

Mr. JAMES E. MOORHEAD, RFD. No. 1, Poplar Grove, Illinois, who is now employed as a landscape architect by the Rockford Nurseries, 2011 South Main Street, Rockford, Illinois, advised he was formerly employed by the U.S. Forestry Service, Knoxville, Tennessee, from 1934 through 1936. Mr. MOORHEAD stated that he could not recall WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON as being a person he knew at Knoxville, Tennessee, adding that he has seen current newspaper pictures of REMINGTON, but could not recognize him from these photographs

Mr. MOORHEAD explained that duving the 1931-1936 period he, MOORHEAD represented the Khoxville Central Labor Union of the American Federation of Labor Union of Government Employees, the TVA local. MOORHEAD stated that he is not now and never has been a Communist, nor has he been solicited or invited to join any Communist Party organization. Mr. MOORHEAD surmised that some of his acquaintances at Knoxville, Tennessee might have been affiliated with Communist organizations, but stated that he could not give any further data bearing out this view, nor was he able to identify persons whom he believed affiliated with Communist groups.



KERRETH McCORNELL, Weaverville, North Carolina, has advised that he is unable to recall any individual named E. H. CHAZEL at Knoxville, Tennessee, during 1937 or at any other time. McCOMMELL explained that it is possible that he was acquainted with MAZEL under some other name but would be unable to identify MAZEL without examining a photograph.

McCONNELL examined a map of the city of Knoxville, Tennessee, as suggested by the Knorville Division but was unable to locate the park in Knoxville where he claimed to have attended a Communist Party meeting in 1937 where REMINGTON was also in attendance. McCONMELL expressed the opinion that he would be able to locate the park where the meeting was held if he should go to Knowville, Tennessee, and would also be able to refresh his memory concerning other pertinent addresses in this case. McCONNELL stated that he would be willing to go to Knoxville, Tennessee, in an effort to locate instant park and would prefer to go on August 10, 1950. McCOMMELL stated that he preferred to make the trip to Knoxville and back on the same day, and for this reason requested Special Agent EVERETT J. INGRAM, resident agent at Asheville, North Carolina, to drive him to Knowville, Tennessee, on the above-mentioned date. McCCMMELL stated that he did not desire to ride the bus to Knowville and stated that the train schedule would not permit him to make the trip to and from Knowville in one day. He explained that his personal automobile is used by his wife in her employment each day and would not be available.



Unless advised to the contrary by the Bureau, McCONNELL will be driven to inoxville, Tennessee, by an agent of the Charlotte Office on the morning of August 10, 1950, at which time the Knoxville Office will be contacted immediately upon arrival in Knoxville. It is requsted that the Knoxville Office have available at that time an agent to escort McCONNELL to pertinent places in the city of Knoxville in order to refresh his memory.

McCONNELL examined the report of the Knox County organizer to the All-Southern Conference of the Communist Party September 11 and 12, 1937, as it appears on Page 667 to 671, Volume 2, Executive Hearings, Special Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, 76th Congress, Third Session. McCONNELL, after reading the report, advised that he was the author of this report and had signed the report "K. MALCOH."

When questioned concerning the seven members in the TVA Branch of the Party at Knoxville, Tennessee, McCOMNELL named the three women as BETTY WINSTON MALCOMBRE TODD. MURIEL PEAR, and MABEL ABERCOMBRE. McCONNELL stated that he is not positive concerning the identity of the three men but believes they were DAVID or FRANCISATIONE, JOHN C. BORDEN, WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON, and HENRY C. THART. McCONNELL explained that PAT TODD could have been included in the TVA group even though he was not employed by TVA at that time. He explained this by stating that TODD could have been included in the TVA group since he was closely associated with others in the TVA group at that time.

Mrs. HAROID MANSFIELD, formerly known as MABEL ABERCHOMBIE, and who is presently employed at the Georgia Military Academy, College Park, Georgia, voluntarily came to the Atlanta Office and furnished the following signed statement:

"Atlanta, Georgia
July 12, 1950

"I, Mrs. HAROID MANSFIELD, nee MABEL ABERCROMBIE, make the following voluntary statement to Special Agent JOSEPH T. SYLVESTER, JR., of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, U.S. Department of Justice.

The first time I ever came in contact with WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON was when he came to a boarding house at 920 Temple Street, Knoxville, in the Fall of 1936. At this time WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON and HENRY C. HART resided on the first floor of this boarding house and I resided on the second floor.

"In reference to Mr. REMINGTON, I knew WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON both socially and also in a business way. That is to say, I knew him as a messenger for TVA in Knoxville, and socially from going to square dances and hiking.

"In addition, I knew that WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON was a member of the United Federal Workers and I was also a member of the go to any of these meetings with Mr. WILLIAM REMINGTON but did attend a number of these labor meetings myself and knew that he was in attendance at the meetings. I knew WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON from the Fall of 1936 until the Spring of 1937.

"WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON, during the period that I was acquainted with him, was principally associated with and interested in the United Federal Workers and the Aid to Loyalist Spain Committee.

"WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON'S closest associate was HENRY C. HART. Whenever WILLIAM REMINGTON attended any meeting of the United Federal Workers or the Aid to Loyalist Spain Committee, HART would attend with him. During the time I was in Knoxville, Tennessee, I supported the Aid to Loyalist Spain Committee, which was also known by other names but was for assistance to the Loyalist group in Spain; League for Industrial Democracy; League Against War and Fascism; Boycott Against Japanese Goods; Sale of Scrap Iron to Japan; and the American Civil Liberties Committee, and various lecture tours for the assistance of the Loyalists in Spain. I also supported a number of Union activities.

"Associated with me in these activities was WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON and the following individuals: MURIEL SPEARE BORAH WILLIAMS; HENRY C. HART; HOWARD FRAZIER; HUGH URBAN; HOWARD BRIDGEMAN; BETTY TODD; MERWIN 'PAT' TODD; BERNARD BORAH; DAVID MARTIN; FRANCES MARTIN; THELMA MARTIN; KENNETH MALCOIN; CHRISTINE EVERSOLE BENSON; KENNETH CAMERON; HORACE BRYANT, and on occasions, RUTH MARTIN attended these meetings.

"In summary, I would like to state that my intentions during that period were to help my fellow man by the things we supported, along with the great swing to progressive ideas, by progressive ideas I mean that I worked for such things as thirty-day vacations, a five-day week, and mill workers!

I have never believed in the overthrow of the Government of the United States. I have never made application to membership of the Communist Party. I have never signed or received a membership card or ever knowingly paid dues to the Communist Party. I was not and have not been a member of the Communist Party. If supporting the various causes and contributing money to the organizations I have mentioned before made me a member of the Communist Party, then I was a member at that time 14 years ago.

"I'do not know whether or not WILLIAM REMINGTON was a member of the Communist Party at the time I knew him in Knoxville, Tennessee. He was active in the same groups I was active in and supported the same causes."

I wish to further state that WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON has never asked me to join any type of organization, that I am unable to recall any dates of any of the meetings and places of meetings where the above organizations were held. I do not recall any specific meeting at which WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON was in attendance but know that he did attend the meetings held by the various organizations I supported.

"To the best of my knowledge I believed that at the time I knew WILLIAM R. REMINGTON I considered him to be loyal to the United States Government and never did he approach me with any idea to the contrary. I would be willing to testify to these facts before a Loyalty Board.



Boston teletype to the Director, New York and Knowville dated June 16, 1950 indicated that HOWARD ALLEN BRIDGMAN, an informant of the Boston Office, had suggested that JACK BRADSHAW, a former president of the AFL Hosiery Workers Local in Knowville in 1937, who subsequently joined the CIO, and HELEN CREGORY, the secretary of the same AFL union, could possibly furnish information concerning REMINGTON's activities in the Knowville area after REMINGTON left the employment of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

By teletype to the Director and Boston, copies by mail to Richmond, New York and Cleveland, the Knowlle Office advised on June 21, 1950 that JACK ERADSHAW's correct name is believed to be B. FRANK/BRADSHAW and that last reports indicate he was employed by the Goodyear-Company at Akron, Ohio. Further, Knowlle advised that HELEN CREGORY is believed to be identical with HELEN MAUDIC CREGORY, subject of Bureau file whose last known address was care of her mother, Mrs. J. W. CREGORY at Glenndale, Virginia. It is not known from a review of the Knowlle file whether or not the Bureau has authorized these two individuals to be interviewed.

Mr. and Mrs. MYLES HORTON, Highlander Folk School, Monteagle, Tennessee, when interviewed on June 30, 1950, could furnish no information as to REMINGTON's Communist Party membership, but did advise that during the Holston Hosiery Mill strike at Knowille in 1937, REMINGTON volunteered to assist in the education of the strikers and taught them either on the subject of parliamentary law or public speaking. Mr. HORTON stated that in addition to REMINGTON, the other young TVA employees (all members of the AFGE) who volunteered to teach classes during the Holston strike were; HENRY HART, HOWARD BRIDGMAN, HOWARD FRAZIER and BERNARD "BUCK"

BURTON J. ZIEN, who furnished a detailed signed statement on June 2, 1950 admitting his former Communist Party membership, Knoxville, has advised that "JACK" HRADSHAW and his brother, "MIDGE" BRADSHAW, who were active members of the American Federation of Hosiery Workers Local at the Holston Hosiery Mills, Knoxville, were cocasional visitors to the Knoxville Workers Education Council.

In view of REMINSTON's membership on the Educational Committee of the AFGE, as reflected in the January 1937 minutes of the Linge, and in view of REMINSTON's position as a representative from the Workers Industrial Organizing Committee to the Knoxville Workers Education Council, as reported on the TVA page of the Knoxville Labor News of April 8, 1937, it is reasonable to assume that REMINSTON was known to the ERADSHAWS. A further reference to REMINSTON in the April 8, 1937 issue of the Knoxville Labor News reflects that HELEN GREGORY, WILL REMINSTON and HOMEN VILSON were shown by the Workers Industrial Organizing Committee as its representatives to the Knoxville Workers Education Council. This indicates that REMINSTON was also known to Miss CREGORY.

Mrs. CHRISTINE EVERSOIS ARMSON, who has orally admitted to Knoxville Agents on June 29, 1950 that she was a member of the Communist Party at Knoxville in 1936-38 and knew REMINGTON as a member of the Communist Party at that time, voluntarily suggested the names HKLEN CREGORY and "JACK" BRADSHAW, former officials of the Hosiery Workers Union at the Holston Mills in Knoxville, as persons who can furnish information concerning REMINGTON's post-TVA activities, particularly in the field of labor activities at Knoxville.

In view of the above, it is recommended that, if same has not already been done, the Bureau authorize Richmond to interview HEIEN GRECORY and Cleveland to interview B. FRANK BRADSHAW for such information as they may be able to furnish concerning REMINGTON'S associates, activities, etc.




This telephone call was to request permission for Bureau affects to serve subposed duces tecum in order to obtain a box in the possession of Mr. PAUL CROUCH, said box containing a list of subscribers to the newspaper Southern Worker".

Pursuant to Bureau permission, a subpoena duces tecum was issued through SAAG THOMAS DONEGAN, said subpoena being returnable July 13, 1950. On the same date subpoena was served by Bureau agents. The box containing the list of subscribers was taken to the New fork Office; its contents photostated and the card bearing the name "BILL REMINGTON, Box 1692, Knoxville, Tennessee" kept by this office.

On July 14, 1950, pursuant to the agreement approved by SAAG DONEGAN, the box containing the cards was returned to Mr. CROUCH; however, the card bearing the name "BILL REMINGTON" was kept in the files of this office for possible use as evidence.

ASAC Whelan of New York called at 11:10 A.M. today and advised that Agents of the New York Office interviewed Paul Crouch, who, you will recall, is a former CP functionary who defected and has acted as a source of information for the Bureau and other Governmental agencies. Crouch stated that during 1938 and 1939 he was editor of the Southern Norker, the official CP paper in the South. In this position he came into possession of a box which contained a card for each person on the mailing list as a subscriber for the Southern Worker. This box contains a card for "Bill Remington, Post Office Box 1692, Knoxville, Tennessee (It will be recalled that Post Office Box 1692 was the mail box rented it March, 1937, for the corkers Education Committee by Horaco Bryan, a CP member who also gave as references in the application other members of the CP. This information is known to the HCMA, which also reportedly has obtained photostatic copies of the application filed for this PO Box.

Mr. Whelan pointed out that Crouch is presently in New York in connection with an Immigration hearing and it is expected that he will finish this assignment no later than Friday of this week. Then he is to attend various HCUA hearings which are to be held in different parts of the country.


SAAG Donegan has notified the New York Office that if it is agreeable with Crouch, who is cooperative, he would like to subpoen the entire box containing these cards. Donegan wants to do this so the HCUA or some other party won't be able to obtain access to the box. Mr. Donegan has asked if an Agent of the New York Office would serve the subpoena. His reason for this request is that he does not want the Marshal's Office to know that a subpoena is being issued and also, of course, to keep the fact that Crouch has this material in his possession as confidential as possible. Mr. Donegan desires to make the return date of the subpoena tomorrow, July 13, inasmuch as Crouch possibly will be leaving New York on the following day.




III. RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

At Guliport, Mississippi:

Mr. EDWARD ANDERSON BLAIR, Markham Hotel, stated that he does not know WILLIAM WALTER REMINCTON and that he has no information concerning REMINCTON's membership in the Communist Party, or his loyalty to the United States.

Re Charlotte teletype dated June 1, 1950 and other communications submitted by the Charlotte Office reporting interview with KENNETB MCCONNELL, Aka, KENROY MALCOMBRE and KEN MALCOIM, now residing at Weaverville, North Carolina, particularly insofar as information supplied by MCCONNELL pertains to his activities and those of REMINGTON in Knoxville in 1937.

For the assistance of Charlotte, there is enclosed herewith a map of the City of Knoxville appropriately marked as to various points and addresses which have figured in instant investigation. It is suggested that this map be exhibited to McCONNELL and points indicated thereon discussed with him to refresh his recollection. Particularly, he should be asked to identify the park where he remembers a meeting of the Communist Party was held at which REMINGTON was present.

In the event the Bureau sees fit to authorize a trip by McCONNEIL to Knoxville for the purpose of further refreshing his recollection, it is pointed out that Weaverville, North Carolina is situated near Asheville and is less than 100 miles by highway from Knoxville.

In addition to the above, the Charlotte Office is requested to advise Knoxville whether or not McCONNELL has admitted authorship of the report to the Southern Conference of the Communist Party held September 11 and 12, 1937 at Chattanooga, Tennessee, which was introduced at HCUA hearings in 1940 by KENNETH B. TALLEY (deceased) and which was signed, "KAMALCOIM, Organizer, Communist Party of Knox County." If so, please advise if McCONNELL has identified the seven members of the TVA Branch of the CP mentioned therein.

Supplementing the above photographs, I am enclosing herewith to the Bureau, New York and Boston a copy of the photograph of FORREST MITCHELL BENSON, Aka, JACK BENSON, which photograph was made in approximately 1936 and which was taken from his Tennessee Valley Authority application.

BENSON is the husband of CHRISTINE EVERSOLE BENSON, Nee CHRISTINE HOPE EVERSOLE, who orally admitted on June 29, 1950 that she had been a member of the Communist Party at Knoxville from approximately October 1936 to June 1938, that meetings of . the CP had been held at the house occupied by her and her husband, 2707 Sunset Avenue, Knozville, and who further admitted that 10 WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON was known to her as a member of the TVA Branch of the CP, Knoxville, in approximately 1936-37, she having attended unspecified meetings of the CP at which REMINGTON was present.

Also enclosed to the Bureau, Boston and New York are four photographic views of the house at 2707 Sunset Avenue, Knoxville, formerly occupied by the BENSONs for about three months in the winter of 1936-37, which photographs were made by an Agent of this office on July 11, 1950. These photographs of the house at 2707 Sunset will supplement the series of photographs previously disseminated by Knorville of houses at which REMINGTON ain of his associates are known to have resided at Knoxville.







Mrs. CAROLA ZICROSSER, KAVANAUCH, also known as Mrs. CAROLA KAVANAUCH, CAROLA XICROSSER, Mrs. TED KAVANAUCH, Mrs. HOWARD Interviewed on July 10, 1950 at 81 West Main Street, Mount Kisco, New York, telephone Mount Kisco 6-4584, by SAS JOHN J. DANAHY and MORGAN J. LACEY.

Mrs. KAVANAUGH advised that she is spending the Summer in Mount Kisco and will return to her home at 134 East 24th Street, New York City, Telephone Gramercy 5-1394, in September.

Mrs. KAVANAUCH advised that she was a childhood acquaintance of Mrs. ANN REMINGTON; that her parents visited Mrs. REMINGTON!S parents from time to time when she, Mrs. KAVANAUGH, was a child. Mrs. KAVANAUGH advised that her contacts with Mrs. REMINGTON since then have been limited. She advised that she had been in the company of WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON on two occasions only. She stated that the first time she met Mr. REMINGTON was at the home of Mrs. ELIZABETH COOS at Croton on Hudson, New York, where she attended the wedding of ANN REMINGTON to WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON. Mrs. KAVANAUGH stated that her second contact with Mr. REMINGTON was in Washington, D. C. where she had visited the home of the REMINGTONS. She fixed the date of this second meeting at about the time the REMINGTONS first child was five or six months of age. She stated that a mutual friend told her that the REMINGTONS were in Washington, D. C., and that when she visited Washington, she looked up the REMINGTONS. Mrs. KAVANAUGH advised that she could not recall the name of the mutual friend and that at the meeting in Washington, D. C., which was a dinner engagement, no other individuals were present and the conversation was strictly social.

Mrs. KAVANAUGH stated that she has no knowledge of ANN REMINGTON or WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON as ever having been members of the Communist Party. She stated that she did know that ANN REMINGTON associated with a "leftist group". She was, however, unable to furnish the names of any associates of ANN REMINGTON. She meant by "leftist group", windividuals statement that ANN REMINGTON associated with a leftist group on the general belief that ANN REMINGTON and her mother, Mrs. ELIZABETH MOCS, were part of on any other individuals in this group.

WOOD, a friend of Mrs. REMINGTON'S, who attended Dartmouth College with Mr. REMINGTON. She stated that EVERETT WOOD served in the United States Navy as a pilot during World War II, and upon his discharge obtained a position as a pilot with one of the commercial airlines.

Mrs. KAVANAUGH advised that she resided at 68 Barrow Street, New York City, with one INCRID FETZ, who now resides in Croton, New York, with her family. She stated that EVA CARINA ZHITLOWSKY was acquainted with INCRID FETZ, and that INCRID FETZ introduced her to EVA ZHITLOWSKY. She stated that EVA ZHITLOWSKY took over the apartment at 68 Barrow Street, New York City when she, Mrs. KAVANAUGH, returned to Philadelphia, and that the arrangements for taking over the apartment had been made by INCRID FETZ. Mrs. KAVANAUGH stated that her contact with EVA ZHITLOWSKY was limited only to the one time when she was introduced to her. She stated that she knew nothing of EVA ZHITLOWSKY'S background or activities. She stated that she did not know whether EVA ZHITLOWSKY was a Communist or associated with a Communist group.

Mrs. KAVANAUGH advised that she had been asked to join the Young Communist League when she attended Swarthmore College, Swarthmore, Pennsylvania, but that she did not join. She stated that she was never a member of the Communist Party.

Mrs. KAVANAUGH stated that she was acquainted with BERNARD REDMONT, having attended Columbia University School of Journalism with REDMONT. She advised that she knew nothing of REDMONT'S activities.

Mrs. KAVANAUGH stated she cannot recall that Mr. and Mrs. REMINGTON visited her when she resided at the Rest litth Street, New York City or that the REMINGTONS ever attended a party at her home when BERNARD REDMONT was present.

The Boston Office will, through the records at Dartmouth College, attempt to locate the present whereabouts of EVERETT WOOD, former class-mate of REMINGTON. Will set out appropriate lead to have EVERETT WOOD interviewed relative to activities of REMINGTON.

The New York Office will contemplate reinterviewing Mrs. KAVANAUGH in the future since it is believed that information may be obtained from her which will be of value to instant case.

PURPOSE:

Pursuant to your instruction, the New York Office was telephonically one requested on July 17, 1950, to advise SAAG Donegan regarding the interview (with Robert S. Lehman, who was interviewed by the Washington Field Office on the July 14, 1950, as reflected in the teletype from the WFO on that date The substance of the information contained in this teletype also has been furnished to the Criminal Division of the Department.

BACKGROUND:

The WFO by teletype dated July 14, 1950, advised that Robert S. Lehman had been reinterviewed. At first he disclaimed knowledge of Remington's membership in the Communist Party. Later in the interview, however, he stated, "You have got me boxed," and went on to indicate that having already stated in affidavit for Remington's loyalty hearing that Remington was not a Communist. he was in an untenable position if he now comes out and admits that Remington was a Communist. Lehman intimated that he would be liable for perjury non one or the other. He then went on to ask if there were any way that he could be exempted from what he had said in his previous statements, and added that since his wife had also signed the affidavit for Remington previously, he wished to discuss the matter with her before taking any further action.

In accordance with the Director's notation that this should be taken up with Donegan promptly, Mr. Laughlin telephoned ASAC Whelan of the New York Office at 12:20 P.M., July 17, 1950, and requested that the information contained in the WFO teletype, a copy of which was sent to New York, be discussed at once with Mr. Donegan.

On the same date a memorandum incorporating these facts was submitted to the Criminal Division of the Department.

Mrs. ARTHUR L. HILL advised that im 1937 WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON resided at 1013 Oak Street, Kmoxville, Tennessee, on the second floor of a boarding house operated by her sister, Mrs. G. F. WATSON. Mrs. HILL advised that on the second floor with REMINGTON and an individual who roomed with him, whose mame she did not know, there resided BARTIETT C. WATT, who, at that time, was employed at the Oil Plant located undermeath the Oak Street Viaduct, which she believed was the Sinclair Oil Plant. Also residing on the second floor was a man mamed P. D. HENSLEY, who was employed by the Graybai Blectric Company in Knoxville. Mrs. HILL advised that these two were might be in a position to furnish information concerning WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON and any other individuals who might have roomed with him.

Mrs. HILL stated that REMINGTON only lived at 1013 Oak Street for approximately a month and that during that time he had arranged male callers who came and visited with him. Mrs. HILL stated that she did not know the mames of any of the visitors who came to the REMINGTON room, but that a number of these individuals had stayed overnight on various occasions in the room so that she had never been able to determine who actually roomed with REMINGTON.

Mrs. HILL continued saying on one occasion she believed to be a Saturday might, a young dark-haired woman in her late twenties had come to 1013 Oak Street to visit in the REMINGTON room. At this time, other individuals, all male, had also been visiting

in the REMINGTON reem. Mrs. HILL recalled she had ebtained seme strawberries from one of the individuals and the girl who had visited had requested she make a strawberry shortcake. Mrs. HILL continued saying she had made the strawberry shortcake and the young lady had come to the kitchen and brought the strawberry shortcake to the room. (It is noted at this time in the report of SA CARLTON C. McSWANN of Knexville, Tennessee, dated June 27, 1950, that BURTON JACK TIEN stated who had temporarily moved into a room occupied by HENRY WART at 1013 Oak Street in the spring of 1937 for about two weeks, and that MURIEL SPEARE baked a strawberry shortcake and brought it ever to HART'S room where we had a party which consisted primarily of listening to phonograph records which HART had.") Mrs. HILL stated that at this affair, numerous records were played on a phonograph and the group became quite noisy.

Mrs. HILL further advised that she saw literature in REMINGTON'S reem after he had been there which was in the form of pamphlets and was not in the English language. Mrs. HILL advised she knew no fereign language but thought it was Russian, became suspicious of REMINGTON and his roommate, and her sister asked them to move.

Mrs. HILL advised that REMINGTON was the one who always paid the reem rent and he was a very thin individual who liked to hike. REMINGTON'S most consistent visitor at 1013 Oak Street was a stecky, dirty-blende haired individual who always came on a metorcycle and whose name was net known to Mrs. HILL.

On 7/11/50 Mr. PAUL CROUCH, at his own request, was interviewed by agents of this office at the Empire Hotel, where he is stopping in New York City. At that time Mr. CROUCH displayed a box containing approximately 400 or 500 cards bearing the names of subscribers to the newspaper "Southern Worker" of Chattanooga, Tenn. CROUCH said that he had been the Editor of "The New South", the successor to the "Southern Worker", from 1938 until 1940, at which time the newspaper failed because of lack of funds.

A review of the contents of the box indicated that within it was a card bearing the name BILL REMINGTON, Box 1692, Knoxville, Tenn. Box 1692 is stated to have been the official mailing address for the CP in Knoxville, Tenn.

Special Assistant to the Attorney General Thomas J. Donegan, who at the present time is handling the REMINGTON case for the Dept. of Justice, was advised of the above facts. He stated that he desired that a subpoena duces tecum be issued for the contents. As a result on 7/13/50 a subpoena duces tecum was served on Mr. CROUCH, the contents of the box obtained and brought to this office. The card containing the name BILL REMINGTON was removed and kept by this office for possible use as evidence. The remainder of the cards were photostated. The box containing the cards was then returned to Mr. CROUCH, pursuant to the desire of SAAG Donegan, with instructions to Mr. CROUCH that although he could use them in any manner he desired, they would continue to be under subpoena duces tecum and should be handed over to Mr. Donegan at any time he deemed it necessary for the trial of REMINGTON.

Mr. CROUCH advised that upon his return to Miami he intends to contact the Miama Division and at that time will review the cards with an agent of that office. He stated that many of the names were familiar to him and he would be in a position to furnish memoranda concerning the Communist activities of those individuals he could recall.

In view of the above facts photostatic copies of the names taken from the subscribers' list are being forwarded to your office to await the arrival of CROUCH in Miami. It is requested that following his review of the cards and subsequent memoranda concerning whatever individuals he recalls, your office forward to the various offices covering the residences of the individuals in question the information furnished by CROUCH concerning them.

For the information of the Bureau, on July 7, 1950, NELSON FRAM a labor columnist for the New York World Delegram and Sun, advised the New York Office that he recently saw ROBERT SPIVAK, a reporter for the New York Post and Home News. FRANK stated that SPIVAK had represented the New York Post at Albany, New York, but had recently been assigned to do a piece on WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON. It was FRANK'S impression from the conversation he had with SPIVAK that the Post was going to attempt a whitewash of the recent REMINGTON & situation.

FRANK also found out that SPIVAK had recently been to Tufts College ! where he talked with Professor BRIDGMAN and probably some other people. It was also FRANK'S impression that SPIVAK had either been or planned to take a trip to Tennessee to round out the story. He also was of the opinion that SPIVAK would attempt to contact ELIZABETH BENTLEY.

FRANK further related that he recalled JAMES NEXLER, the editor for the Post; had written a piece for New Republic magazine praising REMINGTON after he had been reinstated by the Loyalty Board in connection with his position at the Department of Commerce. FRANK did not know when the story would be completed, but indicated that it would probably be some time in the future as SPIVAK apparently is doing a rather defailed and complete story on the aspects of the perjury charge which was recently handed down by the New York Federal Grand Jury. On July 10, 1950, SAAG Donegan stated he had been advised by Mr. JOHN G. BRUNINI, foreman of the outgoing Federal Grand Jury, that BRUNINI had heard that ROBERT SPIVAK was preparing a series of articles on REMINGTON; that SPIVAK had contacted GODFREY SCHMIDT, attorney for ELIZABETH BENTLEY, and has tried to contact ANN REMINGTON.

According to Donegan, BRUNINI is of the opinion that REMINGTON or his representatives might be conducting their investigation through ROBERT SPIVAK.

Mr. Donegan suggested that this information be incorporated in the REMINGTON file. He further suggested that if any information came to the attention of the Bureau concerning any investigation being conducted by REMINGTON or any of his representatives, it be brought to his attention.

Reference is made to Knoxville letter to the Bureau, Atlanta and New York dated July 6, 1950 requesting Atlanta to interview Mrs. A. L. HILL, Post Office Box 116, Pine Lake, Georgia, the sister of Mrs. G. F. WATSON, former landlady at 1013 Oak Street, Knoxville, inasmuch as Mrs. HILL was residing at 1013 Oak Street during the time that WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON, MERWIN "PAT" TODD and HENRY COWLES HART occupied a room at this address in approximately May and June 1937.

The report of Special Agent JOSEPH T. SYLVESTER dated July 14, 1950 at Atlanta, Georgia, captioned "WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON, Aka, BILL - Perjury", indicates on page 11 that Mrs. ARTHUR L. HILL was interviewed at Pine Lake, Georgia and recalled REMINITION as a former resident of 1013 Oak Street, Knoxville, during the time she lived at that address. Mrs. HILL further recalled that two individuals named BARTLETT C. WATT and P. D. HENSLEY also occupied rooms on the second floor of the house at 1013 Oak Street, Knoxville, during the time that REMINGTON was there. Mrs. HILL suggested these two men might be in a position to furnish information concerning REMINGTON and any other individuals who might have roomed with him. Mrs. HILL recalled that REMINGTON lived at this address for approximately one month and during that time he had numerous male callers. Mrs. HILL further stated that on one occasion, which she believed to be a Saturday night, a young dark haired woman in her late twenties had come to 1013 Oak Street to visit in the REMINGTON room and at this time other individuals, all male, were also visiting in the REMINGTON room. Mrs. HILL recalled that she had obtained some strawberries for one of these individuals and the girl who was visiting the house had requested her to make a strawberry shortcake, which she did, and which was taken to the room by the young lady. Mrs. HILL stated that, at this affair, numerous records were played on a phonograph and the group became quite noisy.

Parenthetically, it should be noted that BURTON J. ZIEN has recently advised this office that he remembered attending a "strawberry" party at 1013 Oak Stroet in May or June 1937, at which MURIEL SPEARE was present and provided the strawberry shortcake. ZIEN further stated that he believed the party was held in the room of HENRY C. HART and that REMINGTON was possibly present.

Mrs. ARTHUR L. HILL further advised Atlanta Agents that she saw literature in REMINGTON's room at 1013 Oak Street after he left which was in the form of pamphlets and was not in the English language. As a result of this, they became suspicious of REMINGTON and his roommate, and her sister, Mrs. WATSON, asked them to leave.

Mrs. HILL advised that REMINGTON was the one who always paid the room rent and he was a very thin individual who liked to hike. REMINGTON's most consistent visitor at 1013 Oak Street was a stocky dirty-blond-haired individual who always came on a motorcycle and whose name was not known to Mrs. HILL. It should be noted that this description fits that of MERWIN "PAT" TODD.

For the information of Memphis, HENRY C. HART admitted before the HCUA in 1940 that he had joined the Communist Party at Knoxville at the suggestion of one KIT BUCKLES who is alleged to be the same individual who recruited REMINGTON into the CP at Knoxville in the Fall of 1936. THE BILL OF PARTICULARS IN CRIMINAL PROCEDURE.

The granting of a bill of particulars is within the sound discretion of the Court. A defendant in a criminal proceeding is not entitled to a bill of particulars as a matter of right. Coates v. United States, 122 F. 2d 571, 576 (10th Cir. 1941), cert. den. 314 U.B. 698 (1941); United

States 7. Alcos, 61 9. Bupp, 347 (8.D.N.Y. 1941).

Bines an order denying a bill of particulars is not rinal the order is not appealable even where it might be considered an abuse of disordion at the time of entry.

is likely to be available to the derendant, shere is an additional reason for denying the motion for a bill of particulars. United States v. <u>Subinstein</u> 9 P.R.D. 25 (25 N.R. 2010) United States v. Skidmore, 123 F. 28 600 [Van Sir 104]

The only purpose of the bill of particulars as to these requests would be to divulge before trial swidence in the possession of the Government. It cannot be argued that the denial of the disclosure of this swidence before trial will cause the defendant to be taken by any unfair surprise or to bause him to be subject to the danger of being twice. Prosecuted for the same offense. The indistment is clear and definite in stating that the defendant testified falsely when he said he had never been a member of the Communist.

The Government should not be obliged to keep the defendant currently informed as to evidence developed. It is not the purpose of a bill of particulars to tompel periodic disclosures to the defendant prior to trial as to whether the prosecution is of is not in possession of evidence as to particular phases of the proof to be offered at the time of the trial. The defendant net being enticled to the disclosure of evidence in a bill of pargiculars, he also is not satisfied to obtain information as to whether the Government is or is not in possession of guch evidence.

Re Knoxville teletype to Miami dated July 19, 1950 and Miami teletype dated July 20, 1950 concerning proposed interview with JOHN CLARENCE BORDEN, JR., 1607 North Peachtree Circle, Jacksonville, Florida.

For the assistance of the Miami Office in conducting a thorough interview of BORDEN as a potential witness in the pending perjury trial of REMINGTON, the following material is being forwarded by Knoxville to the Miami Office for review prior to interview with BORDEN:

- (1) Report of Special Agent JOHN A. PARKER dated July 18, 1950 at Knoxville entitled "WILLIAM WALTER REMINGTON, Akn, Bill - PERJURY", page 95 of which contains a thumbnail sketch of JOHN CLARENCE BORDEN, JR. BORDEN should be questioned concerning the Norris Branch of the Communist Party mentioned in the last paragraph of page 15 of this report. It is believed that the clerical worker referred to therein was MABELYABERCROMBIE. The three workers in the Town Cooperative were BORDEN, FRANK CRAIG WHITE and KENNETH BY TALLEY, and the domestic worker was CMIA REECE. BORDEN is also mentioned on pages 31 and 53.
- (2) Report of Special Agent CHARLTON C. McSNAIN dated June 27, 1950 at Knoxville entitled, "BUFTON JACK/ZIEN, National Labor Relations Board - LCE", which mentions BORDEN on page 14.
- (3) 1 copy of the House Committee on Un-American Activities report for the year 1940 containing the testimony of BORDEN and that of other witnesses (including FRANK B. WHITE) that identified him as a member of the CP.
- (4) Three photographs of REMINGTON in different poses taken in 1936 and 1937 respectively.

EDWARD MA GLAZEK, former employee of the Tennessee Valley MAUthority, who was a classmate of JOHN C. BORDEN at the University of Tennessee, has recently advised this office that BORDEN was bitten RECORDED - 39

by the "radical bug" while he was a senior in college, permitted his hair to grow long, resigned from his social fraternity and associated himself with the more radical element in the community. Mr. GLAZEK stated that, to his knowledge, BORDEN definitely considered joining the Communist Party at one time and may have done so. He stated that BORDEN became interested in the cooperative movement and was active in the formation and management of a Cooperative Store supported by TVA personnel at Norris, Tennessee which was looked upon as a socialistic undertaking of the highest type.

One point in particular which it is felt BORDEN may be able to clear up is the meeting at the MALCOMERE apartment, 1412 Forest Avenue, Knoxville, as related on page 14 of the signed statement of BURTON J. ZIEN included in the report of Special Agent CHARLTON C. McSWAIN. It is believed that REMINGTON was present at discussion groups at the MALCOMERE apartment in June or July 1937 and it is the recollection of Professor HOWARD ALLEN BRIDGMAN that he attended meetings of the CP at this address at which REMINGTON was present. This is a very material point in the forthcoming law suit.

Two separate reports should be submitted in this case, one bearing Perjury caption, New York origin, with Bureau copies marked to the attention of Mr. BELMONT, and the other under the LGE classification bearing caption, "WILLIAM WAITER REMINGTON, Aka Bill, Director of Export, Program Staff, Office of International Trade, Department of Commerce, Washington, D. C. - LGE." Please designate a copy of both reports for the New York and Knoxville offices.

It is requested that the material which is enclosed herewith to Miami be returned to the Knoxville Office upon completion of investigation in the Miami Division.

Reference is made to Bureau letter to New York, dated July 18, 1950.

On June 24, 1950 KENNETH McCONNELL, Weaverville, North Carolina, advised Special Agent STANLEY C. SETTLE of this Office, while en route to board a plane for Washington, D. C. in connection with the above captioned matter, that ROBERTY SPIVACK, an old friend of McConnell's and reporter for the New York Post, had unexpectedly visited him the preceding evening and that both had talked until about 4:00 A. M. McConnell said at that time that SPIVACK was interested in the REMINGTON case, but discussed no details on the matter.

On July 24, 1950 while Special Agent STANLEY C. SETTLE was interviewing McCONNELL on another matter, McCONNELL inquired as to the trial date set for REMINGTON. When he was advised in the negative, McCONNELL said that he thought that he would write to SPIVACK and find out what happened. At this time McCONNELL said that apparently SPIVACK is doing a great amount of research on the REMINGTON case. McCONNELL said that SPIVACK seemed to know a good bit about the case, referring to SPIVACK's visit. Nothing further was discussed by McCONNELL as would pertain to SPIVACK.

Re Knoxville letter to New Haven, cc to Bureau, Boston and New York, dated July 18, 1950, wherein it is stated, "Bernard Borah died in 1944. Plans are being made for Boston to interview his ex-wife, now Mrs. Stillman P. Williams, nee Muriel Speare, upon her return from Switzerland the latter part of this month. She can be located at 234 Highland Avenue, Winchester, Massachusetts."

For the information of the Bureau and Boston, it has been ascertained that Mrs. WILLIAMS and her husband, STILLMAN P. WILLIAMS, arrived at the Port of New York on the DeGrasse of the French Line on July 24, 1950, en route to 234 Highland Avenue, Winchester, Massachusetts.

Further for the information of the Boston Office, Mrs. WILLIAMS was interviewed concerning REMINGTON on May 24, 1948, by the Atlanta Office. At that time she stated she knew REMINGTON socially and as a fellow employee of the Tennessee Valley Authority in Knoxville, Tennessee, about 1936 or 1937. She explained that she was never very closely associated with REMINGTON and that she knew nothing regarding his activities or associations. However, she stated she had no reason to doubt his loyalty and would regard him as a loyal citizen. DEFERRED RECORDS

There are being forwarded to the Bostony photostatic copies of pages 1266 through 1310 of the HCUA report in 1940, before which Committee Mrs. WILLIAMS and her husband testified on July 26, 1940. It is to be noted that in this testimony Mrs. WILLIAMS identified herself as a member of the CP for approximately two years beginning in July, 1937.

It is believed that a review of this testimony will materially aid the Boston Office in its interview of Mrs. WILLIAMS!

It is suggested that JOHN MOUTOUX, a reporter for the Knoxville News-Sentinel in 1936-37, be located and interviewed concerning his possible knowledge of REMINGTON's activities and associates.

It is suggested that MOUTOUX's whereabouts can be ascertained through the Washington Office of the Scripps Howard newspaper chain, through inquiry at the National Press Club in Washington and through a search of the indices of the Bureau and Washington Field Office.

As indicated in the minutes of the Current Events Class on the topic of "Spain" dated June 18, 1937 and similar minutes dated June 25, 1937, as made available by Professor HOWARD ALLEN BRIDGMAN and as disseminated in photostatic form by the Boston Office, JOHN MOUTOUX was an associate of certain individuals also known to have associated with REMINGTON. While not an employee of the Tennessee Valley Authority, he moved in the same circles insofar as social and extra-curricular activities were concerned. He had the endorsement of the TVA Lodge #136, AFGE, for a position on the Knoxville Housing Authority in 1937. He is known to have been strongly pro-CIO and to have participated in an extraordinary degree in a strike at the Aluminum Company of America at Alcoa, Tennessee in 1937 in which two persons were killed, and is also known to have taken a very active interest in the affairs of the North American Committee to Aid Spanish Democracy at Knoxville.

It is known that MOUTOUX was particularly active in behalf of the American Newspaper Guild (CIO) at the time the Guild organized employees of the two Knoxville daily newspapers in 1937 and in that connection was associated with BERNICE WORGAN, also a reporter on the Knoxville News-Sentinel who later became a full time organizer for the Newspaper Guild and who BRIDGMAN states was recruited into the Communist Party by him at Knoxville in approximately August 1937

While specific information is not in the possession of this office to substantiate the belief that he was acquainted with and associated with REMINGTON, it is neverthelessfelt that MOUTOUX wundoubtedly knew REMINGTON. He should not, however, be interviewed: without specific Bureau authority inasmuch as he is a newspaper many and of known liberal tendencies.



Set forth below for possible future reference is a summary of the adjudication of the Remington case under the President's Loyalty Program:

An investigation concerning Remington was conducted by the YEI in 1948 under the provisions of Executive Order 9835. At that time he was Director Of the Export Program Staff, Office of International Trade, U. S. Department of Commission on June 12, 1948. Remington was suspended from his position on July 1948, for an indefinite period pending a hearing before a Loyalty Board.

On September 22, 1948, the Loyalty Board, Fourth United States Civil Service Region, ruled that on all the evidence reasonable grounds existed for beteaber 27, 1948, Remington appealed to the Covernment of the United States. On September 27, 1948, Remington appealed to the Loyalty Review Board and asked that Miss

Richardson, Chairman, presiding. Remington was represented by the law partnership of Rauh and Levy. Chairman Richardson pointed out that counsel had requested the Board to have hiss Bentley available for cross-examination, but having no power to subposens, the Board had requested her presence by letter dated October 29, 1948, which be added to be presented as a presence of the presence of the Board by letter dated November 10, 1948, that due to presence of the presence of t

The Loyalty Review Board decided that the evidence as presented did not establish reasonable grounds for the belief that Remington was disloyal to the U. S. government. On February 9, 1949, Mr. Richardson advised the Secretary of Commerce that Remington should be returned to the position from which removed. Remington duced one grade to GS-14 and assigned to duties as and International Trade Economist.

By letter dated April 13, 1950, we advised Mr. Richardson that additional investigation was being conducted regarding Remington under the Loyalty Program and the results would be transmitted to him. Thereafter we furnished Mr. Richardson, the Civil Service Commission and the Department copies of 67 loyalty reports. Remington resigned his position on June 9, 1950, effective June 12, 1950. He was indicted for perjury on June 8, 1950. This indictment was referred to in the Bureau's letter further investigation would be conducted under the Loyalty Program. Ordinarily would have discontinued the Loyalty investigation immediately upon termination of amployment, but it was not deemed advisable to do this in the Remington investigation.

In an article in the Washington Evening Star on June 18, 1950, ten days after Remington's indictment, Mr. Richardson was quoted as saying the question "before us was whether Remington was then a Communist, and we found no basis for so holding..... PERJURY

PURPOSE: To advise that the allegations made by Seth X flood Richardson and Frances Perkins before the subcommittee of the Committee on Appropriations, House of Representatives, that the information in possession of the Loyalty Review Board regarding Remington was not as complete as the information presented at the Remington perjury trial is correct. It will be noted that the perjury investigation of Remington was handled as a special, consumed approximately eight months time, involved some 44 field offices and 7 foreign countries, and was a most exhaustive investigation.

BACKGROUND: Reference is made to Mr. Glavin's memorandum to Mr. Tolson dated May 2, 1951, captioned "House Hearings, Independent Offices Appropriations for 1951, Part I," which contains excerpts from Mr. Seth Richardson's and Miss Frances Perkins' testimony before the subcommittee of the Committee on Appropriations, House of Representatives. Mr. Richardson stated, concerning the William Walter Remington case, in reply to Congressman Albert Thomas' question, "Did the Loyalty Board have the benefit of the FBI information as to Mr. Remington's Communist activity back in 1939 and 1940?" "Yes and no, Mr. Chairman. The evidence with reference to Remington's activities from 1938 to 1940 was immensely amplified at the trial in New York over what was disclosed in the FBI investigations." You noted, "What about this. H."

Miss Perkins in discussing the Remington case before the same, subcommittee advised in response to Congressman John Phillips' interrogation as to whether or not the "seven checks" made of Remington all cleared him, "No, there was a full field investigation on him, too, a full FBI investigation, and a check of the House un-American Activities Committee material. All that was before the Loyalty Review Board..... However, I think we should point out to you, in fairness to all concerned, that the material which was placed before the grand jury quite a good while later, almost a year later, and which was brought out before the rial in the courts, where he was convicted of perjury, was not presented to the Loyalty Review Board." wife, Anne, had solicited funds for the American Youth Congress delegates during their convention in Washington, D. C., in February, 1941. It was also reported that he and his wife were members of the Washington Bookshop Association. At the conclusion of the investigation, Remington was interviewed and admitted past membership in the American Peace — Mobilization and also that he was sympathetic with and did research for the American Youth Congress. The reports reflecting the results of this investigation were transmitted to the interested agency, Office for Emergency Management.

Thereafter, in May, 1948, a full field loyalty investigation was conducted based on Remington's past affiliations with the American Peace Mobilization and the American Youth Congress as well as information received from Miss Elizabeth Bentley who was able to put Remington into the Communist Party as a dues paying member and who also had advised that Remington had furnished her, a self-confessed Soviet espionage agent, with confidential information from the Department of Commerce files. The Field was also furnished with information that Remington had been referred to by J. S. Remine, Deputy Sheriff, Knoxville, Tennessee, as one of the "other Communist associates" of David Martin.

The investigation disclosed that while at Dartmouth College he was known to fellow students as being "left of center" and a member of the Young Communist League. It was also developed that Remington went to Knoxville to accept employment with the Tennessee Valley Authority on September 25, 1936, and resigned his position on April 30, 1937, subsequently returning to Dartmouth College. Persons interviewed during the investigation advised that Remington, while living in Knozville, associated with Henry C. Hart, Merwin Todd, Harry F. Alber, Bernard Borah, Mabel Abercrombie and Muriel Borah. J. S. Remine, upon interview, advised that in his capacity as Deputy Sheriff of Knox County, he had conducted certain investigations in 1937 and it was his opinion that Remington, Horace Bryan, Merwin Todd, David Martin, Henry C. Hart, Bernard Borah, F. M. Benson and Kenneth Cameron were active in organizing the Communist Party in Knox County. Mrs. Roxie J. Paris, a former member of the Communist Party in Knoxville, advised during the loyalty investigation that Martin, Borah, Abercrombie, Hart and Cameron were known to her as members of the Communist Party in Knoxville. As a matter of interest, Hart and Abercrombie admitted their past memberships in the Communist Party before the House Committee on un-American Activities in 1940.

In the Washington Field Office report submitted to the Loyalty Board there was set forth in toto the signed statement made by Remington on April 23, 1947, regarding his activities with Elizabeth Bentley. In this statement he admits acquaintanceship with Joe North, editor of "New Masses" who lived next door to his mother-in-law, Mrs. Elizabeth Moos, and through Joe North, met an individual known to him as Helen

who was subsequently identified as Elizabeth Bentley. He admitted meeting Helen in Washington, who he claims was a reporter for the "PM" newsapaper, and of furnishing her with certain information which he obtained through his position with the Department of Commerce. He also advised that he gave her certain sums of money during his periodic meetings with Helen, which he claimed were in payment for copies of the "Daily Worker" and "PM." Also included in the Washington report was the statement obtained from Remington during the Hatch Act investigation in 1942.

Thereafter, the reports containing the information summarized above were furnished to the Civil Service Commission on June 12, 1948, and to the Department on June 25, 1948. On the basis of the information furnished to the Civil Service Commission, Remington was suspended by the Department of Commerce on July 18, 1948, pending a hearing. On September 22, 1948, the Loyalty Hearing Board ruled that on all the evidence submitted during the loyalty investigation, reasonable grounds existed for belief that Remington was disloyal. Following appeals: the Loyalty Review Board decided that the evidence did not establish reasonable grounds for belief that Remington was disloyal and ordered that he be returned to his position on February 9, 1949.

You will recall that on September 30, 1948, Remington appeared at the Bureau and was interviewed by me, at which time Remington recounted in general language his past association with persons of Communist Party sympathies and with Communist front organizations. He then discussed the allegations made by Miss Bentley and stated that he intended to challenge her statements in public for his own self-protection. The results of this interview were furnished to the Civil Service Commission and to the Department on October 1, 1948.

During the perjury investigation, which you will recall was handled as a special, a most extensive and exhaustive investigation was conducted. Investigation was conducted by forty-four field offices and in England, France, Japan, Persia, Canada, Thailand and Germany. Former Communist Party members who knew Remington in Knoxville were interviewed and their testimony was utilized during the trial. Anne Remington, divorced wife of Remington, was interviewed exhaustively during the perjury investigation. She had not been interviewed previously during the loyalty investigation because at that time she was married and living with Remington and there was no indication that she would talk to the Bureau. 'It was her testimony which was most damaging to Remington and the new leads which developed through her information assisted greatly in the investigation. It will also be noted that Seth Richardson was asked by Congressman Thomas whether the Loyalty Board had the Linefit of FBI information as to Remington's Communist activities

in 1939 - 1940. Remington left Knoxville during the latter part of 1937 to return to Dartmouth, married Anne Moos in 1939, and came to Washington in May, 1940, to work. It would, therefore, appear that Anne Remington would naturally have pertinent information concerning Remington's activities during the pertinent period of 1939 and 1940 had she been willing to talk at that time. This period of Remington's activities was extensively developed during the perjury investigation activities was extensively developed during the perjury investigation because of information furnished by Anne Remington. Logically, the loyalty investigation was not as complete and extensive as the perjury investigation but, as noted above, certain portions of information relating to Remington's Communist Party activities in Knoxville and the information received from Bentley were furnished to the Loyalty Board for consideration in this case.

PURPOSE: To advise that Seth Richardson's and Frances Perkins's statements before the Subcommittee of the Committee on Appropriations,

House of Representatives, concerning the Remington case are correct.

The Bureau was able to present additional evidence at the perjury/trial which had not been developed during the loyalty investigation.

BACKGROUND: Concerning the Seth Richardson and Frances Perkins statements before the Subcommittee of the Committee on Appropriations, House of Representatives, regarding the amount of information furnished to the Loyalty Review Board concerning Remington's loyalty and the amount of evidence presented during the Remington perjury trial, the Bureau was able, as a result of the perjury investigation of Remington, to produce additional information relating to his Communist activities. Richardson's and Perkins' statements are, therefore, correct in this

In the loyalty investigation we did develop and disseminate to the Civil Service Commission information that Remington, while a student at Dartmouth College, was a member of the Young Communist League and while employed by the Tennessee Valley Authority in Knoxville, Tennessee, associated with individuals who were described as Communists, namely, Henry C. Hart, Merwin Todd, Harry F. Alber, Bernard Borah, Mabel Abercrombie and Muriel Borah. J. S. Remine, former Deputy Sheriff, Knox County, who conducted certain investigations in 1937, advised it was his opinion that Remington, along with others, was active in organizing the Communist Party in Knox County. Also included in the loyalty reports was information furnished by Elizabeth Bentley concerning Remington's Communist Party membership and his connection with the Soviet espionage ring which operated in the late 1930's and early 1940's in New York City and Washington, D. C. RECORDED: 1367/

As was pointed out by Richardson Jand Perkins, considerable additional vidence was presented at Remington's perjury trial which we secured subsequent to the loyalty investigation. This evidence was developed through interviews with Christine Eversole Benson, Kuniel Speake Williams, Kenneth McConnell and Howard A. Bridgman who later testified at the trial that Remington was a member of the Communist Farty white employed by the TVA in Knozville in 1936-1937. The testimony

of Mrs. Anne Remington was most damaging to Remington, since she was able to state firsthand that both she and Remington were dues paying members of the Communist Party and had met Elizabeth Bentley through arrangements made by Joe North, editor of "New Masses." She further was able to state that on their return from their honeymoon in Mexico in 1939, she and Remington stopped at Knoxville where she was introduced to Henry Hart, Bernard Borah and Muriel Speare, who Remington described as former fellow TVA employees and Communist Party members. On return to New York, both she and Remington enrolled in the Workers School for courses in Marxism, which school was then located at Communist Party headquarters. Additional information was developed through Anne Remington concerning Remington's Communist Party activities which was presented by Anne Remington while testifying at the Remington trial.

WILLIAM WALTER REMINDTON PERJURY

A recent review of the Bureau files regarding William Walter Remington for the purpose of furnishing the Department a list of communications disseminated by the Bureau regarding Remington prior to the time he left Government service. During the review the following personal history data and Government employment data regarding Remington was noted and is suggested it be placed in the files for possible future reference purposes:

Remington was born October 25, 1917, in New York City, to Frederick Remington and Lillian Sutterland. Several weeks following his birth, he moved to Ridgewood, New Jersey. While there he attended Kenilworth Grammar School until 1930 and Ridgewood High School until 1934 when he graduated. In September, 1934, he entered Dartmouth College, Hanover, New Hampshire, and as of June, 1936, he had completed his freshman and sophomore years.

From September, 1936, to May 1, 1937, he was employed with the Tennessee Valley Authority in Knoxville, Tennessee. For a portion of the Summer of 1937, he was employed with the Workers Education Committee in Knoxville, Tennessee. He returned to Dartmouth College in September 1937, and had completed his junior and senior years by June, 1939, at which time he graduated. He entolled in Columbia University in June, 1940, and obtained a Masters Degree in Economics from that university in June, 1941. It is noted that from May, 1940, to July, 1941, Remington was employed at the National Resources Planning Board in Washington, D. C., but during a portion of this period, he was

studying at Columbia University for his Doctorate, commuting between

Remington met Ann Moos Imandt in February, 1938. At the time a student at Bennington College in Vermont. They were married mber 23, 1938, in New York State. Two children were born to rriage, namely, Bruce on March 15, 1942, and Galeyn on April 8, Ann Remington was awarded a final decree of divorce on 5, 1949, in the Circuit Court of Fairfax County, Virginia.




