Now, I can't tell you he'd be allowed to speak

to 250 media representatives, but what I presume, they would have a -- what they would call a pool, you know, a media pool of half a dozen people or something like that. But he would be allowed to do that. And that our normal procedure, and I'm telling it to you as, as straight as it is, our normal procedure is that he would be provided immediate medical attention, depending on the severity of his wounds.

STEVE: Right.

JOHN: And he would then be brought before a magistrate. And if he had to be hospitalized, the magistrate would probably come to the facility and conduct what we call an initial appearance.

STEVE: Well --

JOHN: And that is merely where the magistrate says these are the charges, I want you to know and I want you to understand your rights, all of your rights, to have counsel, appoint counsel, the whole nine yards there, because we don't mess around with that kind of thing. We -- we're, we're very serious about the judicial proceedings in, in the, in the federal system. And, and I want to allay any fears that, that people have that are in there, that just because someone is in there doesn't mean that they're in any way part and parcel to everything that's happened.

STEVE: Right. I, I'm sure of that.

And I don't mean just the youngsters. We know they, they had nothing to do with this, but I'm talking about just because a person is a consenting adult and is inside that facility doesn't necessarily mean that they're part and parcel of everything that's So, you know, he seemed to have some, some going on. questions about that. And, and the other thing is that he would probably -- the federal magistrate, which is a federal judge, would probably instruct that he be taken to a federal medical facility.

And, and I'm talking not just off the top of my head, I'm talking from, you know, prior experience in these --

JOHN: -- in these things, such as the one we have at Springfield, Missouri, or something like that, where they give a person a complete check up, you know, because we don't need problems. You know, we don't need problems.

I says where did you get it? See, I was expecting him to say one of the major universities.

And then he told me he had dropped out of school as a freshman in high school. I was quite surprised to hear that.

STEVE: So, in the process, I kept on at him, well, where did you get the information? Because many times he'll deal in sciences, but not like what I've

heard him give like over the phone. I mean, he really 1 2 gets deep into like matter, anti-matter, the speed of light, gemstones, laser technology, all these things. 3 And so --4 5 JOHN: He does? 6 STEVE: Yeah. Oh, like you would never 7 believe. STEVE: He was a young man who had left the 8 9 Catholic Church. He was studying with the Adventists. 10 JOHN: Uh-huh. 11 STEVE: He loved -- said he had a love for 12 the Bible. I watched him. He was blind in his right 13 eye, maybe 10 percent vision in his left. Over time, he finally -- he became an Adventist and went to their 14 15 schools, got a bachelor's degree in religion at Pacific 16 Union College in northern California. It's an 17 Adventist college. 18 JOHN: Uh-huh. 19 STEVE: And when he came back, he became very 20 bitter with the Adventists because they did not give 21 him a call in their ministry after paying out the 22 thousands of dollars that he had. 23 JOHN: The insult, he paid his dues and 24 didn't get it, huh? 25 STEVE: Exactly. JOHN: Yeah.

STEVE: So I felt kind of for the guy and I spent a little time with him. And then he told me that he had a, a dream. Well, I wasn't into that sort of a thing.

So he went off to Loma Linda University, which is another one of their universities in California, and writes to me and tells me he had a vision. I'd write back and he'd ask me to test them by the, the tenor of the scripture, which there are many scriptures that test when people believe they're prophets and so forth, whatever they're called, of God.

And when he returned -- when he had left, he really didn't know much at all about the scriptures. I mean, he had some of the basics down, but when he returned he literally blew me away.

And I invited a psychologist friend of mine, who was probably about early sixties, midsixties, over to meet him, as I did a lot of friends that have been part of different groups that I'd been in and social groups and so forth, and everyone was astounded. So after I heard it all, I started pressing him about where did you get the information? He said to me there was a guy that he had met in California. So, ultimately, I met the person. I'm not 13 sure, but it wouldn't seem like it because --14 JOHN: But he hasn't been indicating to you 15 that something's getting infected or something like 16 that, it's just --17 STEVE: No. So far, no. 18 JOHN: He's just going through a little more 19 anguish? 20 STEVE: I, I think that's what it could be. 21 I mean, definitely there's some strong pain there. But 22 I, I thought for sure, just like Jim and the others 23 suspected that, you know, that the -- a great 24 infection. I expected a lot of that, especially from 25 the first night. He himself did. JOHN: Yeah.

1 STEVE: It, it is a bad wound. There's no 2 question, I mean. You know, going right through just 3 about --4 JOHN: Well, I'll tell you, I don't 5 understand how in the world he, he's been able to talk like he's been able to talk. 6 7 I don't either. He's taken no --STEVE: 8 He was on a roll last night. I don't 9 mean tonight, I mean last night, talking to, to Henry. 10 STEVE: I'm sure. 11 He was, he was just as verbose as you 12 could be and, and talking about a lot of personal 13 things, you know. 14 STEVE: Right. To tell you the truth, I 15 overheard some of it and I was quite surprised. 16 JOHN: It wasn't just, you know, I'm going to 17 read the scripture, this was just right off the cuff, 18 having quite a dialogue. I, I think they had a very 19 good dialogue together. 20 STEVE: Um-hum. 21 JOHN: You know, and I, and I hope the time 22 that I spent with David this evening was good. I mean, 2.3 I thought it was and I, and I hope he shared the same 24 feelings. 25 STEVE: I hope so. You know, because this is new for me,

1 and when I say new for me, the philosophy is new. 2 STEVE: Right, right. 3 I'm not going to tell you the rest of 4 it is, but it is a new philosophy and, and it's a 5 learning experience and it's just difficult that it had to happen this way. 6 7 STEVE: It is, but maybe -- well, I mean, 8 right from the beginning, even when I first heard, he 9 himself seemed, you know, like all the prophets have 10 been called stumbling blocks because usually there have 11 people that have given a measure of understanding, 12 wisdom, knowledge about the rest for the basis to lead, 13 to show what is needed for God's people in whatever 14 generation, whatever God requires. God really has 15 given light to those that have, on their own, by their 16 own pride and arrogancy, through a lot of hard work, 17 gained their degrees and so forth. 18 JOHN: Yeah. 19 STEVE: You look throughout the Bible, 20 prophets usually were sheep herders, fig pickers, which 21 now we call migrant workers. There were people that 22 were --23 JOHN: Hadn't heard fig pickers before. 24 STEVE: Yeah. Amos was a fig picker. In 25 fact --JOHN: You don't want to say that 10 times

1 real fast, do you? 2 STEVE: No. In fact, I have heard people say pig ficker, you know, get it turned around there. 3 It's quite humorous. I had to laugh, too. I did this week 4 5 in a lecture. 6 JOHN: You, you mentioned when you first met 7 David --8 Yeah. STEVE: 9 -- it was out in California, though, JOHN: huh? 10 11 STEVE: This is correct. It was actually 12 in -- I was picked up by one of the people out there in 13 Los Angeles, at the airport, taken to one of their 14 homes. And extremely apprehensive, of course, looking 15 around, not knowing what this was all about. And I met 16 him in a home and, I mean, I was shocked. He came over 17 by me. I sat in a chair and he sat down on the floor, 18 looking at me, and he started talking to me about the 19 scripture. And, well, I was half listening because, 20 you know, the first time you meet someone you're 21 usually looking them over and observing and --22 JOHN: Well, you said you thought he was a 23 little strange, huh? 24 STEVE: Well --25 The first time you met him. JOHN: STEVE: Well, not really strange.

JOHN: Well, the beliefs, the theory, the principles.

STEVE: Well, no, it was actually the, the information was extremely logical. And what was more astounding was how clear it was coming directly from the book that I had read so many times and never understood, other than, you know, once in a while you might come up with a theory or, speculatively speaking, it could be this, maybe that.

STEVE: But he was talking with such authority because he was bringing in so many chapters in context without interpretation, just reading them but showing how they connect. Well, definitely, a very clear picture was developing between all the prophets and what they saw. So, see, that's what really caught my attention, even though he was dressed not anything like a, a minister or in a three-piece suit or anything In fact, on the contrary, the way he was dressing in those days was always a stumbling block. You wondered well, this guy doesn't seem to be a professional by looks. I mean, you would not expect him to be really anything by the way he was dressing, but it was when he opened his mouth. Where on earth someone as young as himself, where did he get the information? I mean, he did not have enough time in

life at that time to develop and to gain or give that kind of information. There was just no way, especially when once I saw him get on a pulpit and give a group of 100 people a lecture on the Bible.

His hands were greasy from working on a car. He went for five hours, quoting chapter after chapter after chapter, not missing a word. And the astounding thing was not that a person could ever memorize all that, the astounding thing was the clarity and the picture that was drawn from it, the logical progression.

JOHN: Yeah.

STEVE: And this is what, you know, caught a lot of people's attention. So they started -- he's always said ask questions, any questions, any questions. So people asked the questions. The answer is given by having them turn to the pages of their own book. Then they're told to go wrestle with the issues. Like if somebody comes to us, like, for instance, of course, Robert had been coming here, we've had other guests through the years that come here, we'll give them some pretty strong studies and then send them out, tell them to take some time away from us.

Go to the scholars, go to the ministers, go to the lay people, ask them these questions, let them raise questions with yourself. Honestly, this is what

1 we've done over and over again. 2 JOHN: Do you encourage them to talk to 3 basically nondenominational scholars --4 STEVE: Oh, yes, either or. 5 -- or any particular ones? JOHN: Anybody. You know, go, go to 6 STEVE: 7 atheistic scholars that -- maybe someone that's into 8 anthropology of religion or someone that's really 9 studied and looked at it from many different angles. 10 Go to the rabbis, go to the ministers of different 11 denominations. 12 JOHN: You weren't just, just talking about 13 any selected verses with selected analyses, though, you 14 were going over an entire --15 STEVE: Yeah. We -- well, he opens up -- for 16 instance, you know, you have a prophet like Joel who 17 wrote three chapters in the Old Testament. 18 JOHN: Uh-huh. 19 STEVE: Doesn't take long to get through, 20 it's just that the question that puzzles any scholar, 21 any layperson is how does it connect to the other 22 writers of that book, which Christians always tell you 23 that that book is a very consistent book, even though 24 in reality one can show many contradictions. And, believe me, the federal judicial system protects those rights in a strong, strong manner. I mean, it's not a -- it's not taken in a lackadaisical manner at all. It's, it's very serious and, and the judges and, and the other people are very serious about it. I don't know if you've ever spent any time inside a federal courthouse, but it, it's a totally different atmosphere than in a --

STEVE: Yeah, I'm sure it is.

1 JOHN: -- in a state or a local --2 STEVE: I've had tickets, of course, traffic 3 tickets and I have --4 JOHN: That won't get you into a federal 5 facility. 6 STEVE: No, I'm sure. 7 But -- and, and I tried to explain to 8 him that, you know, there is a presumption of innocence 9 and that's what the judicial system is all about, and, and he has to understand that. And he gets his day in 10 court and he gets his day with the media and, and he 11 12 can have the best attorneys money can buy, you know. 13 And, and these people have an obligation to him to bring out what he feels is the truth. And, on the 14 15 other hand, of course the government's going to bring out its side of the story, and I'd be foolish to tell 16 17 you that they're not. 18 But the system is the system, and the system 19 works for us all. And even though at times maybe we 20 don't like the system -- and, and he got into guite a 21 lengthy dialogue with me about the problems that he had 22 in 19, you know, '87-88. 23 STEVE: Right. 24 JOHN: And that, and that's difficult and 25 that's, that's --

STEVE: I think that was something more

1 confined to a local mentality --Sure, sure it was. 2 JOHN: 3 STEVE: -- or a mind-set. It would seem to 4 me it's almost like the movies, where you see some of 5 these old stereotype southern places where you -б JOHN: You're not a good old boy. 7 STEVE: Exactly. 8 JOHN: You know? 9 STEVE: Exactly. 10 JOHN: And --11 STEVE: There's a certain way of doing 12 And I must admit -things. 13 JOHN: When you have your local, your local 14 norms and your local (Indiscernible) and all of these 15 things enter into it. 16 STEVE: Positively. 17 JOHN: Sure. 18 STEVE: And even in those days, I couldn't 19 help but go along with the way people might view 20 something because they hear about somebody digging up a 21 body. I mean what on earth -- you know, this George 22 Roden, I never have met the guy but --23 JOHN: Me either. 24 STEVE: Not that I'd even want to or need to, 25 to associate oneself with such a personality, but the other guy dug up a grave. And I suppose he told you

1 the whole story about -- and then he calls -- gets a 2 hold of David's phone number and --3 JOHN: Yeah, yeah, I heard it. 4 STEVE: Anyway --5 JOHN: I heard him telling Henry about it the 6 other night. 7 STEVE: But you tell -- one of these days 8 maybe someone can tell me why the authorities didn't act on corpse abuse or -- they were -- and it was told 9 10 to them. They should have investigated themselves, not 11 told these young men from Hawaii, my friends, that they 12 needed to go on the property, take pictures. And then 13 the thing is when they did, honestly, when they did, 14 they had pictures of a, of a casket. They were told by 15 this Dickerson to go back onto the property, they 16 needed pictures of bones. That's when that shootout took place. That's when this man came out of his 17 trailer with a semiautomatic Uzi and started firing on 18 19 some of these guys that had .22's, had, had come along 20 to only get -- maybe to shoot some rounds in the air to 21 distract the man. 22 JOHN: Yeah. 23 Until they had the evidence. Of 24 course, it never happened that way. And when the

Sheriff's Department came onto the property, they were

happy to throw down their arms. They thought they were

25

coming to assist, because they knew that the department 2 knew about what they were doing, that they were there trying to gain the evidence. But, instead, they were 3 slapped with handcuffs, laying in the gravel, facing 4 the gravel, fire ants biting them and, I mean, got 5 6 treated as PLOL terrorists and all sorts of nonsense. 7 JOHN: Yeah, he was, he was telling Henry. 8 STEVE: It was, it was a travesty of 9 injustice, no question about it. It was. I followed 10 it along myself and was, was shocked. The kind of 11 money it took to be able to even --12 You don't recoup that money, either, JOHN: 13 do you? 14 STEVE: No, you don't. There's no way you 15 can. 16 JOHN: That's a difficult thing. It's not a 17 civil litigation where someone doesn't find in your 18 favor and so you get your money back. But, you know, 19 the federal system as I was saying, you've got 12 20 independent people who are going to sit there. And 21 just because people are inside that compound doesn't 22 mean they're going to be charged with something. 23 STEVE: No, I --24 As I, as I tried to explain that. 25 -- don't go along with those idea. There's a lot of people here that are -- that, in fact,

when it comes down to many aspects, don't know one 1 2 thing from another. 3 In, in the federal system, you have to have a unanimous -- Any type of decision has to be 4 5 unanimous, you know, all 12 people. Well, they're 6 going to hear both sides of the story, aren't they? 7 STEVE: Right. And, and it's going to be a thorough 8 JOHN: 9 You know -story. 10 STEVE: Well, I think, I think --JOHN: 11 I asked David when I was talking to 12 him earlier this evening and David said he hadn't, if 13 he hadn't I guess chosen the way of life that he's 14 chosen, he probably would have been involved in law 15 enforcement. 16 STEVE: I wouldn't be surprised. 17 And I said, God, I don't think you JOHN: want that headache. 18 19 STEVE: No. 20 JOHN: It's not like it used to be years ago 21 and --22 STEVE: Right. 23 JOHN: And I asked him, I said David, if you 24 were in law enforcement, I said you put yourself in, in 25 my shoes today, in our shoes today, what would you do to resolve this situation? You've got to communicate,

don't you? You have to talk. 1 2 STEVE: Well --3 Maybe there was a lack of communication six days ago, but you have to --4 5 STEVE: Quite obviously. 6 You know, you have to communicate. 7 STEVE: Can I ask you, John, what, what do, 8 what -- today we heard contradictory statements by the 9 ATF agent that was in the news, in the press conference. We -- I don't know if one of them told me 10 11 that -- well, anyway, right along from the beginning it 12 was that they had come to serve a warrant, an arrest warrant, for or to him. 13 14 JOHN: Uh-huh. 15 STEVE: And now we hear that that in fact was 16 not true. I don't know if that was you asked that --17 JOHN: No. I, I made, I made a mistake 18 initially and I, and I corrected it. They were serving 19 a search warrant on the compound --20 STEVE: Okay, on the compound. 21 -- and an arrest, an arrest warrant on 22 his person. 23 STEVE: I see. 24 Because he was talking about the fact that he had been out jogging and walking around and 25 things --

1 STEVE: Oh, that's true. 2 -- days before. But I said if you 3 don't have a warrant, you can walk around all you want. 4 If, if a federal judge, a federal magistrate has not 5 issued a warrant, they don't have any right to stop you or do anything else to you. So that's why. 6 STEVE: Well, he's been in town even. 7 8 took a trip -- well, him and I both. I was in 9 California --10 But the warrant probably wasn't 11 outstanding. 12 STEVE: I see. 13 JOHN: You know, the warrant hadn't been 14 issued. So if it hasn't been issued, they certainly 15 can't stop you or interfere with you in any way. 16 hope that clears that up. 17 STEVE: Well, see, that's why he figured if 18 he was an agent -- I mean, they would have never been 19 hurt. The guy's never hit anybody, he's never 20 threatened anyone. 21 JOHN: Well, I guess the thing that probably 22 bothered him more than anything was, was the, the 23 weapons that were out there. 24 What, bothered who, the agent? STEVE: 25 JOHN: Sure, sure. STEVE: I mean, well, what weapons? Or what

did he know for sure? 2 Well, we --JOHN: 3 STEVE: I mean --4 We all know for sure now, don't we? I mean, we, we know and, heck, it's been in the media, people have come forth and, you 8 9 know, everybody's got to get their story to tell, 10 right, and about the weapons that David's been buying 11 for the, the last several months or years or whatever. 12 STEVE: He hasn't hidden that at all. He's 1.3 been very open about it. He's in fact --14 JOHN: Well, you just said what -- you didn't 15 know about these weapons. 16 STEVE: No, I know, but, I mean, I'm not 17 talking about all, I'm talking to the degree that he's 18 been to gun shows and so forth. 19 Believe me, if I was going to go knock 20 on somebody's door and execute a search warrant or an 21 arrest warrant and I knew they had .50-caliber machine 22 guns in there and Law rockets --23 STEVE: But Robert honestly got --24 -- that would scare me to death. JOHN: 25 Not at all. Robert got to see the demeanor of the man, his spirit and attitude, his

This is done by a federal judge, and 17 the federal judge signs the warrant. And if he signed 18 the warrant on Saturday or on Sunday, that's when you 19 execute the warrant. 20 STEVE: You know what I'd like to do? 21 wonder if it would ever be possible for us to look at 22 the evidences that the --23 JOHN: You bet. 24 -- the world has seen.
