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Civil Rights, advised he has known the appointee for three and one half years. SHRIVER interviewed him personally for a position with the Office of Economic Opportunity. During his first two years with the Office of Economic Opportunity, he was one step removed from the appointee, but did have the opportunity to make reports directly He has found the appointee to be an exceptionally to him. brilliant and dedicated person who believes in people and America and has an abundance of faith in the future of this nation. 0ne year ago, Civil Rights and has had daily contact with the appointee. In this capacity, he has found the appointee to be technically competent as an administrator and in his understanding of human relations problems. observed that those opposed to the poverty program have had a tendency to attribute any shortcomings of the agency to a lack of administrative talent on the part of the appointee. did not feel this criticism was justified. SHRIVER was concerned with only one thing, that is, fighting poverty. Tc accomplish this end required a new and sometimes different organizational approach which did not always fall into the old routine administrative type program. Some national emphasis programs were established which were controlled by the Office of Economic Opportunity headquarters in Washington. Other programs called for control on a regional or local level. The type of administrative control depended on the type of problem to be Initially, everyone was against the war on poverty. solved. The appointee was able to turn the program around and get backing and endorsement from all. He had to be a super salesman and achieve results as well. He was the only man for the job. suggested that now that the ground is broken, he can see a possible consolidation of gains. He stated the appointee is loyal to the United States, believes in democracy and will go all the way to make it work. He would be a splendid person to represent this country in almost any position. His character and reputation are above reproach and he has no physical or emotional problems. recommended the appointee for a responsible position in the Federal government.

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Job Corps. Advised he has worked closely with the appointee for seven years, both at the Peace Corps, where he was Director of Contracts and Logistics, and at the Office of Leonomic Opportunity. He has also been with the appointee and his family at social functions. They reside on an estate near Rockville, which is leased. described the appointee as urbane and witty. He is intelligent. quick, sensitive and has an insight into social problems. The appointee has an unbounding energy and capacity for work and is an extraordinary administrator. stated he feels sufficiently well acquainted with SHRIVER to state that he bas never been the subject of any personal controversy. The Office of Economic Opportunity as an institution, has generated some criticism, but none is directly related to the administrative ability of the appointee. His ability to get controversial programs through Congress attests to his administrative achievements. His honesty, integrity and loyalty to the United States is above reproach. _____had no reason to question the appointce's personal conduct, character or habits and is convinced he would make a good representative of the United States.

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described the appointee as the most imaginative person he has met. he is articulate, has a fine personality and sense of humor and a great compassion for people. As a leader and innovator, he has no peer. The appointee is not an organization man. has not concerned himself with administrative structure and organization within the agency and has generally left these chores up to his deputy and subordinates. At times, SHRIVER has been criticized for not being able to handle a large federal project. Actually, he is an unconventional administrator in the federal complex. The Office of Economic Opportunity was not established to operate as a typical federal povernment It was SHRIVER's intention to get the needed programs agency. moving within the shortest possible time. To do this, he encouraged a loose non-structured operation and sought out very imaginative people to formulate policy. The appointee is able to inspire people and is completely loyal to the United States and the Administration for which he works. He is active in a great many Catholic charitable programs and in the mental retardation foundation + established by the Kennedy family. The appointee is a complete sort of man in repard to his interest in the arts and theater. Politically, he is a democrat and he belongs to no questionable or subversive stated he has only the highest praise organizations. for the appointee as an individual and as a government official and believes he would make an excellent representative of the United States.

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for Congressional Relations, advised he first met the appointee about two or three years ago while working for Congressman J. VAUCHN CARY, who was on the House Appropriations Committee. He has been on the Office of Scononic Opportunity staff since March, 1967, and has had regular, almost daily, contact with SERIVER. He has met with him on the Kill and at his home. spoke highly of the appointee and said he has never been around any person who has worked harder. He is not pre-occupied with post events and is the kind of man with whom you can have a difference of opinion one day and deal freely with on the following day. He is lively, outgoing, energetic and dodicated. bб He doesn't try to deceive anyone and is quick to admit his b7C mistakes. The Office of Economic Opportunity has been attacked at times by opponents of the poverty program who allege the agency is poorly administered. _____ noted that the Office of Economic Opportunity is a grant making agency. The fight against poverty must be carried out in the local community. Buch of the power and administration, therefore, is on the local level. When any mistakes or problems develop on this level, the whole Office of Economic Opportunity structure is attacked. SHRIVER has been the spokesman and policy developer within the Office of Economic Opportunity. The administration of the agency has been left up to the deputy director and said he has heard no other assistant directors. criticism of the appointce and has no reason to question his character, associates, reputation or loyalty to the United States. He recommended the appointee for a high level government position and noted that SHRIVER has an empathy with people that would even cross a language barrier.

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Public Affairs, advised he has been with the Office of Economic Opportunity for two and one half years and is in almost daily contact with the appointee. SHRIVER has great capabilities and is a man of competence and determination. He is unselfish, spiritually motivated and the most highly qualified public servant in Washington today. He developed a new and unique program in the Office of Economic Opportunity and made it successful. The agency does not carry out its functions in the traditional manner and the organization chart is of no interest to the appointee. His aim is to achieve results and he is able to motivate people to this end. This is the mark of a good administrator. commented that the appointee's non-professional activities are in the field of mental retardation, religion and sports. His views are utterly and wholly American. _____ added he had no reservation about recommending the appointee for any high level position in the United States. He believed that SHRIVER would make a good representative of the United States and noted that as Director of the Peace Corps, SHRIVER has had experience dealing with other nations.

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OEO advised he Health Affairs and first met the appointee in 1961 when he was the National Institute of Mental Health. SHRIVER interviewed him for the position of at the Peace Corps, which assignment he subsequently accepted. He then worked closely with the appointee over the next few years, traveled overseas with him on one occasion in 1962 and in May, 1966, came to OEO in the above capacity. described the appointee as the most dedicated and committed public servant he has met in Washington, D. C. Although the Peace Corps was not initially viewed with optimism, the appointee made it a success largely through his own personality. OEO has likewise been a controversial agency and it has been SHRIVER's skill as an administrator that has continued the poverty program. Despite the demands on his time to administer the Peace Corps and OEO, the appointee has performed as a faithful father.

stated he has never heard any criticism of SHRIVER's character, personal reputation, conduct or integrity. He did recall that on one occasion, the appointee's political judgment was questioned. The issue arose over OEO's failure to support the Child Development Group of Mississippi which was the state-wide headstart program in Mississippi. SHRIVER was criticised for not giving his support to the program. It was suggested he failed to support CDGM because of pressure from Senator STENNIS. The real fact of the matter was that black militants had taken over the organization and were using it for political purposes. To have supported the program would have been an irresponsible use of federal funds. Subsequent events in Mississippi have vindicated the position which SHRIVER took at that time.

On occasion, opponents of the poverty program would take advantage of an isolated irresponsible use of funds or mismanagement of a poverty program on the local level to raise the question of SHRIVER's ability as an administrator. _____ did not feel this criticism was b6 b7C

justified. In the war on poverty, OEO tried to give a high degree of autonomy to local groups to work out their own programs. Included in each local group were a substantial number of the poor themselves. It was to be expected that mistakes and problems would arise in the learning process. The mere fact that these problems arose were a reflection on what SHRIVER was trying to accomplish.

The appointee is in incredibly good health. He keeps himself in good shape and has had no physical or emotional problems. ______endorsed the appointee for a position of trust and responsibility with the Federal Government and stated he would make a fine representative of the United States.

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The security file for R. SARGENT SHRIVER, JR., at the Office of Security, Agency for Interantional Development, reviewed on April 4, 1968, by SA JOSEPH V. SPEICHER, reflected that he was granted a "Top Secret" clearance on March 10, 1961, "pursuant to security procedures established by the White House for Presidential appointments." The file indicated that the Office of Security, International Cooperation Administration (ICA), conducted name checks during March, 1961, on the appointee at the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Civil Service Commission, with negative results. The appointee's clearance, for his Peace Corps employment, ended on February 28, 1966, when he left the Peace Corps to accept an appointment at the Office of Economic Opportunity. The file listed appointee's birth date as November 9. 1915, at Mestminster, Maryland, and contained no additional pertinent information.

A service record card for the appointce at the Peace Corps, reviewed on April 4, 1968, by SA SPEICHER, reflected that his official personnel file was sent to the Office of Economic Opportunity on March 4, 1966. This card contained no additional pertinent information.

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The following investigation at the Peace Corps was conducted by SA JOSEPH W. SPEICHER:

On April 4, 1968, Mr. Office of Public Affairs, advised that he has known the appointee, R. SARCENT SHRIVER, JR., quite well since 1962. He indicated that he served under SHRIVER's direct supervision from 1962 to 1966 at the Peace Corps, and has continued to see him socially ever since. Mr. stated that he considered the appointee's loyalty to be beyond question and his character, reputation and associations to be of the highest type. He recommended the appointee "without question" for a Government position of trust, remarking that he is an extremely able; intelligent, conscientious and reliable person. He added that the appointee is an outstanding public servant and his appointment as Ambassador to France is "one of the outstanding appointments the President has made."

On April 4, 1968, Mr. _______ Office of Evaluation and account, advised that he has known the appointee quite well both socially and professionally since 1966. Mr. ______ reported that he has no question whatsoever regarding the appointee's loyalty to his country. He added that the appointee's character, reputation and associates are of the highest type and he recommended him for a position of trust and confidence with the Government. Mr. ______ commented that the appointee is a very able, hard working, discreet and reliable person. He mentioned that the appointee's wife is also a person of the highest type.

On April 4, 1968, Mr. North Africa, the Near Fast and South Asia, advised that he had known the appointce primarily professionally while serving under his supervision from 1964 to 1966 in the Peace Corps. Mr. described appointce b6 Ъ7С

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as a loyal and dedicated U.S. citizen and a man of excellent character, reputation and associations. He recommended him "without hesitation or reservation" for a position of trust.

On April 4, 1968, Mr. advised that he has known the appointee professionally from September, 1962, to March, 1964, while serving under his indirect supervision. Mr. stated that he has never had any reason to question the appointee's loyalty to his country and added that his character, reputation and associations are good, to the best of his knowledge. He recommended the appointee for a position of trust and confidence with the Covernment. Mr. could furnish no information regarding appointee's relatives.

_____On April 4, 1968, Mr. ______Africa, advised that he had known the appointee socially and professionally from 1962 to 1966, and he had continued to see him occasionally socially since that time. Mr. _____ stated that he considered the appointee to be a loyal and devoted U.S. citizen and a man of the highest character, associations and reputation. He recommended the appointee for a Government position of trust, commenting that he is " a great man and we need more people like him in Government service." Mr. _____ mentioned that the appointee's wife is also a very fine individual.

On April 5, 1968, Miss Division of Personnel, advised that she had known the appointee primarily professionally from 1961 to 1965. Miss _____ reported that she has absolutely no doubt as to the appointee's loyalty to the United States. She added that his character, reputation and associations are above reproach and she recommended him for a Government position of trust. Miss _____ remarked that the appointee is "loaded with charm and personality" and will do an excellent job in France." Ъ6 Ъ7С

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On April 5, 1968, Mr. advised that he had known the appointee very well both socially and professionally from 1961 to 1964 in the Peace Corps and has seen him again frequently from 1965 remarked that he had to the present time. Mr. the Peace Corps reported that he considered in the appointee to be "one of the great patriots of our country," adding that he is a loyal, committed and energetic American citizen. He remarked that the appointee's character, reputation and associations are above question and he recommended him "enthusiastically" for a position of trust and confidence with the Government. Mr. remarked that the appointee is a man of the highest caliber both personally and professionally and he will make a superb Ambassador to France. Mr. added that the appointee's wife is a person of the highest type.

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On April 5, 1968, Mr. National Voluntary Service Programs, advised that he had known the appointee socially and professionally from 1961 to 1966, and he still sees him occasionally. Mr. stated that he considered the appointee to be a loyal U.S. citizen and "one of the top one or two men in Government service." Mr. reported that the appointee's character, reputation and associations are above reproach and he recommended him for a position of trust with the Government.

Mr. _____ commented that the appointee seems to have a basic understanding and sympathy for all types of people and enjoys excellent relations with everyone.

On April 5, 1968, Mr. ______ General Counsel, advised that he had known the appointee casually in a professional capacity from 1964 to 1966, having served under the appointee's indirect supervision during this time. Mr. _____ reported that he has never had any reason to question appointee's character, reputation or associations and he recommended him for a government position of trust. He has never heard any unfavorable information concerning him and his business and administrative experience is such that he would be well qualified for any position of trust and confidence with the Federal Government.

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On April 5, 1968, Attorney. law firm of Reavis, Pogue, Neal and Rose, 1100 Connecticut Avenue, N.W., advised SA LEWIS the appointee is a very uncomplicated person. He is outgoing, full of great zest, enthusiastic and well adjusted. said there is nothing even remotely critical of the appointee's character or reputation. Their association began in the Summer of 1939 when the appointee was selected to lead a group of college students to France as part of the Experiment in International Living. The Experiment, according to was a forerunner of the Peace Corps and is still in existence. He is a member of the Board of Trustees. SHRIVER has had no connection with the organization since 1939 although he did receive a certificate of merit from the organization several years ago for his past performance. They had only limited contact until after the KENNEDY election in 1960 at which time they would meet more often on matters of government personnel staffing. | believed the appointee would make a good representative of the United States. In addition to his fine personality, the appointee's experience and world travel as Director of the Peace Corps would make him a fine emissary of the United States. added he was uninformed as to SHRIVER's work at the Peace Corps or OEO but noted there was enormous enthusiasm and sense of purpose among Peace Corps volunteers and the OEO staff was highly motivated largely as a direct result of the appointee's own personality.

He and his cousin were both in the Navy and stationain San Francisco. He is the author of "Point of the Lance," a book which discusses the aims and purposes of the Peace Corps. On the non-professional side, SHRIVER is very religious and is highly motivated by religion. As a result, he is very tolerant of all types of people. believed he would make a splendid representative of the United States, world problems and the courage to express his own views on any particular matter, although in the end he will abide by the final determination. His honesty, integrity and loyalty to the United States are above reproach.



My previous memorandum of 3/29/68 advised that the State Department had requested investigation of Shriver who, on 3/22/68, had been nominated United States Ambassador to France. His nomination was confirmed by the Senate on 4/19/68.

Investigation of Shriver is now complete and is favorable. Shriver, aged 52, is married to the former Eunice Mary Kennedy, sister of Senators Robert and Ted Kennedy and the late President. Shriver has B.A. and LL.B. degrees from Yale University. After serving in the Navy during World War II, Shriver worked for his father-in-law, Joseph P. Kennedy, in New York and Chicago until 1961 when he was appointed Director of the Peace Corps. Since September, 1964, he has been Director of the Office of Economic Opportunity. He "wore two hats" from September, 1964, to February, 1966, as head of the Peace Corps and the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Information Not Being Disseminated

During the Summer of 1934 between high school and college when he was aged eighteen, Shriver toured Europe with a group under the auspices of the Experiment in International Living, Putney, Vermont, an educational organization founded in 1932 to foster respect and mutual understanding among the different people of the world. Some of the others on that tour have since been involved in communist and communist front activities and later in anti-draft demonstrations. Since investigation does not indicate any association between Shriver and those people and since the tour occurred thirty-four years ago when he was eighteen years of age, the information is not being disseminated.

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

From September, 1964, to the present, Mr. Shriver has also been employed as Director of the Office of Deconomic Opportunity, Executive Office of the President, Vashington, D. C.

On March 22, 1957, Mr. Shriver was nominated United States Ambassador to France by the President of the United States. On April 19, 1968, his nomination to that position was confirmed by the United States Senate.

#### Marital Status

Mr. Shriver is married to the former Eunice Mary Ronnody and resides with her on Edson Lane. Rockville. Marvland Their five children.

#### Military Service

Mr. Shriver collisted in the United States Maval Reserve as an apprentice seamon on August 7, 1940. That enlistment was terminated on June 11, 1941, to allow him to accept an appointment as a midshipman. On September 16, 1941, he was appointed an ensign. He entered on active duty on November 1, 1941, as an ensign and was honorably released from active duty on December 16, 1945, as a lieutenant. Senator Tydings stated Mr. Shriver is a dedicated public servant who has served his country with distinction. He commented favorably concerning Mr. Shriver's character, reputation, and associates and stated that he is a patriotic American citizen. He advised that he would recommend Mr. Shriver without hesitation for a position of trust and responsibility.

Charles H. Percy, United States Senator from Illinois, was interviewed in Washington, D. C., and advised that he has known Mr. Shriver primarily due to Mr. Shriver's official duties as Director of the Peace Corps and Director of the Office of Economic Opportunity. Senator Percy stated Mr. Shriver's credentials for continued service to the United States are impeccable. He advised that he has never had any reason to question Mr. Shriver's character, loyalty, morals, or reputation and he recommended him for a position of trust with the Federal Government.

Everett McKinley Dirksen, United States Senator from Illinois, advised through his Research Assistant, Oliver J. Dompierre, in Washington, D. C., that he has had professional contact with Mr. Shriver for more than ten years. He advised that he considers Mr. Shriver to be an outstanding American and a gentleman in all respects and he recommended him for the position of United States Ambassador to France.

Chicago, Illinois, advised that he is a member of the Saddle and Cycle Club. Chicago, Illinois, and was formerly ______ the club. He stated that Mrs. Shriver was a member of that club before she married Mr. Shriver and Mr. Shriver joined the club following their marriage. He stated that the Shrivers were dropped from membership in the club for nonpayment of dues after Mr. Shriver left

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the Chicago area but eventually paid up their dues after cancellation of the membership. Mr. ________ stated the Shrivers were not popular members of the club as they broke numerous club rules as to dress and demeanor and "generally" acted as if they were superior to the other members. He stated Mr. Shriver is a very charming and personable individual and the Shrivers did nothing which would reflect unfavorably upon their moral character.

Merchandise Mart, Chicago, Illinois, advised that he has known Mr. Shriver for approximately twenty years. He stated that Mr. Shriver did an outstanding job as Assistant General Manager of the Merchandise Mart, handing primarily the promotional aspects of the organization. He stated Mr. Shriver is a highly intelligent and articulate person who is completely devoted to the well-being of his fellow man. He stated Mr. Shriver derives the greatest satisfaction from giving service to his community and to his country. Mr. _____ commented favorably concerning Mr. Shriver's character, loyalty, reputation, and associates and he recommended him for any position of trust and responsibility.

Field Enterprises, Incorporated, Chicago, Illinois, advised that he has known Mr. Shriver since 1948 when Mr. Shriver became Assistant General Manager of the Merchandise Mart. He said that he became close friends with Mr. Shriver and, subsequently, with his wife, the former Eunice Kennedy, after they were married. Mr. ______ advised that he has never heard anything of an adverse nature concerning Mr. or Mrs. Shriver and comsiders them both loyal Americans whose character, reputation, and associates are beyond reproach. He stated that their conduct is impeccable at all times and he highly recommended Mr. Shriver for a position of trust with the United States Government.

Richard J. Daley, Mayor, Chicago, Illinois, advised that he has known Mr. Shriver both socially and professionally since approximately 1953. He advised that he has been associated with Mr. Skriver on numerous occasions in connection with community and civic affairs. Mayor Daley stated that Mr. Shriver served on the Board of Education of the City of Chicago for several years and did an outstanding job while on the Board. He advised he has the highest regard for Mr. Shriver and for the other members of his family with whom he is well acquainted. He highly recommended Mr. Shriver for any position of trust and responsibility.

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Peace Corps, Washington, D. C., advised that he has known Mr. Shriver both socially and professionally since 1961. Mr. remarked that he the Peace Corps in March, the Peace Corps in March, IV66. Mr. stated that he considers Mr. Shriver to be one of the "great patriots of our country" and he described Mr. Shriver as a loyal, "committed, and energetic" American ĉitizen. # Shriver Accepts Share of Blame

R. Sargent Shriver says he's willing to accept "a disproportionate share of the blame" for the prevailing social atmosphere that recently caught up his own son, Bobby, in a marijuana raid.

The former ambassador to France, who served as head of the Peace Corps and the War on Poverty in the Kennedy and Johnson administrations, admits he was "in a position to do something about it."

But that "mea culpa" out of the way, Shriver sees his son as one of millions of youths living "under tremendous pressure with fantastic temptations."

And he adds: "I'm not sure a parent can withstand the atmosphere of this society."

Shriver said in an interview that his family, with its wealth and resources, was in a better position than most to cope with the pressures, which have mounted in an "almost libertine society, so far as sex and other things are concerned."

The lack of leadership and vision, he said, has "turned off" even the brightest and most idealistic youngsters. They see compromise and lies and "a double moral standard" all around them. He cited a long list of official "prevarications," running from the U-2 spy plane incident in 1960 through the Bay of Pigs, the Pueblo spy ship seizure, the Green Berets case, all perpetrated for "reasons of national interest."

#### No Heroes

The Vietnam war has produced "no Lafayettes or Mac-Arthurs, no songs like 'Yankee Doodle Dandy,' no lift, no critt. Nobody believes it's a glorious page in American history," he said.

"We don't go into Cambodia to make the world safe for democracy, to liberate the enslaved, in the name of justice, at the request of oppressed people," he said.

Asked if he didn't think it was to stop communism, he



replied, "They didn't even say that, assuming that was the case."

He said he was "shocked with the preoccupation with death in this country," and he mentioned several movies popular with youth, including "Easy Rider," "Bonnie and Clyde," "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid."

#### Under Attack

Observing that: "There isn't an institution that is not under attack from its own adherents," he referred to a newspaper picture showing the Rev. Daniel Berrigan, a fugitive for four months as an anti-war activist, being taken into custody.

"I never thought I'd see the day that a Catholic priest would be hauled in by the FBI," he commented,

Shriver said that when he looked about for a prep school for his 17-year-old son, he had been warned about the use of marijuana and other drugs in some of the best schools in America.

"I was told that if a headmaster says there was no dope in his school he was either stupid or lying," Shriver said.

He said he had "an arrangement" with his son to reward him if he stayed clear of marijuana until 21. "When a bunch of kids got thrown out

of his prep school for smoking pot, I wrote Bobby a letter of congratulation," he said.

Forewarned of the widespread use of marijuana at Hayannisport, Shriver said he debated letting his son spend the summer there. He thought of sending him on a vacation to South America or elsewhere. But his wife, the former Eunice Kennedy, said it would be a copout, and they decided to permit him to go to the Cape Cod resort to be with his Kennedy relatives.

#### Bitter

Shriver is bitter about the "violations" of a Massachusetts law that forbids releasing the names of juvenile defendants and publishing them. But in the case of his son and Robert F. Kennedy Jr., 16, the law was repeatedly ignored as scores of newsmen and photographers greeted the boys and their parents at the courthouse, some even taking pictures through the windows, he said.

But on the larger theme of the plight of youth in this country, Shriver said they needed a challenge, a "vi₀ ion of what we ought to be as a nation.

"What the young people want is a dream."

All films carry the FBI seal and a foreword by the Director which would highlight to the Turks the origin of the films.

He said he would remain in Paris as ambassador. "as long as the President wants me."

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

Among the Kennedys you play for keeps, and envoys for Hubert Humphrey have found that their views on brother in law Shriver ere deadly serious. It is based on the family rule of succession and dates back to a meeting held in the White House immediately after the assassination in Dallas at. which time it was decided that Robert F. Kennedy would pick up the mantle of his late brother and carry on.

Later, after the tragedy in Los. Angeles, the family decided that brother Edward Kennedy, sole surviving male member of the family, would aspire to the White House but would wait at least four years, possibly eight, partly because he was young, partly because 1268 did not look like a good Democratic year.

#### Father's Ambition

Although patriarch Joseph P. Kennedy, now in a wheel chair, did not ablend these sessions, they stemmed from his ambition to put his sons in the White Houser When Joseph P. Kennedy Jr., the eldest son, was shot down in a plane off the coast of Spain during the war, his father decreed that the next son, John F. Kennedy, should run for President. Plans were made to elect him to the

The reason for the family, veto of Sargent Shriver flow is the argument, first, that he is not really a Kennedy; second, that if he were elected Vice President he might get in the way of Teddy Kennedy's future.

The country might get fed up with a chain of Kennedys running for high office; or the Humphrey Administration, of which he would be a part, might become unpopular.

Shriver, married to Eunice Kennedy, oldest of JFK's sis-ters: got in wrong with the family when he accepted the ambassadorship to France at about the time Bobby Kennedy was running for President.

What happened was that President Johnson had offered Shriver the ambassadorship last winter, about three months before Bob Kennedy saw what Gene McCarthy was able to do in New Hampshire and jumped into the Tace

Shriver's reply to the President was that he hoped to run in Illinois for Governor or the U.S. Senate. To give him time to explore this opportunity, LBJ kept the ambassadorship open. By the time Shriver had made up his mind, Bobby had officially announced for Pres. Ident against LBJ. Thinking this might embarrass Shriver, Mr. Johnson asked Secretary of State Rusk to take the precaution of telephoning him in Spain, where Shriver was vacationing; to-make sure Bobby's announcement would not complicate his appointment to France Shriver still wanted to serve. He was appointed.

This added to the iriction between the Kennedy clan and their brother-in-law:

#### Well Oualified

Vice President Humphrey, in looking over the field for a running mate, has found that Shriver fills all the votegetting qualifications. He did a good job as head of the Peace Corps, where he became identified with young people. As head of the antipoverty program he became identified







On July 12, 1973 the Washington Field Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) was requested to conduct an investigation to determine if the above cited burglary occurred and if so, obtain all available circumstances surrounding the burglary.

On July 16, 1973, a representative of the FBI. <u>contacted</u> Principal Assistant United States Attorney, regarding a completed investigative report he maintained during the investigation of the Watergate case in 1972. This file was prepared by the Burglary Unit of the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD) and during the Watergate investigation, the MPD did in fact look into the captioned matter and filed a completed report. Mr. ______ advised that the entire file was turned over to the Office of Special Prosecutor.

On July 18, 1973, this same FBI representative met with ______ and brought his attention to the file. Mr. _____ advised he was unaware of the existence of this file and desired time to review it before having the FBI conduct any investigation.

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Accordingly, no investigation is being conducted in the captioned matter until Mr. _____ makes a recommendation on the previous report.

Don't think the lottery people aren't looking into these matters, too, because they are. But this is for the long-term future. Lottery officials have made no survey to determine how many tickets the daily lottery could be expected to coll and how from the present rate of \$1.35 million to about \$950,000. The net gain in weekly revenue should thus be between \$600,000 and \$1.1 million. That amounts to between \$31.2 million and \$57.2 million a year. 06Q

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
