

The New York Times for September 30, 1945 set forth information to the effect that IPS. FRANKLIN D. POOSEVEIT is scheduled to deliver two of fifteen lectures to be given at the adult work shop on interracial relations of the DOWNTOWN COLLUNITY SCHOOL. This announcement was made by MRS. ELLEN S. ROOCE, School Director. The story went on to relate that MRS. ROOCEVEIT was to be the principal speaker at the dinner copening the work shop on inter-racial affairs at the Biltmore Hotel on the October 2, 1945. Lecture dates and topics for MRS. ROOSEVEIT were listed as being: "Housing and Community Planning - One Approach to Inter-Cultural Relations" is scheduled for November 12th; and a lecture on November 26th on "Democratic Education." M.S. POOSEVELT was also to participate in one or more of the discussion sessions.

These lectures on inter-racial affairs are to begin October 22 at 8:15 PM in the meeting room of the Church of St. Mark's in the Bouwerrie across the street from the DOENTOWN COMMUNITY SCHOOL. These meetings are to continue every Konday until the middle of May. The series is to be opened by DR. BERNHARD J. STERN of Columbia University. Among the lecturers will be DR. MARGARET MEAD, associate curator of ethnology of the American Museum of Matural Mistory. The story in the New York Times reported further that other speakers at the dinner would include: DR. STEPHEN S. MISE, DR. MEAD, DR. CHANNING H. FOBIAS, and DR. J. RAYMOND WALSH.

The New York Times of October 3, 1945 reported that MRS.

ELEANOR ROOSEVELT had been the speaker at the dinner sponsored by the

DOWNTOWN COMMUNITY SCHOOL at the Hotel Biltmore and was reported to have said
with reference to Russia, "If we learn to trust them, perhaps they'll
trust us." She attributed failures in this country to leaders who were
not able to have confidence in the people here or peoples of different
races and religions because of fear of them. Other speakers at the meeting included DR. CHANNING H. TODIAS, secretary for Negroes at the Young

ROOSEVELT discussed the DEMINIONN COLLUNITY SCHOOL. This writeup said
that the school which started at the Greenwich House on Parrow Street had
grown so rapidly that it was necessary to secure additional space, and that
the school is now located in a building which was formerly a hospital.



The basic concept of the school is that it shall really be a community school. It proposes to take part in the life of the community and include all the elements of the community among its students, thereby helping them to live and work in the future in a community. The part I like best is the fact that they expect to work with the parents as well as with the children, and this seems to me to make a great deal of sense in any educational adventure!

From the New York Amsterdam News of August 11, 1945, information was obtained to the effect that LRS. RCOSEVEIF will serve as a lecturer in the adult work shop on inter-racial relations of the DOWNTOWN COMMUNITY SCHOOL. The article states further that DR. MARGARET PAD is Chairman of the school's inter-racial relations section which aims at eradicating group prejudices and tensions which delay the Democratic way of life in this country. The article states that KRS. ROOSEVELT will serve without compensation and her lectures will be given to teachers, parents, and professionals interested in helping promote inter-racial understanding and friendship. Other lecturers were listed as being IRS. PAUL/ROBESON and ROBERT L./COOPLR, director of the Wittwyck School for Boys. Information was set forth that the DOWNTOWN COLLUNITY SCHOOL was established in 1944 in rooms of the Greenwich House Music School with sixty children in four grades. For the 1945-46 school year, DR. IEAD indicated that 200 children would be accepted, 100 in the mursery group and 100 in the six grades.

Ghinese Puzzle

OW DID it come to pass that in non-Communist China, whose people had long been schooled in regarding the United States as their greatest friend, American prestige has been rapidly declining and the legend of American "imperialism" has been growing among the common people and the intellectuals?

The answer to this question, which is all too easily explained by blaming Chinese Communist propaganda, is in reality to be sought in Washington and throughout the rest of this country. When those who make our policy in the Far East are themselves infected with the virus of Communist propaganda, as parroted by Wallace, that the United States is a war-mongering, imperialistic power; when our own spokes. men and officials transmit to China the Communist-slanted comments of Americans and propound in China views in consonance with Moscow's rather than America's interests; is it any wonder that the Chinese are turning against America? But how do such things happen? It would take a powerful searchlight to expose the origins of this puzzling phenomenon.

OW DOES it come to pass that H Elesnor Roosevelt, who as the First Lady of the Land had unrivalled opportunities to get at the facts, dispenses different truths with either hand? In her daily column, in disparagement of the Wallace candidacy, she affirms that secret police are the earmarks of a Fascist or Communist state and that Communists the world over sow chaos to defeat democracy, in her monthly page in The Ladies Home Journal, she offers such pearls as that the Soviets are anxious for peace and are not preparing an attack against us now, and that they have brought "advantages to them (the Russian people) in the past twenty-five

And how does it happen that a trustyears." worthy reporter such as CL Sulzberger of The New York Times, in reviewing Robert St. John's "efficient propaganda job" The Silent People Speak, also carries water on both shoulders? After describing St. John as a "subconscious follower of the party line," after exposing the untruths, the errors and the perversions of St. John's account of life in Titoslavia, Mr. Sulzberger properly asseverates in The New York Times Book Review that the author's "greatest distortion is moral," and is "just as phony in its bias as that of a truly Fascist observer." And yet he ends on a note recommending the book as "of immense interest . . . to anyone."

THESE ARE but a very few specimens I from a monthly sheaf of questions of world-wide range and variety. How did we come to such a pass? Is it merely an accident that the lie has been enthroned, that the double standard has become an accepted norm of public opinion, and that conspiracy has its place in the political life of a free people?

Dear Rep. John S. Wood:

There is no such thing as free speech as the term "free speech" is so glibly and misunderstandingly applied. Free speech is restricted to citizens who live within the Constitution.

One of the most deceptive statements of Communists and their fellow travellers - public officials and college professors with high-sounding namesis: "I believe in DEMOCRACY - a democratic form of government." Democracy is according to OFFICIAL definitions and, as the term implies, the very essence of Communism and wherever tried has resulted in dictatorship. Joe Stalin and his henchmen used the word "DEMOCRACIE" to foist his dictatorship on the Russians. The fact that democracy, the rule of the mob, won't work is as old as civilization itself. The remark of James Madison, frail little Father of the Constitution, that: "Democracy is the bait of schemers and crocked peliticians" fits our biggest peddlers of democracy about as neatly as a glove. I would have you read Madison on "Democracy" and "Republicanism" in No.X in FEDERALIST (most book and dept. stores).

"We are a democratic people in contradictinction to aristocracy. Our government was founded as a REPUBLIC so as to be, on the one side, opposed to democracy; on the other to Monarchy." - Principles of Constitutional Law, Thomas N. The United States shall GUARANTEE to every State in this Union a REPUBLICAN form of government; ... - From our Constitution (Art. IV, Sec. 4). "The Constitution... not only promises that the Union will interpose with all its might...if internal or external causes threaten to overthrow their REPUBLICAN form of government, but it absolutely forbids them (people) to adopt any other form under any condition or for any reason whetsoever. - Constitutional Law of the U.S.A., Dr. H. Von Halst.

Citizens who un-Americanize themselves to the extent of talking collectivism, communism, democracy, fascism, nazism, liberalism, socialism, or a new world order - "Union Now" forfeit all Constitutional rights. And, according to our Constitution and Laws, it becomes the solemn duty of the good citizens of this REPUBLIC to have them imprisoned or executed.

Is it true, as Panton Malker relates, the Administration has 200 million dollars earmarked to be spent in close areas? In other words, does the Rossevelt-Truman CIO-PAC coelition mean to plunge the American taxpayers 200 million dollars deeper in debt in order to deny the American people their right to free elections, and to keep themselves in office? And, if so:

"Our fathers asserted what we are accustomed to call the "right of Revolution. One great end of government is protection, - to secure men in their rights to life, liberty, property, happiness and home. But if government, instead of recognizing the rights of men, denies these rights; if, instead of protecting these rights, it violates them, it is no longer a righteous government and has no right to demand obedience and subjection. It may have power to rule, but it has no right to rule. 'Government ceases to be an object of obedience when it becomes an instrument of oppression. . Administrations are often turned from an unjust course by an unsuccessful revolution...... This is what Jefferson had in mind when he said some

The faithful citizen, as against an unjust government will first seek all other means of self-preservation and defence. The American Republic - James A. Woodburn. When the American people wake up, the life of our "schemers and crooked politicians" may not be worth much.

According to the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution, what right have or had we to join any League of Mations, United Mations or World Court? According to the Monroe Doctrine and the Pledge of Allegiance what right had or have we to interfere in the internal concerns of any foreign power or to take the side of one nation against another nation?

Certain noisy and impudent minority groups show they hate this country and our Constituted representative republican form of government. They clamor for democracy or a homeland of their own. It is the right and it may be the duty of the Congress to give these groups opportunity to have what they desire. Let's put the matter to a vote of the people as to whether or not they should be colonized outside the United States as are the Igorrotes and the Japs. And, if so, then write into the Constitution, by amendment, to bar them and their descendants forever from our shores.

The duties of the President are, broadly speaking, to see that the provisions of our Constitution and laws are faithfully carried out -- not to try to cram his ideas of government down the neck of the American people or to try to tell their Congressmen and Senators what they "must" or must not do.

Moreover, the Executive, Judicial and Legislative branches of our Government are not co-equal. I beg you and those receiving copies of this letter to persuade every Congressman and Senator to peruse FEDERALIST and study Article 1, Section 8, Clause 18 of our Constitution. They should then have intestinal fortitude sufficient to look any brass hat or other public official in the face and firmly tell him to keep his trap shut on matters pertaining to Congress - no matter what his position may be. What offense would it be against the Constitution to kick them in the teeth even now!





Conservative Has a Very Valuable Place in Politics

NEW YORK, Wednesday—The other night I went to a meeting of a group that is attempting to form an organization of independents. It was supposed to be a group of independent Democrats but there were some Republicans present. By ELEANOR ROOSEVELT

Their idea was to make these independents active within their parties, if possible. If not, then they would get them working to gether so that they would wield some influence on the party machinery from the outside.

I was amused by a good young epublican, a student of Fordham Republican, a student of Fordham University, who asked me what the attitude should be of someone who held what I called reactionary idea. He evidently believed that I did not think there was any place in the country for reactionaries or conservatives.

reactionary. But I think there is a very valuable place to be filled by the honest conservative. He is the balance wheel for those who want to move too fast and he does make progressive or liberal mind. want to move too fast and he does make progressive or liberal-mind-ed people examine their positions more carefully. For that reason I think he plays an important role in political life. The opposition is always important in any govern-ment and the better the opposition the better the party in power.



If you ask me

BY ELEANOR ROOSEVELT



I am afraid we were unaware of any danger. We did know, as we renovated the plumbing and the kitchen, that many of the pipes had deteriorated and we were lucky that nobody had typhoid. Every time a board had to be taken up we marveled at the intricacies of the pipes running under the old house. The maintenance men were extraordinary, we remarked, to be able to keep everything in order as they usually did. The structural troubles were never brought to our attention.

What did your secretary, Miss Mahina Thompson, do before she become associated with you?

Miss Thompson worked for the American Red Cross during and after World War I, and then came to work in the women's division of the Democratic State Committee when I first began to work there.

Why do the cursus people ask us about our incomes and what we do for a living? Do they give this information to the income-tax people?

I haven't the remotest idea, but I suppose
there is some good reason. The information
is all supposed to be kept confidential. It is
primarily to help the government got a picture
of the economic condition of the country and
the people. I doubt if it would be necessary for
the census-takers to give any information to
the income-tax people, since we do that ourselves every your when we file our income-tax
returns, and we do it in greater dotail than is
required by the coassa.

What can be done to get government action to give our food surpluses to the starving in China? What government department would handle shir? Is Congressional action first necessary?

It is a very complicated thing that you are saking, because it requires action by a good many government departments. Food surpluses are in the hands of the Department of Agriculture, but the decision as to where they should be distributed would be in the hands of the State Department, I imagine, in conjunction with the United Nations. In addition, how those food surpluses are to be paid for would be a quantition to be decided by a number of departments. Then there would be the quan-

tion of transportation, and the cost of that would come under another department. You would have to have the consent of Congress, as Congress would have to appropriate the money. The answer to this question is not as simple as it would appear to he.

For a fong time I have had one drawn that repeats itself over and over again. Does this ever happen to you?

No. I am afraid I dream very rarely. I am usually so tired when I go to hed that I go to sleep immediately, and if I have a dream I rarely recollect it when I wake up.

Since the Post Office Department has cut down mall deliveries, won't thit increase unemployment by many thousands? It seems to me that the saving made by this out in service wif be largely counteracted by unemployment insurance and relief measures that may become necessary.

I cannot answer your question because I am not familiar with the budgets of the post offices throughout the country, but I cannot believe that the Postmaster General would have ordered these cuts unless they were going to bring about real savings and not factitious ones such as you suggest. With any kind of reorganization of the government there is bound to be a certain amount of unemployment, but I think it will be found that those who have a certain amount of training are better kept in the service, for in the long run they expedite the work.

Do you think anything of importance was accomplished by the Mostnee, Wisconsin, "Red Day," when the American Lexion sourcered a mock Soviet invasion?

Unfortunately two deaths were caused that, I think, might have occurred under other circumstances, since both of them were heart patients. I doubt, however, if anyone learned anything about communism by this much invasion which they could not have learned in other ways just as successfully.

I have read in "Il You Ask Me" that you and Mr. Roosevelt were first countus five states removed. Will you please explain how that sould be and of the same smarration?



Reference is made to your letter of November 22, 1943 in the above entitled matter in which you request that we obtain the original letter and forward three photostatic copies of same to the Bureau without further delay.

Upon contacting Mr. Bauman, Agent in Charge of the Secret Service, New York City, he advised that he recalled reference of this matter to this office, but stated that his office did not presently have the original of the letter in their possession. He mentioned that the original was turned over to Detective of the Alien Squad, New York City Police Dept.

After contact was had with appeared at the New York City Police Dept., Detective appeared at the New York Office, at which time he turned over to the office the anonymous letter referred to in this matter. He mentioned, however, that there was no reference actually made in the letter concerning Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, but that a possible threat to her was inferred at the time of its receipt due to the fact that she was to appear on one of their programs within a period of several days.

Detective mentioned that Miss BESSIE BEATTY, a commentator on this program, has received numerous anonymous letters concerning various threats to her person and reputation, but that she had made no report of same to the authorities, nor would she be willing to testify or furnish any information as to the identity of the writer of any of these letters, even were she sure of the identity of this individual.

In accordance with your request, I am enclosing herewith the briginal to this letter, together with three photostatic copies thereof, and it is nequested that the original be returned to this office when it has served it's purpose as I am desirous of returning same to the New York City Police Dept.



These pro-Stalin politicians who follow Henry Wallace and Eleanor Roosevelt have passed laws in certain states forbidding the erection of privately owned commercial swimming pools unless these swimming pools permit black and white to swim together.

It is only a matter of a few months until it is likely to be declared un-Constitutional and unlawful to send a child to a school for whites only, or a young man and a young woman to a college for whites only.

PRESIDENT HARRY TRUMAN

has allowed himself to give his O. K. to a socalled civil rights program which, in fact, was originally outlined by a conference of Negro Communists held in Detroit, Michigan. President Truman was mislead by a group of Northern politicians into believing that this program of social intermixture of black and white was smart politics.

This is no longer a political issue. It is a question of whether or not the white race is going to commit treason against itself and its America.

If the white people do not awaken and start voting for public officials who believe honestly and fearlessly in white supremacy, it is only a matter of time until the Negro vote in the South and the Southwest will be powerful enough to subdue and belittle and destroy the leadership of the white man.

We who believe in protecting the white man's interest do not hate the Negro and would not rob him of any rights guaranteed under the Constitution, but we are going to fight to the bitter end any attempt on the part of Washington politicians to force the following upon us:


1. The F. E. P. C.—a law now being advocated by the leaders of both old parties in the North to force a white man to hire Negroes, whether

Or if he should say, "I want five Christian girls to work in my office," he could be fined or imprisoned or both for saying "Christian," on the grounds that this would offend the Jews.

3. Black and white mixture in schools. Strange enough, our colleges are so full of Communists, pinks and pro-Russian propagandists that an alarming number of our public school teachers and college professors actually favor the mixture of black and white children and young people in schools. We white people must fight this to the death. While the column is syndicated by United Features, which is owned by Scripps - Howard, Republican executives at the head of Scripps - Howard sent out a flat order that because of Mrs. Roosevelt's political views, her column was not to be published 94-8-350-838 in Scripps - Howard papers. One or two Scripps - Howard papers, notably the "Washington News," are ignoring the directive but the others are banning the former first lady of the land."





THE CAPITAL'S CABBIES

by A. B. CYNHIPPLE

"DON'T KILL AMERICANS BY CARELESS TALK."
NEVER DISCUSS MILITARY OR NAVAL INFORMATION
IN A PUBLIC VEHICLE. DON'T TALK!"

Anyone who has ridden in Washington taxicabs has seen this sticker pasted to the back of the driver's seat. But practically everyone knows that this "DON'T TALK" rule applies in practice only to the back seat. For Washington cabdrivers are the most lavish conversationalists in the U.S. From the time a visitor to Washington is jammed into a five-passenger cab with six other people, unstil the time he reaches his destination, he gets a fluent dissertation on politics and the war, bureaucrats and Negroes, military strategy and the cabby's domestic troubles.

Although each cabby has his own opinions, many of them are extraordinarily well informed on the most recent manipulations of Capitol Hill. Most of the cabbies' political information and rumors comes from talkative pairs of politicians, but a lot of it comes from separate Congressmen and Senators on their way home from the Hill. After a particularly stormy session on the floor of the House, a Congressman is only too glad to pour his post-mortems into the willing ears of a cabdriver.

Cabbies like to talk about military strategy too, and some of them have radical proposals to help win the war. Said one the other day: "Those U-Boats sure are a menace. You know, I've had an idea for beating those U-Boats. Americans have put across some pretty big draining projects. TVA, and all that stuff. Why not drain the Atlantic Ocean, see? Then there wouldn't be any more subs. Hell, we could drive all the stuff over in trucks. It'd be simple."

Few cabbies have such fantastic proposals. But most of them lay claim to having had a "job" (passengers are always called "jobs") who was a general or an admiral and who gave them the low-down on the best strategical move in any given situation. Apparently Washington is crammed with talkative generals and admirals who have any number of unorthodox plans for the attack on Europe. Send thousands of transport planes into Germany one night, and land a whole army in Berlin by parachute. Or, send WACs outo the Continent in the first assault wave on the theory that, for one reason or another, Nazi soldiers wouldn't drive them back into the sea.—

The cabbies also like to talk about the bureaucrats, and some of

The cabbies also like to talk about the bureaucrats, and some of them have their own names for the various alphabetical agencies. OPA means "Office of Piddling Around." WPB stands for "Why Production is Bad." And the ODT, which legislates wartime use of taxicabs as well as buses and trucks, has been affectionately dubbed. "Office for Discouraging Taxicabs." To the cabbies the name "bureaucrat" has become a form of insult. When a pedestrian pays no attention to a light and crosses in front of traffic, he is a "damned humanorar."

"I den't want to show up in 'My Day'

The cabbies have definite likes and dislikes. Most of them like beer and baseball, short hauls and funny papers; dislike cops and pedestrians, Negroes and Eleanor Roosevelt. A lot of them are Southerners who don't have any sympathy with the Administration's attitude in the Negro question. One cabby let out a yell one day when a Negro driver cut is front of him at a crossing, and added: "I'd have got out and climbal all mars him has been an accounted."

But most of all, the cabbies like to talk about business. Business these days is good, better than anyone can remember. Washington is througed with granaleses, people who need cabs to get anywhere, people who know nothing about the transit system and have no desire to learn became they will only be in town a few days. They make up a large part of the cabdrivers business, and there are enough of them alone to keep all of Washington's 3,000-odd cabs busy. So the cabbies for the last year have been living the life of Riley. Cabbies in Washington have a freedom they would have in few other cities. Most of them have their own cabs. A lot of them have made enough money to buy even more cabs and have formed their own taxicab companies under a name of the store of the lines of the have and their own taxicab companies under a name of the store of the lines of

There are /sociacion/Sens punies, and most of them are independent drivers, joined to for conveniences of common telephones, repairs, and, of course, lawyers. So the Washington cabby's time is his own. He is his own boss. He can work from dawn to midnight if he wants, or he can work only a few hours a week. One cabby has a simple system of his own. Says he: "I used to have a white-collar job but I quit it for this. My wife doesn't like it much. She says it's degrading. But I figure it this way. I work until I've got sixty bucks, ten more than I got on my last job. Then I quit. It doesn't matter if I'm through for the week, or if I only worked two days. Sixty bucks, I quit. I usually only have to work three days. Then I got my sixty, and I go home. It's positively beautiful." For the first time in a longer period than they can remember, the cabbies have their customers where they want them. No longer can anyone get a cab by the time-honored Washington method of calling the cab company. There's plenty of business cruising, and nothing has been done to stop cruising yet. The cabby knows that after a customer has stood in the heat for half an hour, he isn't going to complain about how he is taken to his destination. Washington cabs have no meters, and fares are computed by nones in the city. And the cocky cabbies always have an answer for the guy who takes the longest possible ride within one sone, pays his twenty cents and asks if that is correct. "It's correct, but it ain't right, Mac." Although Washington cabbies are their own bosses, there is always the Public Utilities Commission. The PUC registers every cab, can set whatever rules it wants, and the cab drivers have to follow them or lose their licenses. Cabbies claim that the PUC has a lot of , S. S. plain-clothes men lurking around the city, hopping into cabs all the sime, trying their best to get the cabbies to break the rules. One of the latest rules is that a Washington cab is a common carrier, and Take the state of PUC sleuths are supposed to take a cab to see if the driver will go by someone who is trying to get a ride in the same direction. This rule, logical as it sounds, makes a lot of cabbies mad. They like to make their own choice of "jobs" now that they are in a position to pick and choose, but arbitrary selection like this makes too many Washingtonians angry, so the rule sticks. One of the drivers has his own particular aversion to the rule: "Common carriers. Jeez, you'd think we all had athlete's foot or something." The most complicated fare system in the world The cabbies got a lot of public airing and some attacks in the local press a while ago when it was felt that they were making a little too much of a good thing. They were filling their cabs and charging every passenger full fare unless he was one of a party going from the same place to the same destination. So PUC stepped in and changed the rates. To replace the simple but vulnerable former rates, PUC came out with the most complicated fare system the U. S. has ever known, complete with intricate charts. Charges are computed by sones, as before, but a cabby is supposed to pick up anyone flagging him, going in the same general direction. Whether the passengers are in one party or not, they have to pay the group-ride fares. The new system opened up a whole new field of onversation which runs something like this: "Ain't it just like them long-haired bureaucrats to dream up a ice messy scheme that sobody can understand? The old system was lain and simple. You picked up a job at a place. You took him to a place. You charged him and he paid. If there was another guy they both paid the same fare. Sure, they squawked. They squawked and paid. But that was too easy for them bureaucrats. They didn't have nything to do, so they figured out something nice and complicated, sow I pick up a job down near the White House. So I go up Consections Avenue with him. A guy flags me. I gotta stop and pick him up. A little later, out near the Wardman Park Hotel, another tim up. 


