On July 21, 1950, the writer contacted Dr. PERCY A. WELLS, the Director of the Eastern Regional Research Laboratory of the U.S.Department of Agriculture, Wyndmoor, Pa., as suggested in the FBI Laboratory report dated July 19, 1950.

A photostatic copy of the report obtained from a search of RIACK's residence entitled. "The Production of 1-Sorbose from d-Sorbitol by Acetobacter Suboxydans", was exhibited to Dr. WELLS with the request that he advise the writer if this process for the production of 1-Sorbose is practical and/or used on a commercial scale.

Dr. WELIS stated the process will work and has been used commercially in the past. However, in 1937 the process was made obsolete by the discovery that the production of 1-Sorbose could be considerably increased by the use of high pressure tanks with internal agitators. Dr. WELIS explained that he wrote his Doctorate Thesis on the subject of "The Biochemistry of the Genus Acetobacter, with special reference to the Oxidation of d-Sorbitol to 1-Sorbose, and the relation of 1-Sorbose to Vitamin C." A copy of this thesis is available in the library of the Bureau of Chemistry and Soils in Washington, D.C.

This thesis explained in detail the discoveries of Dr. WELLS and his associates in working on this problem at the Arlington Farm. Virginia, Color Laboratory of the Bureau of Chemistry and Soils of the Department of Agriculture. Dr. WELLS and his associates started work at the Arlington Farm Laboratory in 1935. Their high pressure and agitation process for the production of 1-Scrbose in this manner was not perfected until the Spring of 1937. They found that by using a high pressure (approximately 30 lbs. a square inch) rotary tank with various devices inside the tank to agitate and introduce air into the fermenting fluid, their yields ran up to and above 96% of the d-Sorbitol changed to 1-Sorbose.

Dr. WELIS compared the high yield obtained by him and his colleagues with the 801 yield claimed in the report obtained from a search of BLACK's residence. Because of this great difference in yield obtained, Dr. WELIS idid not believe that the method described in BLACK's report would be commercially feasible following WELLS! discovery.

According to Dr. WELLS, the process described in BIACK's report was a well known process similar to that used in the production of vinegar, and that it essentially was one to increase the surface of the fermenting fluid exposed to the air because the bacteria will work only in the presence of adequate supplies of oxygen. He described his new process as a submerged process as compared to the surface process as described in BIACK's report.

Dr. WELLS stated that the process was developed by him and his colleagues at Arlington Farm, Virginia, using a three liter tank. However, in the Fall of 1937, a field station of the Bureau of Chemistry and Soils at the University of Iowa at Ames, Iowa, further developed this process using a 500 liter tank.

Because information regarding the high pressure process in the production of 1-Sorbose was published in the technical periodical "Industrial and Engineering Chemistry", Vol. 29, Page 1385, dated 1937, the process was patented by Dr. WELLS for the Department of Agriculture on June 21, 1938. Dr. WELLS furnished the writer with a copy of this patent. No. 2,121.533, which was applied for on April 12, 1937. This patent is being made an Dr. WELLS further stated that the rotary fermenter exhibit in this file. used in this process was also patented under the name R. WELBACH. did not know the patent number. He stated that as soon as this new process was published. Hoffman-LaRoche Chemical Company at Nutley, N.J., began producing 1-Sorbose commercially using this patented process. Later, two other companies also started producing 1-Scrbose using this patented process. They were Charles Pfizer Company, Brooklyn, N.Y., and Merck and Company, Inc., Rahway, N.J.





Mrs. RHEA STEIN, Boston Post Road, Guilford, Ct. stated she resided with Mr. and Mrs. ALBERT DEW at 510 Hudson St., New York City, for a few months in summer of 1934. Recalls a woman whose name she does not recall living on first floor who invited her to attend Communist Party meetings. This woman's apartment later occupied by SYLVIA and DAVE whose last name she does not recall and with whom HELLER later roomed. She knew HELLER casually during this period and has kept up friendship with him since although she rarely sees him. Does not know any pertinent activities engaged in by HELLER during this period. Recalls she rented room from woman whose name she does not recall but who she believed to be a Communist and who she knew fought continuously with HELLER.

DETAILS: I'rs. RHEA STEIN, who resides at and operates the Chicken Inn on the Boston Post Road, Guilford, Ct., stated that she had been born RHEA KLAPPERSACK in Branford, Ct. and had gene to New York City in approximately 1925 where she worked for various companies, principally in the clothing area. She stated that in what she believed was the summer of 1934, she separated from her husband, SAMUEL GREENBERG, and while awaiting a divorce, went to live with her sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. ALBERT DEW, at 510 Hudson St., New York City. She stated that Mr. DEW at that time ran a sign-painting business on Camaine St., in the immediate vicinity and that she resided with them in a small attic apartment at 510 Hudson St. She said that as far as she could recall, during this period, there was a bakery shop on the ground floor at 510 Hudson St. and the next floor was occupied by a woman whose name she did not know but who was commonly known in the household by a woman whose name she did not know but who was commonly known in the household become the property whose species.

She stated that she did not recall the source of any of this information but that she knew that what she believed to be Communist Party meetings were held in this woman's apartment and this woman had approached her on several occasions to go to Communist Party meetings and intimated that she would like to have her join the Communist Party. Mrs. STEIN said that she did not go to any of these meetings and has always been opposed to Communism. She described this woman as in her early thirties. about 5 ft. 4 in., with reddish blond hair, a rather attractive face and of medium build. She stated that about the same time that she left 510 Hudson St., this women also departed and her apartment was taken over by a young couple who had recently been married named SYLVIA and DAVE whose last name she could not recall. She stated that she believed that DAVE was a school teacher but she did not know where he taught. She said that during this period, she struck up a casual acquaintance with the subject whom she knew as FERN HELLER and that during this period, he resided on the second floor under the DEM's apartment with a woman whose name she could not recall. She stated that HELLER rented the front room of the apartment from this woman and she believed her to be a Communist. Mrs. STEIR said that this woman had approached her on several occasions to go to meetings which she described as social meetings but which Mrs. STLIN felt were C.P. meetings. She said that this woman had a very objectionable personality and spent most of her time typing in her apartment. She stated that she did not know what this woman did for a living but she did know that she and HELLER fought continuously and eventually HELLER moved out of the apartment and it was her understanding that he lived with SYLVIA and DAVID on the first floor for a few months. Mrs. STEIN said that she believed that the woman who rented a room to HEILLER may have been jealous of his attentions to other women and his disinterest in her and therefore branded him as effeminate, which resulted in HELLER's disliking her, and many arguments. Hrs. STEIN said that her acquaintanceship with HELLER during this time was limited to a casual movie with him or a meal and she emphasized that she even paid her own way on these occasions because HELLER was very poor.

She stated that she recalled that HELLER during this time was working as a chemist for some company in New Jersey and commuted daily to New Jersey via the tube trains. She said that to the best of her knowledge he did not belong to any organizations at that time but seemed to spend most of his time engaging in his favorite hobby of dancing at Roseland Ballroom in New York City. She said that on most occasions when he went to Roseland to dance, he brought one of the hostesses home with him after the dance "to continue dancing until morning". Mrs. STEIN said that she did not recall any discussions that she had with HFLLER regarding Communism or Russia and did not have any reason to believe that he was a member of the Communist Party or in any way disloyel to this country. Mrs. STETH pointed out however, that her acquaintanceship with HELLER was a very casual one and that she was quite young at that time and was not cognizent of Communism as she is at this time. She stated that after leaving 510 Hudson St. in the late summer of 1934, she visited the DEA's quite often for a period of time and therefore knew a little of what HELLER and the others residing at 510 Hudson St. were doing. She said that in 1938 she romarried and in 1939, came to Guilford, Ct. to her present address where the and her husband, Mr. A. B. STEIN, have managed a chicken farm.

She said that since leaving New York, she usually receives a Christmas card from HILLM and he has stopped in to see her about 3 or 4 times but that she has had no close contact with him.

Mrs. STRIN mentioned that she did not believe that the DEWs had beer involved with the Communist Party while in Now York City and further mentioned that they were presently vacationing until the middle of August at Garanac Lake, New York but she did not have their exact address there.

EELL stated that he was employed by the American Cynamid Company of Lindon, New Jersey, in 1928, as a laboratory technician. He at that time was also attending the Newark, New Jersey, Technical School. It was at this time, according to BELL, that he became acquainted with BLACK whom he knew as TASSO LESSING BLACK. BLACK was also employed at that time by the American Cynamid Company as a chemist. BELL stated that because of their similar intellectual likes he and BLACK became quite friendly and thereafter from 1928 until sometime in 1938 he and BLACK maintained fairly close social relations. BELL stated that he had been a visitor at BLACK's apartment on many occasions. He stated that he recalls BLACK's apartment as having been located in a large housing project somewhere east of Broad and Market Streets. He, BELL, at that time was living at 541 Linden Avenue, Elizabeth, New Jersey.

BELL stated that he was quite aware of BLACK's membership in the Communist Party inasmuch as BLACK had attempted to persuade him to join the Party on many occasions. BELL stated that he never did join the Party but that he and BLACK had numerous conversations and discussions concerning Communism and he was not at all surprised to learn that BLACK had been engaged in espionage in behalf of the Soviet Union. BELL maintained, however, that at no time was he ever aware of the fact that BLACK was engaged in such espionage activities. BELL stated that he was also aware of the fact that BLACK later became associated with the Socialist Workers Party, but had no pertinent information to offer regarding BLACK's activities therein.

RELL was questioned concerning any of BIACK's former friends or associates whom he could recall. He stated that he recalls BLACK having had a roommate during the time he visited with him at the aforementioned apartment project and to the best of his recollection this roommate's name was similar to "JOHNEL". BELL said he never knew this roommate.

BELL stated that during the times he visited BLACK in his apartment he at no time met any persons whom he thought might have been native Russians and, furthermore, BLACK at no time mentioned to him anything concerning his having attempted to obtain a position within the Soviet Union. BELL also said that BLACK never mentioned having any connection with AMTORG.

BELL stated that he recalls that BLACK went to work for the National Oil Products Company in New Jersey after leaving the American Cynamid Company. He stated that he last saw BLACK in 1938 and since that time he has neither seen him nor corresponded with him.

Upon being questioned concerning any knowledge on his part of FERDINAND PHILIP HELLER, BELL claimed that the name was totally unfamiliar to him. BELL stated that it is quite possible that HELLER might have been a friend of BLACK's whom he met triefly but that he is sure he never had any lengthy contact with him.

BELL recalled, however, that in the early 1930s he and BLACK, to-.. gether with two or three other young men made an automobile trip from Newark to Philadelphia for pleasure. BELL stated that it is possible that HELLER might have been one of these other young men who accompanied him and BLACK but he can not say for certain.

PELL stated that he was born January 20, 1909, in Berdichev, Russia. His father's name is ISAAC BRELETESCOFSKY, his mother's name is SARAH and his parents reside at this time at 762 Eaton Street, Elizabeth, New Jersey. BELL stated that he was brought to the United States by his parents when he was about three years old and he obtained derivative citizenship through his father who was subsequently naturalized.

As stated before, BELL denied ever having been a member of the Communist Party himself or having attended any meetings of the Communist Party. RELL did state, however, that his sister, FRANCES, is married to a man named FRANK CHANDLER whom he, BELL, knows to be a member of the Communist Party. BELL stated that they reside somewhere in Newark, New Jersey, but he is not aware of the street address.



Referenced report reveals on page five that Miss Ethel Mann, Administrative Assistant in the Technical Library, Hercules Powder Company, was interviewed and that she advised that the dopewell reports of the Hercules Powder Company did not contain any Government restricted information. It is noted that Miss Ethel Mann admitted trat William T. Stapler entertained her socially on various occasions. In view of this, it is believed that an opinion should be obtained from other officials of the Mercules Powder Company regarding the classified nature of the Ropewell reports.

One of the necessary elements in establishing a successful prosecution in this case is the establishment of the fact that information of a classified nature was passed by Black. This matter should be handled expeditiously.

All contacts of CHARLES W. BERG, the employer of the subject, were made by SA HOWARD A. SEARL. At no time during any of the interviews, did Mr. BERG express in any manner, a threat in any form to Agent SEARL or any other Epecial Agent of the FBI. BERG appeared to be highly emotional and easily upset. He offered his complete cooperation to the Federal Bureau of Investigation in connection with the instant investigation, and offered his services, if needed, in connection with any other investigation. At times, as the investigation progressed, BERG expressed concern for the reputation of the company, The Charles W. Berg Laboratories of 1827 North 5th Street, Philadelphia, desiring that every effort be made to protect the good reputation of that company.

Interviews with THEMAS L. BLACK were conducted by SAS WILLIAM B. WELTI, JR. and ROBERT W. HOLLES. During the course of these interviews, BLACK made occasional references concerning the emotional instability of his employer. For example, after BLACK returned to his employer after the initial interviews on June 15 and 16, 1950, which were conducted during BLACK's normal working hours, he informed CHARLES W. BERG that he had been interviewed by the FBI and was doing everything he could to assist its investigation of HARRI COLD. BERG was rather incensed over the fact that BLACK had not been at work for two days and told BLACK that the FBI had no right to interview him during the day and that if he were being detained, he should sue the FBI. He also recommended to BLACK that he get an attorney.

BLACK told the Agents that he did not take anything that BERG said seriously in view of the fact that BERG was a neurotic hypochondriac, and an unstable individual.

As the Bureau has been previously advised, the surveillance of subject PLACK was entremely difficult due to the character of the neighborhood in which the surveillance was being conducted. There were several numbers writers (petty gamblers) in the vicinity of the Charles W. Berg Laboratories, and it was not to long before the surveilling Agents were spotted by these numbers writers as their strangers in the vicinity. However, while the Agents were spotted, there is absolutely no indication that they were aware of the identity of the Agents. The surveilling Agents observed these numbers writers in the vicinity and even noticed that they went into the Charles W. Berg Laboratories each day.

BLACK had advised on several occasions, that he suspected he was being surveilled and that LARO on one occasion, hearing of the activity of strangers in the vicinity, flow off the handle and told ELACK that it was all his fault that the FBI was around and that he would shoot the first FBI Agent that he saw. At the time he made this statement, BLACK stated that BERG was in a highly emotional state and certainly did not mean snything that he was saying. BLACK explained that BERG, a married men, was having several affairs with other women and he believed that BERG was considerably distressed for fear that the individuals noticed in the vicinity were hired by his wife or the husband of one of the women with whom he was going, and would have been quite relieved to know that it was the FBI.

During the interviews, when ELACK brought up the subject of a surveillance, no comment was made to either affirm or deny the existence of the surveillance on subject BLACK. To this day, no statement has been made to him as to whether or not he was ever under surveillance by this office.

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

On 10/2/50, Thus. S h. REACK, on admitted Soviet espionage agent, was interviewed at the Philadelphia Office. During the course of the interview he produced a newspaper clipping datelined at Hollywood, California, July 27, 1950, which he believed came from the New York Times of July 28th.

The story dealt with the release of a publicity bulletin by the Committee to Free the Hollywood Ten. According to this bulletin, this consistee was distributing throughout the country a short film defending the ten Hollywood writers jailed for contempt of Congress. The last paragraph of the news story read as follows:

Whiten the office of the Committee for Fresing the Hollywood Ten was called for further information, Hertia Field, who said he was in charge of booking the film, was put on the phone. He ownessed enthusiate about the prospects of getting a wide release of the subject not only in theatres but in homes throughout the country."

The Committee was referred to in the story as a subdivision of the Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions located at 1,50% Cross-roads of the World, hollywood 26, California.

Black emplained that his reason for presenting this clipping was that he was certain HARTEN FIELD is a man whom he knew during the 1930's and carly 1940's in Newark, N. J. His correct name is MAX FRANCELD, which was changed by him to MARTEN FIELD. MACH, for some time, roomed with FIELD's brother, who uses the name of CHARLES FRENCIAD.

According to PLACE, MARTIN PIELD was, for a few weeks in the early 1930's, a member of the COMMUNICAT FRANT in Hearth, H. J., but dropped

out. He has remained a strong and active Communist sympathizer. At ... one time he was employed on the WPA writers\* project in New York City. In the early 1940's he worked as a proof reader for a ticket printing . company in Nowark which BLACK believes was called the Enterprise or the Empire Ticket Company. FIELD went to Hollywood about 1944 or 1945 to become a writer in the notion picture industry but was never successful at it. He was married about 1940 or 1941 at Newark to HELEN GROSSHAM, who is a writer under the name of HELLN COLTON. BLACK describes her as a CP sympathizer.


