On 5/15/67, [REDACTED] Judge KAUFMAN furnished [REDACTED] with two letters received by Judge KAUFMAN. Both letters were postmarked 5/13/67 at Culver City, California and bore return address of [REDACTED]. One letter was addressed to victim at his residence and the other was addressed to victim at his office. Each letter contained two identical xerox copies of an article from the Los Angeles Times of 5/13/67, above which was typed message to victim. Printed under typewritten message to victim are Hebrew characters, believed to represent a proverb from Talmud, "if I don't take care of myself who will", in addition to the beginning of a prayer for the dead in Yiddish, "Oh God of Mercy". Copies of above letter were also noted to have been sent to the White House.

In view of Judge KAUFMAN's close relationship with the NYO and in view of the fact that Judge KAUFMAN will be in Los Angeles on and off during the period 7/6 - 8/23/67, Los Angeles requested to review indices and interview [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] to determine if he constitutes any threat to the well being of Judge KAUFMAN.

Los Angeles will also alert Secret Service and appropriate law enforcement agency covering Culver City as to letter received by victim.

article referred to President Johnson's alleged visit to a Catholic
institution for divine guidance relative to the Vietnam situation.
The message to Judge KAUFMAN was typed above the newspaper article

Printed under the typewritten message to Judge KAUFMAN were Hebrew characters representing a proverb from Talmud, "if I don't take care of myself who will". In addition to the above proverb there was a beginning of a prayer for the dead in Yiddish, "Oh God of mercy".

On May 17, 1967, Mrs. HELEN KAUFMAN, wife of Judge KAUFMAN, advised the New York Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that at 9:00 a.m., New York time, on that date, she had just received a telephone call from [REDACTED]. Mrs. KAUFMAN stated that [REDACTED] asked her if Judge KAUFMAN had received his letter and questioned her as to Judge KAUFMAN's whereabouts. [REDACTED] indicated to Mrs. KAUFMAN that he was expecting some response from Judge KAUFMAN and requested that Judge KAUFMAN call him at telephone number [REDACTED] in Culver City, California. b7c

On May 17, 1967, [REDACTED] was interviewed by Special Agents of the Los Angeles Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation at [REDACTED] residence. [REDACTED] advised that he is a [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] readily admitted corresponding with Judge KAUFMAN and sending the photocopies of the newspaper clipping to the residence and office of Judge KAUFMAN in New York.

[REDACTED] explained that he desired to establish communications with Judge KAUFMAN and was attempting to provoke a response. [REDACTED] stated that the comments typewritten above the newspaper article were a "grizzly joke with a moral" to stimulate a reply and to direct that "extreme thought be given to all serious judgments which concern the taking of a human life". He explained that the news item somewhat paralleled an article concerning Judge

KAUFMAN's visit to a synagogue during the ROSENBERG trial. [REDACTED] explained that the Hebrew proverb and prayer were to further point this up. He stated that this and other comments were used to get attention and to stimulate the Judge's concern in matters involving the taking of a human life.

[REDACTED] advised that he did not intend the letter nor telephone call to be a threat nor did he desire to create any anxiety to Judge KAUFMAN or his wife and apologized if such were the case. He stated the call was solely to determine if the Judge had received the message and understood its purpose. b7C

[REDACTED] expressly stated that he did not intend to direct any further correspondence to Judge KAUFMAN and the purpose of this letter was fulfilled, in that the Judge had obviously given it serious consideration.

On May 19, 1967, the facts of this case were discussed with Assistant United States Attorney STEPHEN E. KAUFMAN, Southern District of New York, who declined prosecution. It was Assistant United States Attorney KAUFMAN's opinion that since neither the letters received by Judge KAUFMAN nor the telephone call received by his wife, contained a direct threat of bodily harm, there was no violation of the Extortion Statute.
