



speculative market. In too many instances his sole hope of survival lay in the exploitation of the labor of the worker and his family. Gradually the worker's portion grew less, his debts accumulated. A custom arose that he was bound to the soil he worked so long as he was in debt to the landlord. So with misery and malnutrition peonage came to the South.



And peonage has persisted. The economic and social causes which produced it are still present. The interests which profit from a fixed, cheap labor supply are sufficiently powerful to have established in the law that no agricultural worker in the South may move from his county with the help of federal funds unless he has the consent of the County Extension Agent, appointee of the big planters. And through the poll tax, which disenfranchices almost the whole of the Negro and poor-white posulation, these same interests enforce political to sofence on the wretched

Theirs is a point of darkness which creates

the moral climate in which alone the crime of Albert Sydney Johnson is possible. Their policy is administered through control of local gov ernments, the school system, and ofttimes the press and pulpit. It is a policy which fosters strife between the poor white and the Negro and which makes primary education as meager as possible; a policy which withholds the vote from more than 2,000,000 young men of the sharecropper country defending America's cause on world battlefields.

The crime of Albert Sydney Johnson is but a small thing. For all around it a vast crime is being committed which is the more horrible in that its victims are a whole population; it is the meaner since it is committed without risk. It is the social crime which brings ignorance and poverty and disease to 9,000,000 fellow-Americans. The guilty are Congressmen and editors. bankers and plantation-owners and businessmen; all those who profit from the degradation of a people, and all those who stand silently by. Even you and I.



The trial of Albert Sydney Johnson reveals the likeness of an America hidden in the ravines and morasses where the light of our civilization penetrates but dimly. It is another America than the one we know-it is the America more than 9,000,000 men, women and children of the sharecropper country know only too well.

In the year 1944, in the midst of a great world struggle to determine whether men may live in freedom, a powerful landowner has enforced the serfdom of free-born Americans who work his lands. It is merely incidental that this man has been brought to justice. The important fact is that the moral climate exists in this country which permits the assertion of the right of the master by one and submission in the role of the serf by mary.

- How can this be?

The antecedents of this crime go back to post-Civil War days. On the one hand were the landless freed slave and the penniless returned soldier; on the other hand, the bankrupt, burnedout landowner. Their sole source of productive wealth was the land. Between them they reached an accommodation: the worker to till the landlord's soil, the crop to be shared. Thus sharecropping began in America as a beneficent arrangement, fair to both the toiler and the landlord.

With the decades the old equitable relationship withered and died. The landlord was ground stween the millstones of a wasting soil and a

In 1934 a small group of sharecroppers came together. They assailed the conditions of Southern agriculture which were making serfs of free men. Out of their discussions grew a program for joint action. Thus the Southern Tenant Farmers Union was born.







Here in this great land with its bright promise for the future, there is a corner where hides all that is dark, dwarfed and misshapen in our civilization. Away from the beaten track, hidden from all save those possessed of the courage to face the truth, 9,000,000 Americans of the Sharecropper Country live in a state of political and economic serfdom. They are the victims of a system which has brought low all who live by it—tenants and landlords, laborers and managers, sharecroppers and plantation owners. Those condemned to live in misery and those doomed to live off the miserable. Starved diseased lives, illiteracy, twisted minds which are the soil of fascism—these are the bitter fruits of the Sharecropper Country.

These people are the stepchildren of our democracy. Their crime—they are guilty of having inherited a soil impoverished by generations of thriftless cash-crop cultivation. Their punishment—they are caught in the toils of an antiquated sys-

tem of landholding which creates virtual political and economic serfs out of its toilers.

Men and women of native stock do not willingly live in despair. In 1934 a small group of share-croppers met near Marked Tree, Arkansas. There they denounced their serfdom and issued a Program of Action looking toward their political and economic emancipation. For the building of their new lives they joined together—Negro and white—in the Southern Tenant Farmers Union.

Those who lived off a people in chains and did not see that they themselves were thereby slaves, fought against this new chancipation proclamation. They fought with he appeald weapons of evictions from the land, chara-ganes, mob violence and fynchings. They sought to refet their old chains upon 9,000,000 Americans presessed of a new viscon of a life of freedom and so urite.

NATIVE STOCK STRUGGLING TO WIN A STAKE IN DEMOCRACY

Once men have seen that vision, it does not die. The Southern Tenant Farmers Union has grown. The men and women who made it are struggling to reestablish their dignity as human beings and to ensure a decent livelihood through a democratic program of minimum wages, soil conservation projects, adequate rural housing, abolition of the poll tax, and anti-lynching legislation. They ask to be admitted to a share in the ordering of their lives through a government in which they will have a voice and a vote.

We are all equally guilty, so long as these Americans live in tarkness and despair. They are a part of America, part for whose fate we share a heavy responsibility. While they struggle courageously against good adds to achieve for themselves and their children a stake in our denomacy, THEY ART NO 1 DROOTTEN.



SCEF BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING JUNE 11, 1960, AT ATLANTA, GEORGIA, OR MASHVILLE, TENNESSEE

On May 2, 1960, Confidential Informant NO T-1 advised that the next SCEF Board of Directors meeting was being planned for June 11, 1960, at either Atlanta, Georgia, or Nashville, Tennessee, and that JIM POMBROWSKI was polling the board members to determine which of these two cities was preferred for the meeting.

SCEW RECEPTION, NEW YORK, NEW YORK, MARCH 22, 1960

In April, 1960,

advised that an SCEF reception held at this hotel on March 22, 1960, between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m., was arranged for by Reverend WILLIAM MOMARD MELISH (a paid SCEF worker in the New York City area) to accommodate some 280 guests although slightly less than that number were actually present.

Stated that various individuals, not further identified, reviewed activities of the SCEF and appealed for funds.

Page 4 of the May, 1960, issue of "The Southern Patriot," official monthly publication of the SCEF, contains an article concerning the above-mentioned SCEF recoption reflecting that SCEF leaders and Mrs. ELEANOR ROOSEVELT were guests at this reception. According to this article, Mrs. ROOSEVELT, in an address to the gathering, commended the current student movement, urged people in the North to give full backing to Southern Negroes and to their white supporters who "under great difficulty have often stood above," and also asked Northerners not to be "complacent" about conditions at home.



Confidential Informant T-3 advised that the Labor Canteen has been continuing regularly in operation but that the feeling has been expressed that the Industrial Union Council meetings should give more publicity to the Canteen in order to increase the number of armed service men that attend. In line with this effect to obtain more publicity the first birthday party of the Labor Canteen was field in early March and was attended by Mrs. ELEANCR ROOSEVELT, Congressman COHN M. COFFEE of Washington, and Congresswoman HELEN GANAGEN DOUGLAS of California. This celebration was given considerable publicity in the March 9, 1945, issue of the Federal Record, official publication of the American Federation of Labor, CIO. This acticle included a picture of the aforementioned three celebrities, taken at the Labor Canteen.

According to Confidential Informant T-4, the activities of the RECYTATION Committee have been confined principally to the distribution of literature. Enclosed with this report is a copy of the pamphlet furnished by this informant. It is entitled "Equal Justice Under Law" and is published by the Committee for Equal Justice for Mrs. RECY TAYLOR, Room 204, 112 East 19th Street, New York. It is noted on the back of the pamphlet the reader is urged to send letters, telegrams, resolutions to the Governor of Alabams, and financial contributions to HULAW JACK, Tressurer, Room 204, 112 East 19th Street, New York 3, New York.

Confidential Informant T-5 advised that the CIO Local 1136 is the United Retail, Woolessle, and Department Store of America—CIO, which is the shee workers union, withdrew from the Maryland-District of Columbia Industrial Union Council in protest against the policies of SIDNEY KATZ, the Secretary-Treasurer of the Council. This withdrawal was in protest to the Communist policies of SIDNEY KATZ. In this connection it should be pointed out that the Maryland-District of Columbia Industrial Union Council is a separate antity from the Washington Industrial Union Council, nevertheless, there is a connection inasmuch as the affiliates of the Washington Industrial Union Council automatically become affiliates of the Maryland-District of Columbia Industrial Union Council.

According to Confidential Informant T-6 this particular local has never been active in the Industrial Union Council and FRANCES GLOUDE, its president, is practically the only one who has ever put in an appearance. Although this local withdrew from the Maryland-District of Columbia IUC early in March, according to Confidential Informant T-6, GLOUDE attended the March limits meeting of the Washington Industrial Union Council.

According to Confidential Informant T-7, the Cafeteria Workers of America; Local 471 of the UFWA had the impression that GLOUDE's union was endeavoring to enter into the cafeteria field.

Herewith is a summary of information pertinent to the subject cokshop as made available by Confidential Informant whose identity is known to the Bureau, for the period October 15 through 21, 1943, inclusive.

Informant advised that the Eleventh ward Branch of the Communist Party of Baltimore convened at subject bookshop, at which time the National Anthem was played to open the meeting.

It was announced that ALEX E. O. AURSELL, Treasurer of the Comsumist Party of Maryland, who is presently attending Cornell University
taking some additional graduate work, would return to Baltimore in time
for the next branch meeting. With regard to a meeting to be held at Club
Convoy, 1630 Bank Street, on October 19, 1943, at which BOYCHUDSON (National
Office) was scheduled to speak, it was made known that admittance could be
gained only by membership card. The program of the various branches in
registering all members has apparently bogged down, and the necessity of
completing this project was emphasized and members were urged to contact
individuals on their lists personally.

DOROTHY ROSE BLUMBERG, Administrative Secretary of the City Committee of the Communist Party of Baltimore, explained that the effort made by the Party to combat the rise of prices through an organized price control program at the Price Control Center, the Frederick Douglass Bookshop, had exhausted itself due to members' failure to show interest in the work and to expend their energies along this line.

One SMOTHERS (phonetic), otherwise unknown to the informant, discussed the sale of the "Daily Worker" and impressed his audience with the thought that they should interest customers with the contents of the paper in an attempt to increase subscriptions. By so doing this would tend to interest customers in Party work and possibly provide fertile grounds for recruiting members.

It was revealed during the course of conversation between Mrs. VERANHATCHETT, colored, co-proprietress of subject bookshop, and TILLIE TRIEDENBERG, Corresponding Secretary of the Fourteenth Ward Branch of the Communist Party of Baltimore, that over 180 tickets had been sold for the dance sponsored by the Fourteenth Ward Branch to be held October 23, 1943, at the colored Odd Fellows' Hall. At this time it was brought forth that an unknown member of the Party visited Bethlehem-Key Highway Shipyards recently and distributed copies of EARL BROWDER'S recent Chicago speech. This individual attracted a large number of patronizers with the following sales talk: "Read what Earl Browder actually said and not the Hearst papers lies."



DOROTHY ROSE BLULBERG discussed with a group of Fourth District members of the Communist Party an article appearing in the "Daily Worker" on October 20, 1943, wherein DOXEY A MILKERSON, colored, Vice-Chairman of District #34 of the Communist Party, discussed Mrs. ELEANOR ROOSEVELT'S recent article, "If I Were A Negro," which appeared in a recent issue of the "Negro Digest." WILKERSON'S criticism of the article, according to Mrs. PLUITERG, was that Mrs. ROOSEVELT was too soft and he subsequently pointed out the necessity for carrying out the negro struggle for immediate equality. WILKERSON, in addition, had pointed out the rapid rise of the negro in the last decade and their important role in the Labor movement. At the conclusion of the discussion, it was set forth that the United States is not as cognizant of the ability of the negro people as other countries, such as the Bahamas, where a negro has been appointed as Special Prosecutor in the demonstrate case.

The foregoing constitutes the gist of the information as furnished this office by Confidential Informant for the aforestated period.



On August 4, 1961, a reliable source attended an organizational meeting of the Bay area FPCC held at 150 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco, California. At this meeting (previously described) announced that

At this SWP National Convention, NY T-13 informed, THOMAS KERRY who is in charge of the SWP work in the FPCC, made the opening national report. KERRY gave a complete history of the founding of the FPCC and of the SWP's work in the FPCC up until the time of the Cuban invasion by the counter-revolutionaries. He told of the many attempts of the Stalkhiats to get the SWP out of the FPCC and of the failure of the attempt by the CP.

REFRY, according to the source, said that the SWP now enjoys the greatest reputation for defense of the Cuban Revolution in the FPCC and that as a result a whole group of people are now moving toward the SWP who would never have done so in the past. He said that this group of people he referred to is representative not only of redicals and ex-radicals but of new young people on college campuses and in unions who have been radicalized by the events in Cuba since the recent invasion of Cuba.

KERRY pointed out, however, that a new problem has arisen since the invasion. He said that now nationally the FPCC is divided on the question of how to best serve the aims for which the FPCC was founded. He explained that there are many liberals of the ELEANOR ROOSEVELT type who believe that FPCC work should be confined to activities in the United States for the prevention of intervention and aggression in Cuba by the United States. He said that this group feels that in this way the FPCC can appeal to more and more liberals as well as educated intellectuals and that the FPCC would, therefore, have a wider influence.

KERRY went on to say that the position of the CP in this matter is not too clear. There are indications, he said, that the CP supports this position in principle but that many of the ranks of CP periphery and ex-CP members who are of a more militant nature go along with the SWP and the others within the FPCC who favor a complete defense of Cuba with its form of Government and not just to fight against intervention.

KERRY further pointed out, according to NY T-13, that there is also criticism as to the lack of democracy in the organizational set-up of the FPCC and the complete subservience of FPCC members to the Executive Committee which is dominated by RICHARD GIBSON and ROBERT TABER.

An article in the Jersey Observer, Jersey City, New Jersey, on March 21, 1945, reported on an F.E.P.C. hearing held by the New Jersey Assembly Judiciary Committee on March 20, 1945, at Trenton, New Jersey. F.E.P.C. Bills which had been introduced in the State Legislature by Assemblyman JAMES OF THE MEWARK negro physician, and a Republican, were discussed. JAMES REPORT, JR., President of the Trenton Committee for Unity, suggested seven amendments to the Hill Bills. There were the same amendments already proposed by DR. FRANK KINGDON, Head of the N.J. I.C.L., and supported author of F.E.P.C. Fills sponsored by Senator JCHN Le ICRRISSEY of Camden County and Assemblyman CHAPLES REMARKED of Mercer County, Democrats. At the hearing, MANUEL AND spoke for the Communist Political Association of the consequences that would be felt at the ballot box.

OFIC ANSTROM of Trenton, New Jersey, Organizer for the Eastern Division of the National Farmers Union, and JAMES IMBRIE of Trenton, Executive Director of the N.J. I.C.L., supported KERNEY'S stand at the hearing.

On November 6, 1945, the following article appeared in the Newark Evening News:

TALK HERE THUPSDAY BY MRS. RCCSEVELT

*MRS. ELEANCR'RECSEVELT will speak on 'The Responsibilities of the Individual Citizen in a Democracy' at Essex House Thursday. The dinner-meeting will mark the opening of a campaign by the New Jersey Indopendent Citizens' League and the National Citizens' Political Action Committee for the 1946 Congressional election.

"The two groups plan to indorse candidates in the Congressional, Gubernatorial and Senatorial elections and for this purpose will drive to unite independent and liberal Democratic and Republican voters, according to UALES LABRIE, the league's executive director.

"Other speakers will be ELMER A BENSEN, former Governor of """ nesota, and DR. FRANK KINGDON and CEL GROSS, league chairman and executive bond member respectively."

In another article entitled, "Famous Personalities Greet the Soviet Thion Through the Morning Preiheit," it was stated that Mrs. TROCSEVELT and RABBI MISE, workers leaders, politicians, artists and others, called for unity of the Big Three and friendship between imerica and the Soviet Union to guarantee world freedom.

Another article entitled "Republicans Control Congress; ALP Gets 15.000 Yotes", stated that workers in progressive forces in New York maintain important positions and attain their objective — Wallace calls upon progressives not to become downhearted and says that the Democratic Party must become progressive or it will be wiped out — Senator Pepper sees difficult times under depublican Congress and obligates himself to carry on a strongerfight against reaction — Wall Street celebrates victory of reaction with "shear the sheep" demonstration and a grash of stocks — Truman Byrnes policy played into the lands of the Republicans in the election.

Other articles dealt with the Palestine situation, The Somi-Autonomous legion of Birobidian, a Great Feoples Meeting with Senry Vallace, Wallace in Los Angles, the New Soviet Five Tear Plan, Sixty Tears on the Jewish Stage, and contribution to Batlonalistic Presdom and many others praising various and sundry activities in the Soviet Union. Still others dealt with the political and economic situation in Europe in one of which the American Army was accused of having closed the mouths of anti-Fascista and/encouraging the east stage of the south of anti-Fascista and/encouraging the east stage.

On December 13, 1943, a "Grand African Dance Festival" was held, sponsored by the African Academy of Arts and Research, at Carnegie Hall, New York. The speakers were Mrs. ELEA-OF ROOSEVELT and Mrs. MART MCLEOD SETHUNE.

Confidential Informant advised that the Megro Labor Victory Committee was working with the African Academy of Arts and Research in putting on this festival. He stated that there were a number of Communist Party members in attendance at the Festival and that they worked in selling tickets and the like at Carnegie Hall, but that other than this, they took no active part in the affair.

A review of the files in the New York Field Division disclosed that a meeting was held on December 4, 1943, at Edison Hall, 228 West 47th Street, New York, New York, called by Dr. MAX TEEGAN, HOWARD FAST, HERMAN, SHIVITN, and FMEDI WASHINGTON, for the purpose of planning a committee for democratic culture to present in an effective manner the contribution of the negro to American art and culture.

Am article appeared in the PEOPLIS VOICE for December 4, 1943, stating that Dr. YERGAN served as chairman at this affair and that the specific outcome of the meeting was a proposed two day conference to be held, early in 1944 which would attempt to:

- (1) popularise through screen, radio, stage, art, literature, education, and music, the democratic ideal of equality and brotherhood of all races
- (2) Modify the traditional concepts now limiting the negro performer to certain stereotyped roles, so that each may employ his talent in the medium to which he is best suited.
- (3) Coordinate the activities of existing organizations which are nothing to open more employment opportunities for negroes in the entertainment industry and to eliminate racial barriers in the field of art.
- (4) Sponsor sotivities based upon the bultural contributions of the negro people.

LEWIS, in the "New Leader" dated June 12, 1948, page 3, column 2, reported that the C.A.W., along with the American Labor Party Progressive Citizens of America, IWO, UOPWA and UE, is publically a supporter of the newly formed New York Committee Against War Propaganda" which LEWIS describes as a pro-Kremlin Committee."

the sponsors of the Peoples Radio Foundation Incorporated which was included in the Attorney General's list of subversive organizations in September, 1948.

ELEANOR ROOSEVELT, writing on the WIDF Convention in Budapest, stated, in her column entitled, "LADIES IN THE RED", which appeared in the December 14, 1948 issue of the "New York World Telegram", that she has collected some of the literature of subject organization. She says that from this literature she learned that the heads of all women's organizations will be changed and new ones carefully chosen so that they will cooperate wholeheartedly with the Women's International Democratic Federation.

The release stated that the C.A.W. was calling women everywhere to support, Women Fight Back Day", October 25, when a series of mass rallies in major cities will arouse women to protest the alarming increase of attacks on basic civil liberties. Seattle, Chicago and New York have already announced such preparations for the rallies.

The New York rally jointly sponsored by the C.A.W., Women for Civil Rights Congress, EM'A-LAZARUS Division of the J.P.F., and others, will be held in Manhattan Center on October 25, 1948.

C., dated August 1, 1940, from CHARLES/BISHOP, colored, 124 South Fourteenth Street, Municipal Jail, St. Louis, Missouri. The letter addressed to this office requested investigation of the alleged mistreatment of CHARLES BISHOP by members of the St. Louis Police Department.

The St. Louis Office has a file entitled "CHARLES P. BISHOP; JAMES DUNKING, Mational Motor Vehicle Theft Act". It appears that subject CHARLES P. BISHOP is identical with the author of the letter addressed to Mrs. ROOSEVELT dated August 1, 1940. St. Louis, Missouri, The report of Special Agent dated May 16, 1929, indicates that BISHOP and DUNKING were indicted by the Federal Grand Jury at East St. Louis, Illinois on May 15, 1929, and on the same date each subject entered a plea of guilty before Federal Judge WHAM, East St. Louis, and each was sentenced to serve two years in United States Industrial Reformatory, Chillicothe, Ohio.

In view of the fact that Mr. FREER states that he has received a request from the Honorable O. JOHN ROGGE; Read of the Criminal Division of the Department of Justice, to make a preliminary investigation in this matter, it is referred to the Bureau for advice as to whether this investigation should be initiated. In view of the fact that Mr. FREER has requested that the investigation receive preferred attention, it is respectfully requested that the Bureau advise the St. Louis Office telegraphically as to whether this --investigation should be conducted. Honorable O. John Rogge, Head of the Criminal Division of our Department, has referred to this office the enclosed photostatic copy of a letter, dated August 1, 1940, addressed to Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, and signed by Charles Bishop, who appears to be presently confined in the Homer G. Phillips Hospital as a result of injuries alleged to have been received through third degree methods at the hands of the St. Louis Police.

Mr. Rogge advises that this letter has been referred to the Department by the White House, and suggests that a confidential preliminary investigation be made, and if such investigation discloses that the claims made in the letter appear probable, I am to advise him by wire, and a more complete investigation will be immediately requested.

Mr. Rogge further states that Mr. Bishop is not being informed as to this reference and that his communication has not been acknowledged by the Department at the time of the writing, namely, August 14, 1940.

If you can give the matter preferred preliminary attention, I will appreciate it. The enclosed photostatic copy is the only one I have, so I am sending it along for your use.

Dear Madam:

You have helped all since opportunities were first granted you. I am begging you first to please forgive me if this humiliates you in any respect. But Madam my circumstances are forcing me to appeal to some one in which I know has the heart to see that justice is given to one that is helpless.

My name is Charles Bishop, I am a Negro, 30 years of age. I was born in the State of Mississippi Dec. 6, 1909. My parents moved to Memphis, Tenn. later and that is where I started downward. Madam I am going to explain truthfully my past as brief as I possibly can. I started running around with other boys and getting into trouble. I was sent to a reformatory for fifteen years Dec. 1925. I ran away April 12th, 1928. I was arrested again April 1, 1929. I was riding in a stolen car and was sent to Chilicotha, Ohio to the Government reformatory, later I was transferred to Leavenworth, Kansas. I do not know why. I was released from there Dec. 24th, 1930.

In 1931 I robbed a man and was arrested, pleaded guilty and given 15 years in Jefferson City. I served 8 years and 7 months.

Now I am getting to what I wanted to ______you about. I have been really bad, Madam, and justly punished. Madam I was released from Jefferson City State Prison Nov. 22, 1939, with a determination to serve God and do the right thing. While I was in prison I studied hard to have the necessary learning to obtain and hold a job. I also learned that crime don't pay.

I confessed my sins to God and am forgiven I know, but I am back in jail and am in the hospital suffering from the beating that the police gave me making me lie on myself.

Mrs. Roosevelt, I am absolutely innocent. Here is my case: On the 10th of Dec. 1939, I was passing a little confectionery store and a fellow salled me whom I knew in prison. This was the first time that I had seen him in 16 or 20 months. So we talked about different things, and I started to go, (this fellow is named Oscar Johnson) then Johnson said "How about pulling a few jobs (meaning sticking up some one) I told

/

him if he ever say anything of that sort to me again I would tell every rolice in St. Louis. So he said that he was only joking, I did think that he was teasing me because I had just been released. But a few days later he was arrested on suspect of robbery and was released. Then he and his gang formed the idea that I snitched on him (Johnson). They had one fellow in their gang that called himself Frank Cambany, he was rooming at my house at that time. A few days after Johnson was released I saw this fellow early one morning coming in with six or seven suits of clothes, and his pockets filled with money. I told my wife the results of having a thief in the house, and told her to ask him to move. Then my wife told me to ask him to move. I did. Frank Cambany got sore and said all manner of evil things about me; but I did not lose my temper. Frank was a shoe shine boy at the Confectionery Store, Oscar Johnson was the manager, and Clint Rice was the owner; Frank's rent was up on Friday, Now that Friday, about noon just before Frank moved a detective by the name of Millbrooks (a negro) stopped by the store and arrested Frank on suspicion of robbery. That gave them the belief that I was a stool pidgeon. This Frank fellow wanted to be a gangster real bad, so they planned to kill me and appointed Frank to do the job. But I was trying to go by the rules of my parole, and did not associate with ex-convicts nor run around at no time at night so his chances of killing me were slim.

Mrs. Roosevelt, I did not know these things before I was arrested. I learned all of these things after I was framed. After Frank could not get a chance to kill me they planned to frame me if they were even caught. They know I would be easily framed because I was out on parole. So they robbed a place in East St. Louis and got caught, the law came and got me out of bed on their statement. They beat me two nights straight with my hands tied behind me and my feet chained to the floor. I can and will testify these things in court. While hanging by my wrist they beat me and kicked me all over. They were careful not to disfigure my face. They made me say yes and that I was with them. I was arrested Jan. 9th, 1940. They got me out of bed and I knew nothing about these robberies.

Mrs. Roosevelt those fellows told the truth after the detectives had obtained a warrant for me. Those detectives knew I was innocent Mrs. Roosevelt, but they usually get a bonus, so they did not care about one's life.

A STATE A

Madam, I know your circumstances, I know there is no way for you to check personally, but this is what I am asking: I have a sister in Memphis, Tenn. at 580 St. John St. who is willing to do everything in her power for me, but she is poor and has four girls to look after. Will you have some one to investigate my case thoroughly? These are the names of the men who implicated me but told the truth later. Oscar Johnson pleaded guilty and was given 30 years. Frank Cambany intered a Plead and received 20 years. Carvest Taylor got 20 years. Eddie Parish was their chauffeur and was given 8 years. They all are in the State Prison of Jefferson City.

I am sure they will verify what I have said. Madam if I am convicted it will no doubt mean life for me. This Madam I can truthfully may, God knows that I am innocent. I have no money to engage an attorney. My sister has no money and my friends have all moved or have died during my 8 years of imprisonment. There is no one to help me. This is the reason I am appealing to you. If some one will just investigate I will be satisfied because they are sure to find that I am innocent. Now Mrs. Roosevelt if I am given a chance to prove my innocence I am sure that I can prove to you and the world that I am innocent. Will you please use your influence by having me given a chance to prove my innocence?

On January 26, 1951 T-11 advised that a meeting of the Progressive Party was held January 20, 1951, at which time a collection was nade and approximately \$200 received, which money was to be used for the purpose of defending the 7 Negroes sentences for execution in February for raping a white girl in the State of Virginia (the Hartins-ville Seven).

T-3 advised on February 14, 1951 that on February 7, 1951, a meeting of the Progressive Party was held in Duluth, Minnesota, and that among the issues that were taken up and discussed were:

- (1) For the Progressive Party to work more closely with the Negro people in Duluth;
- (2) For the Progressive Party to work with the rank and file Negro workers:
- (3) To send a delegate to attend the next National Association for the Advancement of Colored People meeting as a Progressive Party leader:
- (4) For the Progressive Party to work for a State Fair Employment Practices Commission.

T-l advised on February 14, 1951 that on February 11, 1951, a dinner was sponsored by the CP District No. 9 at the IOGT Hall in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The occasion was the celebration of the birthday of WHLLI.M Z. FOSTER, and the main speaker at the dinner was Mr. PETTIS PERMY of New York, the Secretary of the National Negro Commission of the CP. Informant advised that Mr. PEMMY devoted much of his speech to the Magro problem and referred to the "selling out of democracy in the State of Virginia where they have presently 23 more Negroes lined up for execution like the Martinsville Seven." He also mentioned the selling out of democracy in Mississippi, Mabama and Washington, D. C., and referred specifically to segregation which exists in Washington, D. C. During the course of his speech Mr. PEMMY sensored Mrs. ELE NOW ROOSEVELT and stated that she should be disbarred from NAMCP Board for not lifting a finger to expose the injustices in the southern states.

"The Shreveport Journal," Shreveport, Louisiana, carried an article on 4-4-61 captioned "Veterans Group Demands Probe in Mississippi" reporting that Mickey-Levine, National Chairman of the American Veterans Committee had written the Attorney General demanding that an investigation be conducted in Mississippi regarding the leadership of the White Citizens Council. Levine specifically referred to the use of police dogs to disperse a crowd of Negroes who had gathered in Jackson, Mississippi, to protest prosecution of nine Negroes connected with a library sit-in demonstration. Levine protested segregation practices followed in Mississippi and said "terrorism and official murder has been the policy of the officials." He stated "our Federal Bureau of Investigation has been surprisingly ineffective in its spasmodic efforts to intervene."

The article states the AVC describes itself as the "only non-segregated veterans group." Honorary members according to the article are Harry S. Truman, Eleanor Roosevelt and Ralph J. Bunche. National Advisory Council members include Orville/Freeman, Adlai Stevenson, Senator Paul Bouglas of Illinois, Senator Harrison/Williams of New Jersey, Senator Stephen Young of Ohio and Robert R. Nathan, former head of Americans for Democratic Action.

INFORMATION IN BUFILES:

A security investigation of the AVC was conducted between February, 1947, and April, 1950. At its inception the AVC was reportedly infiltrated by communists in local chapters particularly in New York City, Los Angeles and Washington, D. C. At its national convention held in Chicago in 1949, a strong anticommunist group was elected to office and at that time investigation indicated the organization was relatively free from communist influence and domination. A news article in the "Arkansas Gazette" of 3-3-60 reported that

The founder of the organization is generally considered to be Gilbert A. ("Gil") CARRISON, ASN 19181014, a Corporal in the Army Air Forces. HARRISON is said to be well connected and numbers among his friends such prominent individuals as Mrs. ELEANOR ROOSEVELT; Secretary of Commerce HENRY A. WALLACE; and WALTER WANGER, motion picture executive. He adopted the practice of describing his Army career in a series of letters which he mimeographed and sent to a group of his friends, mostly former students at the University of Southern California. After HARRISON was transferred to New Guinen (where he is presently reported to be attached to an Intelligence Unit), he continued to write of his career, sending letters to a friend and former business associate, ADELAINE (Adaline) GUNTHER, a well known University of Southern California cample Figure, who had the letters mimeographed and mailed to HARRISON's friends under the title, "The Berometer".

Copies of this circular letter reached CHARLES C, FOLTE, who at that time did not know HARRISCN. BOLTE subsequently followed a minitar ulan in reporting his own Army experiences after he enlisted in the British Army. He continued doing so following his discharge and return to the United States early in 1943 and, it is claimed, the letters were so well received that he commenced printing the correspondence. The combined efforts of HARRISON and BOLTE thus became the forerunner of the organization's present publication. "The Bulletin".

Confidential Informant T-2 advised that beginning on February 27, 1945 delegates would arrive in Washington, D. C. from New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Illinois, and possibly from some other states, for the purpose of individual contact with Senators and Representatives to gain their support for passage of Permanent F.E.P.C. Legislation. These contacts will be made by members of the delegations as individual citizens and no rallies or demonstrations in Washington, D. C. are anticipated.
