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The Boss was not sure he got all of the facts with reference to the telegram you called him about last night.

You know this confidential informant we arrested a couple of weeks ago. He has been acting as the contact man in Oklahoma City. His has been in the hotel and has been in a certain lodging house here. Catherine has been going around the country with their 12 year old child Vesterday afternoon we intercepted a telegram from the child on board a train at Ft. Worth, Texas, to her father here saying that she was coming to Oklahoma City. They evidently put her on the train. We got busy at both Pt. Worth and here. We met the train and the Agents covered her under cover. Her father met her. Her father and mother met her and took her a round about way to Colvin's house. There we talked to the little girl and get her itinerary for the last four or five days. We found she left Chicago last Thursday and had gone to Memphis. She generally described where she had been but could not exactly. She said she was at a house of a man whose right side was paralysed. She was not sure of the name. She said, however, that she had come up here with a Memphis lawyer who was going to act as the go-between to see just what the lawyers here were doing in the negotiations. Then Frank Blake got into action at Ft. Worth where they got on the train. He found a telegram from this lawyer to a party by the name of Tichenor in Memphis, Tenn. We asked the girl whether that was the name and she said "yes". He was at the Central Garage there, a used car place. There was no doubt about it. The confidential informant is still half way confidential.

Are you sure that's right.

The red wig of the woman is absolutely correct and the straw color hair. She just died it a few weeks ago.

Then was the telegram from Tichenor?

The telegran was from a town in Memphis about 9 o'clock yesterday evening sent to Gainesville, Texas, to the lawyer-contact saying that the deal had fallen through and to wire him at Gainesville, Texas. Gainesville is between Ft. Worth and here. It told them in Memphis to wire them back and they would pick up the wire at Gainesville. We intercepted that wire. The wire to the lawyer contact said \*\*proceed as directed everything all right\*\* or something of that kind.

That's the wire that came out of Hemphis?

Yes. Of course, the first wire was from Ft. Worth to Hemphis to that address, which was confirmed by the little girl. We got the little girl here and took her a round about way to Colvin's house.

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We had the ear followed to see that she was not trailed. The little girl had been with them for the last two weeks since they left San Antonio. Catherine Kelley took her out one day and did not bring her back. She was used as an alibi. They did not think a little girl with a man and woman would be suspected. They did not keep in touch with the parents.

They knew that she had her?

Yes they knew that originally she had her. The parents are the ones that got the letter from Chicago. We tried to have them wire for money but that was not correct.



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#### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

I conferred with Mr. McClure, of the Division of Accounts, with reference to the possibility of the Division hiring a plane for the transportation of the Kellys from Memphis to Oklahoma City. Mr. McClure stated that he felt there was no way in which the Division might defray this expense; that the removal is in pursuance of a Court order which must be executed by the . Marshal and that he, Mr. McClure, was fearful that there was no way in which the appropriation for the Division might be used for this purpose. He suggested, however, that he felt they would have no difficulty in authorizing the United States Marshal at Memphis to defray the expense of the plane and that by the Marshal or one of his deputies proceeding on the plane, as he ordinarily would in company with the party, the expense could be legitimately borne by the Marshal's office. I advised him of the estimate which we have received for a nine passenger plane at 60¢ a mile for approximately 600 miles, which would cost in the neighborhood of \$360.00. He stated he felt this could be taken care of unless, of course, It could be shown that a six passenger plane was available and would serve our purposes. I, of course, told Mr. McClure to do nothing as we were endeavoring to obtain an army plane and that I would advise him later in the event that we felt it necessary to have the Marshal defray the expense of a commercial plane.



MEMPHIS, Tenn., Sept. 27 (A. P.).—George Kelly, reputed machine gunner for the underworld of the Western bad lands, tonight confessed, officers said, to a part

in the kidnapping of Charles F. Urschel, Oklahoma oil millionaire, and named Albert Batès as the actual accomplice.

"You got me right: on the Urschel kidnapping," Kelly was quoted by W. A. Rorer, Department of Justice agent, as saying tonight.

Kelly admitted the kidnapping, Rorer said, "but not the Chicago robbery or the Kansas\_City union station job."

"Kelly made no formal confession but he told the Department of Justice agents that he and Bates were the ones who did the actual kidnapping and that they took Urschel to Paradise, Texas, and returned to Oklahoma City to collect the ransom," a source close to Department of Justice agents said.

"Kelly indicated the degree of guilt of the others connected with the case and gave some idea of the disposition of the ransom money."

The individual who made the announcement asked that his name not be used because of his connection with the case.

Federal Judge Harry B. Ander-cers and Frank Nash, notorious son at Jackson, Tenn., late today criminal, whom the officers had in signed a removal order permitting custody. authorities to take Kelly and his wife, Kathryn, to Oklahoma City name with both slayings. to face trial on the kidnapping Confirms Confess charges. They were arrested here yesterday.

The Kellys at first had said they would fight extradition, but before Judge Anderson's order was announced told officers they ready to return for trial.

Federal agents still closely guarded their plans for removal of the pair to Oklahoma.

Rorer would add nothing to the brief quotations from Kelly, refusing to say whether a more detailed statement had been obtained.

Kelly's alleged statement on the Chicago robbery referred to the holdup of Federal Reserve bank messengers and the slaying of a policeman on the night of September 21. His reference to the "Kansas City Union Station job" was to the

#### Confirms Confession

John M. Keith, Federal agent from Chicago, confirmed the confession as reported by Rorer and by implication connected Kelly with the Chicago hold-up.

"The Kellys were in a bad jam before they were caught," he said earlier in the night.

"They needed that buried money (which was dug up on a farm near Coleman, Tex., today), but they couldn't get to it. Kelly grew desperate. We know that he was in Chicago the night of September 21, when two messengers of the Fed-erai Reserve Bank were held up and a Chicago policeman was killed. all the thieves got was two pouches of canceled checks. He left Chicago, or cancered checks. He left chicago, we believe, immediately for Memphis and set up his contact with Ramsey in an attempt to get money." money

The Ramsey referred to is Kelly's brother-in-law, Langford Ramsey, whose reported confession that he attempted to obtain the buried imoney for Kelly preceded Kelly's lown statement by only a short

Keith said Ramsey, an attorney and brother of Kelly's first wife, had told in detail how he went to the farm of Cass Coleman, near Coleman, Texas, and unsuccessfully tried to obtain \$73,250 of the Urschel rensom buried beneath a tree in a sotton field. The money was Kelly's

share of the loot, authorities said. The money was recovered by Federal agents today.

Ramsey, Keith said, told him that he was instructed to tell Coleman to drive to a point five miles west of McGregor, Texas, today and wait for Kelly to get in touch with him. If Kelly did not come, he was to repeat the trip nightly for a week for a week.

#### Feared Trailing

Ramsey said that after delivering his message he was to drive the Arnold girl to Oklahoma City. There he was to call at a rooming house and ask for "Mrs. E. L. Moore," a code name, signifying that he was sent by Kelly.

After obtaining clothes for the Kellys he was to return to Memphis with the girl, he said.

Ramsey said Coleman, badly frightened, refused to give the "furs" to him or agree to a meeting with Kelly. Ramsey, told that Federal agents were around, said he left for Oklahoma City.

On September 25, from Fort Worth, he said, he wired Kelly at Memphis that the deal had blown up and that he "did not want to bring home the sad tale." This phrase, Keith said, meant Ramsey was afraid of being trailed back to Memphis. Memphis.

#### Took Girl on Trip .

Ramsey, Keith said, first planned to go to Texas with Kelly, but was persuaded to go alone. He took his wife and Geraldine Arnold—the 12-year-old girl who tipped officers to

year-old girl who tipped officers to Kelly's whereabouts here—to the Coleman farm and asked for Kath-ryn's "white fox furs." The word "fur" was the code for money. He also was to say "that party wants to see you" and instruct Coleman to drive to a point five miles west of McGregor, Tex., today and wait for Kelly. If Kelly did not come he was to repeat the trip nightly for a week.

Coleman, he said, was frightened and did not want to meet Kelly.

Advised that Federal agents were in the vicinity, Ramsey left for Oklahoma City, where he was to go to a rooming house and ask for "Mrs. E. L. Moore," and obtain clothes for the Kellys. He telegraphed Kelly from Fort Worth that he did not want to "bring home the sad tale," indicating he was afraid of being trailed back to Memphis.

He telegraphed Kelly for instruc-tions at Gainesville, Tex., and was told to proceed, Federal agents in-tercepting both telegrams. At Fort Worth the Arnold girl told Ramsey she was tired of riding

in an automobile and begged to be allowed to go home on a train. Ramsey said he humored the child's reamsey said he humored the child's wish and sent a telegram to Luther Arnold-to meet the train arriving there at 10 o'clock Monday night.

It was later that the little girl tipped officers as to the whereabouts of the Kellys.

# Kidnap Ransom Cash Dug From Texas Cotton Field

COLEMAN, Texas, Sept. 27 (A. P.).—From a cotton patch Federal agents today dug up \$73,250 of the Charles F. Urschel ransom money buried by George (Machine Gun) Kelly, who is under arrest at Members. phis

Acting on an unrevealed tip, the agents went to the farm home of Cass Coleman, an uncle of Kathryn Kelly, George Kelly's wife, and arrested Coleman. Then they went directly to a lone mesquite tree in the middle of a cotton patch a half-mile from the farm house and

began digging.


In one hole they found a thermos jug containing \$46,000 in \$20 bills neatly stacked. In another nearby they came upon a molasses can which contained the rest of the money.

Frank J. Blake, in charge of the Dallas office of the Department of Justice, said the jug and can ap-parently had been buried several weeks, but rains had obliterated any hint of activities in the immediate neighborhood.

Of the \$200,000 paid for Urschel's release, \$79,650 has been recovered. About \$700 of it was found on Harvey Balley when he was arrested near Paradise, Texas, August 12; an equal amount was taken from Albert Bates when he was captured at Denver several days later, and the rest apparently was circulated by Kelly through his St. Paul, Minn., contacts.




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

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On Saturday, September 16th, Mr. Nathan advised that hearing was held on that morning but that he had not as yet been released; that was to arrive at Oklahoma City on Saturday night; that the bond for release was to be set at \$1,000; that the two women have been released; that they have received no further news as to the whereabouts of Catherine Kelly.

Mr. Nathan stated that the plans are to keep Bailey and Bates in the Marshal's room on the eighth floor of the Federal Building during the course of the trial, which room has a secret passage-way to the Court room. Mr. Nathan stated that the argument in favor of this procedure is that it would be highly dangerous to transport these two criminals from the jail to the Federal Building and back each day during the trial. Mr. Nathan stated that arrangements can be made to have them shackled as they are now; that is, hand-shackled, foot-shackled, and shackled to the radiator. He stated that they will be together in the one room. They are planning to have an Agent in that room with a gas bomb, an Agent outside the room where he can see the Agent in the room, and guards on the stairways, as at night there will be no elevator service. Mr. Nathan stated that when Mr. Keenan arrives he will put this matter up to him. I stated he would be in Oklahoma City on Sunday, or not later than Monday morning.

Mr. Nathan stated that the United States Attorney there is counting on the trial lasting for a week or ten days, but he, Mr. Nathan, stated he is of the opinion it will continue for from two to three weeks, as there are either four or six lawyers for the defense.

Incidentally, I read to Mr. Nathan the letter this Division has prepared to Colonel Schwerzkopf, acknowledging the receipt of his communication of the 2nd instant in which he made the comment that he has not received copies of all reports submitted by the Agents of this Division covering investigation of leads in the Lindbergh case. Mr. Nathan suggested a change in the wording of this letter, which change was made.

Mr. Nathan inquired whether we had located Mack, alias Baird, and I advised that we had not but that an I.C. had been issued for this individual.

Mr. Nathan suggested that a cover on mail might result in some information as to his whereabouts. I advised Mr. Nathan that when he finishes at Ohlahoma City, I desired that he return to Tashington via Kansas City to take the Conroy.

I received your letter of September 27th, concerning the xpublicity which appeared in some of the newspapers of the country incident to the Urschel Kidnaping case, and in particular to the source of information in the arrest of George Kelly and the threats against Hr. Keenan.

I likewise share your views in this matter. I have deplored the publicity in some respects glorifying the criminal, and in particular the prompting of stories giving information concerning what should be confidential developments in these cases.

In the first matter to which you referred, namely, to the effect that a child had furnished the reinformation as to Kelly's whereabouts, I specifically refused to make any statement about this matter when asked by representatives of the press, and I was astounded and shocked when I read the dispatch from Oklahoma City giving the details of this matter. No employee of this Division had anything to do with this disclosure. I was so concerned at the disclosure that I arranged for and their daughter to be removed from Oklahoma City and taken to some other section of the country, the exact location of which I have refused to disclose to any one in order that their lives might be safe, as I felt a certain moral responsibility for the welfare of these persons.

As a matter of fact, the daughter was not instrumental in furnishing this Division the exact address of George Kelly in

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Memphis, Tennessee. This was produced through another source which has not, and I hope will not be disclosed. Concerning the threats against Mr. Keenan, there have been no threats made against him or any member of his family, notwithstanding the newspaper stories to the contrary. Appropriate steps were taken by this Division to insure the safety of his family and this became known to representatives of the press, with the consequent publicity, which is of course to be deplored.

I am very glad that you wrote me as you did, for I am glad to know that some one else shares much the same views about these matters as I do.







## MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Mr. Nathan called on the afternoon of the 27th. instant and advised that they did not have a great deal of information at that point with reference to Langford Ramsev, the Memphis attorney; that, however, they had learned from that she had accompanied Ramsey from Memphis to the home of Cassy Coleman in Texas; that he had endeavored to persuade Coleman to make an appointment to meet Kelly about 100 miles from Coleman, Texas, and there deliver some or all of the money in the possession of Coleman. Coleman claimed, however, that the place was watched by Federal officers and it would girl, Ramsey be impossible for him to do this. According to the then drove her to Fort Forth, sent a telegram to her rather at Oklahoma City stating that she would be at Oklahoma at 10:15 and placed her in the custody of the Travelers Aid and then wired to Memphis advising that the deal had fallen through. Agent in Charge Blake at Dallas had checked on the telegram and in going through the records in an effort to locate the telegram sent by Ramsey to at Oklahoma City Blake located the telegram sent by Ramsey to Memphis and, of course, was in a position to learn of the reply.

Later and more complete information was received from Agent in Cherge Keith by his telegram of the 27th., and the substance of the information placed in a memorandum for the Attorney General for your signature.

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MEMORANDUM OF TELEPHONE CALLS - Urschel case.

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Mr. Keenan advised that there had been quite some talk about the cruel treatment accorded the prisoners at Oklahoma City, so last night he took a member of the AP in the jail right where Bailey and Bates are kept, and stayed in there five or ten minutes, and he, Mr. Keenan, censored all questions asked. Mr. Keenan stated he did this for two reasons - first, so that a story regarding inhuman treatment would not be circulated, and second, to see these men in humiliating positions. I stated I thought this was a wise thing to do.

Mr. Keenan stated the case will go to the jury about 3:30 today, and they are ready for the Kellys to be brought in any time. I stated that we had decided that we would take the newspapers into our confidence regarding the transportation of these prisoners, upon the grounds that they would promise not to print anything regarding the removal until they have arrived at Oklahoma City. Mr. Keenan stated he thought this was the best way to handle the situation. I advised Mr. Keenan we were going to have the Kellys handcuffed and George Kelly shackled to the plane.

I advised Mr. Keenan that yesterday Katherine Kelly was taken sick and pretended she had appendicitis, but upon examination by a doctor it was found she had nervous indigestion. I stated she was better last evening. I advised that I had ordered that the Agents should get a doctor's certificate that she. was physically able to travel by plane to Oklahoma City.

Mr. Keenan stated there is a chance that Bates will give up some of the ransom money; that he, Mr. Keenan, had told Bates that the possibility is that if he will give up all of the ransom money, he would not be turned over to the State authorities. Mr. Keenan stated he thought it was dangerous to keep these men in Oklahoma after the trial, and that it was also his opinion they should not be handed over to the State authorities, but should be shipped immediately to the Federal penitentiary selected.

I advised Mr. Keenan that the American Express Company had a writ of attachment placed on the personal effects of Bates, including a machine gun. bullets, some telegrams and clothing; that we wanted to get the machine gun and the bullets to send to Kansas City to have the ballistics expert examine them in connection with the Kansas City massacre; that last night Mr. Parfish telephoned the General Counsel of the company in New York City and told him these articles had to be released this morning, and that we are now awaiting word of what happened this morning in this regard.

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I advised Mr. Keenan I would let him know when it was definitely decided the time they should leave Memphis, and the means of travel to be used.

It was decided it would be better for Mr. Keenan to remain at Oklahoma City until the Kellys have arrived, and he advised he thought he would do this and go directly to Detroit.

If these people are convicted, Mr. Keenan says they will be sentenced immediately.

I advised that the Attorney General had said last night it might be well not to take the Kellys to Oklahoma City until the Jury had returned its verdict, in order to prevent any reopening of the case. Mr. Keenan stated the Jury may stay out quite a while on Mrs. Shannon, but he can see no reason for not bringing the Kellys to Oklahoma City as soon as possible. He stated that I could tell the Attorney General for him that if he were there he would realize there was no chance of reopening the case under any circumstances.

In telephone conversation with Mrs. Keenan this morning she stated she did not believe it would be necessary to keep guards around her home for a longer period of time.

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of the AP telephoned to request the address of the rooming house where the clothing of Kelly is supposed to be located, in Memphis. I stated that we did not have this information in Washington, and if the Agents in Memphis had it, it could not be given to the newspapers.

Mr. Nathan advised that Mr. Keenan had advised that Mr. Hoover was going to consult the Attorney General as to the proper time to bring the Kellys to Oklahoma City, and also, that Mr. Hoover had requested that he, Mr. Keenan, remain in Oklahoma City. I advised Mr. Nathan I had tentatively in my own mind planned to have the plane leave Memphis tomorrow morning. I told Mr. Nathan I thought the man should leave today for Little Rock. I advised Mr.

Nathan that his plan to the effect that we should take the newspapers into our confidence, providing they will not print the story until after the arrival of the plane at Oklahoma City, is satisfactory.

Mr. Nathan stated all arrangements have/made for transportation from the airport to the jail.

of the Memphis Press telephoned to request permission for a representative of his paper to accompany Kelly and the others in the plane from Memphis to Oklahoma City. I advised that this could not be, and that as a matter of fact the method of transportation had not been decided upon. He stated that he knew Mr. Keith had sent various pictures which had been taken of the Kellys to Washington, and wanted to be given certain of these pictures. I advised that neither could I grant this request.

Machine.

Mr. Rorer telephoned to state that they have been able to get information from Kelly absolutely involving Jarrett in the kidnaping scheme; that they know that on the Fourth of July Jarrett went to the Hopkins Hotel and met Kelly for the first time; that Kelly was registered at the Hopkins Hotel as J. L. Baker; that he stayed there from the 4th until about the 7th of July and then went to the Blackstone Hotel, where he again saw Jarrett; that they have found out how they covered the house, how they entered the house, and all about it; that they will find out more as they have just started getting information in this regard. I advised that I would have Jarrett placed under surveillance at Oklahoma City, and that nothing should be let out on this development. I asked Mr. Rorer to call Mr. Nathan immediately and give him this information, and tell him I wanted Jarrett put under surveillance immediately. Mr. Rorer stated there is another man they believe Kellywill involve before they finish questioning him.

of the Times telephoned to state they have a dispatch saying the government is ready to transport Kelly and his wife to Oklahoma City and that there is a squadron of 15 Army planes waiting equipped with machine guns. I advised this was not true, and in fact we had not decided the method of transportation/would be used. I further advised that there is a rule against

the use of Army planes.

I advised Mr. Rorer that I had considered moving the Kellys tomorrow or the next day, but that if he continues talking I did not think he should be moved. Mr. Rorer stated that at the time of this call Kelly was telling them everywhere he had been. I cautioned that the plane should be checked carefully before leaving Memphis.

Mr. Rorer stated he was afraid the press might follow in another plane. I advised that I had thought of this, and for that reason I was considering transportation by train. I suggested that he and Mr. Keith discuss the matter and advise me of their reaction.

Mr. Rorer stated they have not as yet received any information as to the Kansas City massacre from Kelly, but that Kelly has claimed he was not in on it and is not in with the Kansas City crowd. He stated that Bailey was not in on the case but it was a concident that he had the ransom money. Mr. Rorer stated that a month before the kidnaping Kelly and Bates had a man in Joplin picked for the victim, a limit that they could not make a go of this so they went to Oklahoma City and first picked a man named

that they then picked a man named and that in their contacts they picked up someDody who suggested Urschel; that the contact suggested Jarrett as the man who could put Urschel "on the spot"; that Jarrett was to get \$25,000 later when the money had been changed, but so far had received none.

Mr. Rorer states that Kelly says that although he was in Chicago at the time of the murder, he had nothing to do with it, but is sure who did do it, from the earmarks.

Mr. Nathan advised that so far he had not been convinced that Jarrett is involved in the affair. I instructed Mr. Nathan to have the story regarding the meetings at the notel checked.

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September 25, 1933. I called the Chicago office and talked to Agent in Charge Purvis relative to newspaper reports concerning the alleged identification of the machine gun used at the bank robbery at Chicago with that used in the Kansas City massacre. Er. Purvis stated that there is no truth in this statement; that the Ballistics Expert at Kansas City, had arrived at Chicago yesterday and had been in touch with the Police Department to obtain the bullets found at the bank robbery and to compare them with the bullets found at Acasas City: that shortly after this contact the newspapers appeared with headlines to the effect that an identification had been made; that was disgusted and as a result of this publicity arranged to conduct his work in the Division office at Chicago; that he is now working there and he has reached no conclusion yet. With reference to the fingerprints, Purvis stated that no fingerprints were found on the automobile but they have some latent prints taken from a map which was in the car and from a bucket or 🗟 tank that was in the car; that these prints have been compared with all known criminals at Chicago but me identification has been made, and they are sending the fingerprints on to Washington.
