Denied knowing ALFRED and LOUISE SARIT, MINE and MINE SIDOROVICH, VIVIAN CLASSEN, DAVED and RUTH GREENGLASS. Upon reinterview, subject admitted receiving two letters from MONTON SOBELL THILE SOURCE WAS in Mexico City and Advicted posses sibility answering both letters. Subject maintained that all letters were social in nature. Denied membership in CP. Subject's wife, SYLVI. DAVZICEN, interviewed 3/28/50. Admits membership in CP while residing in Los Angeles; however, claims her husband, WILLIAM D. MZIGER, knows nothing about her actual membership. Denied being member of CP after returning to Washington, D. Min 1945. Denied Impulsage of any letter her hurband received from HONTON SORELL from Merrico City/ Upon reinterview, SELVII. PINZICER admitted scoing a letter from SOMEL, which was written from Mexico City; however, claims letter was social in nature. Mix and HELFHE ELTYCHER both state WILLIAM And SYLVII DIRIZIGER were numbers of the lavy Dept. cell 3-31-51 of CP after/their return to Washington, 1. C. in 1945. 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DETAILS:

At about 10:10 A.M., August 28, 1950, SA JAMES T.

O'ERTEN and the reporting agent contacted the subject, ALLIN' DANZIGER at the research laboratory
of the ACADERY ELECTRICAL PRODUCTS COMPANY, which
is located at 5025 Broadway, New York City. DANZIGER
was invited to the New York Office and exhibited a
comperative attitude, but requested that he be allowed to confer briefly with his boss, Mark MORRIS
EHRLICH, who was located at the main office of the
ACADEMY ELECTRICAL COMPANY, 4849 Broadway, New York
City.

After conferring with Mr. EMPLICH for a few mements, DANZIGER brought him over to the Bureau car and introduced him to interviewing agents as his uncle. Mr. EMRLICH told the agents that DANZIGER had told him that he was not in any trouble and that he, as an attorney, was advising DANZIGER to go to the wife or with the agents and to told them everything they wished to know.

Background

After arriving at the New York Office, DUNZIGER was interviewed by the above mentioned agents. He stated that he had been graduated from the College of the City of New York in 1938 with a degree of Bachelor of Electrical Engineering and in the fall of that year, he travelled to Washington, D. C., to accept a position with the Bureau of Ordnance, Navy Department. He remained at this position until August, 1941, when he left to accept a position as an electrical inspector with the New York City Fire Department. On January 1, 1942, he returned to duty with the Navy Department as an engineer at the Brooklyn -Navy Yard, New York City. In April, 1943, he was transferred by the Navy to the U. S. Mavel Drydocks Terminal, San Pedro, California. He was again transferred by the Navy to the Bureau of Ordnance, Washington, D. C. in Hay, 1945. He remained at this position until September, 1949, at which time he was separated as a security risk. Subsequent to his dismissal by the Navy Department, he operated a television sales and repair shep at 631 Kennedy Street, Washington, D. C. However, this business did not turn out well and in april, 1950, he came to New York City and accepted a position with the ACADERY ELECTRICAL PRODUCTS COMPANY, 4849 Broadway. He stated when he returned from Washington, D. C.,, he resided for a short period of time with his mother-in-law, Mrs. EHRLICH

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at 1777 Bryant Avenue, Bronx, New York. On May 8, 1950, DANZIGER moved into Apartment 3, 124 Featherbed Lane, New York 52, Hew York.

Information Concerning MORTON SOBELL

With reference to MORTON SOBELL, D.HZIGER stated that he had attended high school with SOBELL and that SOBELL had been in his class at the College of the City of New York. They were both graduated from the College of the City of New Yorl in 1938 with a degree of Bachelor of Electrical Engineering. D.HZIGER stated that he had been a friend of SOBELL during the eight years of high school and college, but when pressed for information concerning SOBELL'S political sympathies, activities or associates during these years, D.NZIGER amended his original statement, saying that he was "an acquaintance" of SOBELL. D.NZIGER stated that SOBELL had such a peculiar personality that he did not make many close friends; however, D.MZIGER considered himself tember more requasited with SOBELL than most other persons.

DINZIGER stated that in the fall of 1938, just before he went to deshington, D. C., he married Salvil Ehrlich. In Washington, D. C. they moved in with a group of CONY graduates, who were bachelors in a house which was located at 1316 Delafield Place, Washington, D. C. Some of the other members of this group that DINZIGER could recall were SIDNEY HERSCH (ph), WINXELITCHER, EDDIE HELIMIN and WORTON SOBELL. DINZIGER advised that after a few weeks at this house, he and his wife located an apartment of their own and they moved. Thereafter their contacts with members of this group were very limited. However, DINZIGER said that he continued to see MIX ELITCHER and MORTON SOBELL at work at the Bureau of Ordnance, Navy Department. DINZIGER stated that his association with these persons was broken up in Lugust, 1941, when he left Washington, D. C., to go to work in New York City and subsequently to California.

DINZIGER recalled that after his departure from Washington, D. C., in 1941, he may have received a casual communication from MORTON SOBELL, but stated he had no specific recollection of same. He stated that after his return to Washington, D. C. in 1945 DORTON SOBELL and his wife paid them a brief visit. DINZIGER recalled that the chief reason for the SOBELL trip to Washington at this time was to visit Mrs. SOBELL'S mother, who resided there. DINZIGER could not place the time of this visit any better than sometime between 1945 and 1949. He was unable to recall what was discussed; whether or not the SOBELLS were accompanied by their children; the time of day or the time of year when they visited; nor what sort of work or where SOBELL was living at that time.

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DANZIGER stated that after this visit, he did not see the SOBELLS again until the spring and summer of this year. DANZIGER recalled that he moved into his present apartment about May 8, 1950 and as best he could recall, he visited MORTON SOBELL with his wife one evening about two weeks after May 8, 1950. DANZIGER stated his visit at this time was purely social in nature; however, SORELL mentioned to him that he was planning a vacation trip to Mexico. DANZIGER stated that SOBELL mentioned nothing more specific about the trip to Mexico, other than it was going to be a vacation. DANZIGER said that the rest of the visit was purely social in nature.

DANZIGER related that his last contact with LORTON SOBELL was a few weeks later, at which time it was necessary for him to borrow an electric drill from SOBELL. He stated he called SOBELL on the telephone and explained that he wanted to borrow the drill, at which time SOBELL told him to come over to the house and pick it up that very night. DENZIGER advised that when he arrived at SOBELL'S home, SOBELL was in the process of finishing packing for his trip to lexico. It this time, SOBELL nentioned to DANZIGER that he thought his job was just about finished at the place where he was employed.


DANZIGER explained this statement by mentioning that SO BIL had apparently been working on a special project and that it had just been completed and this therefore would be the logical time for him to take a vacation. SOBELL told DANZIGER that he was very tired and needed a vacation. Present in the home on this particular visit was SOBELL, his wife and children and his sister—in-law, when DANZIGER recalled as EVE or ANN or some similar name.

It is to be pointed out that EDITH TEVITOV, SORELL'S sister-in-law, has admitted to Bureau agents, that she has resided with the SOBELL family at Flushing, New York.

DIMZIGER also stated that after he picked up the drill and visited with SODELL for a short period of time, SOBELL packed his bags in his own automobile and told DIMZIGER that he was leaving for Mexico City on that very night. DIMZIGER definitely stated that SOBELL teld him that his sister-in-law would bring the SOBELL car back to their home in Flushing after the SOBELLS had left for Mexico City. DIMZIGER definitely stated that he saw SOBELL drive off with his wife, children and sister-in-law, apparently to the airport. At this time DIMZIGER stated he drove back to his own home.

DIVICER recalled that a short time after SOBELL'S departure for Mexico, he received an air mail, first class letter from SOBELL's at his residence, 124 Featherbed Lane, Bronx, New York. DANZICER stated this letter was purely social in content. He could recall only that SOBELL had

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mentioned that he had a pleasant trip, despite the fact that it was necessary for him to hold his baby on his lap all the way down. The letter also stated that the SOBELLS were "having a good time" or "having a good rest" or words to that effect. D.NZIGER could not recall just how the letter was signed. He presumed it was "MORT" or "MORTY" or something similar. He could not recall whether or not the letter had a return address. Then asked if he still had this letter in his possession, D.NZIGER stated it might be around the house.

Information Concerning JULIUS ROSENBERG

With reference to JULIUS ROSEHEERG, NUIZIGER stated he remembered him vaguely from school at the College of the City of New York, but stated that he had not seen or heard from ROSEHEERG in any way since they had graduated in 1938. He was unable to supply any information concerning ROSEHEERG'S political sympathics, associates or activities while at the College of the City of New York, or subsequent thereto.

ROSENBERG, SCHELL or any other person with any proposition that he should make available information of any kind, either for the Communist Party, for Russia or for any other principal. DINZIGER also denied that he had ever furnished any information concerning his work to anyone.

DANZIGER was also unable to recall whether or not he had participated in a study group which was formed just after graduation by a group of students in the class of 1938 to study for civil service examinations. He stated that he night have been in such a group, but he had no individual recollection of same.

Information Concerning Other Subjects

DINZIGER stated that he recalled them as classactes at the College of the City of New York, but that he had not seen or heard from them since their graduation in 1938. He tentatively identified pictures of these persons, stating that because of the lapse of time, he was not positively certain that they were the persons in the picture shown to him.

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DANZIGER was shown pictures and given the names of the following persons, and in each case, stated that he had never seen or heard of them:

ANNE and MIKE SIDOROVICH
VIVIAN GLASSMAN
LOUISE and ALFRED SAPANT
DAVID and AUTH GREENGLASS
ETHEL ROSENBERG

DANZIGER stated that he has known KLX ELITCHER since their college days at the College of the City of New York and stated that he has seen him on several occasions at work at the Bureau of Ordnance, Washington, D. C., after his return from California in 1945 and also that he and his wife had visited the DANZIGERS on a few occasions since 1945.

Membership in the Communist Party

DANZIGER stated he is not now and never has been a member of the Communist Party. He stated that he did not know whether or not HAX ELITCHER or MORTON SOBELL are or ever have been Communists, stating that he had no information on the subject. He stated that his wife was not now and never has been a member of the Communist Party under her true name or under the name of SYLVIA TUCKER. He stated that he was familiar with the name SYLVIA TUCKER only because the allegation had been made during the course of his Loyalty Hearing that his wife had used this name for her Communist Party membership.

At approximately 2:45 P.M., August 28, 1950, MILLIN DIMZIGER had a short interview with Assistant United States Atterney MILES LIME, at which time he was served with a subpoena, requiring him to testify on August 31, 1950, before the Federal Grand Jury. The subpoena was served by the U.S. Marshal in the antersom of LIME'S office.

The interviewing agents then accompanied DANZIGER to his home. Upon his arrival at home, DANZIGER made a search for about five minutes and advised agents that apparently the letter had been thrown away. He refused to execute a waiver of search, stated that he had no material of any kind which would be pertinent to this investigation and he could not see his way elect" to having a group of agents "ransack his hope", especially in view of the fact that his wife was quite nervous. DANZIGER made available this Remington Five portable

typowriter, serial number V927904, so that specimens could be taken.

The subject, WILLIAM MANZICER, was reinterviewed on August 30, 1950 by SA ROBERT F. ROYAL and the reporting agent. Upon being confronted with information furnished by Mrs. SYLVIA DANZIGER to the effect that her husband had written to SOBELL in Mexico City, DANZIGER stated his memory had been refreshed and that he now recalled having written to MORTON SOBELL at a Mexico City address. However, the only part of the address he recalled is the word "Cord" or "Cordova". DANZIGER denied having the exact address in his possession. He also admitted possibly receiving two letters from SOBELL while SOBELL was in Mexico. DANZICER again recalled in the first letter from SOBELL, his mentioning that he had had to carry his baby on his knee on the plane to Mexico City; that he had cheap living accommodations and semething to the effect that SOBELL was at one address and possibly would be moving to another; however, mail could reach him at the "Cord" or "Cordova" address.

DINZIGER also admitted that he possibly answered both of SOBELL'S letters and that he had typed his enswers on his own typewriter. The first letter DINZIGER received from SOBELL arrived in New York City about one week after SOBELL went to Mexico and DINZIGER states that he did not answer it too promptly. DINZIGER could not recall the contents of the second letter he received from SOBELL. He stated that the letters were purely social and personal in nature and he could recall nothing specific about them. He remembered that SOBELL did not ask him to do anything in these letters.

DINZIGER admitted that these letters are about the first he has received from MORTON SOBELL during their long association, dating back to high school days. He then explained that SOBELL might have felt an obligation to write in view of the fact that he was with SOBELL on the night SOBELL left for Mexico City.

DINZICER advised that he considered contacting MORTON SOBELL'S attorney to see if there was anything he could do for SOBELL; however, he states he now has no desire to get involved in any of SOBELL'S troubles. DINZICER stated he believes in SOBELL'S innocence; however, should SOBELL be found guilty, he would not want to have anything more to do with him.

Subject was again reinterviewed on August 31, 1950, by SA JAMES T. O'BRIEN and the reporting agent. DANZIGER could recall nothing more about the letters he received from SOBELL or those that he wrote to SOBELL in return. He also stated that he had searched again for the letters in question and apparently

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they had been thrown out, since he could not locate them any place in his home.

It is to be noted that HAX ELITCHER advised SAS JAMES T. O'BRIEN and VINCENT J. CAHILL that DANZIGER gisited MORTON SOBELL in the fall of 1949 at SOBELL'S home in Flushing, New York, and that this visit took place after DANZIGER'S discharge from his position at the Bureau of Ordnance, Navy Department, Mashington, D. C., on leyalty grounds.

It is also to be pointed out that DANZIGER claimed that he had not visited with the SOBELL family from the time of the SOBELL'S visit to the DANZIGERS in Washington, D. C. until the spring and summer of this year.

When confronted with the fact that he (DINZIGER) and his family were observed visiting the SOBELLS in the fall of 1949 in Flushing, New York, DANZIGER stated that his memory had now been refreshed and that he recalled he and his wife and family drove up from Washington in their new jeep station wagon to visit the SOBELLS. DANZIGER stated that it was his recollection that this visit took place in July, 1949, since he was still employed at the Bureau of Naval Ordnance, Washington, D. C.

DANZIGER recalled that he had just purchased his jeep station wagon, license number Washington, D. C. license E5575 and he and his family drove up to New York City to show the car to the SOBELLS. He said the primary purpose of this particular visit to New York City was to visit with his wife's parents, lir. and Mrs. EHRLICH, 1777 Bryant Avenue and he thought that since they were in New York, they might just as well visit the SOBELLS.

Interview of Mrs. SYLVIA DANZIGER

Background (

Mrs. SYLVII DINZIGER was interviewed by SIS ROBERT F. ROYAL and JOHN A. HINISCH at her home, 12h Featherbed Lane, New York City, on August 28, 1950. She advised that she was born January 3, 1919 as SYLVIA EMPLICH and resided at that time at 647 East 11th Street, New York City. In 1925, she moved to the 1500 block on Montercy Avenue, exact address unknewn and in 1929, she moved to either 960 or 970 Tinton Avenue, New York City. In 1932, she moved with her family to 1105 Tinton Avenue, where she remained until Nevember 27, 1938, on whi date she married WILLIAM DINZIGER and they both left immediately for Washington, D. C.

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In Washington, D. C., they resided for six weeks, starting Hovember 28, 1938 at 1316 Delaffeld Road and then for two weeks after that in the 1400 block of Columbia Road. In February, 1939, the DANZIGERS moved to 2517 K Street, N.W., remaining there until July, 1939. From July, 1939 until August, 1941, they resided at 2819 S Street, S.E. and from then until Harch or April, 1943, they resided by 304 East 178th Street, New York City.

Thereafter, the DANZIGERS went to California and resided for one month at 905 Sennate Drive, a home development at San Podro, California. They then moved to a house at 2270 Belmont Street, Long Beach, California, where they remained until April, 1945. After her husband, WILLIAM DANZIGER, was transferred from San Pedro, California, to the Bureau of Ordnance, Navy Department, Washington, D. C., Mrs. DANZIGER stated she returned east and stayed for two weeks with her mother in New York City; while her husband looked for an apartment in Washington, D. C.

Thereafter, they lived at 1342 Halley Terrace, S.E., Washington, D. C. until July, 1946 and at 1909-19th Street, N.W., until April 7, 1949. They then moved to 5501 7th Street, N.W. on the ground floor of which building they operated the radio and appliance store, which faced on Kennedy Street, with the address of 531 Kennedy Street.

In March, 1950, WILLIAM DINZIGER came to New York to find employment and living quarters and stayed with Mrs. DINZIGER'S mother. Mrs. DINZIGER remained in Washington selling the appliance shop and came to New York City on May 8, 1950. Mrs. DINZIGER stated as best she could recall, they moved to their present address at 124 Featherbed Lane, Bronx, New York, on about May 15, 1950. She stated she has two children, a daughter, FERN HERE DINZIGER, born Hovember 15, 1943 in Los Angeles, California and a son, GEORGE DINZIGER, born Odtober 25, 1946. Mrs. DINZIGER indicated her relatives as follows:

Father

MIX EHRLICH, age 55, born in Russia, city unknown; arrived in the U. S. when about 8 years old.

Lother

IDA TUCKER EHRLICH, age 52, born in Russia, city unknown; arrived in the U.S. when about 12 years old.

Both her parents presently reside at 1777 Bryant Avenue, Bronx, New York, and they were both naturalized through their respective fathers' naturalizations. Frs. DANZIGER stated her grandfather's name was ELIA ENELICH.

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Besides her parents, she has a brother, IRVING ERLICH, who spells his last name differently from the rest of the family and who also resides at 1777 Bryant Avenue. She has a sister, FLORENCE EFFLICH, also residing at 1777 Bryant Avenue, Bronx, New York.

Information Concerning MORTON SOBELL


Mrs. SYLVIA DANZIGER advised that she know MORTON SOBELL, who was a classmate of her husband at the College of the City of New York in 1938. She stated that her husband and MORTON SOBELL went to Washington after graduation at about the same time to work for the Bureau of Ordnance, Navy Department. She stated that since MORTON SOBELL was single during this time, she and her husband did not have too much in common with him. She mentioned that occasionally both MORTON SOBELL and MIX ELITCHER, during 1939, would have Sunday morning breakfast with them. However, she stated that they did not associate too closely.

Irs: DANZIGH. rechiled Maving CORTON SOBELL to dinner in New York City once between 1941 and 1943 and thereafter when they again lived in Washington, she say MORTON SOBELL'S wife, HELEN SOBELL about five or six times. The last time she personally saw the SOBELLS was in late June, 1950, after she and her husband moved to New York City. She later changed this time of her meeting to early June, 1950.

On this occasion, Mrs. DANZIGEN advised that she suggested to her husband that now that they were in New York City, they should take time out to renew their friendship and accordingly they visited the SOBILLS in Flushing, New York. She stated she was particularly interested in getting a plant from Mrs. SOBILL, who makes a hobby of raising flowers. On this visit, MORTON SOBELL reportedly stated he was getting tired of living in New York and wanted to go away, suggesting that possibly the west coast would suit him. Mrs. DANZIGER recalled she tried to dissuade him from going to California. She vaguely recalled that SOBELL took her husband out to his garage to show him his tools and workshop. She related that SOBELL'S sister-in-law was present in the house at that time; however, she had locked herself in her room during the time of their visit.

On this initial interview of Mrs. SYLVIA DANZIGER, she stated to interviewing agents that she was not aware 203EIL had written to her husband from "exico.

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Information Concerning Other Subjects

Mrs. DANZIGER stated she did not know JULIUS ROSENBERG, had never seen him and had never even heard his name mentioned, either by her husband or anyone else until the time the newspaper publicity revealed his arrest. She was questioned several times about this and always gave the same answer. She was unable to identify his photograph.

Mrs. DINZIGER likewise did not know and had never heard of Mrs. JULIUS ROSENEER... She advised she did not know LIMED and LOUISE SARAHT, JOEL BARR, DAVID and RUTH GREENGLASS, MIKE SIDOROVICH, TANKE SIDOROVICH, OSTEVE JAVAA and RUSSELL HENUTT.

Ins. DINZIGER advised that she knew MAX ELITCHER, who was a classmate of her hasband at the College of the City of New York. "She stated that both her husband, WILLIAM DINZIGER and MAX ELITCHER went to Washington, D. C., together on November 1, 1938 after they were graduated from the College of the City of New York. She stated her husband returned to New York City and they were married on November 27, 1938 and both she and her husband then went back to Washington. Mrs. DANZIGER stated that period in 1939, the only time she saw MAX ELITCHER was when she and her husband would have him over with MORTON SOBELL for a Sunday morning breakfast. She explained that since they were married and both ELITCHER and MORTON SOBELL single, they did not have too much in common and had separate interests and friends.

Irs. DANZIGER further stated that both she end her husband saw MAX ELITCHER in New York City on several occasions between 1941 and 1943, at which time the DANZIGERS moved to the west coast. Thile for California, they received a few letters from and sent a few letters to MAX ELITCHER.

Upon their return east, the DINZIGER again saw MAX ELITCHER and for the first time met his wife. Mrs. DINZIGER advised that Mrs. ELITCHER has a dominating and superior personality, which resulted in Mrs. DINZIGER feeling very inferior in her presence. For this reason, Mrs. DINZIGER stated that the friendship between ELITCHER and DINZIGER cooled. The last time Mrs. DINZIGER saw the ELITCHERS was before they left Mashington, D. C. late in 1948.

Mrs. DINZIGER also advised that she know WHLLING MUTTERPERL, a classmate of her husband at the College of the fity of New York. She stated that she only recalls that he was a poor boy, who did not even have a decent suit to wear. She advised that she has not seen MUTTERPERL since before his graduation from the College of the City of New York in 1938 and did not know that he had

changed his name to PERL.

Mrs. DANZIGER also advised that she was acquainted with STAMEY RICH, a classmate of WILLIAM DANZIGER at the College of the City of New York. When she and her husband first went to Washington, they lived in a house for a few months in which STAMEY RICH resided. She stated she has not seen him since that time.

Reinterview of Mrs. SYLVIA DANZIGER

SYLVE: DIMZIGER was reinterviewed by SIS ROBERT F. ROYLL and JOHN A. HINISCH at her home, 124 Featherbed Lane, Bronx, New York, on August 29, 1950.

Mrs. DANZIGER advised that her memory had been refreshed and she now recalled that her husband had received a letter from MONTON SOBELL from Mexico City. She advised she was unable to recall whether she had read the letter herself or whether herself had read it to her; however, she related later that she must have read it herself, since she recalled that the letter was handwritten and signed "MONTY". Moreover, she advised that it was written on regular Size white bond paper. Mrs. SOBELL recalled to the best of her knowledge that SOBELL in the letter mentioned that he had gone to Mexico en a vacation; that he and his femily flew down; and that they had a furnished apartment with maid service for \$7.00 per week. She also stated that the letter mentioned that their child, "PIPS", had been ill on the plane trip to Mexico. Mrs. DANZIGER'S recollection was that the letter was rather short and written on one side of the sheet only. She did not see the envelope and did not personally get the letter from the mailbox. She stated that the letter did not request either herself or her husband to do anything for SOBELL.

lirs. DINZIGER then related that on the morning of Lugust 29, 1950, both she and her husband, MILLIM DINZIGER want to her uncle MORRIS EHRLICH who is an attorney and who is also her husband's employer. While there her husband told her uncle that he had answered this letter from SOBELL, but she stated she did not know what he had written in his reply. Since he had not previously told her about answering this letter and since the morning visit to her uncle, she had no chance to discuss this matter further with her husband.

In the course of the second interview, she also recalled that her husband had visited SOBELL the night SOBELL left for Mexico. In this connection, she advised that her husband wanted to put turnbuckles on their bed and in order

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to do this he needed a drill. Mrs. DANZIGER stated that her husband recalled that on his last visit early in June, 1950, to SOBELL, he had seen the type of drill he needed among SOBELL'S tools and so had called him. Upon her husband's return that night, he had told her that the SOBELLS were leaving that evening for Mexico on a vacation and both of them generally discussed thereafter how nice it was that SOBELL could go to Mexico on his vacation.

Communist Party Affiliation

In furnishing additional background information during the second interview, Mrs. DANZIGER related that she was graduated from Morris High School in 1936 and then attended Hunter College in 1936 for two and one-half years, after which she went to Washington, D.C. She returned to Hunter College in 1942 and majored in Biology. While in Washington, D.C., in 1939, she attended one semester at Wilson Teachers College and then took six credits in 1940 at George Washington University. During this time, she was also employed in Washington by the HECHT COMPANY.

Mrs. DANZIGER stated that while she went to Hunter College, she attended several meetings sponsored by the students, which meetings were either conducted by the American Students Union or the Young Communist League. She was unable to recall which group it was or whether she attended meetings of both groups. She placed this activity about 1937.

It should be noted that the Young Communist League is an organization designated by the Attorney General as coming within the purview of executive order 9835.

In a report of the Special Committee on Un-American Activities dated January 3, 1939, Page 80, the American Student Union was cited as a Communist Front which was "the result of a United Front gathering of Young Socialists and Communists" in 1937. The Young Communist League took credit for the creation of the American Student Union and the union offered free trips to Russia. The American Student Union was also cited as a Communist Front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities in reports dated January 3, 1940; June 25, 1942, Page 16; and March 29, 1944, Page 159. The American Students Union was cited as subversive and Un-American by the Special Sub-committee of the House Committee on Appropriations in a report dated April 21, 1943, Page 3.

Mrs. DANZIGER advised that both her husband, WILLIAM DANZIGER, whom she was dating at this time and her parents disapproved of her actions and tried to persuade her not to become involved with these extra-curricular activities. In fact, her parents threatened to take her out of college if she continued. Thereafter, she attended a few of these

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meetings but did not become further involved. Since she was seeing her husband regularly, she did not have the time to engage in these campus groups.

By way of explanation, Mrs. DANZIGER stated that at that time economic conditions were very bad and these groups appeared to have a positive progressive program, which appeared to have considerable merit. She stated she was always a shy, retiring girl, with an inferiority complex and she felt by attending these meetings, she had the feeling of having friends and belonging to something worthwhile.

Mrs. DANZIGER also advised that she attended a few meetings sponsored by the American Students Union, while attending Wilson Teachers College in Washington, D.C. in 1939. She also advised that while in Washington, both she and her husband belonged to the Consumers Union and they both attended at least one meeting of the American Peace Mobilization, held at the National Press Club. She stated that possibly she attended a few more of these meetings of the American Peace Mobilization, but she could not recall whether she or her husband ever became members of this organization.

It should be noted that the American Peace Mobilization is an organization designated by the Attorney General as coming within the purview of executive order 9835.

It should also be noted that the Consumers Union was cited as being under Communist control, influenced by or in collaboration with the Communist Party, by the Committee for Cultural Freedom, Professor JOHN DEWEY Chairman, April, 1940. The Consumers Union was also cited as "subversive and Un-American" by the Special Committee of the House Committee on Appropriations report dated April 21, 1943, Page 3. The Consumers Union was also cited as a Communist Front organization by the Pennsylvania Commonwealth Council before the Reviewing Board of the Philadelphia County Board of Assistance, January, 1942. The Consumers Union was also cited as a Communist Front by the California Committee on Un-American Activities in a report dated 1943, Pg. 102.

In response to the cuestion "Are you now, or have you ever been a member of the Communist Party?", Mrs. DANZIGER asked, "Do I have to answer this question?". She was advised that she did not have to answer. After hesitating, Mrs. DANZIGER stated that she might asswell answer the question but pleaded that her Communist Party affiliation be kept from her husband as he did not know she actually had been a member of the Communist Party.

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Mrs. DANZIGER went on to say that she knows her husband lost his job at the Navy Department because of her membership in the Communist Party and she said this fact has been on her conscience. She advised she has been extremely sorry for her actions. Mrs. DANZIGER advised that when she moved to California, she was extremely resentful and was not in favor of moving there; however, her husband wanted to go to California and so they went. She stated in the first place she did not want to leave her friends and relatives in the east and secondly, she did not get along too well with the people in California. As a result, she became emotionally upset and it was necessary in 1946, in Washington, D. C., to visit a psychiatrist by the name of DOUGLAS KNOWLAND. She stated that because of the move to California, she felt that her husband was primarily responsible and she therefore wanted to do something to hurt him and accordingly joined the Communist Party.

Hrs. DANZIGER advised that her actual joining of the Communist Party came about as follows:

a bookshop to purchase a child's book as a present and while there, she became engaged in a conversation with the woman in charge of the shop. She was unable to recall the name or address of the bookshop or the name of the saleswoman. She was only able to describe her as a "big blonde". During the course of the conversation, this woman persuaded her to attend a Communist Party meeting held at the Odd Fellows Hall.

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A few days later, she again visited the same bookshop to buy her husband a technical book and this same woman, at this time persuaded her to join the Communist Party. Hrs. DANZIGEN stated she then signed the membership card at at this time used her mother's maiden name of TUCKEN, as her last name. Ifter she got home, she felt sorry for her actions and a day or the later, called the woman at the bookshop and requested that her name be withdrawn from the Communist Party, since she feared her husband's anger if he found out about it.

lirs. DNNITGER denied ever having received any Communist Party newsprocessor periodical, stating that she could not receive this material in her
home as her husband would then know about her Communist Party affiliation.
She denied ever having been a Communist Party number in New York City or
Washington, D.C., or having her Communist Party membership transferred from
New York City to California. She was also unable to recall ever paying dues
to the Communist Party.

Irs. D.NZICH denied being a member of the Ashington Committee for Democratic Action or over acting as a cashier for the american Youth Congress.

DINZIGER was extremely social minded in the sense that he favored the working man, but that he is not now and never has been a Communist. In view of this, theory favoring the working man, he joined the United Public Morkers Union in Washington, D. C. As a result of her husband's activities in the United Public Workers Union, Mrs. DEFZIGER stated she became interested in the vomen's auxiliary of the United Public Workers and played a leading part in the establishment of an inter-racial nursery school. She stated she was extremely enthused over this project and it was the first time she had actively been one of the founders and one of the moving forces on a certain matter.

irs. DINZIGER denied also that her husband had ever made any statement praising the Russian form of government or comparing that government favorably with the government of the United States. She stated that she and her husband might have spoken favorably of Russia's war effort and economic pregram.

In conclusion, she stated that she was certain that her husband, WILLIAM DANZIGEN was not a Communist and was not connected in any espicinage matter with SOBELL, ROSHERMS or anyone else. She also stated that she was certain her husband could not possibly be connected with the Communist Party or with any espicinage group and that if he were involved in an espicinage matter, she

would leave him in a moment.

Reinterview of MIX and HELENE ELITCHER

On September 7, 1950, Mrs. HELENE ELITCHER was reinterviewed at her home, 164-18 72nd Avenue, Flushing, Long Island, by SA VINCENT J. CANILL and the reporting agent.

Mrs. ELITCHER, when previously interviewed on July 20, 1950 by SAS ROBERT F. ROYLL and EDWARD F. McCARTHY, recalled that in the summer of 1943 or 1944 and possibly during the month of July, she, with her husband, MAX, came to New York City for a weekend visit. She recalled that she had dinner with JULIUS ROSENBERG, CJOEL BARR, Wars. RUTH ALSCHER and possibly one or two others. The whole party dined at the DETRO-IN-HAND RESTAURANT at 1659 Broadway, New York City. On this occasion, JOEL BARR was introduced to MAX and HELENE ELITCHER as a friend of ROSENBERG.

Mrs. ELITCHER recalled that after dinner, the whole party went via subway to LOEL BARR'S parents! home, 241 Mest 97th Street, New York City, and then after taking Mrs. RUTH ALSCHER home to 1445 Madison Avenue, the party proceeded to the apartment of OAL SAMANT in Greenwich Village. Mrs. ELITCHER vaguely recalled during this initial interview that possibly MINIAM and SYLVIA DANZIGER were present during the dinner at the BIRD-IN-HAED RESTAURANT.

Regarding the above, Mrs. ELITCHER stated when reinterviewed on September 7, 1950 that she had devoted considerable thought to this particular meeting with ROSEMBERG and she is now quite certain that MILLIAM and SYLVIA DANZIGER were not present at this meeting. She stated that the other couple she had in mind, as possibly being the DANZIGERS, were MONTON and HELEN SOBELL. She also advised that after devoting considerable thought to the subject, she could very positively state that MILLIAM and SYLVIA DANZIGER were never present when she and her husband met with JULIUSROSENBERG.

Regarding her Communist Party affiliations, HELENE ELITCHER stated she had been a member of the Communist Party from approximately the end of 1943 or shortly after her marriage, up until the time she departed from Washington, with her husband to New York City. She stated that prior to her marriage, she had not been a member of the Communist Party, nor had she been active in union activities. Shortly after her marriage she joined the Communist

Party and was placed in the Navy Department cell of the Communist Party, in which her husband was also a member.

Mrs. ELITCHER stated that she was active in the Mavy Department cell up until April, 1946, when she took maternity leave of absence from the OPA, where she was then employed. Her first child, KAREN, was bern during May, 1946, and she did not return to work until January, 1947. During this period she did not resume her Communist Party activities in the Navy Department cell. She worked again for the OPA from January to March, 1947, at which time the activities of the OPA were practically dissolved and she was dismissed from her position. During this period from January to March, 1947, HELENE ELITCHER stated that she possibly attended one or two meetings of the Navy Department cell of the Communist Party, but she was not sure. At any rate, she recalled that it was either during this period from January to March, 1947 that she was transferred to a housewives cell of the Communist Party, which cell ap cared to be set up on the basis of location of residence in Mashington, D. C.

Regarding the Havy Department cell, HELEME ELITCHER advised that at the meetings she attended, there were generally six to eight people present on each occasion, which comprised the cell. She stated that normally meetings of the cell were held every two weeks and that each meeting of the cell was held at a different home. She added that numbers of the cell held meetings in their homes and rotated in order. At each meeting, dues was collected from each number and was turned over to the chairman. She advised the amount of dues collected was principally based on the amount of money being earned by the person. She stated that the chairman of the cell usually retained that position for a period of from six months to a year, at which time an election was held and another number of the cell generally became chairman. HILEME ELITCHER was unable to recall any of the individuals who had held the position of chairman over her particular cell.

The money collected during the meetings for dues payments, which were turned ever to the chairman, were in turn given by the chairman to an individual from outside the cell, who was in contact with the Communist Farty. HELENE ELITCHER intimated that the identity of this so-called contact was known only to the acting chairman at that time.

Mrs. ELITCHER hesitated to name the other members of the Navy Department cell of the Communist Party, stating she preferred her husband, MIX, to tell since MAX was in the Navy Department cell for a much longer period of time

than she was. However, she did state that WILLIAM and SYLVIA DAMZIGER were definitely members of the Navy Department cell of the Communist Party. She recalled that WILLIAM and SYLVIA DAMZIGER attended several meetings of the Navy Department cell at which meetings she and her husband were also present. Mrs. ELITCHER remembered that her husband, MAX, attended meetings at the home of WILLIAM and SYLVIA DAMZIGER at the southeast address in Washington; D. C., that the DINZIGERS resided in shortly after their return from the west coast. Mrs. ELITCHER could not recall the exact address.

With regard to the DANZIGERS association with the Navy Department cell, Mrs. ELITCHER stated that her knowledge of their attendance at the cell meetings was limited to the period between the end of 1943 and April, 1946. She advised that after this time, she was not sure whether she had attended any meetings of the Navy Department cell and was not sure whether SYLVIA DAMZIGER was a member of the Navy Department cell of the Communist Party after April, 1946. Mrs. ELITCHER further stated it was her recollection that sometime after April, 1946, SYLVIA DAMZIGER was also transferred from the Mavy Department cell of the Communist Party in another section of Washington. Mrs. ELITCHER stated, however, that her knowledge of SYLVIA DAMZIGER'S participation in Communist Party cell meetings was limited to the Navy Department cell.

Lirs. ELITCHER also pointed out that there could be actually no doubt in the mind of any of the members of the cell as to the nature of the organization they belonged to. She said that it was very unlikely that any of the cell members would not know that they belonged to a unit of the Communist Party. She also indicated that it was not at all likely they could confuse such cell meetings with union meetings.

Mrs. ELITCIER-recalled in addition to the DANZIGERS that LEE and ESTHER SUROVELL, FAULTHE COLDERN and LEK MARRIS were members of the Navy Department cell at the time she was attending meetings of the same cell.

Mrs. ELITCHER pointed out that WHALLEN and STLVIL DANZIGER returned to Washington from the west coast during the summer or early fell of 1945. Shortly after their return, they became members of the Navy Department cell and attended meetings. She stated that she could only account for their activities in the Navy Department cell from that time until about April, 1946.

Mrs. ELITCHER, when questioned regarding the DANZIGERS using the mailing address of the ELITCHERS after the DANZIGERS returned from the west coast, explained that the DANZIGERS had never lived with the ELITCHERS in Washington, but they had used their (ELITCHER) address for the purpose of receiving mail while the DANZIGERS were enroute from the west coast.

Mrs. ELITCHER vaguely recalled that the DAMZIGERS used their address for receiving mail for about six weeks. She stated that TILLIAM DAMZIGER had written to her husband asking his permission to use his address to receive mail just until the DAMZIGERS were able to get an address and settled in Mashington.

Regarding their relationship with the DANZIGERS, Mrs. ELITCHER explained that they were very friendly for a period of about six months after the DANZIGERS returned from the west coast. She added that this relationship took the form of a number of social visits and also an exchange of dinners between the two families. Due to personality differences between her and Mrs. DANZIGER, Mrs. ELITCHER explained that gradually their friendship became strained, until finally she and Mrs. DANZIGER inch envargument. Mrs. ELITCHER stated that actually there was nothing to the argument; however, it served to just about sever their friendship completely.

Mrs. ELITCHER also advised that both she and Mrs. D.MZICER were extremely active in the women's auxiliary of the United Federal Morkers, CIO. She explained that after the DAWZIGERS and ELITCHERS ceased their close friendship, she often saw Mrs. D.MZIGER at the various meetings of the women's auxiliary of the United Federal Morkers, CIO.

MAN ELITCHER was reinterviewed at the New York Office/by 2. VIECENT

J. C.HILL and the reporting agent. MAX ELITCHER stated that WILLIAM DANZIGER
joined the Navy Department cell of the Communist Perty shortly after his return
from the West coast in 1945. ELITCHER stated that DINZIGER probably got into
the Navy Department cell on his (ELITCHER'S) recommendation. ELITCHER said he
was not positive of this fact; however, he thought that this was how DINZIGER
was admitted to the Navy Department cell.

ELITCHER stated the procedure with the cell for admitting a new member would be for one of the present members of the cell to recommend a new individual and then the entire cell would voto whether or not this individual would be admitted. Mong with this vote, the individual's name would be submitted through the chairman's contact to the Communist Party for clearance by the Communist Party.

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ELITCHER stated he vaguely recalled that D.W.Z.IGER may have asked him to get him into ELITCHER'S group. He stated that he had knowledge, probably from MORTON SOBELL, that MILLIM! DANZIGER had formerly been a member of the Communist Party before he left Jashington in 1941. He further stated it would be necessary for him to have mentioned this fact, that of DANZIGER'S prior membership, in order for him to be admitted to the Havy Department cell.

ELITCHER recalled that DINZIGER joined the cell probably about six months after DANZIGER returned from the west ceast in May, 1945. ELITCHER definitely recalled attending meetings of the Communist Party Navy Department cell at the home of WILLIAM DANZIGER at the southeast address and also at DINZIGER'S subsequent home, which was located in the northwest section of Washington. When the addresses 1342 Halley Terrace, S.E., Washington, D. C. and 1909 19th Street, N.W., Washington, Wire suggested to him, ELITCHER definitely stated that these were the addresses of DAWZIGER where the Navy Department cell meetings were held and at which he was in attendance. ELITCHER was not sure whether or not DANZIGER'S wife was ever present at these meetings.

With regard to SMLVIA DAMZIGER, ELITCHER telephonically advised SA VINCENT J. C.HILL on September 8, 1950 that after discussing the matter with his wife, he had recalled that the name of SYLVI. D.NZIGER had been submitted by him to the other members of the Navy Department cell, with a statement by him to the effect that he new she had been engaged in a similar activity before. ELITCHER stated that her name was submitted by the chairman subsequently for clearance and that the clearance was eventually obtained, although there was some delay in obtaining it. He attributed this delay to the possibility that it could not be determined whether she was to be accepted as a member of the Navy Department cell or whether she should be placed in another group, inasmuch as she was a housewife at the time of her return from the west coast.

ELITCHER stated that he had attended at least two meetings at DANZIGER'S home and possibly more. He advised that present at the poetings in DANZIGER'S home were PAULINE COLDMAN, HURK HURRIS, ABE SUROVELL and IRA KLAFTER. In addition to the foregoing, ELITCHER stated that ELL MESHER DELRY CRIER and VELHETTE KIPLIN were also members of the Navy Department cell of the Party and he advised that all of the foregoing, with the possible exception of KIPLIN and MECHER were in attendance at the cell meetings at which DINZIGER was present!

ELITCIER stated that he did not attend any meetings of the Navy Department cell after the spring or early surper of 1948, but informed the chairman of the cell, ARE SUROVELL that he was moving to New York and was ceasing his Communist

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Party activities. He added that he requested SUROVELL to tell DINZIGER that he was dropping out of the cell and was going to New York.

MIX ELITCHER advised that ABE SUROVELL had come into the Navy Depart-Party/possibly in 1942 or 1943 and had terminated his ment cell of the activities when he was inducted into military service. ELITCHER stated that upon being discharged from the service, he again resumed his party activities within the Navy Department cell. He also indicated that SUROVELL was chairman of the Navy Department cell at the time he left for New York City.

ELITCHER recalled that ESTER SUROVELL had also been in the Havy Department cell, but was not active in the cell at the time ELITCHER left to come to New York. ELITCHER advised that ESTHER SUROVELL had been awtive in the coll at an earlier date and had known WILLIAM DANZIGER.

Regarding FAULINE GOLDEN, ELITCHER stated that she was active in the Navy Department cell at the time he left for New York in 1948. He said he believed that GOLDEN fram Come into this particular cell in about 1945, or pescibly a little bit later and had been in the cell for approximately two years as an active member of the Party.

Regarding HARK HARRIS, ELITCHER stated that HARRIS was an active member of the Navy Department cell at the time he left for New York City. He indicated Party member for (b) 7(c) further that HNNIS had been active in the cell as a at least two years.

Regarding/IRA KLAFTER, ELITCHER stated that KLAFTER was an active member of the Navy Department cell at the time ELITCHER left for New York. He further pointed out that KLAFTER had been active in the cell for about one year or possibly a little longer, up until the time of ELITCHER'S departure.

Regarding MARY GRIER, ELITCHER advised that GRIER had left the Navy Department cell of the Party about one year before ELITCIER left for New York. He stated, however, that she had been active in that particular cell for about two years prior to that time. ELITCHER stated that he believed that (6) GRIER night possibly have left the cell due to a loyalty investigation of her (6) background.

Regarding JENNETTE KNFLAN, ELITCHER stated that she had been active in the Navy Department cell for at least one year, but had terminated her association with that cell at the time she left the Mavy Department. He stated

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that there was a possibility that KAPLAN would not know DANZIGER, since she may have dropped out of this cell prior to the time DANZIGER returned to Washington, D. C.

Regarding SAM MESHER, ELITCHER stated that MESHER had been active meaning the Navy Department cell of the Party for at least a couple of years, but stated he had stopped all activity within the cell about one year before ELITCHER departed for New York. ELITCHER recalled that MESHER was attending school while working and may not have had time for Party (b)?

On September 13, 1950, Assistant United States Attorney MYLES LANE, Southern District of New York, advised that he was issuing a subpoena for SYLVI. DENZIGER, returnable before the Federal Grand Jury, 10:30 A.M., September 20, 1950. Line also advised that he desires that Mrs. HELENE ELITCHER, wife of HAX ELITCHER, voluntarily appear before the Federal Grand Jury on the same date.

Reinterview of MILLIAM DANZIGER on September 14, 1950

As has been previously set forth, ITLITIM DINZIGER visited the home of MORTON SOBELL, the night SOBELL left for Mexico City for the purpose of borrowing an electric drill.

MILLIAM DINZIGER on September 14, 1950 was reinterviewed at his home, 124 Featherbod Lane, Brome, by SA ROBERT F. MYAL and the reporting agent, at which time DANZIGER exhibited the electric drill he borrowed from SCHELL. The drill was a small pistol type electric drill, serial number 236-171, model 153, Mall Drill, size 5/16"; 115 AC or DC volts; 1.5 ampheres and 800 RFE. Inscribed on the drill was the name Hall Tool Company, Chicago, Illinois.

HARRY BELOCK, General Manager, REEVES INSTRUMENT COMPLHY, previously advised that ECRTON SOBELL owned a Leice cenera, with a telephote lens for close-up work. He further advised that ECRTON SOBELL had advised him that he had a laboratory in the basement of his home.

DINZIGER was questioned as towhether he had ever visted the photo laboratory in the basement of SOBELL'S home. DINZIGER vaguely recalled being shown through SOBELL'S home when he came up from Mashington in July, 1949, to

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visit with the SOBELLS. He also recalled the 1-st time he saw SCBELL that he visited the basement of SOBELL'S home in order to pick up the electric drill. D.NZIGER stated that SOBELL did not have any kind of a laboratory set up in the basement of his home and he vaguely recalled seeing only an old work bench in a very disorderly condition in the basement. D.NZIGER stated this work bench contained a number of tools, including the electric drill that he was going to borrow.

DINZIGER denied ever being shown a camera by MCNTON SOBELL and he could not furnish any information as to the type of camera SOBELL owned. He recalled seeing some pictures that SOBELL had taken and he also remembered that SOBELL told him that the pictures were blown up from 35 mm. film. DINZIGER was of the opinion that possibly SOBELL had a Leica camera; however, he was not positive. He stated he had the impression that SOBELL had some developing and printing equipment and an enlarger in his home, although he, himself, has never seen this equipment.

Then questioned as to the possibility of SOBELL having a derk-room set up in his home, DENZIGER stated that it is not necessary to have a dark room specifically set up to develop film, since all it takes is just a dark space and a small water supply. He denied again seeing any dark room in SOBELL'S home or anything used by SOBELL to develop pictures.

Regarding the pictures mentioned above that SOBELL showed him, DANZIGER stated they were pictures of SOBELL'S family. He denied seeing any photographs of any technical matter.

PENDING

ADMINISTRATIVE PAGE

During the initial interview of WILLIAM DANZIGER on September 28, 1950, it was the observation of interviewing agents that DANZIGER was purposely vague and extremely evasive. It was noted that he volunteered no information and although he talks incessantly about general matters, he does not talk concerning pertinent matters.

DINZIGER observed during this initial interview that he believed SOBELL to be innocent, stating that he based this on his knowledge of SOBELL. Then confronted with his previous remarks that he was only an acquaintance of SOBELL and when it was pointed out to him in spite of his belief that SOBELL was innocent, he had made no effort to either help SOBELL or his wife, he relapsed to the statement that he really did not know SOBELL very well and could be considered only an acquaintance of his.

It is to be pointed out that when WILLIAM DANZIGER was initially interviewed on August 28, 1950, by SA JAMES T. O'BRIEN and the reporting agent, he was asked if he had known ABE SURCVELL and PAULINE COLDEAN. DANZIGER stated that he had known ABE SURCVELL and PAULINE GOLDIAM but had no information as to whether or not they were Party members. () 7(C)

DANZIGER at the time made the comment that he detected "a pattern" in the names of the persons whose names were being mentioned to him. When rewested to elaborate on this statement, he stated that all of these persons had been very active in the unions in Washington, D.C., either the United Public Workers or the Federal Workers of America. DANZIGER was not clear as to the name of the union to which he said he belonged.

During subsequent interviews of WILLIM DINZIGER, it was the observation of interviewing agents that DANZIGER was still vague, evasive and appeared to hedge when asked anything specific.

During the interview of Mrs. SYLVI: D.N.ZIGER, when she was explaining why she happened to join the Communist Farty, she made the statement that she was a shy, retiring girl, with an inferiority complex and was constantly aware of the fact that "she was and looked Jewish". She then stated by attending meetings, she had the feeling of having friends and belonging to something worthwhile.

Also during the interview of Mrs. SYLVIA DANZIGER, she mentioned that she disliked California intensely because their acquaintenees in California were all Centiles and "these acquaintances constantly made remarks about her Jewish race, which irritated her and made her feel very badly".

Physical Surveillances of WILLIAM DUNZIGER

A full-time physical surveillance of WHLIM DAWZIGER was conducted by agents of the New York Office from August 17 to August 20, 1950.

A spot-check surveillance of MILLIAM DAMZIGER was conducted by agents of the New York Office from August 21 to August 25, 1950.

A full-time physical surveillance was conducted on MILLIAN DANZIGER from August 26, 1950 to September 1, 1950 by agents of the New York Office.


The surveillances on the subject failed to reflect any contacts pertinent to this investigation, with the exception of the instance reported below:

Mr. J. RYAM, partner in the A. T. TYPE RITER SERVICE STORE, 500 West 207th Street, New York City, was subsequently interviewed on August 21, 1956, at which time he advised that LILLIAN DENZIOER, giving his aldress as the ACADEMY ELECTRICAL PRODUCTS COMPANY, 4849 Prendway, New York City, purchased a second-hand typewriter on April 27, 1950. Mr. RYAM further advised that the typewriter was a Remington portable, model 5, Pica, serial number V927904. Mr. RYAM stated the typewriter, when purchased, was in very good shape and needed no repairs or alterations, other than a cleaning, which was done before the typewriter was turned over to WILLIAM DANZIGER. Mr. RYAM advised the former owner of the typewriter was GEORGE HEIRY SCHELLER, 531 West 211th Street, Apartment 32B, New York City, and the typewriter was purchased from Mr. SIELLER on April 26, 1950 for eash.

Mr. RYAN recalled that WILLIM DANZIGER came into his store on hugust 21, 1950 to purchase five hundred sheets of yellow type paper, which DANZIGER said he intended to use to teach his child to type.

GEORGE HEHRY SHELLERY 531 Lost 211th Street, Leartment 32B, New York City, was contacted on Lagust 21, 1950, and he furnished ten sheets of typewritten specimens, which specimens he himself had typed on instant typewriter, which was now in the pessession of LILLIAN DIMZIGM.

It is to be noted that Butel dated August 17, 1950, entitled "NORTON SOBELL, wa.; ESPIONICE - R", set forth at the time MORTON SOBELL was arrested in Mexico City, there was found in his possession a letter postmarked New York City, August 9, 1950 at 9 P.M. The letter was type-written on note paper, addressed to Mr. N. WALTER, the name under which SOHELL was residing at Cordova 153, Apartment &, Mexico City, Mexico, and was signed LEU. Reference teletype instructed that typewriting specimens should be obtained from the typewriters in possession of the various subjects in the ROSENBERG casc.

By letter dated August 23, 1950, the typewritten specimens, which were obtained from GEORGE HENRY SHELLER, were forwarded to the FBI Laboratory for comparison with the typewritten letter, which was found in MORTON SOBELL'S possession at the time of his arrest in Mexico City.

By letter dated August 28, 1950, the FBI Laboratory concluded that the typermitten specimens obtained from Er. SHELLER were not prepared on the typewriter used to type the letter found in MORTON SCBELL'S possession.

When the subject was initially interviewed on August 28, 1950, interviewing agents accompanied him to his home, at which time additional typewritten specimens were obtained from the typewriter in DAMZIGER'S possession, which typewriter was previously described as a Remington portable, model 5, Pica, serial number V927904. These specimens were forwarded to the Bureau by New York letter dated September 6, 1950.

By letter dated September 13, 1950, the FBI Laboratory concluded that: the typewriter used to prepare these typewritten specimens was not used to prepare the typewritten letter found in FORTON SOBELL'S possession at the time of his arrest in Mexico City.

By letter dated August 25, 1950, specimens of the subject's handprinting and handwriting, which were obtained from MILLIM DAMZIGER'S personnel file at the Naval Ordnance Laboratory, White Oaks, Maryland, were forwarded to the ·FBI Laboratory, to be checked against appropriate sections of the National Security File.

ADMINISTRATIVE PAGE, CONTD

By letter dated August 31, 1950, the FBI Laboratory advised that the specimens of the subject's handprinting and handwriting were compared with the appropriate sections of the National Security File, but no identification was effected. The Laboratory also advised that appropriate photographic copies of this hendwriting and handprinting were being added to the National Security I File for future reference.

The results of the mail cover, which was placed on MILLIM and SYLVIA DENZIGER, 124 Featherbed Lane, Bronx, New York, on August 8, 1950, have been set forth by either letter or teletype for other offices to cover.

In addition, Confidential Informent T-1, of known reliability, was requested on Lugust 31, 1950 to furnish a list of the subject's tell calls, made from telephone CY. 3-2823, which number is listed to TALLIM DINZICEM, 124 Featherbed Language and the calls of the subject of th

Regarding the other cell members of the Navy Department cell of the Communist Party, which information was furnished by MIX and HELENE ELITCHER on September 7, 1950, a teletype dated September 3, 1950, was directed to the Burcau, Mashington Field, Baltimere, New Mayon and Boston Offices, to submit summaries of the recent activities of the various members of the Mayy Department cell and to request Bureau permission to interview these members in an attempt to obtain corraborative evidence against DAMZIGER and possibly against MORTON SOBELL.

Regarding the electric drill that WHLLE DANSIGER berrowed from MORTON SOBELL, the night SOBELL left for Mexico City, a teletype dated September 18, 1950, was directed to the Chicago Office to trace the ownership of this electric drill.

Regarding the ACADEMY ELECTRICAL PRODUCTS CORPORATION, where subject is employed, Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised in a report dated October 24, 1949, that the corporation was chartered under New York laws on February 24, 1947, but did not become active until August, 1948.

The corporation manufactures automatic attachment plug caps, which has been approved by the Underwriters Association. A patent is held on this item.

The device manufactured is an electrical wall socket which automatically attaches itself to all electrical wiring. Sales are made to chain stores, wholesale and electrical appliance stores, hardware distributors, variety stores and mail order houses throughout the United States.

The principals of the firm are THVING LEVINE, President; MINUR GREENBANK, Vice President and Treasurer; and JOHNIS HINLICH, Secretary. The principals are active in the menagement and thirty-five persons are caployed. In June, 1949, a small research laboratory was opened at 5025 Broadway, in addition to the main office located at 4849 Broadway, New York City.

On March 22, 1950, NORRIS EMPLICH, Secretary, declined specific financial information; however, he stated sales were holding steady and averaging about \$75,000.00 monthly.



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


A definite conclusion could not be reached whether the questioned handwriting appearing on the registration card, Ql, was written by WILLIAM DANZIGER, whose known handwriting specimens are designated as Kc3 in this case, because the known handwriting specimens of DANZIGER are not entirely comparable with the questioned handwriting and in addition, the questioned handwriting contains certain characteristics which cannot be accounted for on the basis of the known specimen, Kc3. However, some handwriting characteristics were observed common to the writing on the registration card, Q1, and to the known handwriting of DANZIGER. If at all possible, additional known handwriting of DANZIGER should be obtained. Handwriting other than signatures alone should be obtained, if available.




