When my wife and I were abroad in 1930, we heard from many source; that we considered reliable that the industrialist Fritz/Thyssen and cour Henry Ford were the original backers on a big scale; of Hitler ever since 1923. Mr. Thyssen has admitted this and is now a fugitive from the country of his birth.

Mr. Henry Ford and Mr. Lindbergh are the only Americans who were decorated by Hitler. For what? Can those two Americans answer the enigma. Mr. Henry Ford employed nearly all the Mazis who were sent over here to discover our industrial secrets; even the notorious Fritz Kuhn was employed by Ford. Ford was the first American who (Nazi style dealt in organized anti semitism in his Dearborn Independent. Was he decorated for the base vilibations published against the Jews in his sheet; or was he decorated for his support of the Hitler cause in order to break up the labor unions in Germany where he had factories, the same as he tried to do here, although (up to now) without success.

Under such circumstances could this man Henry Ford be entrusted with the building of our airplanes which he claims to be able to build "Tin Lizzie" style in less than no time. I suppose the Nazis in his employ would doubtless "assist to do a good job", especially if as he states; there is no interference by our government.

As to Lindbergh's conduct "the other person decorated by Hitler" after his baby was murdered by an active Yorkville Nazi in this country, he ran away to England to make England his home and bring up his children there. No sconer did it appear that war would come to Europe, Me again ran away from England and returned to the United States and tried to tell us on several occasions that our country was not in danger; provided that we did not interfere in European affairs; as if any serious American had asked this foolish young man for his opinion. Bid he get his decoratic from Hitler in order to play the well known Hitler game, Probably unconsciously, of advising strict neutrality in order to become an easier prey for Hitler, like Belgium; which country was also strictly neutral.

These are serious observations to think about in these really dangerous days.

First let me state that this letter is no attempt at any petty revenge against the two women mentioned, nor would they be considered at all in this letter except that they have from time to time dropped hints of coming events of such vast national significance that they should at least be investigated to see to what foreign parties they have contacts.

The September 5, 1940 issue of The Free American and Deutscher Weckruf and Beobachter contains on Page 1 an article captioned, Declaration of 1940 National Convention of German American Bund.

For record purposes the article is quoted as follows:

"The German American Bund in national convention assembled at Chicago resolves and declares as follows:

"We reaffirm our loyalty to the Constitution and laws of the American Republic and our readiness to serve our country, the United States of America, with our lives and fortunes in all emergencies, while holding to the motto: 'Our country, right or wrong; if right to be kept right, if wrong to be set right.

"Me denounce attacks on the Bund as criminal libels, the outgrowth and result of an organized, highly-financed campaign of propaganda, as brazenly manifested by the widely publicised proposal to amend the Declaration of Independence to read, ('Declaration of Interdependence,' a proposal to unite the United States with England, Canada and other dominions of the British Empire.

"We demand that the laws of the land shall be impartially administered and not be made a springboard for discrimination and persecution of German Americans by procedures such as requiring excessive bail and inflicting 'cruel and unusual punishment' in civil cases, of which the Bund is prepared to furnish examples.

"The Bund looks back with pride on the patriotic contributions, achievements and sacrifices of its German pioneer forebears in building and defending the Republic against the aggressions of Great Britain and France. It asserts without fear of successful contradiction that the German element has formed an integral part of American political and social life from the first Jamestown settlement down, and through the personages of such leaders as General Baron v. Steuben, Jacob Keisler, John Peter Kenger, Conrad Weiser, Francis Lieber, Karl Follen, Carl Schurz and many others, has exercised inestimable constructive influence inseparable from American life in all its branches.

"Firmly holding that the past patriotic acts of our people entitle us to an equal voice in the affairs of our country, the United States of America, and prepared to follow the example thus set us, we hold unwaveringly to the doctrine of keeping Europe out of America and America out of Europe, as that doctrine was transmitted to us by every President, from Washington down to Lincoln and Cleveland.

"We wholeheartedly support the Monroe Doctrine, but point but that the Doctrine is not a one-sided expression of policy, in that it is equally emphatic in pledging the United States to one of none-interference in European affairs.

Me hold that the agitation and panicky deliveries from on high on the supposed dangers that threaten the United States from invasion is home-made for the ulterior purpose of preparing the ground for American intervention in a European quarrel.

We therefore deprecate the attacks on Col. Charles Lindbergh and Henry Ford and other courageous, outspoken Americans as part of a vicious propaganda financed by internationalists to silence the voice of "millions of mothers with sons of the age to be sent to the slaughter fields of Europe. We forsee in the progressive stages of this agitation a sinister purpose to undermine the foundation of the Republic and to submerge our national independence in a union with the British Empire, as advocated by Andrew Carnegie and Cecil Rhodes.

"We denounce the Newish boycott of American citizens engaged in lawful trade and commerce as in conflict with law and a proper sense of American principles; and

"We denounce the widespread efforts to discriminate against and persecute German Americans by creating unjustified suspicion of their loyalty. We charge that the real 'fifth column' in our midst is not any German American organization but is composed of Tories and internationalists who, with unlimited means at their command, urge 'the reclamation of the United States as an integral part of the British Empire' and bid Americans in page advertisements to forget the great men who founded this Republic.

We denounce the plan proposed by Assistant
Attorney General John O. Rogge for the creation of a
bureau 'to make a study of German, Russian, Italian
and Japanese propaganda and publishing the results of
such studies,' as reported in Washington dispatches.
Such a plan must prove repugnant to the most commonplace
conception of decency and fair play. The plan convicts
itself of insincerety and dishonesty by failing to include British propaganda, avowedly financed by \$150,000,000
appropriated by the British Parliament.

West India islands outright in payment of the ten billion dollars borrowed from American taxpayers during the World War, an obligation over which those who love England and France more than they love the United States have sought "to draw the veil of forgetfulness.

We favor all appropriations necessary for the adequate defense of our country against the aggressions of any European or Asiatic power, but oppose all plans designed to involve us in foreign wars. Washington warned us to 'beware of the imposture of patriotism.' Hence we counsel all who care to listen to guard against too great confidence in professions of patriotism by the sponsors of vast war measures.

"Finally we demand that Congress shall cease to be a yesman Congress, and as the representatives of ALL the people, it shall reclaim its authority from the hands of the executive department."



## LINDBERGH WALKS ALONE

The was walking dejectedly, hands in his pockets, shoulders stooped, I a battered brown fedora pulled down over one eye. Now and then he would stop to kick a pebble lying on the path. He would go on a way, thin on his chert, stop again, and just strand. The Bois de Boulogue in Paris was bleak that day. The gaunt winter branches of the trees made a cold background for this unbappy wanderer. It was Lindbergh—so recently America's Hero No. 1, now a bitter, self-exited, cantankerous recluse.

"If you're looking for sensations," said a close friend of the Lindberghs to the writer, "you'll be disappointed. You will find a very unhappy man and a very peculiar one. He has grown out of an utterly simple and naive boy who, unequipped and temperamentally unfirted, was plunged into waters that he did not understand and could not learn to navigate. You will find that he has done very little during the past three years, that his great international intrigues have very hittle substance in fact. And time hangs very heavy on his hands.

and makes a noncommittal reply. Or if somebody changes the topic of conversation to some subject other than flying or research, he quickly loses all interest and subsides into his usual bored silence. Seldom is anyone invited by the Lindberghs. When they go out, they are generally alone. And alone, they spend the day—he pottering in his little laboratory or drawing airplane designs, she attending to the children or writing.

Most of Lindbergh's friends in the American colony, who wished him so well and have tried so hard to make him happy, have become very imparient. His almost pathological shyness often makes him rude to the point of insult. When his more sociable wife does entertain at their apartment, he frequently sulks in his rively and refuses to come out. When visiting other people, he will insist before he leaves that a servant be sent out on the street to see whether there are any newspaperment or other suspicious lotterers lying in wait for him. Even old friends must be very careful with his unpredictable sensibilities. The slightest hint of curiosity brings an icy answer and a wall of silence.

When Lindbergh discovered that there was a newsman present, he shut up like a clam, and hardly responded to the Crown Prince's discussion of his own flights with the Wright Brothers in the early days of aviation. Friedrich Wilhelm, with the true German's love of photographs commemorating all occasions, had arranged for pictures to be taken in the garden after lunch. "What are you trying to put over on me?" glowered the Colonel when the photographer appeared. The Prince, much upset, tried to amooth over the embarrassing situation. But Lindbergh remained truculent and left abortly afterwards with a very curt word of farmer!"







Lindbergh's harred of the press has become an obsession. The corner windows of his Paris apartment command a view of both the streets on which the house stands. One of the servants is almost always on watch to report anyone hanging about the neighborhood. If Lindbergh sees a suspicious-looking passerby on the sidewalk as he comes out the front door, he scuttles back in again and waits until the coast is clear. The address of the house is a carefully guarded secret of the American Embassy and of the few friends who have promised never to talk to anyone cless about his movements.

Of late, he has even been violent with pressmen who came roo close. In Moscow last August, Lindbergh thought that the Secret Polite "ihadow" who was following him around was a reporter. Lindbergh runned suddenly one day and felled the unfortunate agent with a punch to the jaw. A few days later in Rumania, Lindbergh caught an overzeal-ous newsman who had climbed into the airport commander's apartment through the kitchen window to get an incerview. He locked the reporter into a room for an hour. Since those incidents have become known, the 'boys' give the Colonel a wide berth. Lindbergh's friends have tried again and again to change his attende, to make him understand that a



Lindbergh is France's best advertisement of what perfect sanctuary the Republic can and does provide for the harried foreigner. Practiced and astute Monsieur Jacques Simon, the Prefecture's famous expert, takes a great deal of trouble with the Colonel, his greatest worty. Wherever Lindbergh goes, an unobtrusive bicyclist or a taxi driver of the Sûrete's not far behind. He doesn't know it, but he is watched every moment. At Port-Blanc, the little Bereon coast town off which lie the Islands of Illiec and St. Gildas—the aummer homes of Lindbergh and Dr. Carrel—police vigilance is unflagging. Almost the moment a stranger arrives, he is accosted by a friendly but very firm little man, Inspector Josselin, permanently assigned to Lindbergh's protection. offered him in Paris, Lindbergh is really happy only when he is in Brittany with Dr. Carrel. The famous scientist is his best friend. Dr. Alexis Carrel, Nobel Prize winner and one of the Rockefeller Institute's most brilliant stars, is very different from the average research worker. His interests are many, his knowledge of the world immense. With his keen analytical ability in things scientific, he combines a deep intui-tive understanding of human character and the ways of men. He is no dry scientist, his vision constricted by his particular branch of work, but a man of charm, wit and sympathy for the emotion of others -so common to Frenchmen of that type.

## Carrel and Lindbergh: the beginning of a friendship

Lindbergh met Carrel in November, 1930. In the summer of that year, the Colonel had become ac-

quainted with Dr. Paluel Flagg, who had been called in as anesthetist at the birth of the Lindberghs' first child. They became friends and once, in the course of a conversation, Dr. Flagg asked Lindbergh whether he was interested in medicine. Keenbeign whether the was interested in medicine. A firm friendship grew up between the two men, the deep kind that often develops between absolutely antithetical types of individuals. Carrel, the brill-hant thinker, the incuitive and temperamental genius liant thinker, the incuitive and temperamental genius with little sense or patiente for the purely mechanical, found in Lindbergh the man of orderly detail, the mind which fastens itself on a problem and gets to its goal in the shortest and simplest possible way. And to Lindbergh, Carrel showed a new world—what makes human beings tick, why they respond as they do. When Lindbergh is with Carrel, the Colonel is a changed man. The Doctor understands him and his peruliarities. He needs but to lay his hand on Lindbergh's arm and say, "Look, Charles," to smooth him out of his most difficult moods. to smooth him out of his most difficult moods. 
## The Lindberghs find peace in Kent

Early in 1936, after a visit to London and several weeks of house hunting, the Colonel and Anne finally found the kind of a place they were looking for. "Long Barn" it was called, in the little Kentish village of Weald, four miles from the nearest town, 30 miles from London. The mellow, old, half-timbered house lay at the end of the London. The barn for which the place was named had been toro down years before and a skillfully antiqued, cheerful redbrick wing put in its place. In "Long Barn's" 18 rooms was beautiful old furniture, in the living room a huge freplace. A charming English rose garden had been laid out. Round about were woods and meadows. Here was the peace that the Lindberghs were looking for.

Lindbergh at that time was more tactitum and reserved than ever. The execution of Bruno Hauptmann preyed on his mind, as friends noticed, and all the horrors of the past months were still fresh in his memory. And he would unburden himself to no one. Gradually, by May 1936 the quiet of the little village had begun to straighten him out. He started strolling about, calling at the local post office for his mail, and greeting the villagers with friendly "hello's." No one bothered him. The people of Weald were as little inquisitive as they were informative. In the little white church on Sundays, no one turned to stare. The Vicar came to call, found Lindbergh very

Soon came General Goring's invitation to come to Germany for the Olympic Games and study the progress of aviation in the Reich. This was to be the first of three formal visits to Germany. Lindbergh borrowed a plane, and he and Anne set out for Berlin. On July 12 they landed at the Staaken military air field and were pompously greeted by Göring's right-hand man who welcomed them "in the name of Air Minister Göring." Long rows of bombers and fighters were drawn up on the field for Lindbergh to see. That night he dined with Major Truman Smith, the American Military and Air Atrache in bernin. The paper has changed its masthead on page 1. Instead of the two boxes in "erman which were to the right and left of the title on top of the page " Official Organ of the Terman American Bund and of the D.K.V." and "Fighting Organ of the racial "ermandom", this issue has on the left:

" AMERICANS! EUILD UP THE AMERICAS!" and on the right:
" KEEP THE U.S.A. OUT OF EUROPE'S WARS!"

The lead article in English on page 1 is "Lindbergh demands U.S. keep out." The article states that the old neutrality law "had practically the unanimous support of the American people". The article is continued in double-column spread on page 2, col. 1 and 2 and closes with the sentence—in heavy type:

"Write, circulate and mail letters and petitions to your Senators and demand that the embargo on arms shall not be lifted or live to see your sons sent to slaughter for England and rance! "

Page 1, col.1 and 2, center, and page 2, columns 5, 6 & 7 has an article in English "Don't be fooled again by tales of 'German atrocities'.- British propaganda under full headway.-"

RECORDED & INDEXED

Page 1, col. 1 and 2, bottom has an article in English in a special box "Remember your constitutional rights. A DE HAVESTIGHTOM President Woodnwo Wilson's address at Arlington SEP 28 1939 Cemetery, May 30, 1916." The article cites the quote "We have no criticism for men who love the places president of their birth and the sources of their origin."
