Carmine Galante Federal Bureau of Investigation Number 119495 was born as Camillo Galante, February 21, 1910, in New York City. He reportedly resides at 274 Marcy Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, and claimed to own and operate the Rosina Costume Company, 1515 70th Street, Brooklyn, New York. He is also allegedly connected with the Abco Vending Company, 5012 Palisades Avenue, West New York, New Jersey. He is described as 5'5", 160 pounds, beld with orown graying hair.

Galante has numerous arrests dating to 1926 for robbery and assult. He was the prime subject in the murder of Carlos Tresca in New York City in 1943. He is known to carry firearms and to have shot a policeman who was attempting to apprehend him. He has served approximately 10 years in Sing Sing Prison, New York. In view of his past record, HE SHOULD BE CONSIDERED ARGED AND EXTREMELY DANGEROUS.

Galante was reported in attendance at the Apalachin, New York home of Joseph Barbara on November 14, 1957, but escaped prior to apprehension of the others by New York State Police. Current press publicity claims that he may have gone to Miami, Florida, Havana, Cuba, and possibly on to Italy. A subpoena has been issued for Galante to appear before the Special Federal Grand Jury on January 9, 1958, and has not been served as his present whereabouts is unknown.

I PERSONAL HISTORY AND BACKGROUND

A. Birth

The records of the Manhattan Bureau of Vital Statistics, as checked by SA on January 9, 1958, reflected under Certificate Number 10302, that CAMILLO GALANTE, a white male, was born on February 21, 1910, at 27 Stanton Street, New York City. His father was listed as VINZENZO GALANTE, born in Italy, age 28, occupation laborer. His mother was VINGENZA RUSSO GALANTE, age 25, also born in Italy. The certificate further stated that he was the second child.

On January 6, 1958, the records of the New York State Parole Office, as made available by to SA reflected that during a parole investigation concerning the subject in 1938, it was noted that his parents came to the United States 24 years prior to that time. This would indicate that GALANTE was approximately 4 years of age at the time of his parents arrival.



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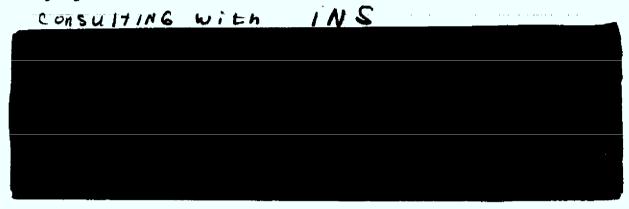
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B. Employment

The New York State Parole records mentioned above reflected that when the subject was arrested for attempted robbery in 1930 he was employed at the O'Brien Fish Company, 105 South Street, New York City, as a sorter. He was paroled on January 18, 1930, to the Catholic Society. In 1939 the subject was employed at the Lubin Artificial Flower Company, located at 270 West Broadway, New York City. He was also employed by this concern from 1923 to 1925.

On February 3, 1941, the parole records reflected that the subject joined the International Longshoremens Association, Local 856. He was sponsored by his brother, SAM GALANTE, and received a Coast Guard pass. For a short time he worked as a stevedore on Piers 14 and 21 for the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company and the New York and Puerto Rican Steamship Company.

On September 15, 1941, New York State Parole records reflected that the subject was employed as a handyman by the General Electro Plating Company, 176-180 Grand Street, New York City, by

The parole records reflected on August 17, 1942, the subject was employed by the Knickerbocker Trucking Company, 520 Broadway, New York City, as a helper on trucking company vehicles. His employer was listed as

The records of reflected that the subject was employed in a pastry shop located at 13 Prince Street, New York City. These records contained additional information concerning physical surveillances and persons contacted by the subject during this period.

C. Residences

an investigation into the activities of CARMINE GALANTE. The results of this investigation are set out in appropriate sections of this report. stated that the subject resides at 274 Marcy Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, with his wife, HELEN, and their two children. The premises, a well maintained 3 family house, is located in a low income neighborhood. The other 2 families occupying the house are and the control of GALANTE'S wire HELEN.

On January 24, 1958, a physical surveillance was maintained at 274 Marcy Avenue by SA however, no activity was observed. This residence appeared to be above average in upkeep and maintenance in what would otherwise be an average low-income neighborhood. It was located

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directly across the street from the rectory of the Church of the Transfiguration.

On January 28, 1958, the records of the Brooklyn County Clerk's Office were examined by 3A concerning the premises located at 274 Marcy Avenue, Brooklyn. These premises were located in block number 2206, lot number 32, and the tax records reflected that they were in the name of MARULLI with a land valuation of \$2,550 and improvements valued at \$14,000. It was described as a 3 story residence. The records further reflected that on January 16, 1956, these premises were sold by SALVATORE and ANTONIA MANERI to ANGELINA MARULLI and MAE LEGGIO. The deed on file of this transaction reflected that ANGELINA MARULLI had a 2/3 undivided interest and MAE LEGGIO owned a 1/3 undivided interest. The East New York Savings Bank held a \$6,660 mortgage dated October 1, 1955. The attorney for this transaction was listed as EDWARD Z. JACOBSON, 66 Court Street, Brooklyn, New York. The owners of this residence were checked from 1928 to the above mentioned present owner which were as follows:

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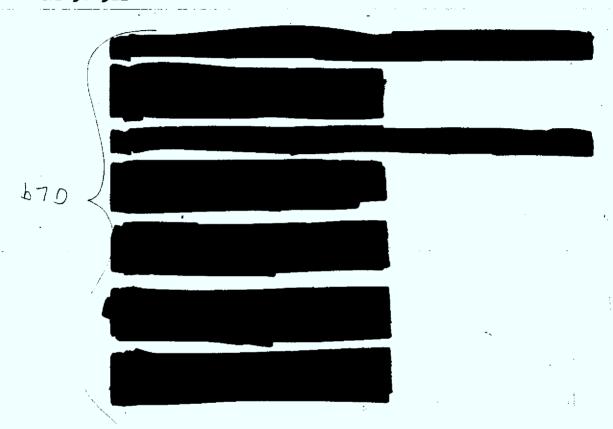

They were married by CELSUS REPOLE, Roman Catholic Priest, 213 Stanton Street, New York City, and witnessed by MICHAEL CONSOLO and MARY CASO.

On January 7, 1958, advised SA that she was unable to locate any credit record for the subject,

As noted previously in this report, the mortgage on the subject's residence is maintained by the East New York Savings Bank.

H. Draft Registration

New York State Parole records reflected that on July 12, 1940, the subject advised that he had registered for the Selective Service Act of 1940 on October 16, 1940 in the 22nd Assembly District, 54th Election District, and he advised on May 10, 1941, that he had been classified as 4F.

I. Religious Affiliations

New York State Parole report reflected that the subject belonged to the Church of All Nations number 9 located

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at 2nd Avenue and 1st Street, New York City, and was a member of the Catholic Youth Group.

J. Medical and Psychiatric Examinations

New York State Parole records reflected that a psychiatric report by was made at Sing Sing Prison on January 23, 1931 on the subject. It was noted that the subject was neat in appearance but dull emotionally. He had a mental age of 14½ and an IQ of 90. He was shy with strangers and had no knowledge of current events, routine holidays or other items of common knowledge. He was diagnosed as a Neuropathic, psychopathic personality, emotionally dull and indifferent with prognosis as being poor. New York State Parole records further reflected that on a physical examination held at Sing Sing Prison on June 24, 1932, the following medical history of the subject was noted:

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II CRIMINAL RECORD

A. FBI Identification Record

The following FBI identification record for the subject is under FBI number 119 495 as of January 1958:

G. MITT has been active in counterfeiting

and was picked up in 1950 for questioning relative to his knowledge of various East Side mobster activities regarding counterfeiting and illegal sale of alcohol. In August 1930 GALANTE was arrested for the murder of Patrolman WALTER DE CASTILLA, who was killed trying to protect a payroll in Brooklyn. GALANTE was released for lack of evidence. On December 24, 1930, GALANTE was wounded by who surprised GALANTE and three other men in an attempted armed robbery of a truck. GALANTE was captured by after emptying his gun at the piercing his overcoat several times and hitting him in the thigh. Two small children were wounded at the same time.

parole. GALANTE was returned to prison for violation of parole. GALANTE was suspected of the ownership of a large at 71 Wanser Avenue, Inwood, Long Island, which was raided by Alcohol Tax Unit agents on July 30, 1934.

On January 11, 1943 after reporting to parole officer at 80 Centre Street, New York City, GALANTE was trailed to a car by parole officers which was used shortly after in the murder of CARLO TRESCA, controversial anti-Fascist newspaperman, who was shot at 5th Avenue and 15th Street, New York City, within an hour after GALANTE had reported to parole officer. GALANTE was arrested for the murder but was never tried being returned to prison for violation of parole.

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It is believed that TRE CA could have been killed because of this reported insult to FRANK GAROFALO. The New York District Attorney's office attempted for many years to show an association between GAROFALO and GALANTE with negative results.

City, was examined by SA the subject was observed by the New York City Police Department on September 4, 1947 in front of 5 Berkley Place, placing part of a dismantled still into a 1938 Cadillac automobile of involved was a 1937 International truck registered to of 149 Houston Street, New York City. This equipment consisted of copper sheeting, tubing and other parts necessary in the assembly of a still. The individuals were arrested by the New York City Police Department and the ATU investigators were advised. GALANTE on interview claimed to be employed by his brother who owned a grocery store in the neighborhood, and that he had been looking for olive oil in that area, and that was the only person of those arrested whom he knew. <u>41 Kenmore Street, was arrested as a co-</u> 532 Union Street, Brooklyn occupation tinsmith, was arrested as the still maker, and considered the still owner. GALANTE was charged as a coconspirator and all of these persons were charged with the possession of the equipment for the manufacture of alcohol. All of this equipment and the vehicles involved were seized by the ATU. Later a petition was submitted to the Secretary of the Treasury by JOSEPH WINSTON and J. WOLFE CHASSEN, attorneys, 66-58 Fresh Pond Road, Ridgewood, Queens, New York, for the return and release of the 1938 Cadillac belonging to Eventually this car was released by the Government and returned to

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D. Parole Violation

On January 13, 1943, the subject was arrested as a suspect in the murder of CARLO TRESCA.

The New York State Parole investigation conducted to determine if GALANTE'Sparole should be revoked gave the following summation of his activities since release from Sing Sing Prison on May 1, 1939. It was noted that he worked quite steady on a full-time basis until July 1940 for the Lubin Artificial Flower Company, 552 West Broadway, New York City, and then part-time until February 1941. Thereafter until about September 1941 he was employed as a longshoreman at various piers. From September 1941 to May 11, 1942, he was employed by the General Electro Plating Company, 176 Grand Street, New York City. He then received unemployment insurance until about August 1942, at which time he was employed with the Knickerbocker Transportation Company, 383 Grand Street, and allegedly employed there until taken into custody on January It had been alleged that he had been associating who was suspected of operating a still by the Federal ATU. However, ATU advised on October 10, 1041 that their informant was unable to identify GALANTE or, He was charged with associating with an ex-convict, on January 12, 1943 and for driving an automobile for about a 6 months period of time, such being unauthorized under the terms of his parole. He was returned to prison to serve the remaining portion of his sentence.

F, Attorneys

New York State Parole records reflected that in 1937 the subject's attorney was NICHOLAS P. ANNUZZI, 2 Lafayette Street, New York City, who at this time served a writ in Superior Court claiming GALANTE was being required to serve a longer term than that which was owed to the state.

In 1938 Mr. ROSENBERG of Slade and Ohringer, Attorneys, 299 Broadway, New York City, advised that his firm had been retained to contest the right of the Parole Board to withhold the granting of commutation and compensation time on the subject's sentence.

On February 13. 1943, parole records reflected that FRANK DELLI PAOLI, Attorney, served a writ to release

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GALANTE after the CARLO TRESCA murder because he was being held without charge.

Parole records further reflected that while GALANTE was in prison as a result of his parole being revoked, THOMAS DAUGHERTY, attorney, of Troy, New York, became interested in his case and visited GALANTE on May 25, 1944, accompanied by MARCUS L. FILLEY of Troy. New York, also an attorney, who visited who was also an inmate of that prison. (Top hoodrum of New York Office.)

The parole file further reflected that there were two CARMINE GALANTES other than the parolee, and a letter that the parolee wrote used for his own purpose contained facts which were only applicable to the case of the other CARMINE GALANTE.

DAUGHERTY appealed to the Special Term of the County Court, Clinton County, Platsburg, New York, on July 31, 1944, requesting that the time served by GALANTE be credited; however, this was dismissed by the judge.

Later on December 21, 1944 the subject was discharged from Clinton Prison on a court order signed by the Honorable ANDREW W. RYAN, Supreme Court Justice, Clinton County, New York. The Department of Correction had computed his release as being March 15, 1945, but this court order caused his release on December 21, 1944 with no parole supervision.

At the time of the subject's arrest for speeding on October 18, 1955, attorney REIMO ALLIO of Johnson City, New York, represented him at the Binghamton substation of the New York State Police. GALANTE was later represented in this speeding arrest by DONALD W. KRAMER, then Mayor of Binghamton, New York.

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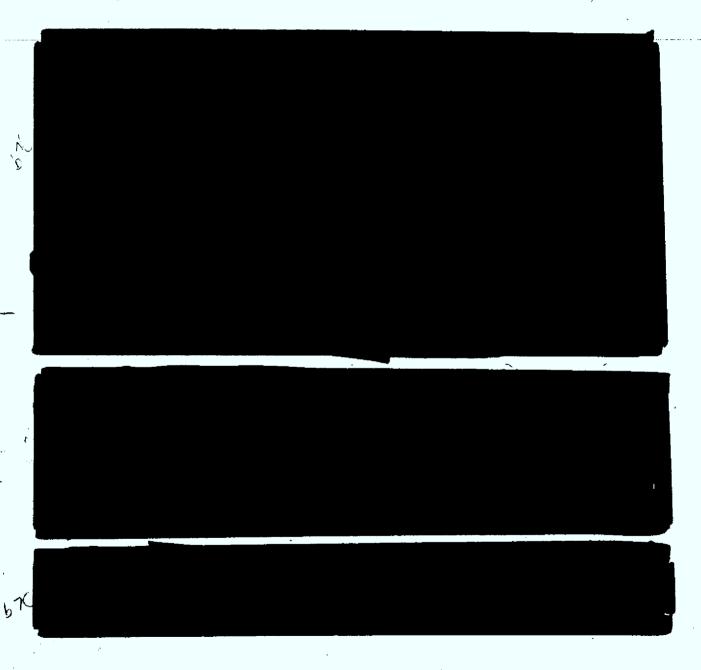
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FRANK GAROFALO

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GAROFALO resides at 339 East 58th Street, New York City, in a modern, well maintained apartment house, occupying a four room apartment with his brother, VINCENT GAROFALO. GAROFALO has no telephone, but uses a public telephone located in the lobby of the apartment; which has a doorman in attendance. GAROFALO has occupied these premises for about 15 years, and used this address as that of the High Grade Packing Company.

GAROFALO was born in Italy on September 10, 1891, and became a citizen of the United States on September 8, 1931 (certificate #3426896). He is a rather distinguished looking man, 5' 7" tall, weighing 170 pounds, having brown eyes, gray hair, and is required to wear glasses when operating a motor vehicle. His fingerprint classification is -5 U 11 14

GAROFALO was issued New York State chauffeur's 1 license #6065834, which expires on May 31, 1958. GAROFALO

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was fined \$10.00 on November 10, 1952, for passing a light, and \$5.00 on December 12, 1954, for going through a play street in Manhattan Traffic Court. There is no vehicle listed to GAROFALO or the High Grade Packing Company.

GAROFALO indicates that he is employed by the High Grade Packing Company. The New York County Clerk's Office issued business certificate 1693 on January 15, 1946, to GAROFALO as the sole owner of the High Grade Packing Company, which was reported to have been located at 100 Hudson Street, New York City, in 1946. A check of this address failed to indicate any connection with GAROFALO's company.

It is noted that on the basis of information obtained in this rather eursory investigation of the High Grade Packing Company, it is the opinion of that the usage of this business name is a subterfuge on the part of GAROFALO to give an aura of respectability to CAROFALO and to give him an excuse to be traveling to Florida and the West Coast.

On September 13, 1940, FRANK GAROFALO was issued New York City pistol permit #23745, and gave his home address as 339 East 68th Street, New York City, rather than 339 East 58th Street, the actual residence. GAROFALO gave his occupation as a partner in the firm of M & G Coat Company, 178 McKibbins Street, Brooklyn, New York. GAROFALO purchased a .32 caliber Smith & Wesson, Serial 445564, on September 20, 1940, from FRANK LAVA, 6 Centre Street, New York City. GAROFALO stated that he needed the revolver for protection in carrying large sums of money for payrolls. GAROFALO indicated NICHOLAS MARRONE, 178 McKibbins Street, Brooklyn, as his partner, and named as character references FRANK GIARANITA, 94 Wilson Avenue, Brooklyn; ANTHONY RUSSO, R & R Cloak Company, 47 Thames Street, Brooklyn, and JOHN CREMENDO, 22 Boerum Street, Brooklyn, as a reference on a subsequent application.

GAROFALO renewed the license in 1941, 1942, and 1943. On April 19, 1943, the license was cancelled by a letter from Detective GEORGE DUNPHY, Shield 1503, and Assistant District Attorney GRUMET, as GAROFALO was no longer in business.

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GARCFALO has no criminal record, and is relatively unknown to various law enforcement agencies in New York City, with the exception of the New York District Attorney's Office, who, in investigation of the CARLOS TRESCA murder, considered TRESCA's reported insult of GAROFALO, described elsewhere in this report, as one of the most logical motives for TRESCA's death.

GAROFALO apparently is connected with Canada by Dry Bottling Company, 9 Badger Avenue, Endicott, New York, operated by JOSEPH BARBARA, as, according to the information

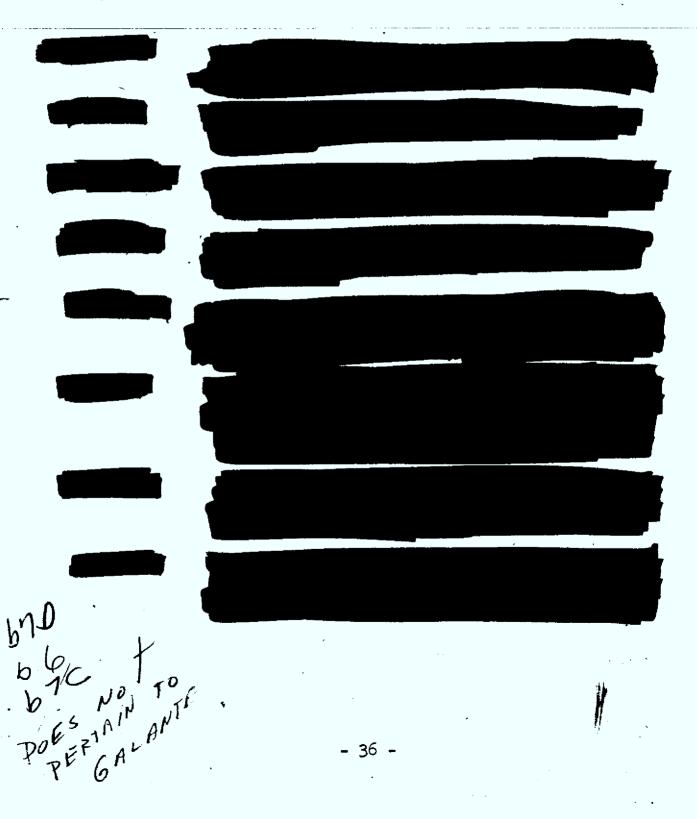

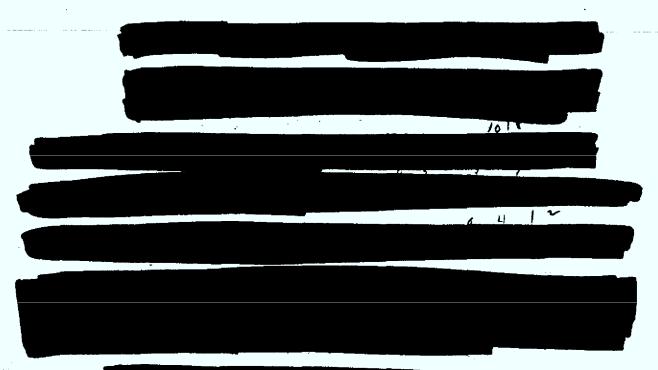
Investigation of this case revealed that one JOSEPH BARBARA, Apaiachin, New York, made reservations at the Arlington note; Binghamton, New York, for five men. BARBARA is the operator of the Mission Beverage Company and Canada Dry Bottling Works at 9 Badger Avenue, Endicott, New York. He is a man with a lengthy criminal record, including arrest for homicide, and is known to control all of the area racketeers in this vicinity and to have wide-spread gangland connections.

GALANTE was arraigned before Town of Windsor, New York Justice of the Peace RICHARD B. KLAUSNER. pled not guilty to all of the charges and was released on \$200.00 bail on each charge, a total of \$600.00. The case was adjourned until October 25 at 7:00 p.m.

A check with the Department of Correction revealed that CARMINE GALENTE under the names of CARMINE GALANTO, CARMINE GALANTE, CARMINE GALANTI, JOSEPH RUSSO, CHARLES ERUNO, and CARMONE GALANTE had a lengthy criminal record. He is identified as New York State DCI #137551X, and New York City PD #B56994. He had been arrested for petit larceny, grand larceny, attempted robbery and assault, assault second degree, homicide, violation of parole and violation of the internal revenue code.

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2. New Jersey Law Enforcement Council (NJLEC) Investigation and Other Interested Agencies

In the January 7, 1958 edition of the "New York Daily News" an article appeared stating that the NJLEC opened their hearing in Newark, New Jersey, and that Captain CHRIS GLEITSMANN and Detective Sergeant PETER J. POLICASTRO of the West New York, New Jersey Police Department appeared before this council. They were questioned concerning their efforts to intercede with the New York State Police in October, 1956, on the speeding arrest of CARMINE GALANTE. It was alleged by the New York State Police that Captain GLEITSMANN offered a \$1,000.00 bribe to Sergeant EDGAR CROSWELL to keep GALANTE from jail on a traffic charge.

In connection with this bribery attempt, an article appeared in the "New York Herald Tribune", dated January 8, 1958, which is set out as follows:

"District Attorney LOUIS GREENBLOTT, at the behest of Acting New York State Investigation Commissioner ARTHUR L. REUTER, said the bribery matter would be turned over "at once" to the Broome County Grand Jury. The bribery attempt was allegedly made near Binghamton in Broome County.

"Captain GLEITSMANN and Sergeant POLICASTRO were suspended from their posts by Police Chief FRED ROOS or West New York, who is also under subpoena in the case but is too ill to testify.

"Commissioner MODARELLI was suspended from his extra \$5,000-a-year job in which he handles

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*pistol permits for Hudson County. He was suspended by the Hudson County Board of Freeholders on the ground he hasn't shown up for work in the last five days. Law Enforcement officials are seeking to serve Commissioner MODARELLI with a subpoena since he also has been named in the bribery attempt.

"Chairman JOSEPH HARRISON of the Law Enforcement Council said he would submit contradictions in the private testimony of the police officers and the testimony of Sergeant CROSWELL to the prosecutors of both Hudson and Essex Counties, and would keep the hearings in recess in the hope of eventually subpoening Commissioner MODAMELLI.

"Chief counsel CHARLES TYNE read portions of Captain GLEITSMANN's private testimony in the record after scoring the police officer "for flying in the face of everything a police officer is supposed to stand for."

"Captain GLEITSMAIN, in his account of the alleged bribery offer, said it was his impression that there was "kiddin; on both sides." The transcript of the story told by GLEITSMANN quotes him as insisting that Sergeant CROSWELL told him that the "offer" was not enough to keep the state trooper's car in gasoline.

"The West New York captain, in his account, readily admitted that he went to see Sergeant CROSWELL in an effort to get GALANTE free.

5 56 "Instead, in some 115 pages of testimony, Captain GLEITSMANN said he had gained the acquaintance of a JCE LANZINI, proprietor of the Abco Vending Machine Service in West New York, and had gone upstate at JOE's request to try to get "ore of his salesmen out of jail".

"Earlier he admitted they had previously seen "mostly characters" hanging around the Abco premises in West New York, which he admitted visiting frequently. He related how Sergeant CROSWELL stopped his intercession attempts by showing him GALANTE's extensive criminal record. He then said the bantering between himself and Sergeant CROSWELL began."

The "New York World Telegram and Sun" edition of January 8, 1958, carried an article which is as follows:

"JOSEPH HARRISON, NJLEC Chairman, ended the two-day public hearings in the Jersey aspects of the gangland meeting at Apalachin, New York. He said he would send transcripts of testimony to prosecutors in both states for possible perjury investigation."

In the "New York Times" edition of January 10, 1958, an article appeared describing the testimony of JOHN T. CUSACK, District Supervisor of the Federal Bureau of Narcotics. Mr. CUSACK testified as to his opinions regarding the reason for the meeting at Apalachin, New York on November 14, 1957. He also offered a theory for the recent murder of ALBERT ANASTASIA in New York and named two men suspected

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of the responsibility of the 1953 assassination of CARLO TRFSCA, anti-Fascist editor.

He identified CARMINE GALANTE as the reputed slayer of TRESCA and stated that GALANTE was now engaged in a campaign to control narcotics, gambling and other rackets in Brooklyn, New York. These activities were receiving the attention of District Attorney EDWARD S. SILVER. FRANK GAROFALO was listed as the one who had ordered TRESCA's killing.

In the "Herald Tribune" edition of January 10, 1958, CUSACK was quoted as saying, "FRANK GAROFALO is mentioned in the Bureau of Narcotics files in association with the late WILLY MORETTI and the late ABRAHAM DAVIDIAN, a California mobster believed to have been assassinated in 1949 by elements of the Mafia in California. GAROFALO is a close associate of JOSEPH PROFACI, Brooklyn's 'olive oil king', who was at Apalachin."

"There have been reports in the underworld that JOSEPH DI PALERMO assisted GALENTE in carrying out the TRESCA murder by driving the get-away car."

In the January 7, 1958 edition of the "New York World Telegram and Sun" an article appeared stating that ANTHONY CALENDRILLO of Garfield, New Jersey, whose car GALANTE was driving when arrested in October, 1956, appeared before the NJLEC, but insisted that he had only known GALANTE by his first name. He stated he knew several of the boys around

Abco Vending Machine in West New York, New Jersey, but only by their first names as 'CHARLIE", "MIKE", "JOE", "JOHNNY" and "DOC".

Concerning West New York Police Commissioner ERNEST J. MODARELLI, the "New York Daily News" of January 7, 1958, stated that MODARELLI was missing and unavailable for comment. The article further stated that he was the combined Police and Fire Commissioner, and Mayor JOHN R. ARNELLINO of West New York said MODARELLI makes \$2,250.00 yearly and picks up \$5,000.00 more from a Hudson County job in the Licensing Department in charge of pistol permits.

This article further stated that GALANTE was identified by the NJLEC as part owner of a vending machine company formerly situated in West New York, which had a direct "line" to police head-quarters.

The "New York Times" article of January 8, 1958, stated that MODARFLLI had been suspended that day from his post as a Hudson County firearms inspector.

The "New York Daily News"edition of January 9, 1958, stated that West New York, New Jersey city commission approved Police Chief FREDERICK ROOS' suspension of two policemen accused of offering a New York state trooper a \$1,000 bribe to clear CARMINE GALANTE of a traffic violation. No action was taken against Police Commissioner MODARELLI pending his appearance before the City Commission

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The "New York Daily News" of January 16, 1958, carried an article concerning the appearance of MODARELLI after two weeks in hiding. This article is quoted in portions as follows:

"MODARELLI met privately with his fellow commissioners for a half hour before the commission meeting. Then, before more than 200 fellow townsmen - West New York has a population of 40,000 - MODARELLI read a lengthy statement, blasting the law council's attempt to call him, as politically inspired and an act of bad faith.

"In his statement last night, MODARELLI said he had appeared before the council last October 21, answered questions under oath, and at that time denied sending GLEITSMANN or anybody else to Binghamton on GALENTE's behalf."

The "New York World Telegram and Sun" edition of January 11, 1958, carried an article portions of which are set out as follows:

"Assemblyman WILLIAM F. PASSANNANTE (D., Man.) has identified himself as one of the legislators who interceded in behalf of CARMINE GALENTE, Mafia thug and reputed murderer, when GALENTE was arrested on traffic charges near Binghamton in 1956.

"Mr. PASSANNANTE's role in the affair came to light after Assemblyman DANIEL S. DICKINSON, JR. (R., Binghamton) told reporters JOSEPH CARLINO, Assembly majority leader, and 'a New York City

.52 53 "legislator, a Democrat', had called and asked him to defend GALENTE against charges of speeding and driving without a Ticense.

'The assemblyman, who represents Tammany leader CARMINE DE SAPIO's own 1st District, said he would go to Albany Monday to tell the Legislature's watchdog committee all he knows about the case.

"Mr. DICKINSON said he refused to touch the case after he learned of GALENTE's long criminal record. When he told Mr. CARLINO, a Long Beach Republican, about the record, he said, the assembly leader told nim: 'I want no part of this at all. Forget it.'

"The New York City legislator was 'a little more insistent' about getting help for GALENTE, Mr. DICKINSON said.

"Last night Mr. PASSANNANTE told reporters that 'a lawyer'friend had asked him to find an upstate attorney to defend GALENTE. He said he called his legislative colleague, but Mr. DICKINSON told him he knew about the situation and the man involved and didn't want the case.

"Asked what else he did on this matter, he added, 'after I got into the case, I became aware of his record and advised him to plead guilty.'

Assemblyman WILLIAM F. HORAN (R., Tuckahoe), chairman of the Legislature's watchdog committee,

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"yesterday ordered a probe into the political pressures sought on benalf of CALENTE. He said the committee will hold a meeting Monday or Tuesday to question all those involved in the case.

"On Thursday a veteran/narcotics agent told the watchdog committee GALENTE is known in underworld circles as the killer of CARLO TRESCA, anti-Fascist publisher of a New York Italian-language newspaper.

Mr. TRESCA was slain in 1943."

In an exclusive interview to the "New York Journal American" on January 11, 1958, PASSANNANTE was quoted as saying:

"I don't think that I should talk at this time because I have notified Assemblyman WILLIAM R. HORAN of Tuckahoe, chahman of the Watchdog Committee that I'll be in Albany to testify on Monday. I'm volunteering to do this.

"I know that my name has been connected with the GALENTE case but I don't know the man.

"However, as long as my name has been connected with the case I think I can give my side.

"As I recall it a lawyer - I don't recall who it was right now - called me in 1956 and said GALENTE had been arrested by the State Police at Binghamton on traffic charges. He asked me, I think, if I would take the case.

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"I told him I didn't practice outside of the city, but I would see if I could get him a lawyer.

"I don't know much about Binghamton, but I do know Assemblyman DANIEL S. DICKINSON, JR., a Broome County Republican. I called him and asked him to recommend a lawyer to defend GALENTE.

"These cases are like the hundreds every Assemblyman has, all the time. Someone calls you and asks for help or advice.

"I didn't know that CARLINO was also involved in the case at the time.

"Later I learned that former Mayor DONALD W. KRAMER of Binghamton acted as GALENTE's lawyer in court.

"I acted as any Assemblyman, Senator, or Congressman would have done under the same circumstances. A lawyer asked me, because, I suppose, I'm a member of the Legislature, to recommend an upstate lawyer to handle a case.

"DICKINSON later told me about GALENTE and I washed my hands of the case just as he did and CARLINO."

In the January 13, 1958 edition of the "New York World Telegram and Sun" an article appeared in connection with the report to be released by the NJLEC concerning their investigation into the alleged,

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bribery attempt by the West New York Police Department. Portions of this article are quoted as follows:

"In the report released to the press over the weekend, the LEC said the safety of the people of West New York is in the hands of officials 'unfit' to hold high office.

"The report adds that the conduct of West New York Police Commissioner ERNEST J. MODARELLI and Detective Capt. CHRIS GLEITSMANN 'strongly suggests' that their relationship with the criminal element may go much deeper than intercession and attempted biribery on behalf of an ex-convict.

"The report describes Mr. MODARELLI as 'sedulously avoiding' a council subpoena and concludes that Capt. GLEITSMANN 'did attempt to bribe' a New York State trooper.

"It is obvious . . . that the public welfare and safety of the people of West New York are in the hands of officials, such as MODARELLI and GLEITSMANN, who have demonstrated their unfitness to hold the high offices of director of public safety and captain of detectives.

"The report absolves Detective Sgt. PETER J. POLICASTRO, who drove Capt. GLEITSMANN to Binghamton, N. Y., and attended the meeting at which the bribe attempt was allegedly made. The report says of Sgt. POLICASTRO, 'It does not appear that he actually participated in the bribery attempt."

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In the "New York Herald Tribune" edition of January 15, 1950 an article appeared stating that Attorney General GORVER C. RICHMAN, JR., of New Jersey had appointed Deputy Attorney General CHARLES JOELSEN to conduct an investigation of the West New York Police Department. The appointment of Mr. JOELSEN, who is also Acting Prosecutor of Passaic County, New Jersey, came after Democratic opposition killed a legislative bid by Republicans to continue the LEC.

Mr. RICHMAN further stated that Mr. JOELSEN would use state troopers who worked / the NJLEC for his investigation and that the council had also agreed to furnish Mr. JOELSEN with all of the transcripts of testimony in relation to the West New York bribery charge and its possible relationship to the Apalachin meeting of mobsters last November 14.

The article went on to say that the end of the 6-year-old LEC came despite a vote to continue the controversial council in office. Senate leaders sent a delegation to Newark to take over the records of the LEC.

The "New York World Telegram and Sun" edition of January 18, 1958, contained an article that Deputy Attorney General CHARLES JOELSEN was preparing a case against West New York Police Commissioner ERNEST MODARELLI to present before the New York Grand Jury the first week in February, and before the Hudson County Grand Jury in the second week in February. JOELSEN said his first step would

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be to contact the District Attorney's Office in Broome County and present evidence that MODARELLI was behind the \$1,000.00 bribery offer.

In the anuary 15, 1958 edition of the "New York Post" an article appeared stating that the Broome County Grand Jury of Binghamton, New York, will open an inquiry into charges of political influence on behalf of CARMINE GALANTE despite the dropping of the charges by the Chairman of the Legislative watchdog committee.

The article went on to state that a Tioga County Grand Jury launched its inquiry into gangster influence at Owego yesterday, concentrating on the Mob's Apalachin meeting. Portions of this article are set out as follows:

"After a conference yesterday between Broome County District Attorney GREENBLOTT and Acting State Investigation Commissioner REUTER, it was announced the inquiry here would open on Feb. 5.

"Earlier yesterday Assemblyman HORAN (R-Westchester), chairman of the 'watchdog' committee took to the floor to announce he would vote for two Republican Assemblymen and one Democratic involved.

"He said he did not think the three - Assembly Majority Leader CARLINO (R-Long Beach) and Assemblymen DICKINSON (R-Binghanton) and PASSANNANTE (D-Manhattan) - were guilty of 'any impropriety'.

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"The three have conceded they checked into GALENTE's arrest in October, 1956, for speeding and driving without a license after attending a meeting near here with JOSEPH BARBARA, the host last Nov. 14 at the Apalachin gathering of The Mob.

"CARLINO and PASSANNANTE, a protege of Tammany Chieftan CARMINE DE SAPIO, said they had been called by lawyers, whom they refused to identify.

"Both said they called DICKINSON to represent GALENTE, but DICKINSON said he refused when he discovered GALENTE's long criminal record.

"GALENTE finally was represented in the traffic case here by the then Democratic mayor, DONALD W. KRAMER, who said he advised GALENTE to plead guilty in view of his record. GALENTE was sentenced to 30 days and fined \$150.

"The Broome County grand jury inquiry stems from disclosures last month before the New Jersey Law Enforcement Council.

"The name of JOSEFH M. SHEEHAN, counselor to the State Division of Veterans Affairs here in October, 1956, was brought out yesterday by GREENBLOTT. He said SHEEHAN, now in the State Education Dept., phoned an assistant district attorney inquiring about the speeding case.

Asst. DA LOUIS J. CASELLA said SHEEHAN told him he was calling for his boss' although he would not identify him.

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56' 57 "'It obviously was an innocent call by SHEEHAN at the request of his boss,' CASELLA said."

In the issue of the "New York World Telegram" dated January 28, 1958, an article appeared identifying VINCENT MACRI, Capitol Hill "mystery man," as being the individual who got the State Division of Veterans Affairs to look into the 1956 traffic arrest of GALANTE. He stated he was acting on behalf of an Albany liquor dealer, it was reported. Portions of this article are set out as follows:

"Mr. MACRI, a familiar figure around the Capitol, was identified in sworn testimony presented to Acting State Investigations Commissioner ARTHUR REUTER by LEONARD L. SCHIEFFLIN, deputy director of the veterans' unit.

"The state official told Mr. REUTER that Mr. MACRI approached him with a story about a man who was being held without bail at Binghamton on a traffic charge. The man turned out to be GALENTE, a big-time underworld figure, who supposedly had been attending a gangland meeting similar to the one held at Apalachin a year later.

"The United Press also learned that Mr. MACRI, who was called by Mr. REUTER Jan. 13, told the investigations commissioner he had approached Mr. SCHIEFFLIN on behalf of the liquor dealer. Mr. MACRI gave Mr. REUTER the dealer's name but the latter has not been questioned because he is in a hospital.

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"Mr. SCHIEFFLIN said that he assumed GALENTE was a veteran because Mr. MACRI had referred several veterans to him in the past for help. The hoodlum, however, is not a veteran."

C. CARLO TRESCA Murder

The files of the New York State Parole Office, mentioned above, reflected that CARLO TRESCA was murdered January 11, 1943 at 9:40 p.m. at 5th Avenue in New York City. He was shot by an unidentified assailant, who then entered a Ford sedan in which two accomplices were believed to be waiting.

On January 12, 1943, an abandoned word was found two blocks from the scene of this nurder with New York license 10 9272, which was believed by the Police Department to be the vehicle used by the escaped murders.

On the evening of January 11, 1933, CARMINE GALANTE reported to his parole officer and upon leaving the parole office was placed under surveillance. Some suspicion had been encountered that GALANTE was violating the provisions of his parole and the parole officers were attempting to ascertain his activities.

After leaving the parole office, he was observed to enter a Ford sedan, license number 10 9272, which was noted by the parole officers. Since they had no vehicle available and no other transportation was immediately available, they were unable to continue this surveillance.

The following day the parole officers noted the murder of CARLO TRESCA and the description of the vehicle found abandoned in the vicinity of this murder, at which time they advised the District Attorney's Office.

QALANTE was taken into custody on January 13, 1943 and held in violation of parole.

To date this murder has never been solved, although the District Attorney's Office and police officials are reasonably certain that GALANTE had some part in the TRESCA murder.

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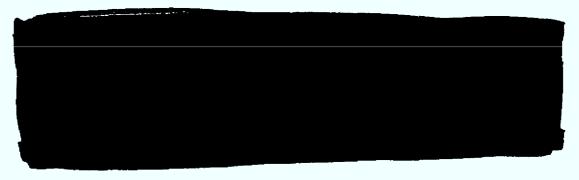

In 1943 information was received that the of CARMINE GALANTE

In the Crime Survey of October 15, 1946, it was stated that FRANK GAROFALO, 336 East 58th Street, was a suspect in the murder of CARLO TRESCA and reportedly one of the leaders in the Castelmmarese gang and that he operated the Colorado Cheese Company, 176 Avenue A, New York City. GALANTE used to go out with Assistant United States Attorney DOLORES FACONTI of the Southern District of New York. It was alleged that the slurring remarks made by TRESCA regarding GAROFALO and FACONTI when attending a dinner together, caused the murder of TRESCA.

GAROFALO was identified as a big-time racketeer, a former associate of CHARLES"LUCKY" LUCIANO and allegedly in control of the Italian section of the New York underworld.

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An additional suspect in the murder of TRESCA with alias

allegedly a notorious Mexican Communist and a suspected OGPU trigger man. He was a bitter enemy of TRESCA, who had been exposed by TRESCA as an alleged wife murderer, as well as a participant in the plot to assassinate LEON TROTSKY.

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In the Walter Winchell of March 8, 1943, an item appeared which stated to the effect that it was rumored that TRESCA's murder was instigated by another publisher (who owns a foreign language sheet), and that the killer was his bodyguard, the latter being insulted by TRESCA in 1934. The honor of a woman who holds an important federal job was part of this mystery.

It has been alleged that FRANK GAROFALO had been the bodyguard of GENEROSO POPE, the latter being a publisher of a foreign language paper.

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56 57 58 of CARLO TRESCA, initiated considerable action to influence the authorities to take action in the murder of CARLO TRESCA. He wrote several pamphlets

analyzing this murder and some of his opinions were as follows:

GENEROSO POPE and his gang were attacked in TRESCA's newspaper, "Il Martello" and there was great animosity between the two.

TRESCA was invited to a dinner at the Manhattan Club on September 10, 1942, and was assured that POPE would not be there. TRESCA, on arrival, observed FRANK GAROFALO at this dinner and remarked, not only a Fascist but also a gangster, referring to GAROFALO, who was POPE's henchman and bodyguard.

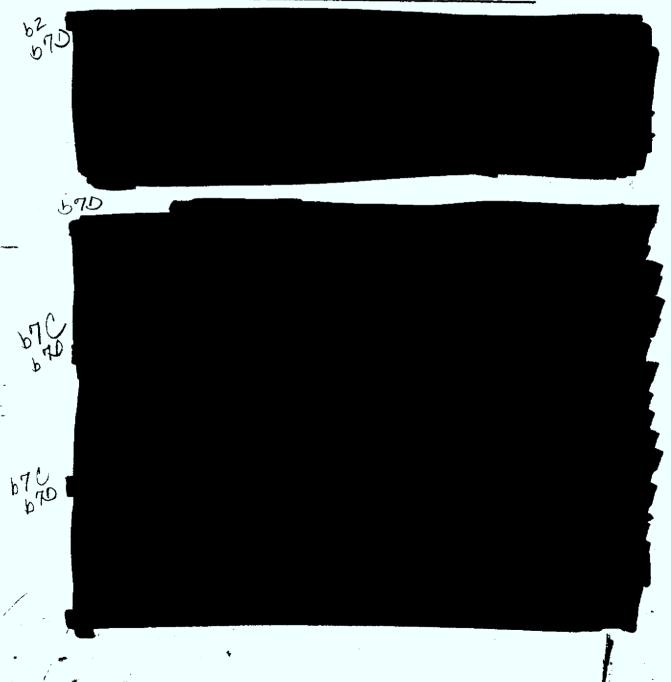

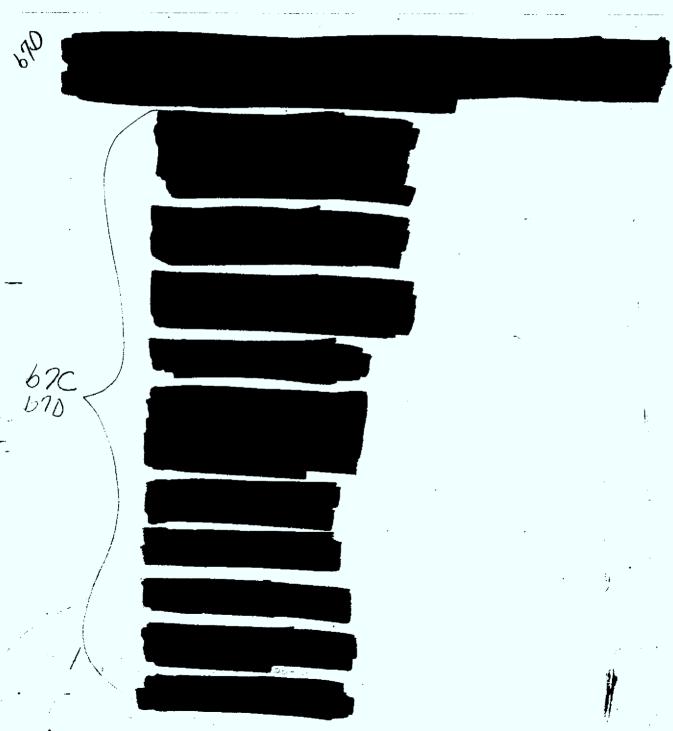
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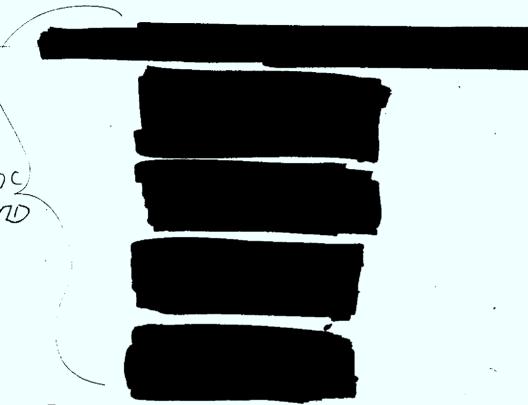

Idded that this company was a contractor on women's dresses for a local manufacturer on a contract basis with the corporation receiving 20 to 3C per cent, on the amount of work performed. Officers were reported active in the company and 25 persons were reported employed with 36 sewing machines, cutting tables, etc. The company occupied the second floor fo a two-story brick building considered in equipment and fixtures were valued at \$5,000.00 and the inventory was estimated to be approximately \$500.00. Local credit was considered satisfactory and a local bank
