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





Dear Mr. Hoover:

Reference is made to our telephone conversation relative to developments in connection with the numerous recent gang shootings in New York City which might involve developments of interest to the Bureau, in connection with cases under investigation or which might possibly develop into Federal violations.

The following is a brief resume of the principal gang killings which have occurred in New York during the past thirty days. There have been several other recent killings involving minor gangsters whose exact affiliations and connections are wellmost and it has been impossible to determine just what part, if (my, they played in the gang war or whether their killings were actually expected with the activities of the larger gangs.

On September 30, 1935, JOSEPH AMBERG and him chauffour and associate, MORRIS RESSLER, were that to with in a garage at 385 Blake Avenue, Brooklys, of three unidentified men disguised as mechanics.

Joseph Amberg was a brother of the netorious Amberg family,

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On Ontober 12, 1935, the tody of FRANK (LITTLE FRANKIE) TRITERBAUN was found in a trunk at Ecosevelt and South Streets, New York City. He had been hacked to death, apparently with an exe.

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On Cetober 23, 1935, the body of LOUIS (PRETT) AMMERG was found in a burning automobile at 133 North Elliott Place, Brooklyn. He had been hacked to death and the body left in the automobile.

Pretty Amberg, another one of the notorious Amberg brothers referred to above, had for several months prior to his death been living in the Lincoln Botel in New York City, under the uses of Louis Cohen-

On the night of October 23, 1935, ARTEUR FLEGEMENTER, known as BUTCH SCHULTZ, and three of his henchmen and bodyguards, LEC FRANK, BEFNARD ROSEMERANTZ and OTTO BERNAR, were shot to death in a restaurant in Kewark, New Jersey. About an hour later, the same night, another prominent Dutch Schultz gangster, MARTY KRONTER, and an associate of his, SAN GOLD, were whot in a barber shop at 17th Street and Seventh Avenue, New York City. It is thought that Gold will recover; Krompier's recovery is Apubtful.

It is alleged that the two gumen participated in the tilling of Scimits and his associates in Newark. However, the articl number of the gumen has not been definitely established and there were no experimeness to the shooting. It is reported that one gumen was responsible for the shooting of Krompier and Gold. It appears that the wounding of Gold was probably actional since he is not known to be an artive gangster although he services with them. Schultz's three associates in the Kewark chop house were killed by bullets from \$38 calibre revolvers. Schultz was killed by one rullet from \$38 calibre revolvers. At the time the killers started shooting at the three gangster scated at the table where

Schults had been sitting, Schults was in the lavatory directly behind them. As he emerged from the lavatory during the shooting, he was struck by the all calibre bullet which caused his death. Arompier and Gold likewise were shot with all calibre revolvers. The activities of Schults and his gang are too well known to call for any description.

Apparently, the New York and the Newark, New Jersey Folice have nothing definite at all insofar as the identities of the killers in the various shootings are concerned. Likewise, it appears that although there are numerous theories for the motive for the killings, nothing definite in this connection is known. The most logical theory which has been advanced and thich is, in reality, a composite of various theories, explained to me by officials and newspaper reporters, is that the so-called "BIG 6" gang, which is identified ancre, was apprehensive that Schults would be removed to New York City to stand trial in the Southern District of New York on the indictments for income tax evasion still pending against him and that his actual return to New York would greatly strengthen the position of his gang and its activities.

E should be torne in mind that, for the past two years, S. hults had been absent from New York City. During part of this time he was a fugitive, being scoght in commection with income tax violations, and rince the first of this year he had been out on bond or standing trial on the income tax indictments. He recently was acquitted in Federal Court at Malone, New York, on ore income tax charge. He had, nince he had been out on bond, kapt out of New York City, in an effort to avoid trial in Her Yerk City on other income tax charges. During this two years! absence from New York, his various rankets had been carried on by his associates; but during the same period, rival gangaters, af-fillaced with the so-called "Big 6" organization, here when advariage of his absence and lack of personal direction, and have grown rapidly in their racksteering activities. At the time of his death, Schults was involved in removal proceedings in the Pedarel Court at Howark, New Jersey, and it appeared certain that he > Ald be ordered to be removed to New York City to stand trial on t e charges pending against him here.

The theory is that the rival gangsters of the "Pig 5" digamisation, including Costella and Laciano, were fearful

that when Schults actually returned to New York and took ever the management of his gang, their own raciateering activities would be endangered. They likewise were fearful that he would again be acquitted in the trial for income tax evenion in the Southern District of New York and that this would fid greatly to his local prestige and strengthen his position. It is believed that these possibilities caused the "Big 6" racksteers to take the action which precipitated the killings.

Echultz's actual strength, designated the Ambergs to approach anticin beam members of the Schultz game for the purpose of finding out whether they would desert their leader, with proper inducements, or whether they could be depended upon to stick with him. It is reported that as a result of these approaches by the Ambergs to certain members of the Schultz sch it was learned that these members were entirely loyal to Schults; that Schults, learning of the efforts of the Ambergs and their associates to cause some of his men to desert him, had Joseph Amberg and Morris Lessler killed.

It is reported that

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three who astually carried out this killing on Schults's orders. It also appears that Louis (Pretty) Amberg shortly afterwards, by way of retaliation ogainst Schults for the death of his brother Joseph, engineered the death of Frankie Teitelbaum. Immediately thereafter, Pretty Amberg was primely killed, supposedly by Schults time.



City Police, who have been working with the Newark, New Jersey Police on the investigation of the Newark killings, had not received the proper cooperation in Newark and had been ordered to leave there, neither Chief any time during my conversations when them, and anything to indicate that this report might be true. They had every opportunity to express themselves, and it would seem from their general attitude that they have been working with the New York police. I do not believe that they are the types who would order the New York police out of their sity, repacially in view of the fact that they are presently being subjected to severe newspaper attacks. They impressed me as being glad to have anybody assisting them in order that some of the responsibility for the investigation and the lack of results being attained might be divided.

On October 29, 1935, I communicated with Agent in Charge Smith of the Eansas City Office by telephone and advised him concerning the theory that Kensas City gargeters might have come to Ken York for the purpose of killing SCHULTZ and his four lieutenants, and suggested that Mr. Smith, in a discreet manner and without indicating to anyone that the Bureau might be interested, endeavor to secure such information as might be available in Eansas City regarding this matters

and several other prominent members of the Big 6° gaug, are now in Miami Beach, Florida. It is not known whather their absence from New York will be temporary or for an extended period. It may be that they have left the city at this time to avoid the questioning in connection with the numerous shootings, since the local police have repeatedly stated, according to the newspapers, that these parties were definite suspects and wanted for questioning. It is understood that the Miami Beach police have offered to arrest them for the New York police, but that the New York police have advised that they would not be able to extradite because of the lack of evidence.

It is also reported that Mayor InGuardia has severely eriticised Police Commissioner Valentine for permitting the whelesale billings and for not making any progress in the invertigation looking to the identification and apprehension of the parties to sponsible.
