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[redacted] Civil Rights, advised he has known the appointee for three and one half years. SHRIVER interviewed him personally for a position with the Office of Economic Opportunity. During his first two years with the Office of Economic Opportunity, he was one step removed from the appointee, but did have the opportunity to make reports directly to him. He has found the appointee to be an exceptionally brilliant and dedicated person who believes in people and America and has an abundance of faith in the future of this nation. One year ago, [redacted] Civil Rights and has had daily contact with the appointee. In this capacity, he has found the appointee to be technically competent as an administrator and in his understanding of human relations problems. [redacted] observed that those opposed to the poverty program have had a tendency to attribute any shortcomings of the agency to a lack of administrative talent on the part of the appointee.

[redacted] did not feel this criticism was justified. SHRIVER was concerned with only one thing, that is, fighting poverty. To accomplish this end required a new and sometimes different organizational approach which did not always fall into the old routine administrative type program. Some national emphasis programs were established which were controlled by the Office of Economic Opportunity headquarters in Washington. Other programs called for control on a regional or local level. The type of administrative control depended on the type of problem to be solved. Initially, everyone was against the war on poverty. The appointee was able to turn the program around and get backing and endorsement from all. He had to be a super salesman and achieve results as well. He was the only man for the job.

[redacted] suggested that now that the ground is broken, he can see a possible consolidation of gains. He stated the appointee is loyal to the United States, believes in democracy and will go all the way to make it work. He would be a splendid person to represent this country in almost any position. His character and reputation are above reproach and he has no physical or emotional problems. [redacted] recommended the appointee for a responsible position in the Federal government.

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[redacted] Job Corps, advised he has worked closely with the appointee for seven years, both at the Peace Corps, where he was Director of Contracts and Logistics, and at the Office of Economic Opportunity. He has also been with the appointee and his family at social functions. They reside on an estate near Rockville, which is leased. [redacted] described the appointee as urbane and witty. He is intelligent, quick, sensitive and has an insight into social problems. The appointee has an unbounding energy and capacity for work and is an extraordinary administrator. [redacted] stated he feels sufficiently well acquainted with SHRIVER to state that he has never been the subject of any personal controversy. The Office of Economic Opportunity as an institution, has generated some criticism, but none is directly related to the administrative ability of the appointee. His ability to get controversial programs through Congress attests to his administrative achievements. His honesty, integrity and loyalty to the United States is above reproach. [redacted] had no reason to question the appointee's personal conduct, character or habits and is convinced he would make a good representative of the United States.

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[redacted] described the appointee as the most imaginative person he has met. He is articulate, has a fine personality and sense of humor and a great compassion for people. As a leader and innovator, he has no peer. The appointee is not an organization man. He has not concerned himself with administrative structure and organization within the agency and has generally left these chores up to his deputy and subordinates. At times, SHRIVER has been criticized for not being able to handle a large federal project. Actually, he is an unconventional administrator in the federal complex. The Office of Economic Opportunity was not established to operate as a typical federal government agency. It was SHRIVER's intention to get the needed programs moving within the shortest possible time. To do this, he encouraged a loose non-structured operation and sought out very imaginative people to formulate policy. The appointee is able to inspire people and is completely loyal to the United States and the Administration for which he works. He is active in a great many Catholic charitable programs and in the mental retardation foundation established by the Kennedy family. The appointee is a complete sort of man in regard to his interest in the arts and theater. Politically, he is a democrat and he belongs to no questionable or subversive organizations. [redacted] stated he has only the highest praise for the appointee as an individual and as a government official and believes he would make an excellent representative of the United States.

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[redacted]
for Congressional Relations, advised he first met the appointee about two or three years ago while working for Congressman J. VAUGHN GARY, who was on the House Appropriations Committee. He has been on the Office of Economic Opportunity staff since March, 1967, and has had regular, almost daily, contact with SHRIVER. He has met with him on the Hill and at his home. [redacted] spoke highly of the appointee and said he has never been around any person who has worked harder. He is not pre-occupied with past events and is the kind of man with whom you can have a difference of opinion one day and deal freely with on the following day. He is lively, outgoing, energetic and dedicated. He doesn't try to deceive anyone and is quick to admit his mistakes. The Office of Economic Opportunity has been attacked at times by opponents of the poverty program who allege the agency is poorly administered. [redacted] noted that the Office of Economic Opportunity is a grant making agency. The fight against poverty must be carried out in the local community. Much of the power and administration, therefore, is on the local level. When any mistakes or problems develop on this level, the whole Office of Economic Opportunity structure is attacked. SHRIVER has been the spokesman and policy developer within the Office of Economic Opportunity. The administration of the agency has been left up to the deputy director and assistant directors. [redacted] said he has heard no other criticism of the appointee and has no reason to question his character, associates, reputation or loyalty to the United States. He recommended the appointee for a high level government position and noted that SHRIVER has an empathy with people that would even cross a language barrier.

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[redacted] Public Affairs, advised he has been with the Office of Economic Opportunity for two and one half years and is in almost daily contact with the appointee. SHRIVER has great capabilities and is a man of competence and determination. He is unselfish, spiritually motivated and the most highly qualified public servant in Washington today. He developed a new and unique program in the Office of Economic Opportunity and made it successful. The agency does not carry out its functions in the traditional manner and the organization chart is of no interest to the appointee. His aim is to achieve results and he is able to motivate people to this end. This is the mark of a good administrator. [redacted] commented that the appointee's non-professional activities are in the field of mental retardation, religion and sports. His views are utterly and wholly American. [redacted] added he had no reservation about recommending the appointee for any high level position in the United States. He believed that SHRIVER would make a good representative of the United States and noted that as Director of the Peace Corps, SHRIVER has had experience dealing with other nations.

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[redacted]
Health Affairs and [redacted] OEO advised he first met the appointee in 1961 when he was [redacted] [redacted] the National Institute of Mental Health. SHRIVER interviewed him for the position of [redacted] [redacted] at the Peace Corps, which assignment he subsequently accepted. He then worked closely with the appointee over the next few years, traveled overseas with him on one occasion in 1962 and in May, 1966, came to OEO in the above capacity. [redacted] described the appointee as the most dedicated and committed public servant he has met in Washington, D. C. Although the Peace Corps was not initially viewed with optimism, the appointee made it a success largely through his own personality. OEO has likewise been a controversial agency and it has been SHRIVER's skill as an administrator that has continued the poverty program. Despite the demands on his time to administer the Peace Corps and OEO, the appointee has performed as a faithful father.

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[redacted] stated he has never heard any criticism of SHRIVER's character, personal reputation, conduct or integrity. He did recall that on one occasion, the appointee's political judgment was questioned. The issue arose over OEO's failure to support the Child Development Group of Mississippi which was the state-wide headstart program in Mississippi. SHRIVER was criticised for not giving his support to the program. It was suggested he failed to support CDGM because of pressure from Senator STENNIS. The real fact of the matter was that black militants had taken over the organization and were using it for political purposes. To have supported the program would have been an irresponsible use of federal funds. Subsequent events in Mississippi have vindicated the position which SHRIVER took at that time.

On occasion, opponents of the poverty program would take advantage of an isolated irresponsible use of funds or mismanagement of a poverty program on the local level to raise the question of SHRIVER's ability as an administrator. [redacted] did not feel this criticism was

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justified. In the war on poverty, OEO tried to give a high degree of autonomy to local groups to work out their own programs. Included in each local group were a substantial number of the poor themselves. It was to be expected that mistakes and problems would arise in the learning process. The mere fact that these problems arose were a reflection on what SHRIVER was trying to accomplish.

The appointee is in incredibly good health. He keeps himself in good shape and has had no physical or emotional problems. [] endorsed the appointee for a position of trust and responsibility with the Federal Government and stated he would make a fine representative of the United States.

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Peace Corps

The security file for R. SARGENT SHRIVTER, JR., at the Office of Security, Agency for International Development, reviewed on April 4, 1968, by SA JOSEPH W. SPEICHER, reflected that he was granted a "Top Secret" clearance on March 10, 1961, "pursuant to security procedures established by the White House for Presidential appointments." The file indicated that the Office of Security, International Cooperation Administration (ICA), conducted name checks during March, 1961, on the appointee at the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Civil Service Commission, with negative results. The appointee's clearance, for his Peace Corps employment, ended on February 28, 1966, when he left the Peace Corps to accept an appointment at the Office of Economic Opportunity. The file listed appointee's birth date as November 9, 1915, at Westminster, Maryland, and contained no additional pertinent information.

A service record card for the appointee at the Peace Corps, reviewed on April 4, 1968, by SA SPEICHER, reflected that his official personnel file was sent to the Office of Economic Opportunity on March 4, 1966. This card contained no additional pertinent information.

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The following investigation at the Peace Corps was conducted by SA JOSEPH W. SPEICHER:

On April 4, 1968, Mr. [redacted] Office of Public Affairs, advised that he has known the appointee, R. SARCENT SHRIVER, JR., quite well since 1962. He indicated that he served under SHRIVER's direct supervision from 1962 to 1966 at the Peace Corps, and has continued to see him socially ever since. Mr. [redacted] stated that he considered the appointee's loyalty to be beyond question and his character, reputation and associations to be of the highest type. He recommended the appointee "without question" for a Government position of trust, remarking that he is an extremely able; intelligent, conscientious and reliable person. He added that the appointee is an outstanding public servant and his appointment as Ambassador to France is "one of the outstanding appointments the President has made."

On April 4, 1968, Mr. [redacted] Office of Evaluation and Research, advised that he has known the appointee quite well both socially and professionally since 1966. Mr. [redacted] reported that he has no question whatsoever regarding the appointee's loyalty to his country. He added that the appointee's character, reputation and associates are of the highest type and he recommended him for a position of trust and confidence with the Government. Mr. [redacted] commented that the appointee is a very able, hard working, discreet and reliable person. He mentioned that the appointee's wife is also a person of the highest type.

On April 4, 1968, Mr. [redacted] North Africa, the Near East and South Asia, advised that he had known the appointee primarily professionally while serving under his supervision from 1964 to 1966 in the Peace Corps. Mr. [redacted] described appointee

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as a loyal and dedicated U.S. citizen and a man of excellent character, reputation and associations. He recommended him "without hesitation or reservation" for a position of trust.

On April 4, 1968, Mr. [] advised that he has known the appointee professionally from September, 1962, to March, 1964, while serving under his indirect supervision. Mr. [] stated that he has never had any reason to question the appointee's loyalty to his country and added that his character, reputation and associations are good, to the best of his knowledge. He recommended the appointee for a position of trust and confidence with the Government. Mr. [] could furnish no information regarding appointee's relatives.

On April 4, 1968, Mr. [] Africa, advised that he had known the appointee socially and professionally from 1962 to 1966, and he had continued to see him occasionally socially since that time. Mr. [] stated that he considered the appointee to be a loyal and devoted U.S. citizen and a man of the highest character, associations and reputation. He recommended the appointee for a Government position of trust, commenting that he is "a great man and we need more people like him in Government service." Mr. [] mentioned that the appointee's wife is also a very fine individual.

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On April 5, 1968, Miss [] Division of Personnel, advised that she had known the appointee primarily professionally from 1961 to 1965. Miss [] reported that she has absolutely no doubt as to the appointee's loyalty to the United States. She added that his character, reputation and associations are above reproach and she recommended him for a Government position of trust. Miss [] remarked that the appointee is "loaded with charm and personality" and will do an excellent job in France."

On April 5, 1968, Mr. [] advised that he had known the appointee very well both socially and professionally from 1961 to 1964 in the Peace Corps and has seen him again frequently from 1965 to the present time. Mr. [] remarked that he had [] the Peace Corps in [] reported that he considered the appointee to be "one of the great patriots of our country," adding that he is a loyal, committed and energetic American citizen. He remarked that the appointee's character, reputation and associations are above question and he recommended him "enthusiastically" for a position of trust and confidence with the Government. Mr. [] remarked that the appointee is a man of the highest caliber both personally and professionally and he will make a superb Ambassador to France. Mr. [] added that the appointee's wife is a person of the highest type.

On April 4, 1968, Mrs. [] the Deputy Director, advised that she had known the appointee primarily in an official capacity from 1961 to 1966. Mrs. [] described the appointee as a loyal U.S. citizen. She recommended him for a Government position of trust, remarking that the Government is lucky to have him in its service. She added that she could furnish no information regarding the appointee's relatives.

On April 5, 1968, Mr. [] National Voluntary Service Programs, advised that he had known the appointee socially and professionally from 1961 to 1966, and he still sees him occasionally. Mr. [] stated that he considered the appointee to be a loyal U.S. citizen and "one of the top one or two men in Government service." Mr. [] reported that the appointee's character, reputation and associations are above reproach and he recommended him for a position of trust with the Government.

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Mr. [] commented that the appointee seems to have a basic understanding and sympathy for all types of people and enjoys excellent relations with everyone.

On April 5, 1968, Mr. [] General Counsel, advised that he had known the appointee casually in a professional capacity from 1964 to 1966, having served under the appointee's indirect supervision during this time. Mr. [] reported that he has never had any reason to question appointee's character, reputation or associations and he recommended him for a government position of trust.

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[redacted] for the United Planning Organization, 1100 Vermont Avenue, N.W. advised SA LEWIS on April 4, 1968, he has known SHRIVER only by reputation since the appointee became director of OEO.

[redacted] the United Planning Organization, most of his contacts are with the regional and district officers of OEO. He has had no direct professional contact with the appointee. [redacted] observed that he was [redacted] of the President's Council on Equal Opportunity during the six months of 1965 when the Council was in existence. Even though SHRIVER was a member of this council, they had no personal contact. [redacted] stated the appointee has the reputation of being a very able person. He has never heard any unfavorable information concerning him and his business and administrative experience is such that he would be well qualified for any position of trust and confidence with the Federal Government.

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On April 5, 1968, [] Attorney, law firm of Reavis, Pogue, Neal and Rose, 1100 Connecticut Avenue, N.W., advised SA LEWIS the appointee is a very uncomplicated person. He is outgoing, full of great zest, enthusiastic and well adjusted. [] said there is nothing even remotely critical of the appointee's character or reputation. Their association began in the Summer of 1939 when the appointee was selected to lead a group of college students to France as part of the Experiment in International Living. The Experiment, according to [] was a forerunner of the Peace Corps and is still in existence. He is a member of the Board of Trustees. SHRIVER has had no connection with the organization since 1939 although he did receive a certificate of merit from the organization several years ago for his past performance. They had only limited contact until after the KENNEDY election in 1960 at which time they would meet more often on matters of government personnel staffing. [] believed the appointee would make a good representative of the United States. In addition to his fine personality, the appointee's experience and world travel as Director of the Peace Corps would make him a fine emissary of the United States. [] added he was uninformed as to SHRIVER's work at the Peace Corps or OEO but noted there was enormous enthusiasm and sense of purpose among Peace Corps volunteers and the OEO staff was highly motivated largely as a direct result of the appointee's own personality.

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Mrs. [] Washington Representative of The Population Council, 1735 I Street, N.W., advised SA LEWIS on April 5, 1968, she has known the appointee since the early 1940's. He and his cousin were both in the Navy and stationed in San Francisco. [] SHRIVER's cousin and through him met the appointee. Their contact was intermittent subsequent to that time until she joined the Peace Corps staff [] then as [] and finally as Special Assistant to SHRIVER in charge of [] In this latter position she had a direct professional relationship with the appointee. [] described him as a "can-do" man. He likes to get things done, is creative and innovative, and likes to surround himself with idea people. At the Peace Corps he exercised very good judgment. He was always careful and conscious of the health and welfare of the volunteers in the different countries. He is the author of "Point of the Lance," a book which discusses the aims and purposes of the Peace Corps. On the non-professional side, SHRIVER is very religious and is highly motivated by religion. As a result, he is very tolerant of all types of people. [] believed he would make a splendid representative of the United States, [] world problems and the courage to express his own views on any particular matter, although in the end he will abide by the final determination. His honesty, integrity and loyalty to the United States are above reproach.

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On April 4, 1968, [] Attorney, law firm of Wilmer, Cutler and Pickering, 900 17th Street, N.W., advised SA LEWIS he and the appointee attended college and law school at Yale University. They were acquainted as students at the school even though their graduating classes were two years apart. He had very little contact with the appointee until the KENNEDY campaign in 1960. [] advised he is presently a member of the appointee's Business Leadership Advisory Council at Office of Economic Opportunity, and he has only the highest admiration for the appointee. He has demonstrated a great skill of advocacy and persuasion as an administrator of the Peace Corps and Office of Economic Opportunity. The loyalty, devotion and enthusiasm shown by his subordinates and the Peace Corps Volunteers is extraordinary. [] noted the appointee is active in the Yale Alumnae Association, but was not acquainted with his other outside activities or organizational affiliations. He knew nothing unfavorable concerning the appointee's character, associates, reputation or loyalty and believed he would make an excellent representative of the U.S.

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Mr. [REDACTED]
the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, Federal Office Building, 17th Street, N.W., advised SA LEWIS on April 4, 1968, he has known SHRIVER intimately for 25 years. The appointee is a Godfather of one of his sons. [REDACTED] stated he saw a great deal of SHRIVER while the appointee was General Manager of the Merchandise Mart in Chicago. He also worked closely with him during the KENNEDY Campaign in 1960. [REDACTED] considered the appointee to be one of the ablest individuals in government service today. He has an attractive personality and his character and professional reputation are above reproach. The appointee was a former President of the Chicago School Board, he was active in Catholic charities and has always enjoyed a close relationship with Notre Dame University. [REDACTED] added he has never heard any criticism of the appointee and believed he would make a superb representative of the United States.

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On April 5, 1968, [] Attorney, law firm of Saxon, Maguire and Tucker, 2000 L Street, N.W., advised SA LEWIS that he first met the appointee in 1960, during the presidential campaign of JOHN F. KENNEDY. He has had no professional association with SHRIVER since the appointee has been director of the Peace Corps and Office of Economic Opportunity. [] stated he had been professionally acquainted with the KENNEDY family and was Treasurer of JOHN KENNEDY's campaign when he was seeking election to the U.S. Senate. Although he has had no social contact with the appointee, he is acquainted with the latter's achievements and personal reputation. [] commented that the appointee is genuinely liked by everyone on Capitol Hill, despite their differences of opinion on the Poverty Program. It was mainly through the personal efforts of SHRIVER, that the Office of Economic Opportunity program was saved. [] considers the appointee an able and intelligent person and felt he would make a great ambassador.

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Maryland and Illinois Senators

The following investigation was conducted by
SA [] on April 2, 1968.

Senator [] advised he has been a close personal friend of the appointee, ROBERT SARGENT SHRIVER, JR., for more than 20 years. He said he has maintained contact socially with the appointee over the years and had visited him and his wife, EUNICE KENNEDY SHRIVER and their children, [] at their present residence at Rockville, Maryland.

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Senator [] advised the appointee is a dedicated public servant who had served with distinction as Director, Office of Economic Opportunity. He said he is aware the appointee has been designated by President LYNDON B. JOHNSON as Ambassador to France. He said he has no question concerning his personal or professional ethics nor as to his patriotism. He recommended the appointee without hesitation to a position of trust and confidence in the United States Government.

Senator DANIEL B. BREWSTER, advised he has known the appointee for more than 30 years as a close personal friend. He said he is also well acquainted with the appointee's wife and children. He was aware the appointee has been designated by the President as Ambassador to France. Senator BREWSTER characterized the appointee as an intelligent, responsible citizen of high attainment. He had no question concerning his reputation in the area of his public or personal life. He considers him to be a loyal American citizen and recommended him to a position of trust and confidence in the Government.

Senator [] advised that he has known the appointee primarily as the result of his recent representation as Director of the Peace Corps and as

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as Director of the Office of Economic Opportunity. He said his credentials for continued service to the country are impeccable. He had no question concerning his loyalty, morals, reputation. He recommended him to a position of trust and confidence with the Government.

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Minority Floor Leader, Senator EVERETT MCKINLEY DIRKSEN, advised that the Senator is unavailable for interview due to a temporary physical disability. He said he is authorized to say the Senator has had professional contact with the appointee for more than 10 years. He said the Senator is aware of his nomination by the President to the post of Ambassador to France. He said he is authorized to say the Senator would interpose no objection to his nomination to an ambassadorial post. He said the Senator considers the appointee to be an outstanding American and is a gentleman in all respects.

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CREDIT AND POLICE AGENCY CHECKS

SE [] caused a search to be made of the files of The Credit Bureau, Incorporated, Washington, D.C., and was advised on April 2, 1968, that the files contained a satisfactory credit record for the appointee.

On April 2, 1968, IC [] determined that no record was contained in the Metropolitan Police Department files concerning the appointee or his wife EUNICE MARY KENNEDY SHRIVER.

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It is to be noted that at all times an indefinite number of unidentified records are out of file and not available for review.

On April 2, 1968, IC [] searched the files of the U.S. Park Police, and no criminal record was found concerning the appointee or his wife.

IC [] caused a search to be made of the files of the Prince Georges County, Maryland, Police Department, and was advised on April 3, 1968, that no record was located for the appointee or his wife.

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MISCELLANEOUS

House Committee on Un-American Activities

The files of the House Committee on Un-American Activities were reviewed on April 2, 1968, by SE [REDACTED] and no identifiable record was found for the appointee.

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Passport Office

Records of the Passport Office, Department of State, reviewed by SA JEROME E. VEIGLE, on April 5, 1968, disclosed the appointee was issued passport number J237667 on February 21, 1968, at Washington, D.C. His travel plans were un'known except for the purpose of the trip which was future prospect as tourist. The application disclosed he last married on May 23, 1953 to EUNICE MARY KENNEDY SHRIVER who was born July 10, 1921, at Boston, Massachusetts. His occupation was Special Assistant to the President.

Passport number DB556254 was issued the appointee March 20, 1963, at Washington, D.C. No travel plans were listed on this passport application dated March 20, 1963. This passport was renewed on or about October 8, 1965 at Washington, D.C. His permanent address on renewal was 140 E. Walton, Chicago, Illinois. No travel plans were included on the renewal.

Diplomatic passport number X001237 was issued the appointee April 17, 1961 at Washington, D.C. His occupation was listed as Director, Peace Corps. He was to depart New York, New York by air on April 22, 1961, for a period of three weeks to one month to visit England, Nigeria, India, Pakistan, Burma, Thailand, Malaya, Philippines, Italy, Turkey, Hong Kong and Japan, the latter four countries to change planes. The purpose of the trip was to discuss and negotiate with foreign governments plans and proposals for use of Peace Corps abroad.

Passport X001237 was extended for travel as follows:

On 10/12/61, extended to 1/30/62 to visit Mexico, Colombia, Peru, Bolivia, Chile, Brazil and Venezuela.

On 6/7/61 extended to 12/31/61 to visit Guinea and such other places as may be necessary.

On 2/7/62 extended to 12/31/62 for travel to Trinidad, St. Lucia, Panama, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Honduras and Guatemala.

On 4/27/62 endorsed for travel to Japan, Thailand, Malaya, Indonesia and Philippines.

On 6/18/62 extended to 8/31/63 for travel to Philippines, Thailand, Malaya, Nepal, India, Afghanistan, and Iran.

On 10/19/62 endorsed for travel to Ethiopia, Somalia, Tanganyika and Tunisia.

On 12/17/62 endorsed for travel to the Dominican Republic, Jamaica and Panama.

On 3/15/63 extended to 7/31/63 for travel to Senegal, Liberia, Ivory Coast, Ghana, Togo, Nigeria, Gabon and Cameroons.

On 5/13/63 extended to 12/31/63 for travel to Ivory Coast, Togo, Libreville, and Senegal.

On 10/18/63 extended to 8/31/64 for travel to Pakistan, India and Afghanistan.

On 10/1/63, endorsed for travel to Lagos.

On 2/5/64, endorsed for travel to Germany.

On 5/7/64 extended to 5/31/65 for travel to Peru, Bolivia and Brazil.

On February 28, 1958, the appointee was issued passport number 763343 at Chicago, Illinois. He was to depart San Francisco March 15, 1958 by air for a period of one month to visit Japan, Korea, Hong Kong, Thailand, Cambodia, and South Vietnam on a pleasure trip. This passport was renewed on or about May 2, 1960, at Chicago, Illinois. The renewal indicated appointee had no immediate plans for travel.

Passport number 83299 was issued the appointee

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Defense Central Index of Investigations

The Defense Central Index of Investigations, (DCII), Ft. Holabird, Maryland, comprising indices to Army, Navy and Air Force investigative files, was searched through a representative of that agency on April 3, 1968, and disclosed that information possibly identical with the appointee is contained in the files of the U.S. Army Investigative Records Repository (AIRR) and the U.S. Naval Investigative Service (NIS).

A review of the AIRR files, Fort Holabird, Maryland, on April 3, 1968, disclosed no derogatory information concerning the appointee.

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Library of Congress

On April 8, 1968, IC [] determined from the main card catalog at the Library of Congress, that the appointee is the author of "Point of the Lance," published by Harper and Row, New York, in 1964. The Book Review Digest for 1964 contains no information concerning this publication.

Newspaper Morgues

On April 5, 1968, SA WILLIAM E. TRAINOR, JR. reviewed the Library files of the "Washington Daily News," newspaper, and no pertinent information was found concerning the appointee.

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On April 8, 1968, SA TRAINOR reviewed the Library files of the "Evening Star," newspaper, which contained numerous items relating to SHRIVER'S appointments and public duties, however, a review of these articles revealed no additional pertinent information concerning the appointee.

My previous memorandum of 3/29/68 advised that the State Department had requested investigation of Shriver who, on 3/22/68, had been nominated United States Ambassador to France. His nomination was confirmed by the Senate on 4/19/68.

Investigation of Shriver is now complete and is favorable. Shriver, aged 52, is married to the former Eunice Mary Kennedy, sister of Senators Robert and Ted Kennedy and the late President. Shriver has B.A. and LL.B. degrees from Yale University. After serving in the Navy during World War II, Shriver worked for his father-in-law, Joseph P. Kennedy, in New York and Chicago until 1961 when he was appointed Director of the Peace Corps. Since September, 1964, he has been Director of the Office of Economic Opportunity. He "wore two hats" from September, 1964, to February, 1966, as head of the Peace Corps and the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Information Not Being Disseminated

During the Summer of 1934 between high school and college when he was aged eighteen, Shriver toured Europe with a group under the auspices of the Experiment in International Living, Putney, Vermont, an educational organization founded in 1932 to foster respect and mutual understanding among the different people of the world. Some of the others on that tour have since been involved in communist and communist front activities and later in anti-draft demonstrations. Since investigation does not indicate any association between Shriver and those people and since the tour occurred thirty-four years ago when he was eighteen years of age, the information is not being disseminated.

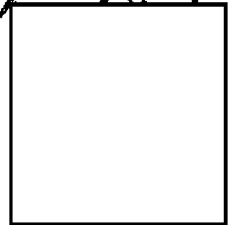

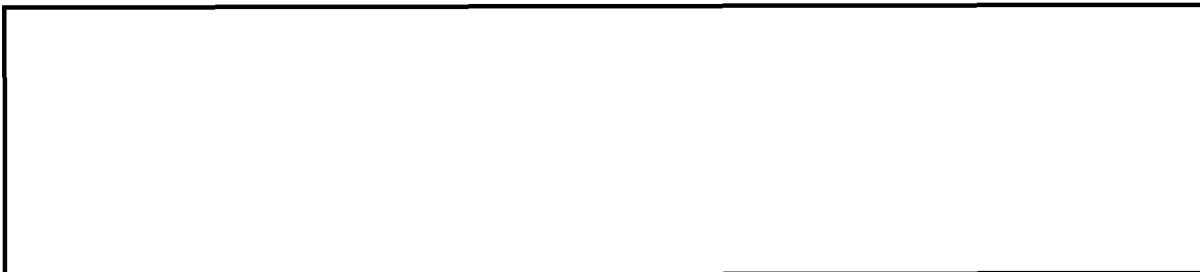

Mr. Shriver was born on November 9, 1915, in Westminster, Maryland.

Education

From September, 1934, to June, 1941, Mr. Shriver attended Yale University, New Haven, Connecticut, receiving a B.A. degree on June 21, 1938, and an LL.B. degree on June 18, 1941.

Employment

From September, 1940, to October, 1941, Mr. Shriver was employed as an associate by the law firm of Winthrop, Stimson, Putnam, and Roberts, New York, New York.

From February, 1946, to November, 1946, he was employed as a research assistant by "Newsweek," a weekly news magazine published in New York City.

From 1946 to 1948 Mr. Shriver was employed as an associate by Joseph P. Kennedy Enterprises, New York City.

From 1948 to 1961 he was employed as Assistant General Manager by the Merchandise Mart, Chicago, Illinois.

From May, 1954, to October, 1960, Mr. Shriver served as a member of the Board of Education of the City of Chicago, Illinois. From 1955 to 1960 he was President of the Board of Education.

From May, 1959, to January, 1961, Mr. Shriver served as Executive Director of the Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr., Foundation, New York, New York.

From March, 1961, to February, 1966, Mr. Shriver was employed as Director of the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C.

From September, 1964, to the present, Mr. Shriver has also been employed as Director of the Office of Economic Opportunity, Executive Office of the President, Washington, D. C.

On March 22, 1968, Mr. Shriver was nominated United States Ambassador to France by the President of the United States. On April 19, 1968, his nomination to that position was confirmed by the United States Senate.

Marital Status

Mr. Shriver is married to the former Eunice Mary Kennedy and resides with her on Edson Lane, Rockville, Maryland. Their five children, [redacted]

[redacted] reside with them.

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Military Service

Mr. Shriver enlisted in the United States Naval Reserve as an apprentice seaman on August 7, 1940. That enlistment was terminated on June 11, 1941, to allow him to accept an appointment as a midshipman. On September 16, 1941, he was appointed an ensign. He entered on active duty on November 1, 1941, as an ensign and was honorably released from active duty on December 16, 1945, as a lieutenant. He served in an inactive status until October 15, 1954, when he was honorably discharged a lieutenant commander. His record is clear.

II. RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

Interviews

Daniel B. Brewster, United States Senator from Maryland, was interviewed in Washington, D. C., and advised that he has known Mr. Shriver for over thirty years as a close personal friend. He stated he is also well acquainted with Mr. Shriver's wife and children. Senator Brewster described Mr. Shriver as an intelligent, responsible citizen of high attainment. He advised that he has never had any reason to question Mr. Shriver's public or personal life and considers him a loyal American citizen whose character,

reputation, and associates are above question. He recommended Mr. Shriver for a position of trust with the United States Government.

Joseph D. Tydings, United States Senator from Maryland, was interviewed in Washington, D. C., and advised that he has been a close personal friend of Mr. Shriver's for more than twenty years. He stated he has visited in Mr. Shriver's home on a number of occasions and is acquainted with his wife and children. Senator Tydings stated Mr. Shriver is a dedicated public servant who has served his country with distinction. He commented favorably concerning Mr. Shriver's character, reputation, and associates and stated that he is a patriotic American citizen. He advised that he would recommend Mr. Shriver without hesitation for a position of trust and responsibility.

Charles H. Percy, United States Senator from Illinois, was interviewed in Washington, D. C., and advised that he has known Mr. Shriver primarily due to Mr. Shriver's official duties as Director of the Peace Corps and Director of the Office of Economic Opportunity. Senator Percy stated Mr. Shriver's credentials for continued service to the United States are impeccable. He advised that he has never had any reason to question Mr. Shriver's character, loyalty, morals, or reputation and he recommended him for a position of trust with the Federal Government.

Everett McKinley Dirksen, United States Senator from Illinois, advised through his Research Assistant, Oliver J. Dompiere, in Washington, D. C., that he has had professional contact with Mr. Shriver for more than ten years. He advised that he considers Mr. Shriver to be an outstanding American and a gentleman in all respects and he recommended him for the position of United States Ambassador to France.

[redacted] Chicago, Illinois, advised that he is a member of the Saddle and Cycle Club, Chicago, Illinois, and was formerly [redacted] the club. He stated that Mrs. Shriver was a member of that club before she married Mr. Shriver and Mr. Shriver joined the club following their marriage. He stated that the Shrivens were dropped from membership in the club for nonpayment of dues after Mr. Shriver left

the Chicago area but eventually paid up their dues after cancellation of the membership. Mr. [] stated the Shrivens were not popular members of the club as they broke numerous club rules as to dress and demeanor and "generally" acted as if they were superior to the other members. He stated Mr. Shriver is a very charming and personable individual and the Shrivens did nothing which would reflect unfavorably upon their moral character.

[] Merchandise Mart, Chicago, Illinois, advised that he has known Mr. Shriver for approximately twenty years. He stated that Mr. Shriver did an outstanding job as Assistant General Manager of the Merchandise Mart, handling primarily the promotional aspects of the organization. He stated Mr. Shriver is a highly intelligent and articulate person who is completely devoted to the well-being of his fellow man. He stated Mr. Shriver derives the greatest satisfaction from giving service to his community and to his country. Mr. [] commented favorably concerning Mr. Shriver's character, loyalty, reputation, and associates and he recommended him for any position of trust and responsibility.

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[] Field Enterprises, Incorporated, Chicago, Illinois, advised that he has known Mr. Shriver since 1948 when Mr. Shriver became Assistant General Manager of the Merchandise Mart. He said that he became close friends with Mr. Shriver and, subsequently, with his wife, the former Eunice Kennedy, after they were married. Mr. [] advised that he has never heard anything of an adverse nature concerning Mr. or Mrs. Shriver and considers them both loyal Americans whose character, reputation, and associates are beyond reproach. He stated that their conduct is impeccable at all times and he highly recommended Mr. Shriver for a position of trust with the United States Government.

Richard J. Daley, Mayor, Chicago, Illinois, advised that he has known Mr. Shriver both socially and professionally since approximately 1953. He advised that he has been associated with Mr. Shriver on numerous occasions in connection with community and civic affairs. Mayor Daley stated that Mr. Shriver served on the Board of Education of the City of Chicago for several years and did an outstanding job while on the Board. He advised he has the highest regard for Mr. Shriver and for the other members of his family with whom he is well acquainted. He highly recommended Mr. Shriver for any position of trust and responsibility.

Robert Sargent Shriver, Jr.

[redacted] Peace Corps, Washington, D. C., advised that he has known Mr. Shriver both socially and professionally since 1961. Mr. [redacted] remarked that he [redacted] the Peace Corps in March, 1966. Mr. [redacted] stated that he considers Mr. Shriver to be one of the "great patriots of our country" and he described Mr. Shriver as a loyal, "committed, and energetic" American citizen. He stated Mr. Shriver is a man of the highest standards, both personal and professional, and will make a superb United States Ambassador to France. He stated he is also acquainted with Mrs. Shriver and considers her a person of the very highest type. He said Mr. Shriver's character, reputation, and associates are beyond reproach and said he would recommend him "enthusiastically" for a position of trust with the United States Government.

[redacted]
Office of Economic Opportunity, Executive Office of the President, Washington, D. C., advised that he has worked closely with Mr. Shriver for approximately seven years, both at the Peace Corps and at the Office of Economic Opportunity. He stated he has also enjoyed a social acquaintance with both Mr. and Mrs. Shriver. He described Mr. Shriver as an urbane and witty person who is intelligent, quick, and sensitive. He stated Mr. Shriver is energetic, possesses a "tremendous" capacity for work, and is a highly efficient administrator. Mr. [redacted] stated that the Office of Economic Opportunity [redacted] as an institution has generated some criticism, none of which has been directly related to the administrative ability of Mr. Shriver. He advised that Mr. Shriver has never been the subject of any personal controversy and his honesty, integrity, and loyalty to the United States are above reproach. Mr. [redacted] stated he has never had any reason to question Mr. Shriver's personal conduct, character, or habits and he recommended him for any position of trust with the United States Government.

Eighty-four other associates and acquaintances of Mr. Shriver's were interviewed and they advised that he is a loyal American whose character, reputation, and associates are above question. Those acquainted with the other members of his family advised that they are highly reputable persons. He was described as a highly efficient administrator who is outgoing, energetic, and dedicated to his work. Several described him as the most highly qualified public servant in Washington, D. C.,

today. It was stated that he is in excellent health and has no physical or emotional problems. They highly recommended him for a position of trust and responsibility with the Federal Government.

Mr. Shriver was admitted to practice law in the State of Illinois in April, 1959. He was admitted to practice in the State of New York in December, 1941. He was admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of the United States in November, 1966. No grievances have been filed against him. The records of other appropriate bars and bar associations, including the American Bar Association, were checked and no record concerning Mr. Shriver was located.

Passport Record

The records of the Passport Office, Department of State, indicate that Mr. Shriver has been issued seven passports since June 21, 1934, for travel to numerous countries throughout the world for business and pleasure. Those files contain no derogatory information concerning him.

Shriver Accepts Share of Blame

R. Sargent Shriver says he's willing to accept "a disproportionate share of the blame" for the prevailing social atmosphere that recently caught up his own son, Bobby, in a marijuana raid.

The former ambassador to France, who served as head of the Peace Corps and the War on Poverty in the Kennedy and Johnson administrations, admits he was "in a position to do something about it."

But that "mea culpa" out of the way, Shriver sees his son as one of millions of youths living "under tremendous pressure with fantastic temptations."

And he adds: "I'm not sure a parent can withstand the atmosphere of this society."

Shriver said in an interview that his family, with its wealth and resources, was in a better position than most to cope with the pressures, which have mounted in an "almost libertine society, so far as sex and other things are concerned."

The lack of leadership and vision, he said, has "turned off" even the brightest and most idealistic youngsters. They see compromise and lies and "a double moral standard" all around them. He cited a long list of official "prevarications," running from the U-2 spy plane incident in 1960 through the Bay of Pigs, the Pueblo spy ship seizure, the Green Berets case, all perpetrated for "reasons of national interest."

No Heroes

The Vietnam war has produced "no Lafayettes or Mac-Arthurs, no songs like 'Yankee Doodle Dandy,' no lift, no spirit. Nobody believes it's a glorious page in American history," he said.

"We don't go into Cambodia to make the world safe for democracy, to liberate the enslaved, in the name of justice, at the request of oppressed people," he said.

Asked if he didn't think it was to stop communism, he

replied, "They didn't even say that, assuming that was the case."

He said he was "shocked with the preoccupation with death in this country," and he mentioned several movies popular with youth, including "Easy Rider," "Bonnie and Clyde," "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid."

Under Attack

Observing that: "There isn't an institution that is not under attack from its own adherents," he referred to a newspaper picture showing the Rev. Daniel Berrigan, a fugitive for four months as an anti-war activist, being taken into custody.

"I never thought I'd see the day that a Catholic priest would be hauled in by the FBI," he commented.

Shriver said that when he looked about for a prep school for his 17-year-old son, he had been warned about the use of marijuana and other drugs in some of the best schools in America.

"I was told that if a headmaster says there was no dope in his school he was either stupid or lying," Shriver said.

He said he had "an arrangement" with his son to reward him if he stayed clear of marijuana until 21. "When a bunch of kids got thrown out

of his prep school for smoking pot, I wrote Bobby a letter of congratulation," he said.

Forewarned of the widespread use of marijuana at Hayannisport, Shriver said he debated letting his son spend the summer there. He thought of sending him on a vacation to South America or elsewhere. But his wife, the former Eunice Kennedy, said it would be a copout, and they decided to permit him to go to the Cape Cod resort to be with his Kennedy relatives.

Bitter

Shriver is bitter about the "violations" of a Massachusetts law that forbids releasing the names of juvenile defendants and publishing them. But in the case of his son and Robert F. Kennedy Jr., 16, the law was repeatedly ignored as scores of newsmen and photographers greeted the boys and their parents at the courthouse, some even taking pictures through the windows, he said.

But on the larger theme of the plight of youth in this country, Shriver said they needed a challenge, a "vision of what we ought to be as a nation."

"What the young people want is a dream."

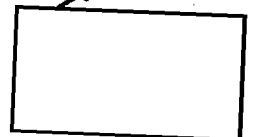
Shriver: Not planning run for Dirksen's seat

Kennedys Veto HHH-Shriver

Ticket

CHICAGO — Hubert Humphrey's search for a Vice President has run into a family feud that could only happen in the Kentucky mountains or with the Kennedy clan. Teddy Kennedy doesn't want the Vice Presidency, but the family has turned thumbs down on Ted's brother-in-law, Sargent Shriver, who does.

And since one reason for putting Shriver on the ticket would be to get Kennedy family support, this amounts to a firm veto.

Among the Kennedys you play for keeps, and envoys for Hubert Humphrey have found that their views on brother-in-law Shriver are deadly serious. It is based on the family rule of succession and dates back to a meeting held in the White House immediately after the assassination in Dallas at which time it was decided that Robert F. Kennedy would pick up the mantle of his late brother and carry on.

Later, after the tragedy in Los Angeles, the family decided that brother Edward Kennedy, sole surviving male member of the family, would aspire to the White House but would wait at least four years, possibly eight, partly because he was young, partly because 1968 did not look like a good Democratic year.

Father's Ambition

Although patriarch Joseph P. Kennedy, now in a wheelchair, did not attend these sessions, they stemmed from his ambition to put his sons in the White House. When Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr., the eldest son, was shot down in a plane off the coast of Spain during the war, his father decreed that the next son, John F. Kennedy, should run for President. Plans were made to elect him to the

The reason for the family veto of Sargent Shriver now is the argument, first, that he is not really a Kennedy; second, that if he were elected Vice President he might get in the way of Teddy Kennedy's future.

The country might get fed up with a chain of Kennedys running for high office, or the Humphrey Administration, of which he would be a part, might become unpopular.

Shriver, married to Eunice Kennedy, oldest of JFK's sisters, got in wrong with the family when he accepted the ambassadorship to France at about the time Bobby Kennedy was running for President.

What happened was that President Johnson had offered Shriver the ambassadorship last winter, about three months before Bob Kennedy saw what Gene McCarthy was able to do

in New Hampshire and jumped into the race.

Shriver's reply to the President was that he hoped to run in Illinois for Governor or the U.S. Senate. To give him time to explore this opportunity, LBJ kept the ambassadorship open. By the time Shriver had made up his mind, Bobby had officially announced for President against LBJ. Thinking this might embarrass Shriver, Mr. Johnson asked Secretary of State Rusk to take the precaution of telephoning him in Spain, where Shriver was vacationing, to make sure Bobby's announcement would not complicate his appointment to France. Shriver still wanted to serve. He was appointed.

This added to the friction between the Kennedy clan and their brother-in-law.

Well Qualified

Vice President Humphrey, in looking over the field for a running mate, has found that Shriver fills all the vote-getting qualifications. He did a good job as head of the Peace Corps, where he became identified with young people. As head of the antipoverty program he became identified

However, the allegation of the Kennedy family would undo most of these assets. Humphrey therefore passed the word to the Shriver in Paris regarding their opposition. Shriver's wife, Eunice, immediately began serving as her husband's ambassador to remove the veto of the Kennedy family.

First she got in touch with her mother, Rose Kennedy. It's doubtful, however, how influential Rose Kennedy is with the rest of the family. Jim Bishop, in his forthcoming book, "The Day Kennedy Was Shot," will tell the story of how Jacqueline Kennedy did not call her husband's mother Rose on the date of the Dallas tragedy; it was Mr. Johnson who did call Rose. Bishop was also told by Cardinal Cushing of Boston how, when he entered the cathedral at the time of John F. Kennedy's funeral, he found Mrs. Rose Kennedy in the rear and escorted her up to one of the front pews with the rest of the family.

Bishop interviewed Mrs. Rose Kennedy three months after the funeral and learned that she had not seen or heard from her daughter-in-law Jackie since the day of the funeral.

So it's doubtful whether Mrs. Shriver can get much effective help from her mother in breaking down the Kennedy clan's taboo on her husband as a candidate for Vice President.

Meanwhile, however, Eunice has been wearing a Humphrey button in Paris and has made it unequivocally clear who she is for.

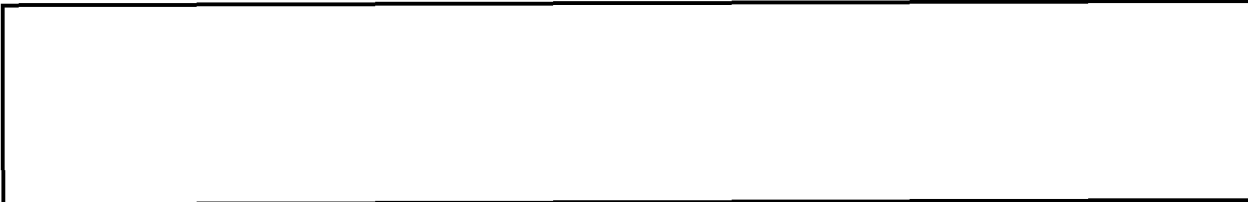

Since that time, public records indicate he was the Democratic Party's Vice Presidential nominee in 1972. (161-5486)

By communication dated October 28, 1975, the United States Secret Service (USSS) advised that protection for Presidential candidates would include and be afforded R. Sargent Shriver, residing at Rockville, Maryland, effective October 20, 1975. On March 23, 1976, the USSS advised that protection of Presidential candidate R. Sargent Shriver was discontinued. 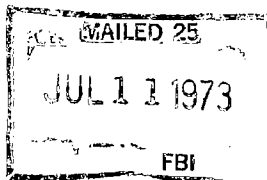

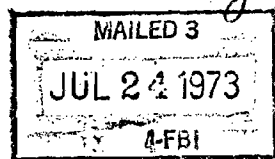

On July 12, 1973 the Washington Field Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) was requested to conduct an investigation to determine if the above cited burglary occurred and if so, obtain all available circumstances surrounding the burglary.

On July 16, 1973, a representative of the FBI contacted Principal Assistant United States Attorney, [redacted] regarding a completed investigative report he maintained during the investigation of the Watergate case in 1972. This file was prepared by the Burglary Unit of the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD) and during the Watergate investigation, the MPD did in fact look into the captioned matter and filed a completed report. • Your pocket is filled with quarters. Two at a time, you feed them into a vending machine electronically hooked up to The Game's computer at headquarters in Newton. The vending machine prints the tickets as you pay for them and then pops them out to you. You examine the tickets, light up a cigar, and wait — nervously, of course.

At a few minutes after 4 word of the results of the drawing comes through

off-track horse race betting network, not to mention a system for betting on the results of professional sporting events! Don't think the lottery people aren't looking into these matters, too, because they are. But this is for the long-term future. The daily drawings, according to good authority, could become a reality by late next winter or early next spring.

Lottery officials have made no survey to determine how many tickets the daily lottery could be expected to sell and how

from the present rate of \$1.35 million to about \$950,000. The net gain in weekly revenue should thus be between \$600,000 and \$1.1 million. That amounts to between \$31.2 million and \$57.2 million a year.

Meanwhile, the lottery has already:

—Raised about \$17 million for distribution to the Commonwealth's 351 cities and towns at the end of this year, with \$2.9 million of this amount earmarked for the City of Boston.

—Distributed prize money of nearly \$18 million to some 100,000 win-
