Background:

Names and pictures relating to the Alcatraz escapeas were found in two packets fashioned from the raincoat material utilized in the life raft and Mae West jackets, and since their discovery in a whirlpool near Alcatraz, the names have been checked out without any trace of the escapees. The Anglin brothers and Morris, like the other escapehazard convicts at Alcatraz, have previous histories of escape and attempted escape. Morris, on September 20, 1959, was found run-ning back to his cell at the U.S. Penitentiary, Atlanta, at the time another inmate,

escaped. Morris was not prosecuted for this attempt.

was assigned to cell on September 10, 1961. He denied making the holes and claimed that they were probably made by an inmate formerly assigned to that cell.

It was ascertained from U. S. Penitentiary, Alcatraz, on June 22, 1962, that the first time white cement paint, water mix, was ordered by that institution was on October 10, 1961, and it was not delivered until October 27, 1961. This was purchased through GSA and is listed as GSA article 8010-286-7721. This is the only type of cement paint that has been used inside of the cell block at the penitentiary. Advised that if you mixed a small amount of water with the white cement paint it would dry very quickly. Then the inmate who was camouflaging the hole would in all probability use some of the regular prison paint to go over the outside of the cement paint and this would camouflage the hole . made available a sample of the white cement paint used by the institution as described above and it is being submitted in four plastic type containers.

There is being submitted a sample of the prison type paint utilized in painting the cells at the penitentiary.

The FBI Laboratory is requested to analyze the material believed to be cement paint which was submitted by referenced letter and ascertain if it is a similar cement type as to the enclosed known sample of cement paint. In addition, the Laborato is requested to analyze the torques appearing paint which is being submitted and which is used by the penitentiary in painting inmates cells. The latents noticed on the window were streaked rather than clear impressions as though the hands had slid ever the glass when manipulating the window. The best impressions were found on the outside edge of the wooden window sill where four dark colored finger impressions of possible value were noted. In view of the nature of the material transferred to the wooden sill these impressions were not dusted but a section of the window sill was removed and is being submitted herewith.

It is requested that the following examination be conducted:

Compare any legible latents with the fingerprints of FRANK LEE MORRIS, FBI # 2157606; CLARENCE ANGLIN FBI # 4731702; JOHN WILLIAM ANGLIN FBI # 4745119 in an effort to determine whether any of the latents can bee said to be identical or not identical to either of these men.

will also process the entire window sill, check and compare the latents on this section of window sill against those of the above named escapees to determine whether identical or not. The yellow painted surface is the top of the sill, the unpainted surface the bottom and the pink surface where the latents are now visible is the outsideedge.

The above examination is requested in an effort to determine whether the escapees may still be on the island.

A thorough search both at the time of the escape and subsequent to the above incident has failed to locate any sign of their presence on the island.

According to SAC Price, the jacket is similar in every respect to the one left behind on Alcatraz by the subjects and the other which was washed up on the Pacific shore not far from the Golden Gate Bridge June 15, 1962. Examination of the jacket recovered from the San Francisco Bay today showed it had brown stains, possibly blood. The valve was open in a crimped condition, giving the appearance of having teeth marks. It is entirely possible that the escapee wearing this jacket attempted to prevent the air from escaping by squeezing this valve with his teeth. REC- 37

Results of examination:

Specimen E4 (Popular Mechanics, March 1988) contains an article discussing various types of life preservers. The article includes pictures of a man vearing a yoke type preserver similar in shape to Q3 through Q5, with the caption "Yoke-type vest holds swimmer high and apright; keeps unconscious man riding high, face out of water." The article states, however, that the yoke type preserver makes primning difficult.

Specimen R5 (Sperts Illustrated, Mangh 21, 1963) in discussing various inflatables, life preservers, teys, et cetera, states that "The composition of most inflatables.....is wither vinyl plastic or rubberized fabric. Rubberized fabric.lic durable as more difficult to puncture than vinyl."

Specimen ES (Popular Mehanics, November 1960) contains an article on making decays out of inner tubes by a vulcanising process. Neither the material nor the process was used in constructing Q3 through Q7.

The life preservers were tested for their ability to retain air. They were inflated until firm, and then weights were placed on them. It was necessary first to seal three punctures in Q5. Specimen Q3 appeared to be completely airtight, remaining firm for several hours, Specimens Q4 and Q5 lost most of their air in about an hour. Movever, the rate of deflation was slow, and pressure could me doubt be maintained by mouth.

The hair on the dummy faces was verified as being of human origin.

The dummy faces were examined for the presence of bristles similar to those composing the E7 brush, but none were found.

Specimen Q18 has a base of concrete composed of Pertland coment and sand. Over the concrete is a layer of white concret point similar to the ER white concret point.

Specimes (1) is begiesly a mixture of Fortland Coment, sand grains and white coment point with a layer of white bound point over the mixture.

Specimen Q21 is similar to Q10 in that it is becievely a mixture of Portland coment and white coment paint over which is white coment paint.

Specines Q30 is formed from seep packed ever a small bundle of white cottes rags.

Although the tan or flosh-colored paint on the dumny faces was basically similar to the E7 paint, differences were noted. It appears that paint like E7 could have been used on the dumny faces; however, prior to use other paint ingredients were added to it. For example the paint on Q80 and Q81 contained barium not found in the E7 paint, and the paint on Q18 and Q19 contained more lead than the E7 paint. Paint ingredients, pigments or extenders containing barium or lead could have been added to E7 and then the mixture could have been applied to the dumny faces.

The two paddles, Q24 and Q25, are similar in design and construction and are composed of similar materials.

The blue-green paint used on the cells, specimen II (FBI Laboratory report dated July 3) was similar in color and composition to the blue-green paint on Q24 and Q25.

The walls or sides of the periscope, Q23, and the backing on Q26 was composed of a material similar to an artist panel which is a white cetten canvas ever a stiff cardboard backing. This panellithe material present in the periscope, Q33, bears the trade name "Elue Boy" and "18" X 24". The adhesive on the inside of the periscope is similar to Ecu-Weld liquid plastic adhesive as found in specimen Q23.

All of the submitted saw blades in specimens Q6, Q10 and Q13 appear to be homemade. The following information was compiled concerning the saw blades:

It appears probable that the four pieces of steel listed in the last table represent materials from which the homemade saws were made.

In dimensions and appearance the 11/16" wide steel stripe are similar to metal from a large spring. Steel banding strap material for use in properting boxes for chipment is usually softer than the new blade metal but it looks strikingly similar to it. The prison officials probably can determine the most logical source of the saw blade metal including the 1/2" wide metal.

It is not possible to estimate the age of the saw blades on the basis of the amount of rust on them.

Specimen Q0 consists of the round knurled handle and 1 5/8" of the filing portion of a small, burken file. The information "2 \$INCHES" appears on the handle of the old file which identifies it as a product of the Simonds Saw and Steel Company, Fitchburg, Massachusetts, a large volume manufacturer of saws and files.

In addition to the three thin pieces of steel in Qll which appeared similar to the steel from which the saw blades were made, there were numerous pieces of miscellaneous metal, homemade tools, tablespoon handles, a small wooden block with three set screws and a homemade flashlight.

The flashlight demonstrated the ingensity of the prisoners is stilling available anterial to accomplish their purpose. The housing for the two pealight batteries (one battery is a spare) is a small sectangular plantic bey thick has a bale in one and through which the bulb is enroved so that the base of the bulb contacts the center post of the battery. A fastener, similar to an accomplish file fastener, is employed as the means of enrying the electricity from the battery base to the side of the bulb and it also acts as the switch. There is no lone or other protection for the bulb.

To pertinent information was developed from examining the electric motor, Q13, the steel scraping or digging tool, Q14, the electric cords of Q16 and Q17 and the two pieces of steel in Q16.

Specimen Q15 consists of three tablespoon handles, a homemade steel tool with a paper tape handle and some black fabric tape stored around part of a small Singer Sewing Machine book containing some writing. No significant information was developed concerning the tablespoon handles or the small tool.

No blood was identified on specimens Q4 and Q5.







It appears probable that the four pieces of steel lested in the last table represent materials from which | It is not possible to estimate the age of ___ the saw blades on the basis of the amount of rust on them. In dimensions and appearance the 11/16" wide steel strips are similar to metal from a large spring. Steel banding strap material for use in preparing leases for shipment is usually softer than the saw blade metal but it looks stribingly similar to it. The prison officials - probably can determine the most logical source of the saw blade metal including the "12" wide metal. EXAMINATION OF FILE FOUND IN MORRIS' CELL Specimen Q9 consists of the round bourled handle and 15/8 of the filing portion of a small, broken file. The wooden block could be used as a chuck on an electric drill. The flashlight demonstrates the ingenity of the prisoners in utilizing available material ___ to accomposible their purpose. The housing for the two penlight batteries (ombattery in a spare) is a small rectangular plastic box which has a hole in one end through which the bull is screwed so that the base of the bulb contacts the center post of the leathery. a fastener, similar to an accompile fasterer, is employed as the means of carrying the electricity from the battery base to the side of the - bulb and it also acts as the switch. There is no lear or other protection for the built.

EXAMINATION OF SPECIMENS Q12, Q14-Q17

No pertinent information was developed from examining the electric motor, Q12, the steel scraping or digging tool, Q14, the electric cords of Q16 and Q17 and the two pieces of ottel in Q16.
