

All law enforcement officials in the Detroit district have been furnished appropriate information concerning the description of Kelly and his wife, together with a description of the 15 sylinder Cadillac sedan and the phevrolet Sport Coups in which May were allegedly seen in Iowa meently. Also, all Cadillac distributors and agencies throughout the United States and Canada have been furnished with complete descriptions of Kelly and his wife and the 16 sylinder Spaillac.

It will be noted that other investigation at Cleveland, Ohio, is in detail set out in communications from the Detroit Division Office dated August 14 and 15. Hence, it is not deemed necessary to include same in this report.

at Cleveland has offered complete cooperation in this matter and will actify this Division office in the event any further word is received from Mr. and Mrs. Kelly. It will be noted in my communication of August 15 that Kelly deposited \$500 as down payment toward the purchase of a new 12 cylinder Cadillac coupe, Kelly indicating that he would return to Cleveland within a month.

Ft. Worth; State Senator Grady Woodruff and his partner Mack W. Berch appeared for defendants Harvey Bailey, R. G. Shannon, Ora L. Shannon and Armon Crawford Shannon. While the hearing was in progress Harvey Bailey signified his willingness to waive further hearing and return to Oklahoma City, whereupon waiver was prepared and signed by him. The court ellowed a reduction of bond of \$5000.00 for Armon Shannon, \$15000.00 for R. G. Ebannon and \$25,000.00 for Ora L. Shannon, and ordered them immediately removed to Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Shortly after the decision by the Court, the three named Shannons were taken by plane from Ft. Worth, Texas to Oklahoma City by Deputy United States Marshall accompanied by Special Agent in Charge Gus T. Jones of the San Antonio Division Office, and Hon. Herbert K. Hyde, United States Attorney, Oklahoma City.

Mr. Brooks advised Agent that the house at 857 K. Mulkey Street, Ft. Worth, Texas, was rented by Kathryn Kelly prior to July 1; that on July 1 his daughte Kathryn Kelly came to his rooming house at 823 Lamar Street and induced him to move into her house at 857 E. Mulkey Street, instructing him to file application and make deposits with the electric light and gas companies in the name of J. E. Brooks. He stated that he has not seen George Kelly in over two years; that he was

under the impression that George Kelly was a gembler; that George and his daughter Kathryn traveled extensively over the country end he has been receiving mail from her from Kansas City, Chicago and Minneapolis; that most of the mail received by him prior to three months ago, was from Minneapolis, Minn. He stated that Kathryn has communicated with him about every two woeks; that he is now expecting a letter from her or telephone call through Kathryn's neighbor, E. Mulkey Street, Ft. Worth, Texas, telephone As will be noted in report of Age dated at Dallas, August 7, 1933, this telephone number is being kept As will be noted in report of Agent under surveillance by the telephone company at Ft. Worth, Texas. The last time a call was received over this wire was from Dallas, Texas on August 1st or 2nd. At that time Kathryn Kelly talked to her father, Mr. J. E. There were several letters found on the premises addressed to Mr. Brooks W. Reno Street, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. When questioned from about these letters Mr. Brooks stated they were from his old landlady at that address; that he lived there for about two years prior to February, 1933. He further stated that when George and Kathryn Kelly were at Oklahoma City they called at this address and it is possible that Kathryn might attempt to use as a means of communication between himself and Shannon's kin folk at Stratford, Oklahoma. The kin folk of Kathryn Kelly located at Stratford, Oklahoma, are known to the Oklahoma City Division Office and undoubtedly this place is being kept under close surveillance, as noted in the report of Special Agent Oklahoma City. August 17, 1933. Therefore no further undeveloped lead will be set out in this report by the Dallas Office. These parties also described the man seen in Hattiesburg and the description was exactly that of Geo. Kelly.

When seen in Hattiesburg he was neatly dressed, wearing straw hat. He was alone in Hattiesburg, but was seen leaving there yesterday at about 6:30 PM in a brand new Plymouth Coupe bearing Texas License plates - thought to be either 27124 of 37124 - not positive, and accompanied by another man. No description is available. He left on the highway which leads to Gulfport - branches off to Mobile.

I am highly pleased that the work of the Division of Investigation in dealing with the criminal element, and particularly in recent kidnapping cases, has been such as to warrant this editorial comment. THIS crime-ridden country regards with astoniahment and admiration the brilliant exploit of Federal operatives, mided by police of three cities, in running down and captur-ing the gang deemed responsible for the \$200,000 Urschel kidaaping in Oklahoma and the brutal Kansas City massacre of five men last June.

Climating the achievement, three hundred Federal, State and local officers, guided by army airplanes, waylaid and waged a machine gun battle late yesterday afternoon in the outskirts of Chicago against still another group of suspects.

Harvey J. Bailey, ringleader of the Urschel kidnaping outsit, appears to be as ruthless, daring and resourceful an outsity as this generation has known.

LIK, appears to be as ruthless, daring and resourcerul an outlaw as this generation has known.

A bank robber, leader of a sensational prison break, field marshal of the machine gun brigade in the bloody Kansas City affair, evidently mainly responsible for the crafty and successful abduction of the oil millionaire Urschel; friend of Fred Burke, another alleged "master mind" in crime; having accomplices in several States at one time, engaging in boothering the product of the properties. legging, holdups or whatever else-such is the police portrait of this dangerous man.

His very capture was in keeping with his underworld re-pute. Bailey lay asleep in a secluded rural hideout, with deadly weapons in reach on all sides, when the authorities broke in upon his slumber and awakened him with the prod of a "bull gun."

The fact that, under these circumstances, he yielded calmly detracts nothing from the personal perils that his captors dared. Rather it is a tribute to the high-grade detective skill that the Federal men exhibited in locating and seizing simulfancously, with evidences of guilt upon them, not only Bailey in his Texas lair, but the ex-convict Albert L. Bates in Denver and four other suspects in St. Paul.

THE police characters of the men implicated, the nature of the crimes under scrutiny, and the dramatic completeness of the law officers' coup ought to be the final victorious argument in favor of an American "Scotland Yard," as ad-Nocated by the Hearst newspapers and by many eminent penologists.

Only a few hours before the round-up of the Bailey gang, Warden Lawes, of Sing Sing Prison, was telling & actor Copeland's committee on racketeering, at its New York hear-

ing:
"Backets are affiliated with politicians, there is no doubt of it ... In fact some political organizations are racketeering organizations. There is no doubt of that... Backeteering could be stopped in sixty days...."

Former Police Commissioner Mulrooney was saying at the

kame sessions:

"I believe the machine gun has no place in organized society except for the police and military forces...There is no hope for control of firearms unless it be Federal control."

Between racketering as such—extortion from industries by threat and violence, bootlegging and crimes like kidnaping, the public has sensed the close alliance.

One illicit or murderous activity meets and merges with the

Local politics much too frequently protects the racketeerand even the violent criminal.

State and local police, confined within geographical boundary lines, are too often halted in their pursuit of law-breakers.

But in solving the Urschel case the Federal sleuths ranged from Canada to Mexico. Their agencies in one State helped those in another. When local authority was needed, the Federal men called it in.

THAT, obviously, is the way to proceed against the thing that crime has come to be in America. An American "Scotland Yard," developed out of existing

and highly capable law-enforcing organizations, is one-half the answer to organized crime in all its forms.

The rest of the answer lies with prosecutors and the courts.

THOUNDING THE PROPERTY

Reference is made to the report submitted by Special Agent R. H. Colvin, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, dated August 28, 1933, in the case entitled GEORGE R. KELLY with aliases et al, Kidnaping, from which it will be noted that the fourteen subjects were indicted at Oklahoma City on a charge of conspiracy to kidnap Charles F. Urschel. It does not appear that the indictment charges them with the substantive offense of kidnaping.

It would seem that these subjects should have been indicted for the actual kidnaping of Urschell as well as conspiracy to kidnap. Under the conspiracy indictment it is doubtful whether any evidence in the Division's possession can be introduced against the defendants living in St. Paul who were the mediums through which some of the ransom money was distributed, and it appears that they came into the picture after the actual kidnaping and return of Urschel, whereas under an indictment on the substentive offense it is possible that evidence in the Division's possession may have been used against them.



From the Louisville Courier Journal. It must have been a good moment for Attorney General Homer Cummings when was able to announce the expensed Harvey Balley, one of the king pin crimman who led the break from the Kansas Penitentiary on Memorial Day, when warden and two guards were kidnaped; not only is he the man who has been identified as the ring leader in the Kansas City Union Station massacre, when ave men were moved down by machine gun bullets; this Harvey Bailey is the kidnaper of Charles F. Urschel, who was snatched from his home in Oklahoma City and held until his family had paid \$200,000 ransom

There is something more in the capture of Bailey than the mere triumph of law over the forces of organized crime. The story of how he was apprehended, how the search was made for his hide-out by airplane, and how he was arrested while lying on a cot with a machine gun, an automaticrific and an automatic pistol beside him, would do credit to the most sensational fiction writer. The story is very pat in all its details. Urschel identifies an outbuilding on the farm where Balley is discovered as the place where he was held captive, and his own fingerprints on various objects in the building corroborate his statement. A considerable number of the marked bills paid out in ransom by the Urschel family are found in Bailey's possession, linking him positively with that particular case.

.The most important feature about the Bailey arrest, however, is the credit which it reflects on the Federal machinery for crime detection. Definite steps have been taken by the Roosevelt administration to strangle the kidnaping racket by means of a central agency in Washington. Nothing feasible offers such promise of relief from: this national disease as the establishment of confidence among the people in the abiljiy of the United States Government to crush the kidnapers. When such confidence is achieved, the families of kidnap victims may no longer try to hide their dealings from the proper authorities, as they now do. most frequently in the hope of negotiating directly with the criminals. The successful handling of the Urschel case should go far to impress the public with Uncle Sam's superior ability to deal with kidnapers.

The kidnapers of Charles F. Urshel, wealthy oil man of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, are in custody, with the exception of GEORGE R. KELLY alias R. G. OSHANNON, a man 35 years of age, 5 10 tall, weight 177 lbs., gray or blue eyes, dark brown hair, medium ruddy complexion, medium muscular build, and probably wearing octagon shaped, rimless glasses. KELLY is an expert machine gunner, and will no doubt be heavily armed.

KELLY, another man, and two woman companions are thought to be traveling at the present time in a Chevrolet sport coupe, motor #3,740,186, bearing Iowa 1933 license #82-17210; or, a blue-black, 16 cylinder Cadillac sedan, 9 passenger, Motor #1,400,263, with Ohio 1933 license #691-965 or Texas 1933 license #F-24-752.

Law enforcement officials in this district have been notified to be on the lookout for Kelly and the above automobiles.

Recently you were furnished with a list of the serial numbers contained on the \$20 Federal Reserve notes with which a ransom of \$200,000 was paid. Although the case has been solved, only a part of the \$200,000 ransom money has been recovered, and it is believed that prior to their errest the criminals may have secreted this money in safety deposit boxes. The names which may have been used in renting such boxes are unknown. Accordingly, this Division would most highly appreciate your further cooperation in advising this office immediately as to any safety deposit boxes which may have been rented in your bank between the dates of July 22nd and August 14th, 1933, inclusive, to any person or persons whose true identity and activities may be questionable. You may rest assured that any information you transmit will be treated with the strictest confidence.

It is urgently requested that should a safety deposit box have been rented at your bank during the dates in question and under supicious circumstances, you communicate with me by telephone at Charlotte, 3-4127, collect.





MEMORANDUM FOR MIL. WILLIAM STANLES THE ASSISTANT TO THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

I thought you might be interested in a development which arose at For Worth, Texas, incident to the resoval of the Shannons from Fort Sorth to Oklahoma City for trial for the kidnaping of Mr. Urschel. The day when Judge Wilson greated the order of removal for the Shannons to be taken to Oklahoms City, the defense attorneys had a writ of habeas corpus prepared to be filed immediately following Judge Wilson's decision. However, in the interim, the United States Marshal and Agents of this Division executed Judge Wilson's order of removal by taking the Shannons from the Federal Building to the Municipal Airport and placed them in a plane. They were in the air within fifteen minutes after Judge Wilson's order of removal was issued.

The attorneys for the defense requested Judge Vilson to hold the Shannons in Fort Borth as they intended to file a writ of habeas corpus. However, the Judge refused to do this, whereupon the attorneys for the defense claimed that the officers were *spiriting the Shannons out of torm. The Judge replied that if so, the officers were only executing his order of removal, and as the matter that had been Before the Court had been disposed of, there was nothing at that time before the Court. The habeas corpus writ was then filed, but as indicated, we had the Shannon out of town before it reached Judge Wilson's hands. is a matter of fact, the officers departed from the Federal Building at Fort Worth, Texas, at 12:20 p.m., and at 1:50 p.m., the Shannons were safely lodged in the Oklahoma County Jail two hundred miles away. The move of the attorneys for the defense was simply one in which they hoped to get the removal case before the Appellete Court and thereby cause a delay in resoving them to the jurisdiction of the Federal Court in Oklahoma.
