The following information is contained in New Haven Office files regarding the George Orwell Forum Yale University:

ladvised that according to the On 3/14/58, minutes of a Young Socialist League, National Administrative Committee meeting on 3/3/58, in New York City, it was reported that sympathizers of the Young Socialist League (YSL) had founded a broad group, the George Orwell Club at Yale University. According to this information, 107 people attended its first meeting and 16 new people joined the Orwell group.

An article appeared in the YALE DAILY NEWS, a daily Yale University campus newspaper, New Haven, Conn., Page 1 and Page 8, entitled "'Puerto Rican Problem' Discussed at Orwell Forum". This article reported that one DAN WAKEFIELD of "The Nation" magazine had addressed a George Orwell Forum (GOF) meeting concerning the "Spanish Harlem" problem in New York City. A photograph accompanied this article which pictured WAKEFIELD with ROBERT A BONE, Instructor of English at Yale.

furnished a mimeographed copy of On 4/12/58, a Young Socialist League (YSL) national communication dated April 1, 1958. This communication reported among other things that at New Haven the morale of the comrades was very high, the GOF had some 25 members and an average attendance of 100 at its meetings. An article appeared in the YALE DAILY NEWS, issue of 12/5/58, on Page 1, which reported that NORMAN MATLER, an author, would speak before the GOF on the following Monday on the topic "The White Negro".

On this occasion the furnished a pamphlet which announced that the GOF of Yale University would be host for a two-day conference for students from New England colleges, sponsored by a publication called "Dissent". This publication was described as an "independent quarterly of democratic socialist opinion", listing editors such as NORMAN MATLER, ERICH FROMM, NORMAN THOMAS. The GOF was described in this pamphlet as "a Yale undergraduate group which promotes a discussion of democratic socialism on the Yale campus". Reservations for this conference could be made by contacting ROBERT A. BONE.

An article appeared in the YALE DAILY NEWS, issue of 3/22/60, Page 3, announcing that RAYA DUNAYEVSKAYA gave an address the previous evening, sponsored by the GOP, at Yale. The title of the talk was listed as "Must the Afro-Asian Revolutions Go Communist". The article reported that the lecture emphasized her belief that the African

Revolution did not go Communist but neither did it go Capitalist. The speaker was identified as the former secretary of LEON TROTSKY, who had recently concluded a study of Marxist economics and American democracy.

An article appeared in the YALE DATLY NEWS, issue of 10/4/60, Page 1, announcing that ERICH FROMM would deliver a talk, sponsored by the GOF the following evening. FROMM was described as a noted psychoanalysis and a National Committee man of the Socialist Party-Social Democratic Federation. The title of his talk would be "What is Socialism?".

The above references show all of the information contained in New Haven file concerning captioned group. The organization has not been conclusively identified as a subversive or front club organization.

In view of the descriptive information concerning this organization as above, investigation is not recommended at this time in view of the "on campus status" of this Forum. It is felt that investigation of the activities of this organization would have to be conducted almost exclusively on campus of Yale and among the various students and, therefore, would tend to place the Bureau in a potential embarrassing position.



REVEREND HUBERT N. DUKES

Dukes was born 11-21-94 in Elko, South Carolina. He soc, South South Carolina. He reportedly visited Russia in 1933, and on his return said he was "not so proud of America." During the late 1930's and early 1940's, he was connected with several organizations cited as subversive. He was the subject of a security matter investigation conducted by the Bureau in 1944 based on information that he had addressed a CP meeting in Jackson, Michigan, in September, 1941. Investigation failed to disclose that Dukes was a CP member or that he was active in CF functions. (106-27350E)

DR. ERICH YEROMM

Fromm has not been investigated by the Bureau. Who" of 1958-59 discloses that Fromm was born in Frankfurt, Germany, in 1922. He has practiced psychiatry and lectured at colleges since 1934. In 1943, Fromm was considered as a possible lecturer by the Jefferson School of Social Science (cited by the Attorney General). In 1946, Fromm was friendly with two individuals described by Elizabeth Bentley, self-confessed Soviet espionage courier, as having furnished her information for her Soviet espionage apparatus. (100-391697)

On 6-2-60, Fromm was elected to the National Committee of the Socialist Party-Socialist Democratic Federation (SP-SDF). In July, 1958, the Independent Socialist League (ISL), a basic revolutionary group was removed from the Attorney General's list and the organization was dissolved. ISL members were invited to join the SP-SDF, and many did join. The SP-SDF has not been the subject of an investigation by the Bureau (100-429425)

REVEREND FRANCIS GEDDES

"People's World," a west coast communist newspaper, disclosed that Reverend Francis Geddes was one of six clergymen who wrote letters to the "San Francisco Chronicle" on 7-17-59 that were critical of the HCUA. (100-431562)

TABATA, described by an SWP Boston Executive Committee member as a very important African marxist whose writings seem to be Trotskyist in origin, was the featured speaker at a meeting held at the Tremont Street Methodist Church, Boston, on October 31, 1965. Informant advised that TABATA was on tour in support of Dr. NEVILLE ALEXANDER, a Negro South African scholar, and his companions, who had been imprisoned at South Africa for reading marxist literature. Informant further advised that the meeting had been arranged for by the SWP, Boston, and that subject chaired the meeting.

"The Harvard Crimson," an undergraduate newspaper published at Cambridge, Massachusetts, in its Novamber 8, 1965, edition carried an article reporting on the results of the campaign for the City Council in . the ... recent Cambridge elections. The article reported that subject, "a twenty-four year old Boston University student who ran for the Council as a protest against the war in Viet-Nam ran nineteenth out of a field of twenty-four. He polled seventy-seven first place ballots and was eliminated on the first cut."

The "Boston University News," an undergraduate newspaper published at Boston University, in its November 10, 1965, edition carried the following article:

"University Student Join Peace March

"The University Students for Peace (SFP) will join the Nov. 27 Washington march to protest continued escalation of the Vietnam war, according to John Friedberg (CLA '66), president.

"Protestors will call for an end to bombing of North Vietnam, for immediate negotiations, and for a representative government in the South, Friedberg said.

"Sponsors of the march include authors Saul Bellow, John Hersey and Arthun Miller; Dr. Benjamin Spock and Prof. H. Stuart Hughes of SANE; Dr. Erich Fromm; entertainers Tony Bandall, Ruby Dee and Ossie Davis, and Rabbi Uri Miller.

"Buses will leave Freedom Square in Cambridge at 9 pm Nov. 26. Those who plan to attend should sign up this week at an SFP table in the Union Link.

"SFP passed a resolution opposing the danger of militarism and offering to admit all those who oppose militarism, regardless of political beliefs.' The resolution followed a debate on whether the group should admit members of the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA), a Trotskyite group which Friedberg said has designs on the peace movement.

"Friedberg quoted an internal YSA document which said 'YSA is making a turn toward totally integrating itself in the anti-war movement, toward building it and organizing it."

"The YSAers accused their opponents of red-baiting. Although one member, Gus Horowitz (GRAD) said YSA believes the Viet Cong should win, but we don't think the anti-war movement should take this stand publicly."

possibility was out of the question. He said that we simply could not allow another war to happen and that the purpose of the conference was to impress the trade union movement with the urgent necessity for peace.

A Negro, HILTON HANA, was then introduced. He said he had been sent by PATRICK GORMAN, who could not be present, to read a letter from GORMAN. The letter stated GORMAN was sorry he was unable to attend the conference, but that he agreed with its purposes and wished it all success.

BOLLENS then introduced ERICH FROMM as a Psychiatrist

FROMM stated he was going to talk about the cold war. He then gave a brief historical background of the Soviet Union, stating that up to a certain time officials and representatives of that government worked unceasingly toward world revolution. Then it was decided that conditions in each individual non-socialist country differed greatly and that it would be better to allow each country to choose its own means, related to conditions in that country, to advance its system of government to the ultimate aim of Socialism. He stated at that time State Capitalism had started to develop in Russia and that State Capitalism is the form of government presently existing in Russia rather than Socialism as is believed by many people. He stated that American imperialism was in fact another form

of State Capitalism and that as a matter of practical fact very little difference exists between the current American and Russian forms of government. He stated that both governments aspire to world domination.

He said that both rations were leaded with nuclear weapons. He stated that most people were unable to suppress a feeling of horror whenever they read or heard about human torture carried out in castle dungeons during medieval days, but that such tortures were not comparable to the pain, anguish and terror experienced by the people of Hiroshima and Nagasaki when the American atomic bombs dropped. Such bombs were the equivalent of one thousand tons of TNT. Today's bombs are the equivalent of a million tons of TNT. One dropped over Chicago would kill every living thing within a radius of forty miles.

He said that a statistician named KARN of Rand Corporation was engaged in preparing figures for the United States Government on the possibility of survival following a nuclear attack on this country. He estimated that, providing fifteen minutes warning was received prior to the dropping of bombs, the nation would escape a single attack with a loss of approximately five million lives. If the attack were to come as a complete surprise, between sixty and ninety million people would die as a result. FROMM said it was his own spinion that even if a fifteen minute warning were received, the vast

majority of the American people would be trampled to death in the rush of the population trying to evacuate the big cities.

to ninety million deaths simply had to stop, that the lives of that many people were involved, not just cold figures on a piece of paper. He said that an aroused intelligent people simply would not allow such a holocaust to occur and that our purpose should be the arousing of the people to an awareness of this very real danger and the fearful annihilation which will result if reason is not allowed to prevail.

Then came a question and answer period. A young man, who identified himself as a newspaperman, then asked FROMM what specifically could be done to prevent World War III. FROMM answered that that was why the conference was being held; to work out and put into action specific plans to prevent World War III. Then a man named ROSS, who said he was a member of the Auto Workers' Union at St. Joseph, Michigan, said he had noted FROMM had made quite a point in his speech concerning the Russian desire to definate the world. He said that there was a clique in Russia which desired greater emphasis on attaining world domination through force and violence, but that KHRUSHCHEV was convinced that the peaceful coexistence road to eventual world Socialism should be followed. 

"The Committee affirms that the Act is of dubious legality, that its operations do and can increasingly subvert the Bill of Rights, that its provisions legalize procedures which attack the traditional and honored right of free association.

"We realize that we are launching a new national organization which deals with a highly controversial issue. The handle of liberty is always hot. Whoever gets hold of it in times of national acciety will be upen to the result which the McCarran act makes difficult to refute. He will be called Communist, Communist fellow-traveler, a protector of subversion, a friend of rascals. That chance of the loss of prosperity and private tranquility we must take, if we are not to let slip away the institutions and procedures of a democratic state."

Source advised that as of July, 1966, he has learned of no change in the alms and purposes of the NCRMA than what was promulgated during 1963.

MARCH ON WASHINGTON FOR PEACE IN VIETNAM, WASHINGTON, D. C., NOVEMBER 27, 1965

A confidential source at South Bend, Indiana, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on November 9, 1965, that the October 29, 1965, issue of the University of Notre Dame "Scholastic" in an article entitled "Notre Dame Profs in SANE March," stated, in part, as follows:

"No draft cards will be heread, but after the March on Washington for Peace in Vietnam, Americans will find it harder to avoid the moral contradictions of the war in Vietnam. Such is the feeling of the March's sponsor, The National Committee for a Bane Nuclear Policy (SANE); and two Notre Dame faculty participants, Mr. Joseph M. Duffy, Jr., a Professor of English, and Reverend Peter Riga, Professor of Theology.

"The faculty members joined a nost of prominent individuals—among them Saul Bellow, James Farmer, and Doctors Erich Fromm and Benjamin Spock—last week in Washington for a special March Committee press conference. Committee members announced that the March, "completely peaceful and legal in execution and creative and affirmative in tone' will step off November 27..... The March will begin at 11:00 Am in front of the White House culminating that afternoon in an outdoor meeting beneath the Washington Monument.
