Hooks Suggests Conspiracy In Attacks on NAACP Offices

WASHINGTON:— NAACP. Executive-Director. Benjamin-Hooks suggested last week that two recent attacks on organization offices in Atlanta and Baltimore may be part of a conspiracy and he has asked the FBI to investigate the prospect.

Hooks also vowed that the "terrorist" attacks against the offices of the 80-year-old civil rights group would not alter its mission or interfere with a march the group held Saturday to protest recent Supreme Court decisions viewed as setbacks to minority gains.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People called for the march to protest several of the high court's decisions that weaken affirmative action programs and minority business contract set asides.

At a news conference, Hooks said he had no hard evidence linking the attacks against the NAACP but he believed they might be connected:

Tear gas bomb

In Baltimore July 19, several gunshots were fired at night into lighted rooms at NAACP national headquarters. No one was injured.

The NAACP had moved its headquarters to Baltimore last: year from New York city.

"We have no way of knowing whether the two incidents are connected, but certainly the fact they occurred so closely together and under somewhat similar circumstances cannot be lightly dismissed as sheer coincidence," Hooks said Friday.

Police in Atlanta and Baltimore "have been magnificent" in investigating the incidents, he said, but "we cannot ignore the possibility of a conspiracy that crosses state lines. Racism is. on an upward swing in this country."

No arrests have been made in the Baltimore, incident, according to city police officials.

Hooks said he sent a telegram Thursday to FBI Director William Sessions asking him to investigate both incidents "to find out if there is a connection."

"If these acts of terrorism were meant to frighten us or deter us from any course of action, they failed completely," Hooks added.

"We did not give in to terrorism when the Ku Klux Klan was riding high and mighty and we will not give in to these latter-day terrorists."





Benjamin Hooks, executive direc- sured of monolithic black support tor of the National Association for need do only the minimum to mainthe Advancement of Colored People, is rightly dismayed that - despite major gains over the past 30 years many blacks are still trapped in a cycle of poverty and degradation.

But his opening address to the NAACP convention here demonstrates that Hooks hasn't yet come to terms with the fact that his own group's commitment to liberal ideology is helping to perpetuate this distressing state of affairs.

The liberal remedies — coercive strong extended black family strucaffirmative action laws, cradle-toture." grave welfare programs and all the rest - have clearly failed.

And the fact that Hooks and most other major black leaders are committed to liberalism, and to the Democratic Party, compounds the damage - by depriving blacks of their full potential influence in America's bipartisan political culture.

Hooks' message was unambiguous: blacks who do not accept liberal dogma as received wisdom must be seen as virtual traitors. This approach limits the leverage blacks can enjoy by making them prisoners of one party.

The Republicans are unlikely to cater to a constituency that doesn't exist, while the Democrats - as-

tain their loyalty.

What's more, the NAACP's ideological commitment to government-imposed solutions blinds it even to lessons that can be drawn from recent black history.

Hooks' speech illustrated this point. He prefaced a passage deploring drug abuse, welfare, prostitution and crime by saving: "In the old days, the black poor found hope and relief . in the stability and security of a ture."

Ironically, the very government programs that Hooks seeks to extend contribute to the breakdown of the black family. Welfare programs have greatly diminished the father's role in the family and have also eroded parental authority by enabling teenage girls to opt for pregnancy as a route to independence,


In listing the NAACP's achievements. Hooks pointed to the hundreds of black millionaires and the hundreds of thousands of black professionals living in middle-class comfort.

But most of these people would ascribe their success not to affirmative action programs, but to authentic equality of opportunity - quite a different thing.


The 1984 "civil rights" bill does not embody the

Ward's controversial words were loudly hissed by a Columbia University audience Wednesday night.






Mayor: 'Spay' welfare moms



Ben Hooks Is Good FCC Choice

SENATOR HOWARD BAKER (R-Tenn.) should be commended for urging President Nixon to appoint Memphian Ben Hooks to the upcoming vacancy on the Federal Communications Commission.

If the appointment comes through, as expected, we hope the Senate will confirm it.

There can be no argument about his credentials. Ben Hooks has been so active that it is sometimes difficult to know how to address him - as judge, the Rev. or Mr. His fields range widely - religion, law, education, business. He is a practicing attorney. He is pastor of churches in both Memphis and Detroit, so he knows the urban situation well. 



From March, 1949, until 1960. Judge Hooks was engaged in the practice of law with an attorney in Memphis, Tennessee. In 1960 Judge Hooks established his own law practice.

From March, 1961, until December, 1964, Judge Hooks served part time as an Assistant Public Defender in Shelby County, Tennessee, and from September, 1965, to December, 1968, he served as a judge of the Criminal Court, Shelby County, Tennessee.

During 1969 and 1970, Judge Hooks was employed as President of the Mahalia Jackson Chicken System, Incorporated, in Memphis, Tennessee.

From 1956 to the present, Judge Hooks has been the Pastor of the Greater Middle Baptist Church in Memphis, Tennessee, and from 1964 to the present, he has also been the Pastor of the Greater New Mount Moriah Baptist Church in Detroit, Michigan.

Judge Hooks has been an active participant in fraternal, religious, and community affairs in Memphis, Tennessee. He serves on the Board of Directors of the Tri-State Bank, the Mutual Federal Savings and Loan Association, and the Le Moyne-Owen College as well as several small local businesses. Judge Hooks also has a weekly television program known as "Conversations in Black and White," and he is a participant, along with other ministers, in a weekly religious program known as "What Is Your Faith?"

Judge Hooks has also been active in the civil rights field since the mid-1950's. For a number of years he has served on the National Executive Board of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and in August, 1970, he was listed as the Financial Secretary of that organization.

Judge Hooks is married to the former, and they reside at 1860 South Parkway East, Memphis, Tennessee.

Military Service

Judge Hooks was inducted into the United States Army on July 21, 1943, and entered on active duty on August 11, 1943. He received an honorable discharge on February 13, 1946. He

enlisted in the United States Army Reserve on February 14, 1946, and served on inactive duty until February 12, 1949, when he was honorably discharged. His service record is clear, except for treatment for venereal disease in 1945.

II. RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

Interviews

Memphis, Tennessee, advised that he had formerly owned two buildings in Memphis, Tennessee, and operated a cleaning establishment in one of them. Judge Hooks, as President of Mahalia Jackson Chicken System, Incorporated, negotiated with him for the sale of the cleaning business and the lease of the property. This sale was made and subsequently in October, 1971, the Mahalia Jackson Chicken System, Incorporated, went into bankruptcy. Mr. stated that as a result of this business deal with Judge Hooks, he had lost \$500 in rent. While he considers Judge Hooks to be a loyal citizen, he felt that Judge Hooks had proved himself to be incompetent as a businessman and should not be considered for any position with the Federal Government.

Odell Horton, President, Le Moyne-Owen College, Memphis, Tennessee, and a former Assistant United States Attorney. In Memphis, Tennessee, advised that he has known Judge Hooks well since 1957. He stated Judge Hooks has a fine legal mind and is a diplomat and excellent speaker. The only flaw he knows of concerning Judge Hooks is that he tries to be involved actively in so many things that he cannot do justice to all of them. He continued that Judge Hooks has unlimited energy and is willing to work, but at times he might neglect his legal business, his ministerial profession, or some of his civic activities. He stated that this is just an opinion on his part, and he knows of no problem which has arisen in this regard. He advised that, to his knowledge, there has never been the slightest criticism of Judge Hooks's morals or integrity, and he would recommend him for a position of trust and confidence.

Tennessee, stated that he has known Judge Hooks for about twenty years. He pointed out that in 1956, while still a young lawyer,

Judge Hooks had joined with several other Negro lawyers to form the Mutual Federal Savings and Loan Association, a black-oriented business. He commented that Judge Hooks has been active in every worthwhile black organization in Memphis for many years, and he pointed out that, while Judge Hooks has been dedicated to bettering the positions of Negroes, he has tried to do so in the context of uplifting the entire community. He recommended Judge Hooks for a position of trust and confidence.

"Commercial Appeal," a daily newspaper in Memphis, Tennessee, advised that he first met Judge Hooks about three years ago when the need became obvious to responsible black and white citizens that they required better communication and better understanding. A group was formed under the leadership of Judge Hooks which is jokingly and affectionately referred to by its members as the "Ben Hooks Literary Society." He stated that Judge Hooks is a dedicated and responsible man who has the interests of the entire community at heart and who has done everything in his power to promote better race relations. Judge Hooks has the ability to look objectively at both sides of racial problems, and he attempts to urge fair decisions by the leaders in the community. He recommended b6 Judge Hooks for a position of trust and confidence. b7C

Memphis, Tennessee, advised that he knows Judge Hooks very well. He stated that by virtue of the "Ben Hooks Literary Society," of which Mr. is a member, Judge Hooks has probably influenced more prominent white businessmen than any other black leader in town. He mentioned that Judge Hooks has a weekly television program on his station known as "Conversations in Black and White," and through this program Judge Hooks has been able to deal with some of the frustrations in the black community in an intelligent manner. This program is well received by both blacks and whites. Mr. recommended Judge Hooks for a position of trust and confidence.

member of the Memphis, Tennessee, City Council, advised that she has known Judge Hooks well since about 1952. She stated that at the time of the death of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and the ensuing racial troubles in Memphis, Judge Hooks was a moderator and of great value to the Memphis City Council in

helping to prevent further disturbances. Although she highly recommends him for any responsible position, she stated she would hate to see him leave Memphis because of the great asset he has been to the community.

Attorney and former member of the Memphis, Tennessee, City Council, advised that Judge Hooks has been active in promoting the interests of black people to the fullest extent, but never at the expense of the overall community and never to the point of unfairness. He stated that Judge Hooks was outstanding when he served on the Criminal Court bench, and he ran his court with great decorum and treated lawyers and everyone else with courtesy. He recommended him for a position of trust and confidence.

Howard H. Baker, Jr., United States Senator from Tennessee. advised through his Administrative Assistant, in Washington, D. C., that he knows Judge Hooks as a personal friend and political associate and recommends him for a position of trust and confidence. He has known Judge Hooks for the past eighteen years, and he considers him to be a very capable, dependable, honest, and trustworthy person who is very highly regarded professionally and personally.

William E. Brock III, United States Senator from Tennessee. advised through his Administrative Assistant, in Washington, D. C., that Judge Hooks is known to him as a political associate and personal friend. He thinks very highly of Judge Hooks and recommends him for a position of trust and confidence.

Forty-one additional persons, consisting of professional associates, attorneys, justices, community and business leaders, representatives of the press, radio, and television fields, social acquaintances, and neighbors, were interviewed. They commented favorably concerning Judge Hooks's character, reputation, associates, loyalty, and morals, and they recommended him highly for a position of trust and confidence. Judge Hooks was generally described as an intelligent, responsible, and dedicated person of high moral character and integrity and as one who has been active in bringing levelheaded, open-minded, fair, and balanced judgments to bear on community problems. Those acquainted with his close relatives stated they are reputable individuals.

He has applied for membership in this association.

President Nixon announced. yesterday that he will nomi-nate Benjamin L. Hooks, a Baptist minister and Memphis attorney, to the Federal Communications Commission.

If confirmed by the Senate. Hooks will be the first black on the commission, which has been increasingly asked to rule on issues involving discrimination in broadcasting,

The FCC regulates interstate telephone and telegraph services and grants radio and television, licenses.

Hooks describes himself as an independent. The sevenan independent. The seven He declined to discuss hi man commission may not have liews about FCC policies, say more than four members of one political party, and there already are four Republican members, including Chairman Dean Burch.

Hooks is being nominated for a term of seven years to replace Robert T. Bartley of Texas, a Democrat, whose term expires June 30.

A 47 year-old native of Memphis, Hooks is engaged in an active law practive and also is. pastor of the Middle Baptist Church.

He graduated from Le-Moyne College and received his law degree from DePaul University. He served in the Army from 1943 to 1946.

Hooks is a board member of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, a member of the NAACP and a member of the Memphis-Shelby County Human Relations Council.

In Memphis, Hooks said he was "certainly happy" that the President "has seen fit to recommend me for the communications commission.

"I feel that dealing with people, black and white, for the last 23 years qualifies me to work on the commission," he said.

I. PURPOSE

RECLIFIED-FBI
The FD-610 is designed to promptly provide FBIHQ with a complete set of pertinent facts for each Civil Rights case investigated by the FBI. Data is directly entered into a computer which will assist in more effective. efficient, and economical management of the Civil Rights Program by FBIHQ and the field. Each office MUST correctly complete ALL items requested on the form either on the initial submission, or later by supplemental submission prior to the close of the case. Title changes should be submitted by report or FD-610, whichever is more appropriate.

II. WHEN TO SUBMIT

The FD-610 is to be submitted in all cases supervised by the Civil Rights Unit, which include the following classifications: 44-CR; 50-ISS; 173-CRA 1964; 177-DIH; 187-Privacy Act of 1974-Criminal: 189-ECOA; 204-FRS; 214-CRIPA. The FD-610 should be, in most cases, the initial communication advising FBIHQ of the initiation of the investigation. In all instances, the FD-610 should be submitted within 5 working days of receipt of the complaint; however, the urgency of the situation may require a prior telephone call or teletype to FBIHQ.

III. DESCRIPTION AND REQUIREMENTS REGARDING ITEM #4 ON THE FD-610

Initial -

Should be checked if it is the first FD-610 submitted in the case. Every attempt should be made to provide all the information required on the initial submission: however, the initial submission of the FD-610 should not be held in abeyance while awaiting data which will be obtained on a later date. The auxiliary office (AO) should submit the initial FD-610 when they receive the original complaint with two copies designated to the office of origin.

Supplemental - This should be checked whenever a subsequent FD-610 is submitted. When submitting a supplemental FD-610, provide data only for those items requiring a change. Instances requiring a supplemental submission are: when previously unknown data is obtained, data was previously omitted, or data was previously incorrectly reported. The supplemental FD-610 should be used as the cover communication for the submission of LHMs.

IV. SIGNIFICANT CASE

Significant cases are those receiving extensive media attention, involving a prominent individual or involving FBI personnel as the subject or victim. Significant cases are also those wherein FBI investigation has determined the allegations to be serious and substantial thus warranting a full investigation. When prosecution becomes imminent, FBIHQ should be advised promptly and a supplemental FD-610 should be submitted designating the case "significant" if not already so designated.







NEW YORK — The Rev. Jesse Jackson is expected to run for president, but NAACP delegates say the USA isn't ready for a black president.

Among 85 delegates interviewed this week, two-thirds said a black won't win the presidency until 2000 — or beyond.

Six said Jackson has a chance in 1988, but five said a black will never be elected.

■ 51 were undecided on their choice for president, but 32 said they'd vote for Jackson. "Jesse Jackson is the only one I've heard who has a plan for this country," said Isaiah Bennett, 59, of Charleston, S.C.

Teen Mother Can't Get to Class

Yolanda Bailey, 17, wants badly to get her degree from T.C. Williams High School, where she was a B and C student until her junior year.

That was when she had her baby, Dilhon, and discovered that she could not find child care she could afford so that she could return to classes.

"I don't want to drop out," Bailey said in an interview at her home in Alexandria, where she was caring for her 6-month-old son.

While a lot of her friends had babies and dropped out of school, she said, she believes that "they don't know what they are missing yet. Maybe five years down the road they will realize."

Bailey is one of more than 100 high school girls in Alexandria who had babies in the last school year, according to city officials.

And while the officials are searching for ways to reduce teen pregnancies, they also are trying to encourage those who have had babies to go back to school, Child care is one necessary ingredient.

Alexandria Mayor James P. Moran Jr. said in an interview that he may have found a nonprofit group to pay for day care for Bailey's child, but he voiced frustration at the number of teen-agers who face similar

problems. "While [we hope] we can take care of this [Bailey's] situation, the point is, this is not that uncommon,

Moran said. If the teen-age mothers do not go back to school, their ability to be self-sufficient is limited and they may be relegated to a life of poverty, he said.

Suggestions have been made to provide child care at T.C. Williams for returning teen-age mothers, Moran said.

But the mayor expressed reservations about that approach, saying that while it might help some to return, it could send the wrong sig-

nal to girls who have not had babies.

Citing peer pressure and an environment where it sometimes is the "in" thing to do to have a child.

Moran said that this is "one reason I am reticent about providing day care at the high school."

Some teen-agers "will feel that it is perfectly acceptable to have a baby," he said. "I'm not sure we should make it that easy."

In 1985, there were 365 reported pregnancies among Alexandria teen-agers, or about 13 percent of the female teen-age population, according to city figures.

Of those girls of junior high school and high school age who became pregnant, 170 gave birth to babies that year.

A city task force headed by Moran has recommended establishing a health clinic in or near T.C. Williams that would, among other things, provide students with information about contraception and give them vouchers and prescriptions for birth control devices.

Proponents of the controversial idea have said it would help reduce teen pregnancies, while opponents have argued that it would encourage teen sex and lead to even more pregnancies and abortions.

Bailey says that she does not regret her decision to have a child but that she is frustrated by not being able to get back to high school.

After graduation, she wanted to go to Northern Virginia Community College to continue her education in a mathematics-oriented field, such as accounting or computers.

Bailey, who would have two more years of high school, now goes to night school at T.C. Williams and takes courses preparing her to take a test that would earn her a general equivalency diploma.

She said the classes so far have gone over things she already has learned, however, and are not the same as finishing high school
