



C-Men Arrest Farmer In Cable Extortion

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Bureau of Investigation announced last night it had taken into custody a man alleged to have written an extortion note to Clark Gable, using the name of a woman neighbor against whom the man had a "grudge."

The bureau said Gaylord Penry, 35 years old of Peoria, Ill., was alleged to writing an extor-

tion note to the motion picture actor, demanding payment of \$1,000 "to cover your fair or your future."

The note, the bureau said, was

written over the signature of An-

drieth, also of Peoria, but Penry

said she had no knowledge of the

extortion plot and that he signed

the note to the letter as a mere pro-

tection as he had a grudge against

Gable, the bureau said.

"We have no evidence," the bureau said, "that she was writing whatever she is

mentioning in her letter."

The letter, the bureau said, was

addressed to Gable at his home

in Los Angeles, Calif. The letter

was not delivered to Gable's home

and was found in a mail box.

The bureau said, "That he had ad-

vised him for slandering the memory of

Clark Gable in the event it was shown

in Alfred Hitchcock's

"Investigation," the bureau said, "and

that the person is responsible

and comes from a well-known family."

Penry has been employed as a

saleswoman in the vicinity of Peoria,

Illinois, since 1936.

The case will be presented to the

United States attorney at Peoria

today, but, the bureau said, nothing

more can be said at present

as the identity of the man is still

unknown.

**U. S. Jury to Act

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—Federal officials today ordered representatives in Mason City, Ia., to take Grand Jury action against Oayford Porsythe, 26, arrested for allegedly sending an extortion letter to Clark Gable, motion picture star.

Porsythe is said to have admitted to police that he wrote a threatening letter to Gable last Feb. 9. The message was signed with the name of "Alice Smith," member of a prominent Iowa family, who had no knowledge of the threat.

"If you value your life or your future," the letter warned, "then send \$1,000 right away, and tell no one, or else...."

THREATENS GABLE TO IMPLICATE GIRL

Jilted Farm Hand Admits Sending Extortion Note.

PONDA, Iowa, Feb 26 (U.P.) — An unemployed farm worker admitted to Federal agents today that he sent a \$1,000 extortion note to Clark Gable to spite a young widow who had spurned his love.

Gaylor Forsyth, 30 years old, mailed the note to the movie actor two weeks ago, signing the name of Mrs. Alice Schenckter, 28, a farmer's daughter. He said he had had no plans for anything more than sending the letter.

"I did it to spite her," he said. "She wouldn't pay any attention to me. Her father wouldn't let me on his place."

Forsyth was taken to the county jail at Pocahontas by Officer L. M. Chapman, chief of the Des Moines office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, who has no criminal record, was turned through his handwriting.

Mrs. Schenckter told Chapman she had had "one or two" dates with Forsyth but had ignored him since.

Forsyth returned recently from Florida, where he had worked in the kitchen of a Miami night club.

Forsyth's arrest preserved Gable's record against would-be assassins. Two years ago, Mrs. Viola Wells Morton, an English woman, filed suit against him, claiming that he was the father of her daughter. Gable proved he had never been to England. Mrs. Morton was deported to Canada the same day.





Man Held Over Extortion Note To Clark Gable

POCAHONTAS, Iowa (UPI) Feb. 25.—(AP)—Gaylord Fornell, 38-year-old farmhand, seized by federal agents investigating a \$1,000 extortion letter sent to Clark Gable, was held in jail today pending action by the United States attorney.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation announced the Pocahontas, Iowa, man wrote a note telling the motion picture actor to pay \$1,000 "if you value your life or your future."

The name of Mrs. Alice Schaeffer, a widow living with her parents near Pocahontas, was signed to the note. Both Fornell and Alice Schaeffer and the letter have nothing about the note.

Fornell, the bureau said, stated Mrs. Schaeffer's name out of spite because she had injured his wife. There were no indications as to what steps they have been made for obtaining the money demanded.




WASHINGTON, D. C. (UPI)—

The federal bureau of investigation announced Thursday night it had taken into custody a man alleged to have written an extortion note to Clark Gable.

They said the man signed the name of a young woman neighbor against whom the man had a "grudge."

The bureau said Gaylord Forsyth, 32, of Pocahontas, Ia., "threatened to kill" an extortion note to the motion picture actor, demanding payment of \$5,000 "if you value your life or your future."

The note, the bureau said, was written over the signature of Alice Schaeffer, also of Pocahontas.

But Forsyth said she had no knowledge of the "extortion note" and that he signed the name to the letter as a spite proposition.

He was interviewed by agents at Pocahontas, Ia. The letter was turned in to the bureau by the author, the communication said. "Forsyth could not admit," the source said, "that he had any place for threatening" Gable, "but Clark Gable is the only person he has wanted to threaten."

Forsyth has been employed as a farm laborer in the vicinity of Pocahontas, the bureau said.

The case will be presented to the United States attorney at Mason City, Ia., the bureau said, adding that Forsyth is being held in the county jail at Pocahontas, 120 miles northwest of Des Moines.

Love Betrayed Miss

Federal agents in Des Moines said Thursday night it was Forsyth's adoration of Miss Schaeffer which led indirectly to his arrest.

Some time ago, Miss Schaeffer received a letter from a stranger. The stranger explained that he noted that her name was written

on a dollar bill which he was given in change from a larger bill at a Sioux City, Ia., restaurant.

Initials "G. F."

Also on the bill were the initials "G. F." The stranger who wrote Miss Schaeffer explained he was writing merely to tell her about finding the bill with her name on it.

Miss Schaeffer told investigating agents about the initials "G. F." who soon identified as Gaylord Forsyth, former civilian conservation corps worker.

The Des Moines F.B.I. office said that Forsyth had fallen in love with Miss Schaeffer but that she had ignored him and that this tried him.

"And," said an agent in the Des Moines office, "we'd been getting too many negative stories."

DENIES GUILT.

The former farm youth just returned recently from Tampa, Fla., where he was a dishwasher, he told officers. He left Pocahontas several years ago.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Federal Bureau of Investigation on Tuesday night held without bail a man alleged to have written an extortion note to Clark Gable using the name of a woman neighbor against whom the star had a "grudge."

The threat came through Poreyth, an Iowa town addressed to Mr. Gable, an extortion note to the movie star demanding payment of \$1,000 if "you value your wife or your future."

FARMER HELD FOR EXTORTION NOTE TO GABLE

Suspect Admits Letter to
Soile Pretty Widow.
Agents Say.

MELBOURNE, Fla., Feb. 28 (UPI) — A husky, unemployed farm worker confessed to Federal agents today that he sent a \$1000 extortion note to Clark Gable, despite a pretty young widow who spurned his love.

Gusie Porvith, 30, mailed the note to Mr. Gable two weeks ago, signing the name of Mrs. Alice Brinkley, 20, member of a respected local family. He said he had no plans for doing anything more than sending the letter.

"I did it for spite," he said. "I fell in love with her, but she wouldn't pay any attention to me. Her father wouldn't let me have her place."

Gable slipped into this little community yesterday and appeared Porvith.

L. M. Chapman, chief of the Des Moines office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and Porvith, who had no criminal record, was traced through his handwriting.

Miss Brinkley, he said, knew nothing about the letter and grieves about Porvith's actions. She told Mr. Chapman she had "one or two" dates with Porvith a few years ago but had ignored him since then.

Porvith returned recently from Florida, where he had been employed in a Miami night club.

Brown, 24, Melville, Minn., daughter and stepdaughter have sold her parents' home and moved back to town, her name being one of the three in the title.

Chapman said Porvith denied writing the letter and confronted with the initials and specimen of his handwriting.

Porvith's only comment was the effort not aimed would have hit his mother and her neighbors.

It could be said, "What will they think?"

Mrs. Porvith made an admission.

The full statement given follows:

Over the course of 1934, I received a letter from a man, who I later learned lived from Florida. His name was never mentioned at his address, nor was his name ever mentioned at the studio address of Metro-Goldwyn Mayer.

"If you value your life and your future, then send me \$1000 right away and no one else," it said.

The writer indicated that "Your father was hardpressed for money to maintain his home and that "you" were going to get funds if "you" had to steal them."

Mr. Gable probably never saw the letter. Professional letter experts looked it over and turned it over to studio officials who called up Federal agents.

Clark Noble, the victim's attorney, received an extortion letter through the United States Mail at Hollywood, California, in which it demand one million dollars for the sum of \$1,000,000. The letter was postmarked Ponca, Iowa, February 9, 1934, and was signed "Alice Zimmerman." It contained the statement "if you value your life and your future then send us \$1,000 right away and tell no one or else." The writer of this letter indicated her father, who was a farmer, one barn up and that she was going to get away even if she had to steal it. Mr. Noble was advised not to say anything concerning this letter and he was requested to send the money to the writer of the letter at Route 1, Ponca, Iowa.

This extortion letter was referred to the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, at Los Angeles, California, and thereafter Special Agents of the Los Angeles, Iowa, Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation were assigned to conduct an investigation in the vicinity of Ponca.

Through investigation it was determined that Mr. Taylor Parry was a bank teller, and on the afternoon of February 14, 1934, a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation located Mr. Parry at Ponca, Iowa. Upon interview he was asked to write the extortion letter to Clark Noble, giving the name of Alice Zimmerman, whom he had known for the past several years. Parry could not recall the bank additional places for obtaining the money in view of the event Clark Noble called the name of Alice Zimmerman, but stated Alice Zimmerman did not have any knowledge concerning the extortion letter and that he did not have any knowledge concerning the apprehension of the man who sent the note to the letter as a safe proposition since he had a strong desire to live his life in peace and quiet. Investigation disclosed that Alice Zimmerman is single, and comes from a well-known family. She stated upon being approached and asked about a handwriting checkup about the extortion letter, responded to Clark Noble.


On February 16, 1934, an information complaint was filed against Parry before the United States Commissioner at Fort Dodge, Iowa, charging him with violation of the extortion Statute. He is serving a six month sentence in the maximum security prison of the Federal Prison Camp.

England Parry is 30 years of age, single, a resident of [redacted], and has been employed as a farm laborer in the vicinity [redacted].







I was released after 27 days, and finally arrived at Barberville, Ohio on August 27, 1938. At this city I fainted on the highway and was taken to the Citizen's Hospital, where I stayed until August 30, 1938.
