The Department of Justice today announced that 14,738 alien enemies have been apprehended by Special Agents of the FBI since Pearl Harbor.

J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, said that many of those arrested were vigorous advocates of Axis ideologies and were extremely dangerous to the nation as potential spice and saboteurs.

"Some who have been taken into custody frankly admitted they would welcome an opportunity to fight against the United States," Director Hoover said. "It was necessary that the FBI know the identity of such persons so that the proper steps could be taken to prevent them from committing acts detrimental to the security of the United States."

Among those apprehended were 5,977 Germans, 5,303 Japanese, 3,503 Italians, 11 Rumanians, 11 Hungarians and one Bulgarian. In the group were 1,210 Italian scamen and 175 German seamen.

In all instances, aliens are taken before Hearing Boards
following arrest and a recommendation is made to the Attorney General
interpretable United States in each case. He determines whether the enemy
is alien is interned, paroled or released.

Long before war engulfed the United States with stunning suddenness on December 7, 1941, the FBI began investigating

persons suspected of pro-Axis sympathies, and, when the conflict actually began, the 2,599 Special Agents were able to take into custody immediately hundreds of the most dangerous persons in the United States. By nightfall of December 8, 1941, a total of 1,771 enemy aliens had been arrested, and the FBI's work in this field of internal security has continued without a letup in vigilance.

A German alien in an eastern city admitted under questioning by the FBI that he wanted to see Germany win the war and that he would have no hesitancy in fighting against the United States. This alien, who first came to America in 1930 and who went back to Germany (for several months in 1938-39, also admitted being an enthusiastic former member of the German-American Bund and was a Bund Storm Trooper. He demanded that he be allowed to return to Germany via the first ship leaving for a neutral port, but was interned by order of the Attorney General as a dangerous individual.

A young German alien registered for Selective Service in New York told Special Agents of the FBI that he would surrender to the enemy at the first opportunity if he were called into military service. He further admitted that he had worked in a German Labor Camp during a trip to the fatherland in 1938 and was rejected for service in the Corman Army because of an old eye injury.

Pictures of ships in the Panama Canal and of the lock installations there were found when the alien's premises were searched, and he admitted taking them. The camera with which the photographs were made also was found, although all aliens were ordered sometime before to turn in cameras and other specified articles, such as weapons, explosives, maps and charts.

Decause this alien was considered potentially dangerous to the internal security of the United States, he was ordered interned by the Attorney General.

In the spring of 1941 a German alien who came to the United States in 1930 was inducted into the Army in Connecticut and after serving several months was discharged. The FUI, which had received previous information on him, resumed its investigation, and, although he had taken his oath upon entering the Army and had filed first citizenship papers, evidence was developed to substantiate reports that he was pro-German. It was found that he had been a Storm Trooper in Germany and that, if he were recalled into the Army, he would ask for non-combatant duty to avoid fighting against his fatherland.

This alien was picked up by the FBI while the pall of smake still hung over Fearl Harbor and was ordered interned.

"American boys are afraid to fight and have to be dragged into the Army." Statements like this and others is outright support of the Axis cause were reported made by an alien couple in the midwest. Investigation by the FBI disclosed they were ardent supporters of Hitler and his policies in Germany, and, inasmuch as both were considered dangerous individuals, they were interned.

In October, 1940, the FBI began an investigation of a Japanese alien who lived at Seattle, Eachington, after he was seen photographing certain installations on the Willamette River in Oregon.

Decause he was known to be connected with Japanese propaganda activities and was considered a potential danger to the United States, he was apprehended by the FBI on December 7, 1941, and was interned.

Later he was repairiated to Japan under an exchange arrangement.

Another west coast Japanese who had been in the United States more than 35 years was known by the FBI to have been quite active in subtle propaganda activities. He was influential among Japanese, being one of the most important in his section of California. Because he was considered a danger to America's security, he was apprehended by the FBI on December 8, 1941, and was interned. He had been under investigation for nine months prior to Fearl Harbor.

A former customs inspector in Japan came to the United States about 40 years ago. He was in business on the west coast, but was active in pro-Japanese activities and for a time was president of a group which worked in class cooperation with the Japanese Consulate at San Francisco in handling problems of Japanese in America. He was arrested on December 8, 1941, and was interned.

A San Francisco Japanese alien came to the United States in 1905 and later became a leader in efforts to keep Japanese in the United States true to the old country. He upheld Japanese aggression and vehemently criticised the "revengeful attitude" of America. He at one time was honored for his outstanding service to Japan. This individual's background was known to the FBI, and he was apprehended on December 7, 1941, and later was interned.

In addition to 923 apprehensions, as indicated in the above schedule, the Bureau has been advised that Presidential warrents have been requested of the Attorney General in 59 other cases. These recommendations are still pending in the Department.

In connection with the foregoing tabulation, I desire to point out that the 923 apprehensions constitute approximately 15.4% of the total of 5.964 German alien apprehensions which have been effected to date in the United States. This percentage indicates that approximately one out of every six Germans apprehended has nurchased or made application to nurchase Rucckwanderer Marks. In the majority of these cases, investigation was initiated upon determining that the individual had invested or intended to invest in Rucckwanderer Marks. It is to be further noted that the 426 Rucckwanderer Mark purchasers who have been interned upon order of the Attorney General represent approximately 22.4% of the total of 1,901 German aliens who have been interned as of September 30, 1043.

As of the above date, 30 of the 119 persons whose citizenship has been revoked under the Denaturalization Program were persons who purchased or made application to purchase Rueckwenderer Marks. This number indicates that slightly over one out of every four persons who has been denaturalized invested in Rueckwenderer Marks with the intention of returning to Germany. The above number constitutes approximately 25.2% of the total number of persons who have been denaturalized.

I also desire to point out that approximately 433 Rueckwanderer purchasers were found at the time of inventigation to be employed in plants engaged in the manufacture of essential war materials. The reports covering the results of these inventigations have been furnished to the offices of the Military Intelligence Service and Raval Intelligence, and information has been received from these agencies that on the basis of the Eureau's reports and

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submequent investigation by either G-2 or ONI approximately 46 of this number have been ordered discharged from their employment by either the Secretary of Var or Navy. Many of the other employees have either been transferred to other departments in unrestricted areas within the plant or are under close observation by plant officials or trusted employees.

The Department of Justice today announced that Special Agents of the FBI have apprehended 923 alien enemies as the result of investigations originating from a check on purchasers of Rueck-wanderer Warks.

J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, said some of the most dangerous Germans in the United States
first came to the attention of the FBI because their names appeared
on the list of Rucokwanderer Lark buyers.

Of those apprehended, 426 were interned, 300 were paroled, 72 were released, and final disposition is awaited in 125 cases. In all instances, those arrested are carried before Alien Enemy Hearing Boards which make a recommendation on disposition to the Attorney General of the United States, who gives the final decision.

Among the eight German saboteurs who came to the United
States by submarine in June, 1942, were two who had bought Rueckwanderer
Varks while they were in the United States previously, and several
convicted spies also had invested American dollars in this type of

An Cerman bank oredit.

Furchasers included many naturalized Americans, some of whom have since had their oitizenship revoked through proceedings instituted as the result of FBI investigations. In numerous instances, information on such purchases, coupled with other

evidence of pro-Cerman sentiment, has been made known to military authorities who have caused the individuals involved to be removed from strategic positions in war industry for fear they would cause damage or be responsible for confidential information reaching the enemy.

A German who had worked as a watter in various cities from San Francisco to New York was on the Rusekwanderer list. Although he came to the United States in 1926, he admitted he plans to return to Germany; said that he had bought \$610 in Rusekwanderer larks but no defense bonds. This clien also expressed the belief that might makes right and said he would not fight for the United States against any Axis power. A New York barber invested (3,000. Then interviewed he admitted that he wanted Germany to win the war, although he had lived here since 1983. German propagands was found in his home, and he, too, was interned.

In the Midwest, a naturalized citizen was outspokenly pro-Mari. He protect Hitler and condemned America and said he was proud to be the first Nazi in the factory where he worked. This man, who invested 5,000 in the Rueckwanderer Marks, was discharged from the war plant where he worked, and later denaturalization proceedings were filed. If his citizenship is revoked, he will be subject to apprehension as an alien enony.

Persons who bought Rucekwanderer Karks actually purchased credit at a designated German bank at the preferential rate of 4.10 reichmarks per dollar. The prevailing rate of exchange for regular transactions was 2.48 reichmarks per dollar. Purchasers had to present certificates of unobjectionableness from German Consular sources, and to obtain full value of the credit the holder was required to return to Germany. Otherwise, the agreement provided, he must accept in settlement whatever was offered by German authorities.

Sale of the Rueckwanderer Karks began in the United States in May, 1936, and ceased in June, 1941, when such foreign remittances were frazen by Presidential Proclamation. Information obtained by the FBI indicates that the entire Rueckwanderer setup was under the control of the German Ministry of Economics, which sought badly needed foreign exchange.

#### MEMORITUME FOR MR. TOLSON

Bill lylander of Press Censorship, with whom we have had considerable dealings and who has always been very favorable and helpful in connection with any matters we wanted cleared, called to see he this horning.

He states they were revising the censorship code and he wanted to informally and off the record discuss certain phases of the contemplated revisions with us and to get a little guidance. The following are the proposed revisions of the code:

1) At the present time the War Department alone is appropriate authority for the release of information pertaining to escaped prisoners of war and escaped internees. It is proposed to revise the code to have the Department of Department of the its appropriate authority. Record to

2) At the present time the name of alien enemies may not be mentioned except when the Department of Nustice series. Hylander said the Department of Justice made representation to Censorship authorithes that this provise should be the code as a security measure, that when alien end ies are apprehended it would be to the interest of our governmentant to let the enemies know on their apprehension. He wondered in this was really a security proposition. I told num off the record and informally that the FBI had never made any uch representations, that there was no more security involved in the Arrest of the average enemy alien than in the arrest of a Georgia colored man for stealing five pounds of colm meal to feed his largily; whereupon, Hylander stated that in the new revisions they would state that the authority would be the Department of Justice but would carry an over-all clause giving Censorship the authority to release information on an enemy alien when the problem of security was not involved. He stated that when the new code went into effect the procedure would be to call us, ask if it would help security not to mention the mane of the enemy alien; if we said no, they would then call the Department and state that the press had the information and ask the Department if there was a security problem. Then the Department would bring up the argument which Gillond always used (that the name of the enemy alien should not be published so as not to embarrass his lamily) Censorship would take the position that the sole excuse for

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censorship was protect security and since so with was not involved they would authorize the release of such information. I told Mylander that after all, the Bureau was a part of the Department, that we could not be put in the position of violating any Departmental instructions. He stated this would not happen, that censorship was a security measure, and that the TBI was the test organization to discuss security and answer problems on security, and under the law, when questions were posed, we had no other encice but to answer them.

In this connection, Hylander stated he heard Walter Winchell last night and was glad to have him blow the lid off as he did. I told him I heard Winchell but did not know what calle he was talking about nor where he got the facts.

- 3) There is a general provision covering sabotage. Under this there is a provision which prohibits the publishing of production figures except upon authority of the Army. They are going to relax the production clause to permit the publication of general figures. I told hylander this, of course, was a matter for the Army, Navy and WPB to pass upon.
- 4) Another item under the sabotage clause prohibits publishing specifications, bottlenecks in industry, et . They are going to strengthen this particular clause, making the Army and military authorities as proper authority.
- 5) Another clause prohibits mentioning of "sabotage" except upon appropriate authority. This clause will be strengthened.
- 6) In connection with the production clause, there is a proviso that raw materials cannot be mentioned. He stated they desire to relax this somewhat and asked if we had any views on it. I told him this, again, was a problem for the military authorities but that generally speaking, from the espionage standpoint, there had not been as much interest in raw materials as in production figures.
- 7) A new clause in the new code will promibit any reference to new and secret military weapons, location of plants producting these weapons, etc. This is aimed primarily at manufacturers who like to state their plant is making secret war weapons. This, of course, has no general bearing upon the Eureau.

In addition, Mr. Mylander asked if we had any special observations, problems, or knowledge of any loopholes in the current code which we would like to have strengthened, that if we did, to let him know. I told him I would call him and advise one way or the other, no later than tomorrow.

In a mection with espionage general, he told me that Censorship knew espionage was being handled in an excellent manner and he wondered, just for his own information, whether much information was getting out of the country. I told him the best answer to that was what has actually happened, such as how the African invasion took the Germans completely by surprise, and how we had put many new military weapons in the field which had taken them by surprise. He then asked if there were any short wave stations operated by German agents left. I told him there were none, that we had the communications problem pretty well sawed up. He then said General Strong told Byron Price a few days ago that everything was an good shape, however, there was one short wave station in operation being operated by German agents. I told hylander strictly off the record and in confidence that the FBI was still operating a short wave station. He stated he thought probably General Strong was referring to this one station.

If there are any additional observations, I will be glad to communicate them to Hylander.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Attorney General Francis Biddle announced today that since Pearl Harbor it has been necessary for the Federal Bureau of Investigation to take into custody only 14,738 aliens of enemy nationality as persons potentially dangerous to the security of the United States.

Of this number 3,771 are now interned, 4,113 have been paroled and 1,444 released outright after hearings before local Alien Enemy Hearing Boards. The remainder were released after preliminary hearings before United States Attorneys.

Mr. Biddle revealed that the 3,771 aliens interned represent less than one-half of one percent of the more than 938,000 alien enemies in the United States. He explained that the comprehensive files maintained by the FBI make it possible to determine the beliefs and sympathies of all aliens of enemy nationality, and that it is the policy of the Department of Justice to take into custody for further investigation and hearings all whose loyalty to the United States is in doubt. However, only those regarded as dangerous to the internal security of the country are interned.

Among those interned are 1,853 Germans, 111 Italians, 1,798 Japanese, 6 Hungarians and 2 Rumanians.

In all instances, aliens are taken before Hearing Boards who make recommendations to the Attorney General in each case. He then determines whether the alien enemy is to be intermed, paroled or released.

Long before the outbreak of war, the Attorney General said, the FBI began investigating persons suspected of pro-Axis sympathies. On

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December 7, 1941, Special Agents of the FBI were able to take into custody immediately hundreds of the most dangerous aliens in the United States, and by nightfall of the following day a total of 1,771 alien enemies had been arrested.

According to Director J. Edgar Hoover, typical of the cases investigated by the FBI was that of a young German alien registered for Selective Service in New York. He told investigators that he would surrender to the enemy at the first opportunity if he were called into military service. He further admitted that he had worked in a German Labor Camp during a trip abroad in 1938, but had been rejected for service in the German Army because of an eye injury. Pictures of ships in the Panama Canal and of the lock installations there were found when his premises were searched. He was ordered interned by the Attorney General.

In another case, a German alien in an eastern city admitted under questioning by the FBI that he wanted to see Germany win the war, and that he would have no hesitancy in fighting against the United States. This alien, who first came to America in 1930 and who went back to Germany for several months in 1938-39, also admitted being an enthusiastic former member of the German-American Bund and a Bund Storm Trooper. He demanded to be allowed to return to Germany on the first ship leaving for a neutral port, but was ordered interned as a dangerous individual by the Attorney General.

#### DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Attorney General Francis Biddle announced today that since
Pearl Harbor it has been necessary for the Federal Bureau of Investigation
to take into custody only 14,738 aliens of enemy nationality as persons
potentially dangerous to the security of the United States.

Of this number 3,771 are now interned, 4,113 have been paroled, and 1,444 released outright after hearings before local Alien Enemy Hearing Boards. The remainder were released after preliminary hearings before United States Attorneys.

Nr. Biddle revealed that the 3,771 aliens interned represent less than one-half of one percent of the more than 938,000 alien enemies in the United States. He explained that the comprehensive files maintained by the FBI make it possible to determine the beliefs and sympathies of all aliens of enemy nationality, and that it is the policy of the Department of Justice to take into custody for further investigation and hearings all whose loyalty to the United States is in doubt. However, only those regarded as dangerous to the internal security of the country are interned.

Among those interned are 1,853 Germans, 111 Italians, 1,798 Japanese, 6 Hungarians and 2 Rumanians.

In all instances, aliens are taken before Hearing Boards who make recommendations to the Attorney General in each case. He then determines whether the alien enemy is to be interned, paroled or released.

Long before the outbreak of war, the Attorney General said, the FBI began investigating persons suspected of pro-Axis sympathies. On

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December 7, 1941, Special Agents of the FBI were able to take into custody immediately hundreds of the most dangerous aliens in the United States, and by nightfall of the following day a total of 1,771 alien enemies had been arrested.

According to Director J. Edgar Hoover, typical of the cases investigated by the FBI was that of a young German alien registered for Selective Service in New York. He told investigators that he would surrender to the enemy at the first opportunity if he were called into military service. He further admitted that he had worked in a German Labor Camp during a trip abroad in 1938, but had been rejected for service in the German Army because of an eye injury. Pictures of ships in the Panama Canal and of the lock installations there were found when his premises were searched. He was ordered interned by the Attorney General.

In another case, a German alien in an eastern city admitted under questioning by the FBI that he wanted to see Germany win the war, and that he would have no hesitancy in fighting against the United States. This alien, who first came to America in 1930 and who went back to Germany for several months in 1938-39, also admitted being an enthusiastic former member of the German-American Bund and a Bund Storm Trooper. He demanded to be allowed to return to Germany on the first ship leaving for a neutral port, but was ordered interned as a dangerous individual by the Attorney General.

In October, 1940, the FBI began an investigation of a Japanese alien who lived at Seattle, Washington, after he was seen photographing certain installations on the Willamette River in Oregon. Because he was known to be connected with Japanese propaganda activities and was considered

a potential danger to the United States, he was apprehended by the FBI on December 7, 1941, and was interned. Later he was repatriated to Japan under an exchange agreement.

The Attorney General also made public today the following break-down showing the disposition of alien enemy cases by local Alien Enemy Hearing Boards, as of October 15, 1943:

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#### DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

The Department of Justice announced today that a total of 923 alien enemies have been apprehended by the FBI as the result of investigations originating from a check on purchasers of "Rueckwanderer Marks"—

German "re-migration" Marks.

According to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, the sale of Rueck-wanderer Marks — foreign exchange which could be spent only in Germany — began in the United States in May, 1936, and ceased in June, 1941, with the freezing of such foreign remittances by Presidential Proclamation. Information obtained by the FBI, Mr. Hoover said, indicates that the entire program was controlled by the German Ministry of Economics in an effort to obtain badly-needed foreign exchange.

Ir. Hoover asserted that some of the most dangerous German aliens in the United States first came to the attention of the FBI because their names appeared on lists of purchasers of Rueckwanderer Marks. Of the 923 apprehended, he said, 726 have been interned or paroled and 72 released. Disposition is pending in 125 cases. In all instances, the aliens are given hearings before Alien Enemy Hearing Boards, with final decision made by the Attorney General.

Purchasers of the so-called German "re-migration Marks",

Mr. Hoover said, have Included many naturalized American citizens as

well as German aliens in this country. He disclosed that two of the

eight German saboteurs who came to the United States by submarine in

June, 1942, had purchased such exchange when previously in this country,

while several convicted German spies also had invested American dollars

in this type of German bank credit.

Persons who bought Rueckwanderer larks purchased credit at a designated German bank at the preferential rate of 4.10 reichmarks per dollar, he explained, as compared with the then prevailing rate of exchange of 2.45 reichmarks per dollar. In order to do so, however, purchasers had to present certificates from German consular sources. In most instances, also, the purchaser had to return to Germany to obtain full value of the credit.


Mr. Hoover cited the following cases as typical of those brought to the attention of the FBI through purchases of Rueckwanderer Marks:

A German who had worked as a waiter in various cities from San Francisco to New York came to the United States in 1926 with plans to return to Germany. He bought \$610 in Rueckwanderer Marks but no defense bonds. This alien also expressed the belief that "might makes right" and announced he would not fight for the United 5tates against any Axis power. He is now interned for the duration of the war.

In New York, an alien couple bought \$5,000 forth of the German bank credit. The FBI investigation developed that both were violently pro-Mazi, although they had been in the United States approximately 20 years. The husband admitted Bund membership but refused to name other affiliations, although he was frank in revealing a desire to fight against the United States so as to help Germany win. In this instance the husband admitted that if a German espionage agent asked him for assistance he would comply. Asked if he had purchased war bonds, the alien replied: "After the war you can paper your room with war bonds." Both husband and wife were interned.

A New York barber invested \$3,000. When interviewed he admitted that he wanted Germany to win the war, although he had lived here since 1923. German propaganda was found in his home, and he, too, was interned.

In the Midwest, a naturalized citizen was outspokenly pro-Nazi. He praised Mitler and condemned America and said he was proud to be the first Mazi in the factory where he worked. This man, who invested \$5,000 in the Rueckwanderer Marks, was discharged from the war plant where he was employed, and later denaturalization proceedings were filed. The Department of Justice today announced that 14,798 alien enemies have been apprehended by Special Agents of the FBI since Pearl Harbor.

J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, said that many of those arrested were vigorous advocates of Axis ideologies and were extremely dangerous to the nation as potential spies and saboteurs.

"Some who have been taken into custody frankly admitted they would welcome an opportunity to fight against the United States," Director Hoover said. "It was necessary that the FBI know the identity of such persons so that the proper steps could be taken to prevent them from committing acts detrimental to the security of the United States."

Among those apprehended were 5,977 Germans, 5,303 Japanese, 3,503 Italians, 11 Rumanians, 11 Hungarians and one Bulgarian. In the group were 1,210 Italian seamen and 175 German seamen.

In all instances, aliens are taken before Hearing Boards following arrest and a recommendation is made to the Attorney General of the United States in each case. He determines whether the enemy alien is interned, paroled or released.

Long before war engulfed the United States with stunning suddenness on December 7, 1941, the FBI began investigating

persons suspected of pro-Axis sympathies, and, when the conflict actually began, the 2,599 Special Agents were able to take into custody immediately hundreds of the most dangerous persons in the United States. By nightfall of December 8, 1941, a total of 1,771 enemy aliens had been arrested, and the FBI's work in this field of internal security has continued without a letup in vigilance.

A German alien in an eastern city admitted under questioning by the FBI that he wanted to see Germany win the war and that he would have no hesitancy in fighting against the United States. This alien, who first came to America in 1930 and who went back to Germany for several months in 1938-39, also admitted being an enthusiastic former member of the German-American Bund and was a Bund Storm Trooper. He demanded that he be allowed to return to Germany via the first ship leaving for a neutral port, but was interned by order of the Attorney General as a dangerous individual.

A young German alien registered for Selective Service in New York told Special Agents of the FBI that he would surrender to the enemy at the first opportunity if he were called into military service. He further admitted that he had worked in a German Labor Camp during a trip to the fatherland in 1938 and was rejected for service in the German Army because of an old eye injury.

Pictures of ships in the Panama Canal and of the lock installations there were found when the alien's premises were searched, and he admitted taking them. The camera with which the photographs were made also was found, although all aliens were ordered sometime before to turn in cameras and other specified articles, such as weapons, explosives, maps and charts.

Because this alien was considered potentially dangerous to the internal security of the United States, he was ordered interned by the Attorney General.

In the spring of 1941 a German alien who came to the United States in 1930 was inducted into the Army in Connecticut and after serving several months was discharged. The FBI, which had received previous information on him, resumed its investigation, and, although he had taken his oath upon entering the Army and had filed first citizenship papers, evidence was developed to substantiate reports that he was pro-German. It was found that he had been a Storm Trooper in Germany and that, if he were recalled into the Army, he would ask for non-combatant duty to avoid fighting against his fatherland.

This alien was picked up by the FBI while the pall of smoke still hung over Pearl Harbor and was ordered interned.

"American boys are afraid to fight and have to be dragged into the Army." Statements like this and others in outright support of the Axis cause were reported made by an alien couple in the midwest. Investigation by the FDI disclosed they were ardent supporters of Hitler and his policies in Germany, and, inasmuch as both were considered dangerous individuals, they were interned.

In October, 1940, the FBI began an investigation of a Japanese alien who lived at Seattle, Washington, after he was seen photographing certain installations on the Willamette River in Orogon.

Because he was known to be connected with Japanese propaganda activities and was considered a potential danger to the United States, he was apprehended by the FBI on December 7, 1941, and was interned.

Later he was repatriated to Japan under an exchange arrangement.

Another west coast Japanese who had been in the United States more than 35 years was known by the FBI to have been quite active in subtle propaganda activities. He was influential among Japanese, being one of the most important in his section of California. Because he was considered a danger to America's security, he was apprehended by the FBI on December 8, 1941, and was interned. He had been under investigation for nine months prior to Pearl Harbor.

A former customs inspector in Japan came to the United States about 40 years ago. He was in business on the west coast, but was active in pro-Japanese activities and for a time was president of a group which worked in close cooperation with the Japanese Consulate at San Francisco in handling problems of Japanese in America. He was arrested on December 8, 1941, and was interned.

A San Francisco Japanese alien came to the United States in 1905 and later became a leader in efforts to keep Japanese in the United States true to the old country. He upheld Japanese aggression and vehemently criticized the "revengeful attitude" of America. He at one time was honored for his outstanding service to Japan. This

Mr. Strickland advised that inasmuch as this information came from Honolulu the forms should be kept in the Bureau's files. Er. Strickland also stated that since there are not many individuals left in Hawaii in the same status, there would naturally be but a limited number of such forms.

These forms are received from Hawaii via G-2, Washington, D. C., and the letter of transmittal will be detached in Routing and the forms will be sent through "Not Recorded", to be placed in individual case files. All Supervisors in Records Section have been advised.

In addition to 977 apprehensions, as indicated in the above schedule, the Bureau has been advised that Presidential warrants have been requested of the Attorney General in 22 other cases. These recommendations are still pending in the Department.

In connection with the foregoing tabulation, I desire to point out that the 977 apprehensions constitute approximately 15.9% of the total of 6,135 German alien apprehensions which have been effected to date in the United States. This percentage indicates that approximately one out of every six Germans apprehended has purchased or made application to purchase Rueckwanderer Marks. In the majority of cases, investigation was initiated upon determining that the individual had invested or intended to invest in Rueckwanderer Marks. It is to be further noted that the 437 Rueckwanderer Mark purchasers who have been interned upon order of the Attorney General represent approximately 24.1% of the total of 1,809 German aliens who have been interned as of December 20, 1043.

As of the above date, 32 of the 131 persons whose citizenship has been revoked under the Denaturalization Program were persons who purchased or mode application to purchase Rueck anderer Marks. This number indicates that approximately one out of every four persons who has been denaturalized invested in Rueck-wenderer Marks with the intention of returning to Germany. The above number constitutes approximately 24.4% of the total number of persons who have been denaturalized.

I also desire to point out that approximately 533 Rucckwanderer Mark purchaners were found at the time of inventigation to be employed in plants engaged in the manufacture of essential war materials. The reports covering the results of these inventigations have been furnished to the offices of the Military Intelligence Service and Ecval Intelligence, and information has been received from these agencies that, on the basis of the Bureau's reports and subsequent investigation



by either G-2 or ONI, approximately 49 of this number have been ordered discharged from their employment by either the Secretary of War or Nevy. Meny of the other employees have either been transferred to other departments in unrestricted areas within the plant or are under close observation by plant officials or trusted employees.

In addition to 1004 apprehensions, as indicated in the above schedule, the Bureau has been advised that Presidential warrants have been requested of the Attorney General in 19 other cases. These recommendations are still pending in the Department.

In connection with the foregoing tabulation, I desire to point out that the 1004 apprehensions constitute approximately 15.7% of the total of 6404 German alien apprehensions which have been effected to date in the United States. This percentage indicates that approximately one out of every six Germans apprehended has purchased or made application to purchase Rueckwanderer Marks. In the majority of cases, investigation was initiated upon determining that the individual had invested or intended to invest in Rueckwanderer Marks. It is to be further noted that the 442 Rueckwanderer Mark purchasers who have been interned upon order of the Attorney General represent approximately 24.6% of the total of 1,799 German aliens who have been interned as of March 3, 1944.

As of the above date, 35 of the 158 persons whose citizenship has been revoked under the Denaturalization Program were persons who purchased or made application to purchase Rueckwanderer Merks. This number indicates that approximately one out of every four persons who has been denaturalized invested in Rueckwanderer Marks with the intention of returning to Germany. The above number constitutes approximately 2..1% of the total number of persons who have been denaturalized.

I also desire to point out that approximately 547 Ruschwenderer Mark purchasers were found at the time of investigation to be employed in plants engaged in the manufacture of essential war materials. The reports covering the results of those investigations have been furnished to the offices of the Military Intelligence Service and Navel Intelligence, and information has been received from these agencies that, on the basis of the Bureau's reports and subsequent investigation

by either G-2 or ONI, approximately 53 of this number have been ordered discharged from their employment by either the Secretary of War or Navy. Many of the other employees have either been transferred to other departments in unrestricted areas within the plant or are under close observation by plant officials or trunted employees.

Reference is made to the attached removandom of Farch 14, 1944 from Educard J. Lands to you relative to the purple of Italian seamon and civilian internses, referring which you requested the views of this Bureau.

### JYALLAH SEMUR

I'm. Incis suggests that, with a few possible exceptions, the Italian scarce presently detain a at Part dissouls be transferred back to Indignation custody as sommen who have exceptional their leave so that they may be handled like other seamen and, if possible, be persuaded to reship.

Inamuch as these season have been in custody during their entire stay in this country, there is little information available upon which an opinion as to their desperousness could be predicated, and, for the same reason, it would probably be impossible to obtain any substantial admitional information. Such information as has previously been developed by this hurson, principally in connection with the investigation of saboteme on Italian vessels in United States ports, has been made available to the Department.

Whether or not these individuals should be permitted to reship would appear to be a question in which the Navy Department would have an interest, and it is suggested that the views of that Department be obtained before such a program is initiated. In the event any of these aliens are transferred to Immigration costody as scamen who have eventuyed their leave, it is believed that, in the interests of scourity, they should not be released from such custody unless and until they have been permitted to reship and have obtained employment as seamen.

# CIVILIAN PTALLAR TOTTHURS

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#### MINIORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNEY STRUKAL

Of those talian aliens who were ordered interned subsequent to their apprehension, a majority have already been released and presumably the few who remain interned are those considered most dangerous. I do not feel, therefore, that they should be released without, at least, a close consideration of the facts in each individual case.

Although the question of future internments of dangerous Italian aliens has not been directly raised, I do not believe that Italians presently interned should be released, except upon the facts of an individual case, unless it is clearly apparent that it is now safe to announce publicly that in the future no Italian alien will be ordered interned. I do not feel that the time for such action has arrived.

#### MEMORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNET GENERAL

#### Re: Parole of Italian seamen and civilian internees

The Immigration and Naturalization Service plans to close the interment camp at Ft. Kissoula, Montana, in the next few weeks and experience has domonstrated that Germans and Italians cannot be interned in the same camp satisfactorily. This situation presents a good occasion to review the whole question of keeping these Italians interned as alien enomies.

Italian seamen. - Most of the seamen are here involuntarily, have no ties here, and any allegianch is to Italy although, of course, at present such allegiance is a confused political matter. It is doubtful that they have any affirmative political views about Italy now. Most of these seamen were taken from their ships in our harbors and detained in Immigration custody even before we entered the war. I recommend that, with the exception of a few unreconstructed Fascists and old and infirm who should be held as alien encaies for repatriation, the remaining seamen be transferred back to Immigration custody as scamen who have overstayed their leave so that they may be handled like other seamen and if possible be persuaded to reship. It is hoped, however, that the Immigration Service will avoid involuntary reshipment both in the interest of security and in respect for a seaman's genuine fear of reprisals against any members of his family in Northern Italy, or similar reasons.

Civilian Italian internees. - Even the few internees who are not politically demoralized by Italy's fall know that their Fascist views are completely discredited in their communities and they would not be a danger to their community if returned on parole. I recommend that all of them be placed on strict parole with the possible exception of anyone who still indicates an unwillingness to cooperate on this basis.

If you will indicate your conclusion on these recommendations, the cases will be prepared for individual decision in accordance with your views.

You may be interested in the following information:

Excluding German seamen, there have been 6,085 German aliens apprehended ac\_of April 4, 1944.

Of this number 2,117 were originally ordered interned by the Attorney General. As of April 4, 1944, only 1,648 of 2,117 are still interned. Of those who are no longer interned; 43 have been released outright; 13 have been released and inducted into the armed forces; 46 have been repatriated; 6 have died and 361 are presently on parole.

In addition to the above 1,648 alien enemies, the Attorney General has ordered the interment of 89 who had been previously released by the U. S. Attorneys without a hearing before the Alien Enemy Hearing Boards, or who had been previously ordered released or paroled by the Attorney Ceneral.

While the total of 1,737 German enemy aliens now interned represent 28.54% of those apprehended by the Bureau, they represent but .55% of the German alien enemies in the United States.


Mr. Sinney Lafoon of the United States Department of State recently requested the Liaison Section to secure from the Eureau any available documentary evidence or evidence legally admissible in court which could be used in habeas corpus proceedings which have been instituted by various German aliens presently interned in the United States. Mr. Lafoon was also interested in being advised as to the reliability of the informants from whom information concerning the activities of these aliens had originally been received.

As requested, a thorough search has been made of Eureau files concerning these aliens and the requested information is set forth in the attached memoranda.

#### RECOMMENDATION

DETENTION OF COMMUNISTS IN THE EVENT OF SUDDEN DIFFICULTY WITH THE SOVIET UNION

Reference is made to my memoranda to you of March 8, August 5 and September 5, 1946, concerning the captioned matter. Reference is also made to the various conferences between representatives of this Bureau and Messrs. Peyton Ford and H. Graham Morison of the Department dealing with the formulation of a policy to support a program of action for this Bureau in the handling of Communists in the event of a national emergency or hostilities between the United States and the Soviet Union.

As long ago as September 20, 1946, the Department had under consideration a program for detention of Cummunists in the event of such emergency through Presidential directives which would empower the Secretary of War to define military exclusion areas within which the President would rescind the power of the courts to issue writs of habeas corpus and directives providing for the detention of persons to be held by the Bureau of Prisons of the Department. These tentative plans as outlined by Messrs, Ford and Morison contemplated formal endorsement of any such directives by the President through joint Congressional resolutions and through the enactment of legislation supporting and supplementing them.

This broad program, which was strictly tentative in consideration, was to be discussed by Departmental representatives with representatives of the War Department. The objections of this Bureau to certain features of this program, particularly with regard to the suspension of the writ of habeas corpus were made known to Messrs. Ford and Morison and the Department's representatives advised that further consideration would be given to this program and as soon as my conclusive drafts were drawn this Bureau's representatives would a ain be called into examine them.

Mr. Morison of the Department orally advised on March 15, 1947, that the War Department had been placed on notice with regard to the tentative program drawn up by the Department of Justice. This was seven months ago.

During the year which has passed since the Dopartment first commenced consideration of the above mentioned program, the international situation has deteriorated to a marked degree. Furthermore, the administrative reorganization of the military forces of the United States has changed with the establishment of a Department of Defense.

ENGLOSURE

I strongly urge that the problem of detention of Communists in the event of an emergency involving the Soviet Union and this country be discussed by ou on a Cabinet level with the interested Secretaries, particularly Secretaries State and Defense, and the President.

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#### The Attorney General

You will recall that in my memorandum of August 5, 1946, I strongly recommended that appropriate legislation to correct the lack of statutory backing for the detention of persons dangerous to the security of the United States be prepared for submission either to a special session of Congress, which might be called in the event of such emergency, or to the regular session which convened in January 1947. Since that time, not only has the international situation become more tense, but the Communists in the United States have increased their efforts to penetrate those fields of our industry, i.e., machine building, transportation and electrical equipment, where acts of sabotage would be most dangerous to our defense. I again urge that appropriate legislation be in readiness, at least, for the next session of Congress. Should hostilities commence with a "sneak attack" against the United States by either atomic or bacteriological weapons, Congressional enactment of such a program might thereafter be physically impossible, or, at least, too late.

I feel, as I am sure you do, that neither the Department nor the Bureau can afford to delay in such planning as this any longer. Consequently, I urge you to give this problem your immediate consideration. I particularly urge you to consider the issuance of definite and specific instructions as to procedure which shall be followed in the event of an emergency involving the United States and the Soviet Union, and that those individuals responsible for the carrying out of such procedure be appropriately instructed without delay.

I would also appreciate your informing this Bureau of any developments affecting relations between this country and the Soviet Union which come to your attention as a Cabinet Officer which would have any material bearing upon this Bureau's responsibilities, so that I, in turn, can advise and instruct our field representatives.

For the purposes, it should be noted that on January 9th I talked to Mr. Vincent Quinn, Assistant Attorney General in Charge of the Criminal Division concerning the Bureau's memoranda to the Attorney General urging a program for the detention of Communists in the event of sudden difficulty with the Soviet Union.

I pointed out to Mr. Quinn the Attorney General had indicated that Mr. Quinn was to nandle this matter personally with the Bureau and told Mr. Quinn that I would be available to confer with him at any time he wanted to go into this matter. Mr. Quinn indicated he was having some research conducted on this subject and that networld notify the Bureau in the near future of the date of a possible conference concerning this situation. On this occasion, it was pointed out to Mr. Quinn that you were unalterably opposed to any suggestion to have the United States declared a military area, as well as to any program which would charge the War and Navy Departments with the duty of detaining persons. Mr. Quinn was informed that in your opinion, all functions of this kind within the United States should be handled by civilians and asscivilian proceedings and with no aspect of a military state.

Such was the case in the decision to move some 120,000 Japanese-Americans from their homes and farms on the West Coast to relocation centers. It was a tragic upheaval which Hoover looked upon as a mixture of politics and hysteria and not as an urgent measure of national defense.

The FBI Director first heard of the evacuation proposal when he was called to the office of Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau on the evening of December 10 for a talk with the Secretary and two other Treasury officials. A memorandum of the meeting written by Hoover to Attorney General Biddle tells the basic story:

... The Secretary stated that he had been in communication with his representatives in San Francisco and as a result had ascertained that the task which they were carrying on [freezing Japanese assets and businesses] was an enormous one and that he believed more drastic measures should be taken in order to adequately cover and complete it. The Secretary then put in a call to Mr. X, one of his representatives in San Francisco, and this conversation was heard by all in the Secretary's office . . . It was the opinion of Mr. X that there should be a round-up of the Japanese in San Francisco, Los Angeles and in the bay cities of San Francisco, as well as in certain sections of the San Joaquin Valley . . . The Secretary inquired of me as to whether this could be done . . .

I suggested to Secretary Morgenthau that he call you by phone. I told the Secretary that I felt that you would be reluctant to approve any such program unless there were sufficient facts upon which to justify the cases of the persons arrested, as I believed you would be opposed to any "drag-net" or "round-up" procedure. I pointed out to the Secretary that

in the arrests which had already been made of the Japanese, German, and Italian alien enemies, factual cases had had to be prepared on each one of them prior to their arrests and that these had to be approved by the Attorney General, and that of course citizens of the United States were not being included in any arrests as the authority to make arrests was limited to alien enemies and unless there were specific actions upon which criminal complaints could be filed, you had not approved the arresting of any citizens of the United States.

The Secretary then called you... and you were in accord that the matter should be further considered and that certainly no action should be taken last night of the character recommended by the Treasury Agents in San Francisco...

But the snowball had started. With the hysteria there were the cold calculations of men who wanted the Japanese moved for economic reasons and because of racial prejudices. The decisions for the movement were made in the upper reaches of the Administration. And so it was that tens of thousands of loyal Japanese-American citizens made the sad journey from their homes after a directive was issued giving the Army authority for the roundup.

Hoover put his finger on the real reason for the evacuation when he told Biddle in a memorandum;

The necessity for mass evacuation is based primarily upon public and political pressure rather than on factual data. Public hysteria and, in some instances, the comments of the press, and radio announcers, have resulted in a tremendous amount of pressure being brought to bear on Governor Olson and Earl Warren, Attorney General of the State, and on the military authorities. It is interesting to observe that little mention has been made of the mass evacuation of enemy aliens.

This was a case in which the FBI, after many months of investigation, had tagged and arrested 733 Japanese aliens in all parts of the nation by 6:30 A.M., on December 8. Those were the Japanese considered by the FBI? be dangerous to the nation's security. The evacuation swept up some 120,000 people of Japanese ancestry—the great majority of them citizens—on the West Coast alone.

In this hysteria, Hoover turned aside a flood of offers from citizens' and civilian groups across the country who wanted to resurrect the old American Protective League of World War I. The FBI Director saw no place for vigilantism in World War II.

There were 16,062 enemy aliens arrested during World War II. Of this number, 7,043 were German aliens, among whom 1,225 were interned; 2,449 were paroled; 2,589 were released; 691 were repatriated; and 47 died. Dispositions were unresolved in 42 of the cases. The Japanese aliens arrested totaled 5,428. Of these, 1,532 were interned; 2,423 were paroled; 955 were released; 415 were repatriated; and 88 died. In 15 of these cases the dispositions were unresolved. The number of Italian aliens arrested was 3,567. Of this number, 367 were interned; 861 were paroled; 2,237 were released; 87 were repatriated; and 14 died. There was one case in which the disposition was unresolved. These figures include 802 German seamen and 1,271 Italian seamen who were apprehended before the United States entered the war. In addition, 24 Hungarian, Bulgarian and Rumanian alien enemies were apprehended. Of these, 8 were paroled and 15 were released. The disposition in one case was unresolved.

There were 25,881 searches of enemy-alien premises, where 3,127 shortwave radios; 2,240 sticks of dynamite; 4,626 firearms; 306,247 rounds of ammunition; and other items of contraband were seized.

On 5-5-59 Mr. Walter F. Banse, who is attached to the McGuire office of Assistant Attorney General George C. Doub of the Civil W.C. Sullivan Division of the Department, personally requested me to furnish him statistics as to the number of Japanese aliens taken into custody by the FBI up to 8-15-45.

Mr. Banse advised that the Government Printing Office is to publish a reference document regarding the Japanese-American. Evacuation Claims Program and he desires these figures in connection with his research for the preparation of this document.

Bufiles disclose that a total of 5,428 Japanese aliens were taken into custody in the period between 12-7-41 and 8-15-45. It is noted World War II ended 8-14-45. This same figure was quoted in Whitehead's book "The FBI Story" and also appears in a memorandum from Ladd to the Director dated 7-12-45 captioned "Apprehensions of Enemy Aliens" (100-2-4014). This same file wherein statistics on such arrests are kept does not indicate that any additional arrests were made between 7-12-45 and the end of the war on 8-14-45.

#### ACTION:

There is attached a suggested letter to Assistant Attorney General George C. Doub of the Civil Division advising him that 5.428 Japanese aliens were taken into custody between 12-7-41 and 8-15-45.

Waikart **FROM** RECORDS OF JAPANESE ALIENS SEIZED DURING WORLD WAR II Mrs. Dorothy Gersak, code 13, extension 23262, Archivist, Records Appraisal Division, National Archives, telephonically inquired if we were in possession of or aware of the location of any group or blocks of records belonging to Japanese who were arrested at the outbreak of World War II. She is attempting to develop this information in order to answer an inquiry from the Archivist at the University of Washington who, in researching the history of the seizure of Japanese in the northwest area of this country at the outbreak of World War II, has been, on occasion, informed that collateral records taken at the time of the arrests were in the custody of the FBI. I informed Mrs. Gersak that I was not familiar with any general? category of records such as she outlined, but, of course, this should not be confused with the fact that we have security files on various individuals including Japanese as well as other nationalities. Also that while the Bureau handled the apprehension of Japanese as well as Germans at the outbreak of World War II, they were immediately turned over to other authorities along with any evidence to be used in determining detention or release. She was / also advised that this Bureau would be glad to consider any specific request for information on individuals or groups, but that sufficient identifying data necessarily would have to be furnished in order to intelligently consider and pass upon the request.
