A SOUTHWIDE CALL TO ACTION TO END THE WAR IN VIETNA!

On August 6, 1945, Hiroshima suffered the horror of the first atomic bomb. Twenty-two years later, on August 6, 1967, we will gather in Atlanta to protest the war in Vietnam. It is fitting that we meet on Hiroshima Day to demand an end to this immoral and illegal war, especially since each escalation in Vietnam brings us closer to a nuclear holocaust. Today's hydrogen bomb is 200 times more destructive than the bomb which obliterated Hiroshima; and many nations now stock-pile this terrible weapon. We must learn to avoid war or face annihilation.

A growing number of Americans from all walks of life oppose the war in Vietnam. On April 15 almost half a million of them marched in New York City, and in Atlanta and 144 other cities concerned citizens stand each week in silent vigil to protest the war. We differ in our reasons for opposing the Vietnam war. Some of us oppose it as militarily unsound. A growing number of us, both black and white believe it to be a racist war of genocide and that the U.S. gove: ment is again showing a contempt for Asians in its cruel and inhuman weapons never employed in Europe. Some of us feel that American claims of defending democracy are hypocritical and that instead U.S. troops are defending American business investments. Others see that the Vietnam war has undermined the anti-poverty program.

The children of Mississippi, the slum-dwellers of New York, the unemployed of Appalachia, the poor of Vine City, and the napalmed children of Vietnam are all victims of the war in Asia. All of us are united in opposing this unjust war. We believe that we can best suppo efforts of peace by bringing the troops home now.

This is the first newsletter that you have received from our National Committee. 1. On April 11 Dr. Martin Luther King accepted a position as cochairman of our National Committee on the invitation of our Executive Committee. Although Dr. King has in recent days rece quite a bit of static from different segments of the American . President Union of American Hebrew Congregations tablishment with regards to his speech given at Riverside Church in New York City (sponsored by our National Committee), we feel that it is even more important that he accepted our invitation a National Co-Chairman. It is very clear that many persons in power in this country see Dr. King as an exceedingly "credible" person in the peace movement and have gone to great lengths to to contain him, impugn his motives, and in many other ways, mai him. We welcome Dr. King as a co-chairman and trust that the I for months will see our working relationship becoming a lot ale In the near future you will receive a pamphlet containing speed by Dr. King, Dr. Henry Steele Commager, Rabbi Abraham Heschel, and Dr. John C. Bennett, with a forward by Dr. Reinhold Niebuhn

Vietnam Summer.

You should know that our National Committee is cooperating with faculty and student groups across the country in "Vietnam Summe This is an attempt to awaken the American conscience at a grass roots level on the issue of Vietnam. This summer is strategic if effective pressure is going to be brought upon the present Administration to de-escalate the war, get into a negotiating situation, and eventually see the United States' military prese in Vietnam withdrawn. We will be working through various area and regional contact people that we have across the country and would ask that persons interested in more information on this project write either this office or: New Politics for Peace in Vietnam, P.O. Crisis of Conscience, written by Dr. Robert McAfee Brown, Dr. Michael Novak, and Rabbi Abraham Heschel. This book is to be slightly more than 120 pages in length and is being published by Protestant, Jewish, and Catholic publishing houses. If you know of summer conferences where the book might be utilized or even early fall conferences that might be suitable for use of this book, I would suggest that you would write for early orders to: Association Press, 291 Broadway, New York, New York. You should also know that this book will be available at bookstores across the country (particularly religious bookstores).

4. Study on Violation of International Law by U.S. Government.

Within six weeks we will have a five-month-old study completed on the way in which our country has violated international law at several different points in Vietnam. We intend to appeal to the Vatican, the World Council of Churches, and the International Red Cross to conduct a similar study with regard to any infractions of international law that the North Vietnamese might be guilty of. The study is an attempt to suggest that the United States has violated international law as a matter of policy, and we, as persons concerned with the whole question of constrainwill ask our government to desist.

5. Selective objection.

Dr. Robert McAfee Brown from our National Committee was in Denver a few weeks ago to serve as a witness for Lt. Henry Howe. The officer is a selective consciention objector to this war and Dr. Brown has made the trip to Denver to testify in his behalf at the request of the American Civil Liberties Union. The whole issue of selective objection is one in which we are deeply concerned and I trust that if there is any way in which we can help local groups raise this issue more effective with young men with whom they have contact who are exposed to the military service that you'll not hesitate to write this office for such guidance as we might be able to give.

6. Position paper.

You should know that the position paper developed at the Washington Mobilization has now left this office in more than 100,000 copies. Also, we know of at least nine major newspapers across the country where the article has been printed in full by local committees. We still have quantities of the position paper available if any of you have not yet ordered it and would need any copies.

7. "Negotiations Now!"

Our National Committee supports a move by several different groups to collect over a million signatures which, in effect, support U Thant's three-point peace proposal For more information regarding "Negotiations Now!" you should direct your inquiries to Rev. Rodney Shaw, The Methodist Building, 100 Maryland Avenue, N.E., Washington, D.C., or Mr. Donald Keys, SANZ, 17 East 45th Street, New York, New York.

8. Akron Beacon Journal article.

Enclosed you will find the Akron Beacon Journal article as well as an editorial from that paper which we send to you for whatever use you may have for it. We

think that this letter is similar to many letters received by parents of GI's who are presently fighting in Vietnam. You will note that this reprint is available from our office here in New York in quantities.

9. Literature distribution.

We lay very heavy emphasis on public education and for that reason we have become a major literature distribution point for peace groups throughout the country. In the last four and a half months, we have sent from this office a quarter of a milli pieces of literature of the Viet Nam war. In addition to that, since November of last year, we have sold 9,000 copies of Dorothy Dunbar Browley's book, Washington and Vietnam. We believe that this kind of public education needs to happen not only at a national level but on a local level where many of you reside as well.

10. Mailing list.

If by chance you are getting duplicate mailings please let us know. Also, if you know of persons whom you know might be interested in being placed on our mailing list let us know.

11. Coffin's letter of April 7.

If you've not vet taken time to respond to Bill Coffin's call for funds please think seriously about it before the summer.

12. Local action.

We believe that it is very important for both individuals and local groups of clergy and laymen to press their representatives in both Houses of Congress to subscribe to the following points:

- 1. They will not support a land invasion of North Viet Ham for whatever reasons the Administration might give.
- 2. They will not support any use of nuclear weapons.
- They will not support mining of Haiphong Harbor nor the bombing of Haiphong for any reason.
- 4. They will not force a confrontation with China, either by air or ground operations.
- 5. They will not support indiscriminate terror bombing of North Viet Nam if and when it should occur.

We believe that groups of elergy and laymen ought to write and visit their elected representatives to get them to agree to these points as a minimal contribution to preventing an even greater political, military, and human blunder.

CIESIELSKI appeared in a television interview, which took place on WTAR-TV, Norfolk, Va., and indicated that it was possible for individuals to declare themselves as conscientious objectors, thereby preventing themselves from being made combatants. CIESIELSKI said that both civilians and members of the military can be conscientious objectors. CIESIELSKI did not identify himself on the TV program as being connected with the military, and he was dressed in civilian clothes at the time.



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STOP THE DRAFT WEEK, OCTOBER 16 - 17, 1967

Special Agents of the FBI observed on October 16, 1967, from 4 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. a demonstration and rally at Independence Hall Park, 6th and Chestnut Streets, Philadelphia, Pa., sponsored by PADU and supported by the Philadelphia Area Vietnam Committee (Vietnam Summer), Clergy and Laymen Concerned About Vietnam, Women Strike for Peace (WSP), Philadelphia Mobilization Committee, and Veterans for Peace in Vietnam. Among those identified were members of the Communist Party (CP), the W. E. B. Du Bois Club of America (DCA), Philadelphia Young Socialist Alliance (PYSA), WSP, Peace Committee, Committee for Non-Violent Action (CNVA), Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), PADU, and others. Present were also a large number of unidentified "hippie types" for a total of about 300 people.

A loud-speaker was set up on a platform, and Gordon Fels of PADU was master of ceremonies. Speakers who generally condemned United States activities in Vietnam as immoral, illegal, unjust, and who were in support of those refusing to fight were as follows:

Rev. David Gracie, Episcopal Diocese of Philadelphia, who said he had previously counseled young men to avoid the draft, but to be careful not to violate the law, but now he feels that the tax laws and Selective Service laws or any laws that supported the war should not be obeyed. He said the United States has as its purpose the domination of Asia, and the United States would not be fighting if they were not fighting a colored people. He congratulated the young men who had the courage to refuse to cooperate.

Thompson Bradley, Professor, Swarthmore College, said that the poor, the uneducated, and the displaced are those who are sent to Vietnam. He said the real heroes are those who refuse to go, and "we" will go to jail with them. He said the draftees are forced to brutalize, burn, and destroy the culture of Vietnam.

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STOP THE DRAFT WEEK, OCTOBER 16 - 21, 1967

Ethel Taylor, Coordinator of Philadelphia WSP, stated that those who refused to go should be supported and that she would rather be a draft dodger than a murderer.

At this time Fred Moore spoke and identified himself as one who has previously served a prison term for refusing to obey the draft. He stated that he was interrupting the rally to report that one of the group, Jim Hart, had been arrested by the police for no reason and that Gregg Carlson had stood in front of the patrol wagon and was likewise arrested and taken away. Moore urged that those present stand together in the event of similar arrests and that they let no one else be taken away from the rally.

Bob Heisler, National Educational Director of DCA, spoke on the Ronald Lockman Case. Lockman is a Philadelphia soldier who was previously affiliated with the DCA who refused to fight in Vietnam. He said the DCA will support all soldiers like Lockman who refused to go to Vietnam. He said soldiers like Lockman speak for all of us.

Fred (Wilfred) Batchelder, Head of the Veterans and Reservists for Peace in Vietnam, said that he was in World War II, and he made his decision then and now these boys have made their decision and have refused to go. He admired them for their courage and pledged support to those who have guts enough to say "Hell no, I won't go."

Daniel Silverman, Organizer of The Resistance in Philadelphia, stated that "we" must resist the draft. We must reach those with money and influence. We must change the attitude of the people from apathy to action. He said he would refuse to carry Selective Service cards, refuse to cooperate with the draft, and would help others who would do likewise.

Those who said they were sending back their draft cards to Selective Service and who made a brief statement were as follows:

David Maxwell, white male, age 21, 2-F or 2-S, who said he could no longer cooperate with the system.

Bob Green, white male, who stated that war is morally wrong and that he could not cooperate with the draft. He said he rejects Selective Service and paying taxes.

William Schauman, 36-107-45-421, said he thought this (the rally) was really great.

Tony Avirgan said he had come to the conclusion that war is wrong and that he must actively do everything he can do to make sure there is no more killing.

Richard Sloat who said he was 1-Y.

Richard T. Williams, Negro male, said he was surprised and embarrassed by one thing - he did not see enough of his black brothers here. He said there a lot of his black brothers over there, and he wanted to see more here. He then asked for matches. He was joined by one Negro and one white youth (Frank Femla) and burned what appeared to be their draft cards before the audience.

Jerry D. Coffin, white male, stated that like my brothers just did today, I am going to destroy my card because I can't in any way cooperate with the Selective Service. He then read a prepared statement, a copy of which follows:

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UBLIC STATE ENT OF SELECTIVE STATE DIS-AFFILIATION

Delivered: October 16, 1967, Independence Hall Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

Today I am making public my total disaffiliation with the so-called Selective Service System. I wish to make it perfectly clear that I do not recognize the Selective Service System as having any moral or legal control over my person.

I will not now or ever allow myself to be conscripted, indoctrinated or trained to kill my brothers and sisters.

I will not now or ever allow myself to be directed, influenced or deferred by a system designed to brutalize the spirit of men by forcing them into servitude in agencies designed for mass murder.

I will not now or ever carry on my person or maintain in my possession any card or document that states I am registered with, or deferred by, any agency of conscription.

Further:

I counsel all of you to do as I am doing. Repudiate and refuse to cooperate with the so-called Selective Service System. And I will aid anyone who does so.

I willfully will cause or attempt to cause, any man now imprisoned in the Military forces of the United States, to refuse all duty, and to be disloyal to the system that is being disloyal to his spirit, and I will distribute literature to that effect.

I urge all military personnel to desert the agencies that are brutalizing you. I will aid, harbor, conceal and protect all deserters who come to me.

I urge all arsenal and armory workers to quit and no longer produce the machines and materials that main, burn and destroy humanity.

This total dis-affiliation with the immoral and unjust system of conscription and public breaking of related immoral and unjust laws is the result of my religious belief in the sanctity of the human spirit. I commot participate in any way, with any agency that brutalizes this sacred spirit. Nor can I help but urge all my brothers and sisters to resist those forces of totalitarianism that are evidenced in the Military Selective Service Wot of 1967 and all related loss.

I im a Quaker, my action today is in keeping with the historic topulationies of Quakers everywhere.

When the laws of God, as interpreted through my conceience, conflict with the laws of men, I have no choice but to follo: the laws of God.

Jerry Coffin then burned his Selective Service Registration card and two classification cards. Joining in the card burning were John Mark Blawn (phonetic) who burned a card, and Dave Sinex who burned his induction notice and yelled, "Burn baby burn" as the audience applauded.

Others who spoke briefly against the draft and the war were Bob Antipin; an unknown white male who said he was 1-A and would not go; Fred Moore who spent 17 months in Allenwood Frison for refusing induction; and Gordon Fels, master of ceremonies, who announced another rally at the Armed Forces Induction Center, 401 North Street, Philadelphia, Pa., on Thursday at 7 a.m., October 19, 1967.

Immediately following the rally, small anti-draft certificates were turned in to Ethel Taylor and Thompson Bradley together with about 21 draft cards. Bradley said the draft cards and the anti-draft certificates would be taken to the Department of Justice in Washington, D. C., on October 20, 1967. Erailey said the petition of non-cooperation bearing most of the names of those turning in their draft cards would be mailed to General H. M. Gross, Box 1921, Harrisburg, Fa., the same day. (As will be set forth later, the draft cards and the anti-draft certificates were also mailed to General Gross.)

After the rally, the turning in of their draft cards and certificates, and the mailing of same, a group of about 100 demonstrators went to the Philadelphia Police Department at 8th and Race Streets, Philadelphia, Pa., and demonstrated from about 5:50 to 6:55 p.m. protesting the arrest of the two demonstrators. At this time most of the demonstrators departed; however, according to news sources, several stayed around until about 10:15 p.m.

The above information was furnished to Assistant U. S. Attorney Robert St. Leger Goggin of the Eastern District of Penhsylvania, Fhiladelphia, Pa., who advised that he would consider prosecution against all who burned draft cards, as well as those who turned in their draft cards for referral to



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

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

THE RESISTARCE - OCT 16

On Obtober 16, thousands of young men all across the nation will cease to cooperate with the Selective Service System and the draft.

Our complicity will no loger legitimatize the draft and the monstrous war of genecide which our nation wages in Victnem. United, we will resist the war machinery which feeds on our silence, on our fear, on our division. Each one of us will begin to free himself. Our collective act of resistance will begin to free America and the people of the Victnem from the military oppression which now destroys our lives and meeks our common humanity.

Our resistance begins with a belief that young Americans should not be compelled to claughter other human beings in Vietnam. We have discovered that our rulers have lied to us about the nature of this unjust war and realize that the Selective Service System and the draft are necessary for the continuation for our nation's crimes against humanity. Many of us appose conscription itself because of its denial of personal freedom and all of us are aware of the unfairness of the system of conscription now in use. The military madness of our society is descriping both Vietnam and America and passes a growing threat to the existance of human life. We wish to act effectively, to publicly challenge the legitimary of the war and the draft, and eventually to deny the warmakers the young bodies they need for the war.

Many of us now have deferments -- we will renounce them. We realize that the student deferment, the conscientious objector status to a solect few, deferments for the clergy and divinity students, the I-Y classification, and the other favors dispensed by the Selective Service System, are the tools of the war-makers that are used to silence, manipulate and divide young men and prevent the growth of united apposition to conscription and the war. The student deferments are their best weapon. The campus, when young people have access to the truth, is the center of the most veral opposition to the wer. The warmakers know that many stidents would refuse induction and that massive resistance would crupt ix students were drafted. They wait until the student has left the empus, and if he has not yet been chandled into an approved occupation, then he is taken, singly, and if he refuses, jailed, alone, When it is easy for them. Then ther is no emmunity of young people to refrict. They systematically divide the realthy from the pier, the student from the worlier, the informed from the ignorant. All in the interest of the war machine, so that it will function silently, smoothly. Deforments are a tactic of the system, assurance that it will continue to enslave and kill, selectively, smoothly and silently.

We have prostituted ourselves to the monstrous desires of the war machine. Each of us carries a card, token of their payment for our follusion, symbol of our hope that we will centime to please our masters and receive their favors. Seeking only to escape the death machines with our cum hands, we have permitted ourselves to be propagandized, coerced, and divided.

Not long after Reginald left, I dragged out the wildest zoot suit in New York. This was 1943. The Boston draft board had written me at Ella's, and when they had no results there, had notified the New York draft comboard, and, in care of Sammy, I received Uncle Sam's Greetings.

In those days only three things in the world scared me: jail, a job; and the army. I had about ten days before I was to show up at the induction center. I went right to work. The army Intelligence soldiers, those black spies in civilian clothes, hung around in Harlem with their ears open for the white man downtown. I knew exactly where to start dropping the word. I started noising around that I was frontic to join -- the Japanese army.

When it seemed that I had the ears of the spies, I would talk and act high and crazy. A lot of Harlem hustlers actually had reached that state---as I would later. It was inevitable when one had gone long enough on heavire and heavier narcotics, and under steadily tightening vise of the hustling life. I'd snatch out and read my Greetings aloud, to make certain they heard who I was, and then I'd report downtown. (this was probably the only time my real name was heard in Harlez in those days).

The day I went down there, I costumed like an actor. With my wild zoot suit I wore the yellow knob-toe snoes, and I frizzeled my hair up into a reddish bush of conk.

I what in, skipping and tipping, and I thrust my tattered Greetings at the reception deak's white soldier-"Crazy-o, daddy-o, get me moving. I can't wait to get in that brown---", very likely that soldier hasn't recovered from me yet.

They had their wire on me from uptown, all right. But they still put me through the line. In that big starting room were forty or fifty other propective inductees. The room had fallen vacume quiet, with me running my mouth a mile a minute, talking nothing but slang. I was going to fight on all fronts: I was going to be a general, man, before I got done—such talk as that.

Most of them were white, of course. The tenderlooking ones appeared ready to run from me. Some others. had that vinegary "worst kind of nigger" look. And a few pare amused, seeing me as the "Harlem jigaboo" archetype.

Also amused were some of the rooms ten or twelve Negroes. But the stony-faced rest of them looked as if they were ready to sign up to go off killing somebody--- they would haved liked to start with me.

The line moved along pretty acon, stripped to my shorts, I was making my eager-to-join comments in the medical examination rooms--and everybody in the white coats that I saw had 4-7 in his eyes.







Six young men stood outside Two Arrested Independence Hall yesterday

aniernoon and burned what they said were their draft cards.



Two University students turned in their draft cards yesterday in front of several hundred people at an anti-Vietnam war demonstration at Independence Hall.

The students, Robert H. Green, Jr. and Richard Sloat, were among seven young persons who mailed back their cards to the state director of Selective Service.

Three persons burned their cards.

The protest was sponsored by the Philadelphia Anti-Draft Union. Among the speakers was Thompson Bradley, a professor at Swarthmore College.

Green, a 22 year-old senior in the College, had first planned to burn his card but later changed

his mind. He said he will go to jail if he is faced with the draft,

At the demonstration Green said, "I've reached the point where I believe the war is wrong."

By that I mean morally wrong."

Explaining why he turned in his card he said, "To do any thing less would be being an accomplice."

Green also said that he will not pay taxes to the Federal government to protest the war. He said that his future plans may include graduate school or working for the Friends (Quakers).

He also said he had privately furned his Selective Service registration card five months ago. What he had planned to burn yesterday, but actually sent back to the Selective Service, was his classification card.

Green, who is from Madison, Conn. is classified II-S.

Sloat, who comes from Westport, Conn., and is also a student in the College, is classified I-Y. (Indicate page, name of newspaper, city and state.)


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

The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case - a communist front which had been conducting the campaign in the United States - was reconstituted as the National Rosenberg - Sobell Committee at a conference in Chicago in October, 1953, and 'then the National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell in the Rosenberg Case' ..."

In September, 1954, the name "National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell" appeared on literature issued by the Committee. In March, 1955, the name "Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell" first appeared on literature issued by the Committee. In August, 1966, the name "Committee to Free Morton Sobell" first appeared on literature issued by the Committee.

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

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", issued December 1, 1961, by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Page 115, contains the following citation regarding the National Committee to Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NCAUAC):

"Cited as a 'new organization' set up in the Summer of 1960 to lead and direct the Communist Party's 'Operation Abolition' campaign. Seven of the national leaders of this group have been identified as communists.

"(Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 1278 on the Truth About the Pilm 'Operation Abolition', Part 1, October 3, 1961, page 5)"

A source has advised that the NCAUAC changed its name on March 3, 1967 to include the word "House" in its name, thereby becoming known as the National Committee to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee (NCAHUAC). A national meeting of this organization was held in Chicago, Illinois on April 27 and 28, 1963.

A second source advised on May 11, 1967, that as of that date the NCAHUAC continued to function with headquarters at 555 North Western Avenue, Los Angeles, California.

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

The Provisional Organizing Committee for a Marxist-Leninist Communist Party 'also known as the POC *** was formed in August 1958 by a number of Communist Party members who were dissatisfied with the trends and policies of the party and, while within it, had referred to themselves as the Harxist-Leninist Caucus."

"The leaders and participants in the Provisional Organizing Committee group had been expelled from the Communist Party on the technical charge of 'disruptive, factional, anti-party activities.'

The POC group is composed largely of extreme left-wing elements from the Communist Party. Throughout the party's history, there have been contending right and left-wing factions which, in period of turmoil such as the party has gone through in the recent past, have fought for control. The POC elements lost out in this recent struggle within the U. S. party ****.

The one fact that is completely clear today is that the POC group is made up of hard-core, dedicated, and extremist Communists who, despite their present differences with the Communist Party leadership, are intent upon doing all within their power to speed the achievement of the goals of international communism."

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STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us." At the June, 1965 SDS National Convention, an anti-communist proviso was removed from the SDS constitution. In the October 7, 1966 issue of "New Left Notes", the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of April 18, 1967 was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

The May, 1960, issue of the "Young Socialist" (YS), page 1, column 3, disclosed that during April 15-17, 1960, a national organization entitled "The Young Socialist Alliance" (YSA) was established at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This issue stated that this organization was formed by the nationwide supporter clubs of the publication YS.

The above issue, page 6, set forth the Founding Declaration of the YSA. This declaration stated that the YSA recognizes the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) as the only existing political leadership on class struggle principles, and that the supporters of the YS have come into basic political solidarity with the SWP on the principles of revolutionary socialism.



The headquarters of the YSA are located in Rooms 532-536, 41 Union Square West, New York City.

The January 13, 1968, edition of "The New York Times," page 4, carried an article entitled "Dr. King Calls For Antiwar Rally In Capital, February 5-6." The article stated that at a press conference, called by the captioned group on January 12, 1968, in New York City, Martin Luther King, Jr., had called for a large-scale antiwar rally to be held in Washington, D. C., on February 5-6, 1968. According to the article, the stamment was made during a news conference which also voiced support for Dr. Benjamin Spock and the four co-defendants who were recently indicted by a Federal Grand Jury for counseling evasion of the draft. With regard to the demonstration, King stated that while other protesters / would not be turned away, the demonstration would be primarily for church affiliated groups. He said details of what form the demonstration would take have not been worked out. King was quoted as stating, "We have no plans to try to close the Pentagon or any other Federal building -- we have no illusions about that."

Reference is made to Columbia memoranda entitled " 'WALK OF LIFE,' SPONSORED BY THE SOUTH CAROLINA CHERGY AND LAITY CONCERNED, GREENVILLE, SERVE CAROLINA, TO CO ACTUALA, SOUTH CARGLINA, APRIL 15, 1972 TO APRIL 22, 1972", and dated April 13, 1972 and April 24, 1972, which contain additional information concerning captioned organization.

The presence in South Carolina of activities sponsored by captioned organization was first noted on October 10, 1970, when an article entitled "Charleston Eishop Assigns Kaney to Inner City Work in Greenville," which appeared in the October 10, 1970 issue of the Greenville Piedmont, announced that Rev. Michael E. Kaney, a priest who had served since 1965 at Our Lady of the Rosary Catholic Church in Greenville, South Carolina, had on that date been assigned to Inner City Work in Creenville by the Most Rev. Ernest L. Unterkoefler, Bishop of Charleston. In this article, Kaney was quoted as saying, "This assignment, which will be based here in Greenville, is merely an official recognition and expansion of the work I have been doing for the past two years".

"I shall be involved in three areas of main concern. These are peace organizing and draft counsaling; race relations, and the 'hip' community.

"Since I am hired as a field worker for Clergy and Laymen Concerned About Vietnam (CALCAV), most of my time will, quite naturally, be spent in the first objective".

The article reported that Kaney, born February 18, 1936 in Bath, South Carolina, received his Associate of Arts Degree at St. Bernard's College in Cullman, Alabama, and his Bachelor of Arts Degree at St. Mary's University, Baltimore, Maryland. He completed his four-year theological course at St. Mary's.

The article set out the following information regarding Kaney and his activities prior to this time:

"Ordained in 1960 at St. John's Cathedral, Charleston, the priest was stationed at St. Andrew's Church, Myrtle Beach, Blessed Sacrament, Nativity Parish and Divine Redeemer in Charleston and St. Anthony Church in Florence before coming to our Lady of the Rosary in 1965.

"He was Catholic hospital chaplain for Creenville for a five-month period in 1968; served as Furman Newman chaplain in 1969, and became Selective Service draft information counselor in September 1969.

"He has published several reports and newspaper-magazine articles on the Office of Economic Opportunity (OFO) about its poverty works and projects. He is currently completing work on a book about 'Revelation,' the last book of the New Testament. He published and edited a teenage monthly newspaper, 'The Crusader,' with a circulation of 1,300 from May, 1960 to May, 1964.

"He has been social action committee chairman for the Priests Association of Diocese of Charleston; chairman of the Greenville Chapter of Fellowship of Reconciliation and Americans for Democratic Action; a board member of the South Carolina State Advisory Committee to the United States Commission on Civil Rights (USCCR); and is secretary of the South Carolina State Advisory Committee to USCCR."

CALCAV has publicly described itself as an inter-religious and anti-war group. In 1971, it publicly claimed to have been in existence for five years with offices in New York City, New York.

Fellowship of Reconciliation (FOR) is a pacifist organiation which was established in England in 1914 by a small group of Christians who, during World War I, decided they would not participate in the mass killing of the war. A year later, at Garden City, Long Island, New York, the Fellowship was organized in the United States by 68 men and women and since then, similar fellowships have been created in a score of countries and cooperate with one another through the agency of the International FOR. The organization has always been vigorous in its opposition to war and is committed to the achieving of a peaceful world community. National headquarters of this organization in the United States are located in Nyack, New York.

The following article written by Kaney appeared in the Clemson Tiger, a newspaper published by students of Clemson University, Clemson, South Carolina, January 22, 1971:

"We may not forget them." CONFIDENTIAL

My old Webster's defines patriotism as love of country; devotion to the welfare of one's country; the zealous support of a country's authority and interest.

Tolstoy. I think, came the closest to defining patriotism when he wrote: Patriotism is unreasonable, not only because it runs counter to the first principles of Christ's teachings against egoism, but also because Humanity gains, by its own methods, everything for which patriotism seeks thus making patriotism superfluous, unnecessary and a hindrance, like a lamp by daylight.

A government is good because or when it is established to form a more perfect union, to establish justice, to insure domestic tranquility, to provide for the common defense, to promote the general welfare, and to secure the blessings of liberty for everyone. And it is only good as long as it continues to maintain these goals. It was the goals that brought about the Constitution of our government.

As I look out and see this country, I discover that these governmental goals seemingly are only for the middle class and upper middle class of Americana. The red man, the black man, the yellow man, the brown man, and the poor white man are not given the same benefits

But to get back to Webster's definition. It states that love of country is the thing; how unfortunate that love of the citizens for their fellow citizens is not the definition. So often in any country, the love of that country is placed far above the love of the countrymen, which seems an inversion of priorities.

Devotion to the welfare of one's country is equally an unsatisfactory conclusion — even though it is one that people think right and just Devotion to land and its protection seems to be only a

thin disguise for materialism. It is unfortunate that the dictionary and the people at large would consider patriotism as the devotion to the welfare of citizens. But then, of course, the dictionary can only give the definitions of ideas as the people have them. And in the case of patriotism, I am afraid it is all too correct.

Well, just consider the final part of the definition: zealous support of a country's authority and interest. Frightening, but true! And it seems that this is the very type of patriotism rampant today... the same kind that was true in Hitler's Germany as the people changed something like, "My country, right or wrong." It makes the country god!

I would think that one's first allegiance is not to a flag, not to a country, not to a political system, but to Humanity. If I covet flag, country and political system as my god of the first order, then I become like the Roman imperial Ceasars: my grain of incense is offered in one arena or the other.

Patriotism is an evil in the sense that it divides people into certain categories. It immediately shows how peoples of the world are different; are to be separated. Walls are built up around patriotism; never torn down in its name.

Now consider what Tolstoy wrote about patriotism. He sees Christ's injunction of dying to one's self for the benefit of another, his many requests that his followers cleave to nothing that is temporal as a counter to patriotism. It would indeed seem that publicly, approved egoism should be just as evil as private, individual pride!

He also insists that patriotism is superfluous in the light of Humanity. I

would not go so far, since we have seen how slow, how frightened Humans and Humanity can be. I think it needs yet another arm to assist it.

So we may be patriotic. But we may glory in our country only when there is one brotherhood. One brotherhood in the love of Humanity. A brotherhood that will transcend human, man-made, arbitrary boundaries of flag or country.

Until we accept the colors of the world, the cultures of man and the economics of understanding, we may not be proud of our country. We may not forget them to protect a legacy that forgets them. We may not forget them to protect our own goods. We may not forget them in the interest of a world image. We, in short, may not forget them.

advised on June 24, 1971, that Kaney had distributed a newsletter concerning his recent activities to approximately 150 individuals and organizations throughout South Carolina/and several other states.

He related in this newsletter that, in June 1971, John Cupples of the Boston Regional Office of CALCAV came to Greenville and met with eighteen (18) South Carolinians (8 from Greenville, 2 from Clemson, 4 from Spartanburg, and 4 from Columbia) to discuss the possibility of setting up a state coordinating office and clearinghouse, and southern mood and tactics.

Kaney reported that since early April 1971, he had been busily engaged in counseling conscientious objectors, speaking to high school and college groups concerning peace and his opposition to the military draft and Vietnam War, participating in the formation of American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) chapters in Greenville and Spartanburg and his participation in anti-war, anti-draft demonstrations and teach-ins at Furman University at Greenville, and Wofford College at Spartanburg. He pointed out that he had also spoken to various groups about his participation in anti-war demonstrations in Washington, D. C., during April 24, 1971 through May 1, 1971. He praised the demonstrations and indicated he had been arrested during these demonstrations.

An article in the October 8, 1971 issue of The Tiger reported that Kaney, "a member of the field staff of Clergy and Laymen Concerned" (CALC) participated in a debate concerning the role of the military held October 6, 1971, on the campus of Clemson University. The article noted that, in his opening remarks, Kaney gave his views on the "atrocities" carried out by the lentagon and the Armed Forces. He also gave examples of "the inflated price of our military forces". Kaney claimed that taxes should not be paid to further our military goals and gave a list of figures draling with the "senseless murdering of civilians" through such means as search and destroy missions, and the bombing of the "supposed" Viet Cong. Racism and the role of the Vietnamese people themselves were also discussed.

Concerning the Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) on college campuses, Kaney said ROTC was used for blackmail purposes by the military with penalty of loss of federal funds with a drop in the program. He ended his remarks with the expressed desire that a civilian defense with the use of non-aggressive means to be used for world peace methods being employed to keep each nation in check.

According to an article in the October 12, 1971 issue of the Greenville Piedmont, a newspaper published daily at Greenville, South Carolina, Kaney, local representative of CALC, announced that, on October 13, 1971, a Moratorium Day teach-in would be held at the Birnie Street Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA) in Greenville. He noted that "October 13th is Moratorium Day, when people have taken part in various anti-war demonstrations in past years" and said "Repression at Home and Abroad" would be the theme of the teach-in. He said several groups of blacks and whites would be included and stated that "in Greenville, we hope to show a solidarity in opposition both to the war against yellow people in Asia and repression of black people in this country".

The article further reported that, at 4:30 p.m., on October 13, 1971, protestors would march in front of the Federal Building in Greenville "to renew the public's awareness that 300 people a day are still dying in the war". Kaney was quoted as saying American bombing raids in the war zone "are like a My Lai massacre every day. Murders of civilians can't be ignored just because the killing is done from planes".

advised that Kaney, identifying himself as a representative of CALCAV, obtained a permit from the office of the Mayor in Greenville for 25 people to hold a demonstration in front of the Federal Building at Greenville from 4:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., on October 13, 1971. Karey gave his address as 10 Manly Street, Greenville, South Carolina, and his telephone number as 235-6171.

On October 13, 1971, Special Agents of the FBI observed Kaney and approximately 22 other individuals (18 young people and three adults) as they assembled in front of the Federal Building between 4:28 p.m., and 4:45 p.m. From 4:45 p.m. until 5:30 p.m., they conducted a walking protest march in front of the Federal Building, carrying posters calling for an end of the Vietnam War and complaining about the deaths in Vietnam.




The WRL is an organization whose activities include assistance in the counseling of active duty servicement owards anti-war activity through establishments known as "coffee houses".

CALC, Box 10342, Creenville, South Carolina, had distributed a six-page brochure on the Clemson University campus announcing that people from South Carolina and Kentucky would travel to Washington, D. C., on October 21, 1971, for a workshop of non-violent civil disobedience. The brochure was entitled "Daily Leath Toll (The DPT Program in Washington)" and noted that, on October 22, 1971, each person would visit and explain their action to their Congressmen. Then, during the afternoon of the same date, they planned to be arrested in front of the White House. The brochure urged "no bail, no bond" and noted that a plea of no contest would yield two days in jail.

Included in the brochure was a one-size questionnaire to determine the recipient's willingness to participate in the various phases of the DDT program, including the recipient's willingness to be arrested. The recipients were asked to return the executed questionnaire to CALC, Box 10342, Greenville, South Carolina (803-235-6171).

On November 22, 1971, advised Kaney, Field Representative for CALCAV, had provided leaflets concerning anti-war demonstrations to be held in Washington, D. C., during November 8-24, 1971. These leaflets were posted on the Furman University campus and encouraged students to join Kaney in his trip to Washington, D. C., and demonstrate against the "killing in Vietnam."

An article in the January 13, 1972 issue of the Greenville Piedmont report d that Kaney had been appointed by Bishop Ernest L. Unterkoefler to officially represent the Catholic diocese of Charleston at an inter-faith conference being held January 13-16, 1972 in Kansas City, Missouri. The conference was "called by 132 Jewish, Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodex and Protestant religious leaders" to "discuss the moral issues of the Indochina war". The article noted that Kaney, who "has been active throughout South Carolina as executive director of the state chapter of Clergy and Laymen Concerned" had recently been appointed staif directory of the Oreenville Chapter of CALC and would also represent that organization at this conference.

On March 7, 1972 advised that Kaney received a supply of leaflets entitled, "Resist!! April 15th," which contained anti-draft, anti-war, taxes and anti-killing and bombing in Southeast Asia statements, and announced that April 15, 1972 had been chosen as the day for people in the Southeastern part of the United States (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, and South Carolina) "to take back control of their lives" from pre-war forces and inviting others to join them.

CALC marchers plan to assemble and depart from a point in downtown Greenville on Saturday, April 15, 1972, and march to Columbia, South Carolina. Source said there are approximately twelve "hard core" members who plan to walk the entire distance, but noted there are others who have jobs to hold down and will participate in brief segments of the march. He said Jim Turner, Reporter for the Greenville Piedmont, and the husband of Mrs. Leslie Turner, planned to birticipate in the march on Saturday and Sunday, April 15 and 16, 1972.


Source said the group plans to march 15 or 20 miles each day and will spend the night at churches or other public places along the route.

On March 23, 1972, advised that Kaney planned to participate in this march and had made arrangements for the marchers to spend one night during the march in the church of Charles Dawkins at Little Mountain, South Carolina.

On March 29, 1972, advised that leaflets entitled, Walk for Life" were distributed at the Furman gathering. These leaflets were printed and distributed by "South Carolina Clergy & Laity Concerned, Box 10342, Greenville, 29603... 803-235-6171," and extended an invitation to recipients to join CALC members on April 15, the customary day for the payment of income taxes, in asking the United States Government to cease spending two thirds of its tax money on war, war materials and on war planning and to give its citizens a new list of life-giving priorities by spending tax monies for the desperately needed goods in this country.

On April 15, 1972, a Special Agent of the FBI observed approximately 30 CALC members as they departed from the front of the Federal Building at Greenville and began their "Walk for Life" which was scheduled to be concluded on April 22, 1972, in Columbia, South Carolina.

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




An article in the April 22, 1972 issue of The State, a newspaper published daily at Columbia, South Carolina, reported that five members of the CALC group completed the 100-mile march, and upon arriving in Columbia on April 22, 1972, joined other anti-war activists for a rally on the grounds of the State Capitol.

On March 18, 1972, a Special Agent of the FBI observed Kaney, Jim Turner, and a third unknown white male, traveling in a dark blue (top) and white (bottom half) Ford Falcon "Econoline" van bearing 1972 South Carolina license BBD-170. The windows and sides of this vehicle were covered with various types of anti-war and "peace" leaflets.

On April 14, 1972, Motor Vehicle Division, South Carolina Highway Department, Columbia, South Carolina, advised that 1972 South Carolina license BBD 170 was issued to Catholic Diocese of Charleston, Post Office Box 10342, Greenville, South Carolina, for use on a 1965 Ford van.












An article in the April 28, 1972, issue of the Creenville Piedmont reported that William O. Trotter, from the Charlotte, North Carolina, Office of the Honeywell Corporation, met with four members of Greenville's CALC April 26, 1972, to discuss his company's role in the Vietnam War. The article noted that the local group planned to stage a "peace vigil" outside the Greenville Office of Honeywell during the afternoon of that date "and every succeeding Wednesday".

CALC members who met with Trotter included Dr. Albert Blackwell, Religion Professor at Furman University; Mrs. Leslie Turner, a local music teacher; Art Kramer, a retired chemist, and George L. Johnson, a communications specialist. They requested a meeting with the Honeywell spokesman because the firm manufactures anti-personnel bombs which the group said are being used "indiscriminately" by the United States in the Indo-China War.

On May 11, 1972, Honeywell Electronic Data Processing, 820 East Washington Street, advised that a group of six to ten CALC members have picketed this office on April 26, 1972, May 3, 1972, and May 10, 1972. He said the group carries signs and distributes leaflets expressing opposition to the firm's manufacturing of war materials. He said officials of his firm had informed the CALC members that

it no longer makes weapons but pointed out to them that the firm would do so again if requested to do so by the United States Government. He said the group had indicated that they would continue to picket the office on Wednesday of each week until Honeywell publicly declares that it will stop the production of anti-personnel bombs.


On May 3, 1972, Cambridge description and leaflets had been distributed on the Furman University campus announcing that CALC members would hold a "demonstration and leafletting" in front of the Honeywell Corporation from 4:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m., on May 3, 1972. The leaflet further indicated that this group would hold a "petition circulation, leafletting, and guerrilla theater" in downtown Greenville from 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m., on May 4, 1972. These activities were to be coordinated from the front of the Federal Building, and were to be followed by a picnic supper at 6:00 p.m., in McPherson Park in downtown Greenville.

On May 4, 1972,
Federal Building, Greenville, South Carolina, advised that,
at approximately 4:30 p.m., on this date, 13 members of
CALC, including Kaney and Jim Turner, arrived in front of the
Federal Building. Turner was driving a 1970 green and white
(top) Volkswagen bus, bearing 1972 South Carolina license
AYK-180, which had the words "Honeywell Kills" written in
the dirt that covered the sides of the vehicle. Turner was
observed removing a number of anti-war placards from his
vehicle and distributing them to the CALC members. The
individuals then paraded around the Federal Building until
5:20 p.m., displaying their placards and handing out leaflets,
which included membership applications for "Greenville CALC,
26 Waccamah Circle, Greenville, South Carolina".

flutes during the protest march and stated that Kaney attempted to march through the Federal Building parking lot with the signs. When told him that they could not demonstrate on Federal property, Kaney ignored him and attempted to continue his march on Federal property, carrying the anti-war



posters. However, when warned him a second time, Karey instructed the demonstrators to lay down their signs when passing through the parking lot and pick them up again when they reached the public street.

An article in the May 11, 1972 issue of the Creenville Piedmont reported that six Greenville members of CALC, headed by Kaney, were among the demonstrators at the Coalition of Peace in Washington, D. C., on May 11, 1972. Ine article noted that the six attended a sunrise service on that date and were among the group that appeared on the steps of the capitol building protesting the escalation of the Vietnam War. It was noted that Mrs. Leslie Turner, Chairman of the local CALC chapter, did not attend the Washington, D. C., affair.

The article further reported that the group expected to return home on May 13, 1972, and dig a "Romb Crater" in front of a Greenville church. It was noted that corvices would be held in the crater adjacent to the Evangulistic Temple Church, 200 Hudson Street.

May 20, 1972

Jewish Defense League

The Jewish Defense League is a militant organization which has a history of harassing Soviet diplomats and establishments in protest of the alleged mistreatment of Jews in the Soviet Union. A rally is scheduled for Lafayette Park from 7:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. to protest the treatment of Jews in the Soviet Union and to remind the President prior to his trip to the Soviet Union of this treatment. Approximately 200 persons are expected to attend the rally.

Cuban Independence Day

A rally to celebrate Cuban Independence Day sponsored by several Cuban exile organizations is scheduled between noon and 6:00 p.m. Demonstrators will assemble at the Ellipse at noon, march via Constitution Avenue to the Capitol and then return to the Pan American Union building at 17th and Constitution Avenue by way of the Ellipse. Approximately 4,000 persons are estimated to take part in this rally.

March for Victory Rally

The U.S. March for Victory Committee, a group headed by Dr. Carl McIntire, is sponsoring a rally and march to call for victory in Vietnam. Participants will assemble at 11:00 a.m.

The Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ) and the National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC) and other supporting groups are sponsoring a demonstration to protest the "escalation" of the war in Vietnam. Demonstrators are scheduled to assemble at the Ellipse at 11:00 a.m. and march to the Capitol for a rally at 1:00 p.m. The route of the march will be via Constitution Avenue. It is anticipated that this rally will last until 5:00 or 6:00 p.m. We have no firm figures for attendance. Sponsors have indicated they would be happy if "tens of thousands" attend. A survey of public transportation indicates that these facilities may bring as many as 10,000 persons from out-of-state to the demonstration.

Sylvan Theater Memorial Service

The Clergy and Laymen Concerned About Vietnam and the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) are seeking a permit for the use of Sylvan Theater from 8:00 p.m. 5/21-4:00a.m. 5/22 for a memorial service to protest the war. Following the service a candlelight march is planned from the Lincoln Memorial across Memorial Bridge to Arlington Cemetary. We anticipate participants in this service taking part in demonstrations at the Pentagon early Monday morning, 5/22/72.

For the information of the Bureau and New York, the 5/11/72 issue of the Memphis "Commercial Appeal", a daily newspaper published in Memphis, Tennessee, contained an article on page 41 entitled "State Strange, Props Familiar" by THOMAS BEVIER. According to this article, the ITT Corporation's Annual Meeting of Stockholders was held in Memphis, Tennessee, on 5/10/72. A demonstration by approximately 50 anti-war demonstrators was held in the vicinity of the Sheraton-Peabody Hotel during the course of the stockholders meeting. The demonstrators carried signs charging ITT with contributing to the war in Vietnam. A Franciscan Priest, Rev. DALE OLINE, representing the Clergy and Laymen Concerned, presented two proposals at the stockholders meeting to curtail ITT manufacture of items used in warfare. These proposals were soundly defeated. Rev. OLINE appeared before the demonstrators.


