

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. John W Serette was convicted Tuesday inglit of accepting a bribe from an FBI undercover agent in the Abscam political corruption investigation.

The South Carolina Democrat, the second congressman convicted in the Abscam investigation, was charged with accepting the money from the agent who was posing as a representative of wealthy Arabs needing special immigration legislation.

The U.S. District Court jury also convicted John R. Stowe, a Richmond, Va. businessman, who was charged with aiding and abetting Jenrette in the bribery scheme.

The jury of eight women and four men returned their verdicts in U.S. District Court after some four hours of deliberations that began just after lunch. The verdict was announced at 5:15 p.m. CDT.

After the jury foreman, Sylvia Parker, announced the verdicts, Jenrette, sitting at the defense table, bowed his head and sobbed into his hands. Stowe sat impassively as he had during most of the five-week trial.

After leaving the courtroom, Jenrette sobbed on the shoulder of his wife, Rita, for nearly a half hour.

He told reporters he was "very much in shock."

"Regardless of what those (FBI audio and video) tapes said, I didn't take any money. I haven't done anything to sell the office," said the 44-year-old, third-term congressman.

He said he planned to continue his re-election campaign, although adding he would meet with the Democratic chairmen in the 10 counties he represents "to determine the best course." "I'm not going to let this destroy

me." he said at one point.

Defense attorneys asked that the jury

be polled individually on the verdicts, and each juror quietly responded "guilty" on each charge.

Jenrette was convicted of one count of conspiracy to commit bribery and two counts of bribery. Stowe was convicted of one count of conspiracy and two counts of aiding and abetting bribery.

Each man could face a maximum 35 years in prison and thousands of deliars in fines.

Sentencing will be scheduled later.

Rep. Michael Myers, D-Pa., was convicted Aug. 30 in the first Abscam trial and on Oct. 2, he was expelled from the House by a vote of 378 382

Before the jurors began deliberating.
U.S. District Judge John Garrett Penn instructed them on the laws of conspiracy and bribery and on the legal defense of entrapment.

Both Jenrette and Stowe cistmed, they were victims of entrapment, in which iaw enforcement officials induce or persuade persons to commit unlawful acts they would not otherwise commit

Penn told the jury such inducement may take many forms including persuasion, fraudulent representations threats, coercive tactics, harassment, promises of reward, or pleas based on need, sympathy or friendship."

The jury spent more than a month listening to witnesses and watching FBI videotapes, as the government tried to show that Jenrette and Stowe split a \$50,000 payoff from an undercover agent posing as a representative of wealthy Arabs.

Jenrette took the stand last week to deny he accepted the bribe, which was offered in return for his promise to introduce special immigration legislation for the fictional Arabs.

Dear Congressman Traxler:

I was listening to a broadcast this morning relative to the ABSCAM situation, the convictions that resulted therefrom and the congressional hearings going on relative to some of these people. The thought occurred to me while listening: Who decided which congressmen would be offered bribes and why did this person decide to pick the congressmen he picked?

It seems to me that this question might be even more important than whether someone was or was not involved in ABSCAM. Is this an effort by someone in the FBI, or someone orchestrating the FBI to force the Congress to knuckle under to the "clout" of the FBI? I would really be interested in your reaction to these questions and I would be even more interested in seeing a resolution introduced calling for an investigation into the questions of "who" and "why" these particular congressmen were offered bribes.







Several weeks ago, KSL criticized the "Abscam" investigation conducted by the F.B.I. In response, Mr. Roger Young wrote from Federal Bureau of Investigation headquarters in Washington, D.C. He said, in part (quote):

". . . Some crimes, such as public corruption, would rarely be discovered or prosecuted without undercover activity. Both the person offering the bribe and the person accepting it are covert in their criminal arrangement. Since bribery has no traditional victim, except the unknowing citizen/taxpayer, there is no one to come forth and report the crime.

"All of our undercover operations, including Abscam, are targeted toward criminality, not individuals or institutions. The Abscam case began as an investigation into stolen art in New York and from there led to allegations of illegality in the New Jersey casinos. Eventually the trail of alleged criminality led us to national public officials."

### F.B.I. Inspector Young continued:

"Undercover operations do not 'cause' crime; they merely provide an opportunity for those inclined to break the law to do so while the government compiles the evidence. By detecting criminals who would have otherwise gone undiscovered, these undercover activities also may discourage similar criminal activity.

"The FBI is committed to using its investigative tools lawfully and aggressively to make the greatest possible impact upon major areas of criminality. We believe that our undercover operations, including Abscam, are an essential element of that commitment."

KSL thanks Inspector Roger Young of the F.B.I. for his comments.

# Comment

FOR many months the American public has been treated to hair-raising drama through the courtesy of a government agency. The curtain raiser has filled many fascinating news segments on television and in the other media.

The drama has all the intrigue of a James Bond movie. The actors are government employees and the broad outlines of the script were prepared by a government agency. The dramatic series is titled ABSCAM.

The production was the work of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The plot was simple. Dangle cash before elected officials to test whether a \$50,000 payoff will secure some promise of political favor. The scap opera involved the rental of a swank Washington, D.C., home elaborately equipped with secret comeras and recording devices, luxurious hotel suites, a plush 62-foot yacht and an extensive cast including about 100 FBI agents.

The results were anything but complimentary to Congress or comforting to the public which chose certain officials. The televised scenes of congressmen stuffing money into their packets and using a vocabulary characteristic of X-rated movies was not edifying. It certainly dramatized the danger of electing officials on the basis of charisma and promises rather than an character and performance.

But the entire ABSCAM operation raises serious questions. Should the FBI pour its resources into such an effort? Are there more pressing priorities? Is the whole idea of devising honesty tests for officials and citizens good policy? Does the game approach official entrapment?

The FBI is responsible for enforcing federal laws. It has 7,600 special agents and operates on a budget approaching \$1 billion.

Under longtime director J. Edgar Hoover FBI emphasis was on espionage, bank robberies and organized crime. Since William H. Webster became bureau chief in 1978 it has given prominence to so-called white-collar crime. ABSCAM was part of this new affensive.

But while the FBI was focusing its energies on ABSCAM the country experienced the sharpest rise in crime in four years. The latest annual statistics released by the agency show that crime rose by 9.1%. Violent crime was up 11%. Forcible rape increased by 14.2%; robbery by 12%; aggravated assault by 10.1%; and murder by 9.3%. At the same time arrests for such crimes failed to keep up with the rise in crime statistics. Arrests increased by only 3%. No arrests were made in 75% of the robberies; 86% of the motor vehicle thefts; 85% of the burglaries; 81% of the larceny thefts; 52% of the forcible rapes; 41% of the aggravated assaults; and 27% of the murders.

The rising crime rate is anything but encouraging. A recent report on crime sponsored by A-T-O Inc. painted a gloomy picture of a U.S. citizenry paralyzed by fear. The study was based on interviews with more than 1,000 randomly selected people.

The fear of crime is alarmingly pervasive, affecting the young and the old, the poor and the affluent, men and women, the rural and the urban. This pervasive fear is changing the American people from an open, gracious and generous society into a closed, distrustful and constricted society, according to the study.

## Do we want a Federal Bureau of Instigation?

In view of the alarming increase in violent crime and the dreadful effect this is having on society, why does the afficial federal agency instituted to fight crime spend its resources on ABSCAM escapades? Should the bureau instigate as well as investigate crime?

U.S. District Court Judge John P. Fullam has said "No!" to the last question and has overturned the conviction of two ABSCAM victims. Two members of the Philodelphia City Council were found guilty of extantion by a federal jury. But Fullam, who presided at the trial, reviewed the verdict and overturned it. He declared the FBI had overstepped the bounds of propriety. "The evidence establishes entrapment," he stated.

"No one who has viewed the videotaped evidence in this case would avoid feelings of distress and disgust at the crass behavior the tapes revealed. The jury's verdict represents a natural human reaction to that evidence.

"But, in the long run, the rights of all citizens not to be led into criminal activity by governmental overreaching will remain secure only so long as the courts stand ready to vindicate those rights in every case."

Whether or not the judge's decision will be sustained on appeal remains a question. Some current instructions to the jury define entrapment as an instance in which law-enforcement officers have "induced or persuaded an unwilling person to commit an unlawful act." But these instructions also point out that "where a person is predisposed to commit an offense — that is, ready and willing to violate the law—the fact that government agents merely afford an opportunity for him to do so does not constitute entrapment."

The whole question of tempting people into crime is touchy. One point is how big should the temptation be. In ABSCAM the cash bait apparently was limited to \$50,000. And some individuals indeed refused the bait. But suppose it were raised to \$100,000. Then to \$500,000. Then to \$1 million. Perhaps to \$10 million. An old maxim says: If a man resists temptation it generally is not because he is strong but because the temptation is weak. Is it really in the public interest for the government to run a testing lab to see how much temptation citizens can withstand? Do we want a Federal Bureau of Instigation?

Another delicate issue is who should be selected for the gavernment temptation tests. The FBI insists that the ABSCAM victims fell naturally into its net because they had underground reputations for accepting bribes. But once the enticement pattern is set it easily could be steered toward political apparents. This has become the standard procedure in totalitarian regimes.

Temptation started in the Garden of Eden when Satan dangled the "apple of knowledge" before Eve. In the Lord's prayer Christians plead with their Heavenly Father not to be led into temptation. It would seem that a government, allegedly concerned with human rights, could grant citizens the same favor and not dangle before them the alluring apple conceived by the evil genius of hell.

### **ABSCAM** and Temptation

As one who served for over 35 years with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, I am shocked at the February editorial, "Do we want a Federal Bureau of Instigation?"

You allege entrapment by FBI agents but do not mention that the entire activity in ABSCAM was approved and constantly monitored by high officials of the Department of Justice and by FBI Director William H. Webster, himself a former federal judge. You cite one instance where U.S. District Judge John P. Fullam overturned two convictions for alleged entrapment of ABSCAM victims, but you do not list the other ABSCAM cases.

I feel the FBI should pursue vigorously white-collar crime in order to prosecute corruption by public officials wherever it rears its ugly head. Experience has shown how difficult it has been legally to root out and prosecute successfully such corruption and, therefore, new approaches such as "sting programs" by law enforcement are necessary. They have been very successful and in most instances have withstood court challenges

Your editorial touches on the legal definition of entrapment and notes that where a person is predisposed to commit an offense, the fact that government agents merely afford him an opportunity to do so does not constitute entrapment.

Common sense says that a public official imbued with honesty and integrity has but to say "No" when offered a bribe.

Your editorial alleges that while the FBI was focusing its energies on ABSCAM, the country experienced its sharpest rise in crime in four years. You do not tell readers that the FBI does not have jurisdiction over local crimes such as rape, robbery, assault, murder, etc., unless the crime occurs on a government reservation. Your censure in this connection should be directed to appropriate local authorities, not the FBI.

Kenneth J. Haser Bathesda, Md. I just have finished your February Comment and found it most interesting.

But I still don't have an answer to something you brought up.

A jury of 12 good men and women listened to the evidence in a case, lasting some weeks. With all 12 in agreement, a verdict was presented to the judge, who overturned the findings and reversed the verdict. Why should so many people lose their valuable time on jury duty, when a judge has the final say?




