GATEWAY BUILDING, EIGHT ZERO FIVE SOUTH SALINA STREET,
SYRACUSE, NEW YORK, FROM ABOUT SEVEN TEN A.M. UNTIL TWELVE
NOON. A GROUP OF ABOUT FOUR HUNDRED FIFTY PERSONS ASSEMBLED
AT WALNUT PARK, NEAR SYRACUSE UNIVERSITY (SU), AT SIX A.M.
AND MARCHED WITHOUT INCIDENT TO THE GATEWAY BUILDING, WHERE
PEACEFUL PICKETING WAS CONDUCTED. THE PRINCIPAL COORDINATOR

THE SYRACUSE PEACE COUNCIL, AN AFFILIATE OF THE AMERICAN FRIENDS SERVICE COMMITTEE. THERE WERE NO ARRESTS DESPITE EFFORTS BY SOME OF THE DEMONSTRATORS TO BE ARRESTED BY STAGING A SIT IN ON THE SIDEWALKS IN THE REAR PARKING AREA OF AFEES.

STATED THAT MOST OF THE DEMONSTRATORS CAME FROM SYRACUSE UNIVERSITY AND THE STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK AT BINGHAMION, THERE WERE A FEW REPRESENTATIVES FROM HOBART COLLEGE, GENEVA, NEW YORK, STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK AT BINGAMTON, STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK AT CORTLAND, CORNELL UNIVERSITY AT ITHACA, NEW YORK, AND LE MOYNE COOLEGE, SYRACUSE, NEW YORK. THE SU STUDENT ASSOCIATION HAD OBTAINED A PARADE PERMIT AND THE DEMONSTRATMRS COMPLIED WITH THE TIME STIPULATED IN THE PERMIT. SOME OF THE PARTICIPANTS EXPECTED TO BE ARRESTED AFTER SITTING DOWN IN THE REAR OF AFEES, AND WERE OPENLY FRUSTRATED AT THE LACK OF POLICE ACTION. SOURCE SAID THAT ARRESTS WERE NOT MADE SINCE THE ACTIVITIES DID NOT IMPEDE END PAGE TWO

MIAMI, FLORIDA, ON MAY TWELVE, SEVENTYTWO, MADE AVAILABLE A HANDBILL POSTED AT VARIOUS LOCATIONS NEAR THE BASIN.

THE HANDBILL ANNOUNCES A "BLOCKADE FOR PEACE" TO REGISTER DISSENT FOR NIXON'S APPROACH TO PEACE.

IT CALLED FOR VOLUNTEERS TO SAIL TO NIXON'S KEY BISCAYNE HOME TO LEAVE A "BALLOON MINE" AS A SYMBOL OF DISGUST AT HIS LATEST "PEACE MOVES". THE "BALLOON MINE" WAS DESCRIBED AS A HARMLESS BALLOON ON A TWELVE FT. LINE WITH A WEIGHT FOR AN ANCHOR. THE BALLOONS WERE TO BE ANCHORED IN THE BAY OF NIXON'S KEY BISCAYNE RESIDENCE TO SYMBOLIZE THE MINING OF THE HARBORS OF NORTH VIEWAM. THE "PEACE ARMADA IS TO FORM AT THE FISHING PIER AT DINNER KEY YACHT BASIN. END PAGE ONE

PUBLIC SAFETY AND THE UNITED STATES SECRET SERVICE WERE TO
MEET WITH THE DRGANIZERS OF THE BLOCKADE AT WHICH TIME
FEDERAL AND COUNTY LAWS WITH RESPECT TO IMPEDING OR BLOCKADING
NAVIGABLE WATERS WILL BE EXPLAINED AND A WARNING WILL BE ISSUED.

THE NEW PARTY, ALSO KNOWN AS THE PEOPLES PARTY OF FLORIDA,
IS A POLITICAL ORGANIZATION THAT DESCRIBES ITSELF AS AN
ALTERNATIVE TO THE REPUBLICAN AND DEMOCRATIC PARTIES.

THE VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR IS A NATIONAL VETERANS ORGANIZATION WITH A NATIONAL OFFICE LOCATED AT TWENTYFIVE WEST TWENTYSIXTH STREET, NEW YORK. ITS FIRST PUBLISHED OBJECTIVE IS "TO DEMAND AN IMMEDIATE CESSATION END, PAGE TWO

ON MAY THIRTEEN.

SEVENTYTWO ADVISED THAT A BLOCKADE FOR PEACE TOOK PLACE THIS DATE AT THE SOMETIMES RESIDENCE OF PRESIDENT RICHARD M. NIXON, KEY BISCAYNE, MIAMI, FLORIDA.

- THE BLOCKADE COMMENCED AT TWELVE THIRTY P.M. AND LASTED FOR TWO HOURS. SIX BOATS, WITH APPROXIMATELY FORTY PASSENGERS, APPROACHED WITHIN TWO AND A HALF MILES OF THE PRESIDENT'S RESIDENCE, WHICH IS WELL OUTSIDE THE SECURITY ZONE. THEY COMMENCED TO PLACE IN THE WATER WEIGHTS TO WHICH WERE ATTACHED A SMALL NUMBER OF BALLOONS ON A TWELVE FOOT STRING. THE BALLOONS WERE TO REPRESENT THE MINING OF NORTH VIET NAM HARBOR BY THE UNITED SCATES. END PAGE ONE

DURING THE DEMONSTRATION A BOAT, OCCUPIED BY
CUBANS, ENTERED THE DEMONSTRATION AREA AND PROCEEDED TO PELT

ON MAY THREE, SEVENTYTWO, A SOURCE WHO HAS FURNISHED RELIABLE INFORMATION IN THE PAST REPORTED ABOUT SEVENTYFIVE PERSONS TOOK PART IN A SILENT VIGIL AT THE MAIN LIBRARY, FOURTH AND MADISON, SEATTLE, WASHINGTON, FROM ABOUT NOON TO ONE THIRTY P.M. THAT DATE UNDER THE AUSPICES OF THE AMERICAN FRIENDS SERVICE COMMITTEE (AFSC).

THEY WOULD DEMONSTRATE IN FRONT OF THE WHITE HOUSE IN LAFAYETTE PARK FACING THE WHITE HOUSE, IN FRONT OF THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE BUILDING, ON SEVENTEENTH STREET, NW, ALONG THE SIDE OF THE OLD EXECUTIVE OFFICE BUILDING, ON THE PENNSYLVANIA AVENUE SIDE OF THE TREASURY DEPARTMENT, AND ON THE FIFTEENTH STREET, MM. SIDE OF THE TREASURY DEPARTMENT. THEY STATED THAT THE REMAINDER WOULD STAND ON THE EAST, WEST, AND NORTH SIDE OF LAFAYETTE PARK AND ON PENNSYLVANIA AVENUE ACROSS FROM THE OLD EXECUTIVE OFFICE BUILDING AND TREASURY DEPARTMENT. STATED THE DEMONSTRATION WOULD START AT TEN AM, WITH THE MAJORITY LEAVING AT FIVE THIRTY PM. THEY STATED IT WOULD BE A SILENT VIGIL, AND THAT A DELEGATION WOULD BE SENT TO THE WHITE HOUSE.







As an orthopaedic surgeon, it becomes my task at times to examine young people who are trying to evade the draft, on the basis of an orthopaedic disability.

On several occasions it turns out that these people have asked for my qualification which are on file with the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons, the American College of Surgeons, American Board of Orthopaedic Surgery and any medical society so I do not think that my qualifications can be doubted. However, they demand my qualifications and a summary of the patient's disabilities. The summary is always given to them. I refuse to give them my qualifications because I do not believe my qualifications can be doubted by such as organization as American Friends Servi Committee. It seems to me that this is an extreme subversive agency. After checking into it with one of the investigative services in our area, shows that they have been highly organized and connected with communist activities and I just do not understand why a subversive agency like this is allowed to exist as a 5th column in the United States.



A source advised that on Friday, September 10, 1971, following some hastily-made changes in location, a Regional Conference sponsored by the AFSC commenced at 301s Washington Square, Austin, Texas. Among groups represented were the People's Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ), May Day members, Peace Mikers, John Baez School of Nonviolence in Colorago, the Gay Liberation, and the AFSC.

PEOPLE'S COALITION FOR PEACE AND JUSTICE (PCPJ)

PCPJ, in a press release dated March 1, 1971, described itself as being headquartered in

Washington, D.C., and consisting of over one hundred organizations employing massive disobedience to combat the issues of war, racism, poverty, and repression.

MAY DAY COLLECTIVE (MDC)

The MDC is self-described as a multiissue organization which was formed as a result
of the May, 1971, activities at Washington,
D.C. (WDC).

Quaker meeting house. The conference, originally slated for the John Knox Ranch, Wimberly, Texas, was relocated to Austin when the conference coordinators were notified by the Presbyterian owners of the John Knox Ranch that the ranch was no longer available because of the possible attendance of persons from the Gay Liberation. As a result of this last minute cancellation of the conference location, registration in Austin was somewhat delayed.

Registration was simple and not mandatory. Persons arriving signed their name only on notebook paper. The registrars were tives of Participants were directed to gather in a small room where numerous personal independent conversations were held.

Of the approximately forty persons in attendance, the following were noted to be present:

Informality and lack of organization dominated the conference throughout.

At approximately 5:00 p.m., Friday night, the spoke to the group of approximately forty people about "house" rules, such as cleaning, eating, and sleeping. He then announced that the floor was open to any and all who wished to speak regarding any topic they might chose.

encountered during the recent conference of May Day people in Atlanta, Georgia. She said there were so many splinter groups resulting from differing political views and other infighting that another conference would be necessary to shape things up.

Following her, there was general discussion about the difficulties encountered during the May Day, 1971, demonstrations at Washington, D.C. This general discussion led to one of the first disagreements within the group, that of regional demonstrations versus national demonstrations:

It seemed as though? the trend of the conference had been set by these opening statements as the following two days were dominated by debating the merits of local versus national demonstrations.

The major theme of the local advocates was that more could be accomplished at home and that money spent in travel, lodging, and other expenses related to national demonstrations supported the system and inhibited the movement.

Participation by conference members was less than desirable and by 10:30 p.m., a suggestion was made to break up into four smaller groups. Each group contained from eight to fifteen people.

At approximately 12:30 a.m., Friday, September 10, 1971, the meeting broke up with approximately forty of the participants remaining at the AFSC house to spend the night.

Source one, mentioned above, advised that on Saturday, September 11, 1971, the conference resumed at the Faculty/Staff Lounge in the Texas Union Building, Second Floor, UTAT Campus.

represented himself as a spokesman for the the He discussed the Vietnam War and its repercussions in the United States, the general repression of the public in the United States, and the United States economy. The morning session was reported as being very dull and lacked both participation and cohesiveness. It was noted that several persons in attendance were rapidly approaching a state of sleep.

Following the lunch break, _______, began discussing the Grand Jury system. He discussed its past history and present power. He commented

on the fact that the Grand Jury has too much power today when one takes into consideration the immunity provisions. He offered tips on what members of the audience could do if anyone comes to their door asking questions. He advised them to refuse to answer any and all questions from Government representatives and to refuse them entry into the homes, even if a search warrant is shown. He continued to advise that if they, at any time, began answering questions, there is a point of no return when one jets himself in so deep that a judge may compel him to answer further questions through the immunity clause.

audience whether or not false information should be given to officials. In response to this, stated none of you (the audience) know the power of the Grand Jury or a court room and that it would be to your disadvantage to give false information. He advised against ever giving false information.

"Witch-hunts" were discussed wherein the Grand Jury power was stated to be so great that they utilize this power to gain confessions and admissions from non-cooperative persons with the use of jail threats. Stated that everyone in this room could be subpoensed because of the nature of this meeting.

Late Saturday afternoon, workshops were organized on war tax and draft resistance which included courts and jails, nonviolence and simple civil disobedience, and alternative life style community.

Three general proposals were seemingly agreed on during the Saturday session. These proposals are:

- (1) Passive resistance, which meant they will not voluntarily accompany a policemen to jail;
 - (2) Refusal to pay bail after being arrested;
 - (3) Refusal to pay fines after being found guilty.

The meeting adjourned late Saturday evening and persons again lodged themselves at the AFSC house.

The fourth source further advised that presented the idea of no bail and non-payment of fines in which he stated that it would be best to remain in jail and organize the prisoners for peace purposes. He stated remaining in jail would also, at some point, if persons continued to be arrested, overpopulate the jail so much, so as to cause the release of persons first arrested. He advised that those released would again become involved in peace action and the volume of persons arrested would be so great as to confuse the police system.


It was noted that several persons in the conference agreed to go to Washington, D.C., but there was much discent regarding whether or not one would stay in jail as proposed by the Conference who did not agree to go to Washington advised the great movements could be accomplished by locally-based organizations.

:Source one advised that on Sunday, September 12, 1971, the conference resumed at 9:00 a.m., in Hemphill Park, off 30th Street, Austin, Texas. There were approximately forty persons present as the property began discussing the need not to pay fines or make bail if and when arrested. Disagreements immediately again arose about the non-payment of fines and local versus national demonstrations.

all but a few seemed confused and distressed with what had been obtained during the conference. So ended the conference.



CLARK on Monday morning, 5/24/71, and advised him that the FBI had served a duly authorized search warrant in a lawful manner and that I felt nothing would be served in discussing the matter any further with them. Mr. CLARK stated since I had declined to discuss our breaking into the apartment of ANNE FLITCRAFT with his delegation that he would "go up a notch" and bring the matter to the attention of the FBI's national office or to the Justice Department in Washington, D. C. He stated he did not want to do this without giving me an opportunity to explain the actions of the FBI in this matter.

For the information of the Bureau, the search warrant in question was described in re communication and it was necessary to make forcible entry into the apartment as no one would answer the door. It was later determined that ANNE FLITCRAFT was in another apartment in the building and she subsequently returned to her apartment while the search was in progress. She was permitted to talk to an attorney who appeared on the scene but the attorney was not permitted to come inside the apartment where he could possibly interfere with the search in progress.

At the time the search warrant was executed, no information had come to the attention of the Philadelphia Division that ANNE FLITCRAFT was on the staff of the American Friends Service Committee Inc. 3312 Hamilton NVL 71875.





One hundred and seventy Americans from 41 states will leave from New York's Kennedy Airport on March 3 for a week-long conference with principals in the Paris talks and others. Their objective is finding out what the requisites for peace in Southeast Asia really are.

The Citizens Conference on Ending the War in Indochina, as the project is called, is sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC), Clergy and Laymen Concerned (CALC) and the Fellowship of Reconciliation (FOR).

"The conference will afford a large number of American citizens access to and thoughtful discussion with many persons long familiar with the Indochina struggle," explained Stewart Mescham, peace education secretary of the AFSC.

"We hope that upon their return to the United States, the participants will be new and creative interpreters, in their respective communities, of what they understand the requisites of peace to really be."

Participants expect to meet with representatives of the Provisional Revolutionary Government of the Republic of South Vietnam (PRG, formerly the National Liberation Front), the Democratic Republic of Vietnam (North Vietnam), the Republic of Vietnam (Saigon) and the U.S. Delegation.

Meetings are also being arranged with representatives of the National United Front of Cambodia, the Lactian Student Union and various independent South Vietnamese groups opposed to the war (including Buddhists, Catholics, students and groups supporting dissident members of the Saigon Administration's National Assembly.)

at Tima wreMr. Allan Brick, national program director of the FOR, said that in addition to meeting with official government representatives at the peace talks "we are anxious to learn a great deal more about the recent upsurge of civilian resistance to the war in the large cities of South Vietnam. We want to reach a better understanding of what the Vietnamese people themselves are struggling for."

The Rev. Richard Fernandez, director of CALC, indicated that "the conference will come at an extremely propitious moment given the United States second invasion of a sovereign country (Laos) in less than eleven months. Mr. Melvin Laird," the clergyman continued, "has told us that the invasion of Laos doesn't represent a widening of the war--we are interested to see what both Asians and Europeans see in this new move."

The American Friends Service Committee was founded by a group of Quakers in 1917 to offer young men an alternative to military service. Today, its 600 staff are engaged in peace education, refugee relief, technical aid to developing countries, international conferences and community development work in this country. Its headquarters are in Philadelphia.

Clergy and Laymen Concerned is a 34,000 member inter-religious and anti-war group. It is five years old and has offices at 1,75 Riverside Drive, New York Ciphone (212) 749-8518.

Fellowship of Reconciliation is an association of men and women of all faiths who recognize the essential unity of mankind and have joined together to explore the power of love and truth for resolving human conflict. A second source has described the Institute of the Black World (IIW) as a non-accredited Atlanta, Georgia based school, established originally under the auspices of the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Fund Center by Vincent Harding, to teach King's philosophy to college level students. Harding led the instruction which Mrs. King, Jr. and the board of the Center felt was amenable to the teachings of Dr. King, Jr., and consisted of courses in black culture.

A booklet available from the ISW during Fetruary, 1970, entitled "Institute of the Black World, A Statement of Purpose and Program", on Page 1, under the caption "Introduction" states "The Institute of the Black World is a community of black scholars, artists, teachers and organizers who are coming together in Atlanta under the tegis of Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Center... The Institute of the Black World is a gathering of black intellectuals who are convinced that the lifts of their minds are meant to be fully used in the service of the black community...

Second source also stated in February, 1970, test, in contributing to structuring of the IBW, Vincent Barving has followed the philosophy of "black supremacy activities".

On March 11 and 12, 1971, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that approximately 170 individuals participating in the Citizens Conference on Ending the War in Indochina, sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC), The Clerry and Laymen Concerned About Vietnam (CALCAV), and the Fellowship of Reconciliation (FOR), departed John F. Kennedy Airport in New York City about 10 o'clock on Veinesday night, March 3, 1971, aboard Icelandic Airlines Flight 200. Other seats on the plane were filled with random travelers. They arrived in Luxenbourr about 2 p.m. on March 4, 1971, and they boarded a fleet of chartered buses to Paris, France, a trip of about five hours. The participants were lodged in the Motel Carnier and The Modern Palace Motel.







MOST IMPORTANTLY, she came home this week with some new ideas to share and some old beliefs reaffirmed.

Long opposed to American participation in the Vietnam war, Mrs. Christopher was selected by the South Jersey Peace Center in Moorestown to attend the talks as part of a delegation to the Citizens Conference To End the War in Indochina.

The trip itself was sonsored by the American Friends Service Committee, Clargy and Laymen Conceived about Vietnam and the Fellowship of Reconciliation.

OTRER DELEGATES from this area attending the week-long trip from March 3 to 10 were the Rev. John T. Adamszyk of Moorestown, one of the first organizers of South Jersey SANE, an anti-manual and Muhammed Kenyatta, administrative

chairman of the National Black Economic Development Conference, based to Philadelphia.

As part of the 171-member peace delegation from 42 states, Mrs. Christopher, of 932-B Phillips St., Camden, met with delegates from all parties participating in the long-running talks,

Among North Victnamese and Nutional Liberation Front delegates meeting with the group were Xuan Thiry, North Victnam's chief de egate to the Paris peace tilks, and Thich Nhat Hanh, head of the Buddhist delegation.

DAVID K. E. BR JCE, who heads the U.S. delegation, met with 12 members of the peace delegation for a short session, Mrs. Christopher said.

"Our meetings with the North Vieinamese representatives tursed out to be the most important ones," Mrs. Christophe, said yesterday, sitting in hef second-floor Camden office at a desk filled with papers and paraphernalia that shouts there. "Our theme was what is essential for peace?"

"And the answers basically were a ceasefire and the withdrawal of American troops. IT IS IN more defined aspects of the war, however, that the 34-year-old mother of two young sons is most interested.

As a woman, she is concerned about the effect the conflict has had on Asian women and their families. "We learned how rampant prostitution has become since the war began, how the family unit has been uprooted and how women have had to become combatants as the manpower pool is more and more drained."

As a black person, she is concerned about what she believes is the "futility of black young men fighting in a war for a country where they can't buy a house where they want to." She vows her sons, the oldest 8 years old, will not fight in the war for that reason.

DURING ONE of the first days in Paris, Mrs., Christopher, along with 13 other black delegates — six women and eight men, in cluding Muhammed Kenyatia — formed a black caucus as a sub-group of the delegation.

delegations understand our position as blacks and our history in America. That made us even more aware of how necessary it is for us as blacks to bring about a cessation of this war so that our brothers can stay here to fight against oppression in America."

Mrs. Christopher blames the general sluggishness in the peace talks to a failure of the parties to agree on a basis for talks: "One group says negotiate first for a ceasefire, the other side says a ceasefire first, then negotiate. That's what's holding things up."

"BUT THE WHOLE thing," she added, "is that the war meanwhile is dragging on and on, more and more people are being killed, the United States is spending billions of dollars for killing over there when it could be spending it for constructive purposes over here.







Four years, several bondered thousand deaths, and rimust \$100 killica 'ago, I went to Washington, D. G. for a conference about the Vishaam war. The Clergy and Laymen Concerned organization aponsored it. At that time rome of the facts were hidden from the public, but I must also admit that I was, like so many other Americans, rather indifferent about the war.

I came home from that conference convinced that if we pretinued any longer in this war, it would be tranic for our nation. My apprehensions were fulfilled. I felt that way about it four years ago. I feel the same today.

Last week I returned from Paris where I attended a Citizens Conference on Ending the War in Indochina (the thing has spread to Lass, Cambodia, and Thelland).

There are valid reasons for both sides of the issue. If they are not "valid" reasons from your particular point of view,

they do stem from the inverpretations of history which each side holds. The U. S. negotiating team did not want to talk to us about the questions of how we got involved there. That, they said, was not very relevant now, and anyway, they were only carrying out Nixon's policy, not arguing with it or changing it.

There is little consolation for you if you are looking for clear-cut evidence that will make it easy to decide whether you are "for" or "against" cur Victnam policy and our negotiating stance. It always ends up that you have to make decisions like that yourself, based on how you understand morality, justice, history, and various other particulars about who we are and what we in America are trying to do.

When I weigh these questions, I end up convinced that the United States is more at fault in this war than the other side is (the tables side being those Vicinamese, both North and South, who are fighting to be free of domination by all foreign nations).

The Rev. Richard Fernander from the Clerky and Laymen Concerned group reminded us of a fundamental issue when he said at the Kennedy Airport, "Above all, remember that while you are riding a jet plane to Paris, people are being killed in Vietnam."

And the Venerable Buddhistmonk, Thich Nhat Hanh, told
us quite plainly during the
conference, "What the parsants and people of Victnam
want mest of all is to live!
They want peace, not a peace
solution. Life is more important to them than justice. Stop
the killing, and save us from
your salvation."

If I may judge by the cui thusicsm of Lehiga Valley residents about my going to Paris for this conference and by similar reports from others across the nution, I would say that the American people want peace. Even many of the congressmen who favored this war initially have said, in essence, that we should never have gotten involved in Couth-

<u>Na Ipow that the American</u> provide tinally resected tracely war. And, as I said severs weeks ago when President Nixon announced the investor of Laus, "That's the end of Nixon," so I believe that the American people will reject him, too. We are a tolerant! people, even a patient people, but enough is enough.

Part of the reason why the war continues has to do with our so-called "national pride." No President wants to preside over a military defeat. But we must understand the difference between a mistake and a defent. To admit that we have erred in our policy does not mean the end of our nation's life and purpose, for we have done good before and we can do good again. France survived her exit from Viotnam. The colonial era is over, and we know it. Our support for dictatorial regimes ought be ended and our colony Vietnam relinquished.

The American people are willing to bear some humiliation, even if the President doesn't think so. But there is a second reason why the war continues. And that has to do with our vast and uncontrolled

The North Vietnamese and the Provisional Revolutionary Government distinguish be tween the policy of the Nixon Administration and we, the people. They believe that we, the people, want peace but that Nixon gives us war. You have to ask yourself the ques-tion, then, "Is that the truth, or isn't it?"

BLACK PANTHER PARTY (BPP), also known as Black Panther Party for Self Defense

According to the official newspaper of the BPP, the BPP was started during December, 1966, in Oakland, California, to organize black people so they can take control of the life, politics, and the destiny of the black community. It was organized by Bobby G. Seale, BPP Chairman, and Huey P. Newton, Minister of Defense, BPP.

The official newspaper, called "The Black Panther," regularly states that the BPP advocates the use of guns and guerrilla tactics in its revolutionary program to end oppression of the black people. Residents of the black community are urged to arm themselves against the police who are consistently referred to as "pigs" who should be killed.

The newspaper, in its issue of September 7, 1958, had an article by the then Minister of Education, George Murray. This article ended with the following:

"Black men. Black people, colored persons of America, revolt everywhere! Arm yourselves. The only culture worth keeping is revolutionary culture. Change. Freedom everywhere. Dynamite! Black power. Use the gun. Kill the pigs everywhere."

The BPP newspaper, issue of October 5, 1968, had an article introduced with the following statement: "We will not dissent from American government. We will overthrow it."

David Hilliard, Chief of Staff, BPP, in a speech at the San Francisco Polo Field on November 15, 1969, said "We will kill Richard Nixon."

David Hilliard, in the "New York Times," issue of December 13, 1969, was quoted as follows: "We advocate the very direct overthrow of the government by way of force and violence."

BLACK PANTHER PARTY (BPP)

In the issue of April 25, 1970, the BPP newspaper had an article by Minister of Culture Emory Douglas as follows:

"The only way to make this racist US government administer justice to the people it is oppressing, is...by taking up arms against this government, killing the officials, until the reactionary forces... are dead, and those that are left turn their weapons on their superiors, thereby passing revolutionary judgement against the number one enemy of all mankind, the racist U. S. government."

The BPP Headquarters is located at 1046 Peralta Street, Oakland, California. Branches of the BPP, and Committees to Combat Fascism, under control of the BPP, have been established in various locations in the USA.


