Wiand stated that they had on one previous pocasion received information from a Selective Service inspector in New York to the effect that the New York Director of Selective Service was investigating a tip that Kaye had fraudulently obtained a rejection. Wiand said that at this time, in order to find out whether this was true, he had called Major Kelly of New York Selective Service Headquarters and told him that our New York Office had received an anonymous communication indicating that Kaye might have been malingering and asked Kelly whether he had anything on it. Kelly replied that Selective Service had also received an anonymous tip to this effect and that he had inquired into the matter very thoroughly. He said that Kaye had been reexamined and that he was convinced that the diagnosis which resulted in his obtaining a 4-F classification was both accurate and honest.

Pegler is interested in Danny Kaye's Selective Service status and presently has his personal investigator checking to ascertain the facts of the case. Pegler plans to make a news break if his investigator obtains any evidence as to Kaye's malingering.



provided the Selective Service file of subject KATE for Major HUGH J. KELLY, Selective Service Headquarters, New York City, which officer made this file available to the writer for photostatic purposes and analysis.

A review of this file was made and the following partinent information was obtained therefrom.

KAYE registered for Selective Service at LocalBoard 229, Brooklyn, New York, October 16, 1940 and was assigned order number 1758. On April 23, 1941 a Selective Service questionnaire was mailed to the subject and on April 29, 1941 this questionnaire was returned completed by the subject. It was noted that the questionnaire was mailed to DANIEL KAYE, 350 Bradford Street, Brooklyn, New York, but the address listed by the subject in his questionnaire was 414 East 52nd Street, New York City, telephone, Plaza 3-5040.



In Series 2, entitled "Physical Condition", the subject stated to the best of his knowledge, he had no physical or mental defects or diseases, and further, that he was not an immate of an institution.

Under Series 4, entitled "Occupation or Activity", subject stated that his occupation is that of an actor, and has been for the past ten years. He stated his average weekly earnings are \$200 per week. The subject's employer was listed as SAN H. HARRIS, Alvin Theatre, New York City.

Under Series 7, entitled "Dependency" subject stated that he married his present wife, at Fort Lauderdale, Florida, January 3, 1940. He listed as dependents, his father JACOB KANIHSKY, 350 Bradford Street, Brooklyn, New York.

Under Series 9, entitled "Citizenship", subject stated he was born January 18, 1911, in Brooklyn, New York.

In that part of the questionnaire wherein subject is entitled to set forth his epinion as to what his classification should be, it was noted that KAYE was of the opinion that he should be classified in Class 3.

On the last page of the questionnaire wherein is set forth the minutes of other actions by the Lecal Board, the following items of pertinence were set forth.

June 21, 1941 - Class 3, Category 3.
July 23, 1942 - Class 1, Category 3. (Entire Board).
January 9, 1943 - Class 1.
February 3, 1943 - Placed in 1A. For May, 1943 induction.
90 day postponement of induction granted.
(Entire Board).

May 13, 1943 - 90 day postponement of induction granted with no further postponements. Fotify registrant and employer.

August 26, 1943 - Postponed - October induction. No further postponements.

October 1, 1943 - October, 1943 induction, December 1, 1943 - reclassified 47.

Form No. 221, "Report of Physical Examination and Induction". From this form it was noted subject was afforded a screening physical examination on February 2, 1943, at which time he was determined to be physically fit and on February 3, 1943 subject was placed in Class 14.

Hext item of pertinence was a copy of an affidavit executed by the subject and his wife SYLVIA, for leave to change their names from DAVID KAMINSKY and SYLVIA KAMINSKY to DAWNY KAYE and SYLVIA KAYE. This affidavit was executed January 22, 1943.

A letter dated March 8, 1943 from the subject to Local Board 229, advised in substance that subject desired a 90 day deferment in order that he may complete work in the motion picture "Up In Arms."

A letter dated May 15, 1943 from the Local Board to the subject in substance granted the subject postponement of induction until the end of May, 1943.

A letter dated April 29, 1943 from the subject to Local Board 229, requests a further 90 day deferment in order to complete the aforementioned picture "Up in Arms."

A letter dated May 3, 1943 from the Local Board to SANUEL GOLDWIN, 729 7th Avenue, New York City, in substance requested information as to when subject KAYE'S obligations would be completed with regard to the picture "Up In Arms."

A letter dated May 8, 1943 from JAMES A. MULVEY of the Samuel Goldwyn Company, to the Local Board, advising in substance he expected the picture "Up In Arms" would be completed by the end of August, 1943.

A letter dated May 12, 1943 from the Local Board to the subject advising in substance that he would be granted a postponement of induction for a period of 90 days commencing from May 12, 1943.

A letter dated Angust 23, 1943 from the Local Board to Mr. JANES A. MULVEY, Samuel Goldwyn Studios, states in substance that registrant's induction had been postponed for a period of 60 days from August 23, 1943.

Letter bearing no date but carrying the date stamp September 25, 1943 from subject RAYE to the Local Board, making application for a pre-induction physical examination "because it would result in undue hardship to my family and myself if I were to wind up my affairs and be rejected at the induction station, as you may see from the enclosed medical history I have physical defects which make it at least doubtful whether I will be accepted for military service, xxx

An order to report for a pre-induction physical examination, dated September 25, 1943 calling KAYE for examination September 27, 1943.



A letter dated September 27, 1943 from ABRAHAM KAUFMAN, Major Infantry Chief, Manpower and Operations Division, Selective Service Headquarters, New York City, authorising a pre-induction physical examination for subject DANNY KAYE.

A form letter dated September 28, 1943 from the Induction Station, to Local Board 229, advising that on September 27, 1943 subject KAYE had been given a pre-induction physical examination and "the results indicate that if this registrant had been ordered for induction today he would have been accepted for service in the Armed Jurces."

A letter dated October 6, 1943 from Colonel THEODORE P. BANK, Chief, Athletic and Recreation Branch, Special Service Division, to Mr. LAWRENCE PHILLIPS, U.S.O. Camp Shows, Inc., states in substance that subject KAYE is a member of an entertainment troupe scheduled to depart in the near future for an overseas command, and further requested Mr. PHILLIPS to obtain the necessary approval of KAYE'S Local Board prior to the authorisation of everseas travel of subject KAYE.

Letter dated October 7, 1943 from MOU WOLFSON, Overseas Department, U.S.O. Camp Shows. Inc., to Local Board 229, states in substance, that the U.S.O. Camp Shows desires permission for DANNY KATE to leave the United States for a period of six months to join an entertainment unit formed at the request of the War Department for everseas entertainment purposes.

An order to report for induction dated October 18, 1943, scheduling subject for induction October 30, 1943.

Form 221, which is a report of physical examination and induction, indicates that on October 19, 1943 subject was ascertained to be in normal physical and mental condition and on October 20, 1943 registrant was placed in 1A. This Form 221 further reflects a complete physical examination was conducted at the Grand Central Induction Station, New York City, wherein all items checked by induction authorities were said to be normal or non-deferable, with the exception of

On the last page of Form 221 item 78E bears the following notation:

By letter dated November 19, 1943 from Local Board 229 to Dr. MOORE of the Brooklyn State Hospital, it is stated in substance that subject KAYE'S file is enclosed herewith and that subject KAYE has been notified to appear before Dr. MOORE on Tuesday, November 23, 1943 at 11 A.M.

By letter dated November 23, 1943 from the Local Board to subject KAYE, it was stated in substance that subject failed to appear before Dr. SIMON MOORE, November 23, 1943 and that final opportunity is hereby given to appear before Dr. MOORE on Friday, November 26, 1943 at 10 A.M.

Wext in the subject's Selective Service file is the following quoted report of examination of subject KAYE, conducted at the Brooklyn State Hospital, together with two enclosures on the stationery of Examination of the stationery o

He states he was born in Brooklyn thirty-two years ago. He had a moderate education, reaching the sixth term of Thomas Jefferson High School.

Then he began to entertain in summer resorts and finally landed a job in a show and built up a career. He went to different parts of the world and the shifting of scenes fitted in with his personality.

He went to Florida and came back. His brother developed tuberculosis and was ment to Liberty, New York.

Four years ago he got married.


The neurological examination was essentially negative. His pulse varied between 90-120.

A memorandum dated December 1, 1943 was in substance that members of the Local Board advised Colonel McDERMOTT of the New York City Selective Service Headquarters, that the Local Board was not at all convinced that registrant should not be inducted. It further stated that Colonel KOPETZKI advised the board members and Colonel McDEPMOTT that in his opinion there is no chance whatever of the Army accepting the registrant no matter what the Local Board's thoughts were on the subject or what steps they would take in the matter.

A letter dated December 14, 1943 from LOU WOLFSON, Overseas Department, U.S.O. Camp Shows, Inc., to the Local Board, requested permission for the subject to depart for overseas duty.

On the bottom of this letter is the notation "Permission denied 12/16/43-Entire board."

Letter dated December 16, 1943 from the Local Board to LOU WOLFSON, in substance denies permission for subject to leave the country.

Letter dated December 21, 1943 from the Local Board to Colonel ARTHUR V. NcDERMOTT, New YorkCity Headquarters, Selective Service System, advises Colonel McDERMOTT that the following motion was passed by the Local Board October 16, 1943.

Local Board by unanimous vote of 4 to 0 denied permission to Danny Kaye, Order No. 1758, to leave the country for U.S.O. at request of U.S.O. Camp Shows Inc. Basis of denial—best interest of country would not be served by registrant being permitted to entertain members of the Armed Forces in foreign zones. Neither his physical or mental condition or attitude tend to show that the morale of the armed forces would be benefitted by his performances before them, as a civilian.

Document dated December 29, 1943 "Appeal From Determination" and signed by LEWIS B. HERSHEY. Director of Selective Service, in substance appealed the determination of the Local Board not to issue a parmit for the registrant to depart from the country.

Letter dated January 5, 1944 from the Local Board to the Chairman of Appeal Board 11, sets forth in detail pertinent portions of subject's Selective Service history and is reported herewith:

An appeal having been filed by Lewis B. Hershey. Birector of Selective Service, under the provisions of Paragraph 627.1 of the Selective Service Regulations from the determination of the Local Board not to issue a Permit of Local Board for Registrant to Depart from the United States (DSS Form 351) you will find enclosed herewith registrant's complete file for your consideration.

- In order, however, that you may be in a position to properly evaluate the decision of this Local Board in refusing to grant such permit we deem it advisable to submit the following facts for your attention:
- Several of the selecters of this Board who accompanied the registrant during his processing at the Induction Station on October 30, 1943 reported back to the Local Board that the registrant created a disturbance at the Induction Station, picked an argument with some of the doctors there, and generally by his own conduct impressed upon others that he was reluctant to serve in the Armed Forces.
- These reports have been consistent with the impression of the Local Board Members, based upon his record, his personal contact with them and all the other facts and circumstances in the case, that the registrant was very reductant to serve his country in the same way as every other American Citizen who is subject to Selective Service.
- About the middle of September 1943 the registrant sought and obtained a private audience with Dr. Gruman, Chairman of the Local Board, on the ground that he was afflicted with a physical ailment which he did not want anyone to know about, and which he claimed would disqualify him at the Induction Station and will shorten his life materially. He requested a Pre-Induction Physical Examination which was arranged for him. At this Pre-Induction Examination given him at the Induction Station on September 27, 1943, he presented his evidence of this condition consisting of doctor's certificates and x-rays, but the Local Board was advised that he was found acceptable and had he been ordered for induction on that day, he would have been swern into the service. Then, a Notice of Induction for October 30, 1943, was duly mailed him on October 18, 1943. The induction was on a Saturday and the Local Board did not get the results until the following Thursday. But in the meantime, the press and radio were full of reports that he was rejected for a back condition and had been kept as a Medical Holdover at Governor's Island for three days to check on that condition. The

"efficial results mailed to the Board, of course, gave the reason for his rejection and indicated that that was the only reason for which he was rejected. This was just a few weeks after the same Induction Station found him fit for military service!

When the Local Board came into possession of the real reason for his rejection and the reports of his conduct at the Induction Station and the way his case had been handled there, it felt that in fairness to everyone concerned, including the registrant himself, it would be wise to arrange by a member of the Medical Advisory Board and arranged an appointment with Dr. Moore of the Brooklyn State Hospital. The registrant failed to appear for this examination although duly notified to do so, but did appear at the next appointment in response to a letter from the Local Board that unless he did so he would be considered a delinquent and be treated accordingly.

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But it was then that the recal Board learned for the first time that the registrant or his representatives had been in touch with Col. Repetaky's effice, of the Medical Division of Selective Service Headquarters and that registrant's doctor had been in correspondence with Mrs. Ginsberg of Col. Kopetaky's office, who arranged that Dr. Moore be advised of registrant's doctor's views concerning his fitness for military service. Mothing was said to the Local Board about these different events that were taking place without the knowledge of the Local Board. While the Local Board is not taking the position that these events were irregular, it is presenting them to you in proper sequence to enable you to evaluate the case as a whole.

Dr. Gruman, Chairman of the Local Board and Mr. Schlegel,
Vice-Chairman then held a conference with Col. McDermott, who called
in Col. Kopetaky. Dr. Gruman teld Col. McDermott that the Local
Board was not at all convinced that the Government could not use
registrant's services and that it was the opinion of the Local Board
that registrant's rejection was an error
and should not be permitted to stand, especially in view of registrant's
condition, conduct and background; that registrant was a capable
entertainer by profession and the Government could and should utilize

"his special talents along those lines. Upon Col. McDermott's and Col. Kepetaky's assurance that the Local Board could not possibly induct the registrent no matter what they did in that regard the Local Board reluctantly reclassified registrant into 41.

On December 16, 1943, the U.S.O. Comp Shows, Inc., applied to the Local Board for a permit allowing registrant to leave the country for a period of four months to entertain at a base overseas. At a meeting of the Local Board held on December 16, 1943, the Local Board by a vote of 4 to 0 denied this request and recorded in the Minutes of Action of the Local Board as the basis for the denial: 'that the best interests of the country would not be served by registrant being permitted to entertain the members of the Armed Forces in foreign sones. Weither his physical or mental condition or attitude tend to show that the morale of the Armed Forces would be benefited by his performances before them, as a civilian.'

After several telephone calls by various persons in a further attempt to obtain this permit and the Board's reiteration that its decision still stood, the appeal by Gen. Hershey followed. With regards to the same, the Local Board wishes to state that it agrees wholeheartedly with Gen. Hershey that the War Department should not be deprived of Mr. Kaye's particular talents, but it is of the spinion that Section 623.34 subdivision b and c of the Selective Service Regulations should be followed rather than 627.1.

aniform, if that be true then he should not be accepted for this assignment, because the life is reported to be just as rigid and the Government would have a liability on its hands were he to break down. In conclusion, the Local Board wishes to state that its decision has been arrived at after a careful review of the entire folder and after taking the whole picture into consideration; that its decision is not capricious or based upon prejudice, but is the honest conclusion of every member of this Local Board.

Document dated January 5, 1944 entitled "Withdrawal of Appeal From Determination" and signed by LEWIS B. HERSHEY, Director of Selective Service, states "I hereby Withdraw the Appeal to the Board of Appeal taken on December 29, 1943, in the case of the sove-named registrant."

Letter dated January 12, 1944 from the Local Board to Col. ARTHUR V. NoDERMOTT, Director, Selective Service for the City of New York, which is quoted as follows:

- We have refused to issue registrant a Permit to Depart from the United States (DSS Form 351) for the reasons stated in our letter dated January 5, 1944 to Walter Jeffreys Carlin, Chairman, Appeal Board No. 11, Brooklyn 2, New York. To be more specific, because unanimously we felt, and still feel the Government should avail itself of registrant's services for the duration and not only for a short period of time.
- We note, that under Section 623.34 (c) of the Selective Service Regulations, if the registrant is believed to be capable of any duty at all the Local Board could recommend his induction into the Armed Forces and the Director of Selective Service may accomplish that purpose by requesting a waiver of the defect in order to permit the induction of the registrant. In this way, the War Department could utilize his entertainment abilities to entertain enlisted personnel both at home and overseas, the Selective Service System could perform its functions to the fullest extent by seeing to it that a person of registrant's outstanding ability as an entertainer servehis country to the best of his ability in the fullest possible measure and, the wishes of the War Department and registrant himself would be granted at the same time.
- For, indiscussing this matter with the registrant Monday evening, he stated to the Local Board that he was not opposed to induction if he could be assured that he would be used as an entertainer. And inasmuch as the war Department by requesting his services as an entertainer overseas indicated its desires and intentions to use him as an entertainer, it seems that the induction of the registrant under the section mentioned would be the best possible solution to this case.
- Tou will, therefore, find enclosed herewith registrant's complete file together with a full statement of the facts, in duplicate, and the recommendation of the Local Board which you will be good enough to process under Section 623.34 (c) of the Selective Service Regulations.

We have been authorised to stated that they camcelled this lassification en January 12, 1944 purely because of General Hershey's withdrawal of the appeal and for no other reason.

Letter dated January 15, 1944 from Colonel McDERMOTT to the Local Board, is quoted as follows:

I have your letter of January 12th enclosing the file of the above named registrant, which I am returning herewith.

Personally, I must beg to disagree with both your premises and your conclusions in this matter and I am wondering if your decision was not influenced to some extent by the belief that the registrant is a malingerer despite the fact that

Major KELLY stated that considerable inquiry had been made by his headquarters concerning DANNY KAYE'S case and Major KELLY pointed out that the disturbing factor in the case is that KAYE passed his pre-induction physical examination and then later when he was again called for a physical examination.

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Major KELLY made available the file with regard to DANNY KAYE as maintained by the Coordination and Inspection Division, Selective Service Headquarters.

A review of this file was made and the following pertinent information was obtained.

A paper undated but bearing the following notation:

- Get O.K. for Pre-Induction Examination. Local Board has medical evidence re acceptability.
- Send request Special Delivery and ask for authorisation by return mail.
- When authorisation is received, notify Niss Williams."

Next pertinent letter is dated December 1, 1943, signed by FREDERICK H. WESTON, Lt. Colonel, Cavalry Chief, Athletic-Recreation Division, Army Athletic and Recreation Division, addressed to Mr. LAWRENCE PHILLIPS, Executive Vice-President, U.S.O. Camp Shows, Inc., which letter reads as follows:

This is to certify that Mr. Danny Kaye, selected as a performer in an offshore entertainment unit, will be actively engaged in recreation morale work for the armed forces of the United States stationed overseas and will actively serve in a civilian capacity with task forces."

Letter dated December 18, 1943 from LAWRENCE PHILLIPS.

Executive Vice-President, U.S.O. Camp Shows, Inc. to Colonel McDERMOTT.

This letter states in substance that KATE has been requested by the U.S.O. to make a tour of certain everseas bases in an entertainment unit requested by the War Department, and that he, PHILLIPS, had made an application to Local Board 229 for DANNY KAYE'S release but had received in reply the following:

At a full meeting of the board held this evening, permission is denied.

The letter continued in substance that KATE after being examined by all doctors' requests, was placed in 4F and because of this 4F classification is free to pursue any civilian occupation and also requested a reversal of ruling by Local Board 229.


The next letter dated December 31, 1943 to Major GENERAL LEWIS B. HERSHEY, and signed by Colonel ARTHUR V. McDERMOTT is quoted as follows:

"Dear General Hershey:

- I have your letter of December 29 enclosing a letter of appeal from the Determination of Local Board #229 not to issue a permit to depart from the United States to the above named registrant. I have forwarded a copy of your letter together with the notice of appeal to the Local Board with instructions to submit the case promptly to the Board of Appeals.
- For your information I may state that since I last discussed this case with Colonel Davidson, I have received from the Local Board a memorandum of the action taken as follows:
- "Local Board by unanimous vote of 4 to 0 denied permission to Danny Kaye, Order No. 1758, to leave the country for U.S.O. at request of U.S.O. Camp Shows Inc. <u>Basis of denial</u>—best interest of country would not be served by registrant being permitted to entertain members of the Armed Forces in foreign sones. Weither his physical or mental condition or attitude tend to show that the morale of the armed forces would be benefitted by his performances before them, as a civilian.

The next letter of pertinence in DANNY KAYE'S file is dated January 5, 1944, and is addressed to ARTHUR V. McDERMOTT, attention of Major General LEWIS B. HERSHEY, and is quoted as follows:

I have your letter of December 31, 1943 with regard to the Notice of Appeal from the Determination of Local Board #229 in the case of the above named registrant.




The basis of denial by the Local Board has been moted. Further contact with the War Department has been made and at their specific request there is enclosed herewith "Withdrawal of Appeal".

The file of the registrent should be returned to the Local Board."

The next letter of pertinence is dated March 14, 1944, from Colonel SANUEL J.ECPETZEY, Colonel Medical Corps, Medical Division to Confidential Informant 71. This letter is quoted as follows:

- Pursuant to our telephone conversation teday, I give you the following record of our files on the above named subject.
- The matter was brought to my attention by the Inspection Division due to complaints on November 30, 1943. I then investigated the situation and found the following.
- He had a preinduction examination on September 27, 1943 and was accepted. He was sent up for induction on October 30, 1943 and at that time he presented a certificate from Dr. Janet McKensie Rioch, 17 West 54th Street, New York City to the effect that he was under treatment by the above doctor who reported:



I incorporated this statement in a confidential letter to the Chief Medical Officer at the Induction Station and arranged that he should be sent, irrespective of the Sector's certificate, to the Station Hospital at Fort Jay for their observation and final determination. He was sent to Fort Jay and kept at the Hospital for three days. He was rejected not on the certificates submitted, but as I was informed on the opinion of the continuous on duty at that hospital.

- I checked the findings with the Chief Medical Officer afterwards because in view of the complaints our efforts were all directed toward having him accepted.
- # Further information can be had by you, of course, by looking up his records at Fort Jay Hospital."

It will be noted that reference is made to certain of the aforementioned communications and various complaints received at Selective Service Headquarters relative to subject DANNY KAYE. It was noted, however, there were no written complaints in the file and these complaints would ordinarily be attached to the file which was reviewed by the writer.

From the contents of Colonel KOPETZKY'S letter, it was noted that the findings of the army at the Fort Jay Military Hospital were 57C arrived at independently of the findings submitted by Dr. JANET MCKENZIE RICCH, who is the subject's personal physician, and it appears she was engaged by the subject immediately subsequent to the successful passing of his pre-induction physical examination on September 27, 1943.

It will be further noted that there is no indication in the correspondence reviewed at Selective Service Headquarters that subject was malingering, nor any question as to whether or not the army physicians either at the Grand Central Induction Station or at the Fort Jay Military Hospital were duped by KATE,

Lieutenant COMMISKET provided writer with the medical scratch sheets reflecting that a pre-induction and induction examination were given the subject September 27 and October 30, 1943 respectively.

These scratch sheets were reviewed and in connection with the scratch sheet dated September 27, 1943 entitled Pre-induction Physical Examination, it was noted that all items bearing numbers 39 through 59 were marked normal or negative with the exception of item 50, which bears the following notation: "Musculo-skeletal - History of backache for past several years - clinically N.D." It will be noted that the notation "M.D." as used by Induction Station Authorities means non-deferable. Marked in a blue stamp on this scratch sheet is the notation "accepted."

Under item entitled "Furlough Stamp" the following notation was observed:

- "1. Set of 221 Forms
 - 2. Medical letters of Dr. Weller
- 2. Letters of transmittal
- 1. X-ray films."

The reverse side of this scratch sheet, it was noted, was not filled in, but attached to the reverse side was a white paper entitled "Report of X-ray Examinations", dated September 27, 1943, and stamped



"IRVING I. LOMHOFF, lat Lieut., Medical Corps, Chief Roentgemologist." From the contents of this x-ray report, it was apparent that an x-ray examination had been conducted of the lung area of subject DAHEY KAYE. This report is not quoted but it is suffice to say that the examining physician made the notation "F.D." on this x-ray report.

Also attached to the scratch sheet was another paper bearing the notation "L-ray of Lumbar Spine". This report sets forth the results of x-ray examination of the lumbar region of subject DANNY KAYE and the notation "N.D." "Dependent upon orthopedist's spinion," was noted thereon.

Attached to this scratch sheet were the following documents.

1. Letter dated September 24, 1943 on the letterhead of ALEXANDER L. WELLER, M.D., 421 Bradford Street, Brooklyn, New York, and signed by Dr. WELLER.

This is to certify that Mr. Danny Keye has been under treatment for about 10 years. At times there has been loss of weight and elevation of temperature. X-ray shows old fibrotic tuerroular lesion of right spex.

"About four years ago following a fall, there was a fracture of the coccyx with dislocation associated with coccygsdynia. There are recurrent attacks of pain over the coccyx which was aggravated by another fall a short time ago."

2. Another document attached to this medical scratch sheet was dated September 26, 1943 on the letterhead of Dr. MAX DANNENBERG, 1466 Eastern Parkway, Brooklyn, New York, and was signed by Dr. DANNENBERG.

My dear Doctor:

- Examination of the chest of Danny Kaye shows the heart to be of normal size and contour. The hila are the seat of a lymphatel thickening and nodulation and the root branches are accentuated.

deposits are also noted in the left mid-pulmonic field.





Grand Central Palace was the big store of the draft, the plant in which "all the different groups" as Eleanor the Great, with lofty objectivity, refers to the lower orders of the human race, were stripped to nakedness and, in this dignified condition, answered freedom's call.

ANNOUNCER

talked to a great many officials in Washington. What statement do you care to make at this time?

HUMPHREY BOGART

All the way across the country we had heard that the Washington press was very tough, tremendously intelligent and very tough, and we realized that in coming to Washington we were going to have a difficult time making our mission quite clear

We were amazed to find out when we got there that 95% of the Washington press thought as we did. They were just wonderful. There were about 5% of the press which would think always the same way, no matter how long you talked to them. I discount those.



Well, I officially would like to say that I'm not in sympathy with Communism and I don't like it. But after witnessing the conduct of the hearing, I was really amazed and a little bit frightened by it, and I felt all through the...both the hearings that I witnessed, that every American man, woman and child should be there to see what was going on and see the way it was being conducted and the way I felt the Bill of Rights was being abused.

ANNOUNCER

Thank you very much for your opinion. (U)

Mr. BACALL, do you have something else to say: W)

HUMPHREY BOGART

No, I'm just obliging a photographer at the moment.

ANNOUNCER

DANNYKAYE is in the room. I wonder if I could talk to him for just a moment.

DANNY KAYE

Oh, fine! Does that have anything to do with Constitutional rights? U

ANNOUNCER

No, I'm afraid it doesn't. We just wanted to welcome you here to Philadelphia.

DANNY KAYE, what's your opinion of the Un-American activities...the hearings going on in Washington?

DANNY KAYE

for just a minute. I was a member of a group that was present at the hearings one morning, and the industry, of which I am very proud to be a member, was constantly smeared and attacked as being Communist-led, Communist-dominated, Communist-infested, which in turn makes us seem like complete fools.

So I would like to put this question to you ladies and gentlemen listening right this moment: Have you seen and enjoyed any of the pictures we have made? Have you ever read a line or heard a line, or seen any overt act? Have you ever left the theatre thinking that perhaps you might like the form of government that was being portrayed on the screen better than the American form of government?

Actually, your voices are what we need. You are the ones who are supposed to tell the people who are running this Committee that you don't believe that what you are seeing in pictures is Communist—dominated, or acts of Communists, or that they are trying to overthrow the government. We are not doing that in the motion picture industry. We are very proud of our industry being a clean, wholesome entertainment, and we'd like to hear your voices on it agreeing with us in that matter.

ANNOUNCER

Thank you very much, DANNY KAYE.

I understand that BOHN HOUSTON, the spokesman for this group, is in the room. I wonder if he'd care to make comment this morning. Mr. HOUSTON?

JOHN HOUSTON

We came to Mashington as moving picture people who were very worried ab out a danger they felt their professions were in. We are coming away from Washington as Americans who are deeply disturbed that their rights as citizens are being violated.

We saw in many instances the rights guaranteed by our Constitution violated in the investigation that's taking place at this time.

ANNOUNCER

Thank you very much, Mr. HOUSTON.

And now here's another famous Hollywood personality — one of the great actors of the screen, Mr. PAUD HENREID, who would have something to say at this time. Mr. HENREID?

PAUL HENREID

I don't think it can be repeated enough that we came to Washington as citizens of the United States of America, not to attack any person or group of persons, and not to defend any person or group of persons. We came there to witness the hearings and come to our own conclusions, and be reaffirmed in the belief that our Constitution, our Bill of Rights, has been invaded seriously.

ANNOUNCER

Thank you very much, Mr. HENREID

I see GENE WELLY here in the room. I wonder if he wouldn't step over for just a moment and say, "Hello" to the Philadelphia audience.

GENE KELLY, I'd like to say before I ask you to say something that we're all very sorry here in Philadelphia to read in the papers and hear over the radio about your hurt ankle. How are you coming along with it?

GENE KELLY

Just fine. Thank you very much. Philadelphia is practically a second home to me, so I feel very much at home here on your radio. I was married in Philadelphia, born in Pittsburgh, and of course first saw the light of day...well, we'll let that go.

Like another song-and-dance man, a much greater song-and-dance man years ago said, "I wonder what's all the shootin' fur?" As Mr. KAYE has remarked, it's pretty hard to find any propaganda in pictures, mainly because the motion picture industry is such a large one, and it needs to make pictures which are box office successes. You can't make a picture for entertainment that the American public will accept and inject any propaganda in it. So I think so far, we're pretty safe.

Thank you.

ANNOUNCER

Thank you very much, GENE.

Now I see Mr. and Mrs. STERLING BEYDEN are in the room. I wonder if they wouldn't step forward and talk with us for just a moment. Here's STERLING HAYDEN now coming up to our microphone here at the Southwest Airport in Philadelphia.

Mr. HAYDEN, what are your comments, please?

STERLING HAIDEN

our minds on the basic principal issue. In any political discussion with our friends, we always get off on all sorts of tangents. That's why I would like to point out that the issue involved here is not one of Communism. It is one of the right of every American to think as he chooses. That is guaranteed to us under the Bill of Rights.

And now I see MARSHA WINT here in the room. I wonder if she wouldn't oblige us by coming forward and giving her views on this very important matter.

Miss HUNT?

MARSHA HUNT

Thank you.

It seems to me that many of you listeners may well be confused about these issues which are being so loudly discussed on both sides, and perhaps we can clear up something for you by telling you our position about this.

You may wonder why, if Communism is a dangerous threat to our national security, why we seem to be in a position of objecting to some of the procedure of the Committee that is investigating this very movement in our country. It's our feeling that the cart is before the horse. If Communism is as dangerous as we are told, and it may well be...this is not our authority to decide...then surely the proper authorities, such as the FBI, should be appointed by the government to arrive at this, and if it is this dangerous, then it must be outlawed. We feel it should be outlawed before reputations are put at stake, and people's lives and jobs are jeopardized through only being suspected of belonging to a party which is at this moment still a legal party. And we feel that the order has been reversed rather shamefully for the publicity for a government's group.

ANNOUNCER

Thank you very much, MARSHA HUNT.

As we all know, ladies and gentlemen, thus far this morning we've heard only from the actors' part of the Hollywood profession. We have here one of the famous Hollywood writers with us, Mr. PHILLIPYDUNN, and I'd like to have his viewpoint this morning.

Mr. DUNA?

PHILLIP DUNN

As a writer I'm particularly conscious that one of the big jobs the American motion picture industry has is to present the American way of life to peoples

overseas. There's a great deal of competition in the world and there are many ideologies, and we feel that Democracy is the best way and the only way.

Now, how do you think somebody in Europe reacts when we make a picture talking about Democracy, and they hear from our House Committee of the Congress of the United States that this picture is subversive and Communistic? And how does it help us when by their activity in nullifying the Bill of Rights, they are giving all our enemies, the people who don't like us overseas, the chance to say, "What's the difference?".

ANNOUNCER

Thank you very much, Mr. PHILLIP DUNN.

Miss EVELYN KEYES is in the room. I'd like to go back to one of the betterknown actresses in Hollywood for just a moment.

Miss KEYES, what's your opinion of the Un-American activities affair going on now in Washington?

EVELYN KEYES

Well, what I would like to do is ask all of you to join us in this fight because an attack on the screen is an attack on you, too, the American people, and if they succeed in what they are trying to do, next will be the radio, the newspapers, the pulpit and even into our homes. Please join us. Write your Congressman, or write to us in care of the Committee for the First Amendament, Hollywood, California. Now remember that — the Committee for the First Amendament, Hollywood, California. For after all, in all due respect to Congressional committees, civil liberties do come first.

ANNOUNCER

Thank you very, very much, EVELYN KEYES.

I'd like to ask Miss JANE WYATT, another one of the lovely Hollywood actresses, if she wouldn't care to make a statement at this time.

JANE WYATT

Well, I might say a few words about patriotism. I'm very proud of my country, and I'm proud that one of my ancestors, Robert Livingstone, was one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. And one of the things that make me most proud of America is the position that she holds in regard...in the eyes of the rest of the world. Now I'd like to read you something from the "Lady Observer", which is one of the most conservative and one of the greatest of the British newspapers: "The Investigating Committee of the American Congress threatens the freedoms which are the secret of America's greatness". Now, if freedom is the secret of our greatness, and I believe that

it is, let's fight for that freedom.

ANNOUNCER

And there you have the statements by a number of film personalities, transcribed exclusively by WIP's Special Events Department, as the Hollywood-bound TWA plane stopped at Southwest Airport in Philadelphia at 10:23 this morning.


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The Freedom From Fear Committee published a four-page brochure entitled, "Today...Hollywood, Tomorrow...The Whole Country...Is it good for the Jews?"

The brochure starts off, "In Hollywood today things are happening that are bad for the Jews. And, as the world learned to its bitter cost, what is bad for the Jews is bad for the majority of people everywhere. What began in Munich as crackpot anti-Semitism ended with the slaughter of 35,000,000 people."

In part, the brochure states, who are these ten men who are being persecuted? Some are Jews, some Catholics and Protestants. Yet, it is a coincidence that every one of these Americans has either written, produced, directed or acted in motion pictures that attacked racism, and honorably pictured minorities as human beings deserving equal rights and equal consideration.

After discussing some of the screen credits of the ten witnesses, the brochure continues, "When SAMUEL ORNITZ tried to raise the question of anti-Semitism, many newspapers claimed that Mr. ORNITZ dragged this question into the hearings, but three weeks later Representative RANKIN dragged it out into the open. On November 24, 1947, when asking Congress to indict the ten Hollywood liberal artists, he read a list of names of actors and actresses who had protested the action of the Thomas-Rankin Committee. He said, 'I want to read you some of these names; JUNE/HAVOC - her real name is JUNE/HOVICK; DARNY KAYE - his real name is DAVID DANIEL TAMINSKY. Another one is EDDIE CANTOR, whose real name is EDWARD ISKOWITZ, and he went down the line with EDWARD G-ROBINSON and MELVYN DOUGLAS."

Later, the following sentence appears: "Did the Thomas Committee attack these men because of their political acts? Of course. But, these political acts are acts of tolerance, of concern for the welfare of the people, of progressive thought. These are not acts of subversion."

The brochure cites THOMAS MANN who, speaking of the Committee's methods, said, "That's how it started in Germany. What followed was Fascism and what followed Fascism was war!"



Club Women Aroused

To give you a clear, but by no means a complete picture of how deeply the Commies have entrenched themselves in Hollywood, I will go back to the day after they forced the closing of "Thieves Paradise" last New Year's Eve: I was preparing to leave for New York when a prominent Club woman called me on the phone and asked me to hold my departure in abeyance for a few days—she was very anxious to have me meet a group of Presidents of Women's Clubs and tell them exactly what had happened. She told me how she had been fighting Communism in Hollywood for 20 years-and what an uphili fight it had been. Of course, I promptly agreed to meet with her—and help, if I could. When I met these women i was deeply moved by their grand and unselfish Americanism. They urged me to re-open "Thieves Paradise" right here in Hollywood in deflance of the Reds—and they promised me the support of the full membership of their Clubs. I hesitated. I had just been thru a very tough and grueling experience—and i knew how much tougher it would be to re-open. They continued to urge me-and then proposed to hold a luncheon meeting two weeks later at which they would assemble at least another hundred presidents of other Women's clubs who would also support the re-opening-and make that re-opening the breach into the Red stronghold. I agreed to listen some more. Now I come to my most startling discovery-of how the Studio heads themselves actually protect the Communists in the industry.

Reign of Terror in Hollywood

They had asked me to get a Movie "celebrity" to attend this meeting— to speak on "Communism in Hollywood." Preferably one of those men who had gone to Washington to appear before the Thomas Committee. I spoke to at least a dozen men, all old friends, men who had worked in my plays and pictures—and all staunch Americans. One by one, they all "reluctantly" turned me down, it puzzled me. Finally one of them gave me the true reason for all these turndowns.

Shortly after that the Thomas investigation fizzled out, and the "friendly witnesses" returned from Washington, a strict but secret order had grapevined its way thru all the Agents' offices that anybody, no matter how big a personality, who would dare to talk about Communism in the Motion Picture Industry would be blacklisted out of Hollywood! This statement came from a star who commands \$100,000 per picture! At this time I won't mention his name because if I do he will be through. But I am willing. if called upon, to give that name in strict confidence to J. Edgar Hoover. However, I could hardly believe what I heard. I immediately put the question to one of the Studio heads and, after I pledged myself not to divulge his name, he confirmed that statement, and then proceeded to vindicate that stand by the "Gods of the Industry." He pointed out that Studios had millions of dollars invested in such stars as Katherine Hepburn, Gene Kelley, John Garfield, Myrna Loy, etc., etc., whose values would be destroyed if their names were publicly linked with Communium.

Movie Colony Founded on Reds

"Do you mean to tell me," I demanded, "that the Louis B. Mayers, the Harry Warners, the Schenks and the David Selznicks are deliberately fostering Communium in the picture industry—and allowing those rats to poison the minds of our youth just to save their lousy dollars?"

"Oh, no!" replied this executive, "but we are in a tough spot which you can't seem to understand. We have a great many brilliant minds in our industry, great actors, great writers, great directors. It's true, unfortunately, that some are communistically inclined, but we could not survive without them."

"Well, my friend," I retorted, "all I can say is that if the motion picture industry cannot survive without these rate, then the motion picture industry has no right to survive."

At this point I will show you just how far these Studio heads go to protect these "communistically inclined" enemies of America—and, in turn, punish others for their Americanism.

This Bureau's files reflect that an article published in the newspaper "PM" on July 15, 1945, quoted lylvia Fine, wife of Danny Kaye, as stating that Danny Kaye as treasurer of the Hollywood Section of the Independent litizens Committee of the Arts, Sciences, and Professions and that Sylvia was an Executive Board member.

The Independent Citizens Committee of the Arts, Sciences, and Professions has been cited as a communist front by the Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities in a report dated April 18, 1949.



In September, 1945, a serious race disturbance developed at the Freebel High School in Gary, Indiana,

caused by serious friction between the Negro and white students at the school. In order to counteract the action of the white students in refusing to attend classes, the Chicage Office of the American Youth for Democracy organized a special rally at Orchestra Hall in Chicage, at which Danny Kaye appeared as the principal speaker. It should be noted that the American Touth for Democracy has been eited by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The "Daily People's Werld," in the issue of September 26, 1945, carried an article reflecting that the Fall senester of the Hellywood Branch of the People's Educational Center opened on September 24, 1945, and that the emphasis of the teaching program would be upon peace and postuar problems and new cultural horizons. Particular publicity was given to the motion picture industry which had brought before the students film personalities, among whom was Danny Kaye. It is noted that the "Daily People's World" was a west coast daily communist publication and the People's Educational Center has been designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

"The Washington Post" of October 27, 1947, contained a statement of the Committee for the First Amendment which protested "the continuing attempt of the House Committee on Un-American Activities to smear the motion picture industry." Among those signing this statement was Danny Kaye.

The Committee for the First Amendment has been cited by the California Committee on Un-American Activities in its 1948 Report as follows: "A recently created Communist front in the defense of Communists and Communist fellow travelers. Its immediate purpose is to create favorable public opinion for the Communists who refused to testify before the House Committee on Un-American Activities in Washington, D. C."

The "Daily Worker," dated October 30, 1947, contained a newe article concerning a "Step Censorship" meeting which was to be held on October 30, 1947, at the International Theater, Columbus Circle, New York City. The purpose of this meeting, according to the article, was to protest the "House Un-American" hearings which were being conducted in Washington, D. C. The article continued to state that at this meeting there

would be a playback of the "Civil Liberties" breadcast made from Hellywood on the previous Sunday in which movie store spoke on behalf of the witnesses who had been subpoended to testify before the House Committee on Un-American Activities. The article stated that, this breadcast included Danny Kaye. The "Daily Worker" was east coast communist newspaper which suspended publication on January 13, 1958.

on Nevember 9, 1947, contained a news article concerning a radio show put on the previous Sunday by the Committee for the First Amendment, which breadcast pretested the methods of the House Un-American Activities Committee. This article stated that Danny Kaye told of his trip to Washington with the 26 members of the Committee for the First Amendment.

According to the "Daily People's World," San Francisco, California, dated June 9, 1949, Danny Kaye was among those cited by the California Senate Committee on Un-American Activities as "typical of the individuals within the various Stalinist orbits about whose activities and Stalinist programs and causes, this Committee has presented factual reports or has taken sworm evidence."

The "Daily Worker" of April 13, 1951, page 11, contained a column entitled "Why Are They Silent Today?" which was written by David Platt. In this column Platt mentioned that during 1947 the Committee for the First Amendment was formed and the representatives of the Committee went to Washington, D.C., where they presented a petition for "Redress of Grievances" to the Clerk of the House of Representatives in which it was charged that the investigative function of the House Committee on Un-American Activities had been "perverted from fair and importial procedures to unfair, partial, and prejudiced methods." It was pointed out that numerous individuals signed this petition and among names listed was that of Danny Kaye. Platt, in his article, wanted to know why these people were silent at the present time.

It is noted that in April, 1951, the House Committee on Un-American Activities was conducting additional hearings concerning communism in the motion picture industry.

The "New York Daily News" of April 27, 1951, reported that on the preceding day a Step Communism Committee was launched in order to fight against "Red Influence in the Entertainment



World." This Committee was formed under the auspices of J. Joseph Smith, New York Commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the group was to held a loyalty festival featuring more than 150 movie, stage, and television people, the day after the loyalty parade spensored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars. The festival was to be held in Central Park and the stars scheduled to participate in the anticommunist rally included Danny Kays.

In 1951, Danny Kaye was a participant in an anticommunist rally in New York City.

This Bureau conducted a limited Selective Service investigation concerning Danny Raye, known also as Daniel Raye and David Kaminsky, in August, 1944. This investigation was predicated upon receipt of information from two sources who alleged that Danny Kaye, the wellknown stage comedian, simulated a which caused him to be rejected for service under the Selective Service Act.

our inquiry developed the fact that kaye successfully passed his pre-induction physical examination on September 27, Subsequently:

Kaye was unfit for military service. Kaye was processed for induction in the latter part of October, 1945. The Induction Station authorities

ordered him for observation to a military hospital. After three days of observation in the military hospital Army doctors advised that Kaye was for military duty.

The facts of the investigation were presented to the United States Attorney in the Eastern District of New York who declined prosecution.

Subsequent information appearing in our investigative file reveals that Kaye had affiliation with communist activities in several communist front groups. He had appeared before the American Youth For Democracy, an organization which has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450. He had expressed himself publicly as critical of the House Committee on Un-American Activities. He participated as a fund raiser and was a member of the group who flew to Washington to protest the action of the House Committee on Un-American Activities against the "Hollywood Ten." The "Hollywood Ten." consisted of a group of actors and writers who were cited by a congressional committee as being subversive and/or members of the Communist Party.



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
