



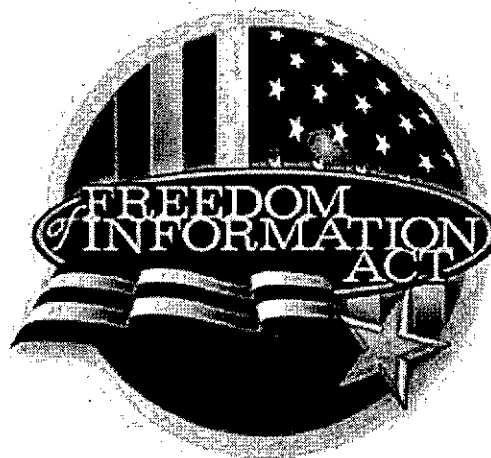

FROM THE DIRECTOR

TO ALL LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS

MILLIONS OF COLLEGE STUDENTS are returning to campuses throughout the country to begin the fall semester. They represent both the hope and the shape of the future. From the standpoint of educational opportunities and intelligence, they are far better equipped than any preceding generation to participate constructively in developing solutions to the many complex problems confronting our Nation.

It can be expected that most of these young people will fulfill the promise they represent to us. In so doing, they will join hands with the millions of Americans of good will who actively seek meaningful solutions to our social life. If our joint progress in this regard is impeded and deterred, much of the trouble will come from a growing band of self-styled revolutionaries who are using college campuses as a base for their destructive activities. This comparatively small group of arrogant, hard-core militants have contempt for the majority and our democratic processes. They regard themselves as the nucleus of an elite dictatorial ruling class of the future.

These extremists openly avow that their aim is to overthrow the existing order. Under the guise of academic freedom and freedom of speech, they profess to seek a dialog, when actually what they seek is a confrontation with established authority to provoke disorder. Through these confrontations, they expect to smash first our educational structure, then our economic system, and finally our government itself.

It is vitally important to recognize that these militant extremists are not simply sadists or "college kids" at play. Their cries for revolution and their advocacy of guerrilla warfare evolve out of a pathological hatred for our way of life and a determination to destroy it. The workshops they hold on sabotage and how to use it to further their objectives are grim forebodings of serious intent.

This New Left movement, as it is known, is growing both in numbers and varied forms of violence. Last spring, major disorders precipitated by the revolutionary adherents of the movement occurred on a number of college campuses. In the violent uprising at Columbia University, militant students and outsiders took over several buildings and committed senseless and deliberate destruction. The incident triggered similar disturbances on other campuses. Changes may be necessary and improvements in any institution can be made, but this is not the way to do it.

Encouraged by their "success" at Columbia, the anarchists in the New Left movement are boldly spreading the word that they intend to "create two, three, many Columbias," in the manner of one of their "heroes," Che Guevara, the Cuban revolutionary who cried "create two, three, many Vietnams!"

The main thrust of the New Left movement arises from the concerted efforts of the Students for a Democratic Society. Many of its members and some of its national leaders openly profess their faith in communist concepts and their determination to "restructure" our society. One of the militant spokesmen of this group stated, for example, that "perhaps 25 universities linked to the movement would be too much for the police—for the dominant class—and we would get what we demand."

The New Left leaders plan to launch a widespread attack on educational institutions this fall. They are relying on collegiate dissidents and militants to bolster and accelerate this drive. It would be foolhardy for educators, public officials, and law enforcement officers to ignore or dismiss lightly the revolutionary terrorism invading college campuses. It is a serious threat to both the academic community and a lawful and orderly society.

Re Bureau airtel to Boston dated 1/11/71 captioned as above.

[REDACTED] was in attendance at the National Convention (NC) of the Worker Student Alliance - Students for a Democratic Society (WSA/SDS) in Chicago, Illinois, 12/27 to 30/70.

Source advised that funds during the convention were controlled by the national officers, particularly [REDACTED]. More money was needed during the convention, whereupon those attending were asked to donate; however, the issue was not pressed which seemed strange to the source. Aside from this, everyone in attendance was required to pay a \$5 registration fee.

The source advised that there were those in attendance whose transportation was paid for, yet these were individuals who could afford to pay their own transportation. Free lodging was also provided for certain individuals.

The source advised that he could not recall any significant immoral activity taking place at the convention nor any other unusual activities.

The control of the convention by PLP was rather subtle. There was an attempt by the New Orleans chapter of SDS to remove PL from SDS; however, this move by New Orleans failed to gain way at Chicago. The PLP Faction failed to succeed in getting many voters, however, during the convention.

According to the source, the Revolutionary Marxist Caucus (RMC) was crude in comparison to individuals the PLP put forth as speakers.

The source was unable to furnish any specific information regarding the handling of funds while at the convention.

As the Bureau is aware, [REDACTED] of the Boston Office, is an expert on extremist organizations who [REDACTED]

The Boston Division, with Bureau permission, in the past has furnished information to [REDACTED] which has resulted in embarrassment and harassment towards the new left and has produced overall satisfactory results.

The Boston Division is offering for consideration at this time by the Bureau the possibility of furnishing to [REDACTED] on a confidential basis, certain information relative to activities, immoral or otherwise, of individuals at the NC with the intention of having this information appear in the [REDACTED] thus causing further embarrassment and harassment.

The above is being proposed by the Boston Division at this time for serious consideration by the Bureau as a major counterintelligence step against the WSA/SDS at a time when they are in a state of flux and are in the process of relocating their national headquarters.

I. POTENTIAL COUNTERINTELLIGENCE ACTION

Boston in referenced communication of 10/16/70, furnished the Bureau with potential counterintelligence suggestions to be implemented at Detroit, Mich., 11/3/70, during the National Demonstration being staged by the WSA Faction of SDS. Bureau instructed certain offices to purposely agitate individuals associated with the National Headquarters (NH) of SDS at Boston, in order to widen the split between the NH and major chapters around the country. The full impact of any attempt to create discord at Detroit has yet to be felt on a national level. It is hoped, however, that positive results will be realized.

Boston is currently giving consideration to exploiting the racism theme of the WSA/SDS and PLP people. It is noted there are no Negroes presently serving in a leadership capacity for either organization.

II. PENDING COUNTERINTELLIGENCE ACTION

Aside from that mentioned above in Section I regarding attempts by informants to instill discord within the leadership of WSA/SDS, Boston has no further pending counterintelligence at this time.

III. TANGIBLE RESULTS

Boston in referenced airtel of 7/31/70, requested the Bureau to authorize Boston to advise the Boston Police Dept. Intelligence Unit when certain individuals wanted by the Cambridge, Mass. Police Dept. were at the NH. Boston advised the Bureau that criminal trespass charges were outstanding at Cambridge, Mass. against four members of SDS for their part in a disruptive picket line at Harvard University, Cambridge on 5/8/70. Boston on 10/2/70, advised the Boston, Mass. Police Dept. of the presence of [REDACTED] the NH of SDS, 173A Massachusetts Ave. Boston. [REDACTED]

Information was received from [REDACTED] about [REDACTED] which was immediately furnished to the Boston, Mass. Police Dept. who accompanied by detectives of Cambridge, Mass. Police Dept. entered the NH and arrested [REDACTED]. According to [REDACTED] and other informants who have furnished reliable information, this caused a great deal of disruption at the NH and consternation within the membership within the days to follow. The NH suspects an informant within their ranks and paranoid is running high.

As late as 11/16/70, [REDACTED] was still reporting instances of suspicion on the part of the NH staff as to who informant is within their ranks that caused the arrest of [REDACTED] at the NH on 10/2/70.

On 11/14/70, [REDACTED] who are being sought on the same charge as [REDACTED] were arrested at Dorchester, Mass. by Cambridge and Boston Police Departments. Both were arrested as a result of continual cooperation between the Boston Division and the Boston and Cambridge, Mass. Police Departments. Pertinent information along with photos

of these individuals was furnished to both departments.
(DANIEL VEACH, the fourth and last subject being sought,
subsequently surrendered himself to the Cambridge,
Mass. Police Dept.)

IV. MISCELLANEOUS

Boston is well aware of the need for good counterintelligence in order to counteract some of the activities of the New Left within the Boston Division. All agents working security and racial matters have been alerted to this need and advised to immediately furnish any and all suggestions to the agent coordinating this matter in order that the suggestions may be forwarded to the Bureau in suitable form.

Re Boston letter to the Bureau, 5/15/70; Boston airtel to the Bureau, 6/12/70; Boston teletype to the Bureau, 6/30/70; Boston teletype to the Bureau, 7/13/70; and Boston airtel to the Bureau, 7/31/70.

I. POTENTIAL COUNTERINTELLIGENCE ACTION

In referenced airtel of 6/12/70, Boston advised the Bureau of a physical confrontation between the USV/PLP Faction of SDS and the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) at MIT, Cambridge, Mass., on Sunday, 5/24/70. At that time, a "flier" was submitted to the Bureau entitled, [REDACTED]. The flier was intended to be inflammatory in order to widen the split between the two groups and further disrupt their activities. Boston feels this incident still has potential for Counterintelligence, and as new suggestions are developed, will submit same to the Bureau.

Boston has an established source at the Middlesex House of Correction, Billerica, Mass., in the person of [REDACTED] of the Institution. [REDACTED] has been furnishing names and addresses of individuals visiting known New Leftists at the institution including two Weathermen and two members of the USV/PLP Faction of SDS. Visitors at Billerica are required under law to fill out a short questionnaire on each visit, furnishing their names, addresses, and whether or not they have ever been convicted of a felony. Any false information furnished, subjects the visitor to perjury punishable by a fine and/or prison sentence. Boston will, UICB, upon noting any discrepancy on the part of any visitor's questionnaire, advise [REDACTED] who in turn will initiate criminal proceedings against that person.

Boston in referenced teletype of 6/30/70, suggested to the Bureau the possibility of exposing [redacted] of CBS in New York, [redacted] a sympathizer of SDS; [redacted] being the father of [redacted] a functionary of the National Headquarters of SDS at Boston. The Bureau by return mail, advised Boston that there was no reasonable way for the Bureau to furnish this information to a confidential source at CBS at this time. The Bureau requested New York and Boston, however, to attempt to develop the means of furnishing this information without divulging Boston's source. Boston will upon developing such means, submit the same to the Bureau.

II. PENDING COUNTERINTELLIGENCE ACTION

Boston in referenced airtel of 7/31/70, advised the Bureau of four individuals associated with the National Headquarters of the WSF Faction of SDS at Boston, having criminal charges brought against them in East Cambridge District Court, Cambridge, Mass., on 7/14/70. The charges brought against them were criminal trespass on the part of Harvard University, for their part in a disruptive picket line at University Hall, Harvard, on 5/8/70. Boston suggested at that time that consideration be given to furnishing to the Boston Police Department information as its developed, that any one or all four of these individuals were physically present in the National Headquarters. This would enable the Boston Police Department to arrest any one or all four of these individuals at the National Headquarters without the benefit of a search warrant, thus enabling the police department to make a search incidental to an arrest, disrupting activities of the National Headquarters, and perhaps gaining intelligence data.

This matter is still awaiting Bureau approval.

Boston in referenced teletype of 7/13/70, advised the Bureau of racial disturbances in the west end of New Bedford, Mass., 7/9 - 12/70. At that time, it was pointed out that [redacted] a known member of the Weathermen Faction in

Greater Boston, (Boston file 100-40356), who is also a SI subject, was arrested and charged with attempted arson during the New Bedford disturbances. At the time of her arrest, she furnished her name as [REDACTED] Boston had earlier determined that she has been routinely visiting [REDACTED] at the Middlesex House of Correction, Billerica, Mass., where he is incarcerated. [REDACTED] (Boston file 100-40358) is also a Weathermen and SI subject. During her visits to the institution, she furnished her name officially as being [REDACTED] Boston at that time, advised the Bureau that it would furnish this information to the authorities at Billerica as well as the New Bedford Police Department, with the intention of possible criminal charges being brought against her for furnishing false information while visiting an inmate at the House of Correction. This information was subsequently furnished to a source at the House of Correction in Billerica, Mass., who is considering criminal proceedings against [REDACTED] at this time. The Bureau will be advised of any results.

III.

TANGIBLE RESULTS

Although there is nothing in this category for the Boston Division to report at this time since the submission of the last quarterly letter, it is felt that there is substantial potential under category 1, which if realized, would result in tangible Counterintelligence results.

IV.

MISCELLANEOUS

Counterintelligence suggestions pertaining to [REDACTED] found in Section I of the above, could also fall into the category of Section II. Boston is aware of the need for concrete counterintelligence suggestions being submitted to the Bureau on a routine basis, in this regard, will remain alert to any possibilities which can be forwarded to the Bureau on a timely basis. All agents working New Left Security Matters have been made aware of the need for counterintelligence activity in the New Left, and have been instructed to immediately furnish any suggestions to the case agent for submission to the Bureau.

All of the four had been formally advised prior to 5/8/70 not to return to the Harvard campus without the express written consent of the Harvard administration. The demonstration on 5/8/70 took the form of picket line blocking people from entering University Hall.

For the information of the Bureau, at least 3 of these individuals frequent the office of the National Headquarters (NH) of the SDS (USA Faction), 1734 Massachusetts Avenue, Boston, Massachusetts.

The following counter-intelligence suggestion is being made:

If the informant reports anyone of the above as being at the NH, Boston will in turn advise the Intelligence Division of the Boston Police Department who in turn will make the arrest(s) at the NH. This will enable the Intelligence Division to observe the activities of the NH, conduct a search incidental to the arrest, disrupt the activities, and hopefully gain intelligence data. It is also felt the NH will suspect that they have an informant within their ranks or that the NH and its staff is under surveillance by the Boston Police Department. A stop will be placed with Agents handling [REDACTED] to advise the Boston Police Department immediately in order to avoid delay.

The information from [REDACTED] will be paraphrased to protect the identity of this sensitive source.

It is requested of the Bureau to give this suggestion careful consideration and to advise Boston as soon as possible in order that this suggestion may have a timely effect.

On 6/8/70, [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] Boston, advised that P. O. Box 31, Cambridge, Massachusetts 02140, has been listed for at least the past two years by the National Committee to Abolish HISC, now known as the National Committee to Abolish HISC. [REDACTED] further advised that lately this P. O. box has been the receptacle of mail addressed to CFFR, as well as National Committee to Abolish HISC. It appears that the CFFR is a name being used by the National Committee to Abolish HISC as perhaps a name to attract new interest or to act as a name for receiving mail, literature, etc.

The Committee to Fight Political Repression was chosen as the "sponsor" for this "flier" because of their very name and since there is no indication at this time that they are connected in any way with either SDS or SMC.

Since the confrontation at MIT on 5/24/70, both SMC and SDS have been attacking each other in print (note attached fliers) and even in the press as can be seen from the above layout.

Furthermore, [REDACTED] has advised on almost a daily basis since that date that the SDS headquarters at 173A Massachusetts Avenue, Boston, Massachusetts, has been receiving anonymous, threatening telephone calls relative to their attack on SMC members.

This incident is the third recent physical confrontation between the major groups. [REDACTED] an active member of SMC, was attacked by members of SDS and seriously injured on 5/3/70. This attack also occurred at MIT. During the 5/15/70 anti-war demonstration on Boston Common, SDS and SMC members clashed near the stage where SDS members were attempting to have one of their speakers put on the agenda to present their views, etc.

The mat which Boston is enclosing at this time has been put together with the assistance of a confidential source of the Boston Division; namely, [REDACTED]

A review of the layout reveals that the news articles are anything but complimentary to either side.

The Boston Division is submitting this layout to the Bureau at this time in order for the Bureau to consider the approval of such a layout and furthermore the printing of this layout. Boston is requesting the Bureau at this time to approve the layout and to furnish Boston with approximately 1,000 copies. UACB, these copies in turn will be furnished to [REDACTED] through his facilities, contacts, and staff, will distribute these "fliers" to areas where they will gain the most coverage, for example, bulletin boards of major universities in the Boston area. By [REDACTED] doing this, in no way will there be a connection between the "flier" and the Bureau. For the information of the Bureau, no commitments have been made to [REDACTED] at this time.

Boston is of the opinion that it would be advantageous to distribute such a "flier" for the following reasons:

1. It will foster the split between SDS and SMC.
2. It will hinder the possibility of their cementing broken relationships.
3. A mistrust will be created among SMC, SDS, and CFFR. It is probable that both SMC and SDS will be somewhat upset at CFFR for distributing such a "flier" and CFFR in turn will in all probability be infuriated over the fact that someone is using their name and may even suspect SMC.

4. It will possibly prevent CFPR from gaining further inroads with the relatively new name since this "flier" will in all likelihood bring them criticism.
5. The possibility exists that the New Left movement nationally will be hurt as well as being somewhat injured in the Boston area.

A sixth and probably more timely benefit which could be derived from such a "flier" is the fact that SMC is sponsoring a national anti-war conference at Cleveland 6/19-21/70. [REDACTED] as late as 6/12/70 has advised that members of the WSA/FLP faction of SDS intend to travel to this conference even though they are at odds with SMC. Furthermore, they are attempting to get fellow members from across the country to join with them. The reasons in doing this are to present their policies and confront SMC ideologically and possibly physically. Should the Bureau approve the enclosed mat, it may want to consider the distributing of these "fliers" to the Cleveland Division for distribution through a source or sources similar to [REDACTED]. In doing so, it may create further dissonance between the two organizations.

It is requested of the Bureau to advise the Boston Division as soon as possible of its decision in this matter in order to take advantage of a timely situation.

On 5/28/70, [REDACTED] advised that [REDACTED] on that date was at [REDACTED] Boston, for a job interview. [REDACTED] found out she had to be 21 years of age in order to obtain employment as a cocktail waitress and was willing to lie about her age and to forge some sort of identification card in order to obtain employment since she was only twenty years of age.

On 5/29/70, [REDACTED] advised that [REDACTED] had obtained a job at [REDACTED] and that on this date she was interviewed by the owner of the restaurant, [REDACTED] was to begin employment on 6/1/70.

On 6/2/70, [REDACTED] advised that [REDACTED] was now working at [REDACTED] and on this date was working there during the evening hours.

On 6/3/70, the Boston Division determined through the Intelligence Division of the Boston PD that forgery on the part of an individual to seek employment for the purpose of serving alcoholic beverages in this state was a minor offense and in all probability would only result in the dismissal of the employee as opposed to a conviction in court. Furthermore, it raised the possibility of the employer being subject to reprimand and/or a possible fine from the Alcoholic Beverage Commission (ABC). The Boston PD advised, however, that a person who forges a Mass. driver's license would be committing a felony and punishable up to five years in the state prison. (Inquiry was made through the Intelligence Division without divulging purpose or details.)

On 6/4/70, the records of the Mass. Registry of Motor Vehicles were searched by [REDACTED] to determine if subject ever applied for a driver's license with negative results. This included a search of section dealing with students who transfer their residence from another state to Mass. while attending college.

The Boston Division is recommending at this time that contact be made with [REDACTED] advising him of [REDACTED] position with the SDS and further to make inquiry as to the type of identification she used in obtaining employment. The overall results gained from this contact will be:

1. Possible termination of employment resulting in harrassing and possible disruption of the SDS headquarters;
 2. A further possible harrassment if it is determined that [REDACTED] forged an instrument, such as a driver's license from another state, which could possibly result in a conviction;

The Boston Division at this time is requesting that the Bureau consider the above recommendation as soon as possible since the possibility always exists that [REDACTED] will become disenchanted with her position and terminate employment on her own.

As the Bureau is aware, [REDACTED] Key Activist and deposed leader of the Weatherman Faction in Greater Boston, is now serving a two year sentence for assault and battery at the Middlesex House of Correction, Billerica, Massachusetts, this being for his part in the attack on the Center for International Affairs (CFIA) at Harvard University on 9/25/69. [REDACTED] and others were convicted as a result of photographs furnished the Cambridge Police Department (CPD) by the Boston Division. Others were identified by victims, however, their names were unknown, hence JOHN DOE warrants were obtained by Cambridge for these unknown individuals.

On 3/18/70, subject arrested by the Campus Police at Northeastern University, Boston, Massachusetts, attempting to break into a building. He was subsequently turned over to the Boston Police Department. [REDACTED] photograph was obtained by the Boston Division and after a review of this photograph by agent personnel, it was believed subject was identical to an individual depicted in an earlier photograph from the demonstration, this photograph having been furnished to the CPD earlier.

Following transmission of referenced Airtel, contact was made with [REDACTED] who was carrying out the eviction proceedings at [REDACTED] Cambridge, Mass., to effect plans for covering the eviction when it took place. [REDACTED] was uncertain as to the date of the eviction and mentioned that if the occupants of the apartment (second floor) wanted to contest the eviction, a court appearance would be scheduled for [REDACTED] promised his full cooperation to the FBI at all steps of the eviction proceedings.

On 3/5/70, a neighborhood source covering [REDACTED] indicated the tenants on the second floor had moved. Agents contacted the new tenant, [REDACTED] and learned he had moved into the apartment during a previous evening and was in the process of cleaning the apartment and painting it at his own expense. He claimed he was unaware of the background of the previous tenants and any material which they might have left behind. In view of this, no further action can be taken

with respect to the suggestions outlined in reAirtel; however, the Bureau should note the eviction proceedings and eventual movement of the Weathermen from this address, as well as others mentioned heretofore, are the result of investigative activity over the past six weeks by Agents of this office.

As the Bureau is aware, [redacted] Bufile 100-450009; Boston file 100-37552), a Key Activist, is presently residing in the Boston area and serves in the capacity of member of the National Interim Committee of the WSA faction of SDS. On 3/5/70, it was determined through [redacted]

[redacted], that [redacted] is a kitchen worker in the kitchen at Northeastern University on the night shift. It was further determined that the kitchen concession is handled by Servomation, Inc. of Stoneham, Mass. [redacted] advised that individuals working for this organization are first cleared, which includes a background check. [redacted] was of the opinion that if any individual hired by this organization to work on campus has any type of criminal background and hides this fact, this could be the basis for immediate dismissal.

As the Bureau is aware, [redacted] was arrested by the Sheriff's Department at Tallahassee, Florida on [redacted] 69 for his part in a demonstration at that time. Although this matter is still pending before the courts, it nevertheless is part of his background and should have been reported by him when seeking employment. Boston is unaware at this time if, in fact, [redacted] did report this fact. The recommendation is being made at this time that the Boston Office furnish this information to [redacted] who, in turn, could furnish this information to the proper source at Northeastern who would be in a position to take action as to having [redacted] dismissed. For the information of the Bureau, [redacted]

[redacted] The Boston Office is certain that information furnished to him re [redacted] background would in no way be attributed to the FBI at a later time.

It is obvious from [redacted] position with the WSA faction that his primary purpose in working in the capacity of a kitchen worker is to foster the aims and goals of the Progressive Labor Party-oriented faction of SDS for which he serves. It is felt that by removing him from this job, the activities of the WSA will be deterred to some extent in this area.

getting an entirely new view from the same newspaper concerning the SDS and the Weatherman faction.

Because favorable results have been received with respect to this technique and in view of the anticipated abandonment of the Weatherman collective at [REDACTED] Cambridge, Mass., Boston desires authority to furnish [REDACTED] photographs which will be taken at that address when the eviction is finally consummated and our cooperative source will make the premises available to Agents of this office. [REDACTED] has excellent connections with the television stations in the area and arrangements can be made for TV coverage of the eviction without Agent personnel in the vicinity or being involved in any way. [REDACTED] would be amenable to either approach to this counterintelligence technique and since we have received good coverage in the news media of the eviction at [REDACTED] it would seem worthy of consideration to involve the television media in the eviction at [REDACTED]

Information to date indicates the exact eviction date at [REDACTED] is uncertain but will be consummated within the next two weeks. Bureau authority for either of the above suggestions is requested at an early date since the notice of eviction will be short and Boston would like to act upon receipt of that information.

With respect to the photographs already given to [REDACTED] it is anticipated he will use these in future articles since he writes for a large number of publications in various parts of the country and also lectures to various groups where he will use the photographs to demonstrate the low-life characteristics of the Weathermen. Thus, it is anticipated we will get much more mileage out of this material.

The Bureau may wish to consider furnishing this technique to other offices with Weatherman collectives as part of a continuing campaign to present the true picture of the Weatherman way of life to the public.

SDS, and Weatherman functionary, for his attacks at English High School, Boston, Mass., on 10/1/69, and the Center for International Affairs, Harvard University, 9/25/69. Information was also furnished to these Police Departments that certain other individuals involved with [REDACTED] in these attacks and for whom John Doe warrants were outstanding in Cambridge were also residing at these collectives.

Information from Boston sources was additionally furnished to the Cambridge, Mass., PD that [REDACTED] had recently returned to Cambridge from Vermont and had scheduled a press conference at Cambridge, Mass., in preparation to surrendering to the Cambridge PD on the Assault and Battery warrant. As a result of this information, Cambridge, Mass., PD arrested [REDACTED] as he was attempting to hold a press conference. Two other Weathermen assisting [REDACTED] at this conference were also arrested on outstanding John Doe warrants.

Further, as a result of photographs furnished to the Cambridge PD by this Division, another individual was identified for his participation in the attack on the Center for International Affairs at Harvard and a warrant issued for his arrest.

Authorities were of the opinion that these arrests of key weathermen functionaries helped to stifle considerably other weathermen-planned activities in the Greater Boston area.

In regard to captioned program, Boston proposes the following course of action:

It has been determined that [REDACTED] a Harvard College undergraduate student currently designated as a key activist and National Interim Committee member PLP-SDS, is presently employed at the [REDACTED] a Harvard University [REDACTED] utilized by graduate students.

[REDACTED] has caused considerable embarrassment to Harvard University authorities in connection with his SDS membership and was involved in the takeover of University Hall, Harvard College by SDS factions in 4/69. He was most recently involved on 11/19/69 in a sit-in at University Hall, Harvard, wherein SDS demonstrators demanded that all Harvard painters helpers be promoted to painters and that twenty percent of the labor force on all Harvard construction sites be "blacks" and "third world" workers.

Boston, with Bureau approval, wishes to furnish this information confidentially to [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] an established source and [REDACTED] of this Division, has been of incalculable assistance to this office in providing security information pertaining to the University. [REDACTED] has advised previously that it would be possible to have an employee without cause fired from his position for justifiable cause. [REDACTED] as previously indicated that he appreciates Bureau interest in such matters and advises that these interests would be fully protected at all times.

Re New Orleans letter and LHM dated 9/25/70, captioned "STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY, WORKER-STUDENT ALLIANCE, IS - SDS;" no copies designated for the Atlanta, Miami, and New York Offices. Bureau letter to Detroit dated 10/13/70, captioned "STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY, WORKER-STUDENT ALLIANCE, IS - SDS;" copies designated for the below recipient offices with the exception of the Chicago and New York Offices.

For the information of the Chicago and New York Offices, referenced Bureau letter made reference to New Orleans LHM which contained a copy of a three-page statement written by [REDACTED] of the Berkeley, California, SDS. This article was highly critical of the SDS/NSA National Interim Conference report by [REDACTED] SDS/NSA National [REDACTED]. Referenced Bureau letter pointed out that it is apparent from the [REDACTED] statement as well as from information furnished by [REDACTED] concerning the National Interim Committee (NIC) that there is a great deal of disagreement among SDS/NSA leaders. The Bureau instructed the Boston Office to consider exploitation of this dissension through the use of a counterintelligence measure (Coin-telpro) and submit its observations concerning this matter. The following is submitted per these instructions:

Information provided by [redacted] and other sources within SDS/USA indicate that the most significant situation occurring within SDS/USA at the present time appears to be the rising opposition developing among San Francisco, Chicago, and New Orleans SDS chapters against the National Headquarters (NH) in Boston. The basic issue involved is the role of the NH in the organization. The above 3 chapters and possibly others have argued that the rank-and-file members within SDS have not been allowed to determine policy for the organization via National Council and national conferences. Activists within these chapters argue that the NH of SDS is playing the major leadership role in the organization by setting policy for SDS. These 3 chapters view the above as an extremely undesirable trend within SDS and feel that it is thwarting SDS from becoming a mass-based anti-war revolutionary organization. Activists within these 3 chapters argue that SDS has been successful in the past and can be successful in the future only if the organization allows its rank-and-file members to formulate the national meetings.

In addition, members of the anti-NH faction within SDS, in particular, [redacted] and [redacted] and [redacted] from Chicago are advocates of far more militant tactics than are members of the NH faction.

Also, there are those within SDS who accept the Progressive Labor Party influence and others who resent it.

It is obvious that based on the above information, there is growing resentment among various SDS/USA chapters who have taken an anti-NH stand. Unfortunately for their cause, the NH seems to disregard their complaints.

their "undemocratic" and neglectful attitude toward rank-and-file members.

Indications are that the NH is planning conferences in the San Francisco, San Jose, and Detroit areas on 11/1/70 and 11/2/70 to prepare for the national demonstration on 11/3/70. Such conferences could serve as occasions for attending disgruntled SDS/WSA representatives to air their critical views of the NH and hopefully develop a strong platform, thereby substantially promoting the already existing factionalism within SDS.

Request of the Bureau

The Bureau is requested to study the above observations set forth by the Boston Office and, if found acceptable, authorize recipient offices to encourage their [redacted] particularly those who plan to attend the national demonstrations, to agitate in their respective SDS/WSA groups with a view toward confronting the NH on the above issues during the national demonstrations for the purpose of promoting factionalism within SDS/WSA, and thereby weakening its current unsteady posture.

Request of Recipient Offices:

A case in point is the situation in Florida where the SDS was overlooked when the Southern Regional Conference (held 10/9-11/79 in Atlanta, Georgia) was planned. A Miami source felt that Florida SDS was overlooked since it has been vocal in its feelings that there are too many Regional and SRO meetings which drain its local treasury and delegate expenses.

It seems that the above anti-NM forces are having difficulty uniting in order that they might achieve strength and influence within SDS/USA. One probable explanation is that they have been unable to physically assemble as a united force and challenge the NM on its "lack of inner debate and struggle around ideas and practice" and "isolation from the ideas and interests of the majority of students," as [redacted] alleges in his statement referenced to above.

It would appear that the SDS/USA planned national demonstrations in San Jose, California, and Detroit, Michigan, on 11/2/79 would afford the anti-NM groups an opportunity to achieve universal assembly and simultaneously challenge the NM forces from a position of strength rather than having to express their resentment and complaints from various sectors of the United States, thereby eliminating the possibility of much-needed broad support.

In order to alert the anti-NM forces to the above opportunity, the Liaison Office suggests that the Bureau authorize recipient offices to encourage [redacted] who are affiliated with factional groups within SDS/USA to discreetly suggest without creating undue suspicion that representatives of the SDS/USA group in question be sent to the sites of the planned 11/3/79 national demonstration, principally to confront NM representatives on

1. Potential Counterintelligence Action

By letter dated 8/26/69, Boston furnished the Bureau with plans to furnish [REDACTED] on extremist movements, who in the past has been furnished with Bureau approval public source data which he successfully used in several newspaper articles which graphically exposed radical and subversive local elements, some material and suggestions regarding the rift that exists between the Black Panther Party (BPP) and the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) in an attempt to further inflame already injured feelings on both sides. This will be furnished to the Bureau as soon as possible for their concurrence.

Boston will also remain alert to initiate any counter-intelligence measures in furtherance of this program.

2. Pending Counterintelligence Action

Boston by letter to the Bureau dated 10/2/69 requested permission to furnish information to [REDACTED] regarding [REDACTED] of confidential informants from the office of Mr. [REDACTED]

by [REDACTED] has been identified as the mistress of [REDACTED] a Harvard Senior and SDS committee member of the Harvard-Radcliffe Chapter. [REDACTED] is further identified as a friend of [REDACTED] of the "Old Mole," self-described as a radical biweekly newspaper, and [REDACTED] a Key Activist of the Boston Division.

The "Old Mole" has published several articles in the past with information secured from Mr. [REDACTED] confidential files. Boston feels that with Bureau permission this counter-intelligence measure would dry up a valuable source of information for SDS and the "Old Mole" as well as provide a valuable service for a good source of this Office. Security would be assured.

3. Tangible Results

Boston with Bureau approval furnished Mr. [REDACTED] Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), Cambridge, Mass., an established source of this Office, information to the effect that [REDACTED] referred to above, and [REDACTED] a former [REDACTED] of SDS, were employed by MIT as instructors in the Department of Humanities. Mr. [REDACTED] because of this information was able to have [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] reappointments to the staff of MIT canceled. Mr. [REDACTED] said that [REDACTED] was being considered for the post of instructor in Humanities for the 1969-1970 academic year and [REDACTED] reappointment as an instructor would have been automatic. [REDACTED] was very grateful for this public source data received and indicated that all aspects of this operation would be kept confidential.

Boston in cooperation with the Cambridge PD provided a number of photographs of radicals operating in the Boston area as a result of a group of 15 youths who forcibly ejected 25 occupants of a Harvard University building. These youths held the building for fifteen minutes before leaving and several of the personnel in the building were injured while being ousted from the premises, two requiring medical attention.

The Cambridge PD does not have an intelligence unit and did not have any photographs of any of the radical elements in the Metropolitan Boston area. As a result of the furnishing of these photographs, one of the participants in the occupation of the Harvard building was identified as [REDACTED] a Key Activist of the Boston Division. The Cambridge PD have sworn out a warrant for his arrest on charges of Assault and Battery and Trespass.

During the course of a demonstration held in front of the John F. Kennedy Federal Building, 10/4/69, sponsored by local SDS groups, several SDS members from the Boston Univ. and Harvard-Radcliffe Chapters were observed parking their cars illegally in the vicinity of the JFK Federal Building. The fact that these cars were parked illegally was called to the attention of the Boston PD Traffic Division and parking tickets amounting to \$80. were leveled against the SDS illegal parkers.

The university has in some instances evicted tenants from these apartments in order to implement their building program.

In the past Boston has utilized cooperative sources at local TV and radio stations, as well as writers, lecturers and newspapermen, in order to implement captioned program.

One such source is [REDACTED] a cooperative [REDACTED] [REDACTED] on extremist organizations; who in the past has been furnished with Bureau-approved public source data which he used successfully in several newspaper articles which graphically exposed radical and subversive local elements.

[REDACTED] through his contacts at the [REDACTED] a cooperative Boston newspaper, could ghost-write a feature article which would outline in detail the recent rift between SDS and BPP as outlined in rebuairtel. Such an article would be a natural follow-up to recent articles concerning black extremist groups which have appeared in the press in nationally syndicated columns. In this connection [REDACTED] could also initiate a series of interviews with leaders of the BPP and SDS locally in an attempt to secure their comments on the rift. These interviews could very well inflame the already injured feelings on both sides.

Boston also proposes utilization of the services of [redacted] for the Boston [redacted] who could create a [redacted] to appear in the [redacted] depicting this split.

It is noted that [redacted] an affiliate of the [redacted] conducts a weekly [redacted] interview program. Through cooperative sources at this radio station, Boston could arrange for inquiring reporter to interview both black and white members of the public concerning the falling out of BPP and SDS.

Boston also suggests that an anonymous letter campaign be initiated with Bureau approval which would be directed at the leadership of SDS and BPP locally and which would present very pointed articles outlining the shortcomings of each group and its leaders and highlighting the basis for the dispute.

Since the BPP and the National Office faction of SDS locally have sponsored joint protest meetings in Boston during the past ten days, it is believed that the use of anonymous telephone calls to the headquarters of each group in an effort to confuse and cancel orders and plans for meetings would also be an effective counterintelligence action.

Information has recently been developed that [redacted] leader of BPP, Boston Group, made the claim during a preinduction physical that he was a [redacted] and, therefore, unfit for military service. [redacted] has [redacted] which would have disqualified him for military service and, therefore, would obviate the need for the [redacted] deferment. In view of this it is believed that [redacted] is in fact a [redacted] and rumors to this effect are being heard in black militant circles in this area.

Boston suggests that the ludicrous situation of an admitted [redacted] leading a militant black organization which is seeking the adulation of young members of the black community could be utilized to great advantage as a counterintelligence measure.

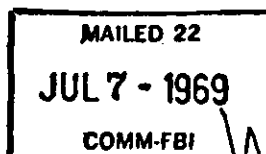

Enclosed for the Bureau is a copy of "The Daily Reamer" dated 1/21/69. This newspaper is printed periodically by Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) students who also publish "The Tech," the Institute's semi-weekly student newspaper. "The Daily Reamer" is considered to be a "tongue in cheek" type newspaper by the student body spoofing national, local and Institute activities.

Page 1 of this paper contains a photograph of a group of "Faculty" members in a near-naked state supposedly protesting an "Inscomm" meeting. The masthead on page 1 also is purposely and delicately placed in a strategic spot as indicated in the photograph on page 1. Page 5 of the newspaper sets out the "Bored of Directors." There are numerous other "sick humor" type photographs and stories throughout the 12 pages of this newspaper, such as the featured headline on page 4 and other articles on pages 6, 8 and 10.

Boston noted after reading the paper that there are numerous advertisements scattered throughout the paper, including a half-page on page 12 from the National Security Agency, Washington, D. C.

Dow Chemical Company, Xerox, Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, Alcoa and Bethlehem Steel are some of the other nationally known companies that have advertised in this newspaper. These companies undoubtedly were under the impression that these advertisements would be placed in the legitimate bi-weekly MIT newspaper, "The Tech," and are not aware that "The Daily Reamer" is in existence.

COUNTERINTELLIGENCE - KEY ACTIVISTS

Previous instructions have been furnished to you regarding the institution and development of the counter-intelligence program. As you are aware, this program was designed specifically for the purpose of disrupting and neutralizing the New Left and was to include its chief disciples. Some offices have approached the problems involved with imagination and enthusiasm. Others have only afforded them lip service.

While an attack upon the various New Left organizations is necessary and should be pursued, this phase of the program should not be followed to the exclusion of attention to its leaders and ideologists.

As office of origin in an investigation of a key activist, you must realize that one of your prime objectives under this program is to neutralize those individuals whose relationship with the New Left movement has been so important as to warrant their designation as key activists.

You must realize that the continued unimpeded activity of these individuals poses a direct threat to the security of the nation. In this light, their neutralization becomes even more imperative. You must, therefore, approach this problem aggressively. The Agent handling a key activist must be alert for any and all situations which hold a possi-

bility for effective counterintelligence action. It is not possible for the SOG to recognize and forewarn of situations that may hold potential for action of this nature. It is necessary, therefore, that each Agent handling these individuals becomes so familiar with their background, habits, and current activities that he will immediately recognize openings for decisive counterintelligence action when they occur. Further, it is not always possible to plan these measures weeks in advance. Each office must, therefore, be prepared to act expeditiously when the occasion arises. It must be borne in mind that violations of local statutes always present an excellent opportunity to frustrate these individuals and to limit their activity within the New Left movement. In this respect, where information regarding a violation of law by a key activist is developed, consistent with the security of your investigation and sources, this information should be promptly furnished to local authorities or to law enforcement authorities having jurisdiction over the violation. You will be expected to follow these situations closely, thereafter, to determine what actions are subsequently taken by these agencies.

Your approach to the neutralization of the key activists is being closely followed at the Bureau. You will be expected to be aggressive and resourceful. A lackadaisical attitude will not be tolerated. Failure on your part to seize the initiative may result in administrative action being taken.

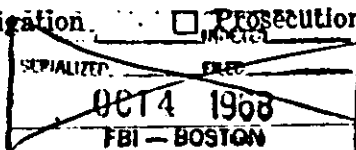

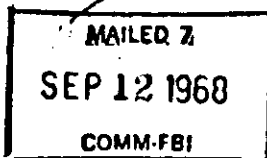

Boston is investigating an individual by the name of [REDACTED] for PSI purposes in this program with Bureau authority. He is a discharged member of the U.S. Air Force.

Boston, by letter dated 5/17/68 with enclosed LHM captioned "STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY: IS-SDS", and dated 5/17/68, advised the Bureau that [REDACTED] on 5/16/68 advised that the Harvard-Radcliffe SDS Chapter was forming a committee to do research work and to determine the injustices that Harvard University has perpetrated for the purpose of requesting the Harvard University student body in the fall cooperate in participating in civil disturbances similar to those that recently occurred at Columbia University, New York City, New York.

This is the only indication of possible violence at any of the aforementioned schools this fall.

The enclosed LHMs in some instances have been classified "CONFIDENTIAL" because the unauthorized disclosure of information set forth therein could reasonably result in the compromise of the sources of continuing value, jeopardize their future effectiveness and adversely affect United States national defense.

Boston will make every effort to develop additional coverage at the schools mentioned in enclosed LHMs in an effort to determine if any New Left activity occurs or if any New Left organization comes into being at any of these schools other than the SDS.

The Wednesday, [REDACTED] 1967 issue of "The Beacon", a weekly campus newspaper of the student body of the URI, Kingston, Rhode Island, contains an article by [REDACTED] concerning the SDA. Information set forth in this article relates that the organization is seven years old; that it is actually a branch of the much larger national organization; Students for Democratic Society (SDS); that it could not be called SDS because money would not be allotted by the Student Senate if it were affiliated with a national organization; and that it follows the policies of the national organization, SDS.

Its reported purpose is to make the university students better aware of the nature of United States involvement in foreign affairs.

A source who has provided reliable information in the past advised during June, 1968 that the Students For A Democratic Society (SDS) maintains an active chapter at MIT, Cambridge, Massachusetts.

A characterization of SDS is contained in the appendix.

According to this source, the actual membership figures for the MIT SDS Chapter are unknown at the present time. However, the leadership of this chapter is in the hands of SDS activists.

A second source who has provided reliable information in the past also advised in June, 1968 that MIT is a rather unique educational institution in that most students in attendance are serious-minded young people who are all engaged in serious academic pursuits which leaves little time for outside activity. Those campus organizations that are active are usually run by a small group of activists and the membership number in attendance at meetings is usually very small and will fluctuate depending on the amount of class work each student has or the time of year.

[REDACTED] is presently enrolled as a member of the Class of 1970, majoring in Life Science. [REDACTED] according to the [REDACTED] source, is also an active member of the SDS Chapter at MIT.

In April, 1968, [REDACTED] was also identified as a member of the District Committee, CPUSA, District 1, by the [REDACTED] source referred to above.

"The Tech," an MIT student newspaper, identified [REDACTED] as being a member of the Boston Draft Resistance Group who spoke at an anti-draft, anti-war demonstration held at the MIT Student Center.

[REDACTED] is presently enrolled as a member of the Class of 1969 at MIT with his major field of concentration, Humanities & Engineering. He is a Canadian national.

During March, 1967 the [REDACTED] source mentioned above identified [REDACTED] as an activist with the MIT SDS Chapter. In February, 1968 the [REDACTED] source referred to identified [REDACTED] as one of the student leaders of a protest demonstration sponsored by the SDS, MIT Chapter. This demonstration protested the appearance of a US Army recruiter on the MIT campus

[REDACTED] was described in "the Tech" as one of MIT's most outspoken anti-Vietnam war activists who, among other things, has been withholding a portion of his income tax in protest of the US policy in Vietnam. In the "Yale Daily News" edition of [REDACTED] 1968, [REDACTED] was described as [REDACTED] of "The Resistance!"

III. Campus Disruptive Activities

On February 28, 1968 the [REDACTED] source advised that about 50 students gathered in front of the Student Union Building, MIT to protest the appearance of a US Army Recruiter on the MIT campus. The demonstrators, according to the source, marched through MIT Academic Building in hope of securing additional demonstrators, however, after failure in this endeavor, disbanded without incident.

According to this source [REDACTED] of the SDS MIT Chapter was one of the leaders of this demonstration. On April 3, 1968 the [REDACTED] source referred to above advised that a group of approximately 50 undergraduates, graduates, students, and faculty members held an open anti-draft, anti-Vietnam meeting in the MIT Student center on April 2, 1968.

When they failed to remain in a designated area, several of these individuals, including some faculty and student members of the university, were arrested for disorderly conduct.

The Wednesday, [REDACTED] 1967 issue of "The Beacon, URI" announced that the SDA, according to [REDACTED] was soliciting marchers to join as concerned individuals in the October 21 peace demonstration at Washington, D.C. The above issue, page 6, set forth the Founding Declaration of the YSA. This declaration stated that the YSA recognizes the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) as the only existing political leadership on class struggle principles, and that the supporters of the YS have come into basic political solidarity with the SWP on the principles of revolutionary socialism.

On March 10, 1967, a source advised that the YSA was formed during 1957, by youth of various left socialist tendencies, particularly members and followers of the SWP. The source further advised that the YSA has recently become more open about admitting that it is the youth group of the SWP and that an SWP representative has publicly stated that the YSA is the SWP's youth group.

Source advised that on May 6, 1968, Herbert Aptheker, a Communist Party official, spoke at the college. Source advised that Aptheker had been invited to speak at the college by the Lecture Committee. Source advised that the Lecture Committee is composed of faculty and student members who invite a lecturer to the college once a month. Source advised that students and faculty members at the college are invited to submit names of lecturers that they would like to speak at the college and that the members of the Lecture Committee then choose the lecturer from the submitted names.

Source advised that Aptheker spoke on the Viet Nam war and that he was introduced by [REDACTED] a member of the Class of 1970, who identified himself as being connected with the Students For A Democratic Society (SDA).

Two of these concerned protesting the appearance of personnel recruiters on the Tufts campus. The first concerned the Dow Chemical Company and the second involved the CIA. The third demonstration took place at the ROTC Review held on May 17, 1968 at Tufts.

In the "Tufts Weekly" of [REDACTED] 1967 there is an article entitled [REDACTED]. According to the article, from 60 to 80 students and faculty members marched around the Tufts Placement Office on November 7 and 8, 1967 protesting in-campus CIA recruiting. The article further mentioned that Mr. [REDACTED] in commenting concerning this demonstration stated that he "couldn't be more pleased with the demonstrators' conduct". "This demonstration is going to be a stand-out for this reason. A militant lock-in proves nothing and tends to wash out the aims of the movement."

According to the source, the demonstration against recruitment by Dow at Tufts took place on November 20, 1967. There was no violence involved nor sit-in.

The "Tufts Weekly" of May 10, 1968 carried an article entitled "ROTC Review Protested." Therein it was mentioned that "peace demonstrators heed a non-violent protest against the military establishment and assisted with the first draft card burning in Tufts history during the annual Naval and Air Force ROTC Review Tuesday at the Tufts Oval.

[redacted] a graduate philosophy student, accompanied by about 20 sympathizers, confronted President Hollowell in the reviewing stands during the proceedings and demanded that Dr. Hollowell accept his draft card. The president refused. [redacted] then tore the card up, placed it on Hollowell's lap and left. Most of the other 60 or so demonstrators left the Oval with [redacted]

[redacted] told Weekly that Hollowell has been giving de facto support to the war through sanctioned on-campus military recruiting and ROTC. [redacted] chose the ROTC Review to turn in his draft card for dramatic effect. "I wanted to show where Hollowell stands," he said. [redacted] continued, "I told Hollowell that he was no more than an apologist for the administration. He can't continue to be a moral coward. He can't continue to play both sides. Hollowell must either renounce his obligations to the government or he must show his support for it by reporting my felony (of mutilating a draft card).

[redacted] added that his action was also for the benefit of the "liberals, pseudo-radicals, and other nominal activists" on campus. "SDS and the other demonstrators are still playing games," he emphasized. "It's no longer a game with me."

The source, on June 27, 1968 related that there was no outside influence in any of the demonstrations at Tufts. According to the source, one member of the Tufts faculty who has been active in demonstrations at Tufts is [redacted] Assistant Professor of Biology.

This source further pointed out that the trend at Tufts is opposition to the activities of the New Left. As an example of this, SDS wanted to do away completely with the Senior Class dinner, graduation, and the like and allegedly donate the money for these affairs to the Negro cause. A ranking Tufts official, namely, the [redacted] in speaking at the dinner declared that these traditional senior affairs were going to be maintained and anyone who did not like it can get out of Tufts.

On March 22, 1967, [redacted] advised that [redacted] had stated recently he had completed his graduate studies at Brandeis University and was planning to take qualifying examinations for his Ph.D in May, 1967. He further stated that instead of remaining in the academic field, he and his wife, the former [redacted] planned to give up their careers and work full time for the Progressive Labor Party (PLP) and accept its discipline. Furthermore, [redacted] stated he would be a full time PLP organizer and be paid by the PLP.

A characterization of the PLP is contained in the appendix.

The [redacted] in its [redacted] 1968 edition, carried an article entitled, "[redacted]" which in part reported that four students who planned to renounce their 2S draft deferments at Selective Service Headquarters, John F. Kennedy Federal Building, Boston, were ejected bodily from the building, on that date.

According to the article, the four, who had been accompanied by three hundred or more students from Harvard University and Radcliffe College, Cambridge, and Boston University, Boston, in marches from Cambridge and Boston University, had with them a statement they wished to present to Colonel Paul Feeney, Deputy State Director of Selective Service. The statement in part stated that the four no longer wished to have 2S student deferments and were renouncing their student deferments in order to place themselves on the same footing as the "vast majority of American young people who must resist the draft."

The statement further stated, "Our aim as students is to unit with all other American young people in a collective struggle against the draft."

The article reported that [redacted] age 25, of [redacted] Waltham, a graduate student at Brandeis University, was one of the four signers of the statement.

The article further reported that Colonel Feeney had refused to accept the statment and that the demonstrators were mostly members of SDS and the Greater Boston Draft Resistance Group.

III. SUMMARY OF DISRUPTIVE CAMPUS ACTIVITIES

The "Boston Herald Traveler" in its December 7, 1967 edition in the article captioned, "150 at Brandeis Defy Sit-In Ban" reported that some 150 Brandeis University students on December 6, 1967 defied the University's administration by staging a sit-in at the Administration Building to protest recruitment by the Dow Chemical Company. The article reported that several hundred other students and a few faculty members picketed outside Gryzmish Academic Center in "one of the most massive and dramatic protests in the history of Brandeis." The article continued that the demonstration affected most of the university student population either as participants or spectators, but only the sit-ins violated the rules of a "protest and demonstration" policy formulated less than two

weeks previously by the administration after consultation with students and faculty, which specifically forbids students to sit in protest inside university buildings without administration permission.

Dr. Abram -L. Sachar, President of Brandeis University was quoted in the article as stating, "This is the first time we have been confronted with the students defiance of an administrative action."

According to the article, during the four-hour sit-in, the Dow Chemical Company recruiter interviewed seven graduate students without incident and rather than attempt to block the Dow recruiters path, the students put out a paper "Carpet" leading from the Administration Building to the office where the interviews were conducted. The paper "Carpet" bore inscription such as "This Way to the War Criminal."

The article further reported that during the several hours of marching, the pickets circled a plaster statue of a wounded soldier "leaning in anguish on his rifle" and some carried signs protesting the war in Vietnam and Brandeis' "complicity" in the war. It also set forth that among the highlights of the protest was a mock war, or as the students called it, "war games"--a skit staged on the Administration Center plaza depicting pains of Vietnamese villagers caught in a napalm attack.

The above mentioned sources on June 26, 1968, advised that the physical location of Brandeis University on the outskirts of Waltham, Massachusetts, away from the hub of other academic activities in the general Boston area, does not lend itself to major organized demonstrations occurring on campus. Further, over the years, the administration has continually exhibited a liberal attitude toward complaints and protests of students, and a willingness to discuss them with the students. As a result, demonstrations which have occurred at Brandeis, generally have been spontaneous and

MAY 2 MOVEMENT

A source advised on March 3, 1965, as follows:

The May 2 Movement (M2M) formerly known as the May-2 Committee was organized on March 14, 1964, at New Haven, Connecticut, by a group of young people participation in a symposium "Socialism in America" being held at Yale University. The original aim of the M2M was to plan and execute a demonstration in New York City on May 2, 1964, demanding withdrawal of United States troops from Vietnam.

The M2M was dominated and controlled by the Progressive Labor Party (PLP) and had for its aim and purpose the embarrassment of the United States Government by meetings, rallies, picketing demonstrations and formation of university level clubs at which a Marxist-Leninist oriented approach and analysis was taken of United States domestic and foreign policies. This source advised on May 19, 1965, that the headquarters of the M2M was 640 Broadway, New York City, Room 307.

A second source advised on February 9, 1966, that the M2M was officially dissolved as an organization on February 6, 1966, at a meeting held on the same date in New York City, by the leadership of M2M and the Progressive Labor Party.

PROGRESSIVE LABOR PARTY

A source advised on April 20, 1965, that the Progressive Labor Party (PLP), formerly known as the Progressive Labor Movement (PLM), held its first national convention April 15-18, 1965, at New York City, to organize the PLM into a PLP. The PLP would have as its ultimate objective the establishment of a militant working class movement based on Marxism-Leninism.

"The New York Times," City Edition, Tuesday, April 20, 1965, page 27, reported that a new party of "revolutionary Socialism" was formally founded on April 18, 1965, under the name of the PLP. The PLP was described as an outgrowth of the PLM. Its officers were identified as [redacted] New York, [redacted] and [redacted] of New York and [redacted] of San Francisco, [redacted]. A 20-member National Committee was elected to direct the Party until the next convention.

According to the article, "The Progressive Labor Movement was founded in 1962 by [redacted] and [redacted] after they were expelled from the Communist Party, USA, for assertedly following the Chinese Communist line."

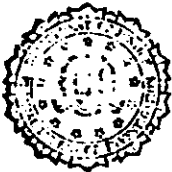
The PLP publishes "Progressive Labor," a bimonthly magazine; "Challenge," a monthly New York City newspaper; and "Spark," a west coast newspaper.

The April, 1967 issue of "Challenge," page 14, states that "This paper is dedicated to fight for a new way of life where the working men and women own and control their homes, factories, the police, courts, and the entire government of every level."

A second source advised on September 26, 1966, that the PLP utilizes the address of General Post Office Box 808, Brooklyn, New York, but also utilizes an office in Room 617, 1 Union Square West, New York City, where PLP publications are prepared.

On December 18, 1967, a source who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that the Dartmouth College SDS Chapter has approximately fifteen members.

II. Identity of Ringleaders

Source advised that [REDACTED] graduated from Dartmouth College, June 16, 1968. He is a native of Los Angeles, California. On June 20, 1968, [REDACTED] Special Agent, [REDACTED] Concord, New Hampshire, advised that at the United States Armed Forces Examining and Entrance Station, Manchester, New Hampshire, June 19, 1968, [REDACTED] indicated he was a member of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), had subscribed to their publications, and participated in their activities.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

III. Summary of Campus Disruptive Activities During the Past Year

According to the Manchester, New Hampshire Union Leader, [REDACTED] 1968, a daily newspaper, on the previous date, some forty students and several faculty members, Dartmouth College, picketed the appearance of a Dow Chemical Company recruiter on the Campus, which protest was organized by SDS, with [REDACTED] the leader. 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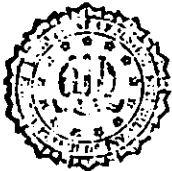

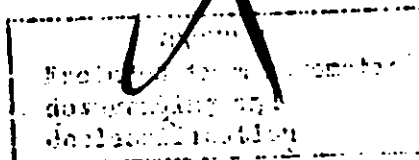

The "Boston News" stated "The PLP is a Communist Party. Our outlook and activities are based on Marxism-Leninism, upon the full realization that class struggle is what will transform the present exploitive society into a socialist one."

Later the article contained the following statement in capital letters: "We need a revolution because it is only through revolutionary struggle that the class overthrowing capitalism can rid themselves (underlined) of the corruption and vices of the old system, and develop new disciplines and morality that will enable them to found a better society."

Another paragraph stated, ". . . this newspaper will be part of the fight for revolutionary socialism and communism."

These students charged the course consisted of little more than "cold war anti-communist rhetoric." One of the writers was [redacted] who was identified as [redacted] of the Harvard-Radcliffe SDS Chapter. The critique also bore the names of other SDS members.

[redacted] on September 13, 1967, interviewed [redacted] concerning his refusal to complete any portion of DD Form 98, "Armed Forces Security Questionnaire," and his qualifications of his DD Form 398, "Statement of Personal History," and the following pertinent information was obtained:

[redacted] was born on [redacted] at New York City, New York. He attended Harvard College, Cambridge, Massachusetts, from September, [1961] to September [13, 1967]

In explaining his "Yes" answer, he set forth the following: "I consider the above arrests to indicate a real loyalty to the people of this country; I have nothing but contempt for the liars, the imperialists who run it."

[redacted] on [redacted] 1967, refused to complete any portion of DD Form 93 and qualified his DD Form 393. He further refused to discuss his reasons for not completing DD Form 93. He qualified DD Form 393 as follows:

Under Section 17, he answered "No" to a question, "Are you now or have you ever been a member of a Fascist organization?", but declined to answer "Yes" or "No" to the following questions under that section:

"Are you now or have you ever been a member of any organization, association, movement, group or combination of persons which advocates the overthrow of our constitutional form of government, or which has adopted the policy of advocating or approving the commission of acts of force or violence to deny other persons their rights under the Constitution of the United States, or which seeks to alter the form of government of the United States by unconstitutional means?"

"Are you now or have you ever been affiliated or associated with any organization of the type described above as an agent, official, or employee?"

"Are you now associating with, or have you associated with individuals, including relatives, who you know or have reason to believe, are or have been members of any of the organizations identified above?"

"Have you ever engaged in any of the following activities of any organization of the type described above: Contribution(s) to, attendance at or participation in any organizational, social, or other activities of said organizations or of any projects sponsored by them; the sale, gift, or distribution of any written, printed, or other matter, prepared, reproduced, or published by them or any of their agents or instrumentalities?"

Under Section 20, "Remarks," he set forth the following statement:

"I cannot fill in most of Section 17 because I consider it revolting to (1) ask if a person is a Communist in the same space as you ask if he is a Fascist and (2) I would never 'rat' on anyone I associate with.

3. Summary of Disruptive Campus Activity

The above-described article set forth that about 150 Harvard students gathered in the street in front of the Office of Graduate and Career Plans on November 13, 1967 to demonstrate against the recruitment by the Institute for Defense Analyses (IDA) and the United States Marine Corps.

This article also stated that the demonstration remained peaceful and unobstructive.

The demonstration reached its peak by 1:30 PM with 150 students parading in front of the Career Plans Office carrying signs and occasionally chanting slogans.

According to the article, one member of SDS said after the demonstration that many of the protesters did not want to move inside the office because of "a feeling of danger" as some of the demonstrators against the appearance of the Dow Chemical Company recruiter on the campus of Harvard University had been placed on probation.

The article stated that when the IDA recruiter and the United States Marine Corps recruiters left the office for lunch, they were greeted with hissing and cries of "Get out of Harvard," "End the War in Vietnam," and "Go back to the Halls of Montezuma."

on February 23, 1968, advised that about 250 students, at 11:00 AM, February 23, 1968, gathered in Harvard yard in front of University Hall. At 11:30 AM, demonstrators marched to University Hall and some sat on the stairs leading from the first to the second floor, but did not obstruct anyone from going up or down the stairs.

advised on February 23, 1968, that demonstrators, at about 3:00 PM, February 23, 1968, marched from University Hall to Massachusetts Hall, where they tried to see Harvard University President, Nathan Pusey, but he was unavailable.

Demonstrators were met by Pusey's Assistant, William Bentinek-Smith. The demonstrators told Bentinek-Smith that they desired to check the Harvard Treasurer's report to determine if any of Harvard's investments were in companies manufacturing products for the United States to be used in the Vietnam war.

The demonstrators asked Bentinek-Smith for his opinion of the Vietnam war, but he declined.

The demonstration ended about 3:30 PM, February 23, 1968, without any incidents.

[REDACTED] stated the demonstration was held to protest Harvard University's alleged "complicity" in the Vietnam war.

[REDACTED] advised on February 23, 1968, that the demonstration was sponsored by the Harvard-Radcliffe Chapter of SDS.

[REDACTED] also advised that a Dow Chemical Company recruiter was on the campus of Harvard University while the demonstration was going on, but he was ignored by the demonstrators.

WISO, Boston, on February 23, 1968, advised that more than 400 students from Radcliffe College, Harvard University, and Boston University began a four-day fast on Sunday, February 11, 1968, to protest United States involvement in the war in Vietnam. The fast, which commenced at noontime on February 11, 1968, in Harvard's Sanders Theater, continued until Thursday, February 15, 1968. The protesters participating in the fast limited their diet to water, coffee, and vitamin pills, all of which were available in the basement of Memorial Hall at Harvard, the headquarters for the fast. The medical facilities were also set up for the students.

Principal organizers of the fast were the Harvard-Radcliffe Chapter of the SDS. One of the faculty advisers for the fast was the [REDACTED],

The fast ended on February 15, 1968, at Memorial Hall, with a ceremony in which loaves of bread were passed among the 200 students who reportedly completed the fast.

The participants were called upon to donate the money they would have spent on meals to the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC), which would supposedly use the money to provide medical aid to the Vietnamese.

[REDACTED] in its issue of [REDACTED] 1967, carried an article entitled, [REDACTED]. This article, in part, read:

"Students will protest 'university complicity with the war' by picketing outside Mallinckrodt Hall this morning while the Dow Chemical Company recruits within. Dow Chemical manufactures napalm.

"SDS co-chairman [REDACTED] called for massive student support of the demonstration at yesterday afternoon's anti-war rally in the yard..."

[REDACTED] in its issue of [REDACTED] 1967, carried an article entitled [REDACTED].

This article, in part, read as follows:

"About 300 Harvard and Radcliffe anti-war demonstrators sat-in yesterday in Mallinckrodt Laboratory, imprisoning a job recruiter from the Dow Chemical Corporation in a conference room for seven hours and halting his interviews.

"Shortly after the demonstration ended at 7 p.m. Dean Glump said that the sit-in was a serious violation of University regulations and could result in severance of connection for some of the students involved.

"The students were protesting Dew's role in the war in Vietnam. Dew is the principal supplier of napalm for the United States military.

"Between 350 and 400 students - by Glimp's count - voluntarily turned in their bursar's cards to the University officials. The demonstrators surrendered the cards because they wanted to take the responsibility and suffer the punishment for the sit-in collectively. It is understood, however, that some bursar's cards belonged to students who did not sit-in but merely wanted to give tangible support to the demonstration.

"(Immediately after the sit-in, the demonstrators met for two hours and formulated a number of demands which the Administration must meet by next Monday, they say, if it wishes to avoid further protests.)

"Glimp said that turning in a bursar's card in support of the protest and actually obstructing freedom of movement 'are as different as night from day in my mind.' He indicated that people who had not been identified as obstructing the door would not be dealt with severely even if they had surrendered their bursar's card.

"He said officials had 'carefully identified students right in front of the door, those directly involved in obstructing movement of the Dew representative.' There is a 'distinct possibility,' he said, that those people will be severed.

The vote came shortly after Dean Glimp - speaking from the midst of the seated, close-packed crowd - promised that the Faculty of Arts and Sciences would 'discuss the issue you have raised here.'

"The issue, he said, was whether the University should discriminate in deciding which groups - civilians or military - are allowed to recruit Harvard students. The demonstrators argued that any corporation guilty of war crimes and partner to genocide - in this case, Dow - had no right to come on the Harvard campus.

"The sit-in began at 9:30 a.m. in front of Conant 233 where ~~██████████~~ was holding individual interviews with chemistry graduate students interested in a career with the corporation. .

"Meanwhile, [redacted] was replaced in Conant 233 by [redacted] it was reported, was another Dow recruiter working in shifts with [redacted]. When no interviewees showed up to see [redacted] at 233, the demonstrators decided he was a decoy and sent scouts to find [redacted]. They found him at 11 a.m. conducting an interview in the building next to Conant - Mallinckrodt E-102. In seconds, the whole demonstration moved to that door and [redacted] was trapped inside for the rest of the day.

"The executive committee of Harvard-Radcliffe Students for a Democratic Society voted Monday night to picket Dow. They specifically rejected a sit-in, however. The demonstration got started when a few individuals, mostly SDSers, decided to sit-in anyway. Only about one-half of the students who sat in at the peak of the demonstration were members of SDS."

PROGRESSIVE LABOR PARTY

[redacted] advised on [April 20, 1965] that the Progressive Labor Party (PLP), formerly known as the Progressive Labor Movement (PLM), held its first national convention April 15-18, 1965, at New York City, to organize the PLM into a PLP. The PLP would have as its ultimate objective the establishment of a militant working class movement based on Marxism-Leninism.

"The New York Times," City Edition, [redacted] 1965, page [redacted] reported that a new party of "revolutionary Socialism" was formally founded on April 18, 1965, under the name of the PLP. The PLP was described as an outgrowth of the PLM. Its officers were identified as [redacted] New York, [redacted] and [redacted] of New York and [redacted] of San Francisco. [redacted] a 50-member National Committee was elected to direct the Party until the next convention.

According to the article, "The Progressive Labor Movement was founded in 1962 by Mr. [redacted] and Mr. [redacted] after they were expelled from the Communist Party, USA, for assertedly following the Chinese Communist line."

The PLP publishes "Progressive Labor," a bimonthly magazine; "Challenge," a monthly New York City newspaper; and "Spark," a west coast newspaper.

The April, 1967 issue of "Challenge," page 14, states that "This paper is dedicated to fight for a new way of life where the working men and women own and control their homes, factories, the police, courts, and the entire government of every level."

A s [redacted] advised on [September 26, 1966] that the PLP utilizes the address of General Post Office Box 808, Brooklyn, New York, but also utilizes an office in Room 617, 1 Union Square West, New York City, where PLP publications are prepared.

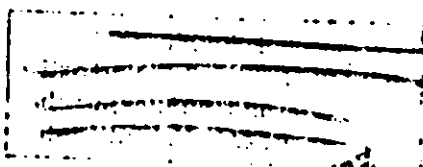

1) Potential Counterintelligence Action

The purpose of this program is to expose, disrupt
and otherwise neutralize the activities of the various New Left
organizations.

Boston will attempt to do the above by utilizing,
where feasible, cooperative sources at Local TV and radio stations,
as well as the services of cooperative writers, lecturers and
newspapermen, in order to effectively initiate a disruptive
program in the New Left.

Campus college newspapers will be reviewed for
articles, editorials and/or letters to the editor which will
be forwarded to the Bureau with appropriate recommendations
for dissemination. In most instances, because of summer
vacation schedules, there have been no school editions printed
of local campus newspapers. However, Harvard University does
prepare a weekly summer session newspaper which will be reviewed
for pertinent data.

He has been involved in some anti-Vietnam draft activity and his name was confidentially furnished (with Bureau authority) to the Massachusetts Registry of Motor Vehicles, thereby enabling the Registrar to initiate investigation concerning [redacted] use of Michigan license plates on a vehicle while a resident of this State.

1.) False Allegations of Police Brutality

The most recent incidents involving charges of police brutality have occurred in connection with the arrest of individuals who sought sanctuary in churches located in Boston, Massachusetts and Providence, Rhode Island.

On May 20, 1968, one [REDACTED] who was convicted in U.S. District Court, Boston, in June, 1967 of a Selective Service Act violation and was sentenced to three years imprisonment, and an Army Specialist Fourth Class [REDACTED] who was adjudged to be Absent Without Leave by U.S. Army authorities after he failed to report to Fort Lewis, Washington, took refuge and sought sanctuary in the Arlington Street Church, Boston, Mass. These two individuals in effect challenged Federal authorities to remove them physically from the church.

Approximately 75 to 150 individuals, both male and female, many of them members of the New England Resistance, an anti-draft organization, supported [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] in their stand.

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Newspaper accounts reported "blaring rock music and refreshments furnished by volunteers helped make the tedious vigil in the church's parish hall go faster". The Executive Director of the Arlington Street Church offered the church's facilities to the two men for "as long as they like" and said if any confrontation came, "it would be in the sanctuary of the place of worship". The Board of Trustees of the church issued a statement which recognized "the religious, moral and legal aspects of their action".

On May 22, 1968 at approximately 3:30 P.M. U.S. Marshals, accompanied by United States Attorney PAUL MARKHAM, entered the church and arrested [REDACTED] who went limp and had to be carried outside the church via a side door to an adjacent alley. Outside the church in the alley approximately 100 sympathizers formed a line to block the progress of the marshals with their prisoner. At approximately 4:15 P.M., Boston Police Department arrived with reserves to provide support for the marshals and when they, the marshals, attempted to move their prisoner to their car, fighting between police and resisters broke out. Approximately 40 protesters sat in front of and on top of the United States Marshals' vehicle. Police then formed a corridor from the car to a waiting police van and when the marshals attempted to move [REDACTED] by means of the protective police corridor, the protesters engaged in renewed fighting.

Newspaper accounts subsequently reported that "20 protesters were injured and 16 dragged off in police vans" as a result of the fight in front of the church. Numerous charges of police brutality were lodged by the resisters. Boston Police Department advised that no police arrests were made and no injuries occurred in spite of news media claims to the contrary. In support of the police statement, Boston newspapers subsequently carried an article indicating that "Federal officials involved in the arrest of [REDACTED] in Arlington Street Church were commended for their 'self discipline' and their

'respect for the church' by the Director of the church, VICTOR JOKEL. JOKEL said the violence by those outside the church did 'all of us a disservice'. [REDACTED] who had been left in the church by the marshals subsequently surrendered to Army control.

Boston informants advised that the resisters in the church had anticipated trouble and were well prepared with lookouts strategically posted to give the alarm when the police arrived to arrest [REDACTED]. They were equipped with bullhorns to give orders and had instructed those resisters present to block and impede the police by any means possible when the actual arrest was made.

In regard to the above, two Selective Service Act fugitives, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] also sought sanctuary inside the Church of the Mediator, Providence, Rhode Island in June, 1968. On June 3, 1968 when Agents of the Boston Office approached the church to arrest these individuals, it was noted that several individuals supporting [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were equipped with walkie-talkies apparently so that they could advise those inside of the church of the FBI's arrival. Upon entering the church, Agents observed approximately 20 to 30 individuals wearing beards and beads sitting around in a circle in what might be referred to as the sanctuary of the church. This group pretended to be praying, but it was noticed that the prayer book that [REDACTED] was holding was upside down. Subjects [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were advised that they were under arrest and they immediately made the statement that they would have to be carried out and would not walk out willingly.

When these subjects were picked up by the Agents, it appeared that a pre-conceived plan was placed into effect in that groups of their supporters kept walking in front of the Agents carrying the two individuals in an effort to delay them or to make it uncomfortable for them to transport the prisoners from the church to the Government vehicles. When the sidewalk outside the church was reached, a larger crowd of approximately 50 people began to push and shove.

However, it was noted that no one actually laid a hand on any Agent involved in the arrest. The protesters pushed and shoved with their bodies in an apparent attempt to aggravate the Agents to a point where they might lose their temper and attack one of the protesters. It was also noted that from the time the Agents entered the church until they left, supporters of this group took numerous photographs of the activity within the church itself.

After placing the subjects in the vehicles for transportation for arraignment, large numbers of the protesters sat down in front of the Government vehicles and it became necessary for the Providence Police to remove the protesters. On several occasions as soon as the police removed one or two of these individuals from in front of the Bureau vehicles, others would take their place. It was felt that these actions by the protesters were made in an attempt to embarrass the Bureau and Providence Police Department as numerous news, radio and television reporters were in the immediate vicinity of the church. Providence Police arrested nine individuals and charged them with disorderly conduct.

It was noted that the activities of the females involved in this demonstration were particularly strenuous and it became necessary that they be dragged by their legs from the scene, enabling them to be portrayed on television as possible victims of police brutality. [redacted] and [redacted] when away from the church, indicated that they did not desire to be carried and it was obvious that the only reason that they declined to walk from the church was to obtain publicity for themselves as well as for their alleged cause.

2.) Immorality

[redacted] who has provided reliable information in the past concerning the activities of the New Left in the Metropolitan Boston area, has advised that numerous meetings concerning anti-Vietnam and/or draft activity are conducted by members sitting around the table or a living room completely in the nude. These same individuals, both male and female, live and sleep together regularly and it is not unusual to have these people take up residence with a different partner after a six or seven month period.

According to the informant, the living conditions and habits of some of the New Left adherents are appalling in that certain individuals have been known to wear the same clothes for an estimated period of weeks and in some instances for months. Personal hygiene and eating habits are equally neglected by these people, the informant said.

The informant has noted that those individuals who most recently joined the movement are in most instances the worst offenders as far as moral and personal habits are concerned. However, if these individuals remain in the movement for any length of time, their appearance and personal habits appear to improve somewhat.

In regard to the above caption, the Rhode Island State Police advised on June 12, 1968 that one [REDACTED] of the Students for Democratic Action at the University of Rhode Island, Kingston, Rhode Island, was arrested by the Rhode Island State Police on a charge of Breaking and Entering and Stealing Drugs, at Hope Valley, Rhode Island, on the above date.

"The Beacon", a weekly campus newspaper of the student body of the University of Rhode Island, Kingston, Rhode Island, in an article dated November 8, 1967, described the Students for Democratic Action as an organization seven years old that is actually a branch of the much larger national organization, Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), that it cannot be called SDS because money would not be allotted by the Student Senate if it were affiliated with a national organization, and that it follows the policies of the national organization, SDS.

3.) Action by College Administrators

On April 24, 1968 approximately five Negro students seized the Administration Building of Boston University (BU), Boston, Massachusetts at 7:30 A.M. and were later joined by a number of other Negro students.

They then proceeded to lock the doors of the building by ropes and chains. As personnel of the university arrived at the building, they were refused entrance by the students. The students said they would deal with no one but the President of the university, ARLAND F. CHRISTJANER. When the President arrived at the building, he was presented with a set of demands by the students. CHRISTJANER asked the students to form a small committee to meet with him and a committee of faculty members, which they agreed to do after much persuasion on the part of the President. CHRISTJANER announced to the group he was in agreement with some of their demands relating to enrollment and counselling of black students. He also agreed to broaden the scope of courses in the field of Liberal and Practical Arts relating to the accomplishment of Negroes.

CHRISTJANER did demand of the student group that they vacate the premises they had seized and turned down several other requests such as the new naming of the Boston University School of Theology to the Doctor Martin Luther King, Jr. School of Theology.

The student group agreed to form a small committee and subsequently met with the President and faculty committee and withdrew their students the same day from the Administration Building. CHRISTJANER's firm but understanding attitude was credited with successfully squelching this black student uprising.

It will be recalled that Harvard College received adverse national publicity as a result of a student demonstration sponsored by the Harvard-Radcliffe Chapter of the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) and directed against former Secretary of Defense, ROBERT MC NAMARA. Secretary MC NAMARA had made a scheduled visit to that institution in the early Spring of 1967. College officials, including President NATHAN PUSEY, were highly critical of the student demonstration and placed the ringleaders on probation and directed that a letter of apology be sent to Mr. MC NAMARA.

President PUSEY has also placed on probation certain other Harvard College students who have participated in militant sit-in demonstrations against CIA and the Dow Chemical Company recruiters. President PUSEY has

indicated to the student body at Harvard that if a small minority continued to refuse to accept their obligations to the rights of the majority of the students at the college as well as the rights of the college's guests and official visitors, he would be forced to expel these students after appropriate hearings have proven that justifiable cause exists.

In this regard, 97 Harvard College seniors out of a graduating class of 1150 petitioned the Deans of the university to allow them to circulate a petition at Class Day ceremonies held on the campus on June 12, 1968. The petition declared that these signers of the petition will refuse to serve in the United States Armed Forces during the Vietnam war. The Deans of the college called the committee sponsoring the committee to their offices and denied them the right to utilize official university graduation proceedings for the furtherance of their aims and further refused them permission to use university grounds or buildings to post notices or seek signatures.

This firm action was credited with reducing the number of signatures on the petition to 97 out of a graduating class of 1150.

Two months ago more than 444 under-graduates signed petitions similar to the one signed on June 12, 1968. However, in April school officials did not refuse the committee sponsoring the petition the use of university facilities.

Boston will continue to be alert for instances in the academic and New Left community relating to the above three categories and will promptly advise the Bureau of any developments in this regard.

While we have cooperated with him on occasions in the past, we have received a number of inquiries indicating that he has made representations that the Director has given him a clearance. He has been corrected and admonished in the past regarding such allegations. [REDACTED] has been a confidential source of the Boston Office since January, 1965. [REDACTED] has been deeply involved in anti-Vietnam activities and has reportedly counseled young men on how they can best confront the Government on the draft question. He is the subject of a current case involving the surrender of his Selective Service Card to the Department of Justice on 10/20/67. This case is presently awaiting prosecutive opinion by the Department of Justice. [REDACTED] is a well-known [REDACTED] who is on the Security Index.

Rebulet to Albany dated 5/10/68 and Boston airtel to Bureau dated 5/13/68, captioned "COMMUNIST PARTY, USA, COUNTERINTELLIGENCE PROGRAM, INTERNAL SECURITY - C (THE NEW LEFT)."

ReBSairtel sets out information concerning a possible counterintelligence operation to be conducted by Boston with Bureau approval regarding "The New Left" which would involve the use of the services of [REDACTED] on extremist movements and a cooperative source of the Boston Office.

[REDACTED] Boston, Mass., a reliable and cooperative source of this Office, also recently advised that [REDACTED] is interested in doing a series of articles on the radical left.

Boston proposed to the Bureau to have [REDACTED] contact in an effort to have an appointment made for [REDACTED] with a proper [REDACTED] so that the possibility of authoring an article on the new radical left for national publication in that [REDACTED] magazine might be discussed. [REDACTED] has been an extremely useful source in regard to the Counterintelligence Program of the Boston Office and has [REDACTED] of the Boston area.

In May, 1965, [REDACTED] authored an article on the [REDACTED] and with Bureau approval was given public source data on numerous individuals and organizations who were connected with the New Left in the Metropolitan Boston area. These articles were well-received and were most successful in exposing the participation of left-wing faculty members in several

universities in the Greater Boston area, as well as graduate and undergraduate students in the affairs of the radical student movement. Among the faculty members of local colleges who have been extremely active in espousing left-wing causes are [redacted] at MIT, Cambridge, Mass., and [redacted] at Boston University, Boston, Mass. In this connection, both [redacted] and [redacted] signed a statement supporting [redacted]

[redacted] These individuals on 1/5/68 were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury at Boston and charged with a continuing conspiracy to aid, abet and counsel violations of the Selective Service laws. The indictment alleged a conspiracy calling for a nationwide program of resistance of the operations of the Selective Service System, including the counseling, aiding and abetting of registrants to surrender Classification and Registration Certificates and interruption of the induction process at induction centers throughout the country. These individuals are currently on trial at Boston. [redacted] have indicated that they stood beside the above five who have been indicted for support of draft resistance. They further indicated that if they (the five) are sentenced, "we, too, must be sentenced. If they are imprisoned, we will take their places and will continue to use what means we can to bring this war to an end."

Boston will with Bureau approval attempt to develop a Counterintelligence Program directed against [redacted] which will incorporate their support of the above five defendants and their active participation in anti-draft and anti-Vietnam activities. It is felt that an individual such as [redacted] would be a perfect vehicle for just such a program.

In regard to Key Activist NICHOLAS MICHAEL EGELSON, the May 8, 1967 edition of "Now Left Notes," the weekly publication of Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), listed NICK EGELSON as the then President of SDS.

[redacted] on 1/19/68 advised that NICK EGELSON attended a meeting of the Steering Committee of the Boston Draft Resistance Group on 1/18/68.

Boston will attempt to develop a Counterintelligence Program concerning EGELSON which will be submitted to the Bureau for approval.

As other individuals are identified as Key Activists, special consideration will be given to the development of appropriate counterintelligence action against them and specific recommendations in this regard will be submitted to the Bureau.

As noted in referenced Bulet, Boston will, commencing 7/1/68 and every three months thereafter, submit to the Bureau a status letter which will include more specific comments concerning the above and will set out what further potential counterintelligence action, as well as pending counterintelligence action, Boston contemplates in regard to this program.
