

Investigation to locate NORA DUGAN, who was employed as a bookkeeper by the HALBROOK MANUFACTURING COMPANY, Jersey City, New Jersey, during the period in which THOMAS L. BLACK and HARRY GOLD worked for that company as Chemists, resulted in locating NORA DUGAN at 40 Jones Street, Jersey City, New Jersey. For the past fifteen years NORA DUGAN has been known as NORA CONNELL, having been re-married.

Mrs. CONNELL was interviewed by the writer on June 7, 1950 and she advised that she was employed by the HALBROOK MANUFACTURING COMPANY for thirteen years. The HALBROOK MANUFACTURING COMPANY is located at 18th Avenue and Coles Avenue, Jersey City, New Jersey. Mrs. CONNELL stated she was employed here from approximately 1927 through 1940. She stated she was an office employee working in the capacity of a bookkeeper. She advised that there were only about 26 persons employed at this company and the office force consisted of herself, JAMES MCINTOSH who was Office and Factory Hanager, and DAN McHALE who was Shipping Clerk.

Mrs. CONNELL stated that sometime in the 1930's McHALE was succeeded by FREDERICK STETSON. Mrs. CONNELL stated that she does not recall any of the Chemists employed by this company with the exception of HARRY HUBER who committed suicide many years ago.

Mrs. CONNELL stated that the HALHROOK COMPANY is an old concern, originally being founded by Mr. SMITH who handed it down to his two sons, FRANKLIN and STANFON SMITH. Mrs. CONNELL stated that for many years FRANKLIN SMITH acted as head chemist for the company and did most of the research work. She stated that she had no association with the chemists at all, other than HURER and SMITH.

Mrs. CONNELL stated that she does not recall THOMAC L. BLACK as an employee, nor does she recall HARRY GOLD as an employee in the HUBER COMPANY. Photographs of BLACK and GOLD were displayed to Mrs. CONNELL and she advised that she did not recognize either BLACK or GOLD.

Mrs. CONNELL said that McHALE, who hangs out around West Side Avenue, near Clearmont Street in Jersey City, New Jersey, would probably know BLACK and GOLD as he was very friendly and worked closely with the men in the plant. She also stated that ANDREW CALOWELL who worked as a loader during the 1930's, may possibly recall BLACK or GOLD. She stated that ANDREW CALOWELL lived somewhere near the plant in the Hudson City section of Jersey City, New Jersey. Mrs. CONNELL stated that in the event either the name of BLACK or GOLD came to her she would contact the writer at the Newark Office.



In an effort to locate BERNARD EDELSTEIN, whose last known address was 227 E. Blancke St., Linden, N.J., the following people were telephonically contacted:



Special Agents CLARK D. TOMPKINS, RICHARD E. BRITSON, G. RANDALL MC GOUGH and the writer started a surveillance on the subject at 6:00 AM on June 18, 1950 at the ALEXANDRIA HAMILTON HOTEL, Church Street, Paterson, New Jersey.

At 10:15 AM the subject entered the lobby of the hotel from the elevator, in the company of two men identified from the hotel register as EMORY RICHARDS, GLENDAIE, Rhode Island, and PERCY H. HELIE, Worcester, Massachusetts. All three proceeded directly into the hotel restaurant.

At 10:45 AM the three men left the lunchroom together. They stopped at the desk and BLACK asked the clerk on duty if a Notary Public were available. The Clerk told him no. BLACK then told the other two men that a druggist friend of his was a Notary Public and would come over.


At 10:55 AM BLACK, RICHARDS and HELLE checked out of the hotel and proceeded to the hotel parking lot where they entered a gray 1950 Club coupd Chrysler, bearing 1950 Mass. license plates #715-248. This car proceeded to 177 East Railway Avenue, Paterson, New Jersey where the three men left the automobile and entered the plant. JACOB FASS was observed at this time when he opened the door of the plant for BLACK and his companions.

There was no activity observed in the vicinity of 177 East Railway Avenue until 1:45 PM when RICHARDS and HELIE were observed leaving in the gray Chrysler. BLACK and FASS accompanied them from the plant to the automobile and it appeared the parties were very friendly.

At 3:35 PM FASS and BLACK left the plant and proceeded to Getty Avenue and Thomas Street, Paterson, by foot where BLACK mailed a letter. At this point BLACK was overheard by the writer to say to FASS "Don't lecture me."

FASS and BLACK proceeded to the Madison Plaza Grill at Getty Avenue and Gerry Street, Paterson, where they entered the grill.



At 4:10 PM BLACK and FASS emerged from the grill and proceeded to walk across the viaduct to Beckwith Avenue and then down Beckwith Avenue to a small park which they entered and sat down.

BLACK and FASS remained in this park talking until 4 55 PM at which time they walked back to the plant located at 177 East Railway Avenue, Paterson, arriving at 5:10 PM.

The rest of the surveillance is covered in the memorandum of Agent DELTON GOERKE.

ERNEST SEGESSEMANN was interviewed at the laboratory of Fine Organics, Inc, 205 Main St, Lodi, NJ, by SA TECMAS M. O'CONNOR and the writer.

SECRESEMANN advised that his memory is very poor and all dates furnished would be approximate. Es furnished the following information.

He met THOMAS BLACK through CLIFFORD HEVENER, a fellow worker with SECESSEMANN at Nat'l Oil Products Co, Harrison, NJ. BLACK and HEVENER had attended Pennsylvania State College together and SECESSEMANN believed BLACK had been expelled from that institution for atheistic activity. The meeting with BLACK occurred in 1929 SECESSEMANN believed but was certain that it was during the time BLACK was employed at the Holbrook Manufacturing Co. Jersey City.


Subsequently, BLACK, SEGESSEMANN and HEVENER roomed together at Sip St (number unknown), Jersey City, for approximately 7 months.

In 193), SEGESSEMANN and BLACK left HEVENER and took an apartment together at 55 Oxford St. Newark.

In about either 1932 or 1933, BLACK obtained a position in the laboratory of Nat'l Oil Products Co. and this was largely through the efforts of SECESSEMANN.

BLACK remained at Nat'l Oil Products Co. until 1984 when he went into business on his own in Newark as a chemical consultant. This employment was followed by employment with the Charles Berg Leboratories in Philadelphia. On leaving Holbrook BLACK helped HARRY GOLD to botain the position which he had just left in that company.

About this time GOLD made frequent visits to the Oxford St. apartment ostensibly to gain knowledge and know how concerning his new job from BLACK.

SEGESSEMANN had no knowledge where or when BLACK and GOLD first met but is sure the meeting occurred prior to the time he himself met BLACK. He believes their acquaintance may have begun at the Pennsylvania Sugar Refinery in Philadelphia where GOLD had been employed prior to his coming to Holbrook.

GOLD's visits to BLACK's epartment continued until 1937 when SEGESSFMANN was sent by Nat'l Oil Products to Cedertown, Ga.

SECESSEMANN remained in Cedartown, Ca, for one year end upon returning to Newark, NJ, in 1938, occupied a separate apartment in the same apartment building on Oxford St but in a different unit from the one BLACK occupied.

SFGESSEMANN moved to Wood Ridge, NJ, in 1941, and left his employment with Nat*1 Oil Products Co. in 1942, when he went to Fine Organics, Inc., Lodi, NJ.

SECESSEMANN volunteered the information that BLACK had told him he had been a member of the CP in Jersey City during the early 1930s. He placed the period as sometime around 1933 or 1934. BLACK was not an aggressive member but attended meetings regularly and SECESSEMANN knew that BLACK on one occasion delivered the DAILY WORKER. BLACK had an acquaintance with Farty members and people in union circles in and around Jersey City and Newark, NJ, but the identity of these people are unknown to SECESSEMANN.

The first break with the Party SECESSEMANN believes came when the Party wanted BLACK to form a CP cell at Nat*1 Oil Products Co. This BLACK refused to do. The final break with the Party came at the time of the Russo-German Pact prior to World War II. It was SECESSEMAN's impression that BLACK became disgusted with the Party at the signing of this pact. During the period of his membership SECESSEMANN gained the impression that BLACK favored the Russian form of government.

After leaving the Party, BLACK became a Socialist of the NORMAN THOMAS school. On one occasion BLACK remarked to SEGESSEMANN that he was a Socialist and not a Marxist.

Prior to joining the Party, BLACK attended meetings of the American Association for the Advancement of Atheiem in New York City. BLACK has been a professed atheist since SEGFSSEMANN has known him.

SECESSEMANN has no knowledge of any activity of BLACK with the SWP and specifically stated that he was certain that BLACK had never made a trip to Chicago for the purpose of attending a convention or otherwise.

SECESSEMANN pointed out that during the visits of HARRY GOLD to the PLACK apartment he overheard GOLD and BLACK engage in political discussions and he was definite that BLACK attempted to convince GOLD of the merits of Communism and COLD appeared to be anti Communist/

much opposed to BLACK's Communist ideas but BLACK never tried to change his mind.

HEVENER left Nat'l Oil Products Co in 1936 to work for the Atlas Refinery in Newark. SEGESSEMAIN described HEVINER as being a negative or backward type of person.

As to bimself, SEGESSEMANN said that in the beginning BLACK sound~ ed him out as to his political views and ideology and on finding him opposed to BLACK's, made no further effort to discuss it.

As to other acquaintances of BLACK, SECESSEMANN advised that FERDINANT (FERN) HELLER had visited the apartment in Newerk approximately 3 or 4 times a year. HELLER had also been a student at Penneylvenia State College and SECESSEMANN believed their first meeting took place there. HELLER was then employed by the Pennsylvania Sugar Co. in Philadelphia, and SEGESSEMANN believed HELLER was also acquainted with HARRY GOLD from that employment. HELLER was believed by SEGESSEMANN to be now working as a chemist with American Chemical Faint Co. in Philadelphia.

Another acquaintance of BLACK was mentioned as JACK FASS who had slso been an employee at Nat'l Oil Products Co. On leaving that organization, he had started a small business in Philadelphia for the manufacture of a cleaning compound. SECESSEMANN believed he had moved to Faterson, NJ, and was known as the Spruce Chemical Co. He also understood that BLACK was considering taking employment with FASS in the Spruce Co.

SECESSEMANN stated that he was acquainted with JACK FASS having teen employed at Nat'l Oil Products Co. with him but stated he recalled no visits of that individual to the Oxford St. spartment.

Also regarding FASS, SEGESSEMANN advised that he was under the impression that FASS had sublet BIAKK's apartment when the latter left to take bleleto. employment in Philadelphia. He understood that the sublet was for the purpose of FASS' family residing there.

The only other individual that SEGFSSEMANN could think of who also associated with BLACK other than the regular employees of Nat'l 011 Products Co was one CHARLES FRIEFIELD who SEGESSEMANN advised moved in to BLACK's apartment during the period of BLACK's hospitalization.

SECESSEMANN also advised that during his acquaintance with college and he had a step mother whom he very much disliked. He recalled at that BLACK had changed his name from TAGGO to MICHAELE. his having received a great deal of kidding about that name.

SECESSEMANN described BLACK as a man of many interests who would suddenly take an interest in some particular subject such as wild life or photography and then would spend a great deal of time and money on it for a short period and then forget it. He said he did not believe BIACK would commit espionage inasmuch as he considered him to be a mental coward and for that reason would not dare to commit such an act. He added that money was apparently of not interest to BLACK, that he was a good natured, likable sort of feliow but one who kept his own counsel. He added that it was quite possible for BIACK to have carried on such activity while living with him since he was that type of person. As an example of BLACK's good naturedness, he explained that BLACK had made considerable effort to place HARRY GOLD's brother JOE in some type of laboring position at Nat'l Oil Products Co. .

SECESSEMANN advised that BLACK's chief interest was in his work in the chemistry and bacteriology field and he tock a great interest in photograph; having considerable knowledge and experience in the field. He had studied all phases of photography including color photography and micro photography, the latter being a subject which BLACK used to considerable extent in the laboratory at Natil Oil Products Co. BLACK had no dark room in his apartment during the period of SEGESSEMANN's residence there but did his photographic work in the laboratory at his place of employment.

SEGESSEMANN added that BLACK was painstaking and efficient but not in the least ambitious. He said BLACK was not a drinker or sexuelly abnormal in any way.

SEGESSEMANN advised that he never received the impression that BLACK was engaged in any form of suspicious or illegal activity, and he was never evere that BIACK kept any papers or material of an unauthorized nature in the apartment.

He further advised he had no knowledge of HARRY GOLD seking for or receiving any information from BLACK except in regard to the job which GOLD took over from BLACK at the Holbrook Manufacturing Co.

SEGESSEMAIN had no knowledge of BLACK having any acquaintance or association with any one of Russian origin.

With regard to WIACK's connection with Fine Organics, Inc., SEGRSSEMANN advised that although BLACK was not on the regular payroll of the company he had for a number of years served as a consultant and did receive compensation for same.

SECESSEMANN also advised he had no knowledge whatsoever of ALFRED DEAN SLACK and that he retained nothing of BLACK's personal property.

Based on the information furnished by the Philadelphia Office regarding the interview with BLACK, SEGESSEMANN was questioned specifically concerning the following points:

Any knowledge he might have had of Black and/or FERDINART P. HELLER ever having any desire to go to Russia;

whether or not BLACK ever acted as a consultant for Amtorg Trading Corp;

any knowledge SEGESSEMANN might have of PAUL PETERSON, GEORGE JOHN or JACK:

whether or not BLACK was visited by HARRY COLD while at the hospital in 1938:

eny knowledge SEGESSEMANN might have concerning DR. ROBERT SWARTZ or SCHWARTZ:

any intention or mention by BLACK of going to Mexico City; whether or not BLACK had ever intended or mentioned the intention of getting a job with Kelex, a subsidiary of Kellog Engineering Co;

any photographs or documents that BLACK might have concerning Trotsky; and whether or not BLACK had ever traveled to Chicago.

About none of the above points was SEGESSEMANN able to furnish information except in the negative.

SEGESSEMANN advised that neither BLACK nor HELLER had ever mentioned going to Russia nor had BALCK ever mentioned any desire to go to Mexico City or to be employed by Kelex.

Specifically SEGESSMANN advised that he was positive BLACK had not traveled to Chicago at any time and particularly not for the SWP convention. SEGESSMANN was questioned several times on this point and he advised that it would have been virtually impossible for BLACK to make such a trip without SEGESSMANN's knowledge.

During the course of the afternoon investigation, SEGESSEMANN volunteered the search of any photographs and papers he might have in order to make doubly certain that he has no material pertaining to BLACK. In line with this, a waiver of search was secured from SEGESSEMANN and with his cooperation the agents searched the SECESSEMANN home at 165 12th St, Wood-Ridge, NJ. During the course of this search no material of any kind pertaining to BLACK or other known principals was noticed. In this connection it was noticed there was very little correspondence in the SECESSEMANN home although he was in possession of hundreds of photographs most of which were of the post card variety and others taken upon his several trips to Europe.

Mr. MAURICE BACON COOKE, 969 May Fairway, Plainfield, New Jersey, advised, on June 18, 1950, that as a representative of the American Locomotive Company, he had frequent association with Giak Ovakimian, who was associated with Amtorg in New York City. He advised he was also acquainted to some extent with Podbielniak, Inc. of Tulsa, Oklahoma and Chicago, Illinois. He said that he had never heard of Thomas L. Black through Ovakimian or any other source.

Mr. COOKE advised that as a representative of American Locomotive Company he had the duty of showing many Russian commissions through different industrial plants in the United States during the period of time from 1935 to 1940, and that he has visited Russia on occasions to secure contracts for the American Locomotive Company.


He advised that he has furnished information to the FBI in New York on a number of occasions, and that he has also furnished information to the Department of Justice in Washington, D. C. concerning his travels in Russia.

JAMES T. CASSELL, Manager of the Douglas Hotel, 15 Hill St., Newark, advised that his records reflect the subject checked into the hotel at 1:17 a.m. on 6/17/50 and checked out at 7:35 q.m. the same date. CASSELL advised that there were no phone calls made from the subject apparently had no baggage because the room was paid for in advance.

IIN 4000 CRE45, the only bellhop in attendance on Saturday night, advised that he had noticed no visitors to the subject's room during his stay at the hotel.

Mrs. JANE FRASER, 17 Oxford St., Newark, NJ, Unit 4, Apartment E-3, advised that she lived in this apartment building in various apartments for 14 years, and recalled the subject as a rather mysterious individual who was seldom seen on or about the premises of the apartment building. Mrs. FRASER stated that from her recollection she knew the subject was a chemist and that he kept strange pets in the apartment such as white rats, snakes and at one time a black crow. Mrs. FRASER stated that she thought the subject's actions were mysterious because he bothered to keep an apartment and was so seldom in it.

LTE RYAN, 55 Oxford St., Unit #1, Apartment E-5, advised that he recalled the subject had resided in this apartment building for many years, but that the subject was a quiet individual who seemed to require no companionship and for the most part kept to himself. MARION KOERBIS, 17 Oxford St., Unit 6, Apartment C-2, advised that she had been acquainted with the subject for the past ten years, but she had never been very closely associated with him and stated that in her opinion the subject had no close friends and few if any visitors to his apartment. Miss KOERBIS stated that she had heard from the janitor that the subject kept expensive cameras and valuable books in his apartment and therefore was extremely careful about the people whom he allowed in the apartment.

Mrs. Elizabeth Koerbis, 17 Oxford St. Unit 6, Apartment C-2, advised that she also had been slightly acquainted with the subject but that he was the type of person who did not cultivate friendliness. Mrs. Koerbis stated that from the gossip and rumors around the apartment building the subject had been described as a quiet fellow who preferred his own company and did not desire to become friendly with any of the other tenants. Mrs. Koerbis recalled that the subject had been weriously burned several years ago and the accident had supposedly occurred while he was employed by the National Oil Products Co., Harrison, NJ.

BENJAMIN LEVITT, propriator of Levitt's Drug Store, Flemming and Lexington Sts., Newark, advised that he recalled the subject had lived in the nearby spartment building for many years, but that the subject was a quiet individual who had frequented the drug store on numerous occasions but never gave any reason to question his loyalty to the US. LEVITT stated that he knew of no personal acquaintances of the subject other than one ERVEST SECRESSEMANN who had shared an apartment with the subject many years ago. LEVITT stated that both of the men were suiet and well behaved.

WILLIAM KNOWLES, Detective, Newark, NJ PD, advised that he had lived in the same apartment building with the subject for a number of years, but at no time was given any reason to question his loyalty to the US. KNOWLES stated that he knew the subject had been employed at National Oil Products Company and that he was a chemist and upon leaving the apartment at Oxford St. he had gone to Philadelphia.

MARGARET CUILEN, Clerk at Chellis-Austin Apartments, renting office, Newark, NJ, where the subject resided from 1932 to 1937, advised that she had been acquainted with the subject but knew only that he resided in the apartment and was considered a rather eccentric individual because of his strange pets. Mrs. CUIJEN stated that she has no reason to question the subject's loyalty to the US.

BETTY KENNEDY, 55 Oxford St., Unit 1, Apartment E-2, advised that she had been employed in the renting office of the apartment building for 15 years and recalled the subject had resided in this apartment building for many years. Mrs. KENNEDY stated that she had been acquainted with the subject but that he was a quiet reserved individual who did not seem to care for friendship with other tenants.

EDWARD DRYDEN, Maintenance Engineer at the Chellis-Austin Apartments, advised that he had been employed as an engineer for about ten years there and that he had met the subject on several occasions. DRYDEN stated that from his limited contact with the subject, he was of the opinion that the subject was a happy-go-lucky fellow who did not bother anybody and left the impression with his associates that he would rather be left alone.

IRVING SIEGEL, Propriator of the Prudential Delicatessen, 52 Flemming St., Nevark, advised that he has been the propriator of the store for about ten years and the subject had patronized his store many times during this period. SIEGEL stated that the subject was considered eccentric because of the strange pets he kept in his apartment, white rats, black crow, etc. SIEGEL stated that he was not intimately associated with the subject because the subject on most occasions kept to himself and did not recommend friendly approaches.

The following investigation was conducted by the writer on 6/19/50:

Mrs. HENRY JAMMER, 1 Arlington Road, Cranford, New Jersey, advised that PAUL WIILIAMS from whom she has rented the house at this address since last fall, is an elderly man; a retired professor who is at the present time residing at 230 South 80th Street, Birmingham, Alabama. Wrs. JAMMER stated that she heard that WILLIAMS may accept a position at Howard College, Birmingham, Alabama.


Records of the Cranford Police Department contained no information concerning PAUL WILLIAMS other than that he was once involved in a family quarrel on which no action was taken.

CHESTER and GORDON JURADINE, Brothers, both of whom formerly worked for the American Cyanamid Company, Linden, New Jersey, are now employed by the Harshaw Chemical Company, Cleveland, Ohio, according to Wr. S. HANNA, Assistant Plant Manager, American Cyanamid Company.

GILFORD CHRISTENSEN, Owner Christensen Department Store, 97 Main Street, Woodbridge, New Jersey, advised that he had been a fellow employee of the subject at American Cyanamid Company in approximately 1929 or 1930. He recalled that the outstanding factor concerning BLACK was that the latter had been an ardent atheist and had been president of the American Association for Advancement of Atheists at some college in Pennsylvania, possibly Lehigh. CHRISTENSEN advised that BLACK had been a reliable worker who left the company of his own accord and stated he had never heard of BLACK doing or saying anything that could be considered un-American. He stated that he knew nothing of the subject's activities or associates outside of the plant and named the following additional employees of the Cyanamid Company who might recall BLACK:

WILLIAM BOTHWELL, Department Supervisor, American Cyanamid Company, Linden, New Jersey, stated that he knew BLACK as a fellow employee approximately twenty years ago. He advised that to his knowledge BLACK had never said or done anything that BOTHWELL would consider to be against the best interests of this country. He recalled that there had been a rumor to the effect that BLACK read the Daily Worker for awhile during the time the subject was employed at the plant but that BLACK stopped reading it after some religious discussion with fellow workers, during which BLACK generally spoke in favor of atheism. BOTHWELL pointed out that this was "second hand" information and that he did not know from whom he had heard this since it was such a long time ago. He stated that he knew of no activities or associates of BLACK's outside of his employment with this company.

JAMES V. PRIFF, Chemist, American Cyanamid Company, Linden, New Jersey, advised that he recalled BLACK as a fellow worker, but since he did not work closely with him knew nothing about his political views, character or associates.

Mr. MONTAGUE HUTCHINSON, Chemist, American Cyanamid Company, Linden, New Jersey, advised that he recalled BLACK only as a fellow worker and knew of no associates or activities outside of the subject's employment at the plant. He stated that he could not recall ever having any political discussions with BLACK and remembered only that BLACK seemed to be fairly quiet and that he got along well with his fellow employees.

The following investigation was conducted by SA EUGENE C. JONES and the writer on June 20, 1950.

WILLIAM ZAWYRUCHA, also known as WASYL ZAWYRUCHA and WILLIAM ZAWYRUCKA, 150 Ellery Avenue, Newark, N. J., was interviewed regarding his knowledge of THOMAS PLACK. ZAWYRUCHA said that he has worked at the National Oil Products Company, Harrison, N. J., for a number of years but was unable to recall when he began employment there. He stated he first met THOMAS BLACK when the latter came to work at NOPCO in the early 1940's. ZAWYRUCHA said that since that time he has had little contact with BLACK and he knows nothing of his activities or associates. ZAWYRUCHA stated that he knew BLACK merely as another employee at NOPCO.

He continued that BIACK had visited his house on several occasions for dinner and that he visited BIACK's apartment on one occasion, at which time BIACK was residing in the Prudential Apartment, Downneck Section, Newark, N. J. 2AWYRUCHA said he had no knowledge concerning the activities or associates of subject. He also stated he had no reason whatsoever to question subject's loyalty or activities.

ZAWYRUCHA was questioned with regard to several cartons of personal belongings of the subject which had been addressed to THOMAS HLACK at the Van Poznack Warehouse, 92 Howard Street, Newark, N. J., on December 6, 1944 from 158 (or 150) Ellery Avenue, Newark, N. J. ZAWYRUCHA stated with regard to this question that in the latter part of 1944 his brother-in-law, FRANK DZIEDZIC, who was a friend of THOMAS BLACK's, had requested him to temporarily store some personal possessions of THOMAS BLACK in his garage at 150 Ellery Avenue, Newark, N. J. ZAWYRUCHA stated that he agreed to this on the condition that this material would remain there only temporarily and that BLACK would remove it as soon as possible. He could not recall how long the material remained in his garage but stated that he urged DZIEDZIC on several occasions to request BLACK to have it removed. Subsequently, this material was picked up from his garage.

ZAWYRUCHA stated he did not know the contents of this material nor could be describe how much there was. He further stated he had no knowledge of the manner in which it was taken from his garage and was unable to say where it was taken. ZAWYRUCHA disclaimed any other knowledge of instant.

material. He stated he did not know the relationship between subject and DZIEDZIC other than the fact that they were fellow employees at NOPCO in Harrison.

ZAWYRUCHA further stated he does not know HARRY GOLD or ABRAHAM BROTHMAN.

ZAWYRUCHA said he could furnish no more information concerning THOMAS BLACK other than already set out.

ZAWIRUCHA produced Certificate of Citizenship No. 3274677 dated June 18, 1931, which was issued per Petition No. 21491 in the United States District Court, Middle District, Pennsylvania. Instant document reflected ZAWIRUCHA was born WASYL ZAWIRUCHA and that his name was officially changed by court order June 18, 1931. ZAWIRUCHA stated he was born February 15, 1897 at Striucka (phonetic), Austria. He emigrated to the United States in 1911, arriving at the Port of New York. He has worked as a janitor and coal miner in Newark, N. J., Detroit, Michigan, Cleveland, Ohio, and Taylor, Pennsylvania. His citizenship certificate indicates that he is of the Ukrainian race, Folish nationality, and that he resided 133 Jefferson Street, Taylor, Pennsylvania, in 1931.

The following description of ZAWYRUCHA was obtained by observation and questioning:

FRANK DZIEDZIC, 176 High Street, Nutley, N. J., who is employed at the Hoffmann-LaRoche Company, Nutley, N. J., was also interviewed on June 20, 1950. It will be noted that DZIEDZIC was previously interviewed on June 18, 1950, at the home of his niece, Mrs. EDWARD NIEMASECK, who resides at 150 Ellery Avenue, Newark, N. J. DZIEDZIC stated that he first met TOM BIACK at the NOPCO Chemical Company, Harrison, N. J., where DZIEDZIC served as an assistant bacteriologist under BIACK in that company's laboratory for six to seven months. DZIEDZIC further advised that he was also employed as a janitor

at this company and that he left the company in February, 1943, to enter the service. DZIEDZIC stated that he befriended the subject. In this regard, he stated that he felt sorry for BLACK, who appeared to him to be an eccentric individual. He stated that he has maintained occasional contact with BLACK from the latter part of 1942 until approximately a year ago. He stated that while employed at NOPCO BLACK maintained an apartment at the Prudential Apartment project in Downneck Newark. DZIEDZIC said he frequently visited BLACK at his apartment and that on several occasions he invited BLACK to dinner at the home of his brother-in-law, WILLIAM ZAWYRUCHA, at 150 Ellery Avenue, Newark, N. J., at whose address DZIEDZIC was also residing at that time.

NOPCO and with whom subject was quite friendly, was a frequent visitor to BLACK's apartment in Newark. DZIEDZIC said that three or four years ago when BLACK was preparing to move to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, the subject asked him to temporarily store ten to twelve cardboard cartons of personal belongings at his home. DZIEDZIC stated he explained to BLACK that he was living at that time with his brother-in-law and that he would have to secure his consent. DZIEDZIC thereupon asked his brother-in-law, WILLIAM ZAWYRUCHA, for permission to allow BLACK to store instant material temporarily in his garage. DZIEDZIC said ZAWYRUCHA protested against this proposal but finally agreed on the condition that BLACK would remove it as soon as possible. DZIEDZIC said that PLACK then sent about ten to twelve cardboard boxes to ZAWYRUCHA's house at 150 Ellery Avenue, Newark, where it remained for approximately one month in the garage. At the end of that time it was picked up by a storage truck.

DZIEDZIC said at the time the material was picked up he was at work and he had no knowledge as to the disposition of the material. DZIEDZIC also stated he did not know the exact contents of these boxes but he assumed they contained various books, chemical equipment such as test tubes, retorts, glasses, etc. He said that he assumed this because of the fact that BLACK stored a great amount of miscellaneous material in his apartment at Newark consisting of items similar to those above. DZIEDZIC also said that his brother-in-law voiced strenuous objections on several occasions during the time that BLACK's belongings were stored in his garage and that ZAWYRUCHA frequently asked him to have BLACK remove this material.

DZIEDZIC stated that around three or four years ago BLACK requested him to transport several cardboard cartons of personal belongings of BLACK to an unrecalled address on Spruce Street in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. According to DZIEDZIC, BLACK had moved to this address while sub-letting his

Newark apartment. DZIEDZIC said that the Spruce Street address was a two to three room apartment which BLACK shared with one JACOB FASS and a cousin of JACOB FASS who was a woman. DZIEDZIC stated that at BLACK's request he transported ten to twelve cardboard cartons of material to BLACK's apartment in Philadelphia, which material included books, chemical equipment such as glassware and chemicals, periodicals, and a small table radio. DZIEDZIC stated that on his return trip from Philadelphia he brought ten to twelve more boxes containing similar articles back to BLACK's Newark apartment. DZIEDZIC stated that this was the only time he ever visited subject in Philadelphia.

DZIEDZIC said that the last time he saw ELACK was approximately a year ago when the subject stopped at his house in Nutley, N. J., to say hello. DZIEDZIC added that approximately six months ago ELACK called him at his residence in Nutley to say hello. At this time DZIEDZIC asked the subject out to dimer but the latter declined. DZIEDZIC said it was his understanding that ELACK had assumed a position with a company engaged in the manufacture of soil compound near Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and that this was his reason for moving from Newark.

DZIEDZIC stated that at no time during his acquaintanceship with EIACK did he have any reason to question his activities. He stated, however, that during the war he received the impression that ELACK admired the part which the Russian Army played in World War II and that he appeared to be a person having "leftist" views. DZIEDZIC stated that beyond that he did not question the loyalty of subject.

DZIEDZIC stated that sometime in 1942 TOM HLACK introduced him to HARRY GOLD in the laboratory at NOPCO, Harrison, N. J. He also said that he saw GOLD on one other occasion at HLACK's apartment but he was unable to recall the date. DZIEDZIC stated that this was his only contact with GOLD and that he had no knowledge regarding HARRY GOLD or his activities.

DZIEDZIC stated that he lived at 150 Ellery Avenue, Newark, until May 19, 1945, when he moved to 283 Chestnut Street, Nutley, N. J., and after living at that address for three years moved to his present address.

DZIEDZIC stressed that his association with BLACK was strictly one of friendship.

The following description of FRANK DZIEDZIC was obtained through interview and observation:

Mr. C. G. MAISE, Personnel Department, Hoffmann-La Roche, Inc., Nutley, N. J., made available the personnel file of FRANK DZIEDZIC which reflected the following information:





The following investigation was conducted by Special Agents ORIAN R. KENNEDY and the writer at West Collingswood, New Jersey, on June 19, 1950:

Mr. EUGHIE R. SMALLEY, 1204 Elm Avenue, West Collingswood, New Jersey, upon being interviewed advised that he first met THEMAS L. BLACK approximately a year ago. He advised that he, SMALLEY, was at that time employed in the Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, area as a Technical Field Representative of the Newport Industries, 270 Park Avenue, New York City, and that BLACK had contacted him relative to an idea he had developed on the production of tall oil ester. SMALLEY stated that he examined the notes of the idea and directed FLACY to his superior Mr. EDMARD CALLETON of the Newport Industries who negotiated with PLACK relative to the purchase of this idea until about two menths ago. He stated that SMALLEY and CALLETON were formerly employed together by the Dil Productions Company, Harrison, New Jersey.

SMATLEY stated that since he met BLACK he had been in contact with him on average of about two times per month and had frequently met Mr. JOSEPH MULLEN and Mr. JACK FASS, who are associated with BLACK in the operation of the Spruce Chemical Company which was formerly located in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and is presently located in Paterson, New Jersey. He advised that it was his understanding that FASS had assisted BLACK in the development of the idea on the production of tall oil ester.

SIMILEY stated that his last personal contact with PLACK had been on May 28, 1950 and that PLACK had telephonically contacted him during the past week and had told him that he had been questioned by the FBI. He advised SIMILEY at this time that the questioning had been a result of his being a friend of HACTY GOLD and had stated that GOLD had been instrumental in securing his present position as a Consulting Engineer with Charles W. Berg Company, North 5th Street, Philadelphia, Pa. He also advised that he had given GOLD's address as his address at his place of employment when he moved to his present living quarters. He stated that he had done this in order that BENG would not be atle to contact him at night or on weekends. SMALLEY explained that BLACK spent his evenings and weekends working on projects being manufactured by the Spruce Uninfacturing Company, but did not desire that his employer know that he was interested in this project.

SMALLEY advised that his contact with BLACK had been principally on a tusiness and professional basis, and that he could furnish no information relative to his background. He stated that he was of the opinion that all of PLACK's activities are motivated by his interest in chemistry, that he never heard him mention GOID until he telephonically contacted him during the past week and that he had never had any reason to believe that DLACK was interested in any information that would be of value to my representative of a foreign power, and had never had any reason to doubt his levelty to the United States.

SMALIEY stated that in December, 1949 BLACK had asked him to become a member of the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia, Pa., and had mentioned that this membership would entitle him to access to the technical laboratory of the institution. He stated that he knew BLACK spent considerable time in this library and knew that membership in the institute was composed principally of technical men. He stated that when BLACK mentioned this to him he had the idea that it was a membership drive being conducted by the institution at that time. He did not become a member.

SHATLEY was graduated from the Dunellen, New Jersey, Wigh School in 1940 and from the University of New York in 1948. He served in the U.S. Army for a period of about three months in 1943 and was honorably discharged after suffering a nervous breakdown. He was employed as a Field Fepresentative of the Newport Industries, 240 Park Avenue, New York City, from September, 1948 to June 1, 1950. He was employed as a chemist by the National Lead Company Research Laboratory, 105 York Street, Brooklyn, New York, from September, 1943 to September, 1948. He is presently unemployed, but is serving as a Consultant for the Field-White Manufacturing Company, 1405 Fox Building, Philadelphia, Pa. and can be contacted there between 9:00 and 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

He advised that Newport Industries is engaged principally in the production of resin, pine oil, turpentine and tall oil, commonly known as navel stores.

Records of the Camden County Credit Association, 817 Cooper Street, Camden, New Jersey, contains no information relative to EUGENE R. SMALLEY other than that he has purchased his home located at 1204 Flm Avenue, West Collingswood, New Jersey.

A summary of the above information was furnished to Fhiladelphia by teletipe dated June 19, 1950.

Re Philadelphia teletype of 6/17/50/, in which information is set forth to the effect that in 1945 BLACK had dealings with an individual from the Hercules Powder Co. in Wilmington, Del., whom he identified as WILLIAM STAPLER.

According to the teletype, in 1945, JACK, a Soviet contact, introduced BLACK to WILLIAM STAPLER in New York City. PLACK was instructed to meet STAPLER at the Pa. RR Station in Newark, NJ. The teletype indicated that BLACK was using the name of "Bob".

According to BLACK, STAPLER's wife knew her husbani was involvied in furnishing information to the Soviets and contact was had with STAILER through his wife. The teletype reflects that it was customer; for BLACK to call STAPLER's wife during the week and she would arrange a meeting with STAPLER and BLACK at the Pa. RK Station in Newark.


"BLACK maintained that STAPLER never furnished information to him for transmission to the Soviets; however, he did furnish information to BLACK for his personal use, samples of pure rosin and literature put out by Hercules.

BLACK identified a photograph of WILLIAM STAPLER furnished by Baltimore which was obtained from the files of the Hercules Powder Co. as being the individual whom he met with in Pa. Station in Newark. Reference teletype reflects that BLACK met with STAPLER on 3 occasions.

This teletype requested that the Newark Office contect ETHEL MAY STAPUJE for all information she may have regarding BLACK and her deceased humband's activities. The teletype also requested that an effort be rade to conduct a voluntary search of her late husband's effects.

On 6/18/50, ETHEL MAY STAPPER was interviewed in Riverdale, NJ, (Fashaic County), by the writer and SA ANDREW R. BARYAK.

Mrs. STAPLER stated she did not know any of her husband's associates and denied ever hearing of "Bob", "Jack" or a THIMAS BLACK. She also denied ever receiving any telephone calls from those individuals and arranging meetings with them for her husband.

At the time of the interview Mrs. STAPLER appeared to be evasive and was emotionally upset.

She stated that her husband lived in Wilmington, Del., with a epinster sister EDITH and came home only about twice a month on weekends during the entire period of employment from 1933 to 1934 at the Hercules Powder Co. She continued that EDITH, who is suffering from a heart ailment, is now reported to be living at the Quaker Rest Home, Pittmann Memorial, in Westchester, Pa.

It is noted that according to Mrs. STAPLER, her busbands' brother RALPH also stayed at this memorial until his death several years ago.

MAJORIES AYERS who resides on Woodlawn Ave, Wilmington, Del., with her husband STANLEY whom she claims is a prominent citizen in the community.

The interview with Mrs. STAPLER reflected that her husband WILLIAM was keeping company with other women.

During the interview Mrs. STAPLER frequently became excited and stated her objection to the "present wave of investigation of chemists and scientists since there have been no secrets since 1932 as the Government had made them available to everyone".

Mrs. STAPLER refused permission to the interviewing agents to search the personal effects of her deceased husband without first consulting her attorney.

Prior to the conclusion of the interview, Mrs. STAFLER consulted with a personal friend, FORDHAM JEWITT WALSH, who resides in a cabin owned by Mrs. STAFLER in Pequannock, NJ. Mr. WALSE was in agreement with Mrs. STAFLER and advised that he did not think she should make available the personal effects of her deceased husband without first having a consultation with her attorney.

The above information was relayed to the Philadelphia Office by teletype dated 6/18/50 (Serial 96),

On June 19, 1950, FRNEST F. KEER, Attorney, 71 Park St.,

Montclair, NJ, telephonically contacted this office and requested agents contact him relative to viewing the personal effects of the deceased husband of Mrs. STAPLER.

On the same date, KEER was contacted by the writer and SA BABYAR and he advised that he would discuss the matter of reviewing the personal effects of WILLIAM STAPLER with his client, Mrs. ETHEL MAY STAPLER.

On 6/20/50, the personal effects belonging to WILLIAM STAPLER were made available by Mrs. STAPLER in the office of ERNEST F. MEER, her attorney in Montclair, NJ.

These personal effects consisted of one briefcase filled with material, most of which pertained to the late Mr. STAPLER's employments dating from 1919 to 1933. A review of these records was non productive.

Included in this material was an interoffice communication under date of 3/30/45, from R. W. IVEIT, Naval Stores Group of the Hercules Powder Co. to WILLIAM STAPLER. This letter rends in part:

"In response to your request, the following samples have been prepared and submitted to you.

Stabelite, Nitrile, Stabeliteamine and Dehydrogenated Rosin (731) Amine.

Samples were labeled as above for use at the Experimental Station Nitrile H.R. amine H.R. and amine D.R. respectively for distribution that might eventually involve use outside of the company.

For your convenience, a summary of the analysis of the various samples is given and the distribution of the samples is shown in Table 2."

This letter may be significant in connection with BLACE's statement to the effect that on one occasion he received certain rowin samples and information concerning rosin from WILLIAM STAPLER.

Also included among the effects is a letter dated 9/28/28, from ABBOIT K. S. SPENCER, 9 Hanover St, New York City, of the Design Laboratories, Inc. The letter discussed activities of the duPont Co. and of the use of the SanDor Co., Chicago, Ill., as a distributor.

Also included therein was an undated typewritter paper with the heading Record of William W. Stapler at the dufont Co. during 52 years as follows:

"I Year at Cap Works, Pompton Lakes, NY, in analysis and control of manufacture of fulminate of mercury.

1 Year at Eastern Laboratory in research and semi-works development of dystuff intermediates.

32 Years at Jackson Laboratory in all phases of intermediate manufacture.

Also included therein was a letter addressed to W. W. STAPLER, 89 Jewitt Et, Newton, Mass, from E. R. WILSON of the Edwin Bird Wilson, Inc., 3 Hanover St, New York City.

Mrs. STAFLER clarified mail being sent to ber bushand at that address, advising that approximately fifteen years ago her hubband had been employed for a short period of time by the International Equipment Co. in Cambridge, Hass.

Also contained therein was a notation on an envelope setting forth the name of M. B. COOK, 220 E. 42nd St, Alco Products Co.

Also contained therein was a letter to BILL STAPLER from JAMES D. REPSTOCK, Ramie Mills of Florida, Inc., PO Box 122, Zellwood, Fla. The letter was dated 8/5/47, and stated that REBSTOCK had accertained that STAPLER had been sick from an individual by the name of MACK SCHAWIZ.

RESTOCK set forth information in the letter to the effect that during the two years since he had left Hercules employment he had been employed by the First Prentiss and Co. and then by the Sauffer Chemical Co. He stated in the letter that at Ramie Mills he was in charge of designing and taler spinning.

Also contained therein was a list of the University of Ponnsylvania Class of 1914 Chemists and Chemical Engineers, dated 4/22/33. The following names, addresses and employment of individuals set forth in this list were checked off in pencil:

On 6/20/50, MEAD STAPLER, sond of Mrs. STAPLER, was interviewed by the writer and SA BABYAK in Riverside, NJ, in regard to FORDHAM WALSE's association with WILLIAM STAPLER.

He advised that WAISH is a longtime remident of Riverdale and may be related to the STAPLER family ina remote way. He indicated that he has little regard for WAISH's character and stability in the community, and that WAISH frequently induges in the use of alcohol.

MEAD STAPLER stated further that on varying occasions in the past WALSE had been associated with his deceased father in small ventures relating to the distribution of chemical formulae. He added none of these ventures was successfil.

Baltimore teletype of 6/21/50, set forth information to the effect that Mrs. A. STANLEY AYERS, sister of WILLIAM STAPLER, was interviewed on that ddate and firs. AYERS advised that she has none of STAPLER's effects. She believed all of them are in the possession of STAPLER's wifew in New Jersey.

Mrs. AYERS advised the Baltimore Office she has no knowledge of any of STAPLER's contacts or associates.

The writer conducted the following inquiry concerning PAUL A. DITTMAN:

Inspection of the records of the New Jersey State Department of Wotor Vehicle, Trenton, New Jersey, revealed that PAUL A. DITTMAN, 63 Main Street, Garfield, Bergen County, New Jersey, has driver's license on file from 1947 to date and all provide the above address. These driver's licenses describe him as white, male, age 62, 5'10", 200 pounds, gray hair, blue eyes. His current driver's license bears 970736.

A check of the applications for the above drivers licenses in the files of the same Bureau reflect that those for only the past two years are available. These give the additional information that DITTMAN works as a Chemical Engineer for himself, is a United States citizen, born in "Moscow". He claimed he had no physical disabilities and his driver's license had never been suspended. The last driver's license was obtained March 3, 1949 from JOSEPH 1: MACIAG, Carfield, New Jersey.

A check of the violations on file with the same Bureau failed to reveal DITTMAN's name.

In an effort to determine if there was any information available concerning DITTMAN as a "Chemical Engineer, working for self" the writer telephoned N. J. MC GUINNESS of the State Board of Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors, 921 Bergen Avenue, Room 710, Jersey City, New Jersey. Mr. MC GUINNESS advised that everybody who professed to be an engineer and worked as such in the State of New Jersey, were required by law to take examinations and register with that state board. He searched his files and found no information concerning any PAUL A. DITTMAN.

Mr. MC GUINNESS added that if DITTMAN was practicing as a Chemical Engineer in the State of New Jersey this constitutes a misdemeanor and he can be prosecuted for such.





At about 7:20 p.m. the Subject, accompanied by two unknown individuals and JACK FASS who was identified by Special Agent PAGE, entered an automobile driven by one of the unknown individuals and they proceeded to the Hamilton Hotel on Beach Street, Paterson, arriving at about 7:40 p.m. They entered the hotel and registered. According to the hotel records checked by Special Agent LEMCZIK, BLACK and one of the unknown individuals named PERT HELLE registered together and were assigned to room 225. The second unknown individual EMORY RICHARDS from Glendale, Rhode Island, was assigned to room 232. After parking the car at approximately eight o'clock, BLACK and the individual who registered as HELLE entered the Hamilton Hotel dining room at approximately 8:10 p.m. and stayed there and at the hotel bar which adjoins the dining room until about 12:05 a.m. June 18, 1950 during which time they were observed to be in earnest conversation. At 12:05 a.m. they retired to their room and were not again observed during the period that these agents remained on duty.

These agents were relieved at approximately 6:30 a.m. on June 18, 1950 by Special Agents RICHARD E. BRITSON, CLARK D. TOMPKINS (A), G. RANDALL McGOUGH, and THOMAS F. JONES.

A check at the hotel desk reflected that BLACK had left no calls during the period the agents were on duty.

At 6:40, pm Subject and FASS left the above restaurant and proceeded to Times Square and from there proceeded to 46th St. where both entered the Victoria Theater at 6:45 pm. At that time JACK FASS was present and advised he had seen PERCY HELIE as well as BLACK over the weekend. He stated that HELIE was to set up a selling company for products of the Spruce Chemical Company, but that HELIE was "scared" due to the fact that BLACK and FASS had told him he might be questioned concerning his association with BLACK in the GOLD case. FASS advised that he and BLACK told HELIE "all about the case".

According to FASS, HELIE is still employed by BERG and desires to work for BERG while setting up a selling agency for Spruce Chemical Company. FASS stated that the deal with HELIE has not been consummated as yet because HELIE desires to have "both his cake and eat it at the same time".

In connection with the above-captioned individual, a search was conducted on the premises of the Spruce Chemical Company, 177 East Railway Avenue, Paterson, New Jersey under authority of a waiver of search executed by JACOB I. FASS and THOMAS L. BLACK by Special Agents LOUIS G. TURNER and the writer between the hours of 9:15 a.m. and 1:15 p.m. and 1:

It should be noted that a great deal of the material on the premises was the property of PAUL A. DITTMAN, 63 Main Street, Garfield, New Jersey, which included personal correspondence and chemical formulae. The bulk of the records noted pertained to the normal business operations of the Spruce Chemical Company. There were also numerous magazines, books, and pamphlets pertaining to chemistry and other technical subjects which were encased in cardboard boxes.

Among the current papers of the Spruce Chemical Company was a letter to JACK FASS from J. SHAPIRO, Care of Arland, Rondpoint de Plainpalais, Geneve, Suisse. Another address also appeared on this letter, namely Jack Shapiro, Chez Boget 14, Boulers Moluetise, Geneve, Suisse. There was also in a desk a list of names or telephone numbers as follows:

FASS advised that all of the above individuals with the exception of GILL were salesmen for BERG. There were also in the desk a number of slips indicating the following requests for patents which according to FASS had been requested by he and BLACK:

During an examination of the correspondence file of the Spruce Chemical Company, considerable correspondence between BLACK and one BERNIE PIDTO, 783 Troy Avenue, Brooklyn, New York concerning miscellaneous matters of no apparent significance was noted. FASS explained that PIDTO is a chemist friend of BLACK and HARRY GOLD.

Also noted was considerable correspondence between BLACK and PERCY H. HELIE, 53 Holden Street, Worcester 5, Massachusetts. This correspondence revealed discussions between BLACK and HELIE in connection with efforts to have HELIE join forces with BLACK and FASS in the Spruce Chemical Company. It was apparent from review of the correspondence that BLACK was making considerable effort to procure HELIE and his sales experience to be used by the Spruce Chemical Company. At the same time, HELIE expressed fear that his acceptance of the job while still employed by Berg Laboratories, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania might result in legal complications.

The above facts were pointed out by FASS who stated that it was necessary that CHARLES BERG not be aware of these pending business dealings involving HELIE and the Spruce Chemical Company.

During the progress of the search JACOB FASS stated that he was aware of the fact that BLACK had been a member of the Communist Party in the 1930's subsequently breaking with them to become a Trotskyite. He stated that BLACK subsequent broke with this organization also but that all of this activity of BLACK occurred before he, FASS, met him. FASS added that BLACK had always displayed a keen interest in animals, having at one time run a zoo as a youth.

Also during the search it was ascertained through conversation with JACOB FASS that PAUL A. DITTMAN was not associated with the Spruce Company as a partner. FASS stated that DITTMAN has been engaged in the water-conditioning business for many years in northern New Jersey in which he analyzes the sediment or corrosive content of boiler water in various industrial plants, thereafter prescribing the proper chemical formula to be added as a preventive.

FASS stated that DITTMAN lined up with chemical companies to mix and deliver the prescribed chemicals but had become dissatisfied with his previous arrangement and through an old friend ERNEST SEGESSEMANN had been placed in touch with the Spruce Chemical Company then in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. According to FASS, the Spruce Chemical Company moved to Paterson in order to handle DITTMAN'S orders more expeditiously.

FASS informed that the premises of 177 East Railway Avenue were rented from GOTTFRIED ZIEGLER and that office space was provided for DITTMAN who heretofore had operated from his home. Aside from the fact that the Spruce Company is dependent on DITTMAN'S business for its activity and the fact that DITTMAN operates now from 177 East Railway Avenue, no part of the Spruce Chemical Company as such is owned by DITTMAN, it being a venture of BLACK and FASS with the latter claiming sole ownership of the business.

FASS also volunteered the following information:

He stated that one CHARLES FRIEFIELD lived with BLACK in the latter's apartment during World War II until FRIEFIELD left for service in the army. According to FASS, FRIEFIELD was probably a member of the SWP and on occasion had arguments with BLACK involving Stalin vs. Trotsky. He stated that the amicable relationship between BLACK and FRIEFIELD suffered as a result of their varied views and following army service FRIEFIELD never returned to see BLACK. FASS stated that to his knowledge FASS was later married and moved to Florida.

FASS advised that one SARA ANN (phonetic) last name unknown, who was a nurse for CHARLES BERG of Berg Laboratories in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania,

often used BLACK'S apartment in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania when BLACK was absent on weekends. FASS was unable to provide further identifying data regarding the above individual or the extent of her relationship with BLACK.

FASS informed that BLACK'S apartment at 17 Oxford Street, Newark, New Jersey was occupied in approximately 1948 by relatives of WALTER ALKUS, a partner of Berg Laboratories. FASS said that he did not know the names of these individuals but that they sublet the apartment for about one year.

It is to be noted that the above individuals have been identified as Mr. and Mrs. MARVIN HENSCHEL.

Also during the search of the Spruce Chemical Company, FASS expressed amazement of how HARRY GOLD could keep his espionage activities from his friends for so long a time. FASS stated that he, himself, is not and never has been a Communist Party member or a Communist.

JOHN SCHMITZ, 54 Brookside Avenue, Pompton Plains, New Jersey arrived at the Spruce Chemical Company during the search. SCHMITZ stated that he has been employed for the past two years as an assistant to PAUL A. DITTMAN in the water-conditioning business. He explained that his duties involve traveling to various industrial plants taking samples of water from boilers and analyzing same for corrosive content. SCHMITZ pointed cut that preventive compounds were then prescribed and handed over to JACOB FASS or THOMAS L. BLACK of the Spruce Chemical Company who in turn mixed up the compound and delivered same to the company involved.

SCHMITZ stated that he has no connection with Spruce Chemical Company, FASS, or BLACK other than seeing them frequently during the course of business. He stated that he knows nothing of their outside activities or background. SCHMITZ added that DITTMAN is presently on an extended vacation, care of HENRY H. SALLS, RFD 3, Porter's Point, Winooski, Vermont, which is near Burlington, Vermont. He stated that during DITTMAN'S absence he, SCHMITZ, is handling the business for DITTMAN during the slack summer season.





He did not get out and the car then proceeded north on Railroad Ave. At 5:00 pm the car returned and went slowly by Railroad Ave. The license no. was ascertained to be PC 56 T.

At 6:28 pm, FASS and BLACK left the premises at 177 E. Reilroad Ave. Paterson and proceeded to Main Street where at 6:42 pm they boarded a bus, license no. OP 68 Y. This bus proceeded to New York where at 7:32 pm both FASS and BLACK got off the bus at 35th St. and 8th Avenue opposite the Hotel New Yorker. BLACK and FASS proceeded south on 8th Avenue of foot to 34th Street and went into Child's on the north side of 34th St. noar 8th Ave.







Mr. J. D. BORGES, Security Office, M. W. Kellogg Company, Jersey City, New Jersey, advised the writer on June 30, 1950, that WILLIAM MEAD STAPLER, son of WILLIAM STAPLER, has been employed by them as an Instrumentation Engineer since July 21, 1948. STAPLER, according to PURGES, has been cleared by the Army to work on top secret contracts. Although the work this individual is doing at the present time is not considered as top secret BCRGES stated it is in a highly confidential classification.

STAPLER, he advised, operates instruments which record the effectiveness of guided missiles and from time to time he has been sent out on actual tests with the missiles to observe their operation. BCRGES advised STAPLER has access to all confidential work on guided missiles as well as access to the Kellogg Company Research Library which contains considerable confidential information in this field.

STAPLER has always been considered by the company as being an excellent employee and they have had no reason to doubt his loyalty to the United States. According to BORGES, STAPLER gets along well with his fellow employees but is a very quiet individual who always eats his lunch alone and a person who has never become too friendly with the men in his department.

According to the company files STAPLER was born November 30, 1919. at Bloomington, Delaware; and has Social Security number 146-12-9696. The personnel files reflect that the school he last attended was Casey Jones School of Aeronautics, Newark, New Jersey, from March, 1940, to June, 1941. His present residence was listed as being Hamburg Turnpike, Riverdale, New Jersey; and his former address until July, 1947, as being 8 Laurel Hoad, Mountain Lakes, New Jersey.

The record reflected he has been out of the United States for a trip to Canada in July, 1947. His social activity includes membership in the Cosmopolitan Club of Montclair, New Jersey, a social group in which STAFLER has been active since 1938. During the course of the writer's interview with CARTER, Dr. RCBERTSON, present Director of Research at NOPCO Company, entered the room and furnished the following information regarding STEIK, after it was ascertained that he was familiar with the Bureau's interest in PLACK and BLACK'S associates:

RORERISON advised that although the pay-roll records reflected that STEIK voluntarily resigned from his position as Director of Research at NOFTO, the truth-of the matter was that the Board of Directors regarded his work as unsatisfactory and requested that he submit his resignation. According to MCEERISON'S recollection STEIK was employed by the Brooklyn College in New York City as a teacher of Chemistry after leaving MCPCO.

ROPERTSON advised further that STMIK was generally regarded by technicians as an "idea man", a man who was constantly working on some new chemical process or novel experiment. He stated that STMIK'S ideas generally proved unsuccessful, but that he did meet with considerable success in developing a permicide which he placed in production subsequently under the trade name of Uforsan. ROPERISON stated that Uforsan proved to be such a successful germicide that extensive use was made of it in the NOPCO dispensary. ROBERISON stated that until about five years ago STETK made personal delivery of Uforsan which was in the form of a salve but that since that time Uforsan has been obtained at NOFCO by mailing an order to SPETK'S home at 470 Grove Street, Upper Montclair where the salve is prepared.

ROBERTION after being shown photographs of STERK, taken in 1932, which were obtained from CARTER, stated that the photographs were a perfect likeness of STERK as he appeared five years ato when last seen by ROBERTSON with the exception that STERK is now completely gray. Both CARTER and ROBERTSON stated that additional background information regarding STERK could be obtained from other records and from additional interviews with former co-workers, but they were requested to make no further inquiry at this time in view of the fact that according to referenced teletype, this investigation was to be conducted with extreme discretion.

Records of the Credit Bureau of Greater Newark reflected that a credit report was submitted on Dr. STEIK under date of April 8, 1944. This report reflects that Mrs. STEIK'S name is BEATRICE and that she and her husband purchased their home at 470 Grove Street, Upper Montclair only two months previously through the Montclair Trust Company from Mabel P. Doody. According to this report, this property is assessed at \$12,400.

This report reflected that STEJK resided at 42 Aubrey Road, Upper Montclair for several years prior to purchasing the home at 470 Grove Street, Upper Montclair, and that an earlier address was 10 Elston Road, Upper Montclair. This report reflected that STEJK rented in these last two addresses and that he left these neighborhoods in good standing.

STEIK'S employment was reported as being employed.
