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

Kyle described him as idealistic in matters of civil rights and a loyal American. of Nebraska Law School stated that Sorenson was "a militant liberal" and was active in local chapters of Americans for Democratic Action and Committee for Fair Employment Practices. **b**6 of Nebraska Law School stated Sorenson was idealistic and interested largely in civil liberties aspect of law, particularly, with reference to protecting the rights of minorities and the stated that Sorenson had indicated to him his feeling that the Federal Loyalty Bill was unwise legislation and that the Supreme Court did not know the meaning of the Fourteenth Amendment. 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

Bufile 100-386125 discloses that Jehle was born in Stuttgart, Germany, on 3-5-07 and applied for admission to the United States as a political refugee in 2-41. He is a graduate of the University of Berlin and prior to coming to the United States he was engaged in scientific research in Germany, England and Belgium. He reportedly was refused a position with the German Government because of his pacifist beliefs and his refusal to swear to a loyalty oath to Hitler. He was associated with the University of Nebraska from 1949 to 1959 and has been associated with George Washington University since 9-59. He has been interviewed by Bureau agents in the past and has stated that he has never been a member of the Communist Party. In 1957 he contacted of the Soviet Embassy, and advised the agents upon interview that he made these contacts because he thought it was necessary to talk to him as he thought it might bring about a better understanding between the people of the USSR and the United States in promoting world peace.

General Persons further stated that Mr. Clifford has indicated to him that within the next few days either Mr. Clifford or some other person designated by Senator Kennedy would call on the Director in order to seek FBI assistance in conducting investigations of Presidential appointees for the new Administration. Mr. Bartlett made no comment.

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

While in school he received the following honors: Phi Beta Kappa, Order of the Coif, Editor of the Law Review.

After graduating from Law School he obtained a position with the Federal Security Agency, as an attorney.

Soon thereafter he was employed by Senator Paul Douglas, who was then chairman of a temporary Joint Committee on Railroad Retirement, in connection with the work of that committee. The committee concluded its work in 1952, and Mr. Sorensen was recommended by Senator Douglas to Senator John F. Kennedy. He began working for Senator Kennedy in 1952 and has been associated with him since that date.

An amendment to the charter of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare (SCHW), which has been cited by the Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities as a communist front, changed the name of the organization to the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc. (SCEF), and listed its purposes as being to improve the educational and cultural standards of the southern people in accordance with the highest American democratic institutions, traditions, and ideals. The amendment was dated April 26, 1946.

Confidential Informant T-2, who is familiar with some phases of Communist Party activity in the New Orleans area, advised on June 29, 1956, that during the time the SCHW was in existence, Communist Party members were members of and worked actively in the SCHW. However, since the formation of the SCEF, Inc., rank and file Communist Party members have not been encouraged to work in the SCEF. Informant stated that the SCEF is a progressive liberal organization which he considers a Communist Party front organization because it has gone along with the Communist Party on certain issues, particularly order acial question, and through the years certain Communist Party members in the New Orleans area have been assigned to work in the organization to further Communist Party principles.

Informant considers JAMES DOMBROWSKT, the Executive Director of the SCEF, as a Communist Party member because he follows communist principles, but he is not under Communist Party discipline. Many prominent people who are officials and members of the organization, while liberal in their views, are by no means communists.

Confidential Informant T-2 advised on May 22, 1958, that the status of the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc., remains unchanged.

The Communist Party, USA, has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.



of the proceedings before the Commission regarding a protest of revenue increase by the City Bus Lines, Inc., of Lincoln, Nebraska, in 1951, disclosed that THEODORE SORENSEN, as of June 7, 1951, was acting as the attorney for this group. She advised the group was listed as 247 patrons of the bus company and they were against an increase in fares as proposed by the company. She stated her files fail to list by name any of the participants involved; however,

He advised SORENSEN had just graduated from the University of Nebraska Law College at that time, and from all appearances, he had conducted himself in a very capable manner, and handled his part of the proceedings in hehalf of the patrons group as would any other lawyer under the circumstances. stated to his knowledge there was no organized committee on the part of the bus customers and they were merely a group of bus riders who objected to an increase in rates.

stated that he had not been acquainted with SORENSEN prior to this occasion with regard to the aforementioned protest proceedings; however, based on his limited acquaintance with SORENSEN, he had no reason to question the latter's integrity, honesty, moral character, reputation, or loyalty.

He advised married approximately five years ago and had moved away from Lincoln; however, he was not aware of her married name nor any information concerning her present address, at this time.

VanPELT stated the SORENSEN family were active members of the Unitarian Church; in his opinion are considered the intellectual type and the children were all very good scholars in high school and college. He said the family has always been, what he considered, liberal bent. He said he had reference to the fact that their political philosophy has been more of a liberal nature in that they tend to favor liberal liberties for minority groups and the furtherance of the interests of labor. He stated although the SORENSENS were strong in their beliefs along these lines, one could never

She stated the SORENSENS, in her estimation, would be considered liberal in their thinking, in that they were very much interested in equal opportunities for all groups, particularly minority groups. She stated their political philosophies, she felt, favored the underprivileged and down-trodden, and they were strong in their feelings toward labor and were constantly interested in ways and means of bettering the laboring class's standard He stated that in all probability, one would of living. consider them idealistic in their thinking; that in her mind, there was no indication that any one of the SORENSENS were anything but loyal, patriotic citizens.

She advised the SORENSENS are people of good moral character, whose reputation and associations have never been questioned to her knowledge.

She stated the elder SORENSEN, Mr. C. A. SORENSEN, passed away a little over a year ago and Mrs. SORENSEN continues to reside at the family home on Park Street in Lincoln. She advised around 1945, Mrs. SORENSEN had since about 1948, she has experienced no

She stated Mrs. SORENSEN has, as indicated, for some time, lived a normal life, and is quite capable of handling her own affairs.

November 22, 1960, he was acquainted with THEODORE SORENSEN for a period of about 7 years, from 1944, until the time he graduated from the University Law School in June, 1951. He stated he had been closely associated with SORENSEN during a portion of this time, particularly during the summer of 1950 while the latter was working with boys groups under his supervision in the YMCA. He added SORENSEN, for some five years prior to 1950, had done supervisory and counseling work with boys groups, as well as handling administrative assignments as program director with the "Y" on a part-time basis.

stated SORENSEN was a particularly brilliant student, a very deep thinker, and one who possessed a definite philosophy about the enulity for all irrespective of their race or color. Stated this was brought out in the way he handled boys groups and he had handled his duties in this capacity very effectively.

ROLAND A. LUEDTKE, Attorney, 539 Stuart Building, Lincoln, Nebraska, advised November 22, 1960, he had been a classmate and a law partner of THEODORE SORENSEN in their moot court training at the University of Nebraska Law College and during this time had been closely associated. LUEDTKE stated SORENSEN was a very brilliant student who has a very good knowledge of law, and will, without a question, become a very capable attorney. He stated in his opidon SORENSEN was a very honest, sincere person, and one who was definitely for the "down trodden" and a "champion of the masses." He stated SORENSEN was, what he would describe, as an individualist, one who was not inclined to socialize, and one who is more interested in study and research of social problems.

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LUEDTKE advised SORENSEN, and other members of his family, were very active members of the Unitarian Church. He stated SORENSEN had, during the late 1940's, and during his senior year in Law School, done considerable youth work in the YMCA.

LUEDTKE stated, without hesitation, he would say SORENSEN was a person of the highest moral character, whose reputation, choice of associates, and loyalty to the Government were beyond question.

Assistant U. S. Attorney, Post Office Building, Lincoln, Nebraska, advised on November 22, 1960, that SORENSEN was an upper classman in Law School at the University of Nebraska at the time he was attending the Univers-He advised SORENSEN was a very brilliant law student and had graduated with honors in the spring of 1951. He stated SORENSEN had been Editor-In-Chief of the Nebraska Law Review during the school year 1950-51 and during this time, he had been on the staff of the Law Review with SORENSEN. He stated SORENSEN is a very sincere, honest, person, who in his opinion, beyond any doubt, is a conscientiously loyal American citizen. He stated, however, SORENSEN has very definite and strong feelings against racial prejudice and is firmly and openly opposed to practices or conduct based on racial segregation. He stated fundamentally, in his opinion, SORENSEN's political philosophy is that of a strong central Government, yet is dedicated to the welfare of the large mass of citizens. stated SORENSEN and his family are known to be people of good moral character and reputation, whose associations have never been questioned.

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821 Trust On November 23, 1960, Building, Lincoln, Nebraska, and formerly Chief Deputy of the Lancaster County Attorney's Office, Lincoln, advised TED SORENSEN had been one year ahead of him at the University of Nebraska Law School. He stated he has known the SORENSEN family for a number of years, and they are the intellectual type and each and every one of the children in the family were brilliant scholars. He stated also it was true of the whole family that they were strongly interested in the welfare of minority groups and have been very prohounced in their feelings in favor of the side of the oppressed, or under privileged. He stated the entire family, who are well known in Lincoln, are people of high moral character, who enjoy a good reputation, and have always associated with others of good reputation. He stated to his knowledge, there has hever been a question raised with regard to any member of the family's loyalty to the U. S. Government.

SA SHERMAN declined to be provoked by statements made by WILLOUGHBY and requested a prompt reply. WILLOUGHBY promised he would send a reply soon.

WILLOUGHBY has recently been described by an established source, as an "Obstreperous Pacifist" and his basic principle in life is to do "what he pleases, when he pleases and how he pleases."

the details of this report.

This office is in possession of considerable information concerning some of the activities of WILLOUGHBY in his position as a member of various pacifist organizations in Philadelphia. They shall be set forth below. They are not being set forth in the details of this report, inasmuch as these activities have taken place many years subsequent to his association with SORENSEN and there is no reason to believe that he is or has ever been a close associate of SORENSEN.

The 2/11/57 edition of the "Daily Worker;" page 1, column 2, contained an article entitled "Impartial Observers At Communist Party Convention Listed." The article lists a number of "impartial observers" who attended the National Convention of the Communist Party, USA, held 2/9/57 through 2/12/57 at Chateau Gardens, New York City. Included as one of the individuals who attended the Convention was GEORGE WILLOUGHBY, Director, Central Committee for Conscientious Objectors. The circumstances under which these men attended the Convention were explained in an article by Reverend A. J. MUSTE, Secretary Emeritus, Fellowship of Reconciliation, also from Philadelphia.

"The idea that it would be in the public interest and that the CP would be well advised to invite a number of non-Communist observers to its National Convention originated in conversations in which NORMAN THOMAS and I, among others, participated. The suggestion was communicated to CP people and we were notified soon afterwards that it was acceptable.

"The understanding was that we were free to ask any persons in civil liberties, peace and church circles, who were well known as non-Communists, and as people in basic disagreement at significant points with Communist philosophy and program and severely critical, for example, of recent Russian policy in Hungary; but who were also defenders of civil liberties for Communists, as well as others.

"It was understood that observers would not act as reporters during the Convention; but that they were

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completely free thereafter to speak and write individually, or as a group, about the proceedings of the Convention and, of course, about Communist theory and practice in general.

"It should be noted also that all observers are acting as individuals and were invited as individuals and in no sense as some sort of fraternal delegates from organizations with which they may be connected.

"The actual composition of the group is partly due to the accidental factor that at comparatively short notice, some people could be reached and were free from other imperative engagements at this time, whereas other deeply concerned people were not. I found a considerable number of cases also where individuals felt they should not undertake the risk of attack on their organizations which might follow from their presence as observers at a CP Convention. That this situation exists in this country seems to me utterly deplorable, contrary to the best American tradition, and an indication that many people have a mistaken idea of what democracy means and how to combat what is fallacious and eyil in Communism."

On 11/26/57, Philadelphia Confidential Informant advised that there was a meeting of the Philadelphia Third Camp Forum at 252 South 12th Street, Philadelphia, on 11/24/57. At this meeting there were 50 to 70 people in attendance.

on 5/23/57 advised that the Third Camp in Philadelphia was a mass organization in which several socialist and pacifist organizations could work and use as a sounding board for their political theories. It was not a membership organization, but rather a movement toward a third way between capitalism and communism. Among the speakers at the above forum were TOM NABRIED, DAVE DAVIS, JOE ROBERTS, and GEORGE WILLOUGHBY, of the Fellowship of Reconciliation.

On 11/21/57, advised that TOM NABRIED, DAVE DAVIS and JOE ROBERTS were members of the National

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Committee of the Communist Party, USA, and members of the District Committee of the Communist Party of Eastern Pennsylvania and Delaware. In his speech at the above forum, GEORGE WILLOUGHBY maintained that the Soviet Union was making no real strides toward peace.

The informant mentioned that he is a difficult person to deal with and is the type who would delight in withholding information from a government agency just to be ornery. The informant advised that WILLOUGHBY definitely is not disloyal to the United States.

It is to be noted that Willoughby's letter was received by this office on 11/29/60 and that he forwarded a copy to THEODORE SORENSEN.



All persons interviewed stated that the Sorensens are loyal citizens. In 1958, Mr. Sorensen's name and address was on the mailing list of the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Incorporated, a progressive liberal organization which succeeded the Southern Conference for Human Welfare. The latter organization has been cited by the Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities. Sorensen and his wife have been living apartysince 7/1/60, and papers are being-prepared-to-effect their legal separation on the grounds, of incompatibility. No moral issue involved. The informant stated it has devoted its efforts primarily to race relations, campaigning against discrimination and segrogation. According to the informant, the Communist Party was interested in infiltrating and controlling the Southern Conference for Euman Welfare but gave little indication of interest in the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Incorporated.

### THEODORE CHAIKIN SORENSEN

An applicant-type investigation was conducted concerning Mr. Sorensen in 1951. This memorandum summarizes the results of that investigation as well as the results of current inquiries conducted concerning him.

### I. BIOGRAPHICAL DATA

### Birth

Mr. Sorensen was born on May 8, 1928, at Lincoln, Nebraska.

### Education

Mr. Sorensen attended the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Nebraska, from September, 1945, to June, 1951, receiving a B.S. degree on June 6, 1949, and an LL.B. degree, magna cum laude, on June 4, 1951.

From February, 1950, to February, 1951, he was the editor of the "Law Review" at the University of Nebraska.

### Employment

During the Summer of 1950, Mr. Sorensen was employed as a boys' worker at the Young Men's Christian Association Camp at Lincoln, Nebraska.

For one week each in the Summers of 1949 and 1950 he was employed as a recreation leader by the American Friends Service Committee at Boone, Nebraska.

From January, 1951, to May, 1951, Mr. Sorensen was employed as a legislative analyst by Mr. O. H. Leibers, former Senator, Nebraska State Legislature, Lincoln, Nebraska.

He was employed as an attorney for a local civic group, Patrons Protest of Fares, at Lincoln, Nebraska, during June and July, 1951.

From July, 1951, to May, 1952, Mr. Sorensen was employed as an attorney for the Federal Security Agency, Washington, D. C.

He was employed as a professional staff assistant for the Joint Congressional Committee on Railroad Retirement, Washington, D. C., from June, 1952, to January, 1953.

On January 8, 1953, Mr. Sorensen became employed as an aide to President-elect John F. Kennedy in Washington, D. C. He is presently serving in the capacity of Special Counsel to President-elect Kennedy.

### Marital Status

Mr. Sorensen married the former Camilla Ruth Palmer at Lincoln, Nebraska. on September 8. 1949. They have three minor children, who reside with Mrs. Sorensen at 124 Dogwood Lane, McLean, Virginia. Since July, 1960, Mr. and Mrs. Sorensen have been living apart. Mr. Sorensen's attorney is presently preparing papers to effect their legal separation on the gounds of incompatibility. Mr. Sorensen is presently residing with his brother, Thomas, at 6631 31st Place, Northwest, Washington, D. C.

### II. RESULTS OF INVESTIGATIONS

#### Interviews

Professor, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Nebraska, was interviewed during the 1951 investigation. He said he had been acquainted with Mr. Sorensen and his family for several years. He noted that during the

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scholastic year 1950-51 Mr. Sorensen was editor of the "Law Review" of the University of Nebraska. He described Mr. Sorensen as a man of integrity who was completely honest. He considered Mr. Sorensen and the members of his family as yersons of excellent moral character and reputation. said, in his opinion, Mr. Sorensen was a militant liberal and was active in the Lincoln, Nebraska, chapter of the Americans for Democratic Action and the Fair Employment Practices Committee. He stated further that, in his opinion, Mr. Sorensen was idealistic and in some respects perhaps impractical. His reason for this observation was that Mr. Sorensen, prior to his graduation from the University of Nebraska, had written several law firms throughout the United States indicating an interest in employment but stating in his letters that he would not be interested in employment unless the law firm followed the principles as expressed by the Americans for Democratic Action. He stated it was his belief that Mr. Sorensen would outgrow that expression of immaturity and develop into an excellent lawyer. He stated he had no question whatever concerning the loyalty of any member of the Sorensen family.

Honorable Robert Van Pelt, Judge, United States District Court, Lincoln, Nebraska, was interviewed during the current inquiries. He said he has known the members of the Sorensen family since the mid-1920's. He stated Mr. Sorensen's father, Christian A. Sorensen, who died in August, 1951, had served as the Nebraska State Attorney General from 1928 to 1932 and for many years thereafter was a leading attorney at Lincoln, Nebraska, and was active in politics. He stated, in his opinion, that all members of the Sorensen family are of the intellectual type and all the children were very good scholars in high school and college. He always considered the members of the Sorensen family to be liberal. In that respect, he said he had reference to the fact that their political philosophies generally favor

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increased privileges and benefits for minority groups and laboring classes. He said that Mr. Sorensen and the members of his family are loyal Americans of the highest moral character who enjoy an excellent reputation and associate with people of good standing. He recommended Mr. Sorensen for a position of trust.

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He advised that Mr. Sorensen's mother, Mrs. Annis_
Sorensen, had, in the mid-1940's
handles her own affairs and carries on normal activities.
Assistant Professor of Law,
University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Nebraska, was interviewed
during the 1951 investigation. He said he was acquainted
with Mr. Sorensen during his, Mr. Sorensen's, attendance
at the University of Nebraskastated he was the
faculty adviser of the "Law Review" of the University of
Nebraska during the scholastic year 1950-51 and Mr. Sorensen
was the editor. He described Mr. Sorensen as very industrious,
completely honest and a person of good moral character. He
stated that Mr. Sorensen was very idealistic, being vitally
interested in the civil liberties aspect of law, particularly
with respect to protecting the rights of minorities and the
oppressed. He stated Mr. Sorensen's interest did not lie in
the field of torts or contracts but in constitutional law,
being particularly interested in that field of law with respect
to its application to minority groups. He stated he was
advised by Mr. Sorensen that he, Mr. Sorensen, felt that
Federal and state loyalty oath bills were unwise legislation.
Mr. Sorensen also advised that the Supreme Court of
the United States did not know the meaning of the 14th Amendment.
He stated he always found Mr. Sorensen to be very cooperative
with him and the other members of the faculty, but he was not
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liked by underclassmen who were selected to work on the "Law Review." He advised that he was informed by several underclassmen that they considered Mr. Sorensen egotistical, overbearing and obstinate. He was further advised by the underclassmen that Mr. Sorensen would never listen to any of their reasons as to why they wanted an article published in the "Law Review" unless the article dealt with civil liberties. pointed out that Mr. Sorensen did a good job as editor of the "Law Review" and he considered him a loyal American citizen.

Mr. Paul H. Douglas, United States Senator from Illinois, was interviewed during current inquiries in Washington, D. C. He said he was the Chairman of the Joint Committee on Railroad Retirement for approximately six months in 1952 and Mr. Sorensen worked on his staff. He said Mr. Sorensen was "superb" in every respect and his character, associates, reputation and loyalty are above reproach. He stated Mr. Sorensen is a very discreet person and possesses great powers of organization and has the gift of precise thinking. Mr. Sorensen, he said, is extremely competent and "brilliant almost above comparison." He said the United States will be most fortunate to obtain Mr. Sorensen's services in any capacity.

Mr. Meyer Feldman, Legislative Assistant in President-elect John F. Kennedy's Senate Office, Washington, D. C., was interviewed during the current inquiries. He said he has known Mr. Sorensen very well on both a social and professional basis for the past six years. He stated he has the highest regard for Mr. Sorensen's character, associates, reputation and loyalty. He also has a high respect for Mr. Sorensen's habits, morals and general ability. Mr. Sorensen, he said, does not smoke or drink alcoholic beverages. He is a high-type individual in every way. Mr. Feldman said he is presently preparing papers to effect a legal separation of Mr. and Mrs. Sorensen due to incompatibility which has resulted from Mr. Sorensen being absent so much from his home

during the past year or two. He said there is nothing whatever in the separation which would reflect unfavorably on Mr. Sorensen's morals. He pointed out that the Sorensens have no intention of being divorced since they are hoping for a reconciliation after a short separation. They have not resided together, he said, since approximately July 1, 1960.

Mr. Thomas W. Gerber, Washington, D. C., Correspondent for the Boston-Traveler Corporation, Boston, Massachusetts, was interviewed during the current inquiries. He stated he has known Mr. Sorensen on a professional and social basis for several years, noting that Mr. Sorensen and the Gerbers have spent several summer vacations together. He added that his wife and Mr. Sorensen's wife are very close friends. that there has been a strained feeling between himself and Mr. Sorensen in the last month, which was the result of Mr. Sorensen insisting that their professional and personal relationships be maintained separately, which he has found to be impossible. He said, however, he has the highest regard for Mr. Sorensen's character, loyalty, reputation, associates and ability. He further described Mr. Sorensen as an extremely intelligent and brilliant individual. Mr. Sorensen, he said, is a "tough and hard-minded" man who is very intent in achieving the goals he has set for himself, even though this may mean great personal sacrifices for himself. stated Mr. Sorensen is a very creative thinker and highly recommended him for a position of trust.

department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Chicago, Illinois, was interviewed during the current inquiries. He said he has known Mr. Sorensen since July, 1951. He described Mr. Sorensen as a thorough, competent attorney who showed good promise. He stated Mr. Sorensen has a questioning mind and writes very well. He said Mr. Sorensen is the type of individual who shows poise and decorum when dealing with prominent persons and is capable of expressing himself in adequate terms. He considers him a loyal citizen of excellent character and reputation and recommended him for a position of trust and confidence.

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Mr. Robert F. Kennedy; Campaign Manager for President-elect John F. Kennedy, was interviewed in Washington, D. C., during current inquiries. He said he has known Mr. Sorensen on a professional basis since 1953. He has had no social acquaintance with him. Mr. Kennedy remarked that he would give Mr. Sorensen's character, associates and loyalty the highest rating. He considers him a very competent and capable person and highly recommended him for a position of trust.

Mr. Pierre Emil George Salinger, Press Secretary for President-elect John F. Kennedy, was interviewed in Washington, D. C., during current inquiries. He said he has known Mr. Sorensen as a co-worker on President-elect Kennedy's staff since 1957. He said he has had no social contact with Mr. Sorensen. He described Mr. Sorensen as an extremely competent and capable person of excellent character, reputation and associates. He said Mr. Sorensen is a loyal American and highly recommended him for a position of trust and confidence.

Mr. Lawrence F. O'Brien, Assistant to President-elect John F. Kennedy, was interviewed in Washington, D. C., during current inquiries. He said he has known Mr. Sorensen since 1953; and from 1956 until 1958 he had considerable contact with Mr. Sorensen in Massachusetts. He said since April, 1960, he has been closely associated with Mr. Sorensen in the organizational end of President-elect John F. Kennedy's campaign. He said Mr. Sorensen is a person of outstanding ability whose character, associates, reputation and loyalty are above reproach. He recommended Mr. Sorensen for a position of trust.

Forty additional persons consisting of present and former co-workers, college professors, social and professional acquaintances and neighbors were interviewed. Those who knew Mr. Sorensen well said he is an extremely intelligent and capable person. They stated he is industrious, is of high integrity and is completely honest. It was also stated

he is interested in protecting the rights of minorities and the oppressed. All persons interviewed furnished favorable comments concerning Mr. Sorensen's character, reputation, associates and loyalty, and recommended him for a position of trust.

Information has been received from another Government agency that Mr. Sorensen in 1948 claimed exemption from combatant military service because he was a member of the Unitarian Church and due to his belief in God he was opposed to military service. He was willing to accept noncombatant service.

An informant, who has furnished reliable information in the past and who has requested anonymity, advised that the name "Theodore C. Sorensen, Box 181, Rt. 3, McLean, Virginia," was on the mailing list of the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Incorporated. The informant pointed out that many persons carried on this mailing list had not given their permission.

A confidential informant, who has furnished reliable information in the past and who has requested anonymity, advised that the Southern Educational Fund, Incorporated, was originally an adjunct of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare prior to its demise in 1948. This informant stated that the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Incorporated, continued as a separate and independent organization stressing the fact that it was nonpolitical in nature. The informant stated it has dévoted its efforts primarily to race relations, campaigning against discrimination and segregation: The informant said that the principal leaders of the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Incorporated, were the same as those of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare. According to the informant, the Communist Party was interested in infiltrating and controlling the Southern Conference for Human Welfare but gave little indication of interest in the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Incorporated.

The Southern Conference for Human Welfare has been cited by the House Committee on Un-American Activities as a communist-front organization.

The Communist Party has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The central files of the Federal Bureau of Investigation contain no pertinent information in addition to that set out elsewhere in this summary memorandum.



The young Senator from Massachusetts was on his way to make a speech at the University of Nebraska: He had just been defeated for the Democratic vice-presidential nomination, and he was not yet a nationally known figure. As he relaxed in the back seat of the auto, he fingered his tie; chewed gum absently and poured over his notes.

By his side sat his assistant, a young man not too long out of the University of Nebraska himself. As the car drew near the university, the assistant jabbed the Senator heartly in the ribs. "Presidential candidates do not chew gum," he muttered

in mock horror.

The Senator grinned, and got rid of the gum.
That was nearly five years ago: But the relationship even then between John F. Kennedy and Theodore Chaikin Sorensen was already an intimate, easy-going one based on mutual confidence, friendship and respect.

Sorensen, though only 33, has been at the President's elbow for eight years, ever since Kennedy's elevation to the Senate. And until January, 1960, the Kennedy-for-President campaign consisted of

Kennedy and Sorensen. Period:

Next to brother Bobby, Sorensen is probably the most important—and influential—man in the President's "kitchen cabinet." As a coordinator, speech writer and trusted general assistant with the purposely ambiguous title of "Special Counsel," he has a finger in nearly every Presidential pie, Yet Sorensen is so, little-known that most news stories even spell his name with the more familiar Swedish

"son," though he is of Danish-Russian extraction and it should be spelled with the Danish "sen."

Sorensen, more than any other White Houses advisor, is the "mystery man" of the administration. A great number of high officials and miscellaneous experts have direct and frequent access to the President, plus a lot of White House "special assistants." But since some of these were found wanting in the Cuban fiasco, Kennedy has been turning finereasingly inward to the men who helped him in other times of great personal challenge. Prominent in this tight little clump of trusted allies is Sorensen.

Shortly after the Cuban affair, President Kennedy described Sorensen to me as "one of my very key men. He gets the work done, he is extremely bright and I have confidence in him. As my own responsibilities grow, so do his."

Kennedy added that although Sorensen may branch out into foreign affairs occasionally, his

major concern is in domestic matters.

In the first months of the New Frontier, Sorensen directed the formulation of some 20 messages and draft bills which outlined the President's program on everything from housing to education. He had a hand in drafting the inaugural address, coordinated budget problems with Kennedy ideas, advised on top-level job appointments, wrote speeches and press conference statements.

Sorensen's operations are strictly in the "Ivory. Tower" realm of ideas and policy. He does not get into the machinery of carrying out a project once it is decided upon in the White House. His success in voicing—and helping form—Presidential policy is largely due to the fact that, through long associate

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tion, he and the President have come to think very much alike. "It's almost spooky," one associate has commented.

Both Kennedy and Sorensen have an immense mental capacity—an intellectualism balanced by good, hard, practical political sense—and large reservoirs of energy. They both are calm, cool operators with a talent for concentration. And they have the same quick, dry wit. Sorensen has provided the President with some of his best quips. Both often talk with a finger poking the air, or an upturned palm gesturing wildly. And Sorensen even likes touch football.

Kennedy has made it clear, however, Sorensen is not his alter ego, though he admits Sorensen, McGeorge Bundy (in charge of national security matters) and Kenneth O'Donnell (appointments secretary) probably know more about what's cooking in White House pots than any other aides.

Sorensen is the link between President Kennedy's thoughts and their appearance on paper. His thorough research was the basis for the Pulitzer prize-winning book, Profiles in Courage. He drafted about two-thirds of all Kennedy's speeches during the Presidential campaign. By now a brief conversation between the two is enough to transfuse a Kennedy thought into a Sorensen speech.

It is not surprising that Sorensen, a man who is more at home with words than with people, should derive his chief amusement from words. He is a big fan of word-guessing games, and he writes poetry. "It's bad poetry," he insists. Actually, it's pretty good doggerel. Here's a sample, written onfive minutes' notice, at a Cabinet breakfast:

All hail the men of new frontiers
The hardy Kennedy pioneers—
The Georgia cracker known as Rusk;
The courtly Hodges, never brusk;
Orville Freeman, farmers' friend;
To Stu Udall, a sleeping bag lend;
Send racy books to Edward Day;
Send lazy crooks to Bobby K;
Take health needs to Abe Ribicoff;
It's Dillon's fault if your check book's off;
McNamara's Ford is in his past;
Art Goldberg's not least, 'tho mentioned last.

Another Sorensen talent is piano-playing; he plays by ear, mostly slow, sentimental, old classics.

Like the President's brother, Sorensen is a lawyer who reached his present eminence without bothering to get the experience of practicing law. His title of "Counsel" is misleading. Legal chores do come under his thumb, but they are hardly his chief preoccupation.

Sorensen would rather play down his role as a writer of speeches and messages. "More important," he says, "is the decision-making which must go into every speech and message." In the process of that decision-making, sometimes as many as 12 agencies or departments must be consulted and coordinated before a major program can be presented. Sorensen goes about this in the same methodical, well-ordered fashion he does everything else. Here, briefly, is how one Kennedy-bill was created:

Sorensen called a meeting of about 40-top-level

representatives, including Cabinet members, of departments involved. They reviewed working papers, hassled over major inter-department conflicts, brought up budget and other problems. Next came departmental meetings on specific problems, then talks with the President to check policy.

When the message was in nearly final form, Kennedy and Sorensen went over the whole-package with the top department officials. The President raised two questions and called for more information. Sorensen held more meetings to iron out these questions, wrote a "final" memo for the President, then met again with the President and department heads to put the bill-in final form.

Sorensen began writing the bill on a Thursday night. Copies of the first draft were ready for heads of all departments involved by 6 p.m. Friday. Each department head jotted down his last suggestions and returned his copy Monday morning.

Sorensen screened these—and made up a memo for the President on two basic disagreements.

Monday afternoon the President went over the whole message carefully, reworked it in several places, resolved the disagreements. Finally Sorensen took it back to his office and began turning it out in final form. It went out to the press, page by page, Monday evening. It was sent up to Congress Tuesday noon. The bill had been written in two and a half weeks.

Sorensen, however, says that a bill often takes longer than that. "The last little corner to be buttoned down by the President sometimes causes ī

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a delay and we have to start all over," he says. "Basic decisions are all made by the President."

Sorensen will try to give the impression that he is not a politician. "I have devoted years to serving the President, including politics at times. But I am not regarded as a practicing politician and I don't expect I ever will be," he says.

This, to say the least, is being over-modest. Sorensen, for all his bookish bent, is one of the best political operators in the business. Before and during the campaign, he traveled with Kennedy into nearly every state; he recruited allies, he plotted strategy, he debated policy.

Vice-President Lyndon Johnson noted wryly: "He's certainly talented. I would not hesitate to trust any political or intellectual operation to him."

Said Senator Stuart Symington, similarly disappointed in Presidential ambitions: "Sorensen is a brilliant organizational genius."

Sorensen's father, C. A. Sorensen, was a leader of the midwestern progressive Republican wing, headed by the late Senator George Norris of Nebraska. From 1928 to 1932, he was Nebraska's attorney general, a fighting liberal who battled conservatives to set up a unicameral legislature and drafted a law to set up rural electrification districts. Sorensen says his idols are his father, President Kennedy and Norris. All three, he feels, dedicated themselves to the national interest and had the courage to fight for what they believed, regardless of odds, pressures or popularity.

In politics; as in-business, there is a fine line between crisp efficiency and ruthless arrogance. This, perhaps, is the point on which Sorensen ad-

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mirers and Sorensen critics part ways. For the serious-minded, self-disciplined and work-oriented Sorensen does not always have time for the social pleasantries most people expect. One longtime acquaintance remarked, "Ted doesn't seem to need other people around him. I have lunch with him once every month or so, and I guess I'm as close to him as anybody,"

Another, a former university classmate of Sorensen's, says that Sorensen always kept to himself and didn't socialize much during his college years. "It was almost as though he hated to waste time."

Sorensen's office is typical of the man—clean, uncluttered, businesslike, unassuming. It is a simple room, bare of obvious prestige symbols such as extra-thick carpets and wood paneling. It is in the corner of the White House west wing, several doors from the President's office. It does not even boast a specially autographed portrait of the President, as most offices in the White House do, although hung over the fireplace is a Karsh color portrait of President and Mrs. Kennedy, one of the reproductions from the popular American Weekly cover.

Sorensen's modest tastes extend to his personal life as well. True, his long hours and dedication to the job do not give him much free time for that personal life. In fact, there is a considerable group which doubts that Sorensen ever does relax.

One associate put it this way: "Ted relaxes in ways most of us would never think of—he creates new approaches to old problems."

Sorensen does not dance. He drinks only mod-

erately. His chief physical exercise these busy days comes from a fast game of ping-pong or from weekend softball games with his three boys, Eric, eight; Stephen, seven, and Phillip, six.

Eric, is already showing signs of the same liking for words which has served his father so well. One day Sorensen brought his three boys to the White House to peek into the President's office (the boss wasn't in). The boys were so impressed that they tiptoed around the room and talked in whispers. Afterward, Eric sat in pop's office and pecked out a letter on his typewriter.

It went: "Dear Mr. President: I like the White House. It is a neat place. You have nice people there. I would like to live in it some day."

The next day Sorensen couldn't resist showing this to Kennedy. The President chuckled, and where Eric had written "I like the White House," he added, "So do I." Where Eric said "I would like to live in it some day," the President scrawled, "Sorry, Eric, you'll have to wait your turn."

Sorensen grew up in Lincoln, Nebraska, and was graduated from the University of Nebraska law school in 1951. He copped all the scholastic honors on the way: Phi Beta Kappa, Law Review editorship and top class grades.

After graduation he became an attorney for the Federal Security Agency, later joined the staff of the joint committee on railroad retirement, headed by Senator Paul Douglas.

When the committee disbanded, Sorensen landed, a job, on Douglas' strong recommendation, with the newly elected Senator from Massachusetts... and by a chance quirk of fate stepped into history.

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SORENSEN resembles Kennedy in so many ways it's "spooky." Both are brilliant, tireless, witty and like touch football. But Ted and his wife Camilla (below) are one up on the President in children.

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

law was focused on constitutional law, particularly in its application to minority groups. In this respect, one law faculty member reported in 1960 that during his attendance at the University of Nebraska, Mr. Sorensen advised him that he felt Federal and state loyalty oath bills were unwise legislation. He also expressed his personal belief that the Supreme Court failed to grasp the meaning of the 14th Amendment. This professor also stated that while Mr. Sorensen was serving as editor of the "Law Review," from February, 1950, to February, 1951, he was disliked by a number of underclassmen who worked with him. They considered him egotistical, overbearing and obstinate. This feeling, according to the faculty member, was partially based on Mr. Sorensen's refusal to accept articles for the "Law Review" unless they dealt with civil libertles.

All persons interviewed during these investigations commented favorably on Mr. Sorensen's character, reputation, associates and loyalty, and all recommended him for a position of trust.

# Close Relatives of Mr. Sorensen:

Mr. Sorensen's father, who is deceased, served as the Nebraska State Attorney General from 1928 to 1932 and for many years thereafter was a leading attorney at Lincoln, Nebraska. Other close relatives include a sister and three brothers, one of whom, Thomas C. Sorensen, is currently employed by the United States Information Agency, Washington, D. C.

A confidential informant, who has furnished reliable information in the past and who has requested anonymity, advised that the Southern Educational Fund, Incorporated, was originally an adjunct of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare prior to the demise of this latter organization in 1948. The Communist Party has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The following information was furnished to the FBI by sources who have furnished reliable information in the past and who have requested anonymity.

A source advised in 1960 he was told that Herbert Jehle, an Executive Board Member of the Washington Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy, made a statement that he had been asked by Mr. Sorensen to recommend someone to President-elect Kennedy's Administration as an appointee to a White House Committee dealing with disarmament. Mr. Jehle furnished the name of Dean Rusk to Mr. Sorensen and described Mr. Rusk as a pacifist who would be a good man in the Department of State because he felt he would work toward the same end as the Washington Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy.

In describing the Washington Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy, another source advised it was organized in February, 1958, and has as its aims and purposes the cessation of nuclear weapons testing with adequate inspection; international control of the manufacture, use and production of nuclear weapons and guided missiles; and general disarmament. identified himself in the past as a member of the Communist Party, described the Washington Committee's Executive Board as being composed of individuals "some far to the left, some neutral, and some socialist." The source said the only active people in the organization as of March, 1960, were "the militant left and the socialists." plus a few individuals attracted by the question of fallout.

During the 1951 investigation of Mr. Sorensen, a member of the law faculty of the University of Nebraska stated that prior to his graduation, Mr. Sorensen had written several law firms throughout the United States indicating an interest in employment but only if these firms followed the principles as expressed by the Americans for Democratic Action. An article which appeared on page 22 of the May 4, 1961, issue of the "New York Journal-American" identified Theodore C. Sorensen as one of the members of the Americans for Democratic Action holding a high position in the Federal Government.

The central files of the FBI contain no pertinent information in addition to that set out in this summary memorandum.

Reference is made to my memorandum dated 8/27/00 m aptioned matter. This memorandum pointed out a refutation would be repared to the charge that Attorney General Kennedy did not ask the BI to have a report in the steel matter completed the next morning. The Director requested that the refutation be prepared for his approval.

Dependent upon the exact terminology used in the book to its interview of reporters by FBI Agents the night of April 11, 1962, we will issue a statement as follows:

"The FBI was instructed at 8:00 p.m., April 11, 1962, to conduct the interviews in question and furnish the results to the Department of Justice by 7:00 a.m., April 12, 1962. The FBI conducted the requested interviews and furnished the results as requested by 7:00 a.m., April 12, 1962. The above facts were brought to the attention of Theodore Sorensen prior to publication of his book, 'Kennedy.' "

Since we do not know precisely how Sorensen will relate the circumstances leading to the night interviews by the FBI, it may be necessary to expand the above statement to adequately refute Bobby Kennedy's denial of the chain of events.

REQUEST/ KENNEDY SUBJECT: BOOK BY THEODORE SORENSEN FORMER SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO PRESIDENT KENNEDY -A' memorandum from Mr. Mohr to Mr. DeLoach dated 8-18-65, pointed out that Mr. Mohr had received a letter from SA William H. Carpenter, Resident Agent at Hyannis, Massachusetts, to the effect that he had been told by Theodore Sorensen that his book, "Kennedy," is due out in October, 1965, (Excerpts from this book are being serialized in "Look" Magazine currently) and will explain that the night interviews by the FBI in the steel controversy in 1962 were strictly decisions made by the FBI. Carpenter tried to dissuade Sorensen by stating that the President wanted the complete report on his desk the next morning at seven. Sorensen stated this was not the truth, that Bobby Kennedy had not asked to have the FBI report completed the next morning. Sorensen has apparently checked with Robert Kennedy and Kennedy has agreed that Sorensen's version is correct. Carpenter also indicated that he did not think Sorensen would change the story as he plans to tell its. This is entirely erroneous as Bob Kennedy did request the results of the interviews; in question be furnished to him the next morning so he could furnish them to the President. The facts in this matter are that at 5:30 p.m. on the afternoon of 4-11-62, then Attorney General Kennedy contacted former Assistant Director Evans and requested the Bureau to interview the President of Bethlehem Steel and certain reporters to whom he had talked the previous day as soon as it was possible to do so. Subsequent, to the initial request, at 8 p. m., then Deputy Attorney General Katzenbach recontacted 🗷 Evans, and stated that he and the Attorney General had been discussing this matter. In a discussion with Attorney General Kennedy on 4-13-62, he advised Evans that any criticism arising out of this matter was his responsibility and he was perfectly willing to accept it. In addition, on the same date Kennedy telephonically contacted the Director to express thanks for the manner in which the Bureau attacked the steel problem and stated that the Bureau had done a good job. He advised that he did not think there was any question but that the efforts made by everyone in the Bureau had played a major role in the rescinding of contemplated steel price increases.

In view of the foregoing it is difficult to understand how Kennedy can now deny that he had requested that this matter receive expeditious attention and that he be furnished the results early on the next morning. It is to be noted, of course, that the serialized portions of Sorensen's book as they are published in Look Magazine have caused several prominent individuals mentioned therein to challenge the accuracy of statements made against them.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that SA William Carpenter, Resident Agent at Hyannis, Massachusetts, recontact Sorensen and give him the full details concerning the requested investigation and the facts which point out that the Attorney General did in fact order such an investigation and did request the results early on the following morning. At this time Sorensen can be advised that he may wish to further check the accuracy of the statements with Kennedy. It might also be pointed out to Sorensen that should this incident be published in its inaccurate form the Bureau will have no hesitancy in issuing a public statement pointing out its fallaciousness.

Reference is made to Jones to DeLoach memo, 8-20-65, which relates to Sorensen's book, "Kennedy," which is due to be published next October, 1965. In its present form the book claims that the night interviews by the FBI in the 1962 steel controversy were the sole responsibility of the Bureau. Sorensen told SA Carpenter of Hyannis, Massachusetts, that he had gotten his version of the steel controversy from Bobby Kennedy.

It was recommended and approved that SA Carpenter recontact. Sorensen and give him the complete details concerning the requested steel investigation on the night of 4-11-62 and that should the steel incident be published in its present erroneous form the FBI would have no recourse but to make a public statement pointing out the true facts.

SAC Handley of Boston advised that Carpenter has recontacted Sorensen and very carefully pointed out the exact sequence of events concerning the steel interviews. Sorensen said that he appreciated having these facts and that he wished he had checked personally with the FBI. Sorensen said obviously these facts did not mesh with the facts he had learned from Bobby Kennedy and Sorensen immediately contacted his Publishers, Harper and Row, to see if changes could still be made in the copy. Sorensen said he had written this portion of the book last June and it was possible that it is now too late to make a change. Sorensen told Carpenter that his Publishers had promised to make a "sincere effort" to make the change, that they have to contact the firm that is actually doing the printing and they will let him know in the immediate future what can be done about the problem.

In this regard. Sorensen referred to the FBI's role in interviewing certain reporters during the late evening and early morning hours. He pointed out that, "Unfortunately, two overzealous agents, misunderstanding either their role of their instructions, called and visited one of the reporters in the middle of the night to check his story..." Sorensen mentions the press attitude and states, "As always, neither of the Kennedys (Robert or Jack) would publicly blame the career men responsible, but one of Robert Kennedy's deputies had in fact specified to the FBI that all those to be interviewed should be telephoned at their place of business, not their homes, for an appointment in the usual hours. No orders were ever given to awaken anyone or to obtain the information by 7 a.m., and neither Kennedy knew about the calls until the next day." The Director has noted with regard to this observation, "I never heard of this angle before. H." As pointed out in my memorandum to you (Mr. Delioach); dated 8-20-65, Sorensen's defense of Bob Kennedy is entirely erroneous as Bob Kennedy did request the results of the interviews in question be furnished to him the next morning so he could furnish them to the President. Katzenbach wanted the results of the interviews before that meeting and it was arranged that Evans would call Katzenbach at his home about 7 the following morning and furnish him the desired information. This was done. As further evidence that Kennedy was fully cognizant of the request for the information to be made available on the morning of 4-12-62, Kennedy called Evans from the White House shortly after 9 a.m. on 4-12-62 requesting a memorandum as to the results of the interviews conducted the previous evening. Further, Attorney General Kennedy advised Evans on 4-13-62 that any criticism arising out of the matter was his responsibility and he was perfectly willing to accept it. Later on the same day he contacted the Director to express thanks for the manner in which the Bureau attacked the steel problem and stated that the Bureau had done a good job.

The fact that Sorensen was going to handle the matter in his book the way he did came to our attention in August. The Director approved having our Resident Agent at Hyannis, Massachusetts, contact Sorensen and give him the full details concerning the requested interviews and the facts, pointing out that the Attorney General did, in fact, order such an interview and requested the results early the following morning. As a result of the contact with Sorensen, he promised he would correct the record in the next edition of his book. The first edition was apparently in the hands of the printers.

In regard to this matter, the Attorney General discussed Sorensen's book with you on 9-29-65, along with other matters and stated he exceedingly regretted the fact that Sorensen was completely erroneous in referring to the FBI's role in the steel controversy. He stated Sorensen's point that the FBI had been instructed to conduct interviews with reporters during business hours and not thereafter was absolutely false, as well as Sorensen's reference to "two overzealous agents." Katzenbach stated he wanted it clearly understood that the FBI's handling of this matter was strictly his responsibility and that he had called Evans after business hours and had told Evans to obtain information from reporters and get it back to him at an early hour the following morning so that he could brief the Attorney General and the President, You (Mr. DeLoach) pointed out to him that the record certainly needed to be straightened out. Katzenbach indicated he intends discussing the matter with Sorensen and concluded by stating that he hoped that any answers to inquiries the FBI might give in this matter would be coordinated with him so that there would be no conflicting statements between the Department and the FBI. You told him, of course, that we would do this as the record did badly need straightening out.

The most direct and dangerous challenge by a powerful private interest group to President Kennedy's antiinflation efforts—and to the President's office and trust-came from the steel industry in 1962.

His immediate concern in 1961 was an automatic increase in steel wages scheduled to take place on Oct. 1. An analysis by the Council of Economic Advisers showed that the Oct. 1 step was within the range of rising produc-tivity and could be absorbed without a price increase.

On Sept. 6 the President wrote an open letter to the presidents of the 12 largest steel companies, urging that prices not be increased on Oct. 1 or thereafter.

Some of the replies were thoughtful, some were rude, none made any prom-

ises—but prices were not raised.

A week later the President wrote an old friend, President David McDonald of the steelworkers, emphasizing the need in 1962 for a steel-labor settlement "within the limits of advances in productivity and price stability . . . in

the interests of all of the American people."

On Jan. 23, 1962, Kennedy met privately with Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg, U.S. Steel Chairman Roger Blough and McDonald at the White House howing also met with White House, having also met with Blough the previous September.

In all these talks both the President and Goldberg emphasized their interest in a settlement which would make a price rise unnecessary. More specifically, President Kennedy's considerable influence with the union and the good offices of the secretary of labor were offered as a means of helping achieve such a settlement if both sides were agreeable.

No formal pledge from the industry to hold prices steady, if the President succeeded, was requested, and none was forthcoming.

While Roger Blough would later claim that all kinds of public hints about a pending price rise had been made—hints which no one else in either industry or the press seemed to have grasped—he and other industry officials in direct contact with the administration made no use of those opportunities to inform the President of such an action.

On the contrary, the industry volun-tarily made itself party to what was in effect\_a\_tripartite\_transaction\_clearly

based on the President's premise that steel price increases were undesirable and, unless necessitated by a wage increase exceeding productivity increases, not to be attempted.

#### Goldberg Got Dealings Started in February

Nor was it a passive acceptance of minimal help. Goldberg did not even talk to McDonald until R. Conrad Cooper (the industry's chief negotiator) had advised him, after talking with his colleagues in the industry, that they were agreeable.

A series of wires, calls and visits from the secretary on behalf of the President helped to get the negotiations started several months early in February and helped persuade McDonald to accept the industry's most modest

settlement in postwar history.

"They did it in part," concluded the President later, "because I said that we could not afford another inflationary spiral, that it would affect our competitive position abroad—so they signed up."

The agreement provided for no general increase in wage rates at all, and fringe benefit improvements costing about 10 cents an hour, or 2.5 percent.

On Tuesday, April 10, the last major contract having been signed, the President was surprised to note that his appointment, calendar included a 5:45 p.m. appointment for Roger Blough. Ken O'Donnell said Blough had re-quested it that afternoon. Goldberg said he had no idea what Blough might have in mind but agreed to stand by in his office.

What Blough had in mind was soon clear. Seated on the sofa next to the President's rocking chair, he handed him U.S. Steel's mimeographed press release announcing a \$6-a-ton price increase; four times the cost of the new labor settlement.

The President was stunned. He felt that his whole fight against inflation,

If the industry in which he had made his greatest effort for stability, an industry plagued by foreign competition and under-utilization, could make a mockery of his plea for self-restraint in the national interest, then every indus-

would thereafter feel free to defy him. Above all, he felt duped. The man sitting across from him had personally, knowingly accepted his help in securing from the workers a contract that would not lead to an increase in prices. The prestige and powers of the presidency had been used to help persuade the steelworkers to accept less from the companies in the interest of price stability, and now the contract had no sooner been signed than the industry was announcing a large, across-the-board price increase for all products.

#### Question of 'Good Faith' Involved, President Said

"The question of good faith was involved," as the President said later. "The unions could have rightfully felt that they had been misled"—and no other union would ever listen to his plea for self-discipline again.

"I think you're making a mistake," he coldly told Blough, who would not learn until later the enormity of his mistake.

The President's next scheduled appointment was a review of questions for the next day's press conference—an extra session, before the usual breakfast, which Assistant Press Secretary Andrew Hatcher had scheduled in Pierre Salinger's absence.

Hatcher, Walter Heller, McGeorge Bundy and I were waiting for this meeting in Ken O'Donnell's office outside the President's door. When Blough left, the President asked us to come in and told us the news. His own anger was rising.

"My father always told me," he said, recalling the ambassador's brief service in the steel industry and his fight with its leaders while on the maritime board, "that steel men were sons of bitches, but I never realized till now how right he was."

A widely repeated story from Newsweek and the New York Times said that the President, in our first conference after the Blough visit, had quoted his father as saying "all businessmen" were sons-of-bitches. Having been one of those whom the President addressed, I could not be clearer in my recollection that he was talking only about the steel industry. But the erroneous story became a cause celebre in the business community.

Little time was spent on recriminations. A price rise at that time and in that context was not only an economic setback—it was an affront to the office of the presidency and to the man who held it.

"If I had failed to get a rescission," he said later, "that would have been an awful setback to the office of the presidency."

No president should have accepted it without a fight; no one could have thought that John Kennedy would. "U.S. Steel," one of those present would remark later, "picked the wrong President to double-cross."

The first question the President asked us was: "What can we do about

Our primary hope was to create a climate that would discourage other companies from joining in the increase and encourage U.S. Steel to rescind. We recognized that market pressures would force the price leaders to back down if only one or two important companies refused to go along with the increase.

Our primary obligation was to ascertain whether the ability of a powerful company to announce an unjustifiable price increase, with confidence that it could be sustained despite all the obvious economic pressures against it, reflected a violation of the laws against monopoly.

#### Justice Department Initiated an Inquiry

The Defense Department sought to meet its obligation to the taxpayers to purchase steel at the lowest available price. Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara directed that the use of alternative materials would be studied; and "where possible, procurement of steel for defense production shall be shifted to those companies which have not increased prices."

The Justice Department sought to meet its obligation to law enforcement by initiating an inquiry as to whether a series of simultaneous and identical price increases, justified neither by cost nor by demand, and undertaken by companies in totally different financial positions, reflected normal free market behavior, coincidence; collusion or monopoly.

One of the items that particularly interested the trust-busters in April 1962 was the statement by Bethlehem President Edmund Martin, made shortly before the Blough announcement, that this was no time to raise prices. Bethlehem was the first to join U.S. Steer in the increase.

Was this evidence of conspiracy, monopoly power, deliberate ceceit or, as claimed, a misquotation? The antitrust division had an obligation to find

Federal Bureau of Investigation agents, in their normal role as investigators and fact-finders for all divisions of the department, interviewed not only all company officials (U. S. Steel's general counsel told them he and his associates were "too busy" to talk to them then) but also the three reporters who had covered the Bethlehem meeting (all of whom stood by their stories).

Unfortunately, two overzealous agents; misunderstanding either their role or their instructions, called and visited one of the reporters in the middle of the night to check his story and telephoned another who put them loff. The latter, as well as the third reporter, were interviewed at their offices, although subsequent reports talked of "state security police" swooping down unannounced to grill all three in their beds.

#### Neither of Kennedys Would Blame Career Men

As always, neither of the Kennedys would publicly blame the career men responsible, but one of Robert Kennedy's deputies had in fact specified to the FBI that all those to be interviewed should be telephoned at their place of business, not their homes, for an appointment in the usual hours. No orders were ever given to awaken anyone or to obtain the information by 7 a.m., and neither Kennedy knew about the calls until the next day.

But while the public barrage continued, the President was exploring private avenues of persuasion as well.

He had early in the fight asked all those in his administration with business ties—including Luther Hodges, Edward Gudeman, Heller, McNamara, Roswell Gilpatric, Henry Fowler, Douglas Dillon, Goldberg, Robert Roosa and others—to place calls to any contacts they had among steel companies still holding the price line, among steel companies who might consider rescinding, among steel bankers and steel buyers and steel lawyers.

No threats were made, no inducements were offered, but the nation's interest in price stability and a better balance of payments was made clear, and reliable channels of communication between the government and the steel companies were established.

There was little time, v ry little time. When steel prices had last been

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increased in 1958, all the major compahies had been in line two days after the first company's announcement.

The rush of other companies to join U.S. Steel on Wednesday cast gloom over the possibility we had discussed the previous night of bringing U.S. Steel back by persuading the others to hold fast.

Many of the hopes for this divide-andconquer strategy focused on the Inland Steel Company of Chicago. Inland's president, Joseph Block, was regarded as an "industry statesman" and served on the President's Labor-Management Advisory Committee. Block was in Japan, but a series of administration calls reached other Inland officials.

Recognizing the national interest in preventing a worsening in balance of payments and inflation, and recognizing the administration's role in helping obtain a noninflationary labor settlement, Inland agreed that April 1962 was no time to be raising prices, and announced Friday morning that it would not.

Promptly the President called another friend, Edgar Kaiser of Kaiser Steel, and that much smaller company made a similar announcement. Still another company, Colorado Fuel & Iron, announced that it would consider at most only selective price increases on some items in the future.

A note of optimism entered our Friday meeting in the Cabinet room. The companies announcing no price raise, along with an as yet uncertain holdout, Armco, probably had more than 15 percent of the industry's capacity and could, by holding out, increase it to no more than 25 percent "But," said Robert McNamara, on the basis of his days with Ford, "none of the others will be willing to give up any part of that additional 10 percent, and they'll all have to come down."

By lunch time on Friday, the holdouts in the industry had prevailed. Bethlehem Steel, the nation's second largest producer, a rival of Inland's in Midwest markets and of Kaiser's on the West Coast, and a major Defense Department contractor, had rescinded its increase.

Late that Friday afternoon a secretary from the press office placed a scrap torn from the wire service ticker in front of me:

Bulletin\_New\_York\_(AP)—United

Stars Steel Corporation rescinded today the steel price increase it initiated Tuesday.

Roughly 72 hours had passed since Roger Blough's visit to the White House —72 hours in which nearly every waking moment of the President, regardless of whether he was toasting the visiting Shah and Empress of Iran, preparing for his press conference and a trip, hosting the congressional reception or fulfilling a dozen other duties, had been spent in either meditation or action on how best to preserve his purpose and policies in this struggle.

While steel 1962 was the key battle in John Kennedy's war on inflation, his victory was less a victory against Big Steel than a victory for the American presidency.

Magnanimous in victory, always, the President promptly turned his attention to the problems of reconciliation. He permitted no gloating by any administration spokesman and no talk of retribution.

He made a special effort to be gradicious to Roger Blough, toward whom he had no trace of bitterness. He invited him to the White House a few days later, and frequently thereafter, to confer on business confidence, and he also asked Blough to head a business council presidential advisory committee on balance of payments problems.

THEODORE CHSORENSEN - Summary

Theodore Chaikin Sorensen, who was born on May 8, 1928, at Lincoln, Nebraska, was the subject of background-type inquiries conducted by the FBI in 1951 and 1960. Attached is a summary memorandum dated December 1, 1960, setting forth the results of those inquiries.

Sorensen is the author of the book about President Kennedy which was released in the late Summer of 1965; entitled "Kennedy."

In an article appearing in the October 16, 1967, issue of "Saturday Review," Sorensen, editor-at-large of the publication, called for an indefinite and unconditional suspension of U.S. air raids on North Vietnam "to test Hanoi's sincerity and see how it will reciprocate." Sorensen said the incessant raids on North Vietnam were "increasing an embittered n militancy in the North and thus prolonging the war! and costing more American lives. The bombing must be halted, Sorensen said, since "it can no longer be regarded as an indispensable means of securing our forces and objectives in the South."

In June, 1968, following the assassination of Senator Kennedy, Sorensen, who had been a key aide to the late Senator, predicted that most Rof the Presidential delegates who had backed Kennedy would remain uncommitted until the Democratic convention. Be indicated that the Kennedy organization would not support either Vice President Humphrey or Senator Eugene McCarthy unless they moved in the direction of these Kennedy positions: "a more intensive and genuine search for a negotiated settlement in Vietnam"; a commitment to a policy of "no more Vietnams" and recognition that the U. S. was not the world's policeman; commitments to an end of racial bias and violence; an emphasis on "jobs instead of handouts."

In the New York Democratic primary on June 18, 1968, while the Kennedy group won 26 delegates pledged to support his ideal's, Kennedy aide, Sorensen, running for a delegate position from Manhattan's East Side, lost to a McCarthy delegate.

FBI files reveal that in the recent past Sorensen has been in touch with certain Soviet officials in Washington, D. C., with respect to East-West trade matters. He reportedly authored an article in the April, 1968, issue of "Foreign Affairs" entitled "Why We Should Trade With The Soviets."

Sorensen reportedly was one of the speakers at a convention held at the Shoreham Hotel on May 21 - 22, 1968, attended by some 200 people which was sponsored by Business Executives Move for Vietnam Peace.

The fingerprint files of the Identification Division of the FBI contain no arrest data identifiable with captioned individual based upon background information submitted in connection with this name check request.



The following analysis of the below listed files and serials concerning requester, Theodore C. Sorensen, is furnished for the information of the Privacy Unit:

Bufile 164-3930-24, 77-49931, and 123-11516-4 need no corrections or amendments. It should be noted, however, that 123-11516-4 contains the requester's name, because it was indexed from the synopsis. There appears no justification whatever for that indexing. Concerning Bufile 62-48771-175, the last two sentences of this memorandum should be excised as they do not pertain to the requester, but only furnish an opinion of the author of the memorandum.

The following comments concern Bufile 161-29:

1. In serial 26, page 1, the synopsis, information concerning the credit checks and security file reviews, has been omitted. This information is included in the details of this report where it is being furnished to the requester. This needs to be made consistent. On page 6 of this report concerning the interview of Thomas Gerber, the 2nd paragraph of his interview with proper excising should be included because it contains the information about requester "running around" which has been left in the synopsis. It is believed that this can be properly excised.

2. Page 10 of serial 36, The White House summary includes the names of the agencies from whom no information was obtained. Since the names of these agencies were reported in other serials which are being furnished to the requester, they should be left in The White House summary. Also on page 10, the 1st paragraph under miscellaneous concerns the military service records of the requester, which has also been already furnished to the requester. It should be included.

3. Serial 43 should not be furnished to the requester as it deals only with his children and their babysitter and is, therefore, not within the scope of the request.

The letter dated 12-23-63, which is an unrecorded serial just before serial 45 should have included Mr. Sorensen's last name in paragraph 1.

8. Serial 51 should be excised entirely for the same reasons as noted above concerning the FBI agent's personal contacts with the requester and comments thereafter; it should also be excised because it does not pertain to the requester, but to conversation held with the Attorney General concerning an issue appearing in the requester's book.

9. Serial 52 should have furnished to the requester only paragraph 3 which retains an interview with the requester and the SAC of the Boston Office who is now deceased. The other material in this serial is not within the scope of the request.

Serial 53 should be excised entirely because it contains for SA' K-5 information from the FBI agent in Hyannis, Massachusetts, and because the rest of the discussion in this serial concerns what to do about information appearing in requester's book, ho purposed a discussion of what actually transpired between the persons mentioned in the book, which did not include the requester.
