Recently, Judge James P. McGranery called me by phone and stated that Mr. John D. M. Hamilton of Philadelphia had been in touch with him, Judge McGranery, concerning the case of Harry Gold, who had been convicted and sentenced by Judge McGranery when he was on the Federal District Court bench in Philadelphia.

Judge McGranery stated that at the time of sentencing, he felt he had to impose the sentence which he did, but now it appeared that Gold will shortly complete one-third of his term and he was inclined to recommend that consideration be given to a parole. He wanted to know my views concerning the same.

I told Judge McGranery that insofar as I was concerned, I would have no objection to such action.

Judge McGranery indicated he would so communicate with Hamilton and maybe the Department.

By letter dated 11/9/60, AUGUSTUS S. BALLARD of the law firm of Pepper, Hamilton and Scheetz, Fidelity-Philadelphia Trust Building, Philadelphia 9, Pa., furnished the Philadelphia Office with a letter addressed to "Mr. HARRY GOLD, 6823 Kindred Street, Philadelphia, USA" with a return address of JACQUES PIGNOL, 92 Rue E. Rubens, Limoges, France. The letter consisted of various figures and what appeared to be a calculus computation. The letter and envelope are being forwarded to the Laboratory for a cryptographic analysis.

According to Mr. BALLARD in his letter, he advised his firm represents HARRY GOLD, presently confined in the Federal Penitentiary at Lewisburg, registration #19312-NE. He explained that the enclosed envelope and piece of paper were delivered to the address shown on the envelope, 6823 Kindred Street, pointing out that this is the address of HARRY GOLD's brother, JOSEPH GOLD, and of his father. JOSEPH GOLD called BALLARD concerning the matter, and at BALLARD's suggestion, sent in the envelope and its contents for transmittal to the Bureau.

BALLARD expressed the opinion that the letter was the work of a crank but thought it should be brought to the Bureau's attention in the belief that this would be in accordance with the wishes of HARRY GOLD, who has not seen the documents.

Receipt of the material from BALLARD was acknowledged by the Philadelphia Office.

**Q1 Envelope addressed to Mr. HARRY GOLD, 6823 Kindred Street, Philadelphia, U. S. A. with enclosed slip of paper containing miscellaneous numbers, letters and symbols.**

**Result of examination:**

The top portion of the slip of paper contains combinations of letters and numbers, possibly representing an encoded message or possibly being the writing of a crank with no meaning in itself. There is insufficient text to determine positively the significance, if any, of this text.

In the lower left corner of the sheet there appears what is intended to simulate a mathematical operation involving radicals, definite integrals and approximations; however, the entire phrase is not legitimate mathematically. It appears to be the work of a crank.

On the bottom of the sheet toward the right side are mathematical symbols, legitimate in themselves, but with no apparent significance.



Harry Gold met with Benjamin Smilg, subject of a Cincinnati investigation from 1938 to 1941. Gold had stated that Smilg did not cooperate with him. In 1941 Gold's Soviet superior told him to let the Smilg matter drop and that a mistake had been made in handling Smilg. Gold stated he believed the Russians were going to substitute someone of tougher caliber to handle Smilg. (No info.)

The Philadelphia office was requested to exhibit a photograph of Leonard Abramov (65-60703) to Gold.

During interviews with Harry Gold on 8/2-3/50, he advised he first heard the name Shura Swan when Abraham Brothman mentioned him in March, 1942. Brothman mentioned that Swan, who worked for the Soviet Union, had been laid off. Gold got the idea that Swan worked for Amtorg and was the man who indirectly engaged Brothman in espionage.

The cause of Anatoli Yakovlev's leaving the US in late December, 1946, might have been due to the fact that, Harry Gold, told Yakovlev that Klaus Fuchs was arrested in Great Britain and the story of the arrest appeared in the "NY Herald Tribune" in the last week of July, 1946. According to Gold, Yakovlev appeared horrified to hear this. Also, Yakovlev asked Gold what type of job he had in NY, and Gold told him he was working for Abraham Brothman which Yakovlev did not like hearing. Yakovlev parted with Gold and made no further arrangements for subsequent meetings with him. (No info.)
