It is possible that there is no violation of the Espionage Statute involved in this matter. However, it is suggested that you determine if the United States Attorney in your district would institute prosecution in this case. If so, conduct an appropriate investigation. If prosecution is not authorized, it is requested that your office interview the writer of the letter and request her to desist from sending such letters through the mails.

The Los Angeles Office has not as yet determined who has handled this communication, but it will do so depending on the action taken by your office.

**SYNOPSIS OF FACTS**

Rooming house proprietor states [REDACTED] lived at her house for approximately three months but left about three weeks ago. While living there, she was a constant source of trouble, in that she bothered roomers, appeared in the living room not sufficiently dressed, and came home intoxicated frequently. Has a bad reputation in town and is considered a "man chaser." Is the type who is jealous of anybody who is a success. [REDACTED] rooming house proprietor, compelled to dispossess [REDACTED] in view of her activities about the house. New file this office discloses [REDACTED] carried as victim in White Slave Traffic Act case and can be located at Williams, West Virginia. Lead included to interview her there.

DETAILS: The letter of reference from the Los Angeles Office indicates that a letter was received by Mr. Clark Cable, postmarked at Barberton, Ohio, on October 20, 1937, bearing the signature of [REDACTED] who gave her address as [REDACTED] Barberton, Ohio.

Upon receipt of the communication from the Los Angeles Office, an interview was had by Special Agent [REDACTED] of this office with Mr. Emerich B. Freed, United States Attorney, and Mr. Frank Wiedemann, Assistant United States Attorney, Cleveland, Ohio. Mr. Freed examined the original extortion letter and declined prosecution on the ground that there was no violation as he was doubtful that anything of value was demanded. He stated that in all probability this letter was written by a "movie struck" girl, who probably thought this would be a good way to get into the movies. He stated, however, to Special Agent [REDACTED] that he desired that the writer of the letter be interviewed and if she was found to be a person of low mentality, she should be reprimanded and advised not to write such a letter in the future. If she was found to be an individual of sound mind and of the cool, calculating type, he suggested that the writer be again brought to his attention, in order that he might reconsider his decision regarding prosecution.

At [REDACTED] Barberton, Ohio, agent inquired as to [REDACTED] and was advised that she had left there about three weeks ago. The proprietor of the house, [REDACTED] advised that she did not know the present whereabouts of [REDACTED] but it was apparent that [REDACTED] would be in possession of information as to the background and history of this girl. It is noted that the husband of [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] appeared to be an intelligent and well bred woman and not the type who would approve of the letter directed to Mr. Clark Cable.

[REDACTED] stated that [REDACTED] had been living at 570 West Hooper Road for approximately three months and that her father lives in either West Virginia or Kentucky. It was the understanding of [REDACTED]

[redacted] mother died of an epileptic fit some years ago and that [redacted] has not lived with her folks for many years. She further explained that in view of the manner in which [redacted] conducted herself while rooming in the Adams Inn, she was compelled to inform her to secure a room some place else. [redacted] according to [redacted] was a constant source of trouble, stating that she frequently appeared in the living room of their home with little clothes on; that she entered the rooms of other guests; and that she very often came home in an intoxicated condition. She was practically penniless and without clothes and [redacted] gave her various dresses and pieces of ladies wearing apparel and also assisted her in numerous other ways.

[redacted] volunteered the information that [redacted] had directed a letter to Mr. Clark Gable, stating that she was going to get to Hollywood at any cost. Although [redacted] did not read the letter, she was aware of its contents and informed [redacted] at that time that she was consulting with [redacted] if she sent that letter through the mail. However, [redacted] disregarded her advice and caused the letter to be mailed. It is the impression of [redacted] that a similar letter was directed to Mr. Robert Taylor.

It is [redacted] impression that [redacted] is somewhat mentally deficient and is the type who is jealous of anybody who is considered a success. She disclosed that Miss [redacted] has absolutely no ability as far as dancing or singing is concerned, and furthermore that she has a difficult time speaking distinctly and acting as a lady.

According to [redacted] [redacted] was constantly endeavoring to get her to take her out and visit night clubs and [redacted] was not careful or ladylike in her actions.

[redacted] was questioned as to the identity of the [redacted] and was stated that at one time [redacted] received [redacted] the had some information concerning Mr. Clark Gable but she had never been able to learn the nature of it. However, she did mention that in all probability, [redacted] [redacted] [redacted] any knowledge as to the background of [redacted] or [redacted] or [redacted] in possession of any incriminating [redacted] [redacted] [redacted]

[redacted] left the rooming house on a Sunday night and [redacted] was home that evening but on the following

day [redacted] received a telegram from Steubenville, Ohio, in which [redacted] stated that she would be home at noon. However, she failed to arrive and it is [redacted] impression that she might possibly be hitchhiking to Hollywood. Through an aunt of [redacted], [redacted] Steubenville, Ohio, [redacted] learned that [redacted] had been there in company with a Jewish individual, named [redacted] proprietor of a cigar store in Akron, Ohio, whom she stated she intended marrying.

However, [redacted] stated that subject was selling some kind of medicine [redacted] in connection with a campaign being put on by the Ladies Auxilliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in East Liverpool, Ohio. [redacted] telephoned [redacted] East Liverpool, Ohio, which individual is President of the Ladies Auxilliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and through her ascertained that subject was last known to be residing at the Ceramic Hotel in East Liverpool.

At the Ceramic Hotel, corner Fourth and Walnut Streets, the writer located and interviewed [redacted]. She readily admitted having sent instant letter to Clark Gable, and stated that at the time she sent the letter she was in desperate need of employment, and as evidence of this pointed out that she had shortly thereafter started to practice prostitution in Youngstown, Ohio. In this connection it has been previously pointed out that subject was located in a house of prostitution at Youngstown, in November of 1937 and the pimp who placed her there, [redacted], was a subject of a White Slave Traffic Act investigation conducted by the Cleveland field division.

[redacted] advised that she knew of nothing definite regarding Clark Gable's past history, but at one time overheard a bus driver talking to another unknown individual, wherein the bus driver indicated that he knew Clark Gable prior to the time that Mr. Gable became a film star, and knew that Clark Gable's past history was not above reproach. [redacted] stated that inasmuch as she knew how to fix dance she thought she could interest Mr. Gable in securing work for her in Hollywood. She stated that she had not written letters to any other prominent individuals and that this was the first occasion on which she had sent letters through the U. S. Mails or otherwise used any black-mail tactics. It was pointed out to her the seriousness of the offense of using the U. S. Mails in the manner in which she did in sending the letter to Clark Gable, and the penalty for this offense was pointed out to her. She appeared to be thoroughly alarmed at what she had done, and she stated that she would use every care in the future.

Inasmuch as the U. S. Attorney at Cleveland, at the instance of this investigation, suggested that should the writer of the letter be determined to be an individual of low morality, she should be reprimanded and advised not to write such a letter in the future, no further investigation is being conducted in the premises, the suggestion of the U. S. Attorney having been carried out.



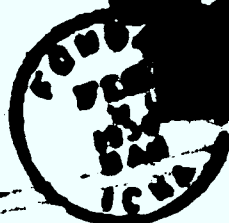

SA [redacted] called from Des Moines re [redacted] Gaylord Forsyth. He stated that SA [redacted] had gotten a signed statement from Forsyth, and that it is his opinion that Forsyth has been reading too many detective stories. He stated that Forsyth has an eight grade education, and lives with his mother, [redacted] rather than his father, [redacted] of [redacted] Iowa. He works on various farms as a laborer, but is not a farmer by profession. He has been in CCC Camps. For the past couple of years he has come to Florida for the winter, and worked in a restaurant in Orlando, Florida.

The girl in this case, whose married name is [redacted] is twenty years of age, a [redacted] and lives with her father, [redacted] IS about 150 miles northwest of Des Moines. [redacted] is normal except about this girl, he had no intention of obtaining the money, merely to scare her.

On January 24, 1935, the girl received a letter from Eagle Grove, Iowa, from a man who said he was a truck driver, and who had received a Collier Mail with the girl's name and that of Gaylord Forsyth written on it, and that he wanted to get acquainted with her. Apparently the man Forsyth writes her name quite often and on anything handy, but does not do it maliciously, but only because he thinks of her.

The Deputy Sheriff who aided SA [redacted] in locating the farm is E. A. Silerist, of Pocahontas, Iowa.

[redacted] stated that there is no chance of a lead of information out there, and was instructed not to make a release until so instructed by the Bureau. I told him that the Bureau would notify Los Angeles of this matter.

MEMORANDUM

Clark Gable, the motion picture actor, received an extortion letter through the United States mails at Hollywood, California, in which a demand was made for the sum of \$1,000. The letter, postmarked Ponda, Iowa, February 9, 1936, was signed Alice Schnetter and contained the statement "If you value your life and your future then send me \$1,000 right away and tell no one or else." The writer of this letter indicated that her father was hard up on his farm and that she was going to get money if she had to steal it. Mr. Gable was warned not to say anything concerning this matter and was instructed to send the money to the writer of the letter at Route 1, Ponda, Iowa.

This extortion letter was referred to the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, at Los Angeles, California, and thereafter Special Agents of the Des Moines, Iowa Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation were assigned to initiate an investigation in the vicinity of Ponda, Iowa.

Through investigation it was determined that one Gaylord Foryth was a logical suspect and on the afternoon of February 24, 1936, a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation located Foryth at Ponda, Iowa. Upon interrogation he confessed to writing the extortion letter to Clark Gable, signing the name of Alice Schnetter, Route No. 1, Ponda, Iowa, whom he has known for the past several years. Foryth would not admit that he had additional plans for obtaining the money from Clark Gable in the event it was mailed to Alice Schnetter, but stated that Alice Schnetter did not have any knowledge concerning the extortion plot and that he signed her name to the letter as a spite proposition as he had a grudge against her. He also stated that Alice Schnetter had nothing to do with this extortion plot, and investigation disclosed that she is reputable and comes from a well to do family. She likewise stated, upon interview, that she knew nothing whatsoever about the extortion letter directed to Clark Gable.

Gaylord Foryth is thirty years of age, single, a resident of Ponda, Iowa, and has been employed as a farm laborer in the vicinity of Ponda. He is presently being held in the County Jail at Pockahontas, Iowa.

The facts as to this extortion plot will be immediately presented to the United States Attorney at Mason City, Iowa, for his opinion as to prosecution of Gaylord Foryth.

Special Agent [redacted] telephoned from Des Moines, advising that one Gaylord Forsyth had been taken into custody by Special Agent [redacted] at Fonda, Iowa this afternoon and that he had just admitted writing the extortion letter to Clark Cable, and at the time of this telephone call Agent [redacted] was attempting to get a signed confession from him.

He stated that Alice Schmetter was found to be reputable, of well to do people, and was thereafter interviewed at her home on Route #1, Fonda, Iowa. Alice Schmetter stated that she did not write the extortion letter in question, but named Gaylord Forsyth as a suspect, stating that he had written her name on several \$1 bills, one of which came into possession of a truck driver who later introduced himself and asked for an engagement. On one of the bills was found the initials "G.F." She further stated that she had several dates with Forsyth in the past, but her father had forbidden her to see him, and on one occasion ordered Forsyth from the premises. Thereafter, she refused to have any further dates with Forsyth, and for this reason believed he may have written the letter, signing her name thereto.

In subsequently furnishing additional information concerning the subject in this case, Agent [redacted] advised that Forsyth is 30 years of age, single, a resident of Fonda, Iowa, and that he has been employed as a farm laborer in the vicinity of Fonda, Iowa. He stated further that a Deputy Sheriff from Pocahontas, Iowa had accompanied Agent [redacted] to the place where Forsyth resides and thereafter Forsyth was taken to the County Jail at Pocahontas, Iowa for questioning. Forsyth admitted

writing the letter to the victim, but stated he had no intention of extorting money from him, but wrote the letter, signing the name Alice Schmetter, as a spite proposition because Alice Schmetter would not have anything further to do with him. He further stated that Alice Schmetter was not involved in this plot and that she knew nothing whatsoever concerning the letter to Clark Gable.

b7C [redacted] further advised that he called the United States Attorney at Mason City, Iowa to determine whether he would authorize prosecution against Gaylord Forsyth. The United States Attorney has looked into the Extortion Statute, advising that he would prosecute if Forsyth is mentally sound.

At 9:25 P. M., I telephoned Mr. Hanson at Los Angeles giving him the facts concerning the apprehension of Gaylord Forsyth. Mr. Hanson advised that he would notify either Clark Gable, or an official at the studio and would make a release to the press immediately.


b7C At 9:45 P. M., I telephoned Agent [redacted] at Des Moines authorizing him to make a release in this case, advising him also that the facts concerning the apprehension of Forsyth had been furnished the Los Angeles Office, and a release would likewise be made at Los Angeles.

# Extortion Note Sent Gable to Spite Girl

FONDA, Iowa, Feb. 25—A husky, unemployed farm worker admitted to Federal agents today that he sent a \$1000 extortion note to Clark Gable to "spite" a pretty young widow who spurned his love.

Gaylor Forsyth, 30, mailed the note to Gable two weeks ago, signing the name of Mrs. Alice Schnetter, 30, member of a respected Iowa family. He said he had no plans for doing anything more than sending the letter.

"I did it for spite," he said. "I fell in love with her, but she wouldn't pay any attention to me. Her father wouldn't let me near his place."

G-men yesterday arrested Forsyth. He was traced thru his handwriting. Mrs. Schnetter knew nothing about the letter.

## FARMHAND IS HELD IN EXTORTION PLOT

Iowan Is Accused of Sending Letter to Clark Gable Demanding \$1,000.

By the Associated Press

POCAHONTAS, Iowa, Feb. 20 — Clayford Fawcett, 30-year-old farmhand, seized by Federal agents investigating a \$1,000 extortion letter sent to Clark Gable was held in jail today pending action by the United States district attorney.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation announced the Fawcett, Iowa, man wrote a note telling the motion picture actor to pay \$1,000 "if you value your life or your future."

The name of Mrs. Alice Schaeffer, a widow, living with her parents near Ponda, was signed. Both Fawcett and Mrs. Schaeffer said the letter knew nothing about the actor.

Fawcett, the bureau said, seized Mr. Schaeffer's name out of spite because she had ignored his attentions. There were no indications as to what plans may have been made for obtaining the money from Mrs. Schaeffer in the event Gable had met the demand.

Fawcett was seized late yesterday at the home of his mother.

**SYNOPSIS OF FACTS**

Gaylord Forsyth, 30 year old farm laborer, Fonda, Iowa, in signed statement admits mailing on February 9, 1938 from Fonda, Iowa, to Hollywood, California, a threatening letter demanding of Victim Clark Gable, the addressee, \$1,000.00, and failure to do so would result in peril to his life and future. Letter hand printed with hard lead pencil on ordinary tablet paper and signed Alice Schnetter, Fonda, Iowa, who in 1936 and 1937 was the unwilling subject of Forsyth's affections. Forsyth, in 1936 and later, wrote Alice Schnetter's name and address on paper currency, several of which came into hands of other persons one of whom wrote Alice Schnetter, furnishing serial number of bill and fact bill also carried initials "G.F.". Gaylord Forsyth arrested 2-24-38 by Bureau Agent, submitted signed statement admitting guilt and identifying photographic copies of extortion letter. Prosecution authorized same date, and on 2-25-38 complaint sworn to before U. S. Commissioner, Ft. Dodge, Iowa, and warrant issued charging Forsyth with violation of Section 338-A, Title 18, USCC. Bond to be fixed at \$2,000.00 at preliminary hearing same date. Fingerprints of Subject forwarded to Technical Laboratory. Description of Subject contained herein.

DETAILS:

The title of this case is being CHANGED to show the Subject as GAYLOP FORSYTH, and the name [redacted] is being eliminated from the title entirely as it is not considered a proper alias.

Prior to the receipt of the reference letter there was a telephonic inquiry from the Bureau regarding this matter, and there being no file in the Des Moines Field Office an exchange of telegrams ensued and the receipt of the telegram of reference from the Los Angeles Field Office advised that the substance of the extortion letter involved herein and the fact that photostatic copies of same had been forwarded to this office along with the letter of reference. Upon receipt of the photostatic copy of the letter and envelope containing same, Agent proceeded immediately to Fonda, Iowa, where the following investigation was conducted.

Inquiry at the Post Office resulted in information that the alleged signer of the extortion letter, Alice Schnetter, was unknown at that office. Inquiry among the clerks by [redacted] Postmistress, resulted in information that a young man named Schnetter had married a girl who resided near Varina, Iowa, some miles distant from Fonda. Further inquiry established that [redacted], Cashier of the Fonda National Bank, had sometime during his lifetime resided in the vicinity of Varina.

[redacted] on interview advised that a young widow named [redacted] resided [redacted] miles North and one mile West of Fonda with her parents, [redacted] prosperous farmers. [redacted] stated that he knew the young lady and stated that she was about 20 years of age and had when 17 years of age married a young man named [redacted] who a few weeks after their marriage had died, and since that time the young girl has lived at home with her parents. He stated that [redacted] was a prosperous farmer of excellent reputation who had had a comfortable income for many years past, even though farming conditions in the particular community were not of the best. He stated that it would be inconceivable that [redacted] would be prompted to write a letter demanding money as he distinctly recalled that upon the death of her husband she inherited a few thousand dollars, and furthermore because of the financial condition of her parents there would be nothing transpire that would encourage her to write a letter demanding money.

He was questioned if there had been any series of hay stack burnings and the like, indicating a group of persons in the community inclined to write threatening letters and do other underhanded acts of thievery or destruction, and he advised that while it was true that Fonda had a bad element of young men in it, so far they have committed no depredation on the surrounding countryside, and nothing of any unusual significance had happened.

Agent proceeded to the farm house of [redacted] and interviewed their daughter, Alice Schnetter, and her mother. They were not told at the onset of the interview the nature of the business that had brought Agent to their home, and were questioned generally regarding letter writing and anonymous communications and other matters of a like nature. Shortly after the questioning opened, Alice Schnetter said she understood the reason for Agent's visit and said she was very worried and annoyed about receiving letters from unknown persons, and further questioning developed that she had received possibly three letters, one of which she had retained and which was exhibited to Agent which letter was signed - "An Unknown Friend, Williard C. Christopher, Dakota City, Iowa, R/O. [redacted]". The envelope containing this letter bore a cancellation mark Eagle Grove, Iowa, 1:00 P.M., January 24, 1938. The letter is written in lead pencil in better than average handwriting. It consisted of three pages on ordinary tablet size paper and was apparently written from Dakota City, Iowa, on January 22, 1938. It is addressed - "Dear Unknown Friend", following the preliminary opening the letter stated that undoubtedly she would be surprised to hear from him, and the fact that he was a young man and the owner of a new V-8 truck and engaged in the business of general trucking and goes on to state that the writer had been in Sioux City, Iowa, the previous week and when he paid for his dinner that he ate there he tendered a \$5.00 bill and in return got four \$1.00 bills and some change, and the following is an exact quotation as the letter continues:

"As I was putting the bills in my billfold I noticed a name written across the back of one of the bills, and it was your name and address. So I thought you might be interested to know where the dollar bill [redacted] was, how I will describe the bill to you as well as a 1936 Sierrus bill No. [redacted] with the initials G.F. on it."

The letter goes on with a statement that the writer would appreciate hearing from the addressee and that when he is next in [redacted] he would like to meet her. This letter is being made a part of the Des Moines Field Office file.



Alice Schmetter stated that she had received other such communications, but this was the only one that had furnished her with any information regarding the written matter on the particular calling bill other than that her name and address were on it. She advised that she knew none of these men who had written to her and was very annoyed at the idea of anyone writing to her under such circumstances. She was then questioned as to the possible identity of the person signing the initials G. F., and she stated that sometime after the death of her husband she met a young man named Gaylord Forsyth at a neighborhood community gathering who had taken her home. That at his request she had gone out with him on one occasion, but had found him not at all pleasing to her taste and had indicated, in what she considered an unmistakable manner, that she wished to see him no more. That nevertheless this man Forsyth had attempted to force his attentions upon her and on several occasions had driven by her father's home, blowing the horn on his automobile and making several such trips by the house the same evening. That her father became very provoked at the annoying attentions of the man, and on one occasion when Forsyth had driven into the farm yard the father had taken a shotgun and chased Forsyth from the premises. On this particular occasion Forsyth had, prior to driving into the farm yard, parked outside the premises on the intersection of two county roads, and had shouted in a loud voice for her to come out to see him to talk to her. The day following this incident, her father, discovered that the mailbox at the corner had been stolen. This mailbox had been at that particular location for 25 years, and all members of the family are of the belief that Forsyth took the mailbox.

She stated that she had observed Forsyth while she was out with him, and thought him to be an exceedingly peculiar person of a nervous temperament, talked about various things in an extreme manner and seemed to be very eccentric. She furnished Agent with a description of Forsyth, which is not being repeated here as a more detailed description follows at the close of this report. She advised that Forsyth on one occasion was in Florida at about Christmas time and she received a Christmas card from him, written in what she presumed to be his handwriting. This Christmas card and the envelope containing it were given to Agent, and it is observed that the postmark is cancelled from the United States Post Office at 9:00 P.M., [redacted] the address is written in lead pencil, and one [redacted] is this [redacted] of Miss Alice Schmetter. [redacted] that from her first meeting [redacted] which she [redacted] in an ornate affair [redacted] has a simple verse wishing happiness [redacted] in lead pencil has the following -



"To Alice from Taylor". The two former names are written in the left-hand, whereas the words to and from are printed. This content of envelope are also being made a part of the evidence file.

A comparison of the handwriting appearing on the envelope containing the Christmas card, and the handwriting appearing on the envelope addressed to the Victim in this case indicated to Agent some similarity. Likewise, the printing of the words to and from, particularly the letters "T" and "R", bear decided similarity to the same letters in the threatening letter.

Concerning Alice Schmetter, it is set out here that she is 20 years of age, a widow, residing on a farm with her parents. She was direct and evidently truthful in all of her disclosures, has a nice honest appearance, and appeared to be a person of fine reputation and character. In view of the information she had given Agent at the time of this interview it is felt that it was more expedient to prolong this interview by the securing of fingerprints, handwriting specimens, etc. Consequently, in view of later developments this was never done.

Agent returned to Fonda, Iowa, the last known general address Alice Schmetter had of Gaylor Forsyth, and contacted [redacted] at the Fonda National Bank, and he stated that he knew [redacted] know him to be a sort of a shiftless fellow of about 30 years of age about 5'8", who while in town resided with his aunt, [redacted] a widow residing on the outskirts of the village. HE advised that two weeks ago [redacted] came into the bank and stated that creditors were pursuing him and that he wanted to transfer his Model A Ford Coupe to his mother, which was done by one of the bank employees, and that on February 23, 1938 he re-appeared at the bank and stated he was no longer bothered by his creditors, which it developed were relatives of [redacted] from whom he had borrowed money, and that consequently he wanted the car re-conveyed to his name, which was done. A description of [redacted] was obtained from [redacted] but for reasons previously set out same is not furnished here. [redacted] advised that [redacted] could usually be found hanging about disreputable pool rooms and gambling places in town, and suggested that before a visit be made to his aunt's house, effort be made to locate him in one of the pool rooms. Agent having enlisted the assistance of [redacted] Deputy Sheriff, and known to be a reliable and trustworthy officer, made a tour of the pool rooms in an effort to locate [redacted] It is noted here that it would be practically useless for a stranger to make any inquiry in this village regarding an inhabitant, because of the distrust of the townspeople toward law enforcement. A tour of the

b7C [redacted] and Agent and [redacted] then went to the residence of his aunt where he frequently stops. Forayth was located at this place, and after a brief questioning at the residence, at which time he assumed a non-committal attitude, Agent deemed advisable to take him to some other place for interview, the nearest being the County Seat at Pocahontas, Iowa. Enroute to Pocahontas he was questioned regarding his recent activities in letter writing and he stated that the only letters he had written recently were letters to members of his family in a dispute over money. He was led to believe that this was the purpose of the interview and he was also questioned additionally regarding mailboxes missing in the community, regarding which he denied any knowledge. Upon arriving at a private room in the Court House, he was questioned regarding a certain communication which was of a serious nature, and it became apparent that Forayth was becoming very uneasy. Without mentioning the threatening letter involved herein he was questioned at considerable length regarding his letter writing tendencies, leading up to the question of mutilating currency by writing people's name thereon and he stated that he did not know at the time he wrote on various dollar bills that it was against the law and he was truly sorry he had violated the law. He stated that he acquired the habit of writing names on dollar bills two or three years ago, first writing his own name and later the names of other people. He did not disclose, however, the name of Alice Schuster as one of the persons whose name he had used for writing on dollar bills. He was then questioned about his initials G. F. appearing on one of the bills located and he acknowledged that that was possible. He was then requested to submit specimens of his handwriting and also specimens of hand printing and he became visibly nervous, and attempted very poorly to disguise his handwriting and printing. He was permitted to print a few words and then questioned and then requested to print a few more words, finally forgetting himself and making characters very similar with the characters in the threatening letter. Similarly he was confronted with the threatening letter and he acknowledged that he had written same. He was then asked to identify the photostatic copies of the envelope and hand printed letter and if said photostatic copies were reproductions of the letter he had sent to Clark Gable, the Victim in this case, he should initial same, which he did. The photostatic copies of the threatening letter and the envelope containing same, bearing the initials of G. F., are being retained in the Des Moines Field Office file.

Forayth has furnished the following sworn signed statement the original of which is being retained in the Des Moines Field Office:

Pocahontas, Iowa  
Feb. 24, 1938.

b7C "I, Gaylor Forayth, do make the following statement to [redacted], Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation of my own free will, without duress or any promise of reward.

On February 28th, 1936, at Fonda, Iowa, I wrote a letter addressed to Clark Gable, the actor, in which letter I demanded \$1000.00 in cash from him. In this letter I threatened his life and future if he failed to comply with my request. I signed this letter Alice Schnetter, Route One, Fonda, Iowa. All of this letter was in hand-printing with a sharp, hard pencil. I purchased the tablet of paper at the Variety Store in Fonda, Iowa and I also purchased the envelope there. I attempted to avoid being caught at this by hand printing the letter. However, I forgot and used ordinary handwriting on the envelope. The envelope was addressed to Clark Gable, Hollywood, California.

I put this envelope in the United States Mails at Fonda, Iowa by dropping it in the letter slot at the United States Post Office at Fonda, Iowa. This was done on Feb. 9, 1936. No one knew I was doing this and I have told no one about it until now.

b7c Agent [redacted] has shown me a photographic copy of the letter and the envelope and I have placed my initials on each. I hereby acknowledge that these are photographs of the letter I mailed and that I sent to Clark Gable.

Sometime in 1936 I began the habit of putting my initials on paper money. I also at this time and later wrote the name of Alice Schnetter, and her address on these bills. I don't know for sure why I did this. I did not think it was a wrong thing to do. I understand that as a result of this she received some mail from strangers that had got these bills.

I was in love with this girl, Alice Schnetter and thought for a time that she was fond of me but later she did not want to see me any more. This made me feel very bad and the only reason I can offer for my actions in mailing the letter to Clark Gable is that I wanted her to be bothered by the authorities, but I did not want her to be harmed.

I have read the above statement and it is true and willingly given. I make this statement because I want to clear this whole matter up and I want to tell the truth about everything.

b7C It will be noted that Forsyth stated he had purchased a tablet of paper at the Variety Store in Fonda, and had also purchased the envelope there. He does not know where the tablet and envelopes are at the present time, but believes it is possible that same may be at the residence of his aunt, [redacted]. He states that the only reason he can offer for writing the threatening letter to the victim in this case and demanding the \$1,000.00 is that after he had been repulsed by Alice Schnetter, his feelings had been so hurt that he felt that he ought to do something to get even with her. He states, however, that that is not the reason he started writing her name on dollar bills, but continued to do so thinking she might be annoyed by persons writing to her. He stated he had contemplated that she would be troubled by law enforcement officers as a result of the letter to Clark Gable, but it had never occurred to him that she might become involved in serious trouble. He was questioned at some length as to what he intended to do following the mailing of the first letter, insofar as arranging for a pay-off place for the \$1,000.00 and he stated he had never made up his mind, and now after his arrest believes he would never have done anything further. He further stated that he obtained the idea for writing the extortion letter from reading detective story magazines, which he does considerably.

b7C Agent notified the Des Moines Field Office immediately upon it becoming evident that Forsyth had written the letter in question, and notified the office further when a signed statement had been secured. Acting Special Agent in Charge Gene H. Henry notified [redacted] of the Bureau of the developments, and in addition communicated with United States Attorney E. G. Dunn at Mason City, Iowa, who authorized prosecutive action against Forsyth in this matter. This information was communicated to Agent, who after placing Forsyth in the Pocahontas County Jail at Pocahontas, Iowa, proceeded to Fort Dodge, Iowa, and on 2-25-38 took the following action.

AT FORT DODGE, IOWA.

E. H. Pratt, United States Commissioner, 1317 - 8th Avenue, North, was informed of Mr. Dunn's authorized prosecution, and Agent gave to a complaint charging Gaylord Forsyth with violation of Section 1342, Title 18, U.S.C., in substance in that on February 9, 1938, at Fonda, Iowa, Forsyth knowingly and willingly deposit in the United States Mail for mailing, a certain threatening letter addressed to Clark Gable, Hollywood, California, in which letter the sum of \$1,000.00 was demanded.

A copy of this complaint is being made a part of the [redacted] Field Office file.  
Warrant was issued based on the above complaint and placed in the hands of the Deputy United States Marshal for [redacted] and Agent was informed by United States Commissioner Pratt that [redacted]

be set at \$2,000.00 later on the same date, upon the appearance of Forsyth before him. In the event Forsyth waives hearing and is bound over to the federal grand jury, or if such action is taken after final hearing, it is the practice in that division of the Northern District of Iowa to place prisoners in a jail at Rockwell City, Iowa.

The information concerning the filing of the complaint and issuing of warrant was communicated to the Bureau on 2-25-31 along with the statement that the anticipated bond would be \$2,000.00.

There are being retained in the Des Moines Field Office file two sets of paper bearing attempts at disguise of his handwriting by Forsyth, made during the course of the interview with him.

Transmitted to the Bureau by letter are two sets of fingerprints of Gaylord Forsyth with the request that same be compared to any latent fingerprints developed by the Technical Laboratory in connection with the examination of the original threatening letter and envelope.

In connection with Forsyth's occupation, he advised that his father [redacted] has been a widower since Gaylord was 12 years of age and that he has since that time for the most part worked as a laborer for adjoining farmers. He stated that a few years ago he started a farm and attempted to operate it as a business, but was a failure at it. He advised that he has an eighth grade education and never had any difficulty in school either as to scholastic ability or deportment; that for the last two winters [redacted] came to Florida and worked as a dishwasher in restaurants. He has a feeling that he has been the victim of circumstances, and informed Agent that

he had been "kicked around all his life". He stated that he has never been in any trouble whatsoever before; that he has never been arrested or even spoken to by an officer. He advised that a short time ago he became a member of a friendship society having an office in Miami, Florida, the name of which he has forgotten, which society is a matrimonial club and the reason he joined the society was that it was becoming lonesome for him and he wanted some girls to write to.

**UNDEVELOPED LEADS:**

THE DES MOINES FIELD OFFICE at Fonda, Iowa, will make investigation at the Variety Store to determine if Forsyth purchased the tablet and envelope used in the writing to the Victim in this case, and if so secure the name and address of the person who can identify Forsyth making the purchase.

Will also make arrangements to secure permission to either obtain voluntarily or to conduct a search for the remainder of the tablet used in the writing of the letter involved herein at the home of [REDACTED]

Specimen Q1 is a plain white envelope containing printing in the upper left-hand corner "After Five Days Return To" beneath which are found two ruled lines for the insertion of a return address. The envelope is addressed in pencil in cursive writing. The envelope contains no watermark and measures approximately 3 3/4 by 4 1/2 inches.

Specimen Q2 is handwritten in pencil on a piece of white pad paper ruled with 25 blue green lines on the front starting approximately 2 inches from the top of the page and spaced an average distance of .307 inches apart. The reverse side of the paper contains 25 lines. The numbers at the top of the paper are such as will probably match with particles of paper still remaining in the pad, should the pad be found. The paper contains no watermark, measures approximately 3 by 8 inches and has a substance number of 24.

The material was treated for the development of latent fingerprints but none were found.

Photographic copies of the specimens submitted will be furnished to the Los Angeles and San Francisco Offices within the next several days.
