IT DOESN'T PAY

HARRY CAMPBELL, who pleaded guilty to his part in the Bremer kidnaping, confessed that he received only \$7,000 of the \$200,000 ransom.

He also confessed his disappointment in the smallness of the stake. For \$7,000 "easy money" he will now spend the rest of his days in prison.

Thomas H. Robinson, Jr., kidnaper of Mrs. Alice Speed Stoll, who has confessed hitting her over the head with a piece of pipe—an act that now places his own life in jeopardy—told his captors, the G-men, that he had to "pay plenty" for protection out of the \$50,000 ransom. He did not specify further but undoubtedly meant that it costs a lot to keep suspicious persons quiet. At any rate he had \$2,360 of the ransom money on him when arrested.

These two men, to say nothing of the others rounded up for these sensational crimes, will subscribe now to the truth of the statement that crime does not pay.

Mrs. William Elmer Mead was interviewed at this office today and stated that in the latter part of January, 1936 she went to West Palm Beach to see Leon Felix at a hotel in West Palm Beach where Charles O. Long was residing; that while in the lobby she saw Mr. Mead, talked to him, and then went to the room of Charles O. Long with Mr. Mead; that present in this room were Charles O. Long, his wife and baby, Leon Felix, Mr. Mead and herself.

She would not give any other definite information other than to state that she was in Jacksonville living with some friends for about six weeks during the latter part of November and the first part of December, 1935.

It is suggested that Leon Felix be re-interviewed relative to the present whereabouts of Mead if he can be located and that the name of Mrs. Mead be used in interviewing him.

Reference is made to my letter of May 29th, 1936, relative to Fred Goulet of Toledo, Ohio.

Subsequent to my letter of May 29th, 1936, further reference to Fred Goulet has been found in the report of Special Agent D. E. Hall dated Detroit, Michigan, July 30th, 1934, wherein it is noted that Agent Mockins maintained a contact with one Joe Remue, 1747 Spencer Street, Toledo, Ohio, for information he might be able to get in from Fred Goletta of 908 Monroe Street, concerning Charles J. Fitzgerald, with aliases. The only information relative to this individual is as follows:

"Joe Remue was interviewed at his place of employment. He advised that he has kept in intimate touch with Fred Goletta but has been unable to secure any definite information regarding the whereabouts of Charles J. Fitzgerald, with aliases. He advised that on several occasions he has taken Goletta out and gotten him drunk, at which time Goletta has told him that Fitzgerald was in Chicago, Illinois, but that he did not know the address and he had not seen Fitzgerald for a number of years. Remue further advised that within the last three weeks, he had taken Goletta out on such a party, when Goletta advised him that maybe sometime this Summer, Fitzgerald and two of Fitzgerald's friends from Fort Wayne were coming to see him, Goletta. He advised that he did not know when they were coming, but that he would get in touch with Remue in the event they did come or if he heard anything further about them. Mr. Remue stated frankly that he was somewhat skeptical as to these statements on the part of Goletta and somewhat doubts whether Goletta has any definite information as to the whereabouts of Fitzgerald and may just have been talking when he stated that Fitzgerald was coming to Toledo. Remue stated that in the event Fitzgerald should show up in Toledo, he feels certain Goletta will let him know and advised that he will immediately call the Detroit Office. Mr. Remue reiterated his expression to Agent

Meekins that Goletta is a very close-mouthed, suspicious individual and that direct contact with him would be of no avail whatsoever."

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: Corruption in Police Departments
of and Harboring Cases in Toledo
and Cleveland, Ohio.

During a telephonic conversation which I had with Mr. Connelley at the St. Paul Office, I inquired as to the progress of the investigation of the above entitled matter.

Mr. Connelley said that upon leaving Cleveland, he outlined in some detail the investigation which he desired performed there, but that the investigation has been rather slow in developing, and that as soon as he can get away from St. Paul, he plans to return to Cleveland and inject some vigor into the investigation. It was pointed out to Mr. Connelley that there appears to be no head to the investigation in Toledo and Cleveland, and that apparently what is needed is someone with some vitality and "go" to keep the Agents moving. I inquired of Mr. Connelley as to whether Agent Fynn is capable of directing the activities of the other Agents, and he said that he was not. Mr. Connelley suggested that Agent Suran of the Chicago Office would be a good man to send down to Cleveland for the purpose of directing this investigation as soon as the investigation of the Ham Case shapes up to such an extent that he can be relieved.

I authorized Mr. Connelley to have Agent Suran proceed to Cleveland and Toledo to work upon the harboring cases, and as soon as he can be spared from his assignments upon the investigation of the Ham Case, this will be done.

In connection with the investigation dealing with persons who harbored Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell in the Cleveland district, it has been ascertained that Harry Campbell, since May, 1935, was friendly with Sheriff James O'Reilly, Lucas County, Toledo, Ohio, and Fred Goulet, 2150 Monroe Street, Toledo, Ohio, the proprietor of a saloon, and the latter's wife, Catherine Goulet, nee McDonald.

Mrs. Goulet is understood to have a brother known as Jack McDonald, alias Jack Mack, who is reported to be presently incarcerated in the penitentiary in Wisconsin. A confidential informant advises that Jack McDonald, alias Jack Mack has been convicted of felonies on four or five occasions; also, that he is due to be paroled from Wisconsin, in August, 1936, to Sheriff James O'Reilly of Lucas County, Toledo, Ohio.

It is requested that you secure the complete criminal history of Jack McDonald, alias Jack Mack, and discreetly determine the truth with reference to his alleged proposed parole to Sheriff O'Reilly, and in the event this has foundation, that you determine just what action, if any, Sheriff O'Reilly has taken to secure the parole; also, that you institute investigation to ascertain the details of McDonald's various criminal activities, and whether they were known to the Sheriff. This information is desired in order to portray the interest of Sheriff O'Reilly in criminals.

Post Office Inspector F. R. Casey, Toledo, Ohio, has indicated to Special Agent E. J. Synn that John Vetter and his brother, Joe Vetter, Port Clinton, Ohio, since the apprehension of Karpis and Campbell, have been questioned by the post office inspectors, and have furnished information implicating Joe Roscoe of Toledo, Ohio, in the Garrettsville, Ohio, mail train robbery of November 7, 1935; that John Vetter admitted that Joe Roscoe made arrangements with him to fly Karpis, Brock and Hunter to Hot Springs, Arkansas, and Tulsa, Oklahoma, on November 8, 1935.

Mr. Casey expressed the opinion that it was felt that the information furnished by the Vettzers and John Brock corroborated, in some respects, by other evidence, established an iron clad case against Joe Roscoe.

In conclusion, he stated that the post office inspectors are to have a conference within a week at Cincinnati, Ohio, for the purpose of formulating a definite plan of action, particularly with reference to Joe Roscoe.

Dear Sir:

It is requested that the expenditure of \$50.00 be authorized to pay to Charles O. Long, informant, to cover expenses from Chicago to Toledo, Akron and Cleveland, Ohio. Long has agreed to locate Mead and notify the Chicago Bureau office. Long stated that he has received information that Mead is presently in the vicinity of Cleveland, Toledo or Akron, Ohio, and has been trying to get in contact with him to do some work.

Long requests that he be apprehended with Mead and be taken to a Bureau office and not turned over to the police, and that the Bureau check with those State authorities which are listed by the Bureau as wanting him and ascertain whether or not they still want him, and if not that the Wanted Notices be taken from the files of the Bureau Identification Section.

It will be noted in the report of Special Agent C.B. Winstead, Jacksonville, Florida dated 4-25-36, pages 8 and 9, that the sheriff's office at Sarasota, Florida was furnished with the Bureau's criminal record of Charles O. Long; that deputy sheriff Edward Gardner corresponded with the various State authorities set out therein as wanting Long, and they advised that they would not come to Florida for him, and as a result Long was not arrested.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent E. J. Wynn, Cleveland, Ohio, dated May 5, 1936.

In an interview with Archie Negleman at the U. S. Northeastern Penitentiary, Lewisburg, Pa., it has been ascertained that Negleman had received information in the Penitentiary through wires that on May 29th or 30th, 1935, a cargo of liquor was hi-jacked near Youngstown, Ohio, by Mc Brennan and "Red" Burton in company with two Syrians, names unknown. Negleman further stated that this liquor at the present time is stored on the road from Canton to Youngstown about eight miles from Canton, Ohio. There is an old barn which has been renovated and which is now a barbecue stand and run by an ex-convict. Negleman stated that the driver of the truck was one Wilson, who lives in Canton, Ohio, about three blocks from Rowland Avenue; that Wilson is in on the job, and was well informed of the activities of the hi-jackers prior to the robbery. The barbecue stand is also a place which is frequented by mobsters, and no doubt the machines used in the hi-jacking are presently stored there.

A report in detail as to the interview with Negleman will be furnished your office at an early date.

If any information with reference to the truck hi-jacking is confirmed, it is requested that the Philadelphia Office be immediately notified.



DETAILS:

In accordance with reference report of Special Agent L. C. Taylor, Sheriff Jake Andres, Ann Arbor, Michigan, was contacted. He advised that he has never heard of a Billy Fisher or his mother living in or around Ann Arbor. Mr. Andres discreetly contacted the Police Department and they advised that they have no record concerning a Billy Fisher or his mother living in or around Ann Arbor. Mr. Andres also contacted all of the undertaking establishments in Ann Arbor and was advised that they had never handled services for a Billy Fisher and have no record of a person whose body was shipped to Ann Arbor from Pennsylvania during 1934, 1935 or 1936. Mr. Andres advised that he would conduct additional discreet investigation to ascertain if a Billy Fisher or his mother had lived in or around Ann Arbor and would advise the Detroit Bureau Office if such information was received.

At 11:30 P.M. on April 26, 1936, Sheriff Willard Welsh of Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, advised the Detroit Bureau Office by telephone that a reliable citizen had identified Alvin Karpis, from a photograph, as having been in Sault Ste. Marie for the past few days under the name of Jerry Thomas and that this individual had been accompanied by one Jack Smith, whose description was given as: height, 6 feet, weight, 150 pounds, hatchet-faced, square jaw, pleasant talker. These individuals had called at the local Post Office for mail sent General Delivery from Toledo and Cleveland, Ohio. Mr. Welsh advised that Thomas, who was believed to be identical with Karpis, remained in the background and never appeared at the General Delivery window. Mr. Welsh also advised that his informant stated these men were driving a coach or sedan, light blue in color. Jack Smith was seen in Sault Ste. Marie a few hours prior to Mr. Welsh's telephone call. These two individuals were staying at a sporting house and contacting a girl by the name of Cecil Fultz, a prostitute. Information given was that these two individuals were at Sault Ste. Marie last fall for about one week. Mr. Welsh's informant who identified Thomas as being Karpis stated that the general description fits accurately except that Thomas is a little heavier than Karpis, as indicated by the above photograph.

The above information was forwarded immediately to the Bureau and reporting Agent and Special Agent C. H. Olson left at 1:30 A.M. on April 27, 1936, for Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan.

Upon arriving in Sault Ste. Marie at 11:30 A.M., April 27, 1936, Sheriff Willard Welsh advised that his informant was a Postal clerk named Francis McDougall. Mr. Welsh advised that he did not anticipate Agents' appearance in Sault Ste. Marie so soon and that the information concerning this identification came to him casually. Mr. Welsh informed Agents that he was proceeding to a luncheon at a local hotel and could be contacted later at his office. Mr. Welsh was very hospitable but his actions indicated that he did not place a great deal of credence in the information which he furnished the Detroit Bureau Office.

Agent interviewed Mr. Francis McDougall, clerk in the Sault Ste. Marie Post Office and Mr. Stephen O'Neil. These men are both employed at the General Delivery window. They advised that they had noticed two suspicious looking strangers in Sault Ste. Marie and upon the arrival of the wanted notices forwarded by the Detroit Bureau Office concerning Karpis and Campbell they remarked that there was a similarity in the facial characteristics of the shorter of the two suspicious men and the picture of Karpis. They also stated that about a year ago these same two men were in Sault Ste. Marie for approximately one week. They advised that during the past three weeks they noted these two men frequently coming to the Post Office for mail at the General Delivery window and casually mentioned to Sheriff Welsh that they believed there was a striking similarity between Alvin Karpis and the shorter of these two individuals. Mr. McDougall and Mr. O'Neil were shown pictures of Milton Lett, Sam Coker, Fred Hunter, Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, and others connected with the Brekid, Hanap, Stollnap and Weynap cases. They advised that none of these pictures resembled either of the two individuals they had in mind with the exception of the picture of Karpis. The shorter man, whom they stated slightly resembled Karpis, was supposed to be using the name of Jerry Thomas. Upon examining the picture of Alvin Karpis, Mr. McDougall and Mr. O'Neil stated that they now believed there was no resemblance between Karpis and Thomas. They stated that they were of the opinion that these two men were still in Sault Ste. Marie.

Mr. McDougall accompanied reporting Agent and pointed out a 1936 blue Ford Tudor, bearing 1936 Ohio license 3463-A, stating that the two parties in this car were the two individuals he had referred to. It was noted that the taller of these two men wore a gray cap, dark trousers and two-tone shoes. The shorter man wore a brown snap-brim hat, light trousers and dark shoes. Both were wearing black shirts with large white buttons. Reporting Agent was able to view these two individuals closely and it was noted that neither of these two individuals resembled any of the Subjects in instant case.

The above mentioned license number was telephonically furnished the Detroit Bureau Office, which, in turn, advised that this license was issued for a 1936 Ford Town Sedan, motor 2556004, covered by Lucas County, Ohio, bill of sale #396565, to Jacqueline Thomas, 317 Twelfth Street, Toledo, Ohio.

Mr. McDougall and Mr. O'Neil gave the following descriptive data concerning the two above mentioned individuals:

In connection with the descriptions of the two suspects, a subsequent examination revealed that Jerry Thomas, who allegedly resembled Karpis, weighs approximately 200 pounds and in no way resembled Karpis. It was further noted that Jack Smith did not resemble any of the other Subjects in this case.

Mr. McDougall and Mr. O'Neil also advised that the two suspects have been seen frequently with a girl named Cecelia Stumpf alias Stewart, a prostitute who operates a house at 600 Gascap Street in Sault Ste. Marie.

Special Agent C. H. Olson and reporting Agent visited several locations in Sault Ste. Marie and observed both of the above mentioned men. These suspects appeared to be very effeminate and visited several girls in beer parlors and taverns.

All of the above mentioned information was telephonically furnished to the Detroit Bureau Office.

Subsequent investigation revealed that the car which suspects were driving was parked at the landing of the Sault Ste. Marie ferry, which operates between Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, and Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. Appropriate arrangements were made with the Customs officials at Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, and upon the return of both suspects from Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, they were interviewed by reporting Agent-- the identity of Agent not being revealed to them.

George Thomas advised that this is his true name but he is sometimes called Jerry. He stated that he makes his home with his wife, Jacqueline Thomas, at 317 Twelfth Street, Toledo, Ohio. He stated that he was born in Marine City, Michigan, on September 3, 1905, and is of Irish descent. A supplemental description of this man obtained at the time of the interview and from observation is as follows:

Jack Smith advised that he and George Thomas are married to sisters and that he makes his home at 412 Twelfth Street, Toledo, Ohio. He was born at Adrian, Michigan, in 1910. A supplemental description of Jack Smith is as follows:

Both Smith and Thomas when questioned stated that they would gladly have their fingerprints taken. Fingerprints of both were secured by Special Agent C. H. Olson and compared with the fingerprints of the Subjects in instant case. This examination revealed definitely that the suspects were not the Subjects in instant case. The fingerprints of Smith and Thomas have been forwarded to the Bureau. It should be noted that the fingerprints of George Thomas are those of the individual who Mr. McDougall and Mr. O'Neil of the Sault Ste. Marie Post Office stated resembled Alvin Karpis.

Mr. McDougall, prior to the securing of suspects' fingerprints, was requested to secure a sample of their handwriting if possible. A thorough search was made and the signature of Jack Smith was located. A tracing of this signature was obtained and is being preserved in the Detroit file of instant case.

George Thomas and Jack Smith advised that they had been in Sault Ste. Marie since March 1, 1936. They stated that they were not employed but were on a vacation and having a good time showing the girls around.

The Bureau was promptly advised of the actions of reporting Agent and Special Agent C. H. Olson by teletype and telegrams.

Mr. Francis McDougall advised that the suspects were associating freely with various prostitutes in Sault Ste. Marie and during their 1935 visit to Sault Ste. Marie they lived at the house of Cecelia Stumpf alias Stewart at 600 Gaspar Street. It occurred to reporting Agent that the suspects might be implicated in the interstate transportation of women for immoral purposes. Although an attempt was made to secure information concerning a possible violation of the White Slave Traffic Act on the part of George Thomas and Jack Smith nothing definite could be learned.

Police Officer F. W. Bell, Precinct 13, Detroit, Michigan, appeared at the Detroit Bureau Office and advised that a friend, one Harry Haas, 3788 Tyler Avenue, Detroit, business address 4218 Cass Avenue where Haas operates a used car lot, had advised him that while on a drinking party with a girl, name unknown, this girl had told Haas that her sister had noticed some suspicious looking people living in a house near her home at Keego Harbor, Michigan. Officer Bell insisted that the place be raided immediately.

Mr. Harry Haas was contacted at 4218 Cass Avenue, Detroit, and advised that on the night before he had had a date with a girl whose name he refused to divulge. He stated that during their evening of drinking, this young woman stated that her sister, Frances Pierce, had told

her that there were some suspicious looking people living in a house near her home at Keego Harbor, Michigan. Mr. Haas stated that there was no indication that these people were connected with the instant case.

Mrs. Donald (Frances) Pierce, 1173 Bamford Street, Post Office Box 389, Keego Harbor, Michigan, was contacted and shown pertinent pictures in instant case as well as in the Hanap, Stollnap and Weynap cases. She advised that there was a suspicious family living near their residence but she had no information as to their identity and had never been able to view these people so that she would be unable to identify them. She stated that she has never seen anyone resembling any of the pictures which were shown her by reporting Agent. Wanted notices on Karpis, Campbell, Dainard and Robinson were left with Mrs. Pierce and she advised that she would immediately notify the Detroit Bureau Office if she saw any persons resembling these individuals. Mrs. Pierce could give no definite information as to why she considered her neighbors to be suspicious people and was apparently very surprised at the appearance of Agent at her residence. She advised that a neighbor, by the name of Matt Keller, who works at the Pontiac plant in Pontiac, Michigan, was a close associate of the people whom she considered suspicious and stated that Keller was entirely reliable.

Mr. Matt Keller was contacted and advised that the house pointed out to reporting Agent by Mrs. Pierce is occupied by Jack Schneider, 1161 Bamford Drive, Keego Harbor, Michigan. He stated that he was very anxious to cooperate with the Government and would keep the interview had with him in strictest confidence. He informed that Schneider has lived at the above address during the past five summers and formerly ran a poolroom in Detroit. He stated that Schneider had told him that he intends to open a beer parlor near Pontiac, Michigan. A description of Schneider, as given by Matt Keller, is as follows:

Mr. Keller examined all of the pertinent pictures in connection with the instant case, the Hanap, Weynap and Stollnap cases and advised that Jack Schneider does not resemble any of the pictures shown him. In a very confidential manner, Mr. Keller advised that he is the caretaker of the Schneider residence during the winter while Schneider and his young

wife are in Detroit; that he considers Schneider a very likeable sort of person, but from his conversations with Schneider believes he is some minor racketeer in Detroit. Wanted notices of the Subjects in instant case were left with Mr. Keller and he advised that he would immediately notify the Detroit Bureau Office if he saw any persons resembling these pictures.

Mr. Peter P. Quinlan, Postmaster at Keego Harbor, Michigan, and Catherine Thorndycraft, his clerk, examined pictures in instant case, the Weynap, Stollnap and Hanap cases, and advised that they have not seen any person around Keego Harbor who resembles any of the pictures shown them. Wanted notices of the Subjects were already in the possession of these people and they stated that they would immediately notify the Detroit Bureau Office in the event they saw any such persons in or around Keego Harbor.

The following persons were contacted in and around Pontiac, Michigan, and pictures of the pertinent Subjects in instant case, the Weynap, Hanap and Stollnap cases were displayed to these persons who advised that they have not seen anyone resembling the pictures shown them; wanted notices on Robinson, Dainard, Campbell and Karpis were left with these parties and they advised that they would immediately notify the Detroit Bureau Office if they saw such persons in or around Pontiac:

J. A. Fleckenstein, manager, Huron Hotel, Pontiac.

Thomas B. Skeels, manager, Roosevelt Hotel, Pontiac.

H. V. Heldenbrand, manager, Waldron Hotel, Pontiac.

Harvey Boatwright, clerk and floorman of the Heldenbrand Hotel, Pontiac.

A letter was directed to the Secretary of State, Lansing, Michigan, requesting information and a stop notice on a 1936 maroon 4-door Buick sedan, motor 63052198, serial 2895972. Subsequently a letter was received from the Secretary of State advising that this car had not been registered but that the Detroit Bureau Office would be notified if any information was received concerning same.

The home of Marie Taylor, 460 Prentiss Street, Detroit, Michigan, has been periodically viewed by reporting Agent without results.

In accordance with reference letter from the Chicago Office to the Bureau dated March 10, 1936, the following investigation with regard to mineral baths in the State of Michigan was conducted:

Captain Frank Walker of the Michigan State Police, Ypsilanti, Michigan, advised that ~~Boorman's~~ mineral wells were in operation at Ypsilanti at one time but have been plugged since 1917. Mr. Walker advised that there are no producing mineral springs in or around Ypsilanti at this time.

Mr. Arthur Rosso, Chief of Police at Mt. Clemens, Michigan, advised that the various mineral springs located in and around Mt. Clemens are not known as the Mt. Clemens Mineral Springs or Victory Springs. He advised that he was personally acquainted with the proprietors of all bath houses in and around Mt. Clemens.

Following is a list of all bath houses operating in and around Mt. Clemens with the names of the persons in charge of them:

~~Colonial Hotel, operated by Max Elkins and Elmer Wolff.~~

~~Medea Bath House, Leslie Ullrich, manager.~~

All of the above mentioned locations were visited and the managers interviewed. They advised that they have not seen anyone resembling Harry Campbell or Alvin Karpis but that if these individuals were seen by them they would immediately notify the Detroit Bureau Office. Identification Orders on Campbell and Karpis were appropriately placed with the managers of the above mentioned bath houses.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent S. L. Fortenberry:

From the Postmaster at Eaton Rapids, Michigan, it was ascertained that there was no such place as the ~~Rapids Wells~~. It was learned that there are several mineral wells in the vicinity of Eaton Rapids but that there is only one bath house within the City of Eaton Rapids. This bath house is operated by Glenn Barnett in conjunction with a small rooming house. There are, however, no hospital facilities in connection with this bath house. Mr. Barnett was contacted and had exhibited to him Identification Orders on Karpis and Campbell but he stated that he had never seen these two individuals. Several of the Identification Orders were left with Mr. Barnett and he assured Agent that he would immediately notify the Detroit Office should these persons come to his place.

Miss Elizabeth Forhan, the United States Commissioner at Benton Harbor, Michigan, was questioned relative to the ~~Eastman Springs~~. She advised that the Eastman Springs had not been in operation as a health resort for the past ten or fifteen years; that the place was formerly owned by James Pugh, who lived in Chicago, but that Mr. Pugh had died several years ago and willed the place to his secretary, a Miss Marie Hewit, who later married Joe Stinson, a well known Chicago bootlegger, and they now use the place as a summer home but do not have any bath facilities there. Agent went to this location and found that it was surrounded by a fence. All the gates were locked. Agent got through the fence and inspected all the buildings, which were in an ill state of repair and unoccupied.

The Postmaster at Big Rapids, Michigan, was contacted and advised that approximately thirty years ago there was a place known as ~~Clark's Red Cross Mineral Wells~~ which was approximately one mile south of town on Highway #131. This well, however, is not in operation at the present time. Agent proceeded to the location of Clark's Red Cross Mineral Wells and found that the property was owned by Mr. O. L. Gilbert. Upon interview Mr. Gilbert advised that the wells had not been in operation since prior to the time he purchased the property which was 22 years

ago, but that he was at present attempting to drill another well near the old one for the purpose of securing mineral water. However, he stated that it would be a period of months or probably years before he would have a bath house in operation.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent J. Waldman:

It was ascertained at St. Clair, Michigan, that there are no mineral springs or mineral baths presently being operated in this vicinity. Mineral baths at one time were given at the Oakland Hotel in St. Clair but this hotel was razed some time ago and was never reconstructed.

Mr. J. B. Sumner, manager of the Park Hotel, St. Louis, Michigan, which is the only health resort in this section of the State specializing in mineral baths, was contacted. A number of Identification Orders #1236 on Subject Campbell were left with Mr. Sumner and he advised that should any information whatever come to his attention concerning this individual he would immediately communicate with the Detroit Bureau Office by telephone. Mr. Sumner also advised, after a check of his hotel records, that there was no indication that any individual under any of Campbell's known aliases had stopped at his hotel, and he was unable to recognize the photograph of Campbell as that of anyone whom he had ever seen.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent W. H. Hoffman:

At Alpena, Michigan, it was ascertained from Sheriff W. J. Marcinak and Deputy Sheriff Jones that although there are several mineral springs in Alpena and vicinity there are no mineral spring bath houses or health resorts there. They advised that the Alpena Mineral Well, which is supposed to be located north of Alpena, is probably the magnetic and sulphur springs located on Crooked Island about thirty miles northeast of Alpena, but there are no health resorts or establishments there specializing in mineral water or mineral fume baths, and so far as they knew, there were no such places in or near Alpena. They further advised that the only place specializing in such health treatment is the Kleber Sanitarium in Alpena at Lockwood and 5th Streets.

Dr. E. A. Kleber was interviewed at the Kleber Sanitarium and he advised that there are no health resorts or sanitariums, hospitals or other places in or near Alpena which, at the present time, give mineral or sulphur water or sulphur fume baths or any treatment of such nature. He stated that in 1874 a magnetic and sulphur spring was dug in Alpena near the present Post Office Building and while it was ad-

vertised as a health resort it was possible to obtain health baths at this location, but that after operating several years it went out of business and was made into a public health resort. The company that promoted this well finally went broke in 1910 and ceased business although they plugged the well so that now it is used only for drinking water which contains mineral properties. Dr. Kleber advised that he has been a physician in Alpena for 23 years and since he is the only doctor or only person operating a health center specializing in mineral baths he is in a position to know where all the mineral wells or springs are located there. He stated that there is a mineral spring fountain in front of the Standard gasoline station #110 at First and Chisholm Streets, that there is one or more on Crooked Island and Sulphur Island near Alpena, and that there is one at River Street between Fifth and Sixth Streets near the Richardson Lumber Company but that none of these places has equipment for giving mineral baths. Dr. Kleber advised that even he does not use the natural mineral water in treating his patients but uses instead a gas-generating contrivance which furnishes the necessary sulphur fumes.

Under the above circumstances, Alpena or surrounding territory does not fall within the classification of health center or resort town referred to in letter of SAC D. M. Ladd of Chicago; however, Identification Orders on both Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell were left with Sheriff Marcinak, Walter Nowak, attendant of the Standard Oil gas station #110, Dr. Kleber, and Corporal Theodore Person of the Michigan State Police Post at Alpena for identification purposes in the event either Karpis or Campbell appears in Alpena, Michigan.

Etowah, Tennessee; that to his best recollection the You-Drive-It Company in Atlanta, Georgia, ceased business about September 1, 1934; that upon instructions from the Home Office of the You-Drive-It Company at Norfolk, Virginia, they destroyed most of the records.

During the conversation with Mr. Saunders he mentioned that the Dixie Drive-it-Yourself System, Atlanta, Georgia, managed by Mr. VanFrank, was the only company doing that type of business who had governors on their automobiles during the Fall and Winter of 1934; that they owned Ford automobiles, some of which were equipped with yellow wheels. He also stated that the Dixie Drive-it-Yourself System had some kind of an arrangement whereby they would pick up passengers at the airport in Atlanta, Georgia. Mr. Saunders also mentioned that he recalls that the said Dixie Drive-it-Yourself System got into some kind of trouble with the police in Atlanta, Georgia, for their refusal to cooperate with them in exhibiting records.

He furnished information to the effect that companies engaged in the drive-it-yourself business maintain what is known as identification slips, which are indexed by name, and also maintain what are known as daily time on trip slips, which are indexed by day and month.

From the foregoing information it appears that further inquiries at the Dixie Drive-it-Yourself System, Atlanta, Georgia, may be advisable.

Mr. A. V. Ferris, 803 North Walnut, McPherson, Kansas, upon interview stated he has not heard from his daughter Lucille and has not received any information concerning her whereabouts. He advised that several weeks ago he visited with Milton Lett's mother near Wann, Oklahoma in an effort to learn of his daughter's location; that Mrs. Lett told him she did not know where her son was located. Mr. Ferris stated that he has no relatives his daughter would visit but that Mrs. Ferris may have a sister who was rather close to the family. The name of this relative is already in possession of the Bureau and she has been interviewed by the writer. Mr. Ferris assured this Agent he would immediately communicate with the Kansas City Office in the event he should hear of the location of his daughter.

Eva Hooper, 745 Ohio Street, Lawrence, Kansas, upon interview, advised that she is Lucille Ferris' aunt, being the sister of Lucille's mother, who resides in Coffeyville, Kansas. Mrs. Hooper stated that an officer of the Kansas State Highway Patrol and two Post Office Inspectors called at her store two or three weeks ago and offended her, and that because of this incident she will not cooperate with any law enforcement agency in locating her niece.

Mrs. Hooper made the remark she cannot understand why officers are seeking the apprehension of Milton Lett when no warrant has been issued for him. Agent asked Mrs. Hooper where she received this information, to which she replied "That is only my business". In response to an inquiry whether she has heard from Lucille Ferris, Mrs. Hooper merely stated she was not interested.

It may be mentioned here that Mrs. Eva Hooper operates a boarding house known as Ricker Hall, apparently for girls who attend the University of Kansas. A thirty day mail cover is being placed on her mail.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE ATLANTA BUREAU OFFICE at Atlanta, Georgia, will consider the advisability of reinterviewing the manager of the Dixie Drive-it-Yourself System in an attempt to ascertain the identity of the party who drove Duke Randall from Atlanta, Georgia to Etowah, Tennessee.

Confirming my telephone call on June 3, 1936, to Mr. McIntire, of the Bureau, you are advised that at the conclusion of the Government's case a motion by defense attorneys for a directed verdict as to the conspiracy indictment against Myrtle Eaton was upheld by Judge Louie W. Strum.

In announcing his decision, Judge Strum called attention to the fact that there was no evidence of any persons being involved during the period named in the indictment except the defendant and Weaver. It is noted that the indictment charged that the conspiracy existed from approximately January 23, 1935. The Judge stated that it was his belief that the crime of harboring requires the active cooperation of two persons for the commission of the substantive offense, and that in line with decisions of the Supreme Court a conspiracy charge will not lie against those two persons.

In his argument on this motion Assistant United States Attorney William A. Paisley called attention to the Gebardi case, and maintained that under that decision it would seem that a conspiracy to violate the harboring statute could be charged as to the two persons involved. However, Judge Strum held that the situation existing in this case was similar to situations in other cases decided by the Supreme Court to the effect as indicated above.

It is not known when sentence will be imposed in this case. The defense has indicated that a motion in arrest of judgment will probably be filed. I will advise the bureau immediately upon any further developments believed of interest.

Mrs. W.E. Mead had been taken from her mail box. It was also observed that the lace curtains had been taken from the windows in her apartment. Mrs. Mary Smith, Secretary for Charles P. Kenning, 1436 Jarvis Street, manager for the Internal Revenue Department which now has a lien on the Mead apartment house advised that Mrs. Mead came into the office Tuesday morning, May 19, 1936, and stated she had just arrived and that she had been in Florida. The place in Florida was not mentioned, and she did not mention her husband. She also stated that she was going to start cleaning house, and that she had a woman hired who was going to work with her. Mrs. Mary Smith stated that if they should learn anything concerning the whereabouts of, or see Mr. Mead, they would immediately notify the Chicago Bureau office.

Mrs. M.E. Ravin, owner of the Jarvis Street Garage, 1512 Jarvis Street, which is located just in back of 1533 W. Fargo Street, stated she had not seen Mrs. Mead since her return and was not aware that she had returned, but would watch for Mr. Mead, and if she observed him or obtained any information concerning his whereabouts she would immediately notify the Chicago office. Mrs. Ravin also stated that she had heard that the Meads owned a house somewhere in Florida. She did not remember from whom she had heard this information.

Agent subsequently observed on passing by 1533 W. Fargo Street that the shades remained in the same position in Mrs. Mead's apartment.

Mr. and Mrs. V.K. Schoeninger, 1531 W. Fargo Street, whose apartment is adjacent to Mrs. Mead's on the second floor front, advised that Mrs. Mead arrived home Tuesday morning as above stated, and immediately began cleaning up her apartment, taking down the lace curtains, and had a woman house cleaner working with her; that she stayed throughout Wednesday, and they did not see her thereafter. Agent was able to observe from the Schoeninger apartment that the furniture still remains in Mrs. Mead's apartment. The doors to her apartment are doubly locked.

Mrs. Smith referred to above was re-interviewed and stated that Mrs. Mead had not been in the office again, and that she did not know that she had left, but presumed from a statement Mrs. Mead made that she intended to stay throughout the summer, and thus thought that Mrs. Mead must be somewhere in Chicago visiting with friends in Chicago or nearby.

A mail tracing in writing resembling Mead's was received on 5-21-36 by C.B. Bertsche, notorious "fixer" and friend of Mead's from 317 Washington Ave., Charleroi, Pa. The Pittsburgh office was notified of this tracing by telegram.

Charles O. Long was re-interviewed and has promised to obtain information from someone else that Mrs. Mead is in Chicago, and will see her and ascertain the present whereabouts of her husband. Long upon a previous interview had advised he is quite certain that Mead used the name B. F. Hall when corresponding with him; that he understands Mead has about \$30,000.00 in available cash, and will undoubtedly go to some fishing lodge in the mountains and spend the summer, as his hobby is fly fishing for trout. In connection with this Long told about Mead's cabin on the Madison River, 27 miles west of the western entrance to West Yellowstone, the postoffice address being Deerfoot Lodge, Montana. He added that he understood the Government had this pegged. The Butte office has previously obtained this information.

Toledo Ohio Police Dept

Long further stated that a Harry Thompson, Gladstone Hotel, Casper, Wyoming was a very close friend of Mead's. He added, though, that Thompson is a "fixer" in Casper and is a close friend of the sheriff, and during prohibition operated a still with the sheriff. Another close friend of the Meads is a couple by the name of Mr. and Mrs. Cramer, whom Long stated operate the Utah Hotel located on the highway just out of Salt Lake City in the direction of Big Lake. Long stated that if Mead goes west he will undoubtedly contact these people. Long also claimed that Sam Hetzler or Hessler, Secore Hotel, Toledo, Ohio is a friend and contact of Mead; that Hetzler is the main "fixer" in Toledo as far as confidence men are concerned. (note: this corroborates information received by Agent Billings as set out on page 8 in the reference report.) With reference to Toledo, Long stated that when he read the doctor's statement as set out in the newspapers to the effect that certain law enforcement officers might be prosecuted for aiding Karpis and Campbell, he thought how Detective Colver of Toledo must be squirming, as Colver was usually one of the officers "fixed" by confidence men and was undoubtedly in on any "fixing" done by Campbell. Long stated that when he saw Leon Felix in Florida in January, this year, Felix was bemoaning the fact that he had to meet his wife who was due out of the California State prison in May, and he did not have any money with which to take care of her.

Agent in general conversation asked Long where the best place was to go trout fishing, and he stated he always went to the Shawano Indian reservation in Wisconsin, and fished on the Wolf River as there had been large quantities of trout in this river.

With reference to Fred Perry, to whom Long had addressed a letter c/o General Delivery, Jacksonville as set out in reference report of the writer, Long stated this is Fred Pitts. It is noted in reference report of Agent Billings that the Postal authorities were trying to locate Pitts in Los Angeles for mail fraud. Long upon subsequent interview stated that he had received word that Mead was waiting in Ohio in the vicinity of Cleveland, Akron or Toledo, and had been trying to get in contact with him, Long, to do some work and that if he, Long, had his expenses paid he would go to Toledo, Cleveland and Akron and arrange to have Mead contact him, and that he would then go to where Mead is, stay with him and notify the Chicago Bureau office. Long subsequently stated that he had gone to these places and had left word with persons who claimed they would be in contact with Mead shortly, and that they would notify him that Long was waiting at the Palmer House for Mead.

Long was interviewed relative to one John Grady, and stated that he knew John Grady, but didn't have any idea where he was. Sergeant Alcox of the Confidence Detail stated that he is looking for John Grady as he had received a telegram from Sandwich, Ontario, Canada requesting the apprehension of Grady. He is certain that Grady is not in or about Chicago. He further stated that if he should hear of the present whereabouts of Grady he would immediately notify the Chicago Bureau office. He was thus requested to bring her to the office that she might be interviewed, and will do so about Tuesday, June 2nd.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. E. J. McCLURE,
GENERAL AGENT.

There is transmitted herewith a voucher in favor of Transcontinental and Western Air, Incorporated, in the amount of \$2,984.20, representing charges for a chartered airplane used by this Bureau in connection with the apprehension of Alvin Karpis, a fugitive from justice wanted for participation in the Bremer and Hamm Kidnaping Cases.

Information was received by the Bureau regarding the presence at New Orleans, Louisiana, of Karpis. Upon the receipt of this information, it was essential that a squad of Special Agents of this Bureau proceed from New York to New Orleans in the most expeditious manner possible in order to assist in effecting the capture of this individual. It being known that Karpis was a desperate criminal, it was also essential to transport certain firearms equipment in the above indicated manner. In view of the extremely emergent nature of the situation, it was imperative that a chartered plane be used in order to place these Special Agents in New Orleans within the shortest possible time.

After the apprehension at New Orleans of Karpis, it was also considered essential to transport him to St. Paul, Minnesota, via chartered plane, for arraignment and delivery into the custody of the United States Marshal. It has been the experience of this Bureau that transportation in the manner indicated is necessary to insure the safe delivery to the proper authorities of such an individual and to safeguard the lives of Government employees delegated to duty of this nature. Travel in this manner served to preclude any possible attempts of Karpis' underworld associates to free him.

After Karpis was placed in custody at St. Paul, it was necessary for the above mentioned squad of Agents to return to New York immediately to engage in the investigation looking toward the apprehension of another fugitive wanted for participation in the same kidnaping cases. Due to the exigencies of the occasion, the interests of the Government were best served by the use of a chartered plane.

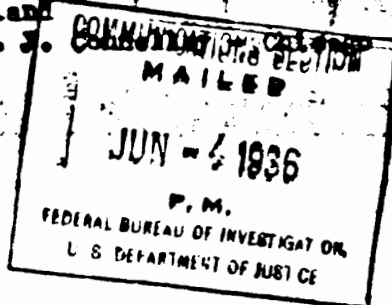

With further reference to my letter of May 27th, 1936, you are advised that Thursday, May 28th, 1936, I went to Hot Springs and there had a long talk with Grace Goldstein, who informed me that the only reason she has not proceeded before this time to the place where the Harpist guns are stored is that she has not had an automobile available. She advised that she did not think it best to hire a car, nor did she wish me to drive her to the place for reasons which she did not say, but I am, of course, inclined to believe that she does not want me to know the guns are stored at her brother's place. At this conference Grace informed me that her automobile is presently being repaired and that she expects to have the car delivered to her sometime Monday, June 1st and that she will leave Hot Springs, if possible, on Tuesday, June 2nd for the purpose of locating these guns. Grace is to telephone me immediately after she has arranged for her departure and give me definite instructions as to where I am to meet her. Upon hearing from Grace I will, of course, communicate with the Bureau and request authority to meet her at such place as she indicates and immediately upon taking the guns into my possession I will communicate with both you and the Bureau.

Hoover Stirs Up the Police

J. Edgar Hoover of the "G" men is showing up some of the police departments of this country. And he is not backing down a bit when they express resentment. More power to him.

The latest instance comes from Toledo where Hoover arrested Harry Campbell, alleged kidnaper and pal of Alvin Karpis. There Campbell had been living quietly in an apartment—and associating as a friend with Sheriff James O'Reilly of Lucas county, in which Toledo is located. O'Reilly knew him as "Bob Miller" and never suspected that he was the bandit, although Campbell's pictures had been sent to every law enforcement officer of this country. Pretty indifferent police work.

Then Chief Ray Allen of the Toledo police came in to say his bit. He wanted to know why his men were not called in when Campbell was arrested, and he resented some words Hoover had spoken about how the "G" men steered clear of police departments they did not trust. Mr. Hoover came right back with this:

"My statement was broader than the chief of police seems to make it. I said I wouldn't cooperate with any department that was corrupt, inefficient or publicly mad. As to his department, the chief of police is in a better position to judge than I am."

The two Thompson Sub-Machine Guns, mentioned in my teletype message of earlier this date, are being forwarded by Railway Express, Government Bill of Lading #J-68157 for ballistic examination. It is requested that bullets be fired from these guns and a comparison be made of these bullets with any bullets on file in the Technical Laboratory, particularly any bullet that is believed to have been fired by a gun used by any of the subjects of this investigation. Both of these sub-machine guns are .45 calibre and were manufactured by the Colt Patent Firearms Manufacturing Company in Hartford, Connecticut. One of the guns has had obliterated from it the identifying numbers and it is requested that an effort be made by the Laboratory to bring out these numbers, after which they should be submitted to the Pittsburgh Office, who are being requested to trace these machine guns. The other machine gun bears serial number 950 and is model of 1921. A copy of this letter is being furnished the Pittsburgh Office in order that appropriate tracing may be commenced as to the ownership of this gun.

twenty-round clip, which is reported to have been used in connection with the gun from which the identifying numbers have been obliterated. At the time this clip and drum were turned over to me the clip contained twenty cartridges and the drum contained forty-nine cartridges, all of which cartridges have been removed and are being retained at this office pending information from the Bureau as to the disposition to be made of them. I know of no value that these cartridges may be to the Bureau and therefore, suggest that we be authorized to destroy these cartridges.

The informant from which these guns were secured informed me that they were buried sometime after the raid on the property near Hot Springs and I believe the condition of the guns will bear this out. The guns are being forwarded in their original condition, with the exception that for identification purposes, A. E. Linzel, who is under contract with this office for the inspection and repair of firearms, in my presence and at my direction, stenciled on each of these machine guns my initials on the trigger plate just back of the rear grip. The fifty-round drum was also marked with the stencil for identification with my initials just under the serial number and on the clip my initials were scratched on the bottom for the same purpose. No attempt was made to clean the guns up, as it was felt that the Bureau might wish to determine from the condition of the guns the possible length of time they had been buried.

Groves stated he did not know the proper name of the one referred to as Footsey, but said that he was in the clique with O'Brien, Footsey and Moran at Joliet and was looked upon favorably by them as a fellow prisoner, although he did not come into any information that was especially confidential with any of those prisoners in which clique he belonged.

Groves said, however, that O'Brien and Footsey were serving their time at the Illinois State Prison on a charge of kidnaping and were incarcerated for a period of six years and two months to the time they were released on parole in about June 1932. Subsequent to the release of O'Brien and Footsey, Doc Moran was released after which Groves was paroled on October 25, 1932. Following his parole Groves stated that he returned to the home of his father in Chicago, Illinois, but being unable to get along with his father he again came in contact with O'Brien and Footsey in Chicago who arranged for him to stay with Doc Moran at the latter's place in Maywood, Illinois. Groves said that he remained in Doc Moran's office in Maywood for about a month during which time he took charge of Moran's office, and that the period during which he was with Doc Moran extended from shortly before New Year's 1933.

Groves further stated that on New Years Eve of 1932 he was a guest of Doc Moran's at the ~~Polia~~ Polia Cafe on Wabash Street in Chicago, Illinois. Continuing, Groves said that the reason he failed to remain longer at Doc Moran's place was that he had been informed by several persons that Doc's place was pretty hot, which Groves said he came to know for the reason that he was aware that Doc Moran was performing abortions, and in rooming with Doc Moran he observed a number of narcotic syringes around and believes that Doc was taking dope himself. He said further he observed while at Doc's place a letter from the Illinois Parole Board advising Doc Moran that he, Moran, was violating his parole from the Illinois State Prison and unless he reported to the Parole Board within a certain period he would be returned to the Illinois State Prison. Groves said that since he himself was on parole from the same institution, he believed that should Doc Moran encounter any difficulty that he too would likely become involved through associating with Doc Moran and accordingly he left Moran's place. He said that it was general knowledge that Doc Moran was wholly unreliable and he was so looked upon by the criminal element.

He further stated that when he read that Doc Moran was alleged to have been murdered and his body tossed in a lake, he suspected that O'Brien and Footsey were probably behind the murder for they had very close contacts with Doc Moran and he suspected that Moran had probably double-crossed them or they feared he might do so. Groves further stated that never did he feel that the Harris mob might have been involved in the murder of Doc Moran if he was murdered because of his, Groves', own personal knowledge of the close contacts of O'Brien and Footsey with Doc Moran.

Agent O'Connell endeavored to question Groves more pointedly as to any source from which he might have obtained the above information, but Groves stated that he had not been informed through any source, and that the opinion expressed above was only a surmise on his part.

Groves further requested that should any investigation be conducted in view of the information which he furnished that no mention be made of his name nor any indication given that he was contacted in this matter.

I am furnishing this information to you for any value it may serve in instant investigation.

Reference is made to your letter of June 2, 1936 addressed to the Chicago office, wherein it is suggested that the Cleveland office should probably consider the advisability of attempting to recover additional properties of Wynona Burdette and Dolores Delaney in order that these articles may be returned to them.

As is apparent from the correspondence of Dolores Delaney with her family and the Karpis family, she has taken a very hostile anti-social attitude toward furnishing any information to anyone, it being noted that in the recent past she repudiated a statement she made at St. Paul, which undoubtedly was the truth, and declined to testify in Florida. It is not believed that any consideration should be given to Dolores Delaney, except insofar as we can furnish any other information which will show her un-regenerated condition of mind, and should be considered when attention is given to her parole in the future, particularly if we are called upon for any opinion as to this.

As to Wynona Burdette it is believed that she is entirely cooperative; that she showed this in her recent testimony in Florida, and Dolores Delaney has taken a direct action to discredit her in the prison, causing her considerable embarrassment. It is believed that anything we can do to encourage Wynona Burdette in her cooperative attitude toward the Government should be considered. However, it is not believed that we should become involved in connection with any property which was taken possession of by the Police at Cleveland, although I do not see anything wrong with advising her of the location of this property if we know of it. If there is any of her property in possession of the Government it of course should be returned to her if it is not needed as evidence, in order to relieve the Bureau of responsibility in connection with same.

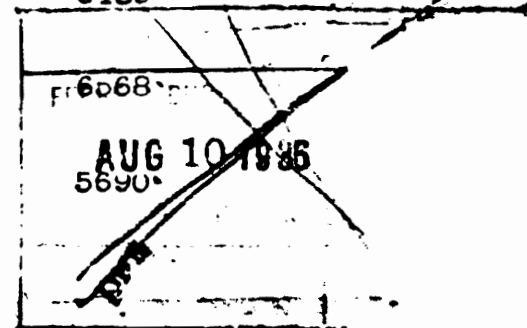

As you were informed by Mr. E. A. Tamm of the Bureau by long distance telephone recently, I was very much concerned over the contents of your letter addressed under date of June 5, 1936 to Post Office Inspector S. J. Hettrick, Cleveland, Ohio, in which you thanked him for "the many courtesies you have extended". I was actually astounded to learn that such a letter had been addressed to Inspector Hettrick since he has displayed to the Bureau on so many occasions not only a reluctance to cooperate with the Bureau, but an obvious desire to frustrate the Bureau's investigation of cases coming within its primary investigative jurisdiction.

It was incorrect to address such a letter to a person whose unfriendly attitude toward the Bureau is not only common knowledge on the part of all Special Agents, but whose failure to properly cooperate with the Bureau has been the subject of nation-wide newspaper dispatches.

Under no circumstances should letters of this type be addressed to Post Office Inspector Hettrick or to any other person who has indicated an utter reluctance to cooperate with or assist the Bureau.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAMM

At about 2:30 P. M. on June 2, 1936, I received a telephone call from Charles Bodson of the Criminal Division who advised that he had received a letter from Assistant United States Attorney Paisley, of Jacksonville, Florida, advising that the defense for Myrtle Eaton had filed a motion to suppress certain evidence obtained by Agents at the time of the arrest of Myrtle Eaton and William Weaver at Harbor Oaks, Florida, on September 1, 1935. I told Mr. Bodson we had several Agents down there now who were there in the capacity of witnesses against Myrtle Eaton, and they would be well able to handle any situation in this connection which might arise. He stated Mr. Paisley had asked for any suggestion the Criminal Division desired to make and this gave rise to a request on the part of Bodson for a copy of the investigative report showing the raid conducted on the Eaton-Weaver home. I told Mr. Bodson it was contrary to policy to furnish reports, but that we would be willing to furnish a digest of pertinent information in the case if that would be satisfactory. He said it would be more than satisfactory since it was exactly what he wanted without having to read too much material. I communicated this information to you at which time it was decided I should call Jacksonville to determine the status of the motion in view of the fact that we had not been advised that such a motion had been filed. I was unable to talk with Mr. Nathan but did talk with Mr. Untreiner, the #1 man. I told Mr. Untreiner that the Jacksonville office was not keeping the Bureau advised as to current developments and that we had been informed of the motion to suppress by a representative of the Criminal Division. He stated he did not know much about the motion but that it had been overruled and that the trial was then in progress. I asked him to give me the names of the Agents down there and he said the following Agents were there for the purpose of testifying: Suran, Sullivan, Cassidy, Brennan, Meekin. I told him those Agents were well acquainted with the case and could handle any situation arising out of the motion to suppress. Untreiner stated he would look into the matter and advise the Bureau immediately.

At about 3:05 P. M., Mr. R. B. Nathan called me back to advise that the motion to suppress had specifically referred to the guns and items of firearms equipment which had been seized by Agents at the time Myrtle Eaton and William Weaver were apprehended. He stated that the motion had been overruled by the court, at which time the court ruled that if the defense found further objection to this evidence, they could make their objection when the evidence was about to be introduced. Nathan advised that at that moment, Agent Cassidy

was on the stand introducing the guns and that the objection to the introduction of the guns had been overruled. Mr. Nathan further advised that as a collateral matter, the defense had obtained a list of the Government witnesses and had chosen only Special Agents Sullivan and Cassidy and commenced asking them questions undoubtedly for the purpose of laying a predicate. Mr. Nathan stated that the judge immediately became aware of the fact that the only purpose of the defense was to try to obtain information from Cassidy and Sullivan which should not properly be in the possession of the defense and for that reason he refused to permit the defense to continue to question these Agents. Mr. Nathan stated also that there was some possibility that the conspiracy indictment would be thrown out and as I have informed you in another memorandum the judge would authorize a directed verdict insofar as the conspiracy indictment against Myrtle Eaton was concerned.

Mr. Nathan stated that Wynona Burdette and Edna Murray had been entirely satisfactory witnesses for the Government. Jimmie Wilson had been subpoenaed and used as a court witness. He indicated that Wilson's testimony was satisfactory but of course not at all impressive. After talking with Mr. Nathan, I telephonically advised Mr. Bodson of the Criminal Division of the status of the motion to suppress. Mr. Bodson then advised that it was possible that the defense might raise the same question at the close of the trial and for this reason he continued to insist upon being furnished with a memorandum setting out briefly the facts concerning the apprehension of Myrtle Eaton and William Weaver. In compliance with your suggestion in this matter, I did prepare and submit to you the said memorandum for transmittal to Mr. Bodson.

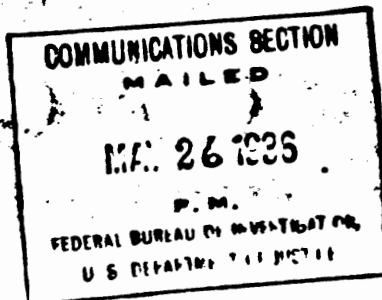

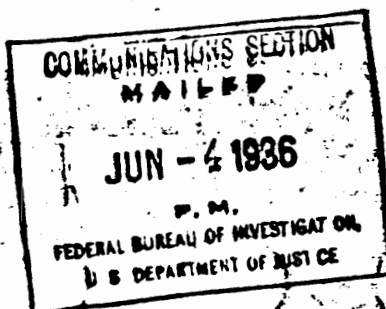

SAC Bruce Nathan of the Jacksonville Office telephonically advised me on this date that the trial court had just authorized a directed verdict in favor of Myrtle Eaton on the conspiracy count in the indictment. Mr. Nathan stated the grounds for the directed verdict were the following: that the conspiracy indictment against Myrtle Eaton charges Myrtle Eaton, William Weaver and others with having conspired to harbor William Weaver; that the only evidence which the Government was able to introduce showing a conspiracy on the part of "others" was evidence showing such harboring and concealing prior to the return of the indictment against William Weaver, which indictment was returned at St. Paul, Minnesota, on January 22, 1935.

Mr. Nathan stated that the judge advised in giving the directed verdict that it was necessary for two or more persons to conspire to conceal, and that since there was no showing that two or more persons had concealed William Weaver subsequent to the return of the indictment against Weaver on January 22, 1935, he would be compelled to authorize a directed verdict.

Mr. Nathan also stated that the court had overruled a motion on the part of the defense for a directed verdict as to the substantive offense of harboring and concealing William Weaver. He further informed there is no indication that the defense will again resume its motion for suppression of evidence concerning the introduction of the firearms which were found at the Weaver home. Mr. Nathan likewise stated that the defense is now introducing its testimony and it is believed the defense will have rested by noon today. He stated that as soon as the jury has reached a verdict, he will immediately advise the Bureau.
