insists, however, that two men got on the Santa Fe train at Collinsville, although the records of that company fail to show that any cash fares were sold from Collinsville on that train.

According to Inspector Hill, Coker was definitely checked into the Will Rogers Hotel on the date in question, but no one could be found who saw him with anyone. The purchase of the overcoat has been verified, and Tom Dean, a former officer of Claremore, Oklahoma, reports that on the night in question he saw two men riding with the taxi driver informant. The taxi driver insists that these men would "be back in a few days" and that they indicated that they wanted a place where they could come and hole in for a few days.

In this respect, it will be noted that a telephone call was received from Mr. McIntyre of the Bureau on April 14, 1936, advising of a letter received from Mrs. R. L. Hammett of Holdenville, Oklahoma, dated April 10, 1936, reporting a conversation she overheard at Claremore, indicating the possible harboring of Karpis by one Bill Flippen.

Mrs. R. L. Hammett, 805 N. Hinkley Street, Holdenville, Oklahoma was interviewed by Special Agent R. N. Butterworth and stated that on Saturday night, three or four weeks ago, which would have been March 21st or 28th, 1936, she drove to Claremore, Oklahoma with her husband, about 10:00 o'clock at night and they parked their car in front of the Will Rogers Hotel while Mr. Hammett conducted some personal business. Mrs. Hammett lay down in the front seat of the car and states that just before 11:00 P. M. two men came to a car parked by the side of their's and she heard one of them remark, "If Bill Flippen doesn't

quit letting Karpis hang around, he will get into trouble with the Federals". These men got into the automobile and drove away. Mrs. Hammett states that she was too frightened to make any observations until the car was too far away for any identification. Mrs. Hammett, through her brother-in-law, James Hammett, of Claremore, Oklahoma, who is employed by The Messenger, a Claremore newspaper, understands that Bill Flippen bears a bad reputation as a bootlegger and gambler in Claremore, Oklahoma, and operates a club house on a ranch situated near the Verdigris River near Claremore, which is accessible only through several gates, making it impossible for a stranger to approach the club house unobserved.

Inspector Hill subsequently advised Agent Hansen that Tom Dorn, previously mentioned, approached the informant's employer, Bill Flippen, and asked him to find out where the informant had hauled Coker; as a result of this inquiry, Flippen fired the informant and Hill reports that Bill Flippen, Jack Miller (a participant in the robbery of the Okemah National Bank and First National Bank at Okemah, Oklahoma, who was granted immunity for his testimony for the Government, and believed to still be of value to the Oklahoma City Office as an informant on activities in the vicinity of Claremore, Oklahoma) and Chicken Smart, well known outlaw in this vicinity, are in some combination with the Chief of Police to control activities in or around Claremore. One Ray Parks is apparently associated with them, and due to enmity existing between Parks and Coker, it was believed that Coker was seeking an opportunity to kill Parks. Inspector Hill is endeavoring to get the informant's job back for him, inasmuch as it is essential in the event Coker returns to Claremore.

According to this informant of Inspector Hill's, Coker related to him that "they" plan to pull a big bank job in Arkansas between May 4th and 14th, and Coker wishes to come to the informant's home "for a couple of days" following this bank job, and so far as the informant knows, he will be alone. In one of his conversations with this informant, Inspector Hill states that they passed the Claremore Air Port and the informant remarked, "That reminds me of another thing, Sam said 'We've lost our pilot' and he wanted to know if I could get another pilot for them". Coker seemed to want someone who was familiar with the Claremore Air Port. This informant further related to Hill that while he was in Coker's hotel room in Nowata, Oklahoma sometime ago, or on his recent visit to Claremore, he saw a lot of money in Coker's bag, most of it in \$20.00 bills, and apparently new. The informant described some of this money as in long sheets of several bills to a sheet. The Bureau was requested in a letter dated April 17, 1936 to check the bank robbery files of the Bureau to determine whether any new or uncut money had been taken in any unsolved bank robberies.

One Marion Pike is an alleged associate of Harry Campbell, and Special Agent Hansen endeavored to locate him at Peggs, Oklahoma. Agent Hansen ascertained that Pike's brother-in-law, Harry Griffith, resides at 1115 1/2 North Geary Street, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Efforts will be made to ascertain the location of Pike through this brother-in-law.

Further inquiries are being conducted at Claremore, Oklahoma to determine the activities and associations of Bill Flippen and the possibility of his maintaining a hideout for the fugitives in this case. Special Agent Paul Hansen has continued his efforts at Coffeyville, Kansas, Nowata, Oklahoma, Tulsa, Oklahoma, and other points in those vicinities, with the view to obtaining any information regarding the present location of the subjects in this case, and particularly in an effort to locate Milton Lett. On March 14, 1936 a confidential informant, known as Mr. South, of South Coffeyville, Oklahoma, advised that Louis Thornton, alias Snipe Thornton came to his place, seeking to contact Milton Lett and reported that if Mr. South should see him to tell him to come to Nettie Fair's farm, Route #1, Anderson, Missouri, indicating that this was a good place to "lay around and kill time". Subsequent investigation was conducted at this point by Agent Hansen and Agents of the Kansas City Office, the results of which were reported by the Kansas City Office.

Agent Hansen ascertained through Fred Hill of South Coffeyville, Oklahoma, who is known as Sandy Hill, a brother of Gus Hill and a cousin of Tom Hill, that early Saturday morning, March 21, 1936, according to information furnished to Hill by one of the employees in his "drug store", Sam Coker was in his place with two other men and a woman. One man was described as "kind of an old man" whom they called Dutch, and they had no information as to who the others were. Dutch probably relates to Dutch Bowman, alias Jack Bowman, alias Charles E. Bowman, previously referred to in this file.

Photographs of Dutch Bowman, alias Jack Bowman, alias Charles E. Bowman, have been obtained. He is described as follows:

A photograph of Dutch Bowman should be exhibited to Wynona Burdette, now incarcerated at the United States Detention Farm at Milan, Michigan, to determine whether he is the party named Dutch at whose place Wynona states Campbell stopped near Joplin, Missouri. A photograph of Bowman is attached to the Detroit copies of this report.

In continuance of efforts to locate Milton Lett through his mother-in-law, Mrs. Ferris, Agent Hansen ascertained from her that her parents are dead and that she has one sister, Eva Hooper, who is a Chaperon at Ricken Hall, a girls' dormitory at the University of Kansas, Lawrence, Kansas. The paternal grandfather of Lucille (Milt Lett's wife), is Andrew Ferris of Meadville, Missouri,

and she has two paternal aunts, Bernice Elliston, and Mrs. John Hopper, both of Meadville, Missouri. The Ferris' are not on speaking terms with Mrs. John Hopper and Lucille is reported not to like her grandfather. However, she is very fond of her aunts, Bernice Elliston and Eva Hooper. Mrs. Ferris has promised to communicate with these last two relatives for the purpose of locating Lucille in the event she might communicate with these aunts. It is believed, however, advisable for an Agent of the Kansas City Office to also interview them.

Covers on the mail of members of the Coker family at Nowata, Oklahoma, are being continued. These relatives, as furnished by Assistant Postmaster Bill Estlin, of Nowata, Oklahoma, are as follows:

Deputy Sheriff Gene Haverfield and police officer John Courts, of Nowata, Oklahoma, advised that they are keeping a close watch for any activities in and around Nowata that may indicate any present connections of Sam Coker. These men will be frequently contacted.

Ruth Drake Collins, 602 Sycamore Street, Coffeyville, Kansas, is a very close associate of Lucille Ferris Lett and it is believed that if the wife of Milton Lett corresponds with anyone, it will be with this girl. A cover was placed upon her mail on April 10, 1936.

On April 13, 1936 Agent Hansen arranged with Harry Wilbourn, superintendent of mails, Tulsa, Oklahoma, to place a cover on all mail received at 2539 East Fourth Place, home of T. F. Bash; 1016 South St. Louis Avenue, home of R. R. Lobaugh; 1020 South St. Louis Avenue and 601 Oklahoma Building, home and office of D. L. Farrell, all of Tulsa and friends of the Campbell family, and a continuation of a cover at 818 South Rockford Avenue, the Campbell home. So far the tracings received have no apparent connection with this case.

With reference to the confidential letter to the Director from the Kansas City Office, wherein Q. P. McGhee names several alleged contacts of this gang and the first one mentioned is "Red" Henderschott of Peoria, Illinois. Henderschott was renting Tom Hill's airplane hangar when the Union Gas Company was robbed by Harry Campbell and others. The robbers apparently drove into this

hanger and stayed during the day of the robbery and left that night. Tom Hill has recently been convicted for complicity in this robbery and received a life sentence in Montgomery County in Kansas. Henderschott testified against Hill at this trial and Hill has told Agent Hansen numerous times of how he dislikes Henderschott for the lies he has told about him. Hill has said that he does not think that Karpis and Campbell would go around Henderschott and if he does think so it would appear that he would give this information to Agent Hansen to cause Henderschott some trouble. While it is known that Henderschott is acquainted with Harry Campbell, it would not seem that he would be considered a very good contact for these fugitives in view of the testimony he gave at the Tom Hill trial at Independence, Kansas. This angle is being mentioned here for the information of the Bureau, inasmuch as Tom Hill is supposed to be the source of McGhee's information that Henderschott is a contact of this mob.

Harvey Pugh, Tulsa gambler, has recently been sent to the Kansas state prison for implication in a murder at McPherson, Kansas which was committed by Campbell, Gene Johnson, et al. He had agreed to furnish any information he received with respect to Harry Campbell to George Stewart, former police captain in Tulsa who was recently murdered in a night club near Tulsa. It is suggested that an Agent from the Kansas City Office interview him with respect to his knowledge of Harry Campbell.

With reference to a letter from the Kansas City Office to the Oklahoma City Office dated April 7, 1936, Post Office Box 532 at Hominy, Oklahoma, inquiries disclosed, is rented to Artie Shedd. She has two sons, Troy, who is working for some oil drilling company in Kansas, and Leonard, who is at home. Johnny Straight also receives his mail in this box and lives with the Sheds. Straight spends most of his time driving for some of the well-to-do Osage Indians. The Sheds have a fair reputation. The photographs of subjects in this case and especially that of Lett, could not be identified at the Hominy Post Office by the employees there. Chief of Police Lon Dabney frequently passes the Shedd home and has never noticed any strangers there, and the Sheds have lived in Hominy for several years. Chief Dabney could not remember, by his photograph, of ever seeing Lett in Hominy and he does not think the Shedd family would be associated with outlaws. The distribution clerk at the Hominy Post Office recalled the letter addressed to Mr. and Mrs. Bill Lucas, Wichita, Kansas, bearing the return address of Box 532, Hominy, Oklahoma, being returned as unclaimed and that he put it in Box 532 and nothing more was heard of it. The Kansas City Office was of the opinion that this letter might have been from Milt Lett.

Charlie Stephens, Room #8, 920 1/2 South Boston Avenue, Tulsa, Oklahoma, the former husband of Edith Campbell, was interviewed. He advised that he had known Edith only a part of one day when they were married that night while both were intoxicated. They lived together eighteen months and are now divorced. He said that he does not know Harry Campbell and has never seen him that he knows of and did not know that Edith Majors was a sister of the outlaw, Harry Campbell, until after he married her. He said that the Campbell family seldom mention Harry's name but all seem to think a lot of him. All of the family, including

Edith, gave him the impression that they knew nothing about where Harry was and did not hear from him. The elder Campbells, he says, are good and honest people and their death is being hastened by worry over their outlaw son. Edith, he advised, is very friendly toward Harry and always speaks kindly toward him, which is in contradiction to many other reports which have indicated that Harry and Edith did not get along and were not friendly with each other. Stephens claimed that he did not know who Edith is keeping company with at present and when advised that it is Harry Sherrill he said that he knew of him but was not acquainted with him. He said that he was satisfied that Sherrill and Harry Campbell are acquainted but did not know whether they would be in communication with each other or not. He said that Edith had told him that her "boy friend" was a married man who deals in oil royalties and she would not tell Charlie what his name is for fear it would be embarrassing to him and his family. Charlie said that he had never heard of Sherrill and Harry Campbell being together, or operating together, and does not think Sherrill is the type of person Campbell would want with him. Stephens said that he has heard nothing about Campbell except what he has read in the newspapers and does not think he will ever hear where Campbell is but he promised to advise Agent Hansen of anything he hears with respect to this case. Stephens operates some punch boards in Tulsa and works part time at the Schlitz Tavern, 823 South Main Street, phone 5-8821.

Special Agent J. H. Rice and the writer conducted extensive investigation in the vicinity of Ada, Oklahoma, in an effort to locate Earl Collins, who is the brother of two brothers-in-law of Milton Lett. He was finally located as an employee of the Stanolind Oil Company at a pumping station located one mile north of the Mi-Jo Camp near Oil Center, which is twelve miles northwest of Ada, Oklahoma. He was interviewed under pretext in order to verify his true identity since inquiry in the neighborhood failed to establish his past history.

Bert E. Ratliff, Postal carrier on Route 2 out of Ada, delivers mail to Earl Collins. He has observed no one answering the description of Lett visiting there, nor any cars similar to those that Lett might be driving.

W. E. Taylor, merchant of Oil Center, and recommended as reliable, stated that he has known Earl Collins since 1929; that he has observed no one answering the description of Lett or driving any cars which Lett might be driving visiting the Collinses. He considers Collins trustworthy and straightforward.

Lloyd Wynick, Route 2, Ada, Oklahoma, is an adjacent neighbor of Earl Collins and was recommended as being discreet and trustworthy. He has not observed anyone answering Lett's description or driving cars the description of those which Lett might be driving visiting the Collins' house.

Each of these men was shown the photograph of Lett and furnished the address of the Oklahoma City Office, promising to notify the Oklahoma City Office in the event they observed anything of anyone which might be of interest in this matter.

Through Wilbur Lee, Superintendent of Mails at the Ada Post Office, a check was made of the Post Office records to determine whether Milton Lett, under his correct name or under the names of Thomas J. Shaw or Carl Baker is now or has been receiving mail there, but without results. Photograph of Lett was exhibited to Mr. Lee, as well as General Delivery clerks T. W. Rowzee, Mrs. Earl Bruner and L. J. Thompson. They did not recall anyone whose appearance resembled this photograph calling for mail at Ada. A watch will be maintained to ascertain if anyone by these names receives mail at the Ada Post Office. Mrs. Bruner recalled that a week or ten days prior to the inquiry, so far as her recollection serves her, she had a letter addressed to M. Lett in care of General Delivery, which was not called for and was returned to the sender. She could recall no other circumstances concerning this letter as to the return address, postmark, etc.

Deputy U. S. Marshal Allen Stanfield, was shown the photograph of Lett, as well as the photograph of Lett's wife (which was also exhibited to the other parties mentioned above), and advised that he would keep the information confidential, and should he observe anyone answering these descriptions, he would communicate with the Oklahoma City Office.

at Tulsa, Oklahoma

Special Agents F. S. Smith and L. E. Kingman on March 26, 1936 conducted an interview with Carolyn Sherrill alias Johnnie Sherman alias Mrs. Ben Trent alias Pauline Trent. This woman has been for several years the moll of George (Burrhead) Keady. She was located at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Conover, 1912 West Archer Place, Telephone #2-6933. Telephone cover on this individual which has been maintained for some time at Tulsa, revealed that she has moved two or three times recently and that the only parties with whom she has held telephone conversations are Lola Chandler who resides at 316 East 13th, Telephone #4-7483, and John Brock prior to his apprehension by postal inspectors. The conversations with Brock were generally to the beer joint he operated at the Lincoln Hotel.

She stated that she had married Harry Sherrill in 1923. (Harry Sherrill is an individual mentioned several times in reports of investigations conducted at Tulsa, and is the present intimate of Edith Campbell). She stated that she divorced Sherrill about a year ago in Tulsa and had not lived with him since his conviction and sentence to the United States Penitentiary on narcotic charges.

She stated that she had met George Keady about six years ago and had become intimate with him shortly thereafter; that she and Keady never actually lived together but that Keady has maintained her in an apartment and paid all of her expenses for over five years. She stated that the reason for her moving about recently from place to place, was because while she was living on 13th Street, Mrs. Keady called her up two or three times and threatened her, and that she has been moving about to dodge Mrs. Keady. She stated that during the period she has been intimate with Keady she has lived at the Burns Apartments, 710 South Elgin, this being in the summer of 1930; that she then lived at 1312 South Elgin for three years; then at 214 1/2 East 13th Street for one year and three months; thence to an apartment on 12th Street; and on March 4th or 5th, 1936, to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Conover where she was found.

She denied knowing that Keady had been in any trouble and stated that as far as she knew, his only underworld activities were confined to gambling and maintaining bookie joints. She stated that she knew nothing of the trouble in connection with the Garrettsville, Ohio mail robbery until she read in the newspapers about Keady being arrested. She stated that she has not seen much of Keady during the past year and that there have been times when he has been away from her for five or six weeks at a time. She stated that prior to the arrest of Keady she had not seen him for about a week and did not know where he had gone; that this was about the middle of February. She stated that Keady was a hard drinker and that she did not drink and that when Keady was on a drunk he kept away from her.

She stated that Keady worked for George Hereford, Tulsa gambling king; that he did not pal with anyone, and that the only hangout he frequented was the beer place operated by John Brock at the Lincoln Hotel. She stated she did not know if Keady owned this place or if Brock owned it.

She claimed that after she read in the papers about Keady's arrest, she telephoned Brock to get the details. At the time of this interview it was apparent that she did not know that Brock had been apprehended. She stated she had not heard from him for several days and did not know where he was. She denied knowing anything about Mrs. Keady having gone to Cleveland, and she lied about this because copies of the telephone conversations show that Brock telephoned her immediately after Mrs. Keady took the train for Cleveland.

She stated that since Keady's arrest she has no source of income and is without funds and is looking for a job. She stated that during her association with Keady he did not bring others to her apartment with the exception of some of the men who worked with him in gambling establishments. She stated that she had not been on many trips out of Tulsa with Keady, but went to Kansas City once with him, three or four years ago; and made two or three trips with him to Oklahoma City; and on one or two occasions went with Keady to South Coffeyville, Oklahoma where they visited Tommy Hill and his wife. She stated that her last trip with Keady was to Tommy Hill's home about two months ago, and shortly after the trial of Tommy Hill at Independence, Kansas. She stated at this time Keady talked privately with Tommy Hill for awhile, out of her hearing, and she does not know what they talked about.

In checking over the persons who should be known to Carolyn Sherrill she stated that she did not know Sam Coker, and so far as she knows, had never seen him; that she has never seen or heard of Milt Lett. She stated that she knows nothing of Alvin Karpis except what she has read in the papers, and that she only knows Harry Campbell through newspaper stories. She stated that on one occasion when Keady was supposed to come to see her that he was two or three hours late in coming, and stated that he had been talking to a Government man who had come to his house, and that he had known Harry Campbell several years ago when Campbell was a kid, and that the Government man was out to his house talking to him about Campbell. She stated that Keady told her that he did not know where Harry Campbell could be located. She stated that she had heard of Dutch Monteith; that she remembers that Monteith used to run dogs at the dog track in Tulsa several years ago. She stated that she does not know of any connections between Monteith and John Brock. She stated that all she knows about John Brock is that two or three years ago he came back to Tulsa, supposedly from serving time in the penitentiary; that he was broke and ill, and that Keady helped him. She stated that she knew Dutch Bowman; that he was a man about 50 years of age and had white hair. She stated that she has not seen Bowman for over a year; that he does not live in Tulsa any more; that Bowman used to stay at Keady's house at different times when visiting Tulsa, and at

one time lived in Tulsa; that Bowman had a woman named Anna, but that he and Anna split up and that Anna later married someone else. She stated that Keady told her recently that Dutch Bowman was living in Joplin, Missouri and that Bowman had been to Tulsa several times during the past year. She stated that Keady told her of these visits but that she did not see Dutch. She stated that she does not know where Dutch Bowman lives in Joplin and does not know if he is operating some joint there or not.

She stated that Lola Chandler who resides at 316 East 13th Street, Tulsa, was a nurse, and that this person has been an intimate friend of hers for several years, and prior to her meeting with Keady. She stated that Lola Chandler does not go out with men at all and knows nothing about Keady and Keady's associates.

She stated that she was quite certain that Keady was not in on the Garretttsville job as she did not believe he was gone long enough from Tulsa during the first part of November to have participated. She stated that the only trip that she knew about that Keady had taken in the past year, away from Tulsa for any length of time, was a trip that he took to Florida last summer. She said that Keady had taken his wife and his wife's niece named Dorothy, who lives with them, to see Keady's father and mother who reside at Miami, Florida. She stated that she does not know the address of Keady's parents in Miami. She stated that Keady and his wife and her niece stayed in Miami two or three weeks.

She stated that she believed Keady had been on a drunk in Joplin, Missouri during the week before his apprehension at Tulsa, but that she did not know this to be true. She stated that Keady was a man who was very careful to keep his activities to himself, and that he had never confided in her as to any underworld activities, and that so far as she knew, all of his income was derived from his gambling activities. She stated that his method of keeping her up was merely to provide her periodically with sufficient funds to pay her rent, living expenses, clothing, etc. It was quite evident that Carolyn Sherrill could not be developed as a confidential informant.

Her description as obtained by personal observation is as follows:

Criminal Record: Claims none

She was not taken into formal custody and therefore was not fingerprinted.

At the close of the interview with Carolyn Sherrill, she was requested to keep strictly confidential the fact that she had been contacted by Bureau agents, and not to discuss this incident or the subject matter of the interview with anyone. This she promised to do as directed.

Subsequent to the interview with her, a telephone conversation was observed between her and Lola Chandler. The conversation occurred at 3:30 P.M. on March 26, 1936. In this conversation she advised Lola that someone had been to see her to talk to her about Keady's trouble, and she advised Lola that Lola might also be contacted, and that she was not supposed to divulge anything about Keady's friends or anyone else he knows. Both Carolyn and Lola indicated that they were of the opinion their telephones were being watched.

Special Agent J. R. Welles interviewed Charles Davis, #31276, Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, relative to his knowledge of the contacts and associates of Harry Campbell. Davis is serving a five year sentence for harboring Glenn LeRoy Wright. Davis stated he rented his farm to Harry Campbell, Glenn LeRoy Wright and Gene Johnson, whom he claims to have known as "Shorty" Burdette, "Pap" Williamson and "Whitey" Willifer, respectively. These men told him at the time they rented the farm that they were running beer and whiskey. He appeared sincere in his desire to be of aid, if possible, claiming Campbell and the others were the cause of his arrest. He claimed to know nothing about Campbell's contacts or associates, stating that he had very little to do with them; however, on questioning, he did state that one Joe Quick, known as "Speedy", and his girl stayed with the above parties most of the time they were at his farm. Harry Campbell had a girl there, as did Gene Johnson, but he never saw any woman with Wright. Joe Quick and his girl are probably the "Speedy" and "Ruth" mentioned on page 22 of the report of Special Agent Paul Hansen, Oklahoma City, February 26, 1936. Joe Quick is presently at liberty. His address is unknown, but he occasionally visits his brother, Charlie Quick, #26687, Oklahoma State Penitentiary. According to Davis, Joe Quick did have a barbecue stand on S.W. 29th Street, Oklahoma City, but was supposed to have moved to Seminole, Oklahoma. He may presently be associating with Grady McMurtrey as McMurtrey is understood to be in Seminole.

Efforts were made to locate George McMurtrey at Seminole as Grady McMurtrey, Oklahoma State Penitentiary #13015, is supposed to live with George. A Violet McMurtrey was located living with A. J. Mullins, 224 Timmons Street, but she is Mrs. Mullins' sister and had recently moved from Denver, Colorado. She knew of no other McMurtreys in Seminole.

W. L. Hughes, Superintendent of Mails, Seminole, Oklahoma, said a McMurtrey family calls for mail at General Delivery. He and Mr. Edgar Mason, Assistant Postmaster, agreed to attempt to learn the address of these persons and advise this office.

Jake Sims, Chief of Police, Bob Short, Amarada Oil Company, and Chris Whitson, Carter Oil Company, all agreed to endeavor to learn whether there is a McMurtrey family in Seminole, and advise this office. I

Subsequent efforts on the part of Special Agent C. S. Duggan at Seminole, Oklahoma, through the parties mentioned above, failed to develop any information as to the location of McMurtrey. Special Agent Paul Hansen ascertained that George P. McMurtrey, father of Grady McMurtrey, and his family had moved to a house on Parthenia Lake, seven or eight miles southwest of Tulsa, Oklahoma. Inquiry there by Agent Hansen reflected that Grady McMurtrey is presently working on a farm in Oregon, where his wife and young son are with him. The only address the parents of Grady have of Grady McMurtrey is R.F.D. (number not known), Salem, Oregon.

For the information of the Portland Office at this point, it is to be noted that Grady McMurtrey at one time was interviewed at the Tulsa Police Department, at which time he admitted being acquainted with members of the Barker-Karpis gang and provided information indicating that Tom Hill of South Coffeyville, Oklahoma was a probable contact of the gang. At that time McMurtrey agreed to become a confidential informant of the Bureau. The Portland Office should endeavor to locate McMurtrey and conduct a discreet investigation to determine whether McMurtrey might presently be in communication with either Karpis or Campbell.

Efforts were made by Agent John R. Welles through Bob Short and Chris Whitson to locate Roland Williams, Oklahoma State Penitentiary #19237, referred to on page 25 of the report of Special Agent Paul Hansen, Oklahoma City February 26, 1936, supposed to be living at Seminole. It was the understanding of Mr. Short and of Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Mayes, who run a store near the Amerada Lease, that Williams lived near or knew Lyman Conner, a roustabout for the Amerada. Mr. and Mrs. Mayes positively identified Williams' picture as a man who about a year and a half ago was staying in that neighborhood and buying large quantities of sandwich material and other food, which they thought he was taking to friends.

On March 25th, 1936 Lyman Conner was located and interviewed on the Amerada lease, four miles west and one south of Edmond, Oklahoma. According to Mr. Short, Conner is absolutely reliable. Conner advised that he had never heard of Roland Williams and failed to identify Williams' picture. As the place where Conner lived at Seminole is in a sparsely settled district, it is possible that Williams was hiding out in that neighborhood, but not contacting the Conner farm. Williams may be associating with Grady McMurtrey and/or Joe Quick, although no trace could be found of him being in Seminole since over a year ago McMurtrey, Williams, or Quick could be presently associating with or contacting Harry Campbell.

Glenn LeRoy Wright, Oklahoma State Penitentiary #29585 was interviewed by Special Agent J. R. Welles at the State Penitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma. Wright appears to believe that he is a master criminal, was very talkative, but stated that he talks to officers only to see if they will drop a hint which will be of value to him later. He claims that he can contact Campbell or at least get word to him within twenty-four hours if he were "on the outside". He indicated that the only possibility of getting out, however would be to escape. Wright classed Campbell as a coward, who always pushed one else to the front and claimed that where he and others had been wounded associating with Campbell, Campbell always came out without a scratch. Wright claims that Campbell "took out on him" at the time Gene Johnson was killed that he hasn't seen him since that time. Wright stated that although he might be accused of "laying the job on dead men" that he was with Fred Barker and Frank Nash shortly before and shortly after they killed J. Earl Smith, the attorney, and that Harry Campbell, Jew Eddy, and Jimmie Lawson had nothing to do with it. He denied being present at the time Smith was killed. Upon t

remark that he probably didn't know any contacts of Campbell unknown to the Bureau, Wright stated "What about Hot Springs?". Wright then stated that he understood the Bureau had that "little punk" contact of Campbell's on the run, and although he mentioned no names, it was gathered that he referred to Milton Lett. Wright ventured the opinion that although Wynona Burdette has talked, Campbell is so crazy about her that he will probably return to her as soon as he can. According to penitentiary officials, Wright's mother and brother visit him frequently and are probably the ones who keep him in touch with the outside world.

Eddie Snyder, alias Eddie Moss, alias Jew Eddy, Oklahoma State Penitentiary #27076, was interviewed by Special Agent J. E. Welles, and claimed he, as well as Wright, had been offered about everything to talk. He said he would give no information either while in the penitentiary or after he has completed his twenty-five year sentence concerning anyone. He claims he is being used as a "target for bum raps", and more especially the killing of Attorney J. Earl Smith at Tulsa. He was asked if he knew any contacts or associates of Harry Campbell and said that he knew none and wouldn't give the information if he did. He repeated this statement several times. There appeared to be no use in questioning him further.

On the morning of March 7, 1936 Post Office Inspector George E. Hill was observed at the Muskogee City Jail. Chief of Detectives Ed Corbin stated that Hill was there in connection with the arrest of Johnny Ryan on March 6, 1936 by Narcotic Officers as a fugitive from Fort Worth, Texas. Corbin stated that Ryan had requested that Post Office Inspectors be notified of his desire to communicate with them inasmuch as "he knows all about the Garrettsville Mail Robbery". According to Corbin, Ryan is a close associate of Burrhead Keady. Corbin does not know whether he possesses any information of value in connection with the Garrettsville robbery, but promised to have a talk with Ryan before he is removed to Fort Worth, in an effort to determine what information he may possess. It was not deemed expedient to talk to Hill or to Ryan at this time.

On March 12, 1936 Roy Bridgess, Federal Narcotic Agent, in Oklahoma City, stated that Ryan is one of those individuals who communicates a lot of information to the police concerning criminal activities and the movements of criminals. According to Bridgess, most of Ryan's information is no good and he does not believe Ryan actually possesses any information of value concerning the Garrettsville mail robbery.

On April 3, 1936 Colonel Wint Smith, Superintendent of the Kansas State Highway Patrol, Topeka, Kansas, advised the Oklahoma City Office by long distance telephone that he had two men on a surveillance of an alleged hideout of Karpis and other subjects, near the Arkansas-Missouri state line. According to Smith, this alleged hideout was occupied by one Art Hulbrook, an ex-convict who has made boasts that he has been with Karpis on various jobs. Hulbrook, according to Smith, left Fayetteville, Arkansas at 9:00 p.m., April 2,

1936 by train for Cincinnati, Ohio, and from statements made by him, he anticipated joining Karpis and his associates to participate in some job. Colonel Smith stated that he had no way of handling the situation, which is the reason he furnished the information to this office. He described Hulbrook as height, 5' 10 or 11"; build, slender; brown hair; brown eyes; thick lips; wearing a dark suit, light hat, no overcoat, and a diamond stickpin in his necktie.

This information was furnished to the Cincinnati Office by long distance telephone and a reply received on April 4, 1936 that all incoming and outgoing trains had been checked in an effort to locate Hulbrook, without success.

It was ascertained that there are two towns in Oklahoma, popular as bath resorts, and in accordance with Bureau instructions, identification orders on the subjects in this case were furnished to the following bath houses:

The continued surveillance of the Campbell residence in Tulsa has resulted in no information of value. The log covering this surveillance from March 15, 1936 to April 3, 1936, is as follows:

In view of the fact that the surveillance previously maintained at 320 South Rockford Street, in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and occupied by Special Agents C. J. Endres and W. L. Buchanan, had apparently been uncovered by the Campbell family, this plant was discontinued on April 3, 1936.

On March 18, 1936, after discreet inquiry in the neighborhood of the 300 block, South Rockford Street, Tulsa, Oklahoma, it was ascertained that W. F. Emerson, 805 South Rockford, wished to rent his house, furnished. After discreet inquiry of the various credit agencies in Tulsa and Burton D. Starr, 1423 East 8th Street, Tulsa, who appears reliable, it was ascertained that Mr. Emerson and his wife keep to themselves, do not associate widely in the neighborhood and could be relied upon to hold any facts coming to their knowledge in strict confidence. Accordingly, these individuals were apprised of the purpose for which the Bureau wished to rent their house, and a plant was established there, occupied by Special Agents M. W. Acers, and V. I. Parry, on March 24, 1936. This house is on the opposite side of the street from the Campbell residence and is approximately forty yards away.

The owners of the last two cars mentioned will be given appropriate attention, although it does not appear that any information of value may be developed therefrom.

It may also be noted that the Ford car previously belonging to Harry Campbell and presently in custody of his father, now bears 1936 Oklahoma license No. 289-451.

On April 17, 1936 Agent Parry reported that the 1934 Ford Tudor, bearing 1936 Arkansas plates No. 147-216, had pulled up in front of the Campbell residence and stopped for about two minutes and after talking with a woman who came along the street, drove away. The Little Rock Office reported that these plates were issued to Mrs. E. M. Sydnor, residing near Hot Springs, Arkansas. The Little

Rock Office was requested to check the associations and activities of this party for any possible connection with the subjects in this case.

With reference to the report of Special Agent J. C. White, dated April 11, 1936 at San Antonio, Texas, concerning one Harry Deveaux, it is to be noted that Russell Cooper was apprehended at Fort Smith, Arkansas and not in Oklahoma and that no Oklahoma officers participated in his apprehension, nor did any Agents of the Oklahoma City Office or any other Federal officers in Oklahoma. It was not necessary to put Cooper on the spot, inasmuch as he was a resident of Fort Smith, Arkansas, and was well known there as the "Bootleg King" at the time of his arrest on the charges of bank robbery. He is unknown to the Oklahoma City Office as an informant, and there is no record of any Harry Deveaux in the Oklahoma City Office.

Communication with the Oklahoma State Penitentiary concerning Harry Deveaux, reflects the possibility of the Deveaux in question being identical with George E. Roberts, OSP #11227 and OSP #13604, wherein his aliases are given as George Mack, G. E. McGee, Walter H. Bailey, H. W. Gilbert, H. O. Miller, Harry W. Scott, H. A. Huhn, Harry W. DeVore, Walter H. Scott. He is described as age 37 (1921); Height, 5' 9 5/8"; Weight, 159 lbs.; build, medium slender; eyes, brown, hair, dk. chestnut; complexion, medium dark; nativity, China; teeth, 1 G.C.; Occupation, clerk; residence, Houston, Texas. A copy of his photograph is being forwarded to the San Antonio Office with copies of this report.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS: THE OKLAHOMA CITY OFFICE will continue its investigative efforts in accordance with information set forth in this report.

THE PORTLAND OFFICE is requested to endeavor to locate Grady McMurtrey near Salem, Oregon and conduct discreet inquiry to determine whether he may be in communication with either Karpis or Campbell, in view of his past associations with Campbell.

THE DETROIT OFFICE is requested to interview Wynona Burdette at the U. S. Detention Farm, Milan, Michigan, exhibiting to her the photograph of Dutch Bowman to determine whether he is the party at whose place Wynona says Campbell stopped near Joplin, Missouri.

THE KANSAS CITY OFFICE will interview Eva Hooper, Ricken Hall, Lawrence, Kansas, and Bernice Elliston, Meadville, Missouri, aunts of Lucille Ferris Lett, with the view to obtaining such information as is available at these sources relative to Milton Lett's present whereabouts.

It is requested that the Kansas City Office at Lansing, Kansas interview Harvey Pugh, recently sentenced there on a conviction of murder, in accordance with the information contained on page 12 of this report.

THE SAN ANTONIO OFFICE, in accordance with previous telephonic request, will conduct appropriate discreet inquiries in vicinity of Chapman Ranch, Texas with the view to determining whether Karpis and his associates are frequenting that vicinity.

Although investigative leads are not being set out for all offices receiving copies of this report, it is suggested that the same be reviewed for any information of value or leads in connection with investigations presently being conducted by those offices in this case.

Reference is made to previous correspondence indicating the possibility that Sam Coker and Milton Lett, persons intimately associated with subjects Karpis and Campbell, may proceed to St. Louis, Missouri, or East St. Louis, Illinois in the near future.

Please be advised that recent information developed at Toledo, Ohio, indicates that a hoodlum by the name of Joker Kennedy, who resides in Toledo, Ohio, but who is thought to have originated either from St. Louis, Missouri, or East St. Louis, Illinois, is associated in Toledo, Ohio, with one Ed McGraw, and the latter is thought to be an intimate contact of subjects Karpis and Campbell.

Detective Harry K. Manson of the Prosecutor's office at Toledo, Ohio, advised that Joker Kennedy has some interest in a hot bond ring, which has ramifications reaching into East St. Louis, Illinois. In the last mentioned city it is reported there are two Jewish hoodlums, one whose name is thought to be either Goldstein, or Bernstein, who operate a cigar store as a front, and in the rear of this cigar store they operate a gambling den. These two individuals are reported to be well known in the hot bond racket and are thought to have been arrested some time in the past in connection with their hot bond activities. Joker Kennedy is thought to be closely associated with these two Jewish hoodlums.

Recent information developed by Special Agent K. J. Dowd of this office indicates that the post office inspectors have a woman confidential informant at Tulsa, Oklahoma, who recently advised the post office inspectors that Milton Lett and Sam Coker are presently at East St. Louis, Illinois, drinking plenty of Budweiser beer and waiting for the gang to assemble there and pull a job.
