THE LETTER REQUESTED CESSATION OF THE WAR IN VIETNAM.

THERE WERE NO INCIDENTS OR ARRESTS. THE ACTIVITY

ON MAY FIFTEEN, NINETEEN SEVENTYTWO, SPECIAL AGENTS
OF THE FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION OBSERVED A DEMONSTRAT-
TION AT THE ARMED FORCES EXAMINING AND ENTRANCE STATION (AFES),
GATEWAY BUILDING, EIGHT ZERO FIVE SOUTH SALINA STREET,
SYRACUSE, NEW YORK, FROM ABOUT SEVEN TEN A.M. UNTIL TWELVE
NOON. A GROUP OF ABOUT FOUR HUNDRED FIFTY PERSONS ASSEMBLED
AT WALNUT PARK, NEAR SYRACUSE UNIVERSITY (SU), AT SIX A.M.
AND MARCHED WITHOUT INCIDENT TO THE GATEWAY BUILDING, WHERE
PEACEFUL PICKETING WAS CONDUCTED. THE PRINCIPAL COORDINATOR
OF THE DEMONSTRATION WAS ANTHONY LANCE AVIRGAN, A LEADER IN

THE SYRACUSE PEACE COUNCIL, AN AFFILIATE OF THE AMERICAN
FRIENDS SERVICE COMMITTEE. THERE WERE NO ARRESTS DESPITE
EFFORTS BY SOME OF THE DEMONSTRATORS TO BE ARRESTED BY
STAGING A SIT IN ON THE SIDEWALKS IN THE REAR PARKING AREA
OF AFEES.

ON MAY FIFTEEN, NINETEEN SEVENTYTWO, [REDACTED]
[REDACTED] STATED THAT MOST OF THE DEMONSTRATORS CAME FROM SYRACUSE
UNIVERSITY AND THE STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK AT BINGHAMTON,
THERE WERE A FEW REPRESENTATIVES FROM HOBART COLLEGE, GENEVA,
NEW YORK, STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK AT BINGAMTON, STATE
UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK AT CORTLAND, CORNELL UNIVERSITY AT
ITHACA, NEW YORK, AND LE MOYNE COLEGE, SYRACUSE, NEW YORK.
THE SU STUDENT ASSOCIATION HAD OBTAINED A PARADE PERMIT AND
THE DEMONSTRATORS COMPLIED WITH THE TIME STIPULATED IN THE
PERMIT. SOME OF THE PARTICIPANTS EXPECTED TO BE ARRESTED

REGISTER DISSENT FOR NIXON'S APPROACH TO PEACE.

IT CALLED FOR VOLUNTEERS TO SAIL TO NIXON'S KEY BISCAYNE
HOME TO LEAVE A "BALLOON MINE" AS A SYMBOL OF DISGUST AT
HIS LATEST "PEACE MOVES". THE "BALLOON MINE" WAS DESCRIBED
AS A HARMLESS BALLOON ON A TWELVE FT. LINE WITH A WEIGHT
FOR AN ANCHOR. THE BALLOONS WERE TO BE ANCHORED IN THE BAY
OF NIXON'S KEY BISCAYNE RESIDENCE TO SYMBOLIZE THE
MINING OF THE HARBORS OF NORTH VIETNAM. THE "PEACE ARMADA"
IS TO FORM AT THE FISHING PIER AT DINNER KEY YACHT BASIN.

THE HANDBILL IDENTIFIED THE FOLLOWING ORGANIZATIONS AS SUPPORTING THE BLOCKADE: THE AMERICAN FRIENDS SERVICE COMMITTEE, FIRST UNITARIAN CHURCH, THE NEW PARTY AND VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR.

[REDACTED] ADVISED THAT THE DADE COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY AND THE UNITED STATES SECRET SERVICE WERE TO MEET WITH THE ORGANIZERS OF THE BLOCKADE AT WHICH TIME FEDERAL AND COUNTY LAWS WITH RESPECT TO IMPEDING OR BLOCKADING NAVIGABLE WATERS WILL BE EXPLAINED AND A WARNING WILL BE ISSUED.

THE NEW PARTY, ALSO KNOWN AS THE PEOPLES PARTY OF FLORIDA, FLA. IS A POLITICAL ORGANIZATION THAT DESCRIBES ITSELF AS AN ALTERNATIVE TO THE REPUBLICAN AND DEMOCRATIC PARTIES.

THE VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR IS A NATIONAL VETERANS ORGANIZATION WITH A NATIONAL OFFICE LOCATED AT TWENTYFIVE WEST TWENTYSIXTH STREET, NEW YORK. ITS FIRST PUBLISHED OBJECTIVE IS "TO DEMAND AN IMMEDIATE CESSATION

ZONE. THEY COMMENCED TO PLACE IN THE WATER WEIGHTS TO WHICH
WERE ATTACHED A SMALL NUMBER OF BALLOONS ON A TWELVE FOOT
STRING. THE BALLOONS WERE TO REPRESENT THE MINING OF NORTH
VIET NAM HARBOR BY THE UNITED STATES.

At approximately nine a.m. on 5/3/72, SA's [redacted] and [redacted] conducted a physical surveillance in the area of the Friends School, 5117 N. Charles Street, Baltimore. It was previously determined that the Baltimore Chapter of the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) would send the demonstrators to Washington, D.C. on 5/3/72 to participate in a one day vigil at the White House, and transportation would be by chartered bus through the Parker Service Bus Company, Baltimore.

At 9:10 a.m. on 5/3/72, it was observed that 70 individuals, most of whom were in their early 20's, boarded two buses from the above company, and the buses departed the Friends School at 9:15 a.m., reportedly for Washington, D.C. These buses were designated as chartered school buses, orange with black horizontal stripes and bearing two Maryland license plates on both ends. It was previously determined through contact with the Baltimore Chapter of the AFSC that the buses would depart Washington, D.C. at 5:30 p.m. on 5/3/72 and return to Baltimore within an hour thereafter.

Today at a committee meeting of our bishop's pastoral council of the [REDACTED] diocese, I saw a slide show called "The Automated Air War." The color slides and taped narration dealt with new electronic weapon systems and anti-personnel bombs being used in Southeast Asia. The purpose seemed to me to be to arouse people against President Nixon's handling of the war.

The slides were produced by NARMIC (National Action Research on the Military Industrial Complex), a Project of the American Friends Service Committee, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. My question is this: What kind of organization is this? It sounded like a very amateurish production — poor narration, extra noise on the tape, and so on. Is this just another radical organization started to pile more anti-war propaganda on the American people? What upset me even more was to find out that they charged one of our nuns \$55 for the trash.

If you can send me any information on this organization, I would be truly appreciative. If possible, I would like to get this information before April 30, as we are having a general meeting of the whole pastoral council on that day, and they plan to show the slides again.

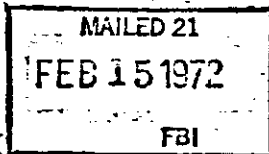

As an orthopaedic surgeon, it becomes my task at times to examine young people who are trying to evade the draft, on the basis of an orthopaedic disability.

On several occasions it turns out that these people have asked for my qualifications which are on file with the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons, the American College of Surgeons, American Board of Orthopaedic Surgery and any medical society so I do not think that my qualifications can be doubted. However, they demand my qualifications and a summary of the patient's disabilities. The summary is always given to them. I refuse to give them my qualifications because I do not believe my qualifications can be doubted by such an organization as American Friends Service Committee. It seems to me that this is an extreme subversive agency. After checking into it with one of the investigative services in our area, shows that they have been highly organized and connected with communist activities and I just do not understand why a subversive agency like this is allowed to exist as a 5th column in the United States.

I respectfully submit that this organization should be investigated and terminated or should I be exterminated.

A source advised that on Friday, September 10, 1971, following some hastily-made changes in location, a Regional Conference sponsored by the AFSC commenced at 3014 Washington Square, Austin, Texas. Among groups represented were the People's Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ), May Day members, Peace Makers, John Baez School of Nonviolence in Colorado, the Gay Liberation, and the AFSC.

Washington, D.C., and consisting of over one hundred organizations employing massive disobedience to combat the issues of war, racism, poverty, and repression.

MAY DAY COLLECTIVE (MDC)

The MDC is self-described as a multi-issue organization which was formed as a result of the May, 1971, activities at Washington, D.C. (WDC).

The conference location on Friday night was at a Quaker meeting house. The conference, originally slated for the John Knox Ranch, Wimberly, Texas, was relocated to Austin when the conference coordinators were notified by the Presbyterian owners of the John Knox Ranch that the ranch was no longer available because of the possible attendance of persons from the Gay Liberation. As a result of this last minute cancellation of the conference location, registration in Austin was somewhat delayed.

Registration was simple and not mandatory. Persons arriving signed their name only on notebook paper. The registrars were ~~local representatives of the American Friends Service Committee~~, local representatives of ~~the American Friends Service Committee~~. Participants were directed to gather in a small room where numerous personal independent conversations were held.

Of the approximately forty persons in attendance, the following were noted to be present:

Informality and lack of organization dominated the conference throughout.

At approximately 5:00 p.m., Friday night, [redacted] spoke to the group of approximately forty people about "house" rules, such as cleaning, eating, and sleeping. He then announced that the floor was open to any and all who wished to speak regarding any topic they might chose.

[redacted] began speaking on the difficulty encountered during the recent conference of May Day people in Atlanta, Georgia. She said there were so many splinter groups resulting from differing political views and other infighting that another conference would be necessary to shape things up.

Following her, there was general discussion about the difficulties encountered during the May Day, 1971, demonstrations at Washington, D.C. This general discussion led to one of the first disagreements within the group, that of regional demonstrations versus national demonstrations.

It seemed as though the trend of the conference had been set by these opening statements as the following two days were dominated by debating the merits of local versus national demonstrations.

The major theme of the local advocates was that more could be accomplished at home and that money spent in travel, lodging, and other expenses related to national demonstrations supported the system and inhibited the movement.

Participation by conference members was less than desirable and by 10:30 p.m., a suggestion was made to break up into four smaller groups. Each group contained from eight to fifteen people.

At approximately 12:30 a.m., Friday, September 10, 1971, the meeting broke up with approximately forty of the participants remaining at the AFSC house to spend the night.

Source one, mentioned above, advised that on Saturday, September 11, 1971, the conference resumed at the Faculty/Staff Lounge in the Texas Union Building, Second Floor, UTAT Campus.

 was the first speaker and represented himself as a spokesman for the ~~AFSC~~. He discussed the Vietnam War and its repercussions in the United States, the general repression of the public in the United States, and the United States economy. The morning session was reported as being very dull and lacked both participation and cohesiveness. It was noted that several persons in attendance were rapidly approaching a state of sleep.

Following the lunch break, , began discussing the Grand Jury system. He discussed its past history and present power. He commented

on the fact that the Grand Jury has too much power today when one takes into consideration the immunity provisions. He offered tips on what members of the audience could do if anyone comes to their door asking questions. He advised them to refuse to answer any and all questions from Government representatives and to refuse them entry into the homes, even if a search warrant is shown. He continued to advise that if they, at any time, began answering questions, there is a point of no return when one gets himself in so deep that a judge may compel him to answer further questions through the immunity clause.

~~Wallrich~~ was questioned by a member of the audience whether or not false information should be given to officials. In response to this, ~~Wallrich~~ stated none of you (the audience) know the power of the Grand Jury or a court room and that it would be to your disadvantage to give false information. He advised against ever giving false information.

"Witch-hunts" were discussed wherein the Grand Jury power was stated to be so great that they utilize this power to gain confessions and admissions from non-cooperative persons with the use of jail threats. ~~Wallrich~~ stated that everyone in this room could be subpoenaed because of the nature of this meeting.

Late Saturday afternoon, workshops were organized on war tax and draft resistance which included courts and jails, nonviolence and simple civil disobedience, and alternative life style community. Wallrich attended the nonviolence

Three general proposals were seemingly agreed on during the Saturday session. These proposals are:

- (1) Passive resistance, which meant they will not voluntarily accompany a policeman to jail;
- (2) Refusal to pay bail after being arrested;
- (3) Refusal to pay fines after being found guilty.

The meeting adjourned late Saturday evening and persons again lodged themselves at the AFSC house.

The fourth source further advised that ~~_____~~ presented the idea of no bail and non-payment of fines in which he stated that it would be best to remain in jail and organize the prisoners for peace purposes. He stated remaining in jail would also, at some point, if persons continued to be arrested, overpopulate the jail so much, so as to cause the release of persons first arrested. He advised that those released would again become involved in peace action and the volume of persons arrested would be so great as to confuse the police system.

It was noted that several persons in the conference agreed to go to Washington, D.C., but there was much dissent regarding whether or not one would stay in jail as proposed by ~~_____~~. Other persons who did not agree to go to Washington advised the great movements could be accomplished by locally-based organizations.

Source one advised that on Sunday, September 12, 1971, the conference resumed at 9:00 a.m., in Hemphill Park, off 30th Street, Austin, Texas. There were approximately forty persons present as ~~the group~~ began discussing the need not to pay fines or make bail if and when arrested. Disagreements immediately again arose about the non-payment of fines and local versus national demonstrations.

There were several general discussions about organizing to convince workers that their particular job was in support of the war and specifically mentioned were workers at the Texas Instruments firm, where the group suggested putting up pickets to talk to the workers about the war supplies they make. It was noted that Texas Instruments makes timing devices for bombs. A question was asked if whether or not there were any of these organizations in San Antonio and someone mentioned the fact that Southwest Research Company was in San Antonio and would be a good place to picket.

The Sunday session and the conference ended early in the afternoon with only those proposals mentioned earlier as major goals of the group. In the end, as in the beginning,

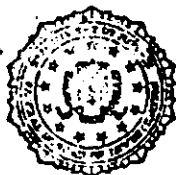

The NPAC was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its basic objective is to unite masses of people including labor unions, GIs, and the black community in the struggle to end United States intervention in Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics. The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

AMERICAN FRIENDS SERVICE COMMITTEE (AFSC)

The AFSC is self-described as a non-profit organization, organized and directed by members of the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers) and funded by both Quakers and non-Quakers. It seeks solutions to both domestic and international problems through non-violent means.

ANTIWAR CONFERENCE

An Emergency Conference to Defend the Right of the Black Panther Party to Exist was held in Chicago, Illinois, from March 6 - 8, 1970. On the morning of Friday, 5/21/71 Mr. BRONSON P. CLARK, Executive Secretary, American Friends Service Committee, Inc., called the Philadelphia Office and spoke to my secretary in my absence from my desk and requested that I call him. I returned his call within a few minutes and was advised by Mr. CLARK that he desired that on some date the following week to come to the Philadelphia Office with a delegation composed of himself, Mr. HENRY BEERITS, Chairman of the Board of the American Friends Service Committee, Inc. and Mr. ALAN HUNT, Counsel for the American Friends Service Committee and member of the law firm of Duane, Morris and Heckscher.

I inquired of Mr. CLARK the reason for his desire to bring the above-mentioned delegation to the office and he stated it was for the purpose of discussing with me the "hard-handed" method by which we executed the search warrant on Sunday, 5/16/71 on the apartment occupied by ANNE FLITCRAFT. Mr. CLARK further advised he was leaving immediately to catch a train. I informed Mr. CLARK I would give the matter consideration and since he was leaving immediately, I would give him an answer on Monday morning.

I called Mr. CLARK on Monday morning, 5/24/71, and advised him that the FBI had served a duly authorized search warrant in a lawful manner and that I felt nothing would be served in discussing the matter any further with them. Mr. CLARK stated since I had declined to discuss our breaking into the apartment of ANNE FLITCRAFT with his delegation that he would "go up a notch" and bring the matter to the attention of the FBI's national office or to the Justice Department in Washington, D. C. He stated he did not want to do this without giving me an opportunity to explain the actions of the FBI in this matter.

For the information of the Bureau, the search warrant in question was described in re communication and it was necessary to make forcible entry into the apartment as no one would answer the door. It was later determined that ANNE FLITCRAFT was in another apartment in the building and she subsequently returned to her apartment while the search was in progress. She was permitted to talk to an attorney who appeared on the scene but the attorney was not permitted to come inside the apartment where he could possibly interfere with the search in progress.

At the time the search warrant was executed, no information had come to the attention of the Philadelphia Division that ANNE FLITCRAFT was on the staff of the American Friends Service Committee Inc.



One hundred and seventy Americans from 41 states will leave from New York's Kennedy Airport on March 3 for a week-long conference with principals in the Paris talks and others. Their objective is finding out what the requisites for peace in Southeast Asia really are.

The Citizens Conference on Ending the War in Indochina, as the project is called, is sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC), Clergy and Laymen Concerned (CALC) and the Fellowship of Reconciliation (FOR).

"The conference will afford a large number of American citizens access to and thoughtful discussion with many persons long familiar with the Indochina struggle," explained Stewart Meacham, peace education secretary of the AFSC. "We hope that upon their return to the United States, the participants will be new and creative interpreters, in their respective communities, of what they understand the requisites of peace to really be."

Participants expect to meet with representatives of the Provisional Revolutionary Government of the Republic of South Vietnam (PRG, formerly the National Liberation Front), the Democratic Republic of Vietnam (North Vietnam), the Republic of Vietnam (Saigon) and the U.S. Delegation.

Meetings are also being arranged with representatives of the National United Front of Cambodia, the Laotian Student Union and various independent South Vietnamese groups opposed to the war (including Buddhists, Catholics, students and groups supporting dissident members of the Saigon Administration's National Assembly.)

Mr. Allan Brick, national program director of the FOR, said that in addition to meeting with official government representatives at the peace talks "we are anxious to learn a great deal more about the recent upsurge of civilian resistance to the war in the large cities of South Vietnam. We want to reach a better understanding of what the Vietnamese people themselves are struggling for."

The Rev. Richard Fernandez, director of CALC, indicated that "the conference will come at an extremely propitious moment given the United States second invasion of a sovereign country (Laos) in less than eleven months. Mr. Melvin Laird," the clergyman continued, "has told us that the invasion of Laos doesn't represent a widening of the war--we are interested to see what both Asians and Europeans see in this new move."

The American Friends Service Committee was founded by a group of Quakers in 1917 to offer young men an alternative to military service. Today, its 600 staff are engaged in peace education, refugee relief, technical aid to developing countries, international conferences and community development work in this country. Its headquarters are in Philadelphia.

Clergy and Laymen Concerned is a 34,000 member inter-religious and anti-war group. It is five years old and has offices at 475 Riverside Drive, New York City phone (212) 749-8518.

Fellowship of Reconciliation is an association of men and women of all faiths who recognize the essential unity of mankind and have joined together to explore the power of love and truth for resolving human conflict. 

A second source has described the Institute of the Black World (IBW) as a non-accredited Atlanta, Georgia based school, established originally under the auspices of the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Fund Center by Vincent Harding, to teach King's philosophy to college level students. Harding led the instruction which Mrs. King, Jr. and the board of the Center felt was amenable to the teachings of Dr. King, Jr., and consisted of courses in black culture.



A booklet available from the IBW during February, 1970, entitled "Institute of the Black World, A Statement of Purpose and Program", on Page 1, under the caption "Introduction" states "The Institute of the Black World is a community of black scholars, artists, teachers and organizers who are coming together in Atlanta under the aegis of Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Center... The Institute of the Black World is a gathering of black intellectuals who are convinced that the gifts of their minds are meant to be fully used in the service of the black community..."

Second source also stated in February, 1970, that, in contributing to structuring of the IBW, Vincent Harding has followed the philosophy of "black supremacy activists".

On March 11 and 12, 1971, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that approximately 170 individuals participating in the Citizens Conference on Ending the War in Indochina, sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC), The Clergy and Laymen Concerned About Vietnam (CALCAV), and the Fellowship of Reconciliation (FOR), departed John F. Kennedy Airport in New York City about 10 o'clock on Wednesday night, March 3, 1971, aboard Icelandic Airlines Flight 200. Other seats on the plane were filled with random travelers. They arrived in Luxembourg about 2 p.m. on March 4, 1971, and they boarded a fleet of chartered buses to Paris, France, a trip of about five hours. The participants were lodged in the Hotel Carnier and The Modern Palace Hotel.

Unwillingness on All Sides Cited Returning Pair See No Progress In Visit to Paris Peace Talks

By TOM STEACY

There is no sign of breakthrough in the long-stalled Paris Peace Talks as both sides refuse to make any further concessions on the points they insist must be included in a settlement of the Indochina war.

The Rev. William T. Gramley of Bethlehem gave this assess-

ment of the talks this morning after he returned from a week-long meeting in the French capital conferring with principals in the peace talks.

Janice "Mickey" Cooper of The North Vietnamese said Easton, who also attended the conference, feels the deadlock is caused by a basic unwillingness of both sides to meet with each other. "Both sides accuse each other of not wanting to meet and POWs 'humanly.'" He noted then each side denies it," she said.

They were among 170 Americans who took part in the Citi-Vietnamese Conference on Ending the War in Indochina. They attended meetings and discussions with representatives of the Provisional Revolutionary Government of the Republic of South Vietnam, the Democratic Republic of Vietnam (North Vietnam), the Republic of Vietnam (Saigon), the U.S. delegation as well as independent groups from Indochina.

Speaking at a press conference at the Lehigh-Pocono Committee of Concern (LEPOCO) headquarters in Bethlehem, Rev. Gramley said the group was told by North Vietnamese officials that American prisoners of war will not be released until all hostilities are ended.

After Troops Leave

According to North Vietnam's peace demands, fighting won't stop until all U.S. forces are withdrawn from South Vietnam.

Rev. Gramley said the North Vietnam officials observed that in all previous wars this century the POW question wasn't settled until after peace accords were reached.

The North Vietnamese said that when the French left Southeast Asia, their prisoners were released. Rev. Gramley added that the North Vietnamese reported it is treating American POWs "humanly." He noted they said only 350 U.S. servicemen are being held prisoners.

Rev. Gramley said the North Vietnamese have two conditions for a negotiated settlement: the United States must withdraw all its troops and The U.S. and Ky must be disposed of as leaders of the Saigon government.

U.S. Demands

The U.S. stipulations for accord, he said, are:

1. a stand still cease fire.
2. a peace conference to deal with the whole question of Indochina.
3. all foreign troops leave South Vietnam.
4. a settlement including all forces in South Vietnam.

5. POWs be released by both sides.

The Rev. Gramley said both sides agree on the point that a settlement should include all sides.

Other than that the North Vietnamese, the conference was told, oppose a cease fire because it would legitimize the current Saigon government. The North Vietnamese maintain an Indochina conference serves only to complicate matters. The question of Vietnam should be dealt with first.

As for troop withdrawals, the North Vietnamese position is that their forces shouldn't have to leave because South Vietnam is their country. Miss Cooper, a local radio newswoman, pointed out that North Vietnam did not directly admit it had troops in the southern portion of Vietnam.

The Rev. Gramley, who is pastor of the West Side Moravian Church, said North Vietnam will accept a coalition government in the south if it does

not include the present Saigon leadership and consists of representatives of South Vietnam, the National Liberation Front and independent groups such as the Buddhists and Catholics. He added that the coalition government must stand for peace, neutrality and independence.

In addition, the Rev. Gramley said North Vietnam opposes Vietnamization because it legitimizes American presence in Southeast Asia.

The Rev. Gramley, who was representing Lepoco at the conference, said they went to Paris to learn about the peace talks and the war. On their findings, he said, we will make up our minds about what the United States should do to end the war.

He said he was one of 150 from the meeting to sign a telegram sent to President Nixon asking: to set a date for withdrawal and to stop political, economic and military support of the Saigon government.

The telegram said a fixed withdrawal date will assure a cease-fire and negotiations for release of POWs. It added that American presence in Southeast Asia leads to continuation of the war and reaction of other countries in the area.

Miss Cooper, who attended the conference independently, said she did not sign the telegram because she hasn't studied all the material from the conference.

Bring the GIs Home Message From Paris:

Mrs. Christopher Returns From Talks With Vietnam Delegate

She listened.

She talked.

She argued.

She is Mrs. Allides Christopher, director of the New Careers Program of the Camden County Council on Economic Opportunity. And she spent a week in Paris, with 171 other concerned Americans, talking to delegates at the Vietnam peace talks.

MOST IMPORTANTLY, she came home this week with some new ideas to share and some old beliefs reaffirmed.

Long opposed to American participation in the Vietnam war, Mrs. Christopher was selected by the South Jersey Peace Center in Moorestown to attend the talks as part of a delegation to the Citizens Conference To End the War in Indochina.

The trip itself was sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee, Clergy and Laymen Concerned about Vietnam and the Fellowship of Reconciliation.

OTHER DELEGATES from this area attending the week-long trip from March 3 to 10 were the Rev. John T. Adamczyk of Moorestown, one of the first organizers of South Jersey SANE, an anti-war group, and Muhammed Kenyatta, administrative

chairman of the National Black Economic Development Conference, based in Philadelphia.

As part of the 171-member peace delegation from 43 states, Mrs. Christopher, of 938-B Phillips St., Camden, met with delegates from all parties participating in the long-running talks.

Among North Vietnamese and National Liberation Front delegates meeting with the group were Xuan Thy, North Vietnam's chief delegate to the Paris peace talks, and Trich Nhat Hanh, head of the Buddhist delegation.

DAVID K. E. BRUCE, who heads the U.S. delegation, met with 12 members of the peace delegation for a short session, Mrs. Christopher said.

"Our meetings with the North Vietnamese representatives turned out to be the most important ones," Mrs. Christopher said yesterday, sitting in her second-floor Camden office at a desk filled with papers and paraphernalia that shouts a busy woman works there. "Our theme was what is essential for peace?"

"And the answers basically were a ceasefire and the withdrawal of American troops. These men and women pointed out that this is a Vietnamese problem that should be settled by Vietnamese and that there have never been Vietnamese troops on American soil to what right have Americans to come to their land."

RELATED TO that viewpoint, she said, is a reluctance of the North Vietnamese and NLF delegates to have faith in negotiations because of the invasion of Cambodia last April and the U.S.-backed South Vietnamese invasion of Laos only a week before Mrs. Christopher and the peace delegation arrived in Paris.

The prisoner of war issue, Mrs. Christopher added, quoting Xuan Thuy, will also be resolved once there is a ceasefire and withdrawal of American troops.

IT IS IN more defined aspects of the war, however, that the 34-year-old mother of two young sons is most interested.

As a woman, she is concerned about the effect the conflict has had on Asian women and their families. "We learned how rampant prostitution has become since the war began, how the family unit has been uprooted and how women have had to become combatants as the manpower pool is more and more drained."

As a black person, she is concerned about what she believes is the "futility of black young men fighting in a war for a country where they can't buy a house where they want to." She vows her sons, the oldest 8 years old, will not fight in the war for that reason.

DURING ONE of the first days in Paris, Mrs. Christopher, along with 13 other black delegates — six women and eight men, including Muhammed Kenyatta — formed a black caucus as a sub-group of the delegation.

"We formed the caucus because we could see parallels in certain kinds of

"The North Vietnamese delegations understand our position as blacks and our history in America. That made us even more aware of how necessary it is for us as blacks to bring about a cessation of this war so that our brothers can stay here to fight against oppression in America."

More convinced now that peace groups must work harder in America in efforts to halt the war, Mrs. Christopher blames the general sluggishness in the peace talks to a failure of the parties to agree on a basis for talks. "One group says negotiate first for a ceasefire, the other side says a ceasefire first, then negotiate. That's what's holding things up."

"BUT THE WHOLE thing," she added, "is that the war meanwhile is dragging on and on, more and more people are being killed, the United States is spending billions of dollars for killing over there when it could be spending it for constructive purposes over here."

"The big explanation is that we have to keep fighting in Vietnam to protect South Vietnam from North Vietnam. Well, that's like hitting a person with your car so that the car behind your's won't hit the person first."

"But what's the difference? The person's dead in both cases."

North Vietnamese Reception Highpoint Of Paris Trip

The Rev. William E. Gramley, pastor of West Side Moravian Church, represented the Laithy Pecqueur Organization of Concern at the recently concluded Citizens Conference on Ending the War in Indochina, held in Paris.

In this article, the Rev. Mr. Gramley discusses the concluding activity of the Americans attending the conference, a reception given by the North Vietnamese and the Provisional Revolutionary Government (NLF) representatives in the French capital.

When you take a wide cross-section of Americans, like those of us who went to the Citizens Conference on Ending the War in Indochina, and send them to Paris to meet with the big brass negotiators, what do you get?

Do you get anything worthwhile out of it? In one sense you get "innocents abroad," and in another sense you get a pretty good display of America's emotions, especially of our desire to love others and to be loved by them. You could call it grass-roots friendship, if you wish.

I want to tell you about this

personal thrust of ours because it may be the central contribution that we made toward peace in Vietnam. On the last evening of the conference we were invited to a reception sponsored by the North Vietnamese and the Provisional Revolutionary Government (NLF) people.

We weren't sure how many would go since we had had a rather "bad day at Black Rock," so to speak, arguing somewhat among ourselves over what actions to take or not to take in the name of the conference. But a goodly number of us went to the reception.

in Vietnamese Poem

After eating some Vietnamese food and reception-like things, I ought to say here (oeuvre) since we were in France), we gathered around the microphone, some of us sitting on the floor side by side with the Vietnamese, although Madame Binh and Xuan Thuy didn't sit down.

Judy Collins sang a song in French and another one about a garden full of weeds and snow. I never heard it before, but it was beautiful.

A Vietnamese girl with a guitarist to accompany her sang a Vietnamese love song which the interpreter said went like this: My mommy asked me where I left my jacket, and I said, "The wind blew it off on the other side of the river. My mommy asked me what I did with my gold ring, and I said "I dropped it in the river."

Then one of our black girls, Alldees Christopher, dressed elegantly in Afro clothing, led the group in the black national anthem — which I had never heard before, either. The Rev. Willie Barrow, a black lady pastor and Operation Breakfast worker from Chicago, said, "Now listen, we're going back to America soon, and if we're going back there, we've got to have some 'soul'. So things really livened up as we sang. "This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine," with various verses to include New York and other states and Vietnam.

It was very moving, and I later wished that I had brought along some Moravian beeswax Christmas candles for each of us to hold. They would have fit in nicely.

Three Vietnamese girls then sang a spirited and harmonious song in their own language. It had a wonderful rhythm to it. I wish people in America could hear such songs and see those girls in their pretty so dai dresses. I don't think we would study war anymore if that happened.

Judy Collins Sing

Judy Collins led us in Poet Sappho's tradition of that song from the Bible about there being a time for everything under the sun, for love, for hate, for war, for peace. We had one original American with us, an Indian girl, and she sang a song in her tribal language. We laughed when she told us to join in on the second stanza.

The Vietnamese translator said that so far no men had sang anything for us, so our black dramatist from Mississippi, Vincent Durrell, got up and enacted a poem which he had composed (I think right then and there) called "Vietnam — Bap."

After we had stood to sing, "We shall overcome," Candy Putter, our coordinator, gave

some pictures of flowers and things to Madame Binh and Xuan Thuy. Madame Binh kissed Candy and said, "I do so for all the Vietnamese women here." When Xuan Thuy also kissed her, one of the Vietnamese men in the group said, "And he kisses her for all of the Vietnamese men here, too."

There was laughter, tears, and friendly embraces. We closed by singing the Vietnamese national anthem as we dragon-danced in a tightly-knit pattern of circles around the room. This type of dance, with hands on the shoulders of the person in front of you, means unity, we were told.

Itaro Evening

It was a rare evening, but an appropriate closing to a long journey and some very long conference sessions. After reflecting upon it on the way back to the hotel in the metro (subway), I knew that I had heard about this sort of thing somewhere before. And then it struck me, that, yes, Jesus had said, "Love your enemies," and, "If you salute only your brethren, what more are you doing than others?"

Somewhat everything that the sponsors of the conference had tried to get us to do or to believe didn't come about by their pressure. But the Spirit of God broke through that night and the reality and truth of our human good will was made manifest. It just may be a step toward peace and reconciliation.

Area Man Deepens Convictions About War At Paris Conference

(Rev. William F. Gramley, pastor of First Baptist Church in Bethlehem, recently returned from Paris, where he participated in citizens' meetings with the four parties to the Paris Peace talks. In an article written for The Express, the Rev. Mr. Gramley explains his thoughts on U.S. involvement in Indochina.)

Four years, several hundred thousand deaths, and almost \$100 billion ago, I went to Washington, D. C. for a conference about the Vietnam war. The Clergy and Laymen Concerned organization sponsored it. At that time most of the facts were hidden from the public, but I must also admit that I was, like so many other Americans, rather indifferent about the war.

I came home from that conference convinced that if we continued any longer in this war, it would be tragic for our nation. My apprehensions were fulfilled. I felt that way about it four years ago. I feel the same today.

Last week I returned from Paris where I attended a Citizens Conference on Ending the War in Indochina (the thing has spread to Laos, Cambodia, and Thailand).

A coalition government is acceptable to everyone except the despots in Saigon. North Vietnam knows that it cannot control the people in the South. It agrees to a coalition of Saigon people (except the despots) and the people (now organized as the Provisional Revolutionary Government), and incensates. But it does want the U. S. to get out—now—for they see us as the great supporters of a minority regime which does not want peace and which imprisons peace-oriented citizens. They will negotiate no further until we set a date for total withdrawal.

There are valid reasons for both sides of the issue. If they are not "valid" reasons from your particular point of view,

they do stem from the interpretations of history which each side holds. The U. S. negotiating team did not want to talk to us about the questions of how we got involved there. That, they said, was not very relevant now, and anyway, they were only carrying out Nixon's policy, not arguing with it or changing it.

There is little consolation for you if you are looking for clear-cut evidence that will make it easy to decide whether you are "for" or "against" our Vietnam policy and our negotiating stance. It always ends up that you have to make decisions like that yourself, based on how you understand morality, justice, history, and various other particulars about who we are and what we in America are trying to do.

When I weigh these questions, I end up convinced that the United States is more at fault in this war than the other side is (the other side being

those Vietnamese, both North and South, who are fighting to be free of domination by all foreign nations).

The Rev. Richard Fernandez from the Clergy and Laymen Concerned Group reminded us of a fundamental issue when he said at the Kennedy Airport, "Above all, remember that while you are riding a jet plane to Paris, people are being killed in Vietnam."

And the Venerable Buddhist monk, Thich Nhat Hanh, told us quite plainly during the conference, "What the peasants and people of Vietnam want most of all is to live. They want peace, not a peace solution. Life is more important to them than justice. Stop the killing, and save us from your salvation."

If any of us have a conscience left (and I say that sincerely because this war is not only killing bodies in Vietnam; it is killing souls and sensitivity in America), if any of us have had even a smattering of religious training, we know that taking life from people is not our purpose on earth. And we must not side-step the issue by accusing the enemy of being just as vicious. We must judge ourselves first. And the judgment is not pleasant, for it includes dropping prisoners out of helicopters and napalm on people; cluster bomb units and defoliants, the Green Beret case and My Lai, tiger cages and the sudden terror of carpet bombing, search and destroy missions, censorship and repression, and thousands of refugees behind barbed wire.

Nowhere did our government's lack of conscience show up more plainly than when Caroline Rees from Massachusetts asked one of the U.S. negotiators this question: "As I look through the

American story, I notice that we are committed to the following: the Geneva Accords, the U.S. Constitution, the U.N. Charter, basic religious principles, friendship around the world, democratic government, and majority rule. And I note that we are committed also to a military dictatorship in Saigon. Why must that one commitment undermine all of our other commitments?"

The negotiator replied: "That's your list of commitments." And she replied, "You mean it's not yours?"

There was another woman in our group who stirred us deeply on the matter of conscience, a Mrs. Agnes Hostettler from Charlotte, N.C. She got up on the last day when we were meeting alone and discussing what we ought to do or not do (such as sign a people's peace treaty) in the name of the conference. Some of us were afraid of what our communities back home would say.

Mrs. Hostettler said, "I have hesitated to speak to you because I still have a German accent, but I must tell you that I lived through the Nazi years in Germany when people said they did not know what was happening. Many who did know were afraid to speak. After the war we held a Nuremberg Trial and judged the leaders to be guilty, but everyone was guilty. Now we know what is happening in Vietnam and what we are doing to those people. We cannot be afraid to take a stand against this war, for we are just as guilty as those who do the terrible things there."

If I may judge by the enthusiasm of Lehigh Valley residents about my going to Paris for this conference and by similar reports from others across the nation, I would say that the American people want peace. Even many of the congressmen who favored this war initially have said, in essence, that we should never have gotten involved in South-

We know that the American people finally rejected President Johnson because of this war. And, as I said several weeks ago when President Nixon announced the invasion of Laos, "That's the end of Nixon," so I believe that the American people will reject him, too. We are a tolerant people, even a patient people, but enough is enough.

Part of the reason why the war continues has to do with our so-called "national pride." No President wants to preside over a military defeat. But we must understand the difference between a mistake and a defeat. To admit that we have erred in our policy does not mean the end of our nation's life and purpose, for we have done good before and we can do good again. France survived her exit from Vietnam. The colonial era is over, and we know it. Our support for dictatorial regimes ought to be ended and our colony in Vietnam relinquished.

The American people are willing to bear some humiliation, even if the President doesn't think so. But there is a second reason why the war continues. And that has to do with our vast and uncontrolled

...the...complex. The role of education in our nation (and hence across the world) is so great that even Congress cannot control it...the military and...the...what they want to do and then...and...check...with Congress. The...has...power, for it

can even turn Food for Peace into gun-for-war.

Or take the fact, for example, that Laos is now the most heavily-bombed country in all the history of the world. Jacques de Corroy, a correspondent for Le Monde, told us about this, for he has been there and seen it — of how we have driven the people into

caves. We have literally bombed them back to the stone age! And did we know that? Did we, the people, permit it? Did Congress? Well, it's part of the ways of our Department of Defense. With secret dispatch and great disregard for law and order and the permission of the American people the war continues and broadens throughout Indochina.

What do we have left, and what hope is there for peace? I have tried to be honest with you (the American people) in what I have said. But I do believe in you, and I believe that God will move you in some way to help make peace a reality. I cannot despair of my fellow citizens. Together we must not be silenced by fear, nor let our consciences be deadened, nor take away the life and breath of living souls, whoever they are, any longer.

The North Vietnamese and the Provisional Revolutionary Government distinguish between the policy of the Nixon Administration and we, the people. They believe that we, the people, want peace but that Nixon gives us war. You have to ask yourself the question, then, "Is that the truth, or isn't it?"

APPENDIX

**BLACK PANTHER PARTY (BPP),
also known as
Black Panther Party for Self Defense**

According to the official newspaper of the BPP, the BPP was started during December, 1966, in Oakland, California, to organize black people so they can take control of the life, politics, and the destiny of the black community. It was organized by Bobby G. Seale, BPP Chairman, and Huey P. Newton, Minister of Defense, BPP.

The official newspaper, called "The Black Panther," regularly states that the BPP advocates the use of guns and guerrilla tactics in its revolutionary program to end oppression of the black people. Residents of the black community are urged to arm themselves against the police who are consistently referred to as "pigs" who should be killed.

The newspaper, in its issue of September 7, 1968, had an article by the then Minister of Education, George Murray. This article ended with the following:

"Black men. Black people, colored persons of America, revolt everywhere! Arm yourselves. The only culture worth keeping is revolutionary culture. Change. Freedom everywhere. Dynamite! Black power. Use the gun. Kill the pigs everywhere."

The BPP newspaper, issue of October 5, 1968, had an article introduced with the following statement: "We will not dissent from American government. We will overthrow it."

David Hilliard, Chief of Staff, BPP, in a speech at the San Francisco Polo Field on November 15, 1969, said "We will kill Richard Nixon."

David Hilliard, in the "New York Times," issue of December 13, 1969, was quoted as follows: "We advocate the very direct overthrow of the government by way of force and violence."

APPENDIXBLACK PANTHER PARTY (BPP)

In the issue of April 25, 1970, the BPP newspaper had an article by Minister of Culture Emory Douglas as follows:

"The only way to make this racist US government administer justice to the people it is oppressing, is...by taking up arms against this government, killing the officials, until the reactionary forces... are dead, and those that are left turn their weapons on their superiors, thereby passing revolutionary judgement against the number one enemy of all mankind, the racist U. S. government."

The BPP Headquarters is located at 1046 Peralta Street, Oakland, California. Branches of the BPP, and Committees to Combat Fascism, under control of the BPP, have been established in various locations in the USA.

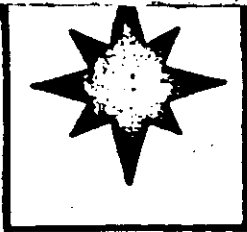

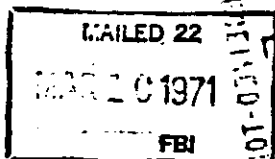
