Dear Director William Webster: Re: ABSCAM

I can well imagine the terrible pressure that is being focused at the office of the director since the publication of the covert investigations into illegal influence peddling all across the nation. It appears to be symptomatic of the world we live in that the influence one weilds is more important than the job one performs. It well past the time when such manipulations are rewarded with both monetary, and status enrichments to the perpetrator of such immoral acts. Investigations such as those carried out by the skillful operatives of your department deserve to given the credit for the ethical climate they seek to preserve. Whether it involves a politician, a labor leader, an insurance broker, a stock analyst, or a bible-belt preacher, all these professionals are subject to the moral standards we expect of our leaders. The public cannot countenance immoral, or illegal practices among its government, and community executives without endangering the whole social system.

Let me encourage you to continue your very proper investigations even though you will be pressured to back off from what you consider a very proper responsibility. Congress is very chagrined over the seven Congressmen, and one Senator who have been linked to bribery, and conspiracy by closely channeled tape, and video evidence collected in the process of investigations into malfeasance in office. The Senate, and House Ethics Committies are very lax in their oversight of solons who are subject to extremely heavy lobbyist influence constantly to the performance of their duties. The real culprit are the lobbyists who attempt to exert undue influence on legislation for their employers who spend freely to support, or contest legislation that would adversely affect their special interests. A strong effort by the Senate, and House Judicial Committies to strictly limit the number, and activities of highly paid mercenaries of special interest would go along way to defuse some of the pressure on the elected officals, and those in prominent positions in government, and private industry.

It is obvious from the disclosures among the top executives of most of our upper etchelon industrial concerns that bribery, pay-offs, conspiratorial conduct of every form, are practiced without constraint in most business dealings. This perhaps is the result of the international acceptance of 'Baksheesh' which is the by-word of commercial contact between suppliers, and purchasers. The Boeing, Lockheed, I. T.T., the list is endless, and has compromised many foreign heads of State implicated during subsequent investigations alleging such unethical, and immoral practices. Burt Lance, Hamilton Jordan, G. William Miller, among those accused of improper behavior, or illegal procededures, give witness to the depth of the influence conspiracy that meanaces every day life. It is granted that none of those mentioned is guilty until proven so in court, but the stigma attached to the charges tend to bind those accused to those convicted previously. If any undue pre-trial prejudice exists it is unfortunate, but I cannot see how exposed investigations that have to come to light at some point would not present such a viewpoint.

The F.B.I. investigation termed, "ABSCAM", is apparently the result of an inquiry into stolen art that is marketed on the underground exchange in the U.S. In the process of this operation information was tendered that influence could be purchased for any number of areas of both business, and government. The required arrangements could be used for whatever interest the procurer had in mind if the offer was acceptable. Now, I ask in all earnestness, how simple a set-up would be proffered if this practice were not widespread, and generally permitted to exist by those who should be controlling such activities? Even second rate spy plots have more cunning employed in the payoff for services rendered than this latest escapade by some of our most experienced solons.

I am reminded about what Senator Muskie's reply was when he was quizzed about the ethicacy of undercover operations to expose the influence peddling existant in all walks of political life. Replying that he personally felt that inquires into suspected illegal, and immoral practices by public servants of any category was necessary. He may not of necessity approve every type of operation that uncovers such evidence, and the methods used to accumulate the information for conviction, but the results prove that they are vitally needed for control of abuse. He was saddened by the discovery of wrong-doing by fellow solons, but also heartened by the evidence that the watching entities are active.

The other long-term inquires into wholesale insurance fraud, and kickback operations throughout the southern district of the U.S. principally along the Gulf Coast, reveals the broad extent of the bribery, and payoff system that has existed for so long with only an occasional instance surfacing when the circumstances became so flagrant that they could not be covered up. Not all the responsibility for such dereliction of duty should fall on the charged perpetrator for he would not be in that lucrative position if great efforts were not made by those who would influence him, or by an apathetic public which chooses to accept these conditions as a necessary procedure in the conduct of business. As a responsible society we cannot condone the unlawful actions by any societal member, but very especially our major role models, the elite leadership of industry, and government. Just dismissing it with the discovery of such great wickedness by saying that it exists on every level, and must therefore be a part of the conduct of all affairs is betraying the trust that everyone should be responsible for.

The recent F.T.C. probes into the felonious activities of the funeral industry, the used auto business, the insurance brokerage operations, and dozens of other nefarious activities places extra burdens on those law enforcement agencies that are responsible for the proper conduct of day to day operations of legitimate trade domestically, and internationally. The high level of criminal conduct used by many organizations to merchandise their wares predisposes these industries to close scrutiny by watchdog agencies at all levels of government. Funeral Associations from Texas, New York, and Pennsylvania reported on the practices currently used in their respective areas. This industry deserves to have a very broad based delving into its suspect practices, but the Congress is seeking to curb the F.T.C. powers to investigate independently by establishing committees which must be informed of the procedures to be followed. This smacks of cover-up in my ledger, and I have complained bitterly to those supporting such Congressional white-washing of wrong-doing!

Most serious-minded solons are stating broad support for the F.B.I. efforts to expose the illegal shenanigans of the minority of office holders, and evilly-inspired influence merchants who sell their souls for profit, and status. Many of this nation's citizens do desire to improve the ethical standards that should be the hallmark of leadership starting at the very lowest level of activity, to the very pinnacle of so-called success. We would much prefer to feel comfortable about our elected leadership, instead of suspicious of their true intent. The days of the giant political machines such as Tammany Hall, the Pendergast Bunch, and the Jack Daly Mob. are in the past, and we should well profit by their obvious excesses in the conduct of public, and private affairs. By burying our head in the sand as the ostrich does to avoid facing reality, we accomplish nothing that will improve the climate in our nation. Let us then face up to our individual, and collective responsibilities, wherever they lie!


I am certain that Attorney-General Benjamin Civiletti is behind your investigative program, and will continue to support the activities that expose the criminals, and culprits in our society. Certainly there may be mitigating circumstances that would distinguish between certain culpability, and innocent enticement. I do not believe that your present cases involve entrapment in that your office took every precaution to not directly offer bribes, or considerations for services rendered. The usual immunity that cloaks the Congressmen should not interfere in the Justice Department proceedings that are required to exonerate the innocent, and convict the dishonest practitioners.

The President has expressed extreme dismay at the proposal by Congress to handicap the F.T.C. by making it subservient to a host of Congressional Committees that would seek to mitigate the direct charges of the F.T.C. investigations. Characterizing the attempt by Congress to take the pressure off the industries now under scrutiny by the F.T.C. as meddling in the proper conduct of that agency charged with fair commercial practices, is unhealthful. Covering up the wrong-doing to save the reputation, and freedom of the violators of official law does not enhance our public image one bit. We cannot successfully deal with the day to day problems that all societies face nagged by distrust, and suspicions of malfeasance in office. It must be recognized that ethical standards are absolutely required in leadership areas of every type, and strict adherence must be maintained to those rules on pain of repudiation by the public which employs most of the perpetrators.

Let us therefore stand behind our watchdogs, keep the pressure off them so they can perform their appointed tasks as they should be carried out.

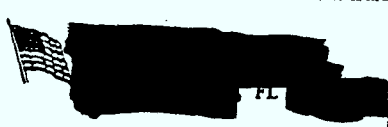

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

PUBLIC RESPONSE Re ABSCAM

I am writing to request a meeting between you and representatives of the National Association of Arab Americans (NAAA) concerning press reporting on ABSCAM, the FBI's recent undercover investigation. Our concern is not the substance of the investigation but rather the use of an Arab-related "cover story" that has deepened anti-Arab prejudice because it reinforced the familiar stereotype of Arabs as high-spending people with low moral values. We are less disturbed by the possibility of a decision to "stick it to the Arabs" than that it may never have occurred to the planners that ABSCAM was prejudicial and likely to damage American relations with the Arab world.

I would not be candid if I were not to say that the FBI has a poor reputation in the Arab-American community. This view by people who pride themselves on their loyalty to the United States stems from FBI activities such as "Operation Boulder" that may have had a valid objective but that ended up violating the civil rights of American citizens of Arab ancestry.

We believe that an informal discussion with you would be mutually beneficial and perhaps help clear the air. It is in the interest of the FBI to have the confidence of the American people as well as to understand more about relating to communities that seem to be unduly on the receiving end.

We would anticipate bringing four or five individuals in our group. We would appreciate it if your office could give us a call so that we can arrange a time to meet.

NAAA Statement for FBI Director William Webster

The FBI has developed a credibility problem in the Arab-American community resulting from FBI activities that may have had a valid goal but that had a highly prejudicial side effect on Arab-Americans in the process. Arab-Americans are loyal and law-abiding citizens whose support the FBI needs for its legitimate purposes, but in order to regain this support the FBI must develop a cultural awareness still lacking.

The deplorable effect of ABSCAM on the public's perception of Arabs (and by extension Arab-Americans) has no doubt been made clear. Nevertheless, it is important to reiterate our concern that if this negative effect never occurred to the planners of ABSCAM, it serves to underscore the need for heightened cultural sensitivity within the FBI. The popular image of the Arab is regrettably a two-dimensional caricature with lots of money and low moral values. Apparent Administration endorsement of this image in ABSCAM must be condemned.

Operation Boulder, mandated by President Nixon following the 1972 Munich Olympics tragedy, was intended to screen out potential "Arab terrorists" but resulted in a massive "fishing expedition" that saw good and decent Arab-Americans harrassed, embarrassed, and humiliated --sometimes publicly-- by FBI officials attempting to link them to illegal activities solely on the grounds of their cultural origins. Operation Boulder was a black chapter in the history of American civil rights and government interference.

The FBI can and must take steps to avoid such mistakes in the future. NAAA stands ready to provide assistance in cultural interpretation of Arab, Arab-American, and Islamic subjects to FBI officials upon request. We urge that the FBI take the initiative in this regard.

The United States has vital national interests in the Arab World, and the Arab-American community serves as a link with the Arab World, reinforcing traditional bonds of friendship with the region. It is important that Arab-Americans have confidence in all the branches of our government, including the FBI.

The apparent willingness of Members of the U.S. Congress to accept bribes from FBI agents posing as representatives of Arab interests is a sad commentary on the morality of Congress. Dear Congressman Matsui,

I have been in law enforcement for 19 years, the last 10 of which including traveling around the country training officers in a special area of vice that has been very successful in corrupting government officials. During these many years in law enforcement, travel, and consulting with other agencies, it was found that people in law enforcement had a very low opinion of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. These opinions came from officers who had dealt with the FBI at local, state, and federal levels. It was generally held that the FBI would do little or nothing in regard to corrupt officials, or any complicated criminal case, even when it fell within their jurisdiction; yet all agreed that time and again the FBI would fall all over themselves to take credit for an arrest for some minor bank robbery or car theft.

The new FBI Director's promised attack on organized crime and white collar crime was looked at with a jaundiced eye by those in law enforcement who had long ago disbelieved press releases by the FBI.

The recent revelations of the undercover sting operations by the FBI have proved all of us skeptics completely wrong. Those of us in law enforcement who have criticized the FBI for those years of incompetence should step forward and give them our wholehearted support and urge them to continue with this type of investigations.

My concern as a person in law enforcement, and more importantly as a private citizen, is that because some members of Congress have become suspects in these cases that pressure could be brought against the FBI to change its aggressive policy, or to attack the
