Grand Jury Condemns "So-Called Third Degree Methods" — Two Captains, Two Detectives, Three Patrolmen Advised A Garland County Grand jury. strongly condemning "so - called third degree methods," late yesterday indicted seven members of the Hot Springs Police department on second degree murder charges as the climax of an investigation into the death of John Dickson, 32, city jail prisoner.

Those indicted were Captain L. A. (Arch) Cooper, Captain R. L. (Bob) Moore, Lieutenant Cecil Brock, Detective Glynn Buchanan, Patrolman Press Griffin, Patrolman Joe Scott and Patrolman Andy Irwin.

Within a few hours after the grand jury reported at 5:35 p.m. the seven indicted officers had surrendered to Sheriff Marion Anderson and were released under bond. Circuit Judge Earl Witt set bond at \$1,500 each.

The grand jury vindicated Chief of Police Joe Wakelin, who with Cooper, Brock and Buchanan, had been suspended by Mayor Leo P. McLaughlin pending outcome of the inquiry, of actual participation in e alleged assault on Dickson, but longly criticized him for fature is accise control over his magni-

tely following the game ury report, Mayor McLaughlin issued a statement, declaring "the seven officers who have been indicted are permanently discharged, and adding "It is doubtful at this time whether or not Joe Wakelin will again serve as chief of police."

None of the indicted officers made a statement. Ill at his home, Wakelin also declined to comment.

A blanket indictment charged that the accused "on December 14, 1936, unlawfully, willfully and with malice a forethought, did assault and murder one John Dickson by striking, kicking and beating him, the said John Bickson, on the back and other parts of the body, with a blunt instrument, the particular description of which is to the grand jury unknown, from the effects of such striking, kicking and beating the said John Dickson died on Dec. 24,

Dickson died Christmas Eve in a hospital from what the death certificate said was pneumonia. Subsequently his father, James Dickson, charged his son died of mistreatment while in custody and asked a full investigation. He retained Scott Wood, former circuit judge, and C. Floyd Huff as attorneys to press the demands.

Dickson had been arrested on charges of robbery and participating in an attack upon Chief Wake-lin last fall while Wakelin and other officers were seeking Dickson and other members of an alleged robbery gang in the wilds of Perry county.

Dickson was removed to the hos-

pital from the city jail four days before his death. He had been arrested two weeks earlier near Hope,

Hempstead county.

An autopsy performed on Dickson's body by Hot Springs phy-sicians revealed that the prisoner had suffered several broken ribs, an injured kidney and other serious injuries. No, he missed me. But the Prior to the investigation, members of the police department had denied the mistreatment charges. They contended Dickson was in a weakened physical condition then taken in custody as the result of sleeping out-of-doors while he was a fugitive.

The text of the grand jury's report to Judge Witt follows: To Honorable Earl Witt, Circuit

We have been in session three days investigating the circumstances surrounding the death of one John Dickson. We have heard 38 witneses, and have endeavored to develop every particle of evidence that would have any bearing upon the death of John Dickson, a prisoner in the city jail recently. We have called upon every person who might have any testimony or who might know of any one who might have some information that would tend to throw light on the investigation.

We have returned true bills in cases of seven defendants whom we believe under the testimony developed during our investion with should face until in connection with the death of Dickson.

During our investigation we found no evidence to connect Chief of Police Joe Wakelin with the actual mistreatment of any prisoner, but the evidence revealed by our investigation leads us to believe that should Chief Wakelin have exercised a more dominant control over the oficers under him such circumstances as those revealed in the Dickson case and other cases of alleged mistreatment of prisoners, would not have existed.

We, the members of the grand jury, strongly condemn any type of brutal, so-called "third degree" methods used upon prisoners. Such practices tend to destroy the credibility of the evidence of officers in criminal trials, aside from being inhuman and which no civilized community should tolerate.

The mayor said it was "doubtful" if Wakelin "will again serve as chief of police."

There are attached hereto the logs for January 6, 1987 covering the taps on telephones listed to the Chief of Police, City Jailor, and Mayor's Office, all located in the City Hall at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

On this date the Garland Erzadxiary County Grand Jury who had been probing the John Dickson case returned seven indictments charging the following named individuals with second degree murder in connection with the death of young Dickson:

Note that call at 5:01 A.M. between Officer Frees Griffin and Bill Hart who claims to be employed at the Belvodere Club.

Refer to that call at 10:55 A.M. between Walter Ebel, newspaper reporter and "Dutch" Akers. Subsequent telephone conversations indicates that Joe Denton never was paroled from the penitentiary, and that he is still incarcerated of the State Farm at Cummins, Arkansas.

Note that conversation at 7:55 P.M. between Cecil Brock and his wife wherein Brock stated that the action of the Grand Jury is in the rangitof a political argument in Hot Springs, and that there isn't anything to worr, about.

Note that Officer Ben Rogers is the new Night Captain of Police.

Note that conversation between Grace Goldstein and a man believed to be Jack McJunkin, a city firemen, at 11:40 P.M. The "old Man" referred to in this conversation undoubtedly is Chief Wakelin. Jack McJunkin usually chauffeu for Mayor McLaughlin, and agent recently heard that he is employed as a doorman at the Belvedere Club.

Note that call over the Mayor's telephone between Joe Wakelin and Judge Ledger ood at 9:02 R.K. whe min Ledgerwood "fixed" it so that Wakelin wouldn't have to appear before the Garland County Grand Jury that probed the John Dickson case

Note that call at 10:22 A.M. over the Mayor's telephone between one Tucker and Mayor McLaughlin, and note in what connection the name of Jacobs is mentioned. It is not believed that this Tucker is identical with the Frank Tucker who is the City Jailor.

The call made at 10:52 A.M. indicates that the Mayor is comtemplating on purchasing \$4,500 worth of 4% bonds, probably as his own investment.

It might be well to set out the conversation between Mayor McLaughlin and Judge Ledgerwood which they had at 5:55 P.M. The person named Higgins in this conversation, undoubtedly is the same individual with whom Mayor McLaughlin talked at 10:52 A.M. relative to purchasing some bonds, as above indicated.

GRAND JURORS NEAR END OF DICKSON PROBE

Final Report Expected ed To Be Filed Today

QUESTION MAYOR

Wakelin Unable To Appear Before Group

Entering its third day of investigation into the ill-timed death of John Dickson, city jail prisoners, the Garland county grand jury had examined some 35 witnesses by the time it adjourned for lunch today. Several other witnesses remained to be questioned this afternoon.

Officials indicated, however, that a decision upon the case would be reached by late this afternoon.

Several city policemen were included among the witnesses examined this morning, while Mayor Leo.

P. McLaughlin was summoned yesterday afternoon.

Three of the four officers under temporary suspension pending the outcome of the grand jury probe is stified yesterday, but the fourth, the officer of Police Joe Wakelin, has been confined to his bed since Sunday by illness. Charles Goslee, foreman of the grand jury, indicated today that the chief would not be called because of his condition. The police chief, a physician declared has never fully recovered from the effects of injuries suffered when he was attacked in a Perry county raid several months ago. John Dickson was reported to have declared after his arrest that it was Alfred "Pug" Dickson, his cousin, who attacked Wakelin. "Pug" is in custody.

Members of the grand jury have been reported as expressing determination to complete the probe of the Dickson case before taking up any other cases. Investigation into the "torch death" of Mrs. Mary Cleo Grover and a few other matters are also scheduled to be taken up at this session of the court. E. Grover, estranged husband of Mrs. Grover, is being held without bond pending a review of his case by the grand jury. Police charged he set fire to the bed upon which his wife slept.



Grand Jury Expected To End Probe by Tomorrow

Ten more witnesses appeared before the Garland county grand jury this morning as it resumed its in-vestigation into the alleged "third degree" death last Christmas Eve of John Dickson, city jail prisoner, and officials indicated it might be late this afternoon or tomorrow before a decision is reached.

Included among the witnesses questioned this morning were Captain L. A. Cooper, Lieut. Cecil Brock and Detective Glynn Buchanan, three of the four officers suspend-ed by Mayor Leo P. McLaughlin pending the outcome of the investigation. Chief of Police Joe Wake-lin, also under temporary suspension, was reported ill at his home this morning, but was expected to appear before the grand jury this

afternoon.

Examination of the witnesses this morning brought to 22 the number aiready questioned and several more were scheduled to be called.

Charles Goslee, foreman of the grand jury, declared this morning that the inquisitorial body is ques-tioning all persons having any information bearing upon the case and reiterated a recent request that ing present having additional in-

Adjourning at noon, the grand jury was to meet again this after noon at 2:15 o'clock to resume its probe. ...

James Dickson, of Hollis, father of the deceased prisoner, charged mistreatment at the hands of city policemen was responsible for his son's death. An autopsy and the grand jury probe followed. The young Dickson was arrested in Hempstead county in connection with a safe robbery here and an attack upon Chief Wakelin in a Perry county raid.

The grand jury was also expected to take up the investigation of the alleged "torch murder" of Mrs. Mary Cleo Grover, whose husband, E. E. Grover, is charged with setting fire to the bed in which she slept. Grover has denied the charges.

PAROLE FOLLOWS FURLOUGH FOR **GARLAND CONVICT**

Cummins Prison Farm, Jan. 5 .-(A)—Prison Supt. Tom Cogbill said today that only one of the 144 pris-oners released on short furloughs for the Christmas holidays was unaccounted for.

He said "Humpy" Brown, serving a five-year term for burglary from Lincoln County, had failed to re-turn to the stockades but asserted he expected Brown back soon.

Another of the convicts granted clemency was picked up by Pine Bluff officers last night and held for prison authorities. He is Fletcher Hodge, 35, serving a long term for murder from Mississippi county.

The four prisoners from Garland county receiving the benefit of Gov. Futrell's Christmas furlough were back at the state farm today with the exception of one Negro, George Hightower, who with five other Gariand convicts, was granted a parole by the state penal board yes-

terday.

The other three from this vicinity will continue to serve out their terms. Lee Wacaster serving his second term for murder, was sentenced to life imprisonment for the slaying of Miss Minnie Snephero five years ago. Previous to that be had served several years for the murder of his brother-in-law, Tillan Brown.

Walter Nelson, tried five years ago for the murder of D. Dewns, was convicted of planting a "bemb" in Weaver's Novelty Shop and causing the explosion in which Downs was killed.

Clarence Stroud, formerly of the Bayou section, is serving a life sentence for the slaying of his wife

about 10 years ago.

Hightower, whe received his parole yesterday, was convicted of killing a Negro girl in a Malvern avenue establishment.

Five Granted Paroles

Little Rock, Jan. 4.— (P) —The state penal board paroled 94 convicts today, among them Charles Crosnoe of Hope, convicted arsonist. Gov. J. M. Futrell earlier today had reduced Crosnoe's term from six to five years. Crosnoe was sentenced from Bradley county May 27, 1935, for burning a gin at Banks. The reduced sentence made him eligible for parole. The commutation order said Crosnoe is physically incapacitated and requires medical attention which cannot be given him in prison.

Although Chairman Walter Helms of Texarkana announced at the board's last meeting that he would resign today, attaches at the governor's office said they had re-

ceived no resignations.
